Invaders Continue To Surge Ahead On Lower Don And In Caucasus

Soviets Report Nazi Forces Are Cut Off In Battle Of Bend Above Stalingrad

(By Associated Press) Soviet dispatches today declared Marshal Semeon Timoshenko's armies, sweeping around the German flanks, cut off Nazi forces in the battle of the Don bend, 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad, but the invaders continued to surge forward on the lower Don and in the Caucasus.

A Hitler bulletin asserted Nazi occupation troops had been driven to the Kuban River deep in the Caucasus at several points and were captured. Von Mackensen, 180 miles south of Rostov, it says, this means the Germans already have advanced nearly a third of the distance to the great Caucasus oil fields and far beyond sectors noted in Russian communiques.

The Germans said Voroshilov's fall after violent house-to-house fighting. It was disclosed that Mussolini, speaking in northeast Italy recently, advised fighting against "idle dreams" about second front. He said there will be none anywhere in this war.

Wild-riding Don and Kuban Cossacks are credited with beating off two regiments of tanked German infantry, but subsequently were forced to withdraw.

The Soviet newspaper, Izvestia, said the Germans are trying to fly armaments and fuel to units trapped by the Red Army at Stalingrad, 60 miles above Stalingrad, where they are falling.

The Red air force, which has

been bombing the lower Don, the Reds' forces are continuing to pour across the river in the Tsimlyansk sector, 180 miles upstream from Rostov. In the western air war, Nazi daylight raids numbered two English planes today after a night-long lull on both sides.

In the area of Kletskaya northwest of Stalingrad the Russian midnight communiques said two Russian units killed more than 1,000 Germans, and added that the Red peasant army still was hurling "counter blows against enemy tanks and motorized infantry."

Southwest of Kletskaya in the Tsimlyanskaya area of the curving Don, the Russians said the Germans still were throwing tanks and men across the river, but the communiques indicated the Soviets were standing firm.

In the Krasnodar-Kuban area, 75 and 50 miles respectively below the Don, the lines apparently were swaying back and forth. The communiques said 400 Germans were killed in the Kuban region, and another 800 in the Krasnodar sector.

"During the day one big population point changed hands again," the communiques said of the Kuban fighting.

This toll of 2,500 Nazi dead made a total of 9,500 announced by the Russians in the last 24 hours.

Corbett Bishop's Hunger Strike Still Continues

ELK RIDGE, Md., Aug. 4. (AP) — Leon, hunched, and apparently little weight for his continuing hunger strike of 25 days, Corbett Bishop returned to ditch-digging today at the Avalon Conscientious Objectors camp, still refusing to eat.

Although he lost from 175 to 125 pounds, a doctor said, he was in good condition. He was eating, he said, because he failed to obtain a 60 to 90 day furlough to wind up his affairs. Camp authorities said he had been given 60 days induction notice.

Congressional Medal Is Given To Bulkeley

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4. (AP) — Leonidas L. Bulkeley, 66, a former Congressional Medal of Honor recipient, was awarded the medal yesterday by Rep. John W. McCormack, D-Mass., in the House chamber.

Bulkeley, a World War I veteran, was awarded the medal in 1918 for his service in France during World War I.

He was born in 1876 in New Haven, Conn., and died in 1920.










This is a boat loft for laying out full scale plans in the Boat Carpentry Shop. Instructor George Gringas is shown standing.

Service in Orlando has proven to be of great help in placing trainees.

Welding, in connection with our country's ship building program, has been recognized as one of the bottlenecks of our present war program. As our country asks for greater numbers of ships to be built, new ship yards are being constructed over the country. The call for welders is growing numbers. Welding, therefore, has become one of the vital classes in our country's defense training program. The demand has become so great that courses in all defense training schools are being streamlined to fill the need. This streamlining has taken the form of averaging out only 100 hours of training and then placing him on the job.

Large ship yards are now taking men who have had a limited amount of training in defense schools and placing them in their own schools, paying the men to continue their training. This insures the yards an adequate number of welders at all times. Trainees who are accepted for the various shipyard schools usually receive around \$18 per week while training. As soon as they go out on the job, their pay is raised to prevailing standards.

The local school has placed welders in the following yards: Ingalls Ship Building Corporation, Pascagoula, Miss.; Gulf Ship Building Corporation, Mobile, Ala.; Alabama Dry Dock Company; Mobile, Brunswick Marine Construction Corporation, Brunswick, St. Johns Ship Building Company, Jacksonville, Fla.; American Machinery Company, Deland.

At present the Seminole County Defense Training School has welding instructors, Maurice P. Roberts and Leland D. Litchfield. Mr. Roberts was born in Hillsborough County, and came here from Tampa Feb. 1, to take over one of the classes in arc welding. He is well qualified for his

job as instructor, having had six years actual experience in shipyards and in structural welding. He is married and has two children, a boy and a girl. The family is residing on West Eighth Street. Mr. Litchfield, who also teaches a class in arc welding has had experience in ship yards and welders, and came to Sanford from Lakeland, where he was working with Food Machinery Corporation. Mr. and Mrs. Litchfield and young daughter are residing at 207 Holly Avenue.

Frank L. Barnum, instructor in automotive mechanics, is married and lives on West First Street. He has had 22 years experience as an auto mechanic and in metal work.

W. D. Hofmann, instructor in Radio Repairing in the school, is a local man and lives with his family in San Lanta. Mr. Hofmann has experience in wireless operation in the Signal Corps Radio and telephone department in the U. S. Army and for the past 20 years has managed his own electrical and radio shop in Sanford. He now holds a second-class commercial operator's radio license and is chief operator of station WOUR, Sanford Police Department.

Dudley R. McCown, instructor in airplane engine service, was educated in Augusta and Savannah. He has owned and operated his own airplane business having had seven years experience.

He is teaching the Airplane Woodworking Class, which is being run to prepare workers for the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation in Deland. Mr. Moss has over 10 years experience in cabinetry making. He works and practices work.

Party Declares India Will Join Allies When Free

U. S. Planes Hit Foe Near Hankow, Smash Wharves, Shipping; Burma Is Hit Also

(By Associated Press) The working committee of the All-India Congress party today adopted a 1,200-word resolution demanding the "withdrawal of British power so as to enable India to become an ally of the United Nations and fight aggressors". Reuters reported from Bombay. The resolution declared, "A free India will be willing to join the world federation which must, at first and foremost, be the United Nations." But it added that the necessary preparations were to be made for civil disobedience struggle under the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi. The Indian army, sprawling across the country has a 350,000,000 population.

Meanwhile, American bombers in an attack on Japanese installations in the vicinity of Hongkong, island center on the Yangtze River, hit wharves, warehouses and shipping today.

Flying through rains as thick as clouds, the planes said it was "like submarine navigation." American bombers have smashed Myitkyina airfield to render Burma too much to penetrate. The Japanese are unable to use it as base for attacks of planes carrying war goods to China. U. S. air force headquarters reported today.

Added to those monsoon downpours of tropical intensity as obstacles were heavier and heavier ground defenses thrown up by the Japanese in an effort to protect the airfields, which blazed the sky over the unchallenged bases of India and China.

China's Information Minister Wang Shih-Chieh issued a statement in which he said the entry of American warplanes into China's battles was having three important results:

"The earlier tactics of the Japanese in menacing China with an unchallengeable aerial air force no longer feasible."

The Chinese army will be able to achieve better results immobilizing an increasing number of Japanese troops. For with air support it will be able to engage the latter on any and practically every front."

Cabinet Wants Full Report On Escape Of 2 Men

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 5. (AP)—The Florida Cabinet yesterday called for a full written report on the escape of Perry Arce and Harry Heavener from the State Hospital for the Insane after Gov. Holland said "somebody slipped badly" if no general alarm was given on the flight.

Arce and Heavener have been charged with killing K. D. Bowers, Tampa salesman, near Williston six days after they fled from the hospital into the nearby Georgia swamps on July 18.

The Governor described Arce as "notorious criminal" and recalled that he, as a state Senator, helped disperse a crowd in Lakeland that was trying to break into the jail where Arce and another man were held for killing two policemen in 1932.

"I can't conceive of criminally insane people escaping without a general alarm being spread," Holland declared.

Gov. J. H. Thrall of the hospital reported to telephones to the Cabinet that he had notified the State highway patrolmen in Gadsden County, where the hospital is located, and the Sheriffs of Polk, Hillsborough and Charlotte Counties in Florida and the sheriffs of two Georgia counties to alert the hospitals. He said he also notified police in Atlanta and relatives of Arce at Dayton Beach.

Railroads In South Will Raise Fare

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5. (AP)—Railroads operating in the south may soon raise passenger fares by the Interstate Commerce Commission to increase revenue to meet the increased cost of fuel, food, labor and materials. This will put the railroad fare in a par with the rest of the country. Roads will file new tariffs before the measure is effective, which officials said will require several weeks.

Navy Casualty List To July 25 Totals 12,342

Marines, Sailors And Coast Guardsmen Are Included

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5. (AP)—The Navy, releasing its ninth consecutive monthly casualty list, said today that 12,342 sailors, Marines and coast guardsmen had been killed since the start of the war. Total to July 25, totalled 12,342.

The recapitulation was the first to include the coast guard. The Navy began issuing casualty lists for its own personnel and its component services, the Marine Corps and the coast guard.

The monthly casualty list contained the names of 27 dead, 17 wounded and 1 missing, a total of 22 reported to next of kin during the period July 11 to 25 inclusive. In this particular list the Navy said there were no coast guard casualties and marine corps casualties were only 4 killed and 1 missing.

The recapitulation showed that the Marine Corps had been born by the Navy's own men who have engaged in such actions as the China Sea campaign, the Corregidor-San Pedro battle, the Midway battle and the initial engagement of the war at Pearl Harbor.

The recapitulation showed that of 1,347 sailors, 1,251 were officers and men of the Navy, 200 were marines and 10 were coast guardsmen.

Wounded were 924, consisting of Navy 818, Marine Corps 90, Coast Guard 7. Missing were 6,091 for the Navy and 1,789 for the Marine Corps, a total of 7,880. No coast guardsmen have been reported missing.
