

## Sanford lays off 17 employees

### Commissioner Woodruff 'not convinced' city has budget problem

Sanford commissioners voted 4-1 Monday night to eliminate 17 city jobs in order to balance next year's budget.

The lay off, which saw 14 city employees and three vacant positions eliminated, was effective as of 5 p.m. Tuesday.

This decision comes after weeks of planning by the city's finance director, Kevin L. Smith, and the interim city manager, Andrew Van Gaale, to overcome a \$1.65 mil-

lion deficit in the 2003-2004 city budget.

"I don't like doing this in such a public manner," said Commissioner Randy Jones. "To me this is the hardest thing to do. There are faces with these job titles."

It was announced earlier this month that the city would be looking at a \$1.4 million

deficit, which did not include \$700,000 in improvement requests from the fire and police departments, parks and recreation and others.

According to Smith, the only improvement request granted in the preliminary budget was \$250,000 for necessary capital

equipment within the city's fire department, bringing the total overage to \$1.65 million.

"I have problems with doing this," said Commissioner Art Woodruff, who voted against the lay off. "I'm not convinced we have a budget problem that requires this type of action. To put this as a reduction in force due to budget issues is not an honest statement."

However, according to Smith, the budget problem was to the point that if the jobs

## Motorists: Expect delays on SR 434

OVIEDO — Residents and business owners along SR 434 should expect delays as crews work for the next couple of weeks to install drainage and utility pipes between Alafaya Woods and Alexandria Boulevard, and from Chapman Road to Lake Hayes. Some access is to be maintained during business hours.

The pipe work will include closing the SR 434 entrance to the Alafaya Square Shopping Center, but access will remain via the adjacent side streets. Motorists should be aware that work to remove an old Seminole County

water main also might affect driveways or side streets. Bad weather or unforeseen circumstances may delay or prolong construction activities.

The contractor, Southland Construction Inc., continues to grade for, and install, curb and sidewalk along the newly widened southbound lanes. Crews continue mixing stabilizer into the new road base. Within the next couple of weeks crews are scheduled to install limerock in the road base and adjacent driveways. Weather permitting, and barring any unforeseen conflicts, the contractor hopes to shift traffic onto the newly widened southbound lanes by early fall.

## Higgins House pampers guests in peaceful setting

SANFORD — Imagine hosting your next party in a beautiful Victorian bed and breakfast located in a quaint historic town. Then imagine not having to plan or prepare anything.

This dream is reality at the Higgins House in the Sanford Historic District, owned and operated by Ron and Phyllis Lloyd.

The Higgins House was built in 1894 for James C. Higgins, the superintendent of the Railroad of Sanford. The two-story Victorian house has since been completely restored. Its structural features include cross gables, patterned wood shingles, bay

windows, turned posts, spindle work, an upstairs veranda, and a widow's walk.

"In the summer," said Ron Lloyd, "my favorite parts are the patio and garden areas with a cold glass of iced tea."

The Higgins House and other restored houses along the Sanford Historic Trusts' Walking/Driving Tour illustrate the rich riverfront community that began in the 1870s.

For a period of relaxation, guests can visit the butterfly gardens complete with a fountain, the pub room complete with a television, or the parlor complete with an upright piano. A stroll to see Ma. Higgins' Country

## PAL summer camp teaches kids life skills

What started out as a spring break program at Midway Elementary School five years ago has turned into one of the largest and most-effective summer day camps in North Seminole County.

The North Seminole County Student Police Academy, based at Sanford's Trinity Christian School on 22nd Street, has nearly 75 campers ages 8-16 who are learning everything from good sportsmanship to self-confi-

dence.

The camp, operated by the Police Athletic League and the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, focuses on five basic life skills principles: decision-making, team work, crime consequences, problem-solving and confidence building. Don't think for one minute it's all work and no play; quite the contrary. Campers are learning these vital skills while playing basketball, swimming, bowling and skating. It's a fun, safe environment

### Police search for killer

LONGWOOD — Police are looking for a white male wanted in connection with an apparent robbery and murder.

The crimes occurred Monday evening at the Citgo Gas Station located at the intersection of West Church Avenue and Parson Brown Way in Longwood. According to police, at about 9:45 p.m. female customer could not get the gasoline pumps to operate and went into the store to see why. The woman found the clerk lying behind the counter with a gunshot wound. Police were notified and determined the clerk was deceased.

Investigators did recover a video surveillance tape that depicts portions of the crime. Early analysis of the tape indicate that a white male of medium build with dark hair, possibly bleached on top, robbed the store. The suspect was wearing a dark long-sleeve shirt and dark

long pants. Police identified the victim as Anthony "Tony" Cruz Francis, 31, of Orlando.

However, he should not declare paternity for a child that is not his. It's unfair to the child — and lets the biological father off the hook.

**DEAR ABBY:** I am a 19-year-old girl and have a problem with my parents. When I was younger, I could talk to them about anything and everything. They respected my decisions and supported me whenever they could — until I reached junior high.

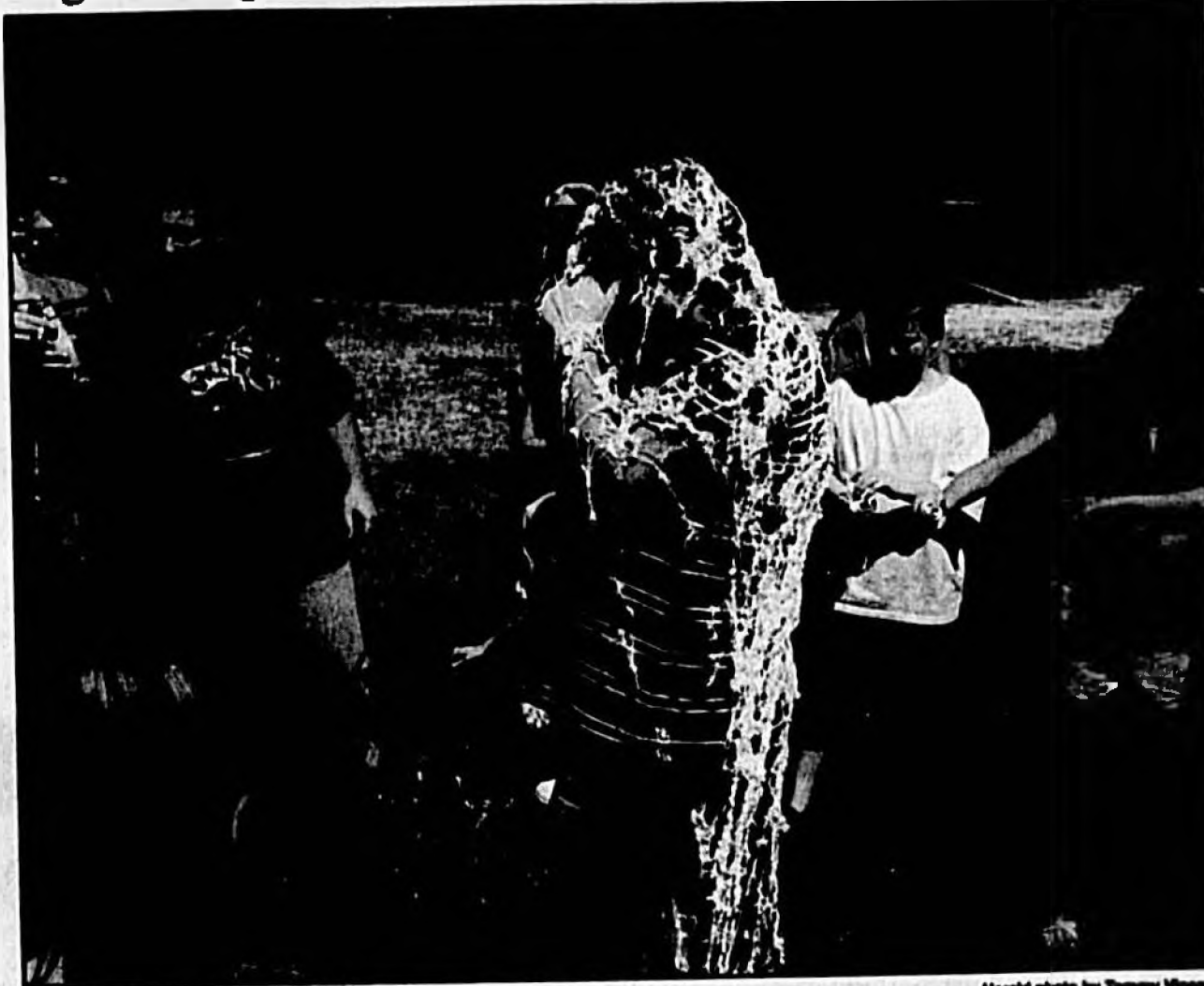

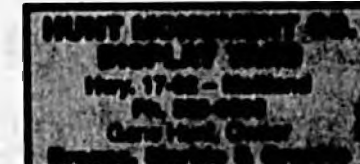

for the children who are supervised by four to eight law-enforcement officers, five school board employees and eight youth volunteers.

"Our goal is in line with the state and national goal, and that is that no child is left behind," said Deputy Stu Walthers who initiated the program while serving as school resource officer at Midway. "We teach kids to have self-confidence and believe that they can do anything they set their minds to. Anytime you can strengthen a child's confidence level, you'll have a more successful and well-rounded child."

Parents drop off their children in the morning to join other students in activities that teach the children respect for others and themselves. They go swimming on Monday, Wednesday and Friday; skating on Tuesday, and bowling on Thursday. Morning

hours are spent learning sports skills and "how to be nice to others," according to one camper.

"They're teaching us to give people a second chance and be friends with everyone regardless of what race or culture they are. God wants us everybody to be friends," Holly Arrigall-Watkins said.

Good sportsmanship is stressed in all the activities. The bowling league is one of the biggest hits this summer, next to the swimming activities. And they all are geared toward improved social behavior.

"We're learning about honesty, having good manners, and being good in school, and trying not to get in fights and go to jail," said 11-year-old MacKenzie Humes. "And we're learning to respect your elders."

They are also learning to view law enforcement officers in a different light.

"The teachers are real nice," said Jarrod Anderson, 11, as a took a break from swimming at Seminole High's Larry Dale Aquatic Center. "They teach you how to play basketball better and how to swim. I like it because they teach you new stuff every day."

The interaction with law enforcement officers gives the youth a positive perspective, said camp law enforcement staff Deputy Don Wheeler.

"These kids see us in a whole different role," Wheeler said. "We aren't the bad guys. At an early age, these kids see that law enforcement is really on their side."

John Tipton, 12, already knows law enforcement is on his side. His father (Carl) is the school resource officer and an assistant football coach at Lake Mary High School, as well as one of the camp instructors. Although his father is

a great role model and teaches him what's right, John said he's an average pre-teen who needs encouragement sometimes from an outside person.

"People think just because your dad is a cop, you don't do things wrong. I do things wrong sometimes, too," John said. "So the program is really teaching us to think about the consequences of our behavior. We're learning about the different types of gangs and how they recruit you by offering to put you in college, enroll you in the military and learn tactics that will help them."

Gang activity is not a major problem in Seminole County, Walthers said, however he acknowledged some groups of "wannabe" gangs whom the sheriff monitors very closely.

"The reason why you don't hear much about gang activity in Seminole County is because we have a good education program in the middle schools and excellent support from Sheriff Don Eslinger, who has a zero-tolerance policy on gangs in Seminole County," Walthers said.

One long-term goal of the Police Athletic League, a non-profit 501-C3 organization under the direction of Sgt. Dwayne Johnson, is to develop into a full-scale sports complex with a gymnasium, pool, and sports field. In addition, the complex will be housed with computer labs, learning centers and tutorial services, Walthers said.

By Tuesday morning, word of Francis' death had spread to many of the regular customers of the store. Many left flowers or tributes.

"To someone I only knew by a first name, to someone I could call a friend," wrote a member of the Lubinskas family in a tribute left at the scene. "Tony was someone who would always greet you with a smile, knew everyone by their first name, had a vibrant personality, and was always there. Be a quarter short, he never complained, would laugh with you, would show that he really cared when you shared with him."

"Someone who you never knew well, but well enough to see that he mattered in this world, that he was someone special to all of us," the Lubinskas tribute continued. "He had a job, but just didn't do that job, he make all of us feel like his friends. He made all of us feel special by just saying our first names when we walked through that door. ... May God make a special place for you in the heavens. May God bless you with all of His graces. You will be missed by many, and always remembered ... just for being you."

were not eliminated they would have been paid for by the reserve funds, an idea the mayor and Commission were not willing to entertain.

"In my opinion that's the bad math that got us to this point," said Mayor Brady Lessard. "At some point you have to make the tough decisions."

The elimination of the 17 jobs from the city payroll will free up \$800,000 in general funds.

"These are reoccurring, escalating costs which is part of the reason we had to do this as opposed to a one-time cut," said Van Gaale. "It was a very difficult decision and the effected employees handled it with grace and dignity."

According to Smith, after mak-

ing this and other cuts, the city is prepared to meet the July 1 deadline by presenting Commission with the preliminary budget, which will still include \$700,000 allocated from the reserve fund.

"This move is the last resort in balancing the budget," said Van Gaale. "We kept every department to the minimum to operate efficiently."

Jobs that were eliminated include, a land development manager, a community development project manager, an engineering technician, a deputy building official, a deputy public works director, a trades worker, three secretaries and one contract secretary, a project manager/parks/grounds operations landscape architect, a museum assistant, a grounds

maintenance supervisor, a battalion chief, an office assistant, a human resources analyst and a receptionist.

One position not on the list that led to discussion during Monday's commission meeting was that of the deputy city manager, left vacant after Roger Dixon's resignation earlier this month.

"I believe the new city manager should have the opportunity to look at whether or not to fill the position of deputy city manager," said Woodruff. "Although, I don't expect him to be handling off duties right away - he needs to be doing the entire job for the first year."

Department leads have ensured Commission that the reduction of

employees will not adversely affect the quality of work.

"They (the people being laid off) were essentially determined in a manner that would continue our service level and not disrupt city functions," said Van Gaale.

According to Van Gaale, the city will pay the 14 employees a three-month severance package, keeping them on payroll through Sept. 30. The group will also receive accrued vacation and sick time, and will be placed on a 24-month priority list to be rehired by the city in other capacities, if possible.

The city will also offer the former employees a counseling service, including how to apply for unemployment and COBRA insurance.

Elizabeth Bullard of Bartow, turns 100 on June 28, 2003.

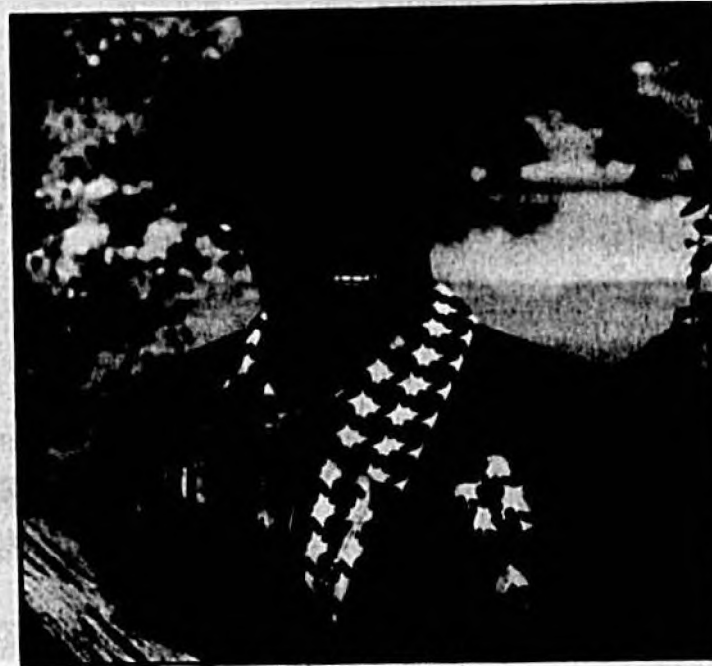

### Cubs trade Bellhorn to Colorado

Oviedo's Mark Bellhorn, who last year set a Chicago Cubs record for homers by a switch-hitter but fizzled this year, was traded to the Colorado Rockies for infielder Jose Hernandez on Thursday.

Bellhorn, 28, had one of the top seasons in Cubs history for a switch-hitter in

2002, batting .258 with 27 homers and 56 RBI. He was anointed the starting third baseman this year never got into the same groove, hitting just .209, and lost his starting job after 39 games. He appeared in 55 games for the Cubs with two home runs and 22 RBI, but had been in only six games this month, batting .167.

The Rockies, however, will not be handing their third base job to Bellhorn. Chris Stynes, who struggled playing third for the Cubs last season but has been solid with Colorado this season, has the job. But Bellhorn gives the Rockies depth, potential for power and a player much younger than Hernandez, 33.

Bellhorn appeared in four seasons with Oakland before joining the Cubs.

"You look at the numbers he put up last year — he was a guy we asked about over the winter, and there was no way

we could get him," said Rockies manager Clint Hurdle, another Floridian from Merritt Island who said the Cubs pursued the trade over the past several weeks. "That goes to show you how the winds change in baseball."

The Rockies wasted little time in getting Bellhorn into the lineup, making him their starting second baseman, a position much more familiar to the ex-Oviedo Lion.

And the change has already done wonders for Bellhorn, who went 2-for-3 and scored a run in his first game and is 4-for-12, a .333 average, with four runs scored in four games.

Now in his seventh big league career, Bellhorn, who played college ball at Auburn University, has appeared in 327 games and has hit .231 (212-for-919) with 42 doubles, eight triples, 36 home runs, 102 RBI and 150 runs scored.


