



JACKSONVILLE (AP) - Shirley Barrie says she never gave up hope when her daughter lay in a coma and doctors said the girl would die.

Lynn Alvarez, Mrs. Barrie's daughter by a previous marriage, had severe injuries to the spine, right side and brain when hit by a car as she ran across a busy road to catch a school bus seven years ago.

Mrs. Barrie said doctors told her Lynn

wouldn't recognize people because of bleeding from the brain tissue.

But, after four months, she came out of the coma and said, "Mommy, I love you." They were the first words the girl spoke. It was a miracle, Mrs. Barrie said. And

there were more to come. The girl, then 10, was told she'd spend her life in a wheel chair. Now at 17, Lynn is up and walking, with the

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter is extending his trip to the Midwest and Western states. #### 12 On Trial In Fraudischeme

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — A dozen persons stand charged with trying to defraud banks in Kentucky, Ohio, and West Virginia out of \$5.5 million and to bilk the late Elvis

Presley out of more than \$338,000. The FBI said Tuesday federal grand juries in Louisville and Nashville, Tenn., charged the suspects with taking part in a year-long plot to delraud the banks by using a phony \$100,000 certificate of deposit from a bank in England. The defendants allegedly planned to use an initial \$70,000 loan from the bank as

collateral for \$5.5 million in other loans.

The FBI said the suspects also tried to defraud Presley in a complicated scheme under which they would get him to sell one of his aircraft, then lease it back to him, and then sublease it to another company.

#### Korean Probe Hearings Open

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The House Ethics WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Ethics Committee moved to open hearings today for its probe of Korean lobbying in Congress — seeking testimony by a Capitol Hill secretary, a former Korean diplomat, a secret agent who defected and a one-time aide to Tongsun Park. Special Counsel Leon Jaworski said Tuesday this first phase of hearings will show that Korea's government plotted with Park and others to buy influence in the 1970s, but the naming of congressmen who might have been implicated would have to wait "because we are not at that point yet."
But Jaworski said he hoped these sessions

will force more Korean government cooperation — especially with Park, who remains in Seoul refusing to testify.



— In 1971, Congress voted to kill a project to build an American supersonic transport, bowing to combined arguments of environmental dangers, high noise levels, poor fuel economy and the great expense of developing market that can save the air-craft from financial ruin, The British-French onslaught

- Many Americans objected to the French-English SST with the same arguments they had used against the

American version, arguing that if the United States would not approve an SST of its own it should not approve one built by foreign interests.

— The Ford administration, under great pressure from Britain and France, granted permission for test flights into Dulles Airport near Washington and into Kennedy Airport in New York.

— Test flights began at Dulles in May 1976. - The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, which operates Kennedy Airport, refused to allow the Concorde to land while it considered new noise

— The Supreme Court Monday lifted the ban, agreeing with lower courts that the Port Authority was stalling and, without new regulations, the ban was arbitrary, unreasonable and discriminatory.

#### **Open Door** Not A Joke

What was good enough for President William

McKinley in 1899 seems to be good enough for Seminole County Commissioner John Alexander.

It's called an "Open Door Policy."

For President McKinley it meant improving and expanding our relations with China. For Commissioner Alexander it means improving and expanding his and other commissioner an expanding his and other commissioners' relations with the public they serve.

Both reasonable objectives.

The Seminole County Commission may or may not be isolated from its public, as Mr. Alexander claims. Certainly, in some instances it probably is and many citizens probably have been forced to deal with that fact from time to time.

And it is not a light matter. We are dealing with something basic. For a governmental body or organization or private business to operate completely and productively, communication and accessibility are essential.

This means communication up and down the ladder of command and responsibility. This means accessibility of supervisors or department heads to the people with whom they work. In business it is indeed essential. In govern-

ment it is indispensable. It is basic.

That is why Commissioner Alexander's

spotlighting of the matter is a useful exercise. And it could serve a useful purpose in the coming weeks and months of county commission deliberations.

At least it will make our elected commissioners

more aware and cognizant of the fact that they have been elected to serve us and owe the people they represent the time of day and the opportunity to share suggestions, thoughts and opinions with

In Mr. Alexander's case, he suggests a demonstrative exercise of an "open door policy," — removal of the door between the county commission reception area and the hallway to the county commissioners' offices.
"I'd like to see that door removed," Alexander

So to help him demonstrate how such an exercise would actually work as two of Mr. Alexander's fellow Democratic commissioners — Bob French and Harry Kwiatkowski — did their

part Tuesday. They removed HIS office door.
"We read about John's open-door policy," said Mr. French, "Now it's a reality."

It's a good start - perhaps a bit too literal but a good start anyway. And we appreciate the hijinks. Moments of

levity are always welcome. But let's not lose sight of the overriding issue: the fundamental need for all elected officials to maintain an open-door policy to their constituents. Again, it's basic.

And it places Mr. Alexander in a unique

We often hear the pledge from officials that "My door is always open" to you and you and you. But too frequently that pledge evolves into nothing more than mere words.

oring county to the north "will cost more money. "And under no circumstances can I foresee, unless by direct court order, sending Seminole sheriff's cars and deputies out of county with juveniles," Polk added.

arrested juveniles to police stations or the sheriff's office where state juvenile intake counselors would see the juveniles and be available around the clock. Polk says there apparently is a legal question if he can hold juveniles. They can't be housed in county jail without

court order. He said he has no place to put juveniles under watch until intake counselors arrive. "I can't tie up a man just to sit there and watch a juvenile."

Polk and other officials are questioning the statistics used by HRS to develop the detention center proposal. "If there was a downward trend in juvenile arrests they wouldn't be wanting to move," Polk said. "It costs \$11 a day to house an adult in the county jail, but it costs \$50 a day for a juvenile at the detention center."

Polk said he originally urged officials to build a local 25bed juvenile detention center, and not the 13-bed facility. "Tallahassee officials at that time claimed we would never need more than 10 beds for juveniles in Seminole. If they'd approved a bigger facility to begin with there wouldn't be the situation we have now," Polk said.

Juveniles are detained at secure detention centers while awaiting trial or transfer to state correctional or rehabilitative centers. Seminole detention center and district officials have requested funding of expansion of the local center near Five Points to relieve the overcrowding conditions that were blamed last April for an escape in which 11 juveniles fled after a state worker was forced to accompany the youths out of the building with a razor blade to her neck.

All of the escapees were recaptured within two days. The woman wasn't injured.

Sheriff Polk said he thinks that, instead of saving money by consolidating the Seminole and Volusia detention centers at a site yet to be selected near Daytona Beach, HRS will find extra money is needed for transportation of juveniles to and from Seminole.

"I'm not trying to tell them how to run their business," Polk said. "But, if Tallahassee would pay more attention to their local HRS people who know the problems they

# Bank Robber Hijacks Jet, 15 Aboard

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) - A suspected Georgia bank robber today forced his way through a security checkpoint at a Nebraska airport and hijacked a Frontier Airlines jetliner in what officials said was a plot to free another accused

bank robber. The jetliner, with 35 persons on board. was taken over at 6:30 a.m. at Grand Island, Neb., flown to Kansas City, Mo., for refueling and then took off for Atlanta

at 9:30 a.m. The jetliner with 11 passengers remaining on board landed at 12:05 p.m. today at Hartsfield International in

"Man in the cockpit," the pilot of the Frontier Airlines 737 radioed to the tower at Grand Island. "Going to Kansas City International for fuel." Grand Island police and federal authorities identified the hijacker as Thomas Michael Hannan, 29, of Grand

Island. They said he demanded the release of George David Stewart, 29. Hannan and Stewart were arrested for the Sept. 2 holdup of the Northside Parkway branch of Fulton National Bank in the Atlanta area. Stewart was being held as a federal prisoner in the Fulton County Jail,

while Hannon was free on bond. The FBI said Hannon, in addition to Stewart's release, also demanded \$ million, two parachutes, two machine guns and two .45 caliber pistols.

The Federal Aviation Administration said 19 of the 30 passengers, including one heart patient, were allowed to leave the plane at Kansas City, leaving 11 passengers and a crew of four aboard the jetliner for the 800 mile, two hour and 50 minute flight to Atlanta.

Authorities in Atlanta were ready for the jet, but there was no indication whether any of the demands would be met when the

Fulton County (Atlanta) Sheriff Leroy Stynchcombe said Stewart had been moved to an "undisclosed location." The sheriff said it would be up to federal authorities whether to release Stewart to meet Hannan's demand.

Authorities origionally thought two persons were involved in the hijacking. because of the apparent coincidence of the

presence of a former high school friend of Hannan's, Lyle Wurtz, aboard the plane. Bill William, FBI special agent in Kansas City, said Wurtz helped with the negotiations with Hannan.



School Board Passes 'Test'

The Seminole County school board Wednesday had an op-portunity to learn first-hand about the tests being given Florida

high school students throughout the state.

In a presentation made by J. Ivan Bowers, program director, pupil personnel, the board received three separate tests, containing a total of 56 questions. The questions were not taken from either the Functional Literacy Test or the statewide assessment test, Bowers said, but they were representative of the kind of question which might be asked on either examination.

The board also heard a report from school district employes or

the county's testing program.

The tests given to the board were divided into three sections: minimum skills test for grade 11; basic skills survey in reading. for grades eight and 'll; and basic skills survey in writing.

The tests were administered during a work session prior to the regularly scheduled Wednesday school board meeting, and all five board members greeted Bowers with laughter as he passes the test to them, then settled quietly down to work.

As each finished one section of the test, Bowers handed another

one over. The entire testing process took about 30 minutes.

At the end of the testing period Dan Dagg, assistant superintendent of instruction, read the test answers aloud and board members checked their own tests. All five passed. Dagg explained that, on the assessment and Functional

Literacy tests, a score of 70 per cent on each skill section of the test is required for students to pass. Some of the questions answered by the board included Determine the number of square meters in a plot of land six numeters by 13 jekameters. (A). .78 square meters; (B) 7.8

are meters; (C) 780 square meters; (D) 7,000 square meters Which is the better buy? (A) seven ounces for 28 cents; (B)
 nine ounces for 37 cents; (C) 15 ounces for 61 cents; (D) 18 ounces for 75 cents. (The answer is A). Dagg mentioned that the statewide tests contained a number of questions of this type and that they were "clearly designed to be as functional on a daily
