

### Hampshire Hamlet Backs Republicans

WATERVILLE, N.H. (UPI)—This mountain hamlet voted first in the nation Tuesday, with residents staying up to midnight to back the Republicans, 154.

First voter in the land was a woman, Miss Jaclyn Osborn stepped up at exactly midnight to cast her vote into the 100-year-old ballot box.

Outside, the temperature was above zero in this ski resort village in the White Mountains.

Some time later, the ballots were spread on a table in the home of Town Clerk Wendell Stevenson, who offered his house as a polling place because the town hall has no electric lights.

Waterville won the race to be first in the nation because the election clerk overslept in nearby Ellsworth.

About 20 minutes after the vote was reported here, Ellsworth voted.

"There's been kind of a rivalry for years about voting first," town clerk Stevenson said.

"Somebody's got to be first. We thought it would be kind of nice for our town."

"There's no real reason—it's just kinda nice to be first."

### Half-Million Watch Pope John Crowned

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope John XXIII, the humble son of an Italian farmer, was crowned 22nd pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church Tuesday in a ceremony of devout and regal splendor.

Five hundred thousand persons massed on the cobble-stoned square of St. Peter's thundered an ovation of "Viva il Papa" when the three-tiered crown of gold, silver, and diamonds was placed upon his head.

The 76-year-old man who was born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli had assumed the full powers of leadership of the world's 500 million Catholics at the time the College of Cardinals elected him as successor to Pope Pius XII.

Tuesday he was crowned at the end of a four-hour ceremony that emphasized publicly his servitude to God and reminded him that he is a mortal man and all things of this world pass as does wax consumed by the flame of a candle.

Crowned On Balcony

The ceremony of crowning the new pope took place on the main balcony of St. Peter's Basilica where Nicola Cardinal Canali placed the golden tiara on his head with these words:

"Receive this tiara adorned with three crowns and know that you are the father of princes and kings, guide of the world, vicar upon earth of Jesus Christ our Lord to Whom let there be glory and honor without end."

A tremendous roar from the crowd echoed from the seven hills of Rome as the Pope arose and bestowed upon it his blessing from below the red velvet and gold-trimmed canopy set up to protect him from rain or sun.

### New York Reports Budget 'In Black'

NEW YORK (UPI)—The nation's biggest city, with an annual budget second in this country only to that of the federal government, said Monday it finished the 1967-68 fiscal year in the black.

New York City Comptroller Lawrence E. Gessa said the city came out with a profit of \$129,502 and that when all the money is counted, the figure might reach two million dollars. Operating revenues amounted to nearly two billion dollars.

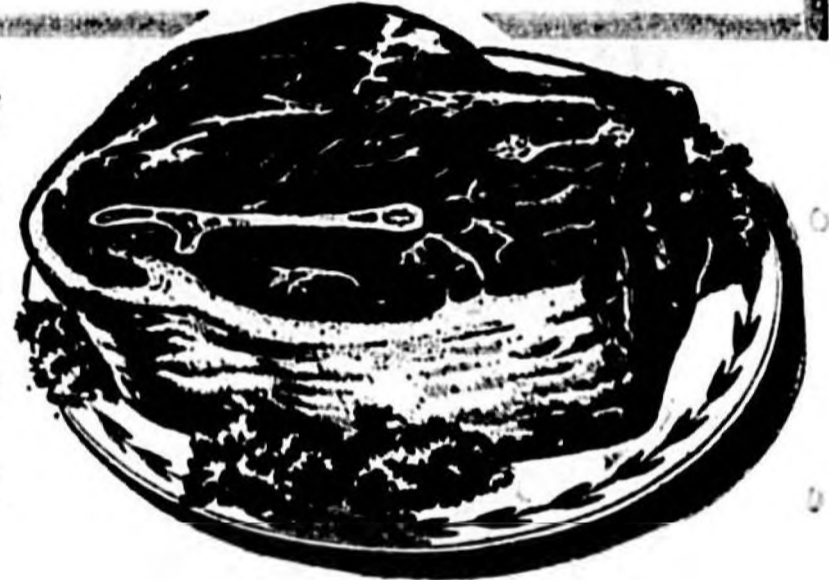

# Denos Need Three Doubtful Offices For Total Sweep

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Democrats needed to capture only three doubtful state offices today to ensure across-the-board political control of California for the first time this century.

Results from Tuesday's general election gave the Democrats the seats of governor, U.S. senator and attorney general, state treasurer and control of the state Legislature and a tie or better in the state's congressional delegation.

The only statewide offices still undecided were those for lieutenant governor, secretary of state and controller. With many precincts still uncounted, the outcome of the three races could not be forecast.

With about 90 per cent of the state's 26,000 precincts reported, Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan was the only Republican leading in the undecided contests.

Superior Judge Stanley Mosk led up a million vote lead over Rep. Patrick J. Hilling, a lead of Vice President Richard M. Nixon in the race for attorney general.

Space Agency Head Says Rocket Could Be Sent To Planets

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A top official of the new civilian space agency declared today that America has the capability "right now" to fire rockets to the planets Mars and Venus.

Dr. Newell D. Sanders, assistant director for advanced technology in the National Aeronautics and Space Agency, said the same Thor Able rocket combination being used in shots at the moon could send instrumented probes to the nearby planets.

Sanders said a favorable time for launching a rocket toward Venus would be mid-1959. If successful, the rocket would travel about 250 million miles in 151 days.

Sanders who took office last month, said he did not know that plans were being made for planetary launches at the time he mentioned. He pointed out that radio transmission from the rocket to the earth over the planetary distances would present a problem.

But he said that if the Venus launching is not attempted in 1959, it will have to be delayed for another year and a half. The delay for Mars, to await a time when that planet will be in a favorable position, would be much longer.

**Proper Position**  
The scientist explained that the launches must be attempted when Mars, Venus and the earth are on the same side of the sun and somewhere near their closest position to each other. Venus orbits around the sun in 225 days, while the earth takes 365 and Mars 687 days.

Sanders said the "minimum" rocket speed required to reach the moon is 25,900 miles per hour. The rocket velocity to reach the moon is 23,900 miles per hour, while for Mars the initial speed must be 23,900 miles per hour.

# Local Vegetable Farmer State's Most Productive

Seminole County vegetable farmers produce more per acre than the average Florida vegetable farmer.

This could be attributed to richer soil, or more efficient farming. Actually, it is a combination of both, according to Cecil Tucker, county agricultural agent.

The average yield per acre in the state is 274.3 bushels of vegetables per acre. In Seminole County, the average is 314.7.

In some categories, the spread between the state and local averages is even greater. In others, the yield is about the same.

How does Seminole County achieve this? Fertilizer plays a big role in the \$6 million business annually. The crop used is not fertile by nature. It is very responsive to commercial fertilizer, however.



### Bingo Legalized For Charity Only

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York City voters approved legalized bingo for charity Tuesday by a vote of more than two to one. The game has been played here for years with little legal interference. But Mrs. Victoria Alberghetti said: "I am not happy. I don't like a divorced man for my daughter. I was born in another country where we don't think at all to marry a man that is divorced. Hollywood ruins everybody. She was not like this before. But she is showing the other way."

Miss Alberghetti said that her man, who is Jewish, "never has been married before in the eyes of the church" because his first wedding—to Gloria Halsey, daughter of comedian Jack Haley—was a civil ceremony.

The singer, who leaves today for a one-month appearance at the Latin Quarter night club in New York, said: "Naturally, mother would have been happy if Buddy hadn't been married before and was the same religion. But nevertheless, I have the blessing of the church. I wouldn't marry him otherwise."

Bregman has a 5-year-old son, Barry. Miss Alberghetti said no definite wedding date will be set until she returns from New York, but she said the ceremony probably would be performed by her parish priest.

# Editorials

## Voter Apathy Biggest Surprise Of Election

The Democrats swept to victory in Seminole County, Florida and across the nation.

Locally, Republicans and a write-in campaign made strong bids. The GOP took three Seminole precincts in the race for the Railroad and Public Utilities Commission and one in the congressional contest, but Seminole voters, traditionally Democratic, remained that way.

Vernon W. Dunn, Democratic nominee for the District 4 seat of the County Commission, faced a strong challenge from lackey of Oviedo Mayor Lee Gary. He emerged with an almost 2-1 margin.

This election, we believe, proved several points. One is that the average American roots for the underdog. Dunn, a heavy favorite early in the campaign, spent a night in Seminole County jail after his car ran off the road near Oviedo. He was charged with drunk driving, but said he had taken four tranquilizers prior to starting the auto trip.

There is little doubt that this episode cost Dunn votes. On the other hand, it put spice in an otherwise dull campaign, brought out more voters. Too, it has been said that Dunn received quite a few votes because many voters were "down" on him due to the unfortunate occurrence. Whether this be true, it is the subject of much debate.

The second point emphasized by Tuesday's vote was that many people do not read or listen carefully. Several voters wrote in Dunn's name, which was listed on the voting machine. One cast a vote for Gary for U. S. senator, another wrote his name on the Sanford City Commission ballot. Quite a few neglected to put the "X" beside his name after writing it on the ballot, others put him in the wrong race.

A third point, and by far the most important, is that relatively few people care who runs their government. In Sanford, only 1,136 voters went to the polls to choose a new commissioner. The mere fact that an election was being held should have brought out more. Eight qualified candidates and one write-in were seeking the office. The total vote equals just a little more than 100 relatives and friends per candidate. Where were the people?

## Ike Didn't Mean It

President Eisenhower was "disappointed, disillusioned and baffled" by the results of Tuesday's election. Too, he didn't mean all of those things he said about the Democrats in the campaign. At least this is what he said at his press conference yesterday.

The overwhelming defeat of the Republicans must have come as a bitter blow to the new, hard-boiled Eisenhower who campaigned from coast to coast. In this campaign, the President got tough. He called the Democrats uncomplicated names, charged them with "reckless spending" and tagged them "prophets of gloom."

The GOP liked the "New Eisenhower." He had departed from his middle-of-the-road journey. He was making fighting talk. Meade Akorn and Richard Nixon said Eisenhower had changed the trend away from the Democrats. Everything was going to be all right.

Republicans took, in Akorn's words, a "bad mauling." Eisenhower found out, as have other politicians down through the ages, that it is difficult to convince an American voter to cast his ballot for someone else. Eisenhower got the votes for himself. Getting them for other candidates was a horse of a different color.

After watching the "New Eisenhower" in action, one wonders what happened to his belief that the President's office should be, as he put it, above politics?

ROME (UPI)—Hollywood producer Sam Zimbalist died of a heart attack Tuesday while working on the film "Ren Hurst." He was 37.

Zimbalist had been in Rome for several months shooting a revival of the epic Roman film at the Cinecitta Studios — Italy's Hollywood.

Here is a quick glance at what he can be expected to do when he gets back to Washington in January. You can count on him to get in the thick of the fight with other Southern Senators to retain the right to filibuster. It was a filibuster that helped win his famous Tidewater Oil Bill fight. He has spoken in favor of raising the amount that a person may earn without jeopardizing his right to draw Social Security payments and at the very beginning of the new session he will introduce a bill raising the limit from the present \$1,200 to \$1,800. ## Fred Othman Says

WASHINGTON — For \$13.85 which somehow seemed high, the man tried hard to sell me a derby.

He had 'em in gray, brown like Al Smith's, and black, such as I used to wear and my father before me. The haberdasher said derbies are the last word in fashionable hats for gents, but somehow I remembered a headache that plagued me in my youth for months.

Pills were no good. Nothing helped until I discovered that my derby was a quarter size too small. It gripped my head like a steel band. A new hat remedied the headache. Later in Denver I bought another derby, a little bigger and a great comfort it was. fun.

Once I used it to carry water to my 1936 model Chrysler automobile. Many a time it saved me from a nasty bump going down the cellar stairs. The beauty about a derby in those days was that it was made of felt, but I knew better. It was built of iron. Once a fellow got a derby that didn't hurt his head he was fixed for hats for life.

The first derbies, known then by

another name, were worn by the ancient Greeks. William Bowler, a London hatter, latched onto the idea back in the 1700's and his skimmers have been known as bowlers ever since by the British, except when they call 'em billy-cocks.

Seems that Lord Derby wore a bowler at the boss race at Epsom in 1780, but didn't create much of a splash with it. Later came William Coke, a gentleman of fashion, who used his bowler to keep his head warm, fed his horse corn in it in emergencies, and claimed it was the only proper hat for a gentleman to wear. You know the British and the way they use their language; that's how billycocks came into being.

To this day one London hatter calls his bowlers cokes. The first derby in America was forged in 1850 at South Norwalk, Conn., by James H. Knapp, a hatter, who didn't know what to call it. He made up a dozen and a half in brown and another 18 in black and sent 'em on consignment to Henderson, and Bird, jobbers in New York, where a clerk subscribed in a London paper. It carried a picture showing another

Lord Derby wearing the same old hat. The hat man called 'em derbies and that first shipment was a sellout.

Americans went for derbies in a large way for generations, though hatters always insist they were the cause of their customers going bald. The lack of ventilation, they said, caused the hair to fall out.

Some of the manufacturers sought to get around this complaint by punching holes in the crown of their derbies, but these were objections to this, too. What good is a derby for carrying water if it leaks?

Derbies went out of style here (but not in England) some 25 years ago, along about the time that starched collars disappeared. Now, as I say, they are being pushed in men's wear stores across the land and I was tempted.

The trouble was this particular 1936 model had such a narrow brim it didn't do much for my particular type of beauty. Partly in the picture, I looked like a Boston politician in that new matter, "The Last Hurrah." One other thing against derbies these days: Current model automobiles don't develop emergency thrills like those of long ago.

A transplanted Missouri grain farmer yesterday delivered the season's first load of cabbage to Harold Kastner & Co. in Sanford.

Kastner said it was the "earliest delivery ever" to the produce firm. The cabbage was grown by Albert Burk, Lake Monroe, who came here from New London, Mo., in March, 1955.

Burk, his wife and their 10 children, better known as the "Burk Dozen," farm 25 acres of land at Lake Monroe. In addition to the 53 sacks of cabbage delivered to Kastner yesterday, the Burks will market four other vegetables this week.

Although he has been here only a short time, Burk has learned the knack of vegetable farming, which he called "the biggest gamble I ever made." He added that Missouri grain farmers have price supports guaranteed by the U. S. Vegetable farmers have no such guarantees.

Burk was reluctant to compare farming here and in Missouri. The two types are so different, he said, that comparison is difficult, if not impossible. Although he grew up on a farm, and has lived on one all of his life, he had to learn how to farm all over again when he came to Florida.

He said he was one of the few farmers who made money during the freeze last year. Much of the credit for this should go to his ever-ready labor supply—the 10 children.

Burk's philosophy is that children who grow up in the city miss a lot in life. Farm work, he said, doesn't hurt youngsters; it helps them. Farming, he figured is very educational. A "good living" to Burk is a good family; enough money to feed, clothe and educate the children, pay off the bills, buy the farm and "a little left over."

Farming on a big scale doesn't appeal to him. When he met his wife, she was working on a farm.

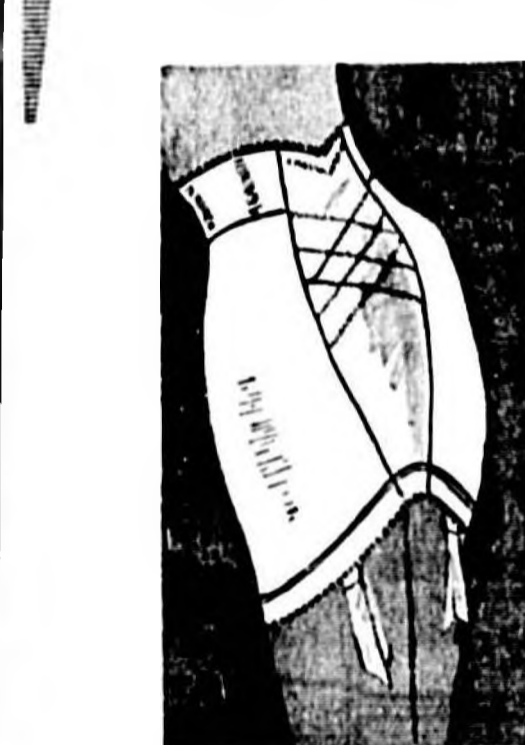

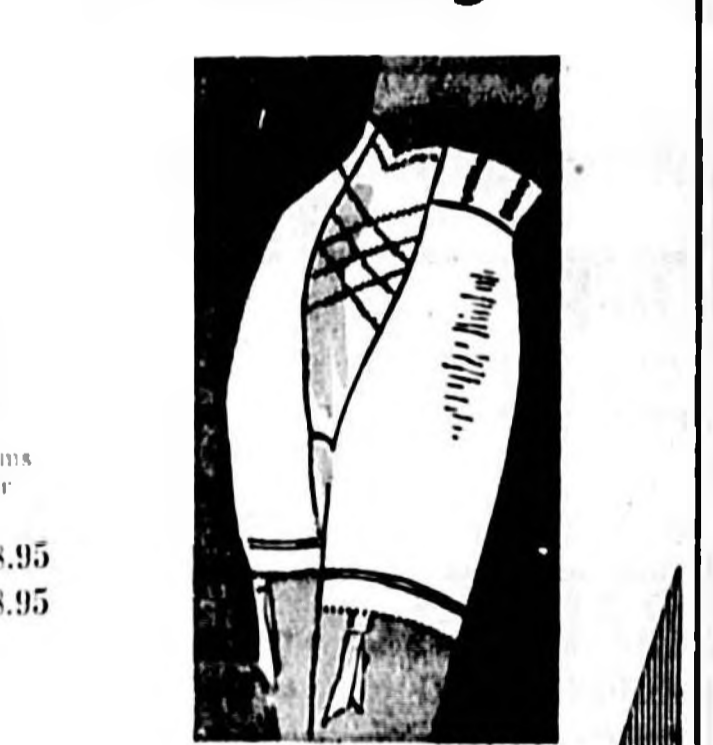

## Democrats Win, Still Have Problems

By FRANK ELIAZER

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Top Democrats today should have been, and for the record were, delicious with joy.

Their party had won control of House and Senate by whopping majorities.

Privately, that's exactly what had some congressional leaders worried.

In the House it appeared Speaker Sam Rayburn would have votes to spare, by the dozen. Senate Leader Lyndon B. Johnson was to be amply supplied with Democrats.

From the standpoint of some Democratic strategists, this won't be an altogether happy situation, because:

—On past performance, an overwhelming Democratic preponderance in either chamber may lead to poor party discipline. Each member will feel his vote isn't needed.

—On the other side of the aisle, the effect will be just the opposite. Republicans, like Democrats, tend to close ranks when heavily outnumbered.

—With Democrats in unquestioned charge of Congress during the next two years, voters may be persuaded in 1960 to blame Democrats rather than Republicans for anything that goes wrong, despite GOP control of the White House. Democratic leaders recall only too well what Harry Truman did with a similar situation. In reverse, in 1948.

Johnson's strength as Democratic leader of the Senate is as a backstage operator. His performance with a shouting Democratic majority in the 83rd Congress was generally conceded to have been superb.

The simultaneous initiation into the club of a big block of new Democratic members, including several with a liberal bent, could complicate Johnson's well-known wheeling and dealing.

Assuming, as senate majority

leader Johnson hopes to remain front and center among Democratic presidential hopefuls for 1960. This infusion of new Democratic blood also might be expected to push Johnson somewhat toward the left in his management of the Senate.

Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler already is in with a prediction that the 86th Congress will be "more progressive and liberal." Butler foresaw, among other things, a curb on Senate filibusters.

Speaker Rayburn isn't running

for president. He isn't likely to be pushed much one way or the other. However, he'll be a band of several score liberal Democrats in the House in the 85th Congress who constantly were pressing for a more liberal party position. Their number will be bolstered in the 86th Congress.

To the extent that the liberal newcomers replace conservative Republicans, the offsetting influence of the conservative Southern bloc will be diminished.

### Jet Engine Makers Hope To Hush Noise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The airlines hope they aren't entering the jet age with too much noise.

They mean that literally—the noise of the jet engine is the worst fault it has.

To keep itself out of broken ear-drum suits, and to make communities completely happy to receive jet service, the U. S. aviation industry has spent a fortune finding ways to lessen the jets' inevitable shriek. It is a noise one observer has likened to "the probable mating call of a love-sick dinosaur."

Boeing alone spent \$10 million developing a noise suppressor for its mighty 707. Other jet manufacturers have similar devices.

The Boeing suppressor consists of tubes at the rear of the engine. The hot gases that power the 707 are scattered through the tubes instead of emerging as one noisy blast.

The device cuts the 707's noise level down to that of a conventional piston engine plane. The problem is not eliminated entirely, however; the jets scream while piston engines roar, and even though the noise level is the same, the jet is likely to be more annoying.

The airlines will pay for more

than just a suppression system. The device, which costs \$25,000 per engine, cuts power about two to three percent and raises fuel consumption slightly. But the airlines figure they are getting a bargain considering the good will involved.

There is evidence that the jet noise factor may have been somewhat overrated. Jets climb so fast that they are out of the "nuisance range" far sooner than piston planes. The 707 hits 10,000 feet less than 60 seconds after takeoff—which means less noise outside the immediate airport area itself.

Nevertheless, their noise could hinder operation of American jet airlines in Europe at the outset.

In Britain, for example, Transport and Civil Aviation Minister Harold Watkinson announced three major regulations applying to the U. S. jets pending proof that their noise has been cut to "a reasonable minimum."

The toughest rule, which could delay regular passenger service, specified that until British officials decide the American jets' noise level is acceptable they will be able to take off and land only during "waking hours."

### Boykin To Attend Crestview Picnic

CRESTVIEW (UPI) — Congressman Frank Boykin of Alabama has been added to the list of speakers for the annual picnic at Crestview Nov. 8 for senior citizens.

Principal speaker is Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus who will discuss states' rights as the problem affects the whole nation.

Although both Faubus and Congressman Bob Sikes of Florida, who is planning the program, have repeatedly denied there is any third party move behind the meeting, signs are popping out around Crestview promoting Faubus for president.

Mayor-elect Harry Booth, committee chairman, said Faubus is apparently being hosted as the nominee of the Democratic Party—not a third party.

**PHILADELPHIA** — (UPI) — Obeying the party line is health habit No. 1 in Russia — and one result is a crop of children who are healthier generally than their American counterparts.

This is the diagnosis of Dr. Joseph Stokes Jr., president of the American Pediatric Society, who recently returned from a study tour of Russia to lay the groundwork for a long-range cultural exchange program.

"It seemed to me that the Russians do a much better job of preventive care than we do here," he explained, "and the result is that you have generally healthier children."

Dr. Stokes observed that children in the "lower-economic groups" in America often do not receive proper care because they are not taken to physicians or clinics.

"But in Russia," he said, "every baby must be brought to the hospital once a month for the first six months, then every other month up to one year, and then two to four times a year after that until the age of seven, when the school authorities take over. At that time their medical case histories are turned over to the school doctors."

"A number of phases of our medical research, however, are more advanced than over there," Dr. Stokes said, explaining that we have made greater strides, for example, in the field of rheumatic fever, which is one of the top child killers in Russia.

The No. 1 killer in the United States, he said, is accidents. "We have so many more automobiles on the streets than in Russia. There they have more trucks, and the trucks move much slower. I can't say what it will be like two years from now."

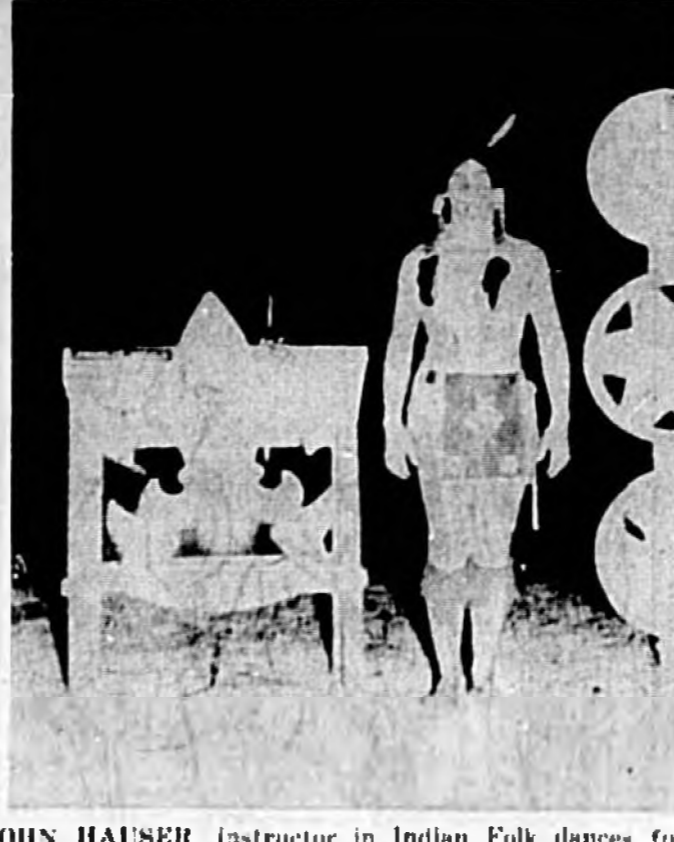

## Wang Will Lose Pig, Patch To Reds

**TOKYO** — (UPI) — What may be the greatest reshuffling of human beings in the history of the world is now in full swing inside Red China, according to well-documented sources here.

With remarkable speed, the Communist regime is herding a half-billion Chinese peasants into newly-formed "People's Communes."

The movement began only last April, yet by the end of October it already had engulfed some 300,000,000 peasants.

This means that the Communist government probably will have completed the whole "sweeping movement, carrying one-fifth of the world's population in its path, in a mere seven months."

Eventually, China's rural masses will be organized along military lines in giant communes averaging 20,000 members. Each commune will be a self-contained unit, responsible for agriculture, industry, trade, education and military training within its boundaries.

Helping describes the communes as "the primary unit of the future Communist society." They are designed to wipe out "certain last vestiges of private ownership of the means of production."

In fact, they are a long step ahead of the Soviet Union's collective farms in size, in the all-embracing scope of their responsibilities and in their goal in three to six years.

How does this affect the individual peasant? For Wang Iseuh Chen, a rice farmer of Honan Province, it means sudden transformation into a full-time coalminer or iron worker.

He will become a specialized worker in a production brigade, drawing a regular salary. His last few pigs, a cabbage patch and some apple trees will be handed over to the commune.

For the present, at least, Wang will be permitted to keep a few chickens, his pet cat and his blue cotton clothing.

Wang will get a maximum of two days off each month, 24 a year. His wife will get three rest days a month, and when she's having her babies, she will rate a

full month's leave from the fields. Actually, the changeover affects Wang's wife more deeply than it does him.

In Honan Province, pilot area for the committee, she is one of 7,000,000 women who were "freed" for manual labor with the establishment of nurseries and kindergartens to tend her children, mess halls to feed her and her husband and tailoring teams to take care of the family's mending.

The advent of the "People's Communes" marks the third major upheaval in Wang's life in the space of eight years.

In 1950, when Mao Tse-Tung and his "agrarian reformers" came to power, Wang got a small plot of farmland. Five years later, a suddenly resentful Chinese peasantry was swept into cooperatives and Wang lost the land.

Then, last April, China established its first commune — the "Agri-ink" commune in Honan Province. Wang's cooperative and 26 others were merged into this giant unit of 44,000 persons.

Wang still had some "vestiges of the means of production" — his pigs, his garden patch and his trees. Now, these will go to the commune.

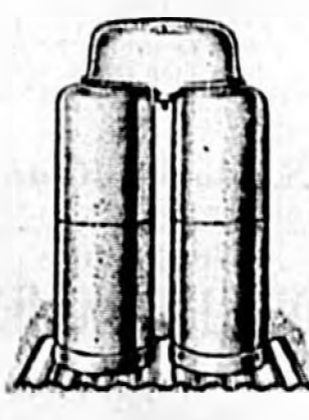
