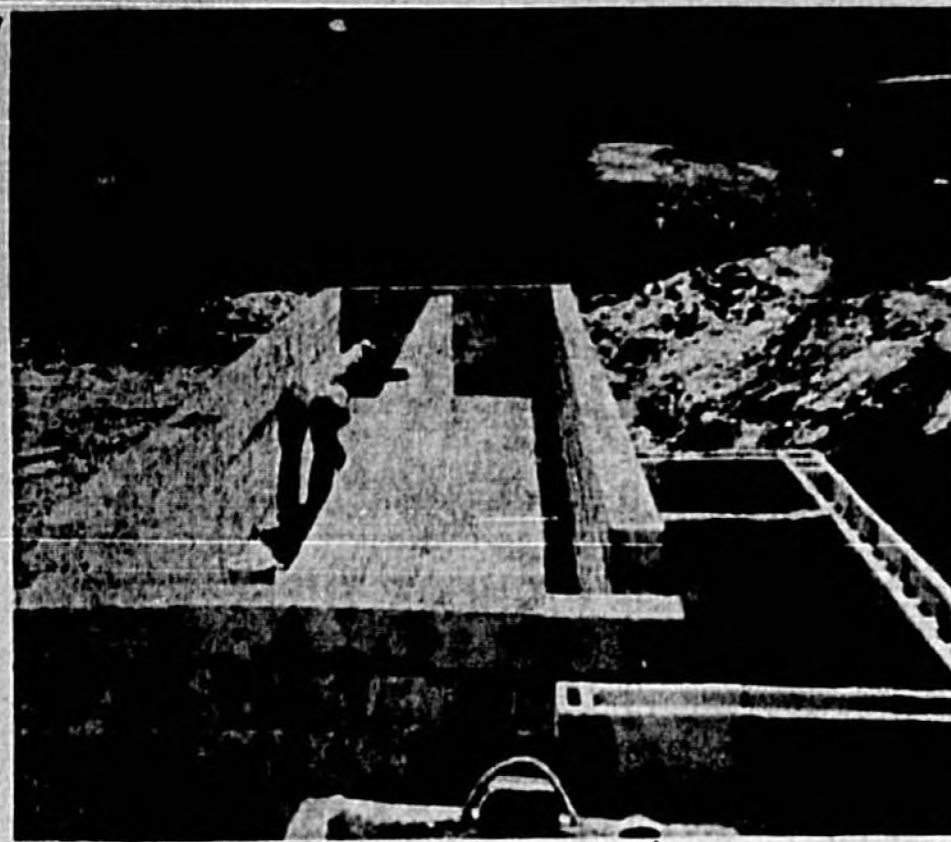

Legislators By - Passsd \$150 Million Saving

Rep. Jan Fortune Says Bill Ignored

Seminole County's first Republican office holder, Rep. Jan Fortune, reported his experiences in the legislature at a meeting of the Seminole County Young Republican Club at the Howell Park Civic Center. He answered questions from the group concerning bills passed.

Due to his experience as a cost reduction and analysis expert, he was interested in cutting down waste and saving the taxpayer money.

He presented his ideas to Gov. Farris Bryant and consequently wrote and introduced a bill in the House which, he says, could save the state \$150 million.

Unfortunately the bill was not put on the calendar until late in the session and did not receive due consideration.

Fortune voted against tax increases and the bond issue because he felt that 10 to 20 per cent waste should be trimmed from the budget making these measures unnecessary.

Much interest was shown by the group in the 875 million bond issue which will be voted on by the people in November along with a proposal to change the election for governor to off-presidential years.

Fortune stated that much of the opposition to the bond issue was not opposition to higher education but to bonded indebtedness, which is unconstitutional, and to the waste included in the proposal.

Contrary to the mistaken ideas given by the press that the bond issue will guarantee construction of a four-year university in East Central Florida, Fortune stated that no provision for construction funds is made, only \$200 thousand for study and analysis, survey of sites, etc.

One million dollars is set aside for an extension of the University of Florida engineering school and the remainder goes to established universities and junior colleges throughout the state.

Fortune served on the claims, pensions, and atomic committees and sat in with the appropriations and finance and tax committees.

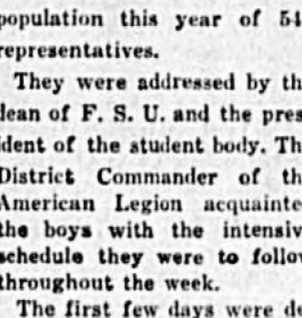

Telephone Building Is Dynamited

Bombing First Such Violence During Strike

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) — A General Telephone Company office building north of here was dynamited early today as talks continued in an effort to halt the bitter and sometimes violent strike.

Today's blast was caused by a bomb planted near the corner of the building. A guard, Harold Widner, 46, was in the building at the time but was not injured.

It was the first reported bombing attempt in the nine-day-old strike which has resulted in continued cable cuttings, damage to other company property and beating of two company employees repairing cables.

A company spokesman said the blast this morning left a four or five foot hole in the ground, and cracked the wall of the building. But he said the blast did not leave a hole in the wall although the bricks were loosened and a person could see through the spaces.

The company said the bomb was identified by air force demolition men as being dynamite and said it apparently had been planted with the intent of blowing up a cable and at the same time damaging equipment in the building.

There was no apparent cable or equipment damage and service was not interrupted.

Meanwhile federal mediator John I. Kenney met this morning with union leaders and planned to meet later with company officials.

Striking electrical workers continued to push for arbitration of the eight-day-old strike. But the company has rejected any suggestion of arbitration.



Father, Uncle Have Close Call As Boy Drowns Here

Eleven-year-old Dennis Ray Brigner, of Wilmington, Ohio, visiting with relatives at Geneva, drowned in Lake Harney late Thursday when he stepped into a deep dredge hole while wading and fishing with his father and an uncle.

The Sheriff's office reported that the two men and the boy were wading about 100 yards out from the west shore of Lake Harney when the boy suddenly disappeared beneath the water.

His father, Carl Brigner went after the boy, but he also began to flounder and the uncle Tom Kinard went out to help the father. Kinard too began to flounder in the deep water of the dredge hole which Sheriff J. L. Hobby said was at least 30 feet deep.

An elderly Negro man, Evans Bacon, who was fishing nearby then ran out to the aid of the two men, extending his fishing pole to them. They were able to grasp the pole, while Bacon pulled them back to safety.

Governors Face Rights Protest

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Despite efforts to prevent it, a civil rights storm is building over the four-day National Governors Conference which opens here Sunday.

Albert Moore, president of the Miami chapter of the Congress of Racial Equality, announced Thursday the group planned to begin demonstrations at the convention site Sunday.

Moore said the demonstrations would be small, "but large enough to let the governors know how we feel about our civil rights."

Two main targets will probably be segregationist Govs. George Wallace of Alabama and Orval Faubus of Arkansas.

Wallace and Faubus have indicated they intend to oppose a proposal by New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller to have the conference adopt a program of equal rights for all, regardless of race or color, in private and public businesses. (Other stories on pages 3 and 12.)

Rail Fact Panel Reports Findings

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A special fact-finding committee headed by President Kennedy's 12-page report today on its week-long investigation of the railroad rules dispute.

Informed sources said the report showed union and management representatives were still far apart in the four-year old controversy that could lead to a nationwide rail strike on July 29.

Panel members declined to comment on the report or their discussion with Kennedy.

Meanwhile, one source said private efforts by panel members resulted in some new concessions by the unions. It was not immediately known how the railroads would react to this development. There were no details of the changes.

Buddhists Reject Peace Overture

SAIGON (UPI) — Buddhist leaders today rejected a peace overture from President Ngo Dinh Diem until his regime takes positive steps for an amicable settlement of this country's religious crisis.

The rejection was contained in a letter drawn up by the Buddhist Inter-Sect Committee in response to Diem's personal broadcast Thursday night announcing orders aimed at "eliminating any suspicion" and asking for unity against the Communists.

The government followed up the broadcast today by inviting Buddhist leaders to meet with an inter-ministerial committee. But the Buddhist leaders said they did not want to enter the talks until they have received further assurances of the government's intentions.

This Is Where Our Money Goes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John J. Williams, (R-Ind.), reports the Health, Education and Welfare Department has approved the following three research grants:

- \$46,731 to study the "regulation of development of the mouse egg."
- \$9,740 to study the "physiological adaptation in the Mexican free-tailed bat."
- \$4,120 to promote the study of the "effects of frustration on a reflex response."

West Taking Calculated Risk With Test Ban

LONDON (UPI) — The United States and Britain will be taking a calculated risk in agreeing to a nuclear weapons test ban with the Soviet Union which leaves Red China free to test as she pleases.

Any test ban agreement now under negotiation with the Soviets in Moscow will not be binding on either power. There is no reason to assume that either Red China, or for that matter, France, will accede to any treaty.

But the United States and Britain want at least to make sure the Soviet Union will not pass on nuclear weapons know-how to Red China or use Red China as a veiled testing ground while the West lives up to its commitment.

The Allies, in turn will refrain from assisting France in nuclear testing.

The Anglo-American test ban draft treaty on banning explosions in the atmosphere, under water and on the ground, now under consideration in the Moscow talks specifically suggests such a safety clause.

The Western draft treaty proposes an undertaking by the three big nuclear powers to "refrain from causing, encouraging, or in any way participating in the carrying out of any nuclear weapons test explosion anywhere."

AF Launches Two Secret Satellites

POINT ARGUELLO, Calif. (UPI) — Two secret satellites were launched by the Air Force Thursday, one of which provided a spectacular display shortly after dark that was visible in much of Southern California.

Police and sheriff's telephone switchboards were deluged with calls in cities and communities as far as 250 miles away.

The huge luminous tear-drop-shaped glow was caused by an Atlas rocket carrying an Agena space vehicle, but in keeping with its policy of secrecy, the Air Force refused to say even if the launch was a success.

A few hours earlier, the Air Force announced it had launched a satellite employing a Thor-Agena booster combination from adjacent Vandenberg Air Force Base.

This combination was used in the past to launch the Discoverer series — workhorses the Air Force used to gather vital information on radiation and recovery techniques.

Commission To Fix Game Laws

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Game and Fish Commission will set Florida hunting and fishing regulations for 1963-64 at a session in the State Capitol July 26. The meeting will be held at 9 a. m. in Senate Committee room 31.

The commission has conducted 21 public hearings throughout the state on the proposed rules and regulations. The results of these hearings will be presented to the session at which time the final rules are set.

Special Citrus Meeting Monday

LAKELAND (UPI) — The Florida Citrus Commission will hold a special session Monday to begin laying the groundwork for advertising and merchandizing of fruit during the coming season.

Shelley Sociable, But Not Her Stomach

NEW YORK (UPI) — Actress Shelley Winters just isn't used to so "much caviar, smoked salmon, sturgeon, chicken Kiev, vodka and wine."

That, she explained Thursday, was why she had to have her stomach pumped out in Moscow.

"The Russians drank toasts endlessly. They even drink a toast when you leave a room," she said on her return to the United States.

"I wanted to be sociable, but I'm no drinker."

Miss Winters, attending a film festival in the Soviet capital, said she became ill Wednesday morning in her hotel room.

"I called a maid and in no time three very handsome Russian doctors walked in and they looked like they were ready to operate," she said. "I got scared and called the American Embassy after the doctors advised me to go to the hospital. The embassy was no help. They said I should go."

But Miss Winters said she stood her ground and the doctors "pumped my stomach out in the hotel room."

Florida To See Partial Eclipse

MIAMI (UPI) — The moon will partially eclipse the sun over Florida Saturday between about 4 and 6 p.m., and scientists and doctors intensified warnings today against direct viewing of the rare phenomenon.

A Miami eye doctor said that if you look directly at the sun while it is partly shaded by the silhouette of the moon as the moon passes it and earth, infrared rays will burn the retina of your eyes "but you won't feel a thing."

Many doctors and other experts warned that the sun should not be viewed during an eclipse in any way, not even through heavily smoked glasses or other such devices.

The moon is due to begin crossing the face of the sun at about 3:53 p.m. Saturday in North Florida, and about 4:15 p.m. in the Keys. The height of the show should come at between 4:55 and 5:08 p.m. depending on location in the state, and it will all be over by about 6 p.m.

In Florida, the moon will cover about half the face of the sun at the height of the eclipse.

For most Americans the eclipse will be partial; the moon will obstruct only part of the sun.

For a few, mostly in Maine, it will be total. The most zealous of these will be astronomers in jet planes and 20 teams of scientific observers perched atop Cadillac Mountain in Maine.

The airborne observers, traveling at nearly twice the speed of sound, will pursue the shadow as it speeds across the face of the globe at 1,750 miles an hour.

They will not catch up to it, but they will be able to see the total eclipse for longer than the 39 seconds it will be visible to teams on the ground.

More important, they will be able to see much of the earth's atmosphere, and thus able to take clear photographs of the rare event and study it with precision.

Bobby Driscoll, 14 year old son of Navy Chief and Mrs. Lewis Driscoll of 203 Laurel Drive in Pinecrest is reported today to be in "good condition" and out of danger.

Bobby was the victim of a shark bite which lacerated his hand and arm while he was swimming at New Smyrna Beach, Monday.

He now can move his fingers and Mrs. Driscoll said that doctors told her Bobby is out of danger and will regain the use of his fingers.

Chief Driscoll is attached to VAH 9 at the Sanford Naval Air Station.

Rocket Fired

WALLOPS ISLAND, Va. (UPI) — The Space Agency fired one more in its series of experimental rockets to the edge of space today. The objective of this one was to measure intensity of light of the stars.

Those executed were identified as Col. Hisham Shabbih, chief of staff of the signal corps, three warrant officers and two sergeants.

The Damascus broadcast said that a military court which found these six guilty is still in session considering other cases of "armed mutiny" and attempted revolution.

When the government tried to relax curfew regulations put into force after Thursday's attempted coup, gunfire immediately broke out in the streets of Damascus. The curfew was reimposed.

Middle Ground

America needs its middle ground. This is where its conflicts are resolved, its debates turned into action.

gan's Gov. George Romney properly observed that we always had our extremist factions, and that at other periods in our history they bulked relatively larger than they do now.

Where such ground does not exist, an effective free society cannot function. For there is then no meeting place for negotiators, for those who would make a consensus by reasonable accommodation of differing views.

We dare not, however, find base for complacency in this. For we live in an age when extremists on many sides shout stridently from well-justified positions. They have not only vocal power but the hard financial substance needed to advance their causes.

When that is impossible, decision can only be had by the process of conquest and surrender, that is, by a dominant (not necessarily majority) group imposing its will on all who disagree with it.

Extremists always are bent on destroying not only their opposite numbers at the other pole, but on capturing, intimidating or otherwise neutralizing all who stand between on the expansive middle ground.

This can, of course, be accomplished by the actual use of force, or the threat of it. It can also be achieved simply by holding within the dominant group all the elements of power a modern society can muster.

Probably, they always succeed in affecting some this way. But sometimes their encroachments are quite broad, until men scanning the field will report "there is no middle ground."

A society that is governed thus is, for all practical purposes, totalitarian. It listens to no dissent, entertains no debate. All matters are considered settled when the dominant group speaks. The extremists are at the helm.

Generally it is in fact still there. It has the look, though, of occupied territory.

Fortunately for us all, the United States is not in this condition. It still has an immense middle ground. Debate flourishes richly in most areas. The rivalry of ideas is encouraged.

That is a dangerous look in any free society. It can lead to weapons being taken up in civil war. Short of that, it can produce a national condition which some call "mental civil war."

Yet from time to time our middle ground stands in somewhat more than ordinary peril from our ever-present extremists at right and left. This could be one of those times.

The smell of such uncompromising conflict hangs over some of our hard political struggles today. It is not a good omen.

Weeks ago in Washington, Michi-

lone, we were told that the middle ground was not a safe place to stand.

Get Facts On Test Ban

The American people urgently need to know more of the official facts and opinions about the proposed ban on nuclear weapons tests.

But why they are opposed and all of the questions thereto related are facts being withheld from the American people.

It is the American people who must make the final judgment whether a test ban on the basis now proposed would be in their interest or against them. They dare not make a mistake.

Perhaps President Kennedy is being too generous in making concessions to the Soviet Union. If so, who has a better right to know about that than the American people?

Several members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff appeared early this year before the Senate Armed Services Committee. More than a fortnight ago, the Joint Chiefs presented to the Senate preparedness subcommittee a report on the proposed test ban treaty. They are against it.

Three Democratic senators, all members of the armed services committees, wrote to President Kennedy earlier this year warning in substance that further test ban concessions would be unacceptable to the U. S. Senate. The text of that letter also is a state secret.

On Page 759 of my college textbook "Psychology Applied" you can read more fully on this matter, so look it up in your local library if you wish.

But please remember vividly that a letter is not intended primarily to win you the job but is just to gain an interview!

Too many young people wander around in tiresome detail and fill several pages with secondary material that should be reserved for answering specific questions after they gain the interview.

If you can learn the actual name of the personnel director or the prospective employer, then address your salutation to him.

In cases like Norman's, however, where you have only a P. O. Box number, start your letter with a "Dear Sir."

Then state in your short opening paragraph that you are looking for a position that offers a future for a person of your qualifications, so you are listing the following data on yourself:

Now indent your letter deeply and in capital letters list these four major headings:

- (1) Experience. Under this, briefly outline two or three of your major jobs. Put the most important one first, and you generally don't need to list the actual date of such employment.

Instead, say, "Assistant Office Manager, Hopkins Syndicate, two years."

(2) Technical Training. Here you include educational background, as high school graduate, diploma from business college, or two years at electronics school, etc., preferably naming the college.

(3) Personal Data. List your height and weight, state of health, single or married, plus the amount of life insurance you carry, for insurance suggests a man with foresight and executive judgment.

If you have already served your required time in the military, state the fact.

If you are middle-aged then skip your age and wait till you get the personal interview to answer such questions.

(4) References. List three or four who have "handles" on their names, such as judge, or president of a bank, or professor or reverend.

For those "handles" will indirectly endorse you even before your references are contacted.

Then sign off briefly. And have your letter typed!

For further crucial advice, send for my booklet on "Vocational Guidance," enclosing a long stamped, return envelope, plus 20 cents. Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—A proposal by Rep. Oliver P. Bolton, R-Ohio, to let U. S. Comptroller General Joseph Campbell and the General Accounting Office which he heads audit the accounts of all House committees and Architect of the Capitol J. George Stewart is something new in Washington.

No one has ever had the courage to suggest that before. But in view of all this year's agitation for congressional reform and reorganization, it has possibilities.

There has been a lot of croaking at Congress this session for loose handling of the taxpayer's money. First it was for little things like spending half a million dollars of the Treasury's foreign funds on expense accounts for overseas junkies. Then it got into big money to finish the \$70 million Third House office building, complete with swimming pool.

A plan to build a two-deck underground garage for the congressmen at a cost of \$8 million has been sidetracked, but it will be back.

It was all this tomfoolery which gave young Bolton his idea for having a closer check of congressional spending. The General Accounting Office is, of course, the watchdog of Congress.

Last year Campbell sent Congress over 800 audits after investigating charges of waste and inefficiency in agencies of the executive branch of government. This resulted in savings of over \$160 million.

Incidentally, this is almost as much as it costs to run Congress — \$140 million for the House and \$28 million for the Senate in the new fiscal year that began July 1. This is an increase of \$22 million over last year.

public accounts of the House of Representatives, as well as all expenditures of the Capitol architect.

The Senate is excluded from this bill because one house of Congress never legislates on the other. But the assumption is that if House accounts are put under General Accounting Office audit, the Senate would follow suit.

"Enactment of this bill," Bolton believes, "would grant to the entire press corps facts which are now held confidential. An open accounting would help re-establish public trust and confidence in Congress."

Bolton also has under study a proposal to establish a congressional Committee on Ethics. It would be patterned after the American Bar Association on Ethics which has done much to raise standards of the legal profession.

On request from this committee, says Campbell, GAO will review how the legislative would operate and its costs.

Preliminary estimates are that an audit of all House committees and Capitol architect's office accounts would require the full-time services of only one or two auditors. The cost would be \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year, plus the cost of printing, public reports, which would be several thousand more.

Bolton's bill would grant to the comptroller general "the right and privilege to audit all

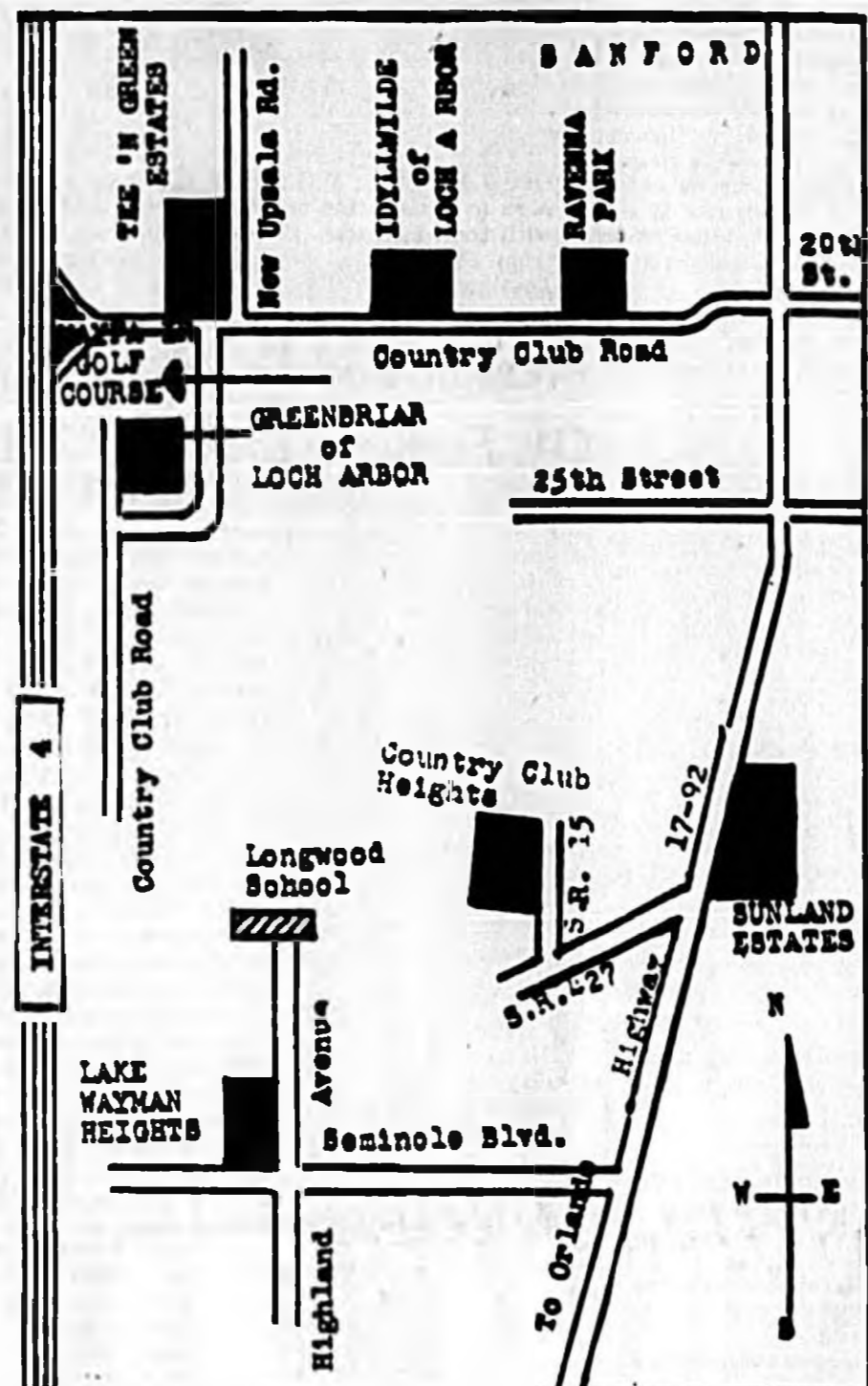

Leaflets Three Just Let It Be

By Myrtle Wilson Home Demonstration Agent

Each year many adults, and many more children, are accidentally infected by poison ivy and poison oak. Yet neither of these plants is difficult to identify, say plant scientists at the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The leaves of these plants always grow in groups of three. The upper surface of leaves is very shiny. The flowers and fruit are in clusters on slender stems that originate at the axis of the leaves. And the fruits usually have a white, waxy appearance.

The form in which the plants grow, however, varies considerably throughout the United States. They may grow as a woody vine attached to a tree; as trailing shrubs, mostly on the ground; or as erect woody shrubs. They may flourish in the deep woods where the soil is moist or in very dry soil on exposed hillsides.

The plants are most frequently abundant along old fence rows and edges of paths and roads, and they ramble over rock walls and climb posts or trees. They often grow with other shrubs or vines so that they are hardly noticeable.

The ability to recognize these plants—wherever and however they grow can save you a lot of discomfort. Previous escape is no proof of immunity.

Accurate Records Needed For Foods

By Myrtle Wilson Home Demonstration Agent

Your food freezer isn't a bank, so don't put foods in and expect to draw interest.

Most foods get no better with age. In fact in most cases, there is bound to be some loss in quality.

But a food freezer is something like a bank in at least one respect. In both cases, you need records. Put what is in a package, along with the date you placed it in the freezer, on the outside of the package.

You also need a written record somewhere that shows your deposits and withdrawals.

It's easy to lose packages of frozen foods in the back or bottom of the freezer. And often the food must be thrown away because it has been stored too long. This makes the freezer a very expensive kitchen item.

A written record shows you what is in the freezer and how long it has been there. So use the record when making out your shopping list. It can help you avoid the mistake of over-buying.

Along with the frozen food record, determine the length of time the different foods can be stored. Then put the date a food should be used in your record.

It's a good idea not to store fresh pork more than six months, other meats more than six months, and fruits and vegetables more than 12 months.

If these items are kept longer, they tend to lose much of their quality.

REMOVE EXCESS LIPSTICK Lipstick is one cosmetic that should be most carefully applied. Never glide it on and run out the door. It should always be allowed to set about 20 minutes, then blotted.

If the excess isn't removed with a tissue, it can easily smear and give your lip-line a ragged appearance or, even more unattractively, rub off onto your teeth.

There's nothing attractive about drinking glasses or linen napkins smeared with lipstick. And no friend cares to be greeted with a red lip print on the cheek.

All this can be avoided by taking the proper care at home when you apply your lipstick. It will last longer and stay on your own lips if you have the patience to let it set, then blot it.

New cocktail clothes feature brilliant, luminous colors—such as cinnamon, emerald and gold. Also gold warp prints, and gold, purple, turquoise and beige brocade dresses are chic for evening wear.

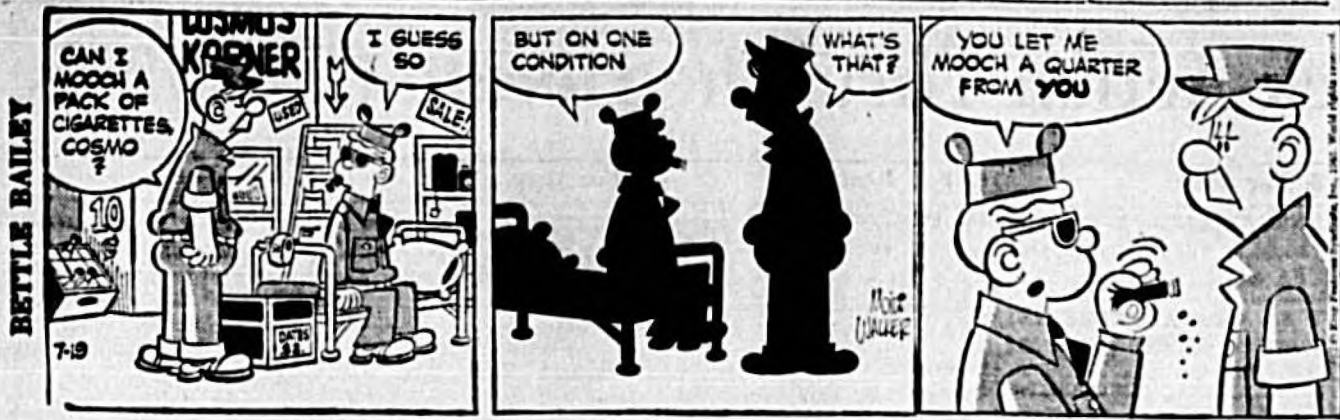

U.S. Crime Rate At New High, Hoover Reports

6 Pct. Above 1961, Says FBI Director

WASHINGTON (UPI) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reports the crime rate in the United States broke all previous records last year and jumped 6 per cent over 1961. Hoover said Thursday in his annual "uniform crime reports" that during the past five years the crime rate in this country went up 27 per cent while the population increased 7 per cent.

He said that all types of major crimes except murder showed increases during 1962. Murder dropped 2 per cent. "The record shows police agencies mounting crime work effectiveness remains high leads and heavier demands for a wide variety of increasing complex police services," the FBI chief declared.

But he added that "law enforcement machinery is impaired and policing is hampered as a result of increasing restrictions being placed on enforcement operations."

"The effectiveness of police work . . . depends to some extent on the action of the courts and the success of the correctional process," he said, "but most of all the degree to which the local citizenry supports law enforcement."

"Positive action to reduce crime," he said, "must begin with the individual citizen."

In his youth, Dan MacLaughlin, star of "As the World Turns," called as a deckhand on a freighter bound for Singapore from New York.

GOP Gains In State Seen If Barry Is Chosen

MIAMI (UPI) — The president of Florida's Young Democrats warned Thursday that Republican strength in the state will get a tremendous boost if Sen. Barry Goldwater was the GOP presidential nomination in the upcoming election.

Miami State Rep. Richard Pettigrew, new head of Florida's Young Democrat Club, called on party officeholders and officials to "start pulling together" to stop the GOP challenge in the state.

Pettigrew expressed particular concern over the growing Republican strength in state legislature. The GOP now has 18 House seats and two in the Senate.

"A minimum of 10 additional seats in the Florida House are in grave jeopardy," Pettigrew said.

"If Senator Barry Goldwater is the Republican nominee, his popularity in certain areas in Florida could sweep in additional 20-25 Republican state representatives, as well as several state senators and cabinet officials."

Control Board OKs \$101 Million Budget

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Board of Control has adopted a \$101 million budget for the coming year, including \$48 million to operate the state's institutions of higher learning.

The budgets now go to the Cabinet Budget Commission for approval.

The bulk of the budget, approved Thursday, will go to state universities, off-campus study facilities, a medical center, experimental and extension services. The expenses for these facilities total \$68.6 million, Chief Budget Officer Robert Willis said.

Willis said more than half of the board's budget would come from general state funds, with the remainder coming from trust accounts.

The past legislature made the following funds available for university operations in 1963-64:

- University of Florida \$18.5 million; Florida State University \$14.5 million; Florida A&M \$4 million; University of South Florida \$5.4 million; Florida Atlantic University, \$3 million, and the Institute for Continuing University Studies \$2.9 million.

Salary hikes throughout the state's university system amounted to about eight per cent, with most of the larger increases going to non-teaching personnel.

Salary increases at the University of Florida, for example, totaled 8.7 per cent. However, faculty salaries increased only 6.7 per cent while non-academic increases amounted to 15.1 per cent.

The board also received a \$2.1 million appropriation from the legislature to start a degree-granting institution at Pensacola and the board plans to spend another \$1.4 million for university construction if voters approve a proposed \$75 million bond issue at the upcoming general election.

Child Drowns In Bucket

LEESBURG (UPI) — A little girl drowned here Thursday when she crawled into a bucket of soapy water and bleach on the back porch of her house.

The Leesburg Fire Department rescue squad worked for more than an hour in a vain attempt to revive 10-month-old Denise Howard.

The father, Grady Howard, said he had been scrubbing the outside of the house and had set the three-gallon bucket on the porch.

Mexico To Get Disputed Land

EL PASO, Tex. (UPI) — that Mexico would get a net of 437 acres in settlement of the 99-year-old El Chamizal (The Ticket) dispute.

Mexico, in a complicated swap, would get 71 acres more than it originally claimed in the Chamizal.

The area, between downtown El Paso and the border, has 3,700 residents.

Notaries Public Will Operate Under New Law

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Secretary of State Tom Adams alerted Florida's 70,000 notaries public today that they will have to be "absolutely honest" in certifying documents after Sept. 1 or face a penalty of \$5,000 and five years in jail.

A new law regulating notaries goes into effect Sept. 1, setting the stringent penalties.

Under it, a notary who falsely or fraudulently notarizes a document would be guilty of a felony. Previously, the notary public law set no penalty for such a violation.

Simple failure to require reasonable proof of the identity of the person whose signature is being notarized would be a misdemeanor under the new law, punishable by a maximum fine of \$500 or six months in jail.

Ignorance or absence of intent to defraud in falsely notarizing a document would be no defense. The law requires that a notary have proof of identity in all signatures witnessed.

Deliberately notarizing false information would constitute a felony and ignorantly notarizing a false document a misdemeanor.

Notaries are appointed by the Governor and commissioned by the Secretary of State. About 15,000 new commissions and recommissions are issued annually.

Governors Indicate Rocky To Be Curbed

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — more than 30 of the 50 governors were contacted, showed 20 on record for a return to the unanimity rule, five opposed and the others undecided or noncommittal.

Supporting Rockefeller against the rules change were GOP Govs. Mark Hatfield of Oregon and John Chafee of Rhode Island and Democratic Govs. Bert Combs of Kentucky and Karl Roivaag of Minnesota. Combs is a member of the executive committee, which announced after its spring meeting that it unanimously favored the rules change.

A UPI check of state capitols suggested that the governors were almost sure to vote for a return to their old unanimity rule, in effect before 1959, for adoption of resolutions. This rule change would enable a single governor to veto any controversial proposal—like Rockefeller's resolution to put the conference on record for a broad civil rights program.

The governors will meet here Sunday through Wednesday. The rules showdown is scheduled Monday morning on an executive committee proposal to abandon the present rule, requiring a two-thirds vote for adoption of resolutions, and to return to the requirement for a unanimous vote.

Rockefeller, a potential contender for the Republican presidential nomination, is prepared to battle against the rules change. He is the author of 11 resolutions, including controversial proposals dealing with civil rights and financing medical care for the aged under the Social Security program.

Killing Laid To Robbery Attempt

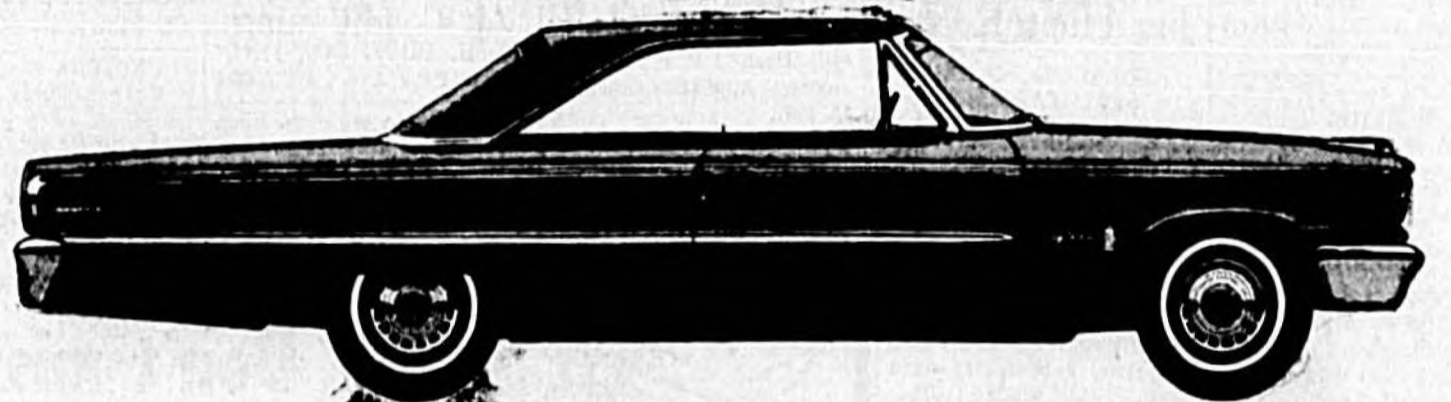

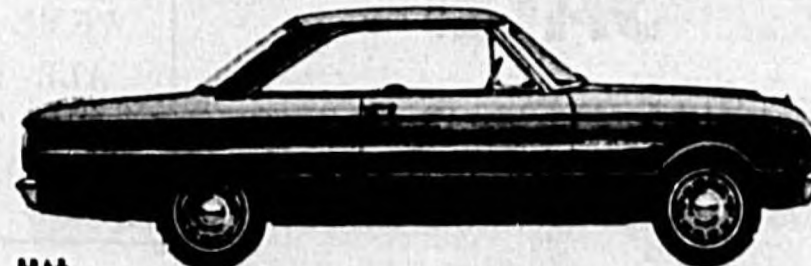

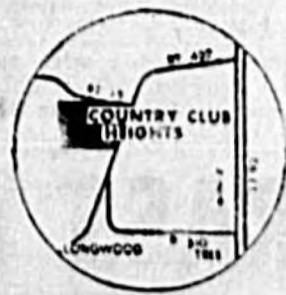

U. S. Seeks No Settlement, Fidel Charges

HAVANA (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime charged in a note sent to Washington over the weekend that the United States does not want to settle its differences with the Castroites. The note specifically protested the recent freezing of Cuban accounts in U. S. banks.

The Cuban note cited President Kennedy's statement at his press conference Wednesday that "the United States cannot coexist with a Soviet satellite in the Caribbean" as proof of U. S. unwillingness to negotiate.

"Cuba maintains and will maintain relations of close and inextinguishable friendship with the Soviet Union, a friend which helped us in the more difficult moments of the revolution . . ." the note said. "Those relations are unalterable, as is the Marxist-Leninist character of our revolution."

The note said the Castro regime will continue to prosper, despite the freezing of its dollar accounts, "with the help of socialist countries and the nations with which we maintain normal relations."

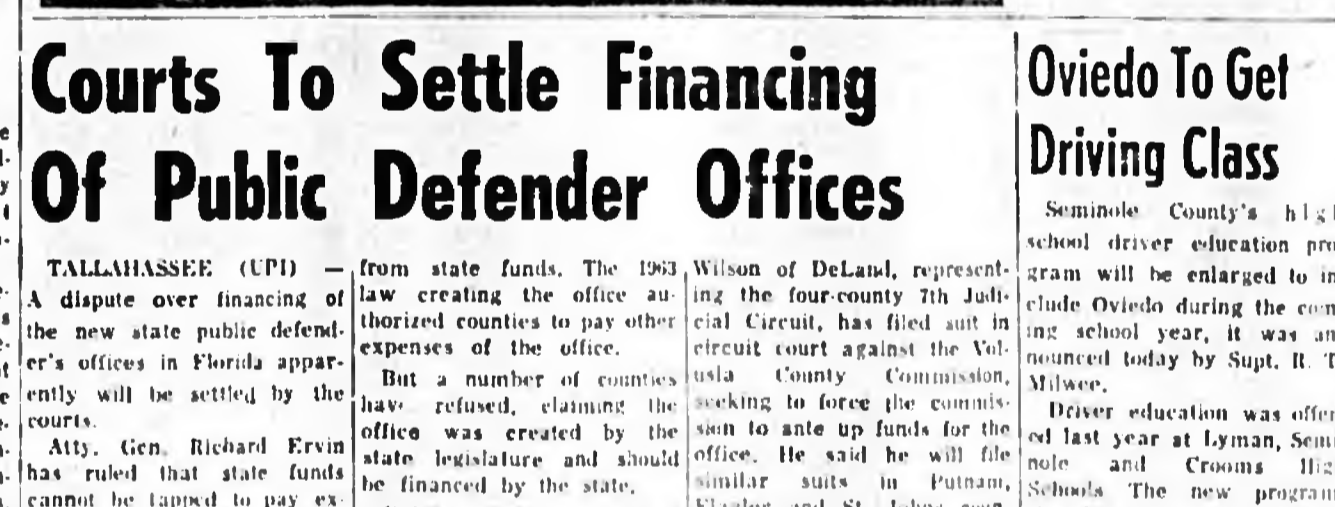
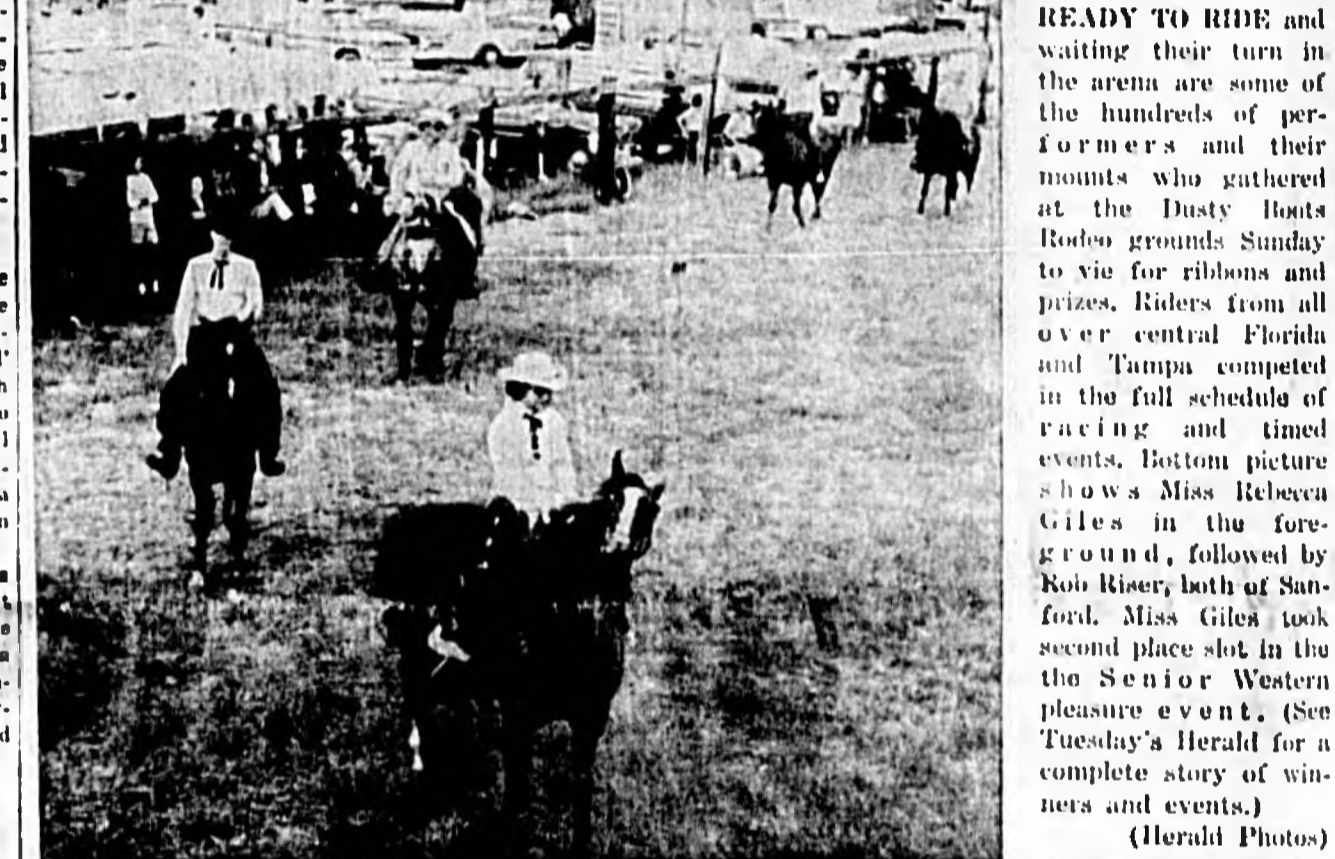

Convention Scraps Resolutions Panel

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and other Republicans pushing for a vote on the civil rights issue were dealt a setback today by the National Governors Conference which abolished its resolution committee.

The Democratic-led move had the effect of avoiding on-the-record voting on the politically-intense issue. The showdown vote was 38 to 16 in favor of an amendment offered by Democratic Gov. Grant Sawyer of Nevada. The result was reached on an almost party line basis.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy unveiled today to Republican and Democratic congressional leaders his proposed legislation to the strike-threatening dispute over train work rules.

2 Face Charges In Phone Strike
TAMPA (UPI) — Police said charges would be made today against two Tampa men allegedly involved in a hassle with a city detective who said he caught one of them trying to cut a General Telephone Co. cable with an ax.

Yesterdays preliminary activities—caucuses and news conferences—were loaded with politics. Courts To Settle Financing Of Public Defender Offices

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A dispute over financing of the new state public defender's offices in Florida apparently will be settled by the courts.

Atty. Gen. Richard Ervin has ruled that state funds cannot be tapped to pay expenses of the office in connection with hiring assistants, investigators, clerical help and office rental.

Ervin said only the salary of the public defender and an assistant in the big counties and travel expenses of the defenders can be paid from state funds.

Wilson of DeLand, representing the four-county 7th Judicial Circuit, has filed suit in circuit court against the Volusia County Commission, seeking to force the commission to ante up funds for the office.

Wilson brought the suit after the four-county commissioners turned down his request for a total \$21,530 budget with Volusia, as the largest county, to finance 65 per cent of it.

Oviedo To Get Driving Class

Seminole County's high school driver education program will be enlarged to include Oviedo during the coming school year, it was announced today by Supt. R. T. Milwee.

Driver education was offered last year at Lyman, Seminole and Crooms High Schools. The new program, therefore, includes all county high schools.

Stewart Gatchel, director of instruction, explained that a new law makes it mandatory for all high schools to offer driver education beginning with the fall term in September. He added driver education was offered at all four high schools as a summer course.

Provision of the new law which requires all new drivers to have completed a driver education course in order to get a license at 16, or else wait until they are 18, went into effect July 1.

Gatchel said that all local driver education instructors have completed training courses and were not required to attend a three-week course which opened today at the University of Florida.

Further Ocala Protests Due

OCALA (UPI) — More demonstrations were scheduled by the NAACP here today to protest the arrests of 44 Negroes and a white integrationist leader.

Florida NAACP Field Secretary Robert W. Saunders told a mass meeting of Negroes here Sunday night that the protests would continue and that he had sent telegrams to the FBI and congressmen all over the country protesting the arrests.

He said he would seek an investigation of the "wholesale law enforcement setup in Marion County."

Saunders called the arrest of "nearly 100 citizens in 72 hours" inexcusable and said he was protesting the matter to Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy.

The Negroes—most of them juveniles—were arrested Saturday and Sunday for parading around the Marion County Jail carrying placards protesting the arrest of white integrationist Zeh Avolny, 25, of Minneapolis, Minn., earlier last week. Avolny is being held for a mental examination.

And the local American Legion team, even without much support from the sponsoring organization, got into a two-out-of-three play-off with the Orlando nine for the right to go to the state finals in Tampa . . . Each club having won a game, the Orlando-Sanford game Saturday night drew a small peppery gallery that saw the Campbell Loring Post 63 take it on the chin, 12 to 4.

Strange to see Sanford, host club, in the visitors' dugout . . . Orlando got the draw as home team.

Test Ban Pact Seen Shortly

MOSCOW (UPI) — East-West nuclear talks entered their second week today and diplomats, encouraged by Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's statement that "an agreement is in sight," predicted accord on a partial test ban by week's end.

The U. S., British, and Soviet negotiators were reported so far along on the test ban issue that their talks have turned to other cold war problems, including measures to guard against surprise attack.

Sunday in a meeting with Under Secretary of State W. Averell Harriman, the American nuclear delegate, they talked in a private room behind Khrushchev's Lenin Station box, where Harriman watched the U.S.-Soviet track meet Sunday.

It was understood they discussed Khrushchev's offer for an exchange of inspectors as a means of safeguarding against sudden troop movements or buildups. The inspectors would be stationed at key points on the territory of opposing nations.

Christine First Ward Witness

LONDON (UPI) — Christine Keeler, the party girl who ruined the political career of War Minister John Profumo, testified today she also was the mistress of the mysterious Peter Rachman, slum property racketeer whose activities have created another crisis for the British government.

The red-haired 21-year-old Miss Keeler, whose affair with Profumo nearly brought down the government, testified as the first prosecution witness in the vice trial of Dr. Stephen Ward, playboy osteopath and artist who brought Profumo and Christine together.

As the trial opened in Old Bailey Court, Ward pleaded guilty to vice charges—including accusations he lived off the immoral earnings of Miss Keeler and another party girl, Marilyn (Mandy) Rice-Davies.

Three Killed In Head-On Crash
