Vigilantes Nation Pays Tar, Feather Final Tribute Communists To Noted Dead

Five Men Taken In Legions Of Friends Spectacular Raid On Ranch By Band Of Over 300 Men

SANTA ROSA, Calif., Aug. 22.—(AP)—A big gunfire and tear gas, 300 self-styled vigilantes armed and feathered, two alleged Communists were today paid their last respects over the remains of Bill Rogers and Mike Mori.

The victims of the raid gave names as Jack Green and Solomon Nitberg, 60, both Marxists and feathered, and Al McWayne George Ford and Mike Mori, who were beaten and shot to death the country and the law grained the roof when the band descended upon the ranch house of Nitberg near Two Rock.

The crowd, driving automobiles with suspended license plates from Green to go up to the residence and surround the ranch.

When he reached the ranch, he was a host of invited guests, which sent the sheriff to his office.

Gunfire inside the house forced the state to retreat and the crowd outside, shouting, "Kill them," surrounded the ranch.

However, nothing was done.

Neutrality Legislation

What may prove to be about the most important legislation passed by either branch of Congress in this session is that which was approved by the Senate yesterday and designed to keep America out of war. The importance of other laws, no matter how far-reaching or beneficial they appear in their present light, will pale to insignificance if another World War should break out and the United States should be drawn into it.

The Senate resolution embraces an exceedingly mild program. In itself it will not keep America out of war, but is in effect an acknowledgement of our desire to remain out. That is something. If a poll were taken today very likely 90 out of every 100 would vote against the United States having any part whatever in any foreign controversy. The Senate resolution leaves much to be desired.

But it is a step in the right direction. It prohibits the sale or shipment of arms, munitions, and other implements of war to all belligerents in a foreign conflict. It provides for the licensing of munition factories and exporters so that the sale of these products to others than belligerents can be controlled. It prohibits American ships from carrying munitions to neutral ports for reshipment to belligerents, and it gives to the President certain authority to prohibit Americans from traveling in dangerous zones, and to prohibit belligerent submarines from entering American ports.

These provisions will go a long way toward keeping this country out of any hostilities which may arise in Europe. It will be recalled that Americans traveling on the British ship, the Lusitania, which was sunk by a submarine during the last war with hundreds of lives lost, was one of the major incidences leading to our entanglement in that war. Also, the sale of munitions by American factories to the Allies caused considerable resentment against this country in Germany and led to just such things as the sinking of the Lusitania.

However, keeping Americans home and preventing the sale of munitions is not the whole story. Undoubtedly what had more to do with our declaration of war against Germany in 1917 was the vast amount of money which American bankers had lent the Allies and the tremendous shipments of cotton, wheat, and meat which were consigned to France and England on credit. This country had gotten itself into a position that it could afford to see the Allies lose the war.

In this connection it is interesting to note that a letter

from Secretary of State Lansing to Woodrow Wilson while the present neutrality bill in the House was considered by the first time the other day to the Senate Committee. In this letter, Mr. Lansing told Mr. Wilson that American bankers were not allowed to make loans to the Allies. Farmers were unable to sell their cotton and cotton oil and sugar had industrial credits which previously did not exist. A comparison should now be made with the situation after the end of the war. The difference is that P. M. Ryan & Co. expected to get a large sum of money from their loan to the Allies, and the same is true of the cotton and cotton oil.

The neutrality law, however, applies to the same kind of financing loans. It goes without saying that there are other loans than those of the bankers and sugar companies, and the involvement of these countries in the same way as the Allies in the war is not ruled out by which the neutrality law will.

NEW ORLEANS TIMES-PICAYUNE

While President Roosevelt was evolving protective measures for millions of workers through old-age pensions and unemployment insurance, Louisiana's dictator struck out of our state laws all semblance of either present or old-age security for several thousand public employees of New Orleans. To expand his political power and insure servility to his orders, he made the services of all non-elective public employees, including members of boards, wholly dependent on approval by a state "civil service commission" of his choosing. Going further, he jeopardized the pension rights of the firemen and policemen and the retirement privileges of several and water board civil service employees, in a way that ultimately will destroy many of the benefits.

Under the new civil service commission, firemen and policemen will be reviewable by the police and fire boards on open trial rather

than by a civil service commission.

Any who incur a service loss

will only their jobs on the force

but their rights in the half-pay

pensions for which they have contributed 2 to 3 percent of their salaries throughout their services.

Civil service employees of the sewage and water board hold their places by the same state commission's permission, whenever it is withdrawn, the hope of retirement

privileges is destroyed for the workers affected.

A number of city employees, disappointed by the royal commission already suffer from this arbitrary and unjust oppression. Those remaining hope, doubtless, to enjoy the continued "pension" of the board, but that hope is shattered by the obvious uncertainty whether the commission depends upon their servility to their royal creator and master.

So, while the nation moves toward greater social security for its workers, the name of Louisiana is blashed by the antinomian and destructive measures ordered by her political crew for the exclusive benefit of this city's public servants.

Thus the old civil service measure, now repealed, protected the employees of three large city departments and against usurpation and arbitrary discharge.
