Sanford County Commissioner James Morse has been asked to disqualify himself from presiding over a lawsuit filed by the county against the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. The lawsuit, filed in Seminole County Circuit Court, alleges that the sheriff's office violated the county's contract with the sheriff's office for the provision of law enforcement services. Morse, who is also a member of the county commission, has been asked to disqualify himself because of his potential conflict of interest.

Gas prices fall to 2-year low

HEATHROW - Gas prices in the state and throughout the nation have dropped to their lowest level in more than two years, according to AAA.

In Florida, AAA Auto Club South reports that the average price for Self-Serve Regular Unleaded is \$1.085 per gallon, down 3.8 cents from the January average of \$1.123 per gallon. This month's average is 20.6 cents less than it was one year ago, and it's the lowest price Florida motorists have seen since December 1995.

The national average price of gasoline is \$1.114 per gallon, down 4.5 cents from last month and at its lowest point since May 1994, when the average was \$1.105 per gallon.

"This dramatic drop in prices is the result of a combination of factors including strong gasoline inventories and low crude oil prices," said Rena Callahan, manager of Public and Government Relations for AAA Auto Club South. "This year, the warm winter is also helping to keep prices low because refiners aren't in a situation where they need to reduce production of gasoline in order to produce more

heating oil."

Callahan noted that problems in Iraq could cause a hike in crude oil prices and result in higher gas prices. During the Persian Gulf War in late 1990, prices jumped from \$1.07 per gallon in August to \$1.38 per gallon in December. This month, the lowest reported price in Florida was 89 cents per gallon in St. Petersburg, and the highest price was \$1.253 per gallon in Palm Beach.

Here are the results of the February Fuel Gauge Survey: SELF-SERVE - Self-Serve Regular Unleaded prices decreased 3.8 cents to an average \$1.085 per gallon, Mid-Grade Unleaded prices dropped 4.4 cents to an average \$1.197 per gallon, and Premium Unleaded prices decreased 5 cents to an average \$1.275 per gallon.

FULL-SERVE - Full-Serve Regular Unleaded prices dropped 2.2 cents to an average \$1.513 per gallon, Mid-Grade Unleaded prices dropped 2.7 cents to an average \$1.612 per gallon and Premium Unleaded prices decreased 2.8 cents to an average \$1.694 per gallon.

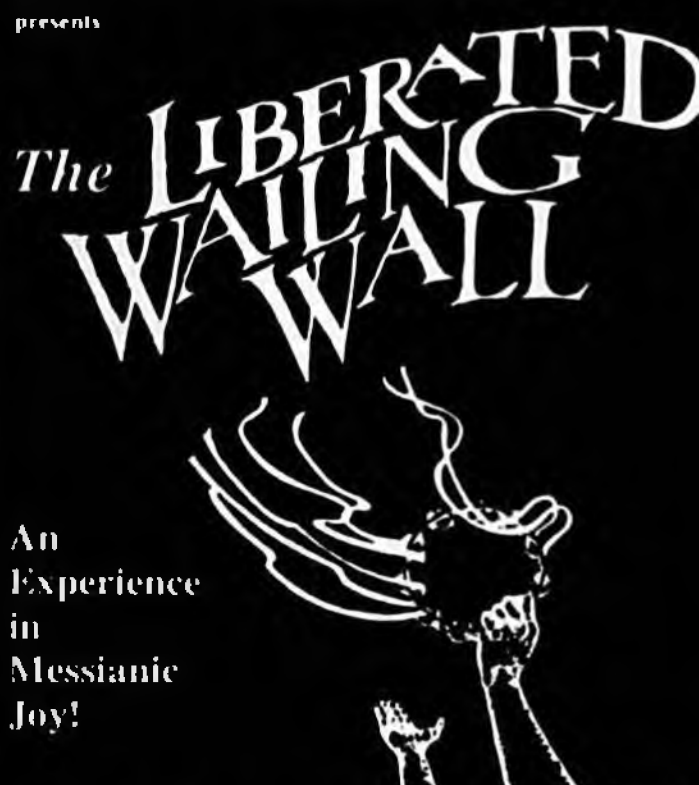

Schools to benefit from federal proposal

Volusia County stands to gain in school money from the Federal Government. Vice President Al Gore announced that President Clinton's School Construction Proposal will allocate \$29,867,000 to the Volusia County School District.

The money is part of over \$1 billion in new type of bonds to build and modernize schools. In addition to the money directly for Volusia County, over \$231 million will be going to state education, with other counties including Broward, Dade, Duval, Escambia, Hillsborough, Orange, Palm Beach, Pinellas and Polk.

Under the new School Modernization Bond initiative, the federal government will subsidize special 15-year bonds over the next two years, half of the money in each year.

"There is nothing more important for America's future prosperity and strength than giving our children a world class education," said the Vice President. "An essential aspect of that is providing safer, smaller, smarter, cutting edge classrooms and schools, places where teachers can concentrate on teach and students can concentrate on learning."

U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley added, "America's schools are wearing out. When rain is coming through the roof, classes are overcrowded, playgrounds are full of temporary classrooms, schools are not equipped for computers.

Chickpeas? Garbanzos? Ceci is catchy

I came to the chickpea early in life: My Italian parents introduced them as "ceci" beans (pronounced CHE-chee), and we ate them prepared in salads and pastas. When I grew up and left home, I re-encountered the ceci — also known as the garbanzo bean — in hummus, the mid-Eastern dip of mashed chickpeas and tahini that was ubiquitous at pot-luck suppers in the 1970s.

Now, as chief cook and bottle-washer in our household, I've returned to the chickpea, which I love to cook with pasta and with dark greens like spinach and escarole. They are incredibly versatile and delicious, low in fat (depending on how you prepare them, of course) and high in complex carbohydrates. The only drawback I can think of is that my kids don't like them, but if I only ate the foods that my kids like, I'd surely die of boredom, if not malnutrition.

The first recipe below, for a dish of spinach and chickpeas, is the creation of the renowned Italian chef and cookbook author Marcella Hazan. I regret to say that I have been unable to find the cookbook in which it first appeared, but I've been making this ever since my friend Curtis Ingham served it at Christmas dinner and blew us all away. Do not try to make this with frozen spinach, or to skip the step of skimming the chickpeas; trust me. And DO use a really high quality olive oil. It's worth it.

The second recipe is from the always reliable Jeanne Lemlin, author of scads of great vegetarian cookbooks. This is from her "Quick Vegetarian Pleasures." The third recipe is for a Chickpea Salad from the excellent new "The Complete Italian Vegetarian," by Jack Bishop.

Because I'm basically a lazy and last-minute cook, I always use canned chickpeas. But I have noticed that some brands are salty and mushy; I've had the best luck with organic brands. But I've included Bishop's method for preparing dried chickpeas for those cooks with more energy and initiative.

SPINACH AND CECI (SPINACH AND CHICKPEAS)
1-1/2 pounds fresh spinach
2 tablespoons salt, preferably coarsely ground salt such as kosher salt or sea salt
1 15-ounce can chickpeas
1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil
1/4 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice

Bring a large pot of water to a boil and add the pasta. Cook according to package directions or until done to your liking.

Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the garlic and red pepper flakes and cook 2 minutes. Add the tomatoes and chickpeas and cook 3 minutes more. Add the spinach, salt and 1/4 cup of boiling pasta water and stir well. Cook until heated through, about 3 minutes. When pasta is done, drain it thoroughly in a colander. Return it to the pot or put in a large serving bowl. Spoon on the sauce and toss well. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese, toss again, and garnish with additional Parmesan cheese.

still be slightly wet — into a large pot with the salt (do not add any water). Cover and cook over medium heat until spinach stems are slightly softened but not too limp. Drain. Meanwhile, drain the chickpeas, and rinse them under cold running water. Squeeze off the peels, one by one. Put the spinach, chickpeas, olive oil and lemon juice into a saucepan, cover, and cook over medium heat for 10 to 15 minutes. Stir occasionally. Taste, correct for salt. Serve while still hot or at room temperature.

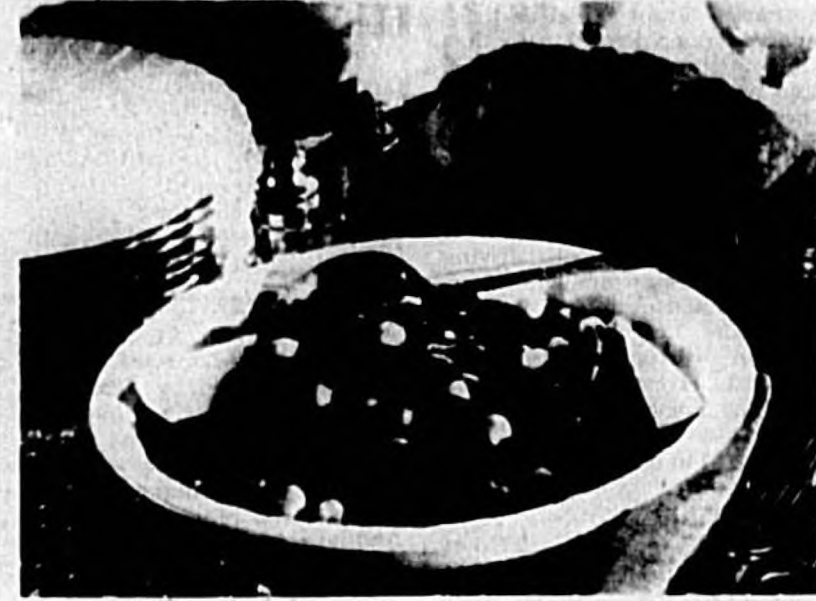

1 pound penne, or mostaccioli, ziti, rigatoni or rotini
1/3 cup olive oil
6 cloves garlic, minced
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
2 medium tomatoes, cored, seeded, and cut into 1/2-inch discs
2 cups cooked (or canned) chickpeas, drained and rinsed
1 10-ounce package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Bring a large pot of water to a boil and add the pasta. Cook according to package directions or until done to your liking.

Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the garlic and red pepper flakes and cook 2 minutes. Add the tomatoes and chickpeas and cook 3 minutes more. CHICKPEA SALAD WITH SUN-DRIED TOMATO VINAIGRETTE

5 large sun-dried tomatoes packed in oil, drained
1 small garlic clove, peeled
1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
1 15-ounce can chickpeas
2 tablespoons minced fresh basil or parsley leaves
Arugula or mesclun (mixed salad greens) for serving (optional)

Place sun-dried tomatoes, garlic and vinegar in the bowl of a food processor fitted with a metal blade. Process until ingredients are minced, scraping down sides of bowl as needed. Add the oil and process until smooth. Strain the dressing into a large serving bowl. Stir in salt and pepper, to taste.

Add the chickpeas and basil or parsley and toss to coat the chickpeas well with the dressing. Marinate at room temperature for at least 30 minutes or up to 3 hours. Adjust the seasonings. Serve on a bed of arugula or mesclun, if desired.

BASIC CHICKPEAS

1 pound dried chickpeas
3 large garlic cloves, peeled
2 bay leaves
Salt, to taste

Pick through the chickpeas to remove any stones or shriveled beans. Place beans in a large pot, add enough cold water to cover by several inches, and soak for 8 hours or overnight.

OR bring the cleaned, picked-over beans, covered with water, to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer for 2 minutes. Remove from heat, cover and let sit 1 hour.

Drain the soaked or simmered chickpeas and place them back in a large pot with enough water to cover by several inches. Add garlic and bay leaves and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer until beans are firm and tender but not falling apart. This will take anywhere from 35 to 60 minutes.

Add salt to taste, turn off the heat and allow chickpeas to cool in their cooking liquid. Remove the bay leaves and garlic. Store with cooking liquid in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 3 days, or in the freezer for several months. Thaw before using.

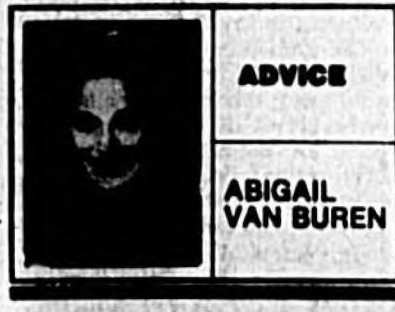
P.S. If this is all you and your husband disagree on, I would say you have a marvelous marriage.

Van Der Weide testified that the Board of Commissioners had approved a \$50 per diem, and that the London trip was on the itinerary supplied to him.

Although Freeman initially denied Van Der Weide's injunction to stop Morse, the result could be reversed should Van Der Weide follow by filing a writ of mandamus to regain the \$1,081. Van Der Weide also seeks legal fees.

Freeman scolded Morse at the first hearing, saying, "Wait a minute. The County Commission voted in a public meeting to pay the bill. What authority do you have to override what they did?"

"You are not a super commissioner," Freeman said.

The judge also told both Morse and Van Der Weide that he didn't think it prudent that the

county might have to spend \$20,000 to \$30,000 on the clerk's legal bills.

"I feel sorry for Maryanne Morse's attorney," said Van Der Weide's attorney Mike Jones. "He's a good attorney with full client control. But she's not listening to Terry Oriffin. I'm sure she's ignoring advice from her counsel."

The dispute by the two elected officials has offended many county officials. Van Der Weide's fellow commissioners have stayed out of the fray. None came to the first hearing on Feb. 9.

Van Der Weide and Morse had communicated only through hand-delivered letters before she carried out her plan to take money from his paychecks if he failed to produce the receipts from his trip. "I'm doing my job," she said. "No one is above the rules."

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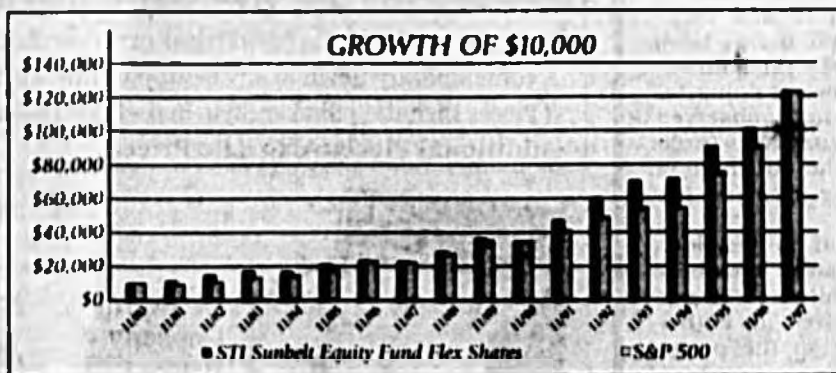

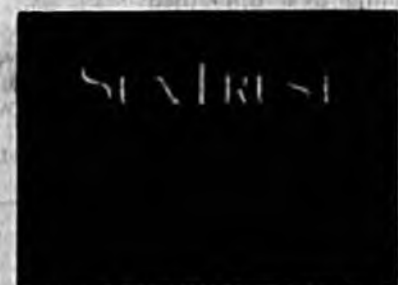

She holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from Spelman College, and when she

was ordained in May of 1990, she was not only awarded a Master of Divinity degree, but a Doctorate of Law degree from Emory University.

Presently, she is the assistant pastor at Greater Rising Star Baptist Church in Atlanta.

Sanford Middle School construction reaches exciting new heights

SANFORD - Metric Constructors, Inc. and Jack, Jennings & Sons, a joint venture company, will host a "topping-out" ceremony on Thursday, Feb. 26 at noon, to signify the completion of the Sanford Middle School structure.

Construction at the facility, at 1702 French Avenue in Sanford, includes a single two-story building with 80,000 square feet of classroom space; a new energy center; renovations of other classroom buildings; and upgrades of sound and communication systems.

Regarding the topping-off, Mark Brown, Metric project manager said, "We are very excited about reaching the highest structural element for the building, a milestone in the construction process. The workers, partners, design team and school board have worked very hard to make this happen."

The estimated project completion date is June of this year, with construction costs of \$9.85 million. The new building facilities will be the home of the math and science Magnet School Program for Seminole County public schools.

Wright and Alan McCoy were being trained for the operation, with officers Ken Kaiser and Marc Kovacs on an eligibility list as alternatives.

Another point brought up by the sheriff regarded the Seminole County Swat team. Now however, Dillard announced that officers Golden and Kovacs are being processed for positions with the county's swat team. "Soon we are going to put two more on the team according to our tentative schedule," Dillard said.

The third matter involved the CCIB, City County Investigative Bureau. Two Sanford officers have been assigned to the CCIB on a temporary basis for three months. Dillard has projected that there will be an additional two officers in the very near future.

Ealinger also explained how the city police and sheriff's officers will be working in conjunction in the area around W. 13th Street in the Goldsboro area. "Some of it is in the city and some of it is in the county," Ealinger said. "We'll hopefully be working together in the entire district."

Ealinger suggested the city survey the citizens of that area to find out what they see as the problems in need of law enforcement officers. "It might be better if we find out the problems through the people who live and work there," Ealinger said, "than to take it on our own to guess what the problems might be."

The joint patrols are expected to start operating in that area Monday.

Although not scheduled for discussion, Commissioner Whitey Eckstein asked for additional comments from the sheriff. "As long as we have the sheriff here with the city commission," he said, "let's get his

opinion about the possibility of using his present airport building and property as a police station."

"Well," Ealinger said, "we moved to that building in 1979. It has 42,000 square feet, and as far as we have been concerned, it's been a good location." He explained how the sheriff's department doesn't necessarily deploy officers from that one location, rather it has a number of community based areas.

Commissioner Eckstein said plans call for a joint substation on the west side of the city, to be used by both police and sheriff's deputies.

"The one drawback I could see in your using the facility," the sheriff continued, "is that it won't give you a lot of exposure. It's not a centrally located building on 17-92 or in the city, but other than that, it has been a very functional building."

While he said it was originally built in 1965, it has been well maintained by the county.

"You have a nice training facility there now," observed Mayor Dale, "and we could probably build one out there or elsewhere in the city for our use."

Mayor Dale said he had been in contact with some members of the Sanford Airport Authority and had received an enthusiastic response to the possibility.

The sheriff's department plans to move to its new facilities at Five Points before the end of the year, leaving the large three-story building on the airport property vacant. During previous discussions it had been projected that the sheriff might be able to leave some of the law enforcement equipment behind, but very little was expected to remain as the new facility is put into service.

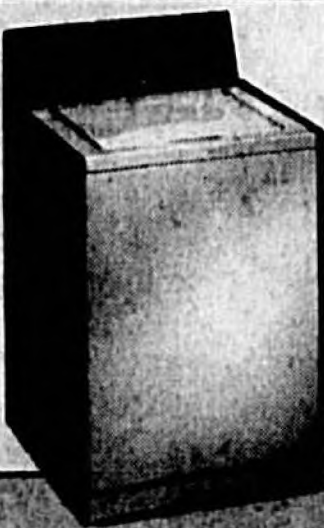

Next up for the 'Noles is a boys-girls match against Pine Ridge in Deltona starting at 3:30 p.m. on Thursday.

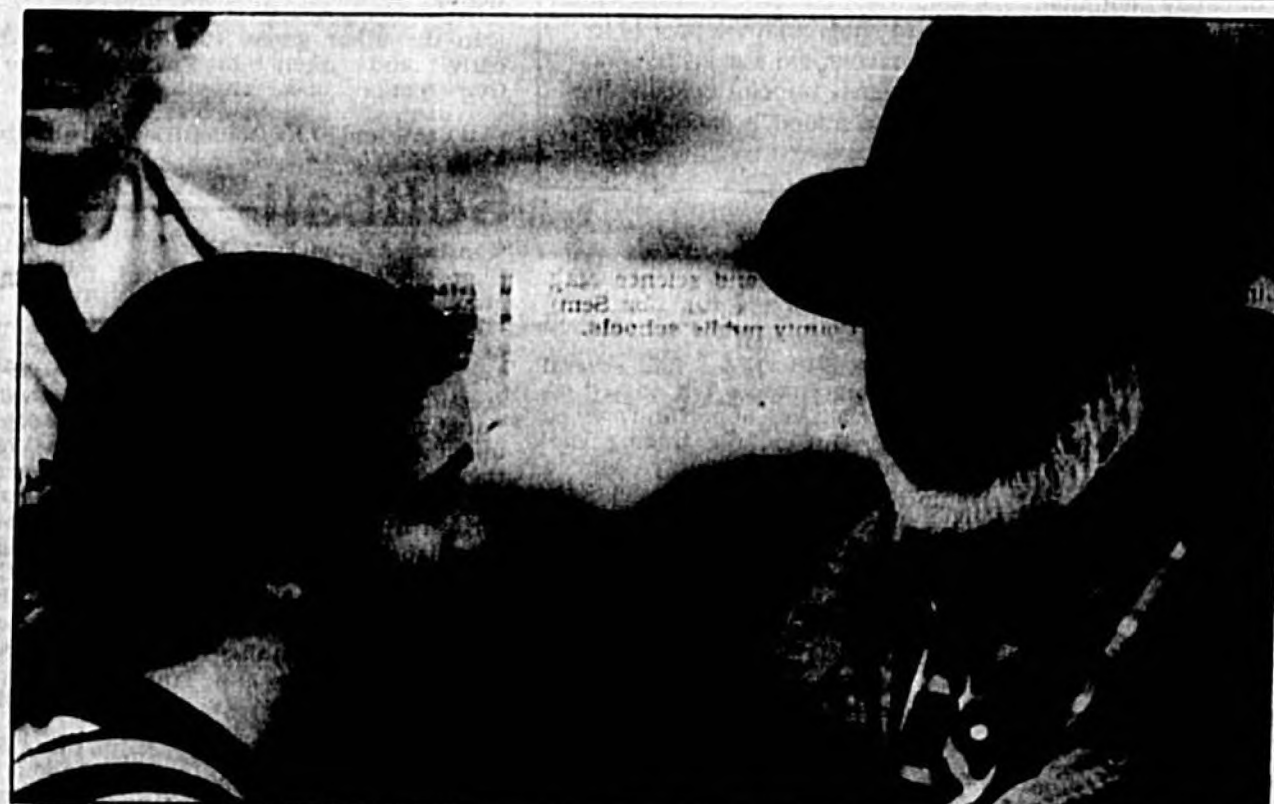

With the clock counting down the last remaining seconds of the FISAA State Championship game featuring Lake Mary vs. Pensacola, head coach of the Rams, Carl Brown, called a time-out to refocus his team. They were down by three with only a few seconds remaining in 'the biggest game of their lives. Almost in slow motion, the ball was thrown in-bound and an abrupt three-pointer was whirled into the air which looked like it had the chance to go in. But as the shrill sound of a siren rang out into the Lakeland Center, the shot heard round the world fell short of the basket and a harsh reality loomed over a juvenile team who had played beyond their years that night. An incessant wound was inflicted into each player and coach of the Lake Mary team during that defeat that could never be healed by any doctor. It's a pain that we can still feel piercing our hearts and running through our veins along with the knowledge that the harder we worked, the harder it was to surrender. Perhaps that anguish is what drives us today. PRESENT SEASON
All summer long, prior to this season, each member of the team silently fought our own little battle which raged within us. But this unconventional war was not fought with guns and bullets, it was the duel of pride vs. frustration. Peering into the eyes of my teammates as they conditioned on the track in the blistering heat or in the weightroom as the sweat poured off their exhausted bodies while they strained to finish one more set of lunges, I quietly affirmed

my suspicions that even through all we had endured as a team, the faith we had in each other and the steadfast bonds that had been forged by the raging fire lit unknowingly by a team from Pensacola was winning the war.

This season was an emotional rollercoaster, but the ride has been well worth it. Everything was thrown at us in our attempt at the state championship which alluded us last year. But we are truly the lucky ones. For most people are so busy doing what they think they have to do, that they lose sight of what they really want to do. In the pursuit of their dreams, the majority of teams don't aim too high and miss...they aim to low and hit.

As we confidently stepped up to the table in order to view the hand which had been dealt to us in the post-season, it seemed the deck was stacked against us. We would have to face Evans, the number three ranked team in the state, in our first regional game. Self-assured that we would not let anyone stand in our way, we defeated a proficient team and then turned to answer the knock of our nemesis as they pounded on our back door. That night we faced our toughest opponent, Pensacola, and were reminded that while dreams had gotten this team started, discipline had kept us going. We had tasted the glory and had hungered for it ever since the state championship. But in order to overcome such adversity, we would have to look around us and see the greatness in our teammates and realize that winners believe in their worth in advance of their performance. The night we triumphantly defeated Pensacola was the night in which we wrote the finest portion of Lake Mary's story...its chapter on payback.

Front court carries Lake Howell to new heights

WINTER PARK - Last time the Lake Howell boys basketball team won a district title was...

Hmm. Let's think about that one.

Never. In all of its years of playing boys basketball have the Silver Hawks won a district title. Never have they been able to fill their gym for a regional playoff game.

Until this year.

Lake Howell, a senior-dominated team led by a very special junior point guard, went out and improved on last season's district runner-up finish to end up as the Class 6A-District 3 champs.

Point guard Reggie Kohn gets the attention and deserves it. But his father, coach Steve Kohn, has pointed out that the team's dominating front line is the unassuming hero of the Lake Howell success story.

Newcomer Rikki Williams, 6-foot-8 Ryan Smith and 6-foot-6 Brad LeCore are the guys who live down in the trenches, pulling down rebounds and score the dirty points. Anyone looking to drive the lane on these guys might as well look for an exit ramp. They'll be manching on Spaldings if they don't.

Williams is the newcomer. He spent the first part of last season playing at Randallstown High School in Baltimore before moving to Central Florida. He had a chance to go back to Baltimore this season but decided his heart was at Lake Howell.

"I came to Lake Howell halfway through last season and coach taught me more than anyone has ever taught me in

basketball," Williams said. "I didn't want to play anywhere else and these guys accepted me like I'd been here all along."

LeCore added, "We always considered him to be one of us from the first day."

Williams is living with friends to remain at Lake Howell. He has the best outside shot of the group and displayed that during an emotional win over Oviedo on Senior Night. Williams hit several three-pointers and was one of several Lake Howell carried off the court by their fans afterwards.

LeCore is the rebounder who doesn't always look great in the point totals. Two weeks ago, in the win over Oviedo, LeCore went head-first into the stands to send a behind the back pass to Kohn for one of the plays of the year in Seminole County.

"I think I'm a good rebounder, but not a great scorer," LeCore said.

Smith is a baseball player in a basketball uniform, except that, at 6-8, you can't tell it. He's planning on attending the University of Georgia to play baseball next season, but for now, he's one of the most intimidating players in Central Florida.

"I guess I'm kind of the 3-point guy," Smith said. "I can't jump and I can't run." Steve Kohn said the thing that makes his front line so strong is that they rarely all play well at the same time.

"They are never as consistent as I'd like them to be," Kohn said. "Most of the time only two of the three are doing it, but it's good to have three different types of players who are so versatile."

Lake Howell got its first taste of success when Smith was a sophomore. At the time, Le-

Core played junior varsity and Williams was back in Baltimore. The Silver Hawks won 18 games. Last year, LeCore joined the varsity and Williams came in halfway through the year and the Silver Hawks won 20, emerging from a tight district to gain a trip to Ocala-Forest for regionals.

Lake Howell led most of the way in that one before squandering a lead and the chance to advance.

Leaving the Ocala court that night, Lake Howell was already thinking about next year.

"We knew next year would be our turn," LeCore said. "It ended too much earlier than we wanted it to. We felt unfulfilled."

Lake Howell entered this season with its big three across the line and Kohn with Shawn Braddy and Robert Jordan in the back court. There have been some bumps along the way, including a loss to Lake Brantley when the Silver Hawks were ranked fifth in the state.

It could have been a devastating loss but Lake Howell rebounded with a big win over Lake Mary. In all five of Lake Howell's losses this season, the Silver Hawks have responded with a win.

"Those losses have been absolute wake-up calls," Steve Kohn said. "We were rising up in the rankings and we didn't know how to handle it. We started becoming big fat dogs."

But Williams added, "We never started thinking we weren't a good team. We learned from them." Lake Howell will be at home Friday (7:30 p.m.) in the regional quarterfinals round against the loser of Tuesday night's District 4 championship game between Dr. Phillips and Edgewater.

With prep career over Stokes turns attention to college

SANFORD - When there is a team that has several top notch players, it's hard for one player to stand above the rest.

She continued to run up until last year, but decided that she needed to make a choice in her senior season and dedicate herself to one sport. Basketball was obviously the right choice. Several colleges are interested in Stokes and Upper Iowa University is very interested.

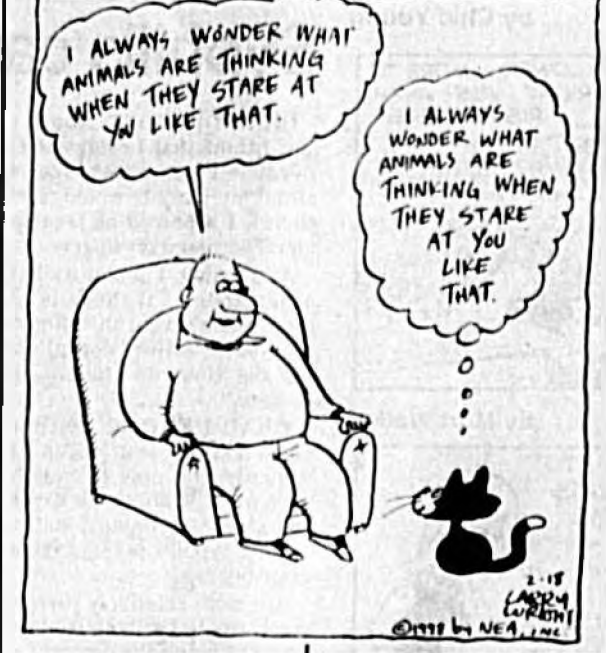

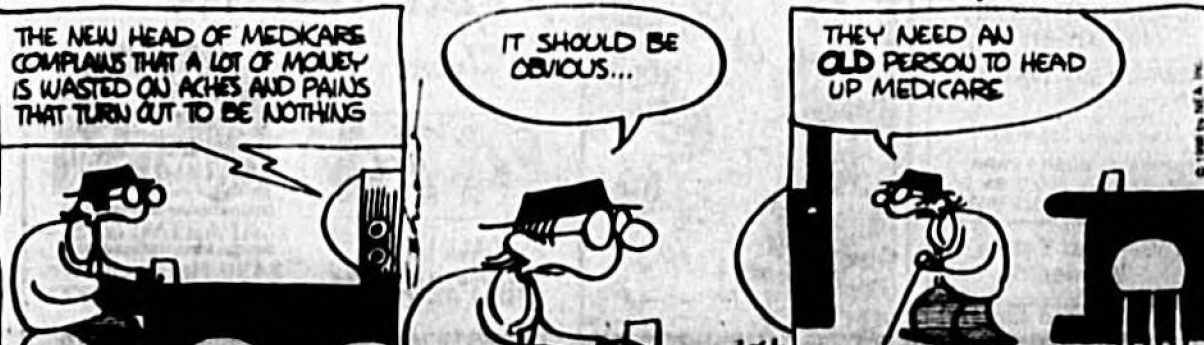

Syphilis can be treated

DEAR DR. GOTT: About 40 years ago, I think that I contracted syphilis. Because I was a teen-ager and was afraid my parents would discover my secret, I received no treatment and merely crossed my fingers.

As an adult, I'm now waiting for the other shoe — if there is one — to drop. I don't want to suffer dementia or some other complication of syphilis. How can I tell if I harbor the disease?

DEAR READER: With a simple blood test that your doctor can order. Actually, you may already have had such a test if, after your exposure, you were married. In most states, a blood test for syphilis is required for a marriage license.

Although relatively rare today and easily treated with antibiotics, syphilis remains a serious disease. Known as the "great pox" (to distinguish it from smallpox, an equally dangerous disease), syphilis was a health scourge only a few centuries ago, when it killed millions of people in Europe and the Americas. Therefore, your strategy of watchful waiting was not prudent.

On the other hand, the fact that you have not developed symptoms during the past four decades is pretty good evidence that you did not, in fact, contract syphilis. If you had, you'd be sick or dead.

Nonetheless, to resolve this issue, you need a blood test. Ask your doctor about this.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Help! I'm a 70-year-old woman whose fingernails have started to split, tear and chip. Do you have any suggestions?

DEAR READER: Such changes in the fingernails can be caused by a variety of factors, including anemia, psoriasis, protein deficiency, hypothyroidism — and just plain aging. If you are otherwise in good health and your doctor has pronounced you fit, your fingernails might improve if treated with either of two unlikely products: Healthy Hoof or Bag Balm.

As you may have guessed, these are used in the farming industry to help cows. However, several readers have extolled their virtues in replenishing nails. The products, which are available in farm supply stores, are massaged into the nails twice a day. I'm told that after several weeks of treatment, the fingernails return to normal.

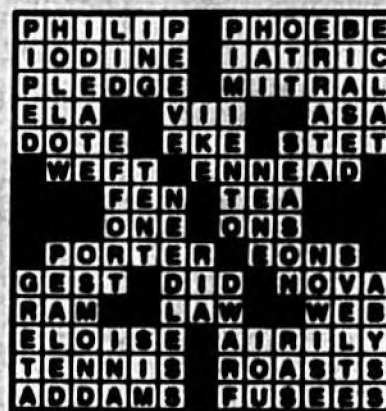

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Do you practice?

Once, I was on a wine-tasting panel for a magazine. One evening, another member of the panel said that she could taste gasoline in the wine. My immediate reaction was to ask her whether it was regular or premium. And how did she know this? Did she taste different fuels for practice? Bizarre!

Bridge deals can be weird too. Some occur at the table, but more are composed. This one was dreamed up by Dr. Cy Lee, from Canada. How many tricks can South take if the deal is played in each of the five denominations: no-trump, spades, hearts, diamonds and clubs?

The deal is in Hugh Darwin's "Bridge Magic" (Faber & Faber, 1973). This book is the last word in double-dummy problems — those in which you work out the solution knowing where all 52 cards are situated.

Ignore my attempt at a possible bidding sequence, in which five no-trump

asks about heart honors (the Grand Slam Force) and six hearts shows zero.

In no-trump, South can be held to 11 tricks. In all four suits, though, South can make a grand slam!

Let's consider seven hearts on, say, a club lead. Declarer wins in the dummy, discarding a spade from hand. He plays a trump to the eight and nine. South cashes his two top diamonds, ruffs a diamond in the dummy, throws his last spade loser on a top club, finesses the heart queen, draws East's last trump, and claims.

If you analyze all the suit contracts

and all possible leads, you will see that South can always win every trick. Amazing!
