Paralyzed Man Forgives Policeman Who Shot Him

HARTFORD, Conn. (UPI) — Guy Brown got to know officers from the Hartford Police Department in the five years he served them at McDonald's hamburger and coffee. He still considers them his friends.

Brown was shot at the McDonald's while waiting in a car. The bullet struck his left arm, paralyzing him. He was taken to a hospital where he remained for two months before being released.

The shooting at first was described as accidental and later declared the act of an officer "locked in fear and panic" and armed with a malfunctioning weapon he used in a manner that violated departmental policy.

Brown, 34, is black, as were the robbery suspects. The officer in question — Thomas O'Connor, 25 — is white. Community leaders feared the possibility of racial violence in the summer ahead. Trouble was averted, however, and the case remains under investigation.

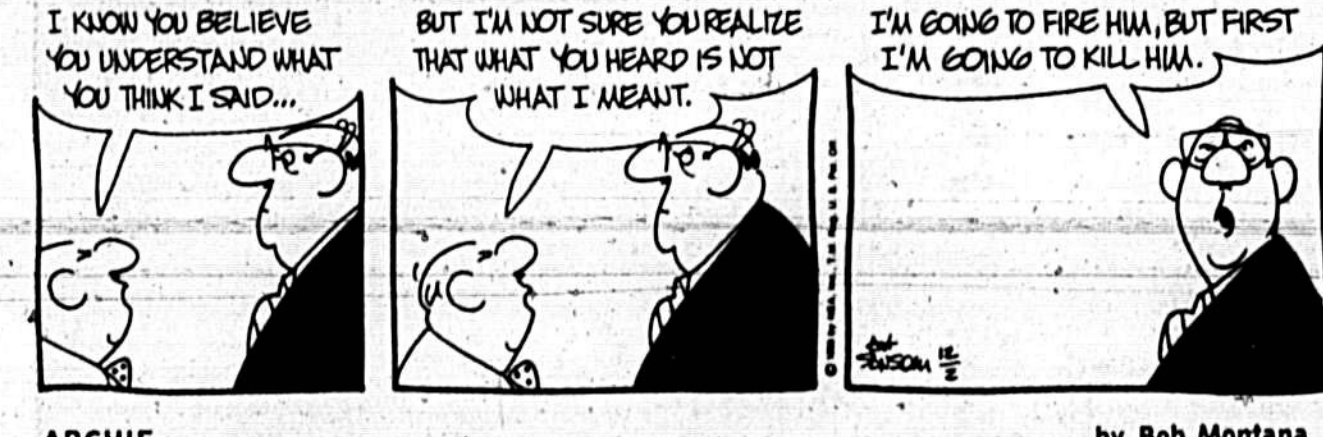

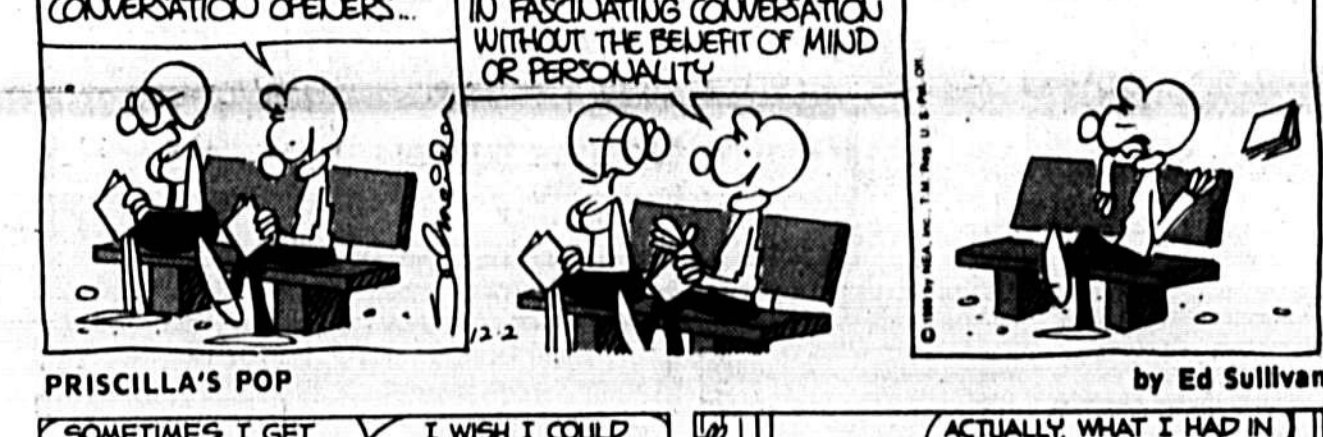

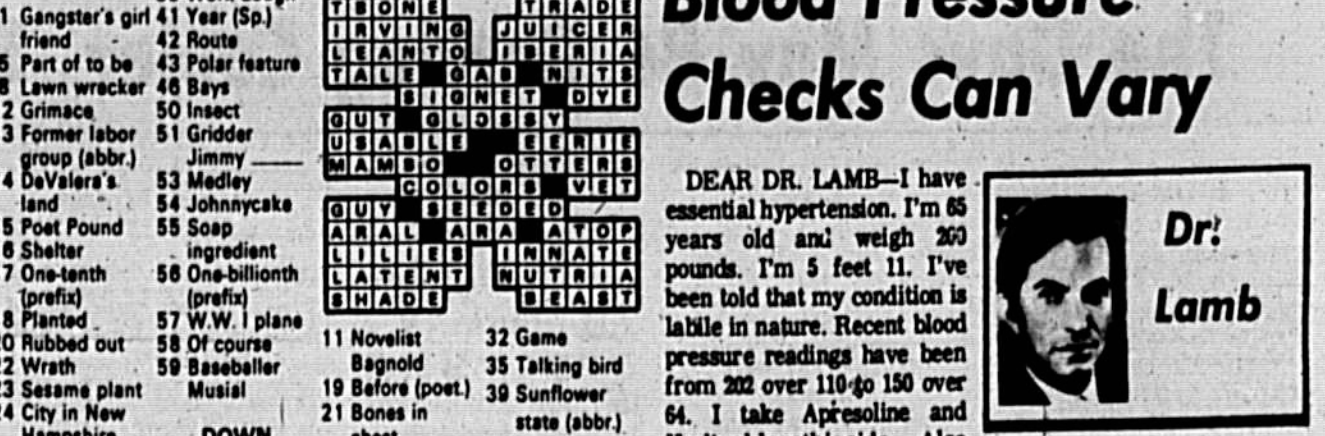

Blood Pressure Checks Can Vary

DEAR DR. LAMB—I have essential hypertension. I'm 65 years old and weigh 200 pounds. You 5 feet 11. I've been told that my condition is labile in nature. Recent blood pressure readings have been from 200 over 110 to 180 over 64. I take Aproxaline and Hydralazine. Also Motrin for my arthritis and a zinc tablet each day.

What bothers me is the wide spread between my systolic and diastolic readings. Frequently the spread is 100 points or more. Would you also comment on my medications?

DEAR READER—The upper reading, the systolic pressure is the highest level in your arteries. The lower reading, the diastolic level, is the lowest level of pressure in your arteries. The highest pressure is reached at the peak of the ejection of blood from the heart into your arteries. Frequently the spread is 100 points or more. Would you also comment on my medications?

One reason for the systolic pressure to be high is because the heart is pumping out a lot of blood each time it contracts. You can see this in the healthy young athlete who is working vigorously.

A second reason for a rise in the systolic pressure is the loss of the elasticity of the aorta, the large artery that comes directly from your heart. In a young person this large artery is very elastic and as blood is squirted out from the heart into the arteries it merely stretches. That keeps the pressure from going too high.

As people get older the artery hardens and loses its elasticity. The more this occurs the more likely it is that the systolic blood pressure will rise. This can occur even though the low reading (diastolic) might be normal. There are other reasons for a high systolic pressure and a normal or low diastolic pressure. These are usually related to a defect

You can influence your blood pressure a great deal by the way you live. If you have excess fat, and I suspect you do at your body weight, you'd be very wise to get rid of it.

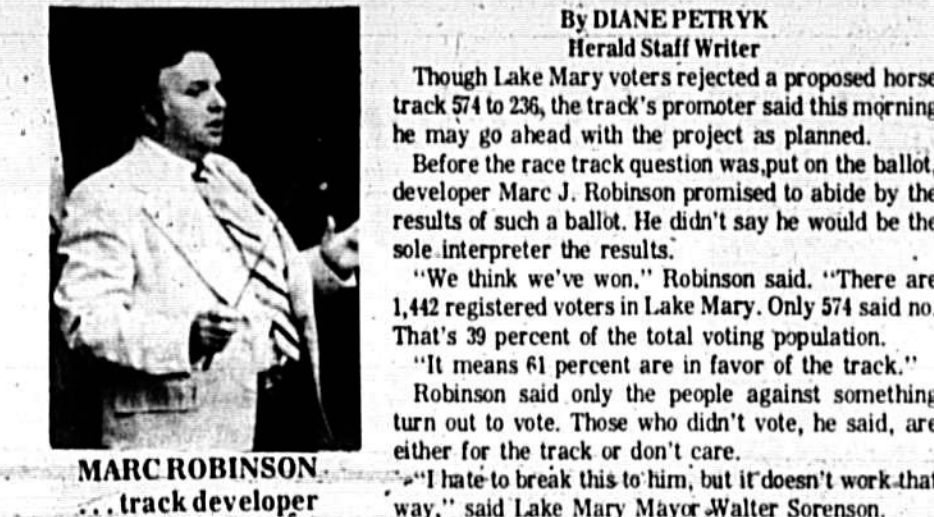

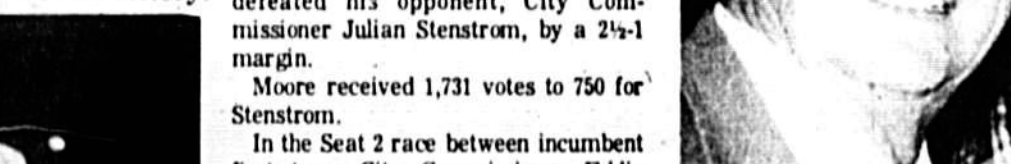
