BRADENTOWN, July 22.—W. A. Manning, secretary of the Bradentown Board of Trade, has received word from D. ## Florida Is Pushing Work On State-Wide Construction Roads

TALLAHASSEE, July 22.—Working under provisions of an act of the legislature designating a system of roads to provide high-ways reaching from one end of the state to the other, the Florida State Road Department is making steady progress toward completion of the network of roads that have a total mileage of 3,500. In addition to work being done by the state, counties are bonding themselves and spending millions of dollars yearly in order to expedite construction of the roads.

The state road department has only about \$4,500,000 a year to operate on, in addition to labor of a thousand or more state convicts who are assigned to road-building work, but is going ahead with its program constructing highways that cost from \$20,000 to \$40,000 for the hard-surfaced type, and around \$2,000 a mile for sand-clay surfaces.

The system provides for a road into Florida from Waycross, Ga., extending along the coast to Miami that will eventually extend to Key West when the contemplated Overseas Highway is completed; two roads through the central part of the state from north to south; one across the northern border from Jacksonville to Pensacola; and a number of others crossing the peninsula and western wing, at different intervals.

Another, the Tamiami Trail, extending along the west coast from Tampa through the Everglades to Miami, is also under construction.

## Veteran Celebrates Ninetieth Birthday

ST. PETERSBURG, July 22.—Daniel D. Hall, a native of New Hampshire, has just celebrated his ninetieth birthday at the home of his son here. He was born at Stafford, N. H., where he lived for 30 years, coming to Florida 10 years ago. He took an active part in the war between the states and saw service in many battles, among them several in the campaigns in Virginia.

TALLAHASSEE, July 22.—Working under provisions of an act of the legislature designating a system of roads to provide high-ways reaching from one end of the state to the other, the Florida State Road Department is making steady progress toward completion of the network of roads that have a total mileage of 3,500. In addition to work being done by the state, counties are bonding themselves and spending millions of dollars yearly in order to expedite construction of the roads.

The state road department has only about \$4,500,000 a year to operate on, in addition to labor of a thousand or more state convicts who are assigned to road-building work, but is going ahead with its program constructing highways that cost from \$20,000 to \$40,000 for the hard-surfaced type, and around \$2,000 a mile for sand-clay surfaces.

The system provides for a road into Florida from Waycross, Ga., extending along the coast to Miami that will eventually extend to Key West when the contemplated Overseas Highway is completed; two roads through the central part of the state from north to south; one across the northern border from Jacksonville to Pensacola; and a number of others crossing the peninsula and western wing, at different intervals.

Another, the Tamiami Trail, extending along the west coast from Tampa through the Everglades to Miami, is also under construction.

PICHER, Okla., July 23.—Only prompt steps taken by officers prevented mob action Monday against Jud Parsons, 17, who, according to Joe Nolan, assistant chief of police, confessed to having attacked and killed Floyd Smith, aged five years.

Parsons is in jail at Miami today, Nolan said, where he was rushed after a crowd of about 200 persons last night rioted about the car after Parsons had been taken to a morgue to view the boy's body. Officers, fearing the temper of the throng, sped him from the city instead of returning him to the Picher city jail.

The boy was the son of Joe Smith, an ore hauler in the mines nearby.

Early Saturday he ran to his home crying to his mother that he had been injured by a man who lured him to a box car on a pretense of giving him a watch.

Parsons was arrested yesterday. At first he denied knowledge of the case, but according to Nolan, confessed last night at the morgue.

According to the assistant chief Parsons was once confined in the state hospital for the insane at Vinita.
