Two arrested in connection with shooting death

Stawn L. O'Neal, 23, 3001 Kings Road, and E.V. Perry, 19, of 581 Old Geneva Road, Geneva, have been arrested in connection with the death of Mark Tollous, 44, identified as a construction worker from Wisconsin who had been staying at the Budget Inn in Sanford.

According to Deputy Chief Steve Harriett with the Seminole County Sheriff's office, the shooting reportedly took place while Tollous was in his pickup truck early Monday morning, following a confrontation between the men, apparently on Water Street in Midway.

After O'Neal reportedly shot Tollous, Tollous drove his pickup truck approximately two blocks on Kings Street to Center Street before the truck came to a stop in a drainage ditch. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Investigators revealed that O'Neal shot Tollous and was aided by Perry, who was present during the confrontation.

Christmas fire damages church

Church secretary says some 'very amazing' things happened during blaze

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Christmas Day came to a sad ending for Senior Pastor Guy Walden, his wife Terri, and the congregation of First Baptist Church on Sanlando Drive, off State Road 434.

At about 7:30 p.m. Christmas evening, a fire raced through the church preschool classrooms and did moderate damage to church offices. No one was injured in the two-alarm fire, which took

more than 30 minutes to extinguish. Firefighters from Seminole County, Longwood and Altamonte Springs responded.

According to Sue Smith, church secretary, the fire started in an electrical panel in one

of the classrooms used by pre-schoolers for Sunday school. She estimated the blaze caused more than \$500,000 damage.

"We plan to rebuild as soon as possible," she said. Smith explained that several "very amazing" things happened during the fire.

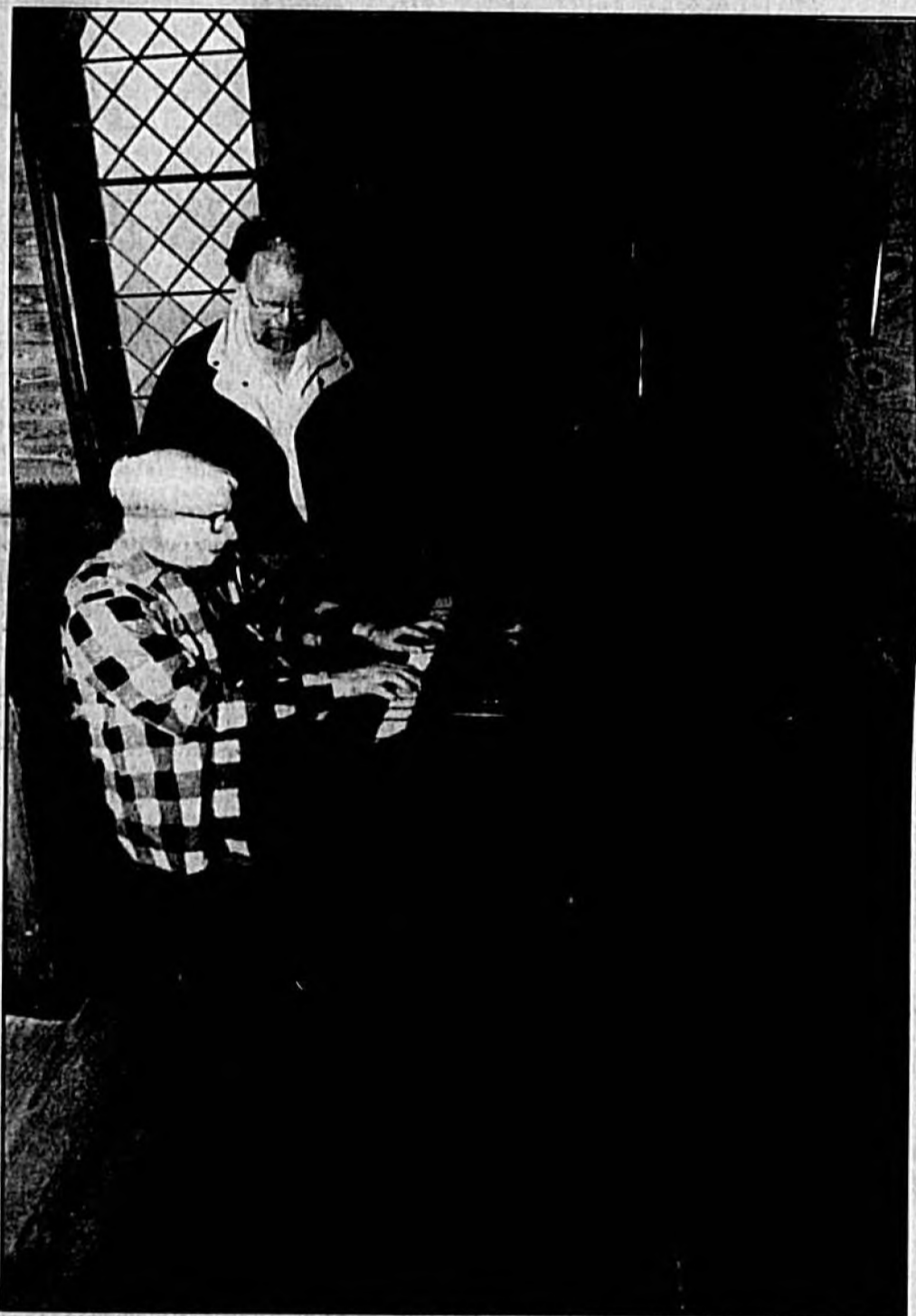
"A child's Bible was completely singed by the fire except for the face of Jesus Christ — It was untouched," she said.

Move mounting to oust Florida justices

SANFORD — A Republican Palm Beach county commissioner, angered by actions of several Florida Supreme Court Justices, is mounting a state-wide effort to convince voters to toss the trio from the state's high court in 2002.

Mary McCarty has taken the reins in an effort to raise more than \$4 million to mount a campaign to have Justices Charles T. Well, Leander J. Shaw, Jr. and Harry Lee Anstead forced into retirement when they face voters for retention in two years.

"The Florida Constitution gives the voters direct control of our Supreme Court," McCarty said of the initiative.

"The efforts of the Supreme Court to hijack the Presidential election for Al Gore coupled with the Court's opposition to school choice, leniency for those convicted of Capital Crimes, and opposition to

parental notification for the abortion by a minor demonstrate that it is time to retire the next three justices who will stand before the voters in November of 2002."

McCarty said she would reach out to elected Republican officials and activists across the state to join the effort. In a fund-raising letter mailed this week to 350,000 Republican donors across the state, McCarty said, "The Court is left-wing, partisan and actively hostile to mainstream ideas and principles. The Court doesn't interpret law — the court writes new laws based on liberal dogmas."

"We seek a Court which is objective and fair," she said. "A Court that will look at both sides of an issue. Merit retention is not automatic — it should be earned."

Seminole County Republican party chairman Jim Steling said

Seminole's drug treatment center to receive \$645,000

SANFORD — Santa has been good to Seminole County's drug treatment program, The Grove Counseling Center.

U.S. Congressman John Mica (R-Winter Park) announced just prior to the Christmas weekend that the facility, located in Winter Springs, will receive a record \$645,000 federal appropriation signed into law at the close of the 2000 legislative session.

Mica, who sponsored the congressional

funding measure said, "With Central Florida's epidemic cases of drug abuse and drug-related deaths, this funding can go a long way toward helping our Central Florida Community deal with these mounting problems."

The Grove is converting its 28-bed co-educational facility to two 20-bed units, one for girls and one for boys. The federal funds will help cover the cost of expansion, remodeling, furnishings and equipment. For the past 28 years The Grove has provided substance abuse, delinquen-

Stitch in time saves another column

Contrary to my boss' opinion, even through I am quite a bit older than he, I was not around when Guttenberg invented the printing press, and I did not personally know Benjamin Franklin. Likewise, I was not on hand when the Wright brothers made their initial flight. (I was out of town that day).

Nonetheless, today I write about good ole' Ben Franklin. It was 268 years ago, on Dec. 28, 1732, that the *Pennsylvania Gazette* newspaper carried an advertisement for the first issue of *Poor Richard's Almanac*, written by "Richard Saunders" and aimed at the year 1733.

Ben Franklin wrote the publication but he wasn't certain it would be successful, so he used the name Saunders.

The advertisement in the *Gazette* said the almanac would contain "many pleasant and witty verses, jests and sayings, new fashions, games for kisses, men and melons, breakfast in bed, etc."

Poor Richard's Almanack, (he spelled it with a "k") was published from 1733 until 1758 by Franklin, and many times since then by others. In the autobiography of Benjamin Franklin, he said, "In 1732 I first published my almanac under the name of Richard Saunders. It was continued by me about 25 years, commonly called *Poor Richard's Almanack*. I endeavored to make it both entertaining and useful, and it accordingly came to be in such demand that I reaped considerable profit from it, vending annually near ten thousand (dollars).

"And observing that it was generally read, scarce any neighborhood in the province being without it, I considered it as a proper vehicle for conveying instructions among the common people who bought scarcely any other books. I therefore filled all the little spaces that occurred between the remarkable days in the calendar with proverbial sentences, chiefly such as inculcated industry and frugality, as the means of procuring wealth, and thereby securing virtue, it being more difficult for a man in want to act always honestly."

In other words — he was offering advice, probably based on his own success. Some of the proverbs he used to fill space were interesting, for example, "It is hard for an empty sack to stand upright." While this is true, I have never used it in everyday conversation.

Ben had an unusual style of writing. Words ending with "ed" were generally written with an apostrophe and "d", such as consider'd, and occur'd. The concept didn't catch on.

These days, we have the *Farmer's Almanac*, upon which some place much faith. This publication has been in existence for 183 years, so it's not a newcomer. Farmers often plant and reap their crops based on what this publication predicts. And to give them credit, although this year's edition was written and printed in mid-1999, the weather forecast in the *2000 Farmer's Almanac* for Florida for this past week in December, called for "very cold, frosts down to Florida." Pretty accurate, I'd say.

It also has proverbs, such as, "Take life as you find it, but don't leave it that way." "Dreams never come true by oversleeping" and "Nothing wrong ever happens at the right time."

So much for the history and moral values lesson. I'll write to you again this Saturday. Hopefully, I'll come up with something more interesting.

Children's Progress It can't happen without help of parents

She's just 2 years old, but she has already learned much of the alphabet. She sometimes confuses look-alike characters such as "W" and "V," but she has conquered most of it. And she is excited about her accomplishment. Seeing the dark-blue "A" on my bright-orange Auburn University hat, she yelled to her mother, "A, Mommy! A!" As we stepped onto Level M of a parking garage, she noticed the tall letter before I did. "M!" she shouted.

My niece is the product of educated parents who dote on her — reading to her daily, taking her to swimming and gymnastics, enrolling her in Suzuki violin classes. Born to a Spanish-speaking father, she counts to 20 in two languages.

Irene is a testament to the promise of a nurturing environment. Her father likes to point out — only half-jokingly — that a good gene pool is a factor in her intelligence, but he does not deny that she thrives because of the attention she receives. Nature could not produce such impressive results on its own.

While her parents are likely to eventually enroll her in a school with good teachers and a disciplined environment, Irene would learn in almost any school setting. That's because her parents will continue to expose her to books and ideas, art and music. As education experts have long pointed out, the single greatest determinant of a child's educational attainment is parental involvement. Without that key ingredient, children simply cannot do as well.

Every year, children enter America's public schools whose parents have never read to them, never lingered over a coloring book with them, never taught them the simple child's prayer, "Now I lay me down to sleep ..." Those are the children of desperately poor parents working two and three jobs, parents who cannot read themselves, parents addicted to alcohol or narcotics. Those children can never catch up to the educational attainment of kids like Irene.

So what do we do about those children left behind? Do we simply throw up our hands, blaming their parents for their failure? Or do we recognize that their failure is also our own?

In a divisive presidential contest, both President-elect George Bush and Vice President Al Gore agreed on the need to improve educational opportunity and attainment. Indeed, Bush's best line was his denunciation of the "soft bigotry of low expectations."

But the campaign trail lends itself only to simple ideas; neither man found the time or the place to confront the complexities of educational failure. Bush found it easier to blast failing public schools and promote vouchers, which would give parents public dollars for private education. Gore, needing the support of teachers' unions, opposed vouchers, focusing instead on improving working conditions for public school teachers.

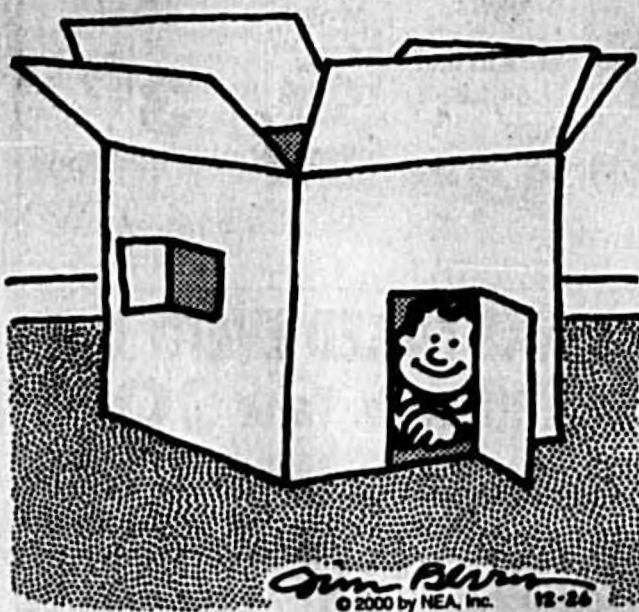
Here's the difficult truth neither man would acknowledge: Failing public schools (and poorly performing children) are largely restricted to poor urban and rural communities. Parents in wealthy suburbs are not screaming for vouchers to put their children in private schools; nor are teachers in high-performing public schools complaining about their working conditions. Somehow, the children of affluent, well-educated parents manage to do just fine — whether the schools they attend are public or private.

It will not be easy to structure programs to boost educational opportunity for children without the advantage of parental involvement. And it will not be possible to duplicate the benefits bestowed by parents who are not only attentive but also well-educated. But we might start to help children without those advantages by acknowledging where the gap exists: at home.

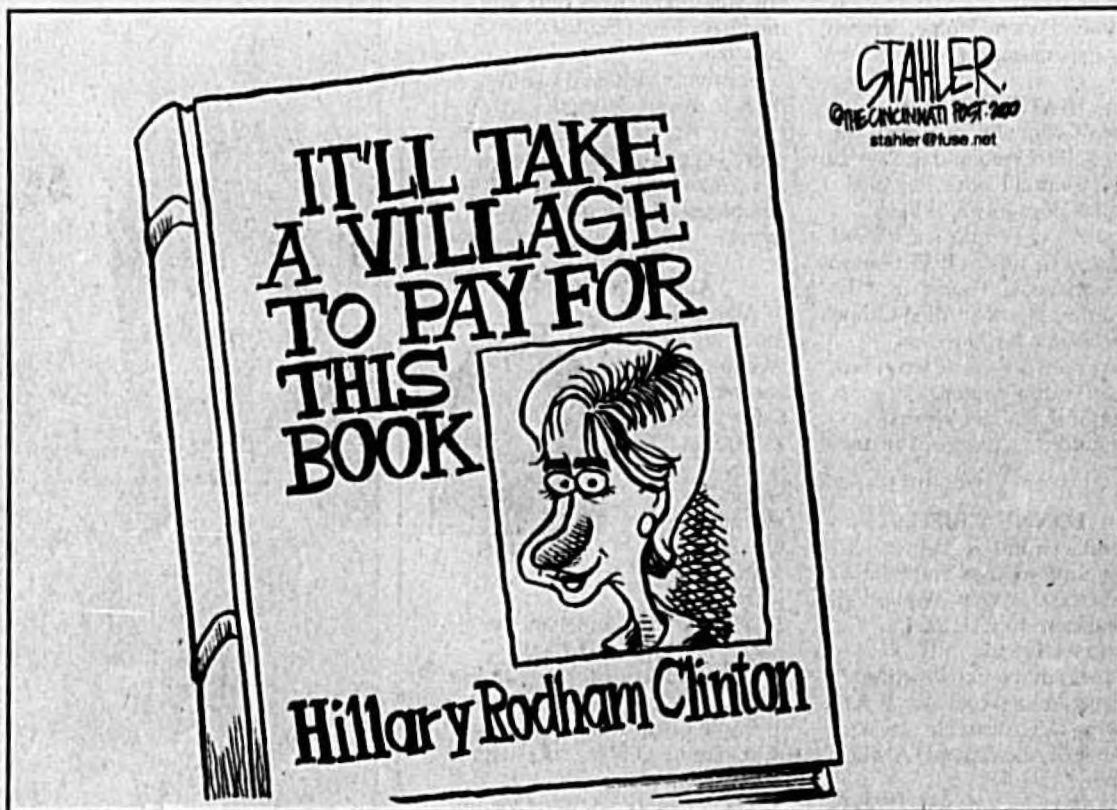

SNL Bush satire inaccurate

George W. Bush is a dunce. How do we know that? Because Will Ferrell tells us so — every weekend on NBC's "Saturday Night Live," the comedy show on which the actor parodies the president-elect.

So why should anyone take late night political satire seriously, even if it is at the expense of the next president? Because the powers that be at NBC News have decided that Ferrell's weekly mockery of Bush is worthy of re-airing on its widely viewed "Today Show," as well as "The News With Brian Williams" on its cable offspring.

By providing Ferrell a wider audience than he would otherwise enjoy, NBC News gets away with telling millions of viewers that the president-elect is an intellectual lightweight and that he is unworthy of the high office to which he has been entrusted.

Of course, the producers at NBC News will deny, deny, deny this is their intent. But during the 25-year history of "Saturday Night Live," when else have its political parodies been re-aired on the network's news shows?

Never. The weekly derision of Bush, which occurs most conspicuously on NBC, is a reminder of an all too familiar tactic used to undermine Republicans in high places. If you can't beat 'em fair and square, smear 'em. They did it to Clarence Thomas. They did it to Dan Quayle. And now they are trying to do it to George W. Bush. But just as anyone who truly

knows Justice Thomas realizes that he was the victim of despicable character assassination, just as anyone who truly knows former Vice President Quayle realizes he was, and is, quite conversant on a wide range of public policy issues, anyone who is familiar with Bush's background recognizes that the mocking characterization, blithely passed along by the media, is so misleading it is downright unfair.

If viewers accept without skepticism "Saturday Night Live"'s assessment of the relative intelligence of Bush versus his vanquished opponent, Al Gore, they would conclude that Bush was grossly overmatched. But what they would not know, because the sketch writers at SNL are undoubtedly unaware of it, and the folks of NBC News haven't seen fit to inform viewers of it, is that Bush's academic background is clearly superior to Gore's.

That's right. The Washington Post obtained a copy of Gore's undergraduate transcript at Harvard, which it compared with Bush's transcript at Yale.

Gore was no more than an average student, posting a C minus in introductory economics, and a C plus and D in two of his science courses (which casts doubt upon his qualification to author a scientific jeremiad like "Earth in the Balance").

And Gore's graduate school record is even worse. He dropped out of Vanderbilt Divinity School



after earning F's in five of the eight courses he took over three semesters. Then he dropped out of Vanderbilt Law School after receiving mediocre grades.

Meanwhile, Bush earned his MBA from Harvard.

Yet, the American people would never know this from the way Gore and Bush are portrayed: Gore as the brightest guy in the class, the one most likely to succeed; Bush as the dunce, the Texas rube a couple of tacos short of a combination plate.

Bush, much to his credit, doesn't let the condescension bother him. He's been underestimated throughout his political career — by political opponents like Ann Richards and Al Gore, and by the media — and he's always exceeded expectations.

That's because Bush is comfortable in his own skin. He doesn't have to compensate for his college record by cultivating a political image as some sort of policy wonk. He doesn't have to pretend he invented the Internet.

The president-elect addressed questions about his smarts in an interview with Time magazine, which selected him as its "Person of the Year."

"I think there's a difference between people who are intellectually curious and people who are intellectually haughty," said Bush. "I appreciate people who are intellectually curious, who want to learn and know more. I am turned off by people who think they're smarter than everybody else." So take that, Will Ferrell.

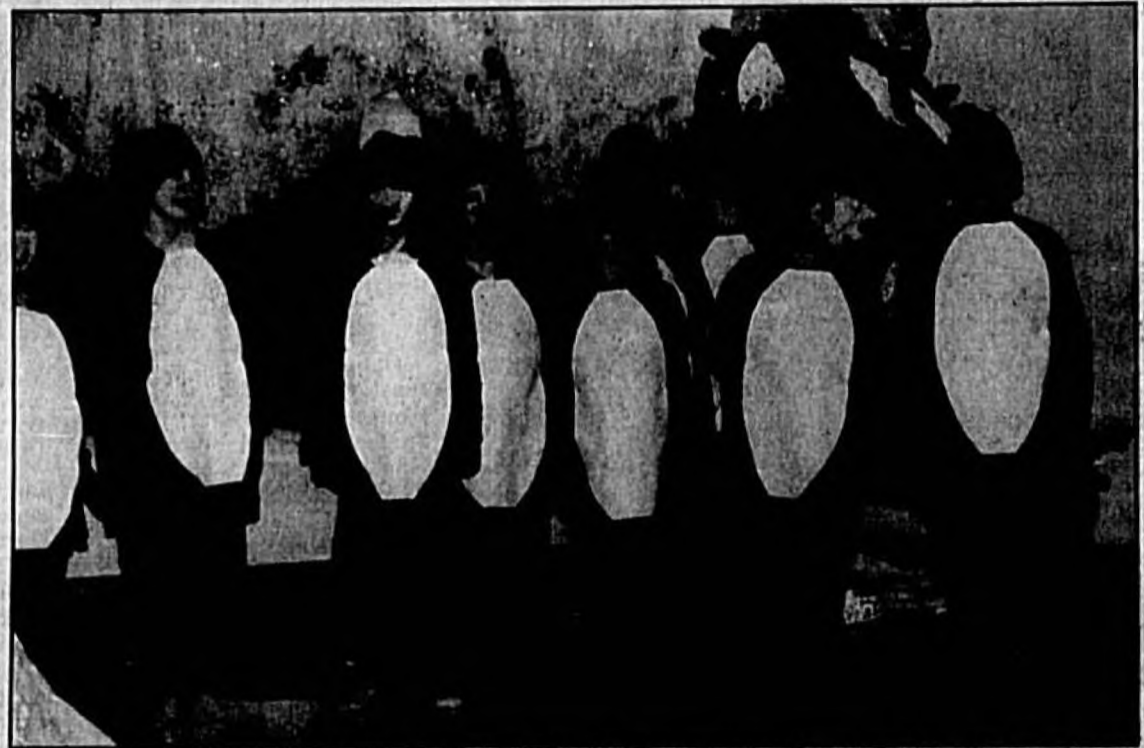

he was aware of the mail out and McCarty's effort.

"It's something we'll talk about. It's a little early at this point because there have been no meetings on the issue. Mary is putting her money where her mouth is," Steling said.

Seminole County's Republican leader, also the vice-chair of the State

Republican party, said he shares the sentiments of McCarty and many other Republicans.

"I'm very upset and so are a lot of other people, both Republicans and Democrats," said Steling.

"The Florida Supreme Court's actions and rulings following the Nov. 7 election were a direct affront to the legislative and judicial branches of gov-

ernment."

McCarty said some within the Republican party have suggested an immediate recall of some of the Justices.

"I think such an extreme action is inappropriate. Our system provides an opportunity to address the question of these Judge's retention at the poles."

The mail-out, "Emergency Florida State Supreme Court

Project," asks donors to contribute in amounts from \$15 to \$1,000. No organized effort to defeat a sitting Supreme Court Justice has ever been organized according to the mail piece. Money collected through the effort will be used to launch grass-roots efforts around the state, telephone banks, postage, and for the purchase of radio and television advertising.

the bench in 2002. Republican Palm Beach County Commissioner Mary McCarty is mounting a mass mail-out to some 350,000 Republican donors, looking to build a war chest for an advertising assault in two years.

"I think that move is totally irresponsible," Poe said.

"We depend upon impartiali-

ty in the judiciary. Neither party should get involved in the politicization of judicial races."

Taking his response a step further Poe added, "As much as Democrats were upset with the way the U.S. Supreme Court ruled we would not get involved in trying to develop provisions to have justices recalled."

Poe said party faithful will be working hard to go after seats in the State House and Senate in two years and see Gov. Jeb Bush as a viable target in 2002.

"Jeb is easily the focal point in the next race," Poe confirmed. "Remember, the last two Republican governors have been one-term governors."

Asked about president elect Bush's early cabinet picks

announced this week, Poe responded, "It's not so much who he picks but the policies those people will be asked to advance."

"It will be interesting to see the early stages of his presidency. His cabinet people will fall in line with what the president wants to promote. We'll have to wait before we make our judgments."

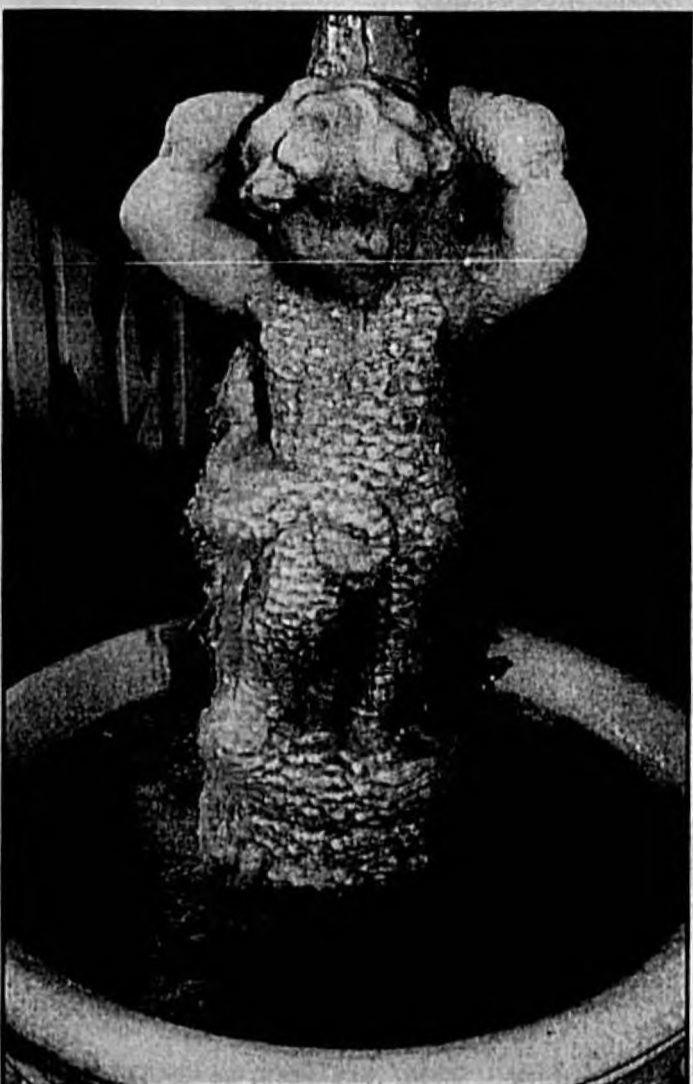

cy and rehabilitation services working with the Florida Department of Children and Families, the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice and a number of federal agencies. Over the last decade the center has been the only provider of publicly-funded adolescent residential treatment in all of Central Florida.

"It's a pretty substantial grant and we're just pleased it was approved," Mica said. "The funds should be available in mid-January."

Larry Visser, president of the Grove, said Mica has been instrumental in advocating the treatment facility's interests.

"Congressman Mica has a real interest in drug treatment programs in the Central Florida area," said Visser.

"He came to us about nine or 10 months ago, toured our facility and we sat down and put some ideas together on how to expand our services and improve on the effectiveness of the program."

"So many times when you go to a government agency for funding it becomes a very long and competitive situation. He really carried the ball for us."

Visser said the facility is hoping to use a portion of the funding to implement more gender-specific treatment programs for boys and girls.

"Adolescents involved with drugs are dealing with a lot of issues. Often girls have a different set of issues to deal with than boys. We are planning to design treatment programs that more specifically address the gender differences in the overall approach to treatment."

Rogers announces in District 1

SANFORD — Add a fourth hat into Sanford's upcoming District 1 City Commission race.

Fred Rogers, a six-year resident of Sanford has formally announced he will seek the seat being vacated by Brady Lessard, a mayoral candidate in the March 2001 race.

Rogers, who runs the Martin House Bed and Breakfast, said District 1 has a number of issues that need to be addressed.

"District 1 is a very viable part of the city," said Rogers.

"I would like to work on better communication between the various neighborhoods in the district and reach out to work with some of the low income and elderly on helping them secure funding for renovations and repairs to their neighborhoods."

Rogers said he would also focus on development and growth along Sanford Avenue's business sector, improve Historic District street lighting and signage, and keeping tax

millage rates down.

Among his other areas of concern are to continue development of a police substation in the downtown area and developing zero tolerance policies on crime and drugs.

"There are a lot of issues that start to get attention and then don't get the necessary follow through," Rogers said. "We need to take things to completion. I've thought a lot about running and I've been approached by a number of people. It's not a decision I made overnight."

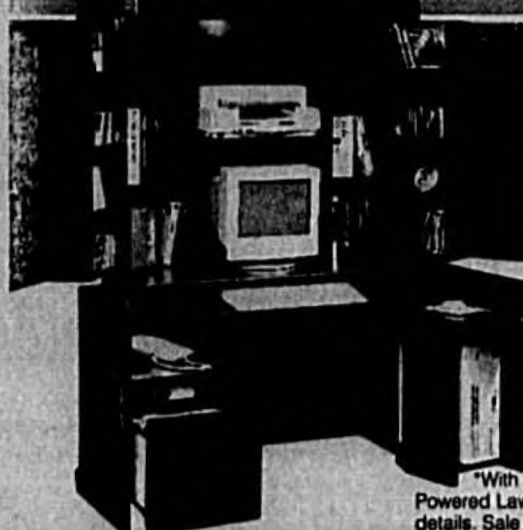

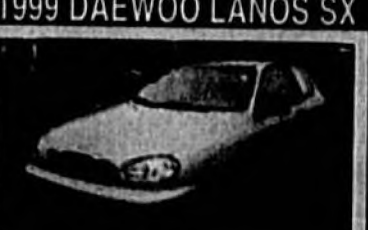

FWC holds meeting in Tallahassee

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) recently wrapped up a three-day meeting in Tallahassee after taking a good look at the status of bears and manatees and changing some fishing regulations.

FWC staff presented a comprehensive assessment of the status of black bears and management

programs for the species. The staff report served to update the Commissioners and the public concerning the black bear population. Staff did not propose reopening Florida to bear hunting, and no such proposal is under consideration by the agency.

Staff also delivered a report concerning the recent manatee summit, assembled by the Governor's Office, and Commissioners voted to delegate authority to the FWC's executive director to approve local manatee speed zone ordinances and protection plans.

The Commission also reviewed projects to be recommended for funding with revenue from the sale of Conserve Wildlife license plates. Commissioners approved recommendations for an equipment purchase for the agency's magazine, Florida Wildlife, and funding for black bear research.

In addition, Commissioners approved realignment of the FWC's administrative regions to improve efficiency and effectiveness and to take into account the fact that the agency's jurisdiction has expanded to include marine resources.

Concerning peregrine falcons, the Commission approved a staff request to postpone the second phase of the process to remove the species from the endangered species list.

The delay is the result of negotiations, still in progress, between United States and Canadian federal governments. Peregrine falcon recovery efforts have been highly successful in the U.S., to the point that the species no longer is in danger of extinction.

However, state and federal laws and international treaties protecting the birds will remain in force once peregrine falcons are removed from the endangered species list.

The Commission repealed a rule that established state parks as wildlife refuges. The parks rule no longer is necessary since the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) now has authority to restrict or prohibit taking of wildlife on park lands. Previously, DEP relied on the Commission to pass such rules.

The FWC's executive director and Commissioners selected artwork for the 2001-2002 Florida waterfowl and wild turkey stamps. Winning artists in the selection were Mark Anderson of Sioux Falls, S.D., who submitted a painting of an eastern gobbler and hens in the turkey stamp division, and John Nelson Harris of Groveland.

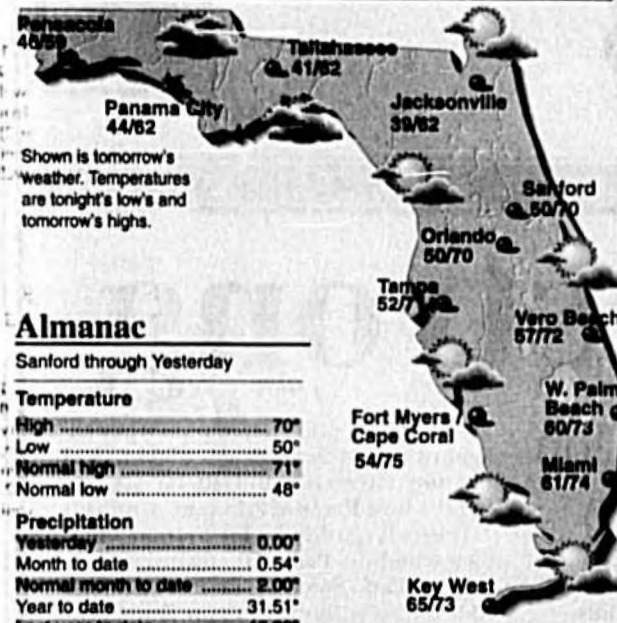

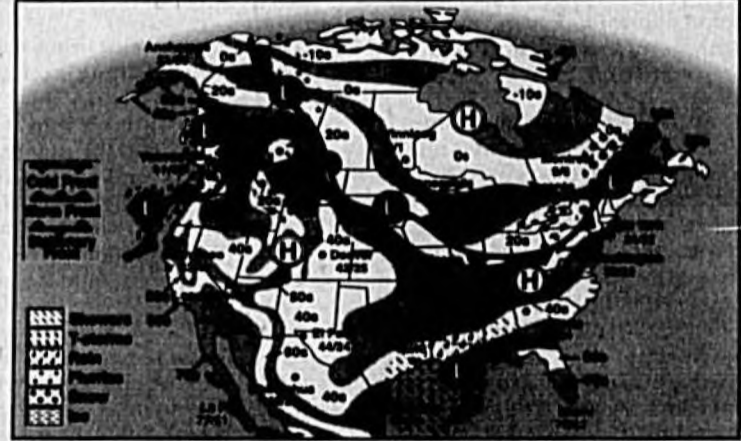

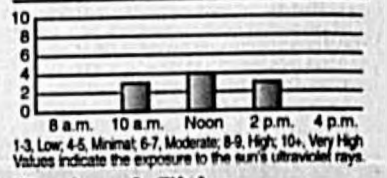

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Think big if your goal is to catch a "wall hanger" bass. Nothing beats a large wild shiner this time of year. Lunker bass prefer one large meal over many small snacks.

FISHING FORECAST

Sebastian Inlet has good action with huge flounder. Anglers bouncing finger mullet across the bottom are catching flounder to over 10 pounds. Snook are a little slow, and anglers are connecting with a few redfish and trout. Finger mullet and large live shrimp are

the best baits.

River action is hot. Look for bass in the deep bends, steep banks, sand bars, and under mats of water hyacinths. Remember that river bass tend to hold in such spots, so take your time when you catch a bass, for more than one will be in the immediate vicinity. Bream, catfish and speckled perch are also hitting. Captain Jack reports that offshore has been slow due to high seas. Flounder and sheepshead are biting inside the Port, while trout and redfish are slow in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Big winter sheepshead are the main attraction at Ponce Inlet. Sheepshead to over eight pounds are hitting live shrimp and fiddler crabs. The hole at the tip of the north jetties is the real hot spot. Also expect drum, bluefish, redfish, and a few jack crevalle. Trout and redfish are rated as fair in Mosquito Lagoon.

Disney and Latin Fantasies

"Fantasia 2000"

Those adults who saw "Fantasia" as children probably have indelible memories of dancing hippos and marching broomsticks. Inspired, no doubt, by the cult appeal of the original, "Fantasia 2000," which was released in theaters last year, is now available on video.

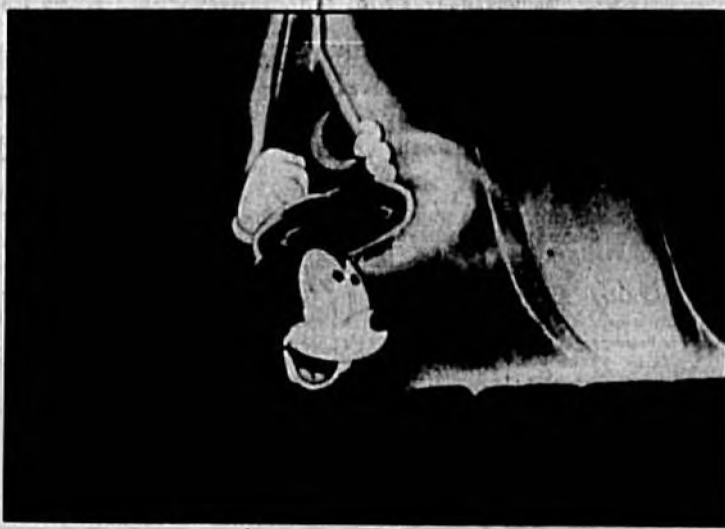
Rabid devotees may cry "Foul!" about this sequel, which shares the inclusion of "The Sorcerer's Apprentice" with the original. (In the sequence, Mickey stars as the apprentice, who unleashes the power of the wizard's hat when his master is not around.) It's still by far the most dramatic, lucid sequence, with captivating animation, endlessly exciting music by Paul Dukas, and a direct link to kids' deepest fears about the desire for power and the fears of the consequences.

One of the most successful original episodes features a breathtaking (if New Age-y) sequence of whales cavorting and

eventually breaking through the surface of the water, with music by Ottorino Respighi. A much-discussed installment offers Hirschfeld-like drawings that capture the lives of several people that eventually intersect on a Manhattan day, set to George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue." An overscheduled child, a construction worker who longs to be a jazz musician, and a man whose wife gives new meaning to the term "shopaholic" are some of the caricatures (or are they?) of New York personalities.

Other sequences include a rather frightening adaptation of Hans Christian Andersen's "The Steadfast Tin Soldier," with music by Dmitri Shostakovich, while "Tomp and Circumstance" sets the backdrop for a take on "Noah's Ark," with Donald Duck as a rather confused helper.

The sequences don't work as seamlessly as they might, and viewers may wonder at the selections of music and storyline. But it still offers kids a chance to watch wordless, imaginative blends of



music and animation. As Toby, 7, explained about the video, "It lets you think of the words yourself. It should be famous."

Rating Scale: 1-10 (10 is the highest)
Appropriateness: 6 - Some of the segments are definitely scary and seem targeted to older children.

Visuals: 7 - Each installment has a distinctive look, and the widely varying animation is one of the pleasures of the film.

"Taina"
Nickelodeon; Sunday
In another instance of TV sitcoms finally catching up to the real world, this new creation on Nickelodeon features the travails of a 15-year-old Puerto Rican girl

trying to make her mark at a performing arts high school, while also contending with her very traditional family. It's great to see a Latina teenager and some of the conflicts that arise between school and family, the Old World culture and the new. However, much of the series, which has a distinctly "Fame"-like feel, needs to establish more of a feel for what's real and what's not. (It's hard to believe, for example, that anyone would actually choose to do a monologue from a Jennifer Lopez movie for an audition piece.) Kelly, 13, who's an aspiring performer herself, gave high marks to the show. "I liked the fact that a teenage Hispanic girl is the leading character in a show, and that the actress looks Hispanic," she explained. However, as she objected, "The family didn't seem very real to me. I couldn't determine who that man in the dark clothes was. Was he an older brother? The father? A visitor?"

Fun Factor: 6 - The plots tend toward the fluffy (so far) and viewers will enjoy the performing.

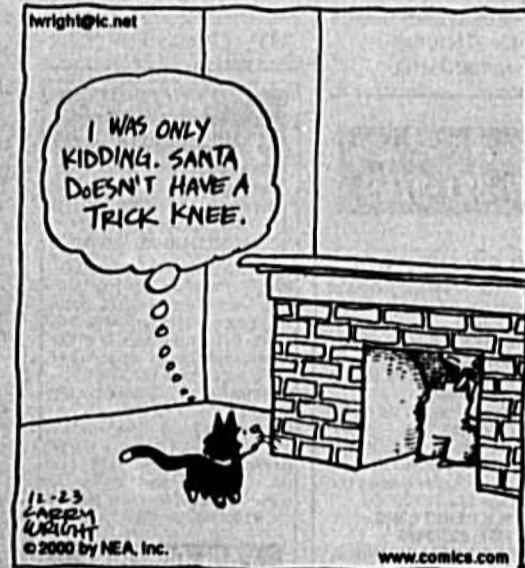
