Gas prices fall to 2-year low heating oil."

HEATHROW - Gas prices in the state and throughout the nation have dropped to their lowest level in more than two years, according to AAA.

In Florida, AAA Auto Club South reports that the average price for Self-Serve Regular Unleaded is \$1.085 per gallon, down 3.8 cents from the January average of \$1.123 per galion. This month's average is 20.6 cents less than it was one year ago, and it's the lowest price Florida motorists have seen since December 1995.

The national average price of gasoline is \$1.114 per galion, down 4.5 cents from last month and at its lowest point since May 1994, when the average was \$1.105 per gallon. "This dramatic drop in

prices is the result of a combination of factors including strong gasoline inventories and low crude oil prices," said Rena Callahan, manager of Public and Government Relations for AAA Auto Club South. This year, the warm winter is also helping to keep prices low because refiners aren't in a situation where they need to reduce production of gasoline in order to produce more

Callahan noted that problems in Iraq could cause a hike in crude oil prices and result in higher gas prices. During the Persian Gulf War in late 1990, prices jumped from \$1.07 per gallon in August to \$1.38 per gallon in December.

This month, the lowest reported price in Florida was 99 cents per gallon in St. Petersburg, and the highest price was \$1.253 per gallon in Palm Beach.

Here are the results of the February Fuel Gauge Survey: BELF-SERVE - Self-Serve Regular Unleaded prices decreased 3.8 cents to an average \$1.085 per gallon, Mid-Unleaded prices Grade dropped 4.4 cents to an average \$1.197 per gallon, and Premium Unleaded prices decreased 5 cents to an average \$1.275 per gallon.

FULL-SERVE - Full-Serve Regular Unleaded prices dropped 2.2 cents to an average \$1.513 per gallon. Mid-Unleaded prices Grade dropped 2.7 cents to an average \$1.612 per gallon and Premium Unleaded prices decreased 2.8 cents to an average \$1.694 per gallon.



Schools to benefit from federal proposal

Volusia County stands to gain in school money from the Federal Government, Vice President Al Gore announced that President Clinton's School Construction Proposal will allocate \$29,867,000 to the Volusia County School District.

The money is part of over \$1 billion in new type of bonds to build and modernize schools. In addition to the money directly for Volusia County, over \$231 million will be going to state education, with other counties including Broward, Dade, Duval, Escambia, Hillsborough, Orange, Palm Beach, Pinellas and Polk.

Under the new School Modernization Bond initiative, the federal government will substdize special 15-year bonds over the next two years, half of the money in each year.

There is nothing more important for America's future prosperity and strength than giving our children a world class education," said the Vice President, "An essential aspect of that is providing safer, smaller, smarter, cutting edge classrooms and schools, places where teachers can concentrate on teach and students can concentrate on learning."

U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley added, "America's schools are wearing out. When rain is coming through the roof, classes are overcrowded, playgrounds are full of temporary classrooms, schools are not equipped for computers.

The main aim of the money is to help the estimated 100 school districts in the nation

with the largest number of children from low income families, then to fund districts said to be in need of assistance in accordance with each

state's plan. Basically, most of the money would be used for Elementary and Secondary education.

One of the criteria to determine eligible schools was to determine the areas in which at least 35 percent of the students were eligible for free or reduced price lunches.

Chickpeas? Garbanzos? Ceci is catchy

I came to the chickpea early in life: My Italian parents introduced them as "ceci" beans (pronounced CHE-chee), and we ate them prepared in salads and pastas. When I grew up and left home, I re-encountered the ceci also known as the garbanzo bean in hummus, the mid-Eastern dip of mashed chickpeas and tahini that was ubiquitous at pot-luck suppers in the

Now, as chief cook and bottlewasher in our household, I've returned to the chickpea, which I love to cook with pasta and with dark greens like spinach and escarole. They are incredibly versatile and delicious, low in fat (depending on how you prepare them, of course) and high in complex carbohydrates. The only drawback I can think of is that my kids don't like them, but if I only ate the foods that my kids like, I'd surely die of boredom,

if not malnutrition. The first recipe below, for a dish of spinach and chickpeas, is the creation of the renowned Italian chef and cookbook author Marcella Hazan. I regret to say that I have been unable to find the cookbook in which it first appeared, but I've been making this ever since my friend Curtis Ingham served it at Christmas dinner and blew us all away. Do not try to make this with frozen spinach, or to skip the step of skinning the chickpeas; trust me. And DO use a really high quality olive oil. It's worth it.

The second recipe is from the always reliable Jeanne Lemlin, author of scads of great vegetarian cookbooks. This is from her "Quick Vegetarian Pleasures." The third recipe is for a Chickpea Salad from the excellent new The Complete Italian Vegetarian," by

Jack Bishop. Because I'm basically a lazy and last-minute cook, I always use canned chickpeas. But I have noticed that some brands are salty and mushy; I've had the best luck with organic brands. But I've included Bishop's method for preparing dried chickpeas for those cooks with more energy and initiative.



Van Der Weide testified that the Board of Commissioners had approved a \$50 per diem. and that the London trip was on the itinerary supplied to him.

Although Freeman initially denied Van Der Weide's injunction to stop Morse, the result could be reversed should Van Der Weide follow by filing a writ of mandamus to regain the \$1,081. Van Der Weide also seeks legal fees.

Freeman scoided Morse at the first hearing. saying, Walt a minute. The County Commission voted in a public meeting to pay the bill. What authority do you have to override what they did?

You are not a super commissioner," Freeman said.

The judge also told both Morse and Van Der Weide that he didn't think it prudent that the

county might have to spend \$20,000 to \$30,000 on the clerk's legal bills.

"I feel sorry for Maryanne Morse's attorney," said Van Der Weide's attorney Mike Jones. He's a good attorney with full client control. But she's not listening to Terry Griffin. I'm sure she's ignoring advice from her counsel,"

The dispute by the two elected officials has offended many county officials. Van Der Weide's fellow commissioners have stayed out of the fray. None came to the first hearing on

Van Der Weide and Morse had communicated only through hand-delivered letters before she carried out her plan to take money from his paychecks if he failed to produce the receipts from his trip. "I'm doing my job," she said. "No one is above the rules."

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

Sanford Middle School construction reaches exciting new heights

SANFORD - Metric Constructors, Inc. and Jack, Jennings & Sons, a joint venture company, will host a "topping-out" ceremony on Thursday, Feb. 26 at noon, to signify the completion of the Sanford Middle School structure.

Construction at the facility, at 1702 French Avenue in Sanford, includes a single two-story building with 80,000 square feet of classroom space; a new energy center; renovations of other classroom buildings; and upgrades of sound and communication systems.

Regarding the topping-off, Mark Brown, Metric project manager said, "We are very excited about reaching the highest structural element for the building, a milestone in the construction process. The workers, partners, design team and school board have worked very hard to make this happen."

The estimated project completion date is June of this year, with construction costs of \$9.85 million. The new building facilities will be the home of the math and science Magnet School Program for Seminole County public schools.

Wright and Alan McCoy were being trained for the operation, with officers Ken Kaiser and Marc Kovacs on an eligibility list as alternatives.

Another point brought up by the sheriff regarded the Seminole County Swat team. Now however, Dillard announced that officers Golden and Kovacs are being processed for positions with the county's swat team, "Soon we are going to put two more on the team according to our tentative schedule," Dillard said.

The third matter involved the CCIB, City County Investigative Bureau. Two Sanford officers have been assigned to the CCIB on a temporary basis for three months. Dillard has projected that there will be an additional two officers in the very

near future.

Ealinger also explained how the city police and sheriff's officers will be working in conjunction in the area around W. 13th Street in the Goldsboro areas. "Some of it is in the city and some of it is in the county," Ealinger said. "We'll hopefully be working together in the entire district."

Eslinger suggested the city survey the citizens of that area to find out what they see as the problems in need of law enforcement officers. "It might be better if we find out the problems through the people who live and work there," Eslinger said, "than to take it on our own to guess what the problems might be."

The joint patrols are expected to start operating in that area Monday,

Although not scheduled for discussion. Commissioner Whitey Eckstein asked for additional comments from the sheriff. "As long as we have the sheriff here with the city commission," he said, "let's get his

opinion about the possibility of using his present airport building and property as a police station."

"Well," Ealinger said, "we moved to that building in 1979. It has 42,000 square feet, and as far as we have been concerned, it's been a good location." He explained how the sheriff's department doesn't necessarily deploy officers from that one location, rather it has a number of community based areas.

Commissioner Eckstein said plans call for a joint substation on the west side of the city, to be used by both police and sheriffs deputies.

"The one drawback I could see in your using the facility," the sheriff continued, "is that it won't give you a lot of exposure. It's not a centrally located building on 17-92 or in the city, but other than that, it has been a very functional building."

While he said it was originally built in 1965, it has been well maintained by the county.

"You have a nice training facility there now," observed Mayor Dale, "and we could probably build one out there or elsewhere in the city for our

Mayor Dale said he had been in contact with some members of the Sanford Airport Authority and had received an enthusiastic response to the possibility.

It's facile to simply propound our 31-0 record and assume that everyone can truly grasp the meaning of Lake Mary basketball or the sensation that comes from carrying the hopes and dreams of a school and consequently a city. But to keep our tale concealed would be selfish, for every great story must be told and so I present Lake Mary's story...

ONE YEAR AGO...

STATE CHAMPIONSHIP CAME With the clock counting down the last remaining seconds of the FHSAA State Championship game featuring Lake Mary vs. Pensacola. head coach of the Rams, Carl Brown, called a time-out to refocus his team. They were down by three with only a few seconds remaining in the biggest game of their lives. Almost in slow motion, the ball was thrown in-bound and an abrupt three-pointer was whirled into the air which looked like it had the chance to go in. But as the shrill sound of a siren rang out into the Lakeland Center, the shot heard round the word fell short of the basket and a harsh reality loomed over a juvenile team who had played beyond their years that night. An incessant wound was inflicted into each player and coach of the Lake Mary team during that defeat that could never be healed by any doctor, it's a pain that we can still feel piercing our hearts and running through our veins along with the knowledge that the harder we worked, the harder it was to mirrender. Perhaps that angulah is what drives us today. 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
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












Syphilis can be treated

DEAR DR. GOTT: About 40 years ago, I think that I contracted syphilis. Because I was a teen-ager and was afraid my parents would discover my secret, I received no treatment and merely crossed my fingers.

As an adult, I'm now waiting for the other shoe — if there is one — to drop. I don't want to suffer dementia or some other complication of syphilis. How can I tell if I harbor the disease?

DEAR READER: With a simple blood test that your doctor can order. Actually, you may already have had such a test if, after your exposure, you were married. In most states, a blood test for syphilis is required for a marriage license.

Although relatively rare today and easily treated with antibiotics, syphilis remains a serious disease. Known as the "great pox" (to distinguish it from smallpox, an equally dangerous disease), syphilis was a health scourge only a few centuries ago, when it killed millions of people in Europe and the Americas. Therefore, your strategy of watchful waiting was not pru-

On the other hand, the fact that you have not developed symptoms during the past four decades is pretty good evidence that you did not, in fact, con-tract syphilis. If you had, you'd be sick or dead

Nonetheless, to resolve this issue, you need a blood test. Ask your doctor about this.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Help! I'm a 70year-old woman whose fingernails have started to split, tear and chip. Do you have any suggestions?

DEAR READER: Such changes in the fingernails can be caused by a variety of factors, including anemia, psoriasis, protein deficiency, hypothyroidism — and just plain aging. If you are otherwise in good health and your doctor has pronounced you fit, your fingernails might improve if treated with either of two unlikely products: Healthy Hoof or Bag Balm.

As you may have guessed, these are used in the farming industry to help cows. However, several readers have extolled their virtues in replenishing nails. The products, which are available in farm supply stores, are massaged into the nails twice a day. I'm told that after several weeks of treatment, the fingernails return to nor-

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
Do you practice?




