'My Country' Has Other Names

AKRON, Ohio (UPI)—Ever hear a patriotic song entitled "Ode for the Fourth of July"? Or "Hail Thee in Victor's Crown"? Few persons except music researchers could identify the tune to fit these titles, but every American over six years of age knows it well because another title is "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

English songwriter Henry Carey under the title, "God Save the King." During the Revolutionary War, English soldiers went to war against the Colonists singing their new national song, "God Save the King." The Colonists liked the lyrics, so made up a variety of lyrics of their own. Meanwhile, Germany lay claim to the music under the title of "Heil dir im Siegerkranz" (Hail Thee in Victor's Crown). They said it was an old German folk song. France claimed the music was written by her famous composer, Lully (who actually was an Italian), in honor of Louis XIV. A publisher in Denmark printed the song in 1799 under a long title which, translated, means "Song for the Danish subject, to be sung on his

King's birthday." This later became the Danish national anthem. But music experts generally agree on one point—whoever wrote it was an Englishman and the original title was "God Save the King." Much later, after "America the Beautiful" came along and there was confusion between the two titles, people began to refer to it as "My Country 'Tis of Thee." When the cry went out for a national anthem, "My Country 'Tis of Thee" was a front-runner. It was nosed out in the finals, however, because "The Star Spangled Banner" was claimed to be a superior song—and because of the bothersome existence of another song of the same tune that is England's and Denmark's national anthem.

Federal Aid To Florida Up 30 Percent

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—A new survey of federal aid to Florida shows an increase of almost 30 per cent this fiscal year over the 1963 figure. The state Chamber of Commerce, in its weekly business review, said Saturday that some \$234 million was paid under federal programs to assist state and local governments with education, road building, public health and to assist individuals.

The chamber said "payment of \$38 million to Cuban refugees in Florida accounted for much of the 30 per cent increase over last year's figure. Elimination of this amount from the Florida total above the national gain of six per cent. "Florida received \$53,675,000 for highway construction under these grant programs last year. Schools, principally public received \$23,183,000 in such

state and included hospital construction and a multitude of research projects." The chamber said special aids to individuals in the state came to \$121,905,000, including refugee payments, old age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the disabled and blind. A total of \$17.5 million went to bolster agriculture, National Guard and Civil Defense projects. The chamber said the grants-in-aid total did not include federal money spent in Florida by the federal government on contracts for goods and services, federal payrolls and purchases, drainage projects and improvements to rivers and harbors.

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Hoover At 90 Fights To Aid Nation's Youth

NEW YORK — Far from resting on his laurels, former president Herbert Hoover on the occasion of his 90th anniversary has launched a major campaign to fight juvenile delinquency.

Active for most of his life in youth activities, Mr. Hoover declares, "We must organize prevention, whatever the merits of punishment may be." Principal among the preventive measures he suggests is the establishment of youth-guidance organizations such as the Boys' Clubs of America. Mr. Hoover says, "We need 1,000 Boys' Clubs for one million deserving boys."

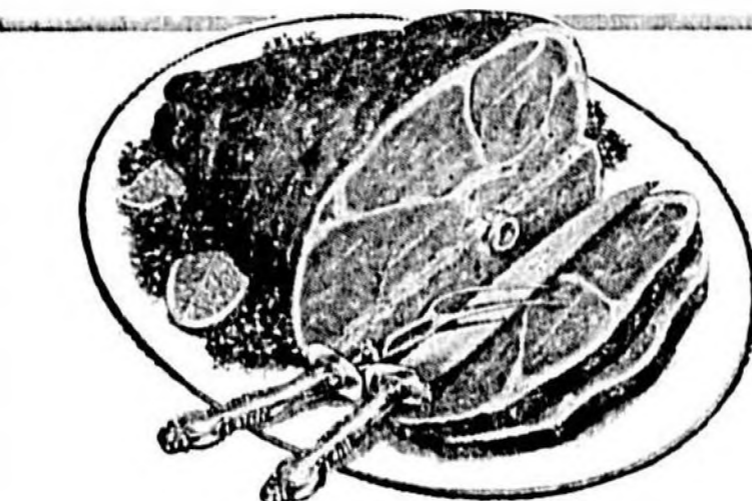
Mr. Hoover, who has served as board chairman of the Boys' Clubs of America for the past 28 years, describes Boys' Clubs as being "the greatest character-building institutions in our country today." Under his leadership, the Boys' Clubs have more than quadrupled in number and membership and currently offer daily professional guidance and supervised recreation to more than 600,000 youngsters in some 635 Clubs.

Today on the occasion of his 90th birthday, Mr. Hoover received pledges for the early attainment of his goal from numerous civic, service, fraternal and labor organizations. Business, industry and political leaders expressed similar cooperation and endorsement of the campaign.

Miss Tracy, a curvaceous 22-year-old blonde from Los Angeles, holds forth nightly with her husband, Jerry, and another member of the Gloria Tracy Trio in the La Fontaine Lounge of the Tropicana Hotel.

A multi-talented girl—acting, singing, dancing—she also has plucked her harp on television in appearance with Roger Williams and Art Linkletter. Glamorous Gloria doesn't care how she hits the big time in showbusiness. "I want to do everything . . . sing, dance, act, play the harp, even do a Broadway show. I just want to be a top entertainer, to make people happy."

Barry Endorsed By Dr. Annis

FLORENCE (UPI) — Dr. Edward Annis, immediate past president of the American Medical Association (AMA), vigorously endorsed Sen. Barry Goldwater Sunday.

The Miami physician was sharply critical of President Johnson and at the same time said he was an "active Democrat" in his home state of Florida.

In an address to the annual meeting of the Muscle Shoals Medical Assembly, Annis charged Johnson "is typically political" as opposed to Goldwater who stood for "basic good citizenship and responsibility of government."

About 200 doctors from Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia and Tennessee were present for the address.

Annis criticized Johnson's support of civil rights as a political move and branded as socialized medicine Johnson's backing of health insurance for the aged financed through social security.

Hold Steel Price, LBJ View

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson, still enjoying a long political honeymoon with big business, is moving early to ward off a spat with one of the biggest of all—steel.

Without waiting for that basic industry to announce a price rise, Johnson has let it be known that he wouldn't like it. He has warned that a steel price boost "would strongly conflict with our national interest in price stability."

He did so in reply to a question from a local reporter who presented his query after being handed a note, during the news conference, by White House Press Secretary George F. Reedy.

"Mr. President, would you care to comment on any of those recent rumors about a possible price increase in steel?" the question went.

Neither the reporter nor Johnson specified the origin of reports that steel prices might go up. But White House aides say they were aware of widespread publication of such speculation, largely on financial pages.

A presidential aide said he knew of no direct soundings from the steel industry to the White House, in that regard. Mindful of the showdown in April, 1962, when the late President John F. Kennedy

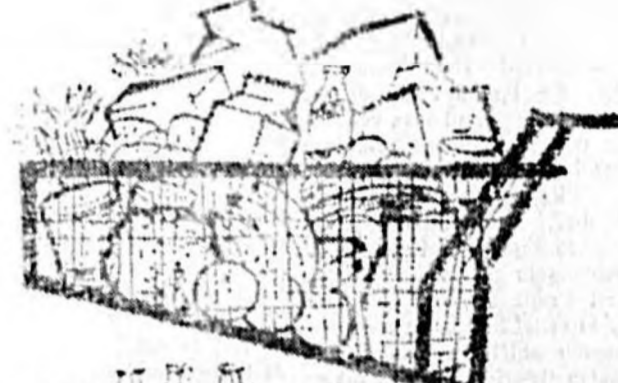
