ET/ABHINGTON-There is a strong feeling in some administration rircles that the Federal Reserve heard and the Commerce department are moving too alowly in imposing credit curbs and industrial controls.

Complaints are being made that the Reserve board has applied only "milkteest" restrictions on installment buying, that the limitations on automobile purchases amount to nothing, and that the heard is olding up housing credit regulations too long. The same feeling is held with regard to the

Commerce department's controls on industrial inventories and other measures now being enforced by the newly created National Production Authority, of which William Henry Harrison is head. The result is that inside pressure is being brought to bear on these agencies to show more vigor in the face of rising inflationary forces. The situalon may reach a point ,where President Trumen will have to step in.

In any case, lighter credit restrictions and conrols on industry are to be especied before any definite move is made toward imposition of even William Henry limited price and wage ceilings.



Testing New Laws

The law's delays are so familiar as to have become proverbial. One example that never fails to startle laymen is the length of time that may elapse between the enactment of a law and its testing as to constitutionality. The record, perhaps, is held by the Tenure of Office Act, which Congress passed to deprive President Johnson of the right to remove his appointees.

This was modified under the Grant administration, and repealed under Cleveland in 1886. Not until 40 years later, when the President was Calvin Coolidge, who had not even been born when the Tenure of Office Act was passed, did it reach the Supreme Court, and then by indirection. day and early Wednesday with 125-mile winds. It killed three persons, injured about 100, inflicted damage of \$15,000,000 to \$20,000.000 and left about 250 persons homeless, mostly in the Miami-Fort Lauderdale areas.
