Last large lot in Lake Mary to be developed

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary reluctantly commissioners agreed last week to a preliminary development plan for the largest remaining tract of unde-veloped land in the city.

In a public hearing that last-ed nearly three hours, residents from three surrounding com-munities — Manderley, City commissioners approve initial planned unit development on Rinehart Road

Timacuan and The Forest approached the city commission with concerns about the planned unit development (PUD), The Villages of Lake Mary. The Villages — a 117-acre parcel located on Rinehart Road across from Primary Boulance. across from Primera Boulevard

— could include as many as 500 town homes or condominiums, about two dozen single family homes, 165,000 square feet of commercial space and 22,000 square feet of office space.

"Over the years we have done a few PUDs," Comm-

issioner Gary Brender said. "We are virtually adding something to Lake Mary that is the size of Timacuan. This is not a small project by any stretch of the imagination."

By pursuing the planned unit development route, com-

missioners and the applicant, D.R. Horton, were able to nego-D.R. Florion, were able to nego-tiate terms of the entire pro-posed development. If the property was developed piece-meal with all the different land uses, its intensity could be high-er with a more "hodgepodge"

appearance. Several commissioners did not want to see any multi-

and spent hood in LaGrange, Ky. He graduated from Hanover College in Indiana in 1949. He served as a Lieutenant J.G. in the Coast Guard during the Korean conflict.

He earned his master's degree in educational administration at Stetson University. In 1955, he came to Seminole County, taught biology and was the head basketball coach at Seminole

High School. He was president of the eminole Education Association before becoming an assistant principal at Lyman High School. He also served as principal of Milwee Middle, Teague Middle and Seminole High School. He was elected to two terms as superintendent of Seminole County Public Schools, serv-

ing from 1972 to 1961.

He received many civic and educational awards including the Rotary Club's Paul Harris Fellow and the 1999 Topper Award from the Sanford Seminole Chamber of Commerce.

The William P. "Bud" Layer Scholarship Fund, administered by the Foundation for Seminole County Public Schools was established in 2002. Most recently the Seminole County School Board voted to name the new Winter Springs elementary school, to open in August 2004, Layer Elementary School, in honor of Bud and his wife

He was a member of
Woods Presbyterian Church and an elder of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. Bud's hobbies included golfing, fishing and

traveling. Former Sanford City Commissioner and teacher Whitey Eckstein commented that Layer was, "a hero of mine." He recalled that in 1967, Layer led a teachers' strike, one of the few ever held in Seminole County. The strike was for higher wages for classroom teachers. "And the strike proved

Sanford homicide suspect caught in **DeLand**

A summer spent on the lam, a DeLand man returned from Puerto Rico recently to be arrested for Sanford murder charges.

Jose Anibal Barroso, 28, of 400 El Dora Court, was taken into custody Monday by Volusia County deputies in DeLand after Sanford investigators received infor-mation that he had returned to Florida. He has been wanted since July 27, when he and two others reported-ly broke into a Sanford home and beat two Wax Myrtle Drive residents. Patricio Prieto Contreras and Julio Pablo. Two-timing senator: Construction worker by day, possible vice president nominee by night

LAKE MARY — Digging in a trench along Interstate 4 Monday, U.S. Sen. Bob Graham is hoping to unearth some more infrastructure funds for Florida next year and possibly a new job.

Since 1977, Graham has been known for his "workdays" where he goes out in the community and performs various duties. The tradition began when a Miami area high school teacher asked Graham, at the time a state senator, to teach a semester of civics class. He continued the trend during his

campaign and terms as gover-nor. During his recent presi-dential bid, Graham also per-formed his trademark work-days in New Hampshire and lowa performing duties as a train conductor and dairy

During his 392nd workday in Lake Mary, Graham was helping a Florida Department of Transportation road construction crew install drainage improvements at the Interstate 4, Lake Mary Boulevard interchange. He was also using the opportunity to promote his new "Build America" bill that



"She observed two of the fish tanks had been disturbed and three rat snakes missing from one of the tanks," the investigating deputy wrote in the incident report.



A day later, however, Contreras died from the injuries sustained during the robbery, and the charges against the three were upgraded to first-degree murder. To the police department's dismay, Barroso had already posted bond.

"He left the country. If he

knew that he was wanted,

we don't know, but he skipped bond," Cohen said.
After more than four months of evading authorities, Volusia County deputies arrested Barroso at 318 Bellviaw Court in 318 Bellview Court in DeLand Monday evening without incident. Cohen said authorities were uncertain why he returned to the area, but he had been a hard suspect to track down because of several aliases.

Previously booked into jail as Daniel "Tito" Maldonado, Barroso used the identity of another Sanford man when he was initially arrested. He even went to the extent to have a driver's license printed with Maldonado's information on it, but used his own photograph, Cohen said. Barroso was also known to use the alias of Juan Castillo.

Volusia County deputies booked Barroso into their county jail and he was trans-ported to the Seminole County jail Tuesday after-

"Florida has traditionally sent more money to Washington than we have gotten back for highways and roads," Graham said. The Sunshine State is labeled

as a "donor state" as they receive only about \$.90 of every \$1 from the gas tax back from the federal government for infrastructure needs. Graham says he is committed to raising the total to \$.95 for all states over the next six years. The increase could translate into more than \$900 million a year for state infrastructure needs.

"The overall level of funding for transportation, schools, water and sewer is not sufficient enough for the level of

growth," he said. Before his workday in Lake Mary, Graham was at Disney over the weekend as the remaining Democratic presidential candidates jockeyed for state support. Several of the candidates have shown interest in Graham possibly being a vice president running mate.

successful. We helped improve the salaries," Eckstein said.





'Speakeasy' club provides laughs for Sanford patrons

SANFORD - Visitors are immediately struck by the industrial, Chicago-style of the Speakeasy Comedy Club in the Sanford Shopping Plaza on 17-92, just north of the 417 Greeneway bridge. Black lights and quirky

props enrich the zany atmosphere, while the warmth of candles on all the tables also provide an easy and relaxed ambiance. Jazz and swingstyle music plays in the back-ground, and on most nights is performed live by a professional musician.

A finger food dining menu is available, along with a fully stocked bar, for those who want to eat during the show, and all items are served in an unexpectedly hilarious style by eccentric waiters, all of whom have taken on a particular, and peculiar, comedic character.

The show itself is based on the improv style, and audience members are strongly encouraged to participate by shouting out scenarios for the comics to act out on the stage. The hostess moderates throughout the evening. detailing the next game with-in the very full program, which provides lots of quickpaced variety. What's more, the troupe makes an effort to keep the comedy PG-13, so

that it is as family friendly as it is diverse. Owner Jon Smith wants it that way.

A 1999 graduate of Deltona High School, Smith says that he is blessed to be so successful this early in his life and career. He credits God and his staff for the favorable response of the public to his off-beat, yet exceptionally marketable ideas.

the show. And yet there is an absence of conceit in Smith, who takes time out for every individual who wants to speak with him, expressing appreciation for each one.



Instead, we went to lunch and then took PV2 Garza to 28th CSH (combat support hospital) to have her knee checked, which took all day. I saw Sgt. Bates waiting with the other evacuees. He was looking a lot better and had both eyes open. He was going to Lanstuhl, Germany, to be treated and possibly coming back to Baghdad. I gave him my e-mail address so he could keep me updated on his situation.

I can tell you that the troops are eager to get the care-package boxes from the Seminole Herald project supporting us. After hearing about how big it is, we decided to make this a platoon size operation as it is going to be too much for just a squad. So it is going to be bigger than planned on this end and will easily cover 4 squads instead of just my squad.

We had some casualties from an IED (improvised explosive device) attack that occurred on the route to Dogwood but not any of my squad. The female who was driving received her second Purple Heart, and she was at the hospital to have some more shrappel taken out of her leg. We left 28th CSH and headed back to Camp Marlboro past the Palestinian Hotel and

Oli Ministry.

Our squad has nicknamed all the routes in our area. They are "Punk Sheep Road," because the sheep in this area are marked with purple spray paint on their heads. Then there is "Finnell Road Rage Corner."

She always goes off on other

drivers at this particular corner.
"Nodding Horse Road," this is where horses nod their heads every morning. "Dusty Trail" is the back road to Camp Mariboro, aptly named for heavy dust. "Raymaker Gurgle Highway." I told you about this place in a previous letter. This is where Finnell drove through that puddle of water and totally soaked Raymaker who was in the turret and all I heard was him cussing and making a gur-gling sound. "Flip-flop Sheep Butt Road" is named for the sheep with the flip flop stuck to the wool on his buit. "Car Wash Circle" is a traffic circle where people pay to have kids wash their cars. Then there's "Automotive Flea market" it's always crowded and they sell cars imported from Jordan. Then there is "Sheep Feed Alley" because they are always feeding sheep there. The list is endless. My people may not

know where "Route Delta" is but they know where "Punk Sheep Road" is and how to get there.

I have noticed how others look at us when we roll into places like the PX at BIAP (Baghdad Airport). It is like the townsfolk looking at gunfighters in the old west. This place is frequented mostly by rear area troops and the ones that live in relatively safe places who seldom get dirty. We are usually dusty with bullet holes in the sides of our humvees. We wear

9mm holsters in a way that we

can draw in a split second, we have a variety of big knives,

some carry AK47 bayonets, have weapons alung over our shoulders, and generally are draped with ammo belts.

I heard three G.I.s talking behind us in line at the PX and one of them said, "Those guys are from that cavalry outfit. They're always patrolling the streets at night and getting in firefights." One guy made a remark about one of our female soldlers and his buddy warred him that she "would probably kill him so fast he would never knew what hit him." They were talking about Finnell. I can assure you that there is no guy brave enough to tackle her, unless they are suicidal.

We were told that there had only been light casualties this

only been light casualties this month, but I found out today that 70 American soldiers have already been killed in November. That's a whole bunch of dead, enough to fill two college classrooms. It's a bunch of parents, sons and daughters, possibly a few future inventors, artists and doctors. Who knows what we have lost. I wonder about these things, and how little we brush aside death by trying to rationalize that it was for the good? But as one "official," (that I shall not name) said in the news, "It is militarily insignificant." What? Seventy dead is insignificant? That's not only ridiculous, it is as insensitive as that stupid "Bring 'em on" remark. When 70 young Americans are killed that is very significant in my book! They keep down playing

this shiff

Some soldiers are have trouble with mental stress to varying degrees. Some are plain worn out, others have just seen too much violence and, of course, living in total fear for eight months hasn't helped none of us. The new ones are scared, I can tell, but it keeps them on their toes. I think some soldiers are probably reluctant to report stress problems for fear of being charged with malingering, so they just keep it to themselves and try to bear with it. If you go bonkers they will put you behind a deak in the operations center and you sit there and listen to the radio.

If I go looney I want to be on patrol pressing out the operations center for the patrol pressing out the operation.

If I go looney I want to be on patrol cussing out the ones in the operations center for not listening when we are about to be engaged with fire and I'm trying to call in our location. This almost happened today when we were on patrol, but the assailant ran off. I wanted to kill that SOB. I had him in my sights and was about to kill him until he ducked into an alley and disappeared in a crowd of people. We couldn't get through the crowd and we lost him. That's OK because he'll be there again tomorrow night and so will I.

I try to hang on to my sanity, but my whole way of thinking is changing. I dread going to sleep at night because of the weird dreams, dreams about my kids playing with a bunch of big knives, or going in a shopping mall and chasing some guy and shooting at him.

In one dream I had, I was standing waist deep in warm blood and it is bubbling. What kind of dreams are these? I used to always have good dreams, I used to look forward to dreaming. Now Stephen King is writing my dreams.

protections from the development as they feared The Villages would adversely impact wet-lands near Lake Natashawn. The small, natural lake is surrounded by wetlands that are inhabited by wildlife.

Jutting toward the lake, between the wetlands, is a three to four acre peninsula of uplands. Commissioners decided if the developer was to encroach the peninsula, the cap of residential units would drop from the proposed 500 to 455.

The cap of units on the pro-posed development could also decrease next year when a more complete planned unit development is presented. The developer will provide environment and traffic studies for the property that could lower the number of total units.

We understand there will be 500 units there and there is a good chance it will be less than that," said John Percy, a planning con-sultant for the project.

Lake Mary's Bryn Mosler also continues to get her legs back after taking a year off, dropping in 10 points while handing out three assists and coming nun a pair of steals.


Sophomore Rosanna Davis bounced back from a tough game against Hillsborough with an 11 point, 10 rebound effort.



"After searching the nation I identified my number one candidate and we got him," Orsini said. "He is the best person for this job. He has a proven track record of building an entire football program to a championship level."

The lights have been turned off, the SWAT team of emergency marine insurance adjusters and surveyors from the BoatU.S. Marine Insurance Catastrophe Response Team have gone home, but boaters everywhere can share in the lessons learned during the team's post-Hurricane Isabel recovery efforts. While there is still work ahead - holes to be patched, rub

rails repaired, interiors replaced – the follow-ing tips will help get you back on the water, faster, with less hassle, after the next storm

blows through.

Call your insurance company first: The first step for any boater whose vessel has been damaged by a storm is to call your insurer. By doing this, you ensure your boat's recovery effort will be smooth. Deciding to speed up the process by negotiating with on-site ambu-

lance chasers - fly-by-night salvors such as trucking and crane companies who often appear after major storms - can result in delays, or worse, more damage to your boat which may not be covered by your policy. By calling your insurance company and having them negotiate and steer your road to recovery, you will ensure that salvage costs are covered, and repairs are made on schedule in accordance with accepted standards.

Triage: When significant storms occur, most marine insurers embrace the Triage concept, which targets initial recovery efforts on vessels with the most damage. Sunken boats take priority, as do boats that can cause environmental damage or create other hazards such as fire and explosions. So if your boat is dinged up, but safely high and dry in the back corner of the yard, be patient and understand that action will be taken as soon as the worse cases are stabilized.

That doesn't mean, however, that your insurer is off the hook. A good marine insurer will communicate frequently with an owner to keep them aware of the status of their claim.

Also, as with the case of Isabel where thousands of boats were damaged, marinas and repair yards were swamped. Many facilities had to first focus on getting back on their feet themselves, before they could commence any vessel repair work.

Protect your boat and its belongings: After the storm, most marine insurance policies require that if it's safe to do so, boat owners should protect their boat from further damage. The most common example of this is covering a cockpit with plastic tarp to prevent rainwater intrusion and additional damage to wiring or structural elements. This \$20 purchase can shorten your boat's recovery by days or even weeks. Besides, expenses related to protecting your boat are generally covered in your policy under what's called "sue and labor."

Pull your papers: Before the storm, remove any official ownership documents from your vessel. This is one time you don't want any more delays by having to get duplicate regis-trations or other papers, which caused a more than a few headaches this time around for

Is your boat paid off? In a similar paperwork vein, nearly a third of all Isabel claimants were delayed payments because their insurance company had not previously been advised that the loan was paid off and bank lien removed. Don't let paperwork as simple as this slow down your road to recov-ery - getting a check with the bank's name on it is never fun and delays repairs.

Pick your insurance company carefully. For most of us, insurance is simply a matter of paying a premium. During his seven-year stint at Georgia Tech, O'Leary guided the Yellow Jackets to a 52-33 (.612) record including five bowl appearances. From 1995-2001, Georgia Tech recorded five winning seasons in six years, including the 1998 ACC Co-Championship and an appearance in the Toyota Gator Bowl New Year's Day.

O'Leary's Georgia Tech teams won at least seven games four times during his tenure, including a 10-win season in 1998 and a nine-win campaign in 2000.

For the past two seasons, O'Leary has served on the coaching staff of the Minnesota Vikings in the NFL. Prior to his departure for UCF, O'Leary served as the defensive coordinator for

the Vikings in 2003. In his first season with the Vikings in 2002, O'Leary guided the Vikings defensive line into becoming the strength of the Vikings defense. As assistant nead coach, he was a sounding board for first year head coach Mike Tice for such things as practice planning and team issues among oth-

Under O'Leary's direction, defensive tackle Chris Hovan emerged as one of the top players in the game at his position. He finished the season with a team-high 36 quarterback hurries and was selected to the Sports Illustrated All-Pro team. The Vikings rushing defense moved up to 10th in the NFL (was 30th in 2001) behind the strong play of Kenny Mixon, who finished the season with a defensive line-high 82 tack-

One trademark of O'Leary's tenure as a head coach has been the quality and experi-ence has had on his coaching staffs. While at Georgia Tech. O'Leary had three assistants work under him that later garnered head coaching jobs. Ralph Friedgen (Maryland). Randy Edsall (Connecticut) and Ted Roof (Duke) all served under O'Leary at

Tech.
O'Leary served as the defensive line coach for the San Diego Chargers in 1992 and 1993. In 1992, the defense had 51 sacks, which at the time was the fourth best in team history. The Chargers won the AFC West in 1992

with an 11-5 record.
O'Leary's first stint at Georgia Tech came from 1987-91 as the defensive coordinator/defensive line coach. The team finished 11-0-1 in 1990 and won the National Championship.

O'Leary received his first coaching job at the collegiate level at Syracuse (1980-86). He coached the defensive line and also was the assistant head coach his final two sea-

O'Leary started his coaching career at the high school level. From 1968-76 he coached at Central Islip (NY) High School (1975-76 as head coach) before taking over as the head coach at Liverpool High School (NY). He posted 37-8-1 record in five seasons including a perfect 10-0 sea-son in 1979.

George Joseph O'Leary was born in Central Islip, N.Y. and attended Central Islip High School. He attended the University of New Hampshire and earned his degree in physical education. George and his wife, Sharon, have two daughters, Chris and Trish, and two sons, Tim

dunk from E.J. Gordon and threes from Mark Stiles and Craig pulled Stetson to within 11, but the Gators held on for


the 13-point victory.

'Out of the Dust' tour is all about the history

Seminole High School stu-dents of Camalia Barnes' classes, grades ninth through 12th, experienced Sanford through the Arts of Tajiri, demonstrated by storytelling, mime, song, dance and tour.

The Negro National Anthem was sung and the history of this song — written by brothers James and Rosemond Johnson — was given. The history of Sanford was given by tour director Patricia Whatley of the Tajiri Arts Incorporated School for the Performing Arts and Academics.

The artist in resident at Tajiri Arts, author Valada Flewellyn, gave the history of Seminole County, noting its original name, Mosquito County. The history of Sanford was continued through song and dance by the Last Mime, whose performances are always a great, eye-catching display of talent in the art of dance.

The students were introduced to the historical ring play of African-American culture. The popular form of children's play was demonstrated by student volunteers, to "Just from the Kitchen" by Sanford's own Zora Neal Hurston, who, at one time, lived in the historical home at Sixth Street and Hickory Ave --- known to many as the Hurston-Francis House,

where parents of the noted author /anthropologist Zora Neal Hurston and Sanford's historical midwife Marie Jones Francis lived.

"Out of the Dust" is the idea by which children and adults are informed of the rich history of our African-American heritage here in Sanford. The tour gives student history of "The Little Red School House," Sanford Museum and Sanford Avenue Corridor, the first cultural arts centers for neighborhood children, taught by Julia Ray Merritt, a school teacher who used her front porch as a stage to teach children the arts.

Hopper Academy, another historical site, was built in 1906 and enlarged in 1916. This building has been remodeled and was originally known as

the "Colored High School," St. James African Methodist Episcopal Church is the oldest African-American church, built in 1913 by black architect Prince W. Spears. Zion Hope began in 1910 and was pastored by the Reverend John Hurston. The Harris Nest was the home of the late Frank and Montez Harris, Sanford's first black millionaires

Sanford's Out of the Dust tour is by appointment only, with a minimum tour size of 20 people and a maximum of 40. Groups smaller than 20 or larger than 40 require a specisetup. Tour cost for students (12) is \$8 and \$12 per adult. Box lunches for adults are available. For tour information, call Patricia Merritt Whatley at 407-324-9140.




