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## DEATH LIST IN CUBAN STORM IS OVER 2000

### Camaguey Is Crowded With Refugees Who Tell Graphic Tales Of Havoc Wreaked

(By The Associated Press)  
Trains of box cars crowded with refugees arrived in Camaguey, Cuba, yesterday from the south coast town of Santa Cruz del Sur, where a hurricane and a 20-foot wave of water demolished the town and caused at least 2000 deaths. The Cuban government rushed medical supplies and clothing to the storm sufferers.

Santa Cruz may never be rebuilt. The Cuban secretary of public works, after a personal inspection, said he would not recommend that any attempt be made to reestablish a community on the dangerous point of land that jutted into the sea.

A new detail of the storm came from Grand Cayman, reef island 200 miles northeast of Jamaica, where the steamer Halibon, New Orleans to Jamaica, was found to be a total loss.

Sixty seven persons are known to have been killed and over 100 seriously injured when the hurricane struck this island and the smaller island of Gayman authorities reported today. All 40 buildings on the two islands were destroyed. The storm apparently skirted the south coast of Haiti, Nassau escaped but some of the lesser islands seem not to have escaped.

## HEADS ARMADA

## ARMISTICE DAY IS OBSERVED IN WORLD CAPITALS

### High Officials Unite In Tributes To Men Slain In World War

The armistice which ended the World War was observed in Washington, D. C., yesterday. President Hoover, Secretary of War Duggan, and other high officials united in tributes to the men who died in the war.

The president's address to Congress on the occasion of the 11th anniversary of the armistice was the most significant of the day's activities.

In his message, the president said that the war had been a "great and terrible struggle" which had cost the lives of millions of men.

He said that the war had also been a "great and noble struggle" which had shown the world the power of human courage and sacrifice.

The president's message was read in the Senate and House of Representatives.
