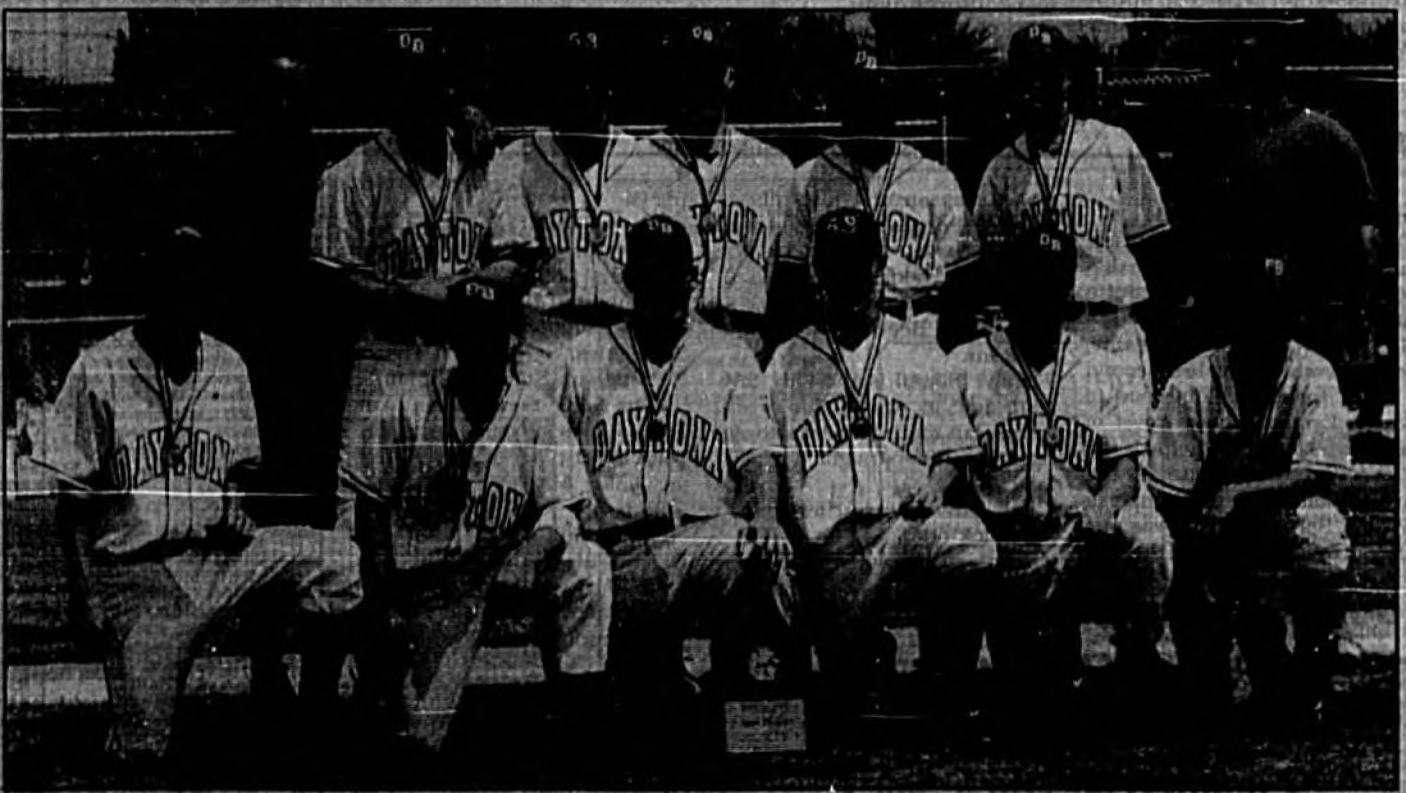

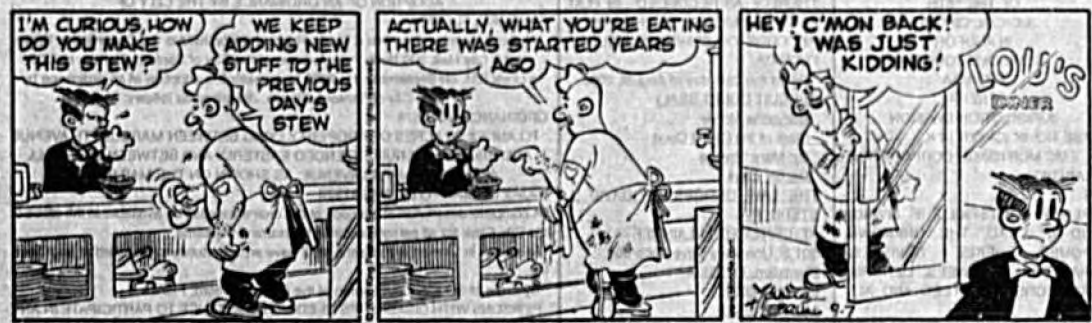

Men have Viagra. What about women?

DEAR DR. GOTT: There's Viagra for men, but what about us women? We're not dead yet! What can we do about vaginal dryness?

DEAR READER: Your question highlights two important issues.

First, male impotence — now called erectile dysfunction, thanks to Bob Dole. This condition, which is common in men over 60, results when blood is not contained in the erectile cylinders of the penis. Viagra alters this. Under the influence of the drug, blood is trapped in the penis, leading to erection. This beneficial consequence is usually welcome but, remember, men with heart problems or those taking nitroglycerine should avoid Viagra.

Second, female menopause. As women age, physiological changes occur. (I won't enumerate them all because you are more than familiar with them.) Two consequences of menopause are vaginal dryness

and shrinkage, which may make intercourse uncomfortable or impossible.

Fortunately, there are several solutions to this problem.

Lubrication in any form — saliva, skin creams or commercial vaginal wetting agents — will virtually solve the problem, providing the difficulty (under a different guise) didn't exist before menopause began.

Thus, your question raises a vital female concern, which, I believe, can be addressed with one of the several vaginal moisturizers on the market — or other techniques.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I often experience sharp pains behind my breastbone; they may spread into my left arm and jaw. I obtain some relief from antacids, and I avoid spicy foods. I am 43. Should I see a doctor? Is this an ulcer?

DEAR READER: It could be. Or you could simply be suffering from symptoms of stomach irritation (gastritis) or hiatal hernia with reflux. You should be examined by your family doctor who will probably order a GI X-ray series to check your upper alimentary tract. This test should show the cause of your discomfort.

If the GI series is inconclusive, you may be a candidate for upper endoscopy, during which a specialist examines your esophagus, stomach and part of your small intestine, using a lighted fiberoptic tube. The fact that your pain is somewhat relieved by antacids

leads me to believe that your problem originates in the intestinal tract, rather than in the heart or lungs. As you probably know, however, angina (heart-muscle cramps) may masquerade as stomach pain. Therefore, in addition to the intestinal X-rays, your doctor may properly choose to obtain a cardiogram (or, better yet, a stress test) and a chest X-ray to rule out the possibility of cardiac or pulmonary disease.

I recommend immediate medical attention, so that any serious disorder can be identified and you can be prescribed treatment that is specific for your problem. I am a 37-year-old male writing from the Hillsborough County Jail in Tampa, Fla. I am here because of a fourth DUI (driving under the influence) arrest — the result of 20 years of alcohol abuse.

Abby, I was brought up to sip from my dad's and uncle's beers. I vividly remember the first time I got drunk. I was 5. I honestly believe it triggered something in my body. I loved the taste.

I am finishing a court-ordered relapse program here in jail. I look forward to a clean and sober extended life when I am released. I have seen the hell of alcohol abuse and it's not pretty.

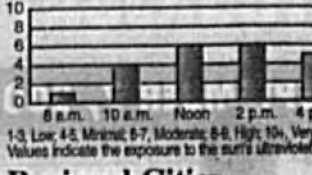

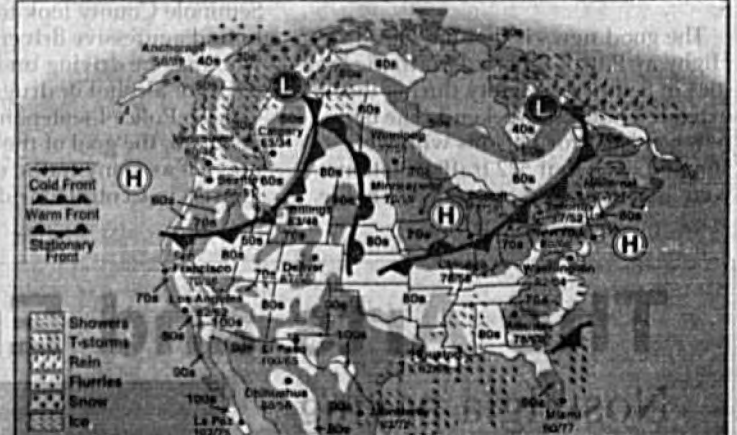
