Let's Keep Planning

Bécause so often we hear the opinion that Sanford will always be "backward" in our outlook, it is real encouraging to observe the quick reaction of so many of our citizens to the recent proposal for the "futuristic" development of our lakefront. There is a widespread, genuine enthusiasm for this progressive, optimistic project.

But regardless of the enthusiasm, there is a splendid practical approach to the matter. When "The Idea" was presented to the City Commissioners, the suggestion that a feasibility study be made to determine the engineering elements involved, the proposers wholeheartedly endorsed the proposal.

The Bankers Group pointed out that the figure that was mentioned "around \$500,000" was a "quickie" opinion given by a qualified engineer, but with very little time to atudy the matter. A searching depth study was needed. (The "depth" referred to the research, not to the depth of the water in Lake Monroel)

Because of the sincerity and integrity of the men pushing the plan, they have stressed the fact that their ides is A plan, not necessarily THE plan for the comprehensive development of our gorgeous lakefront. They have emphasized the fact that the cost figure they have mentioned is by no means an authentic estimate, that they are convinced that the cost will be much more.

As a matter of fact, on the night City Commissioners were presented this idea, no less an authority than our City Manager, W. E. Knowles, whose engineering ability is much regarded said he was sure the feasiblifty report would show a much higher cost figure. The Banker Group supported this opinion, and urged that the exhaustive study be

However, the proposers emphasized there should be no difficulty in financing the project; that regardless of the total of any reasonable cost estimate, the "shot in the arm" for the local economy - in fact, for the business climate of all of Central Florida, the new public image of Sanford as a recreation center, would well be worth the money spent. It would entail some "uptown planning," it was said, but "this should come quickly after the project gets under way.'

And so, as the Bankers Group says, with the many advantages to be gained, the "million or so" dollars that the project will no doubt cost is well justified by the multiplied advantages to Sanford and the area

about it. All of us owe support to the Comsioners as they make their decision after this feasibility report is submitted a few months from now - regardless of cost within reason. Meanwhile, let's all keep planning for it!
