

Christopher Delivers

Hostage 'Clarification' ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI) - Deputy Secretary of

State Warren Christopher returned to Algeria today to deliver a "clarification" of the American response to Iran's definands for releasing the 52 hostages.

The special U.S. Air Force jet carrying Christopher and his high-level delegation landed at Algiers airport late in the morning after a nine-hour flight from

The U.S. officials were met by a group that included Gheraib Abdul Karim, the Algieran ambassador to Iran who delivered the original U.S. response to Tehran last month. Algerian sources said the U.S. delegation was expected to meet with Foreign Minister

Mohammad Benyahia in the afternoon. In Washington, officials said that in addition to providing clarification of the earlier response, Christopher would also tell Algeria to inform Iran that the Carter Administration response could change when President-elect Ronald Reagan takes office Jan. 20. Carter administration officials said the United States is suggesting to Iran that an international commission be set up to handle any disputed legal questions arising from negotiations to the hostages.

Pope Warns Of Technology

VATICAN CITY (UPI) - Pope John Paul II warned today in his second encyclical spiraling materialism is destroying the fabric of modern society and unchecked technological growth threatens to annihilate mankind. In the 83-page encyclical titled "Dives in Misericordia" On the Mercy of God, John Paul said social permissiveness - as manifest in divorce, abortion and artificial birth control - was at the root of a growing decline in fundamental values. The encyclical, released today, also criticizes communist regimes that "distort the idea of justice" and warns advanced technology can lead to the sublugation and manipulation of minds and cultures.

Quake Victims Sit In Snow

NAPLES, Italy (UPI) - Thousands of earthquake survivors huddled around fires in tents and trailers amid driving snow today, with fewer than 1,000 of the estimated 250,000 homeless taking up the government

In the United States, New York congresswoman Geraldine Ferraro introduced legislation to allow survivors to receive special immigrant status, and the House of Representatives approved a \$50 million emergency aid package Monday for rebuilding the devastated area in the mountains east of Naples.

NATIONAL REPORT: A blinding snowstorm swept from the Rockies Into the upper Midwest early today, turning roads into slippery ribbons of ice and triggering scores of traffic accidents. At least three people died in weather-related accidents. The storm brewed in the Northern Rockies and left more than a foot of snow in Wyoming and the Dakotas Monday before trekking eastward across Nebraska, Iowa and Wisconsin. A steady drizzle of rain and dropping temperatures plagued the Chicago area overnight, and residents braced for the first significant snowfall of the season. Three people - two in Nebraska and one in Iowa - died in accidents on snow-slick



Sagebrush Growing In Washington

United States is directly under the control of the federal government. The vast federal domain — 760 million acres of it - is not parcelled out evenly among the 50 states, however. It is concentrated overwhelmingly in the West, some 90 percent of it being located west of the Rocky Mountains. In a couple of cases, Washington comes close to owning, in the name of all the people of the United States whole states - 96 percent of Alaska is federal land and close to 90 percent of Nevada. The lands were reserved by the federal

government for various purposes - conservation, wildlife preservation, public ecreation - as territories achieved statehood. The last to be admitted to the Union, the sparsely populated Western states, were in no position to protest the arrangements at the time, had they been inclined to do so.

They have since become powerfully so inclined, so much so that in recent years protest has reached the point of what more outspoken Westerners are calling a sagebrush rebellion." The rebels want the federal government to divest itself of millions upon millions of those acres, transferring control to the states in which the lands lie And they think they now have, as a conchance of bringing that about.

Barfield, in a statement released by Auburn officials Monday, said he had been asked to resign by university President Dr. Hanly Funderburk and the school's board of

"I have been asked by Dr. Funderburk and the board of trustees to resign and I am not one to stay where I am not wanted," said Barfield, who will be given an undisclosed settlement for the year remaining on his contract. "I have submitted my resignation effective immediately."

Barfield also said he had confidence in his staff and team but added he could no longer "provide Auburn with the championship football program it desires ... under the situation that now exists. "We do not have the united front and the unity of purpose among Auburn people that we need," he said. division has rendered us ineffective.' Barfield, 44, compiled a 29-25-1 record. Dodger's Howe Tabbed N.L. Rookie Of Year

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Steve Howe didn't think he would even make the team, but Monday he became the second Los Angeles Dodgers' pitcher in two years to win the the National League's Rookie of the Year award. "I can't believe it," Howe said after receiving the award. "I really didn't expect it. I competed against some really fine

Howe got 12 first-place votes and 80 points from the 24 members of the Baseball Writers Association of America two from each National League city - to easily beat out pitther Bill Gullickson of Montreal and outfielder Lonnie Smith of Gullickson got five first-place votes and 53 points, and Smith

received four first-place mentions and 49 points. "I was just glad to be with the Dodgers," Howe said. "I March I had no idea I would accomplish what I did." During spring training as a non-roster player, Howe was nearly sent back to the minors for more seasoning. Although they needed lefthanded relief help desperately, the Dodgers were not quite sure if Howe was ready for the jump to

But he impressed them with his 94-mph fastball and made the team with a strong showing in the exhibition season. "We weren't sure we were doing the right thing when we kept Steve," Dodgers' pitching coach Red Adams admitted earlier this year. "We didn't want to risk injuring his arm. But the more we looked at him in spring training, the more we liked him and we decided to take a chance with him." The Dodgers' gamble paid off as Howe became the club's No. 1 reliever during the regular season. Appearing in 59 games, he gave up just one home run — to Houston's Joe Morgan — in 85 innings of relief and walked only 22. During one stretch of outings from May 6-Sept. 17, he allowed only seven

earned runs in 63 1-3 innings (1.00 ERA). "I had a good time in the bullpen," Howe said. "I hadn't relieved before so I didn't know what to expect. My arm never bothered me, so it doesn't worry me if I'm a starter or reliever

Second baseman Davey Lopes said he "told Steve to amiliarize himself with everything he had to do-in every situation. He had tremendous aptitude. Once he was told something, he never made the same mistake twice." Howe, 22, who set a Dodger rookle record for saves with 17 and posted a 7-9 record with a 2.65 earned run average, was named on 22 of the 24 ballots. Gullickson and Smith each were

named on 17 ballots. For the first time since the BBWAA began voting on rookies in 1947, a 5-3-1 point system was used in determining the vinner. Each writer participating in the voting was asked to
