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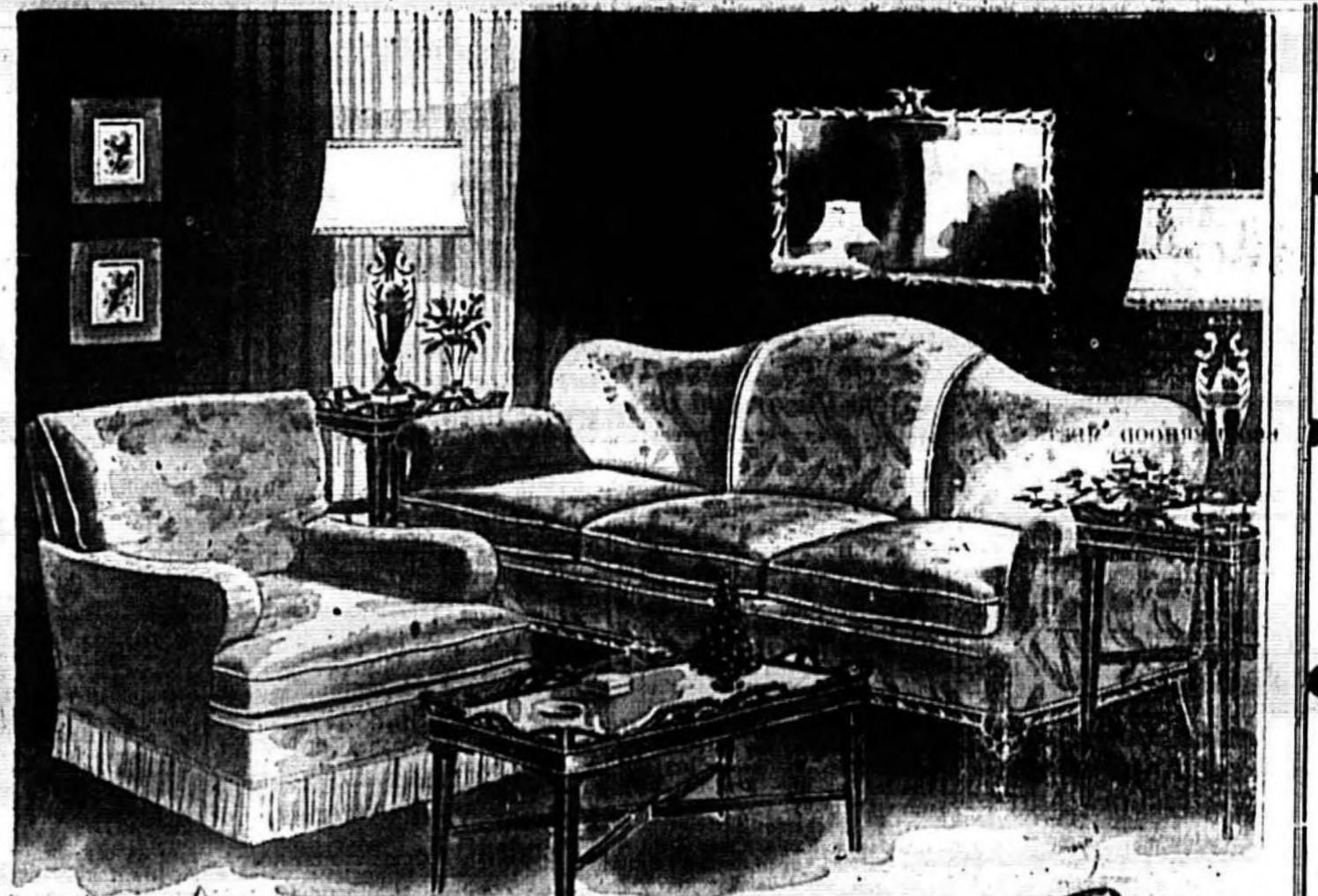

Split Pea Soup with

Raw Vegetable Salad
Gingerbread with Stewed Apples
(Recipes Serve Four)

Split Pea Soup with Frankfurter Garnish
1 1/2 cups dried split peas
2 tablespoons bacon fat
2 large onions, sliced
2 quarts cold water
Ham bone
1 stalk celery
1 carrot
1 sprig parsley
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1 tablespoon flour
1 cup cream
Salt and pepper
4 frankfurters, sliced and fried crisp
Pick over peas and soak in cold water two or three hours. Fry onions in the bacon fat, add cold water, ham bone, peas and vegetables. Simmer for two hours. Remove ham bone, celery and carrot and press through a sieve. Rub butter of margarine and flour to gether, dilute with cream and add to the soup. Simmer for 10 minutes. Serve hot with frankfurter slices floating on top.

LONDON—British women, badgered in wartime to turn their shirts into blouses, pajamas into nightgowns, and hats into pocketbooks, are now being exhorted to "make do and mend" their kitchens.

"With a little ingenuity and a handy husband with a saw, you can contrive almost the modern household's dream," says the British "Make do and Mend" Kitchen in the "New Kitchens for Old Homes" section of the "New Homes from Old" exhibition now on show in London.

The "Make do and Mend" Kitchen is a collection of practical, tried-looking, homelike schemes—woven aprons, a table of stone, a gas range, a modern Victorian kitchen devoid of glamour or convenience.

While the nearby displays of the gas, electricity and solid fuel companies are nearly deserted, only a few optimists peering at their shining labor-saving new gadgets, the rooms of any old back kitchen and scullery typical of most London houses and the next door "made over" counter part is surrounded by women of all ages.

"It's no use looking at the new stoves and heaters," said one woman, "because I can't do anything at all to cook on old fashioned range or gas range. They say you can't have priority for a gas or electric oven. But I may get some tips here to make my dudger a little less."

Next door to a dingy Victorian basement kitchen, with huge coal stove, dreary ledge, paint "spotted" and dirt worn linoleum covered floors, open dirt-colored cupboards, clipped yellow sink and built in stone wash boiler, the Women's Voluntary Services have shown how to turn an antique horror can be converted into something which, though at least approximately the average American kitchen.

There is no ice box or washing machine, but the old sink has been replaced with a modern, deeper one fitted around the old fashioned faucets. A draining board has been made from the four dollars worth of wood at lowest per month per family.

An old fashioned dresser with open shelves has been converted to a cupboard, its deep drawers divided into separate compartments for cutlery and kitchen utensils.

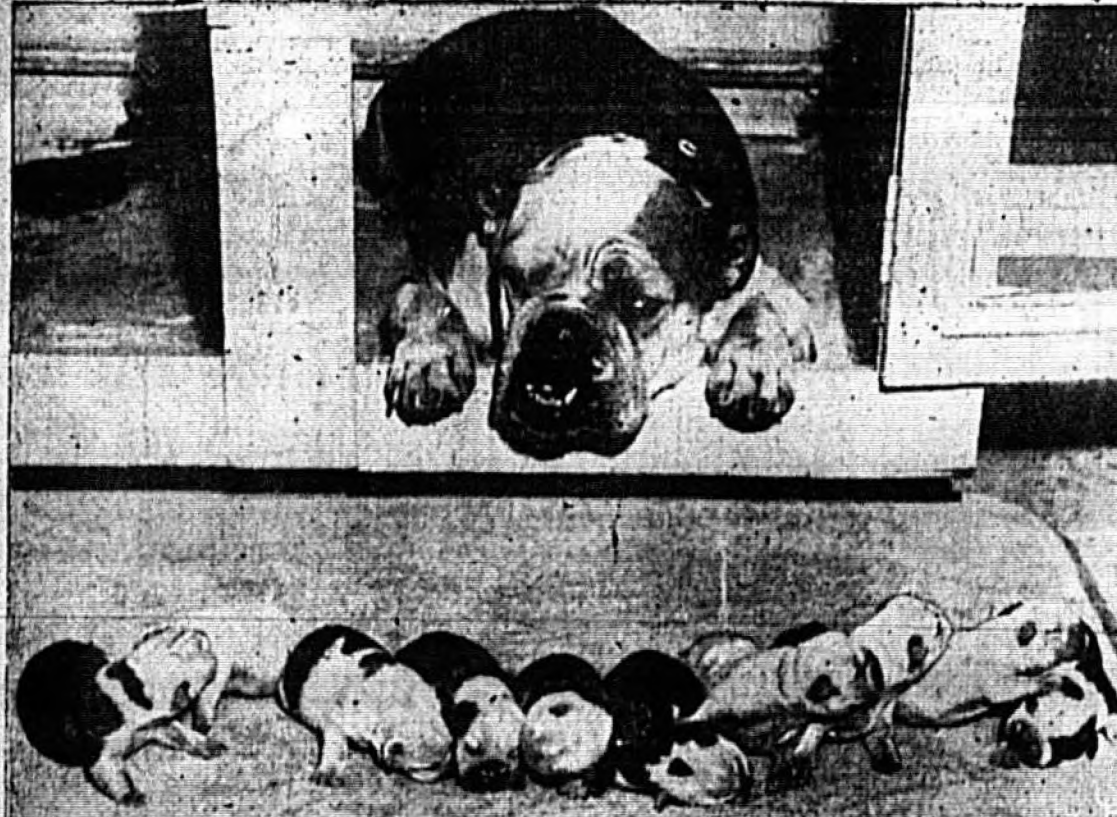
