Longwood ready to battle Florida Power

Commissioners say utility wants to dictate, not negotiate

LONGWOOD — Following the lead of other Central Florida cities, Longwood city commissioners considered Monday if the city should pursue legal actions against Florida Power.

By a four to one vote, with Mayor Paul Lovstrand dissenting, the commission moved forward with legal proceedings; however, Lovstrand was able to persuade commissioners to try one last round of negotiations with the utility

provider before entering a court battle. Thirty years ago, many Central Florida cities entered franchise agreements with Florida Power. As a part of the partnership, Florida Power collected franchise fees from their customers and handed the collected fees over to the cities for

their regulation of the rights-of-way. More than 35 cities across Central Florida have had their franchise agreements with Florida Power expire since 1995. Several cities, including Casselberry and Winter Park, have entered legal battles to make the utility

honor previous agreements and perhaps remove the electricity provider from the cities' limits all together.

While many cities including Altamonte Springs have signed renewals with Florida Power, other cities are fighting the utility in the courtroom because the renewal contract is very much different from the previous arrangements.

Although Longwood city commission approved last meeting to attain Orlando law firm Gray, Harris and Robinson for

Sales tax holiday begins July 28

Just in time for shoppers to begin buying those back-to-school items and fall clothing, the Florida Department of Revenue has announced the state's fourth sales tax holiday, from 12:01 a.m. Saturday, July 28, through midnight, Sunday, August 5.

For the first time, this year's sales tax holiday will offer tax relief from state and local sales tax on certain specified school supplies selling for \$10 or less, as well as on clothing, footwear and certain accessories selling for \$50 or less.

It is estimated shoppers in Florida stores may save approximately \$28.5 million during the sales tax holiday according to estimates prepared by state economists.

"Helping taxpayers keep more of their hard-earned money is always worthwhile," said Governor Jeb Bush.

Florida initiated the sales tax holiday in 1998. By law, sales of clothing, footwear and certain accessories selling for \$50 or less per item, are exempt from the state's six percent sales tax and from local sales taxes as well.

Information about the tax free holiday is also available by calling the DOR's toll-free taxpayer hotline at 1-800-352-3671.

Also, retailers who wish to have additional information on how to comply with sales tax law during the holiday, may attend free seminars offered by the Department of Revenue tax specialists.

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Looking for Dino

Peri Sedigh hopes Sanford residents find her pet iguana

SANFORD — Motorists or pedestrians shouldn't be surprised if they see a 3-foot iguana nonchalantly cross their path along Virginia Avenue. It's only Dino, and he's probably trying to find his way home.

The orange and turquoise reptile has been lost since Memorial Day, when his owner, Peri Sedigh, returned to her yard and discovered her beloved pet missing.

"I had him out in the yard to enjoy the sun," Sedigh said. "I went inside to answer the phone. I was only inside for about three minutes, but when I came back outside, he was gone."

According to Sedigh, it was very uncharacteristic for Dino to leave the yard. And, if by chance, he decided to venture outside his domain on May 28, he wouldn't have gone anywhere fast.

"Dino is like a couch potato," Sedigh said. "He's very sweet and docile. And, he always preferred being inside rather than outside."

County hires full-time mediation coordinator

SANFORD — Court mediation has been required in contested Seminole County family and dependency cases since 1996, but only recently did county commissioners approve funding for a full-time coordinator.

According to coordinator, Yvonne Dixon, the program is extremely successful in helping lessen the courtroom's docket.

With three choices offered in court mediation — private mediation which ranges from about \$150 to \$300 an hour; reduced rate mediation that costs \$90 an hour; free mediation for indigent people — it has helped make the useful mediation process available to all Seminole residents.

"Once they notice the case for trial, which means they want to get in front of the judge and try the issues, they have to go to mediation prior to the trial," Dixon said. "About 70 percent of the cases actually settle if they go to mediation."

Since taking the position on a temporary basis in July 1999,

Dixon has kept complete records of mediation for indigent people.

From July 1, 1999 to Dec. 31, 1999, Dixon reported 162 cases were referred to indigent mediation. Of those 162 cases, 90 were mediated and 54 cases successfully reached settlement.

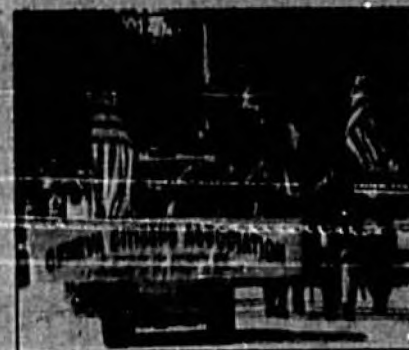
In 2000, 213 cases were referred and 137 were mediated with 95 of them successfully reaching a settlement.

While the purpose of the mediation is to resolve differences between two disagreeing sides in the presence of an independent mediator, occasionally the parties reconcile in mediation and a court date is no longer needed. Dixon said cases that do reach mediation usually require about two hours — a savings of eight hours in the courtroom.

Dixon utilizes more than 20 contracted mediators to conquer the enormous case load. Mediators are trained professionals who have a variety of backgrounds, including lawyers, health providers and accountants, and also have previous experience

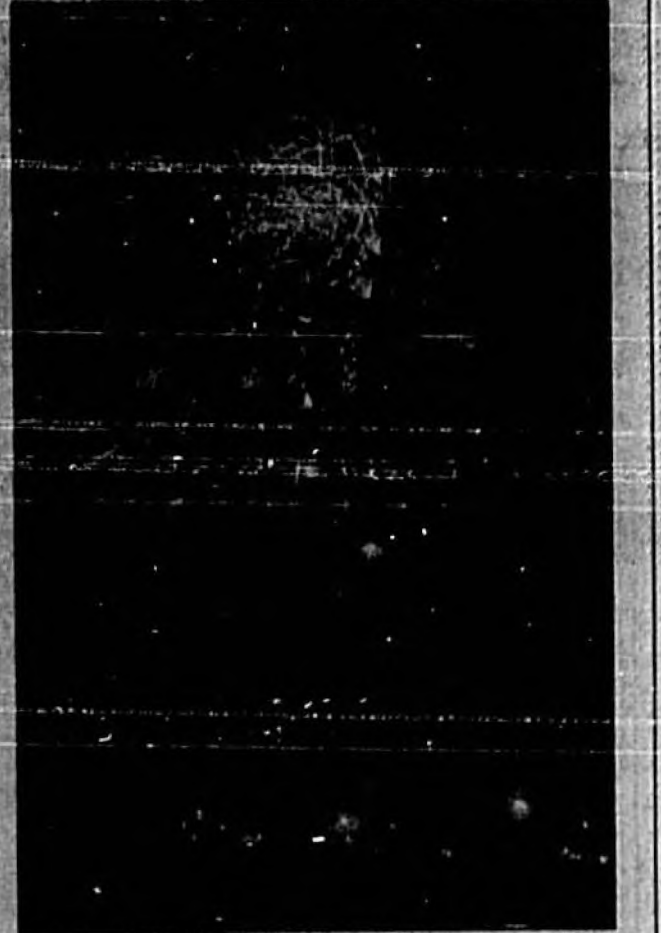

Orange, Seminole animal groups merge

SANFORD — The merger of the Humane Society of Seminole County with the Orlando Humane Society will give the Seminole shelter a new lease on life.

According to Steven Horneffer, president of the Humane Society of Seminole County, the merger of the two facilities was made final when Seminole County commissioners approved a lease agreement giving Orlando management of the Seminole County shelter. The two shelters will now be called the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals of Central Florida.

Horneffer said the merger will add much needed improvements to the Seminole facility. The shelter, Horneffer noted, has had its share of financial troubles, having at times to make emergency appeals for cash just to keep operating.

"As hard as we tried, we could never get over the hump," Horneffer said.

Horneffer indicated that some of the problems involved finding time to get things done. When fund raising suffered, Horneffer said the shelter "stayed a hand-to-mouth" operation.

The Seminole shelter will now benefit from Orlando's professional resources. Horneffer explained that some veterinary services in Orlando will be shared with the Seminole operation. Seminole will now have a small animal hospital, Horneffer said.

The big July 4th fireworks event at Fort Mellon Park in Sanford is over. It was well attended and except for a few who had their sparklers or personal fireworks taken away by police or firemen, it was an excellent event. Sanford Main Street and others who took part in this event are to be highly congratulated.

Hopefully, with the new blood we have in the Sanford community heading up various organizations, we will be seeing more events which attract visitors to Sanford. Of course one of the biggest will be the Golden Age Games coming up in November.

Many communities, large and small, have special events to draw attention to their city or town. Sanford may do well to have more such activities during the year. For example: for Saturday, July 7, it's Barn Day outside Finley, Neb., featuring events and displays of antique farm equipment. There is a Cherry Pit Spitting contest in Eau Clair, Mich., expected to draw 1,000 contestants. A Rock Festival is planned in Winter Park, Colo., with attendance estimated at 16,000. The Cherry Festival in Traverse City Michigan expects a half-million folks to attend. There's an Ice Cream Festival in Wilmington, Del., expecting 30,000 people. There are also art festivals and celebrations in honor of practically everything including the hanging of John Wilkes Booth in Washington, D.C.

For Sunday, July 8, it will be Butterfly Days in Muskegon, Mich., expecting 10,000 people, and again, arts and crafts shows and special observances.

Practically every day, Chase's Calendar of Events for the year 2001 indicate special activities, not only in the U.S. but throughout the world, such as the running of the bulls in Pamplona, Spain.

Locally of course, we have the Pepsi 400 race at the Daytona International Speedway.

I'm not suggesting we run bulls through First Street or have automobile races on Seminole Blvd., but there are many events and/or celebrations which could be created — perhaps one-of-a-kind events for Sanford. And during these events, let the stores downtown be open for business — perhaps holding special sales.

A number of decades ago, when the city of Sanford had its own orchestra (such as it was), there were band concerts at the former bandshell at what is now Memorial Park. When those concerts were held, people would not only gather to hear the music but take the opportunity to do some downtown shopping. Yes, we have the mall now, which wasn't there back in those days, but that shouldn't preclude people from shopping downtown as well. After all, Sanford boasts of many stores not available at this or any other mall.

The aim here is (1) determine something to celebrate or an activity to hold (2) check the Chamber of Commerce, city, and other surrounding areas to find a suitable date as to not interfere with someone else (3) determine which group will plan the organization (4) solicit cooperation from those who would be involved (determine funding), then promote it well.

If a town the size of Traverse City, Michigan, only slightly larger than Sanford, can hold an event expected to draw 500,000 people, we can easily see the economic boost an event can be to the City of Sanford and its merchants. Think about it.

me next week." No need for alarm, though. The eatery is doing just fine, as anyone who has had the Willow Tree's to-die-for chicken salad knows.

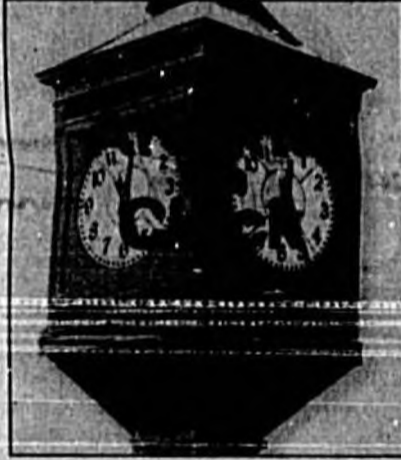
Running a successful restaurant puts a premium on family time, and Schirmer hinted she wants to spend some more time with her family.

Factory Girls

We are all the children of the mill girls of Lowell

I'm not working much these warm and sunny days near the water, so I'm thinking about work. That's what good and true Americans do in their spare time — if they are not headed for a second job or a third.

It is very hard to disengage when you are serving the greatest economy in the world. Most of us get only a lousy two weeks off a year — if we're lucky enough to have to work at only one job — compared to the five or six or seven weeks of vacation in other developed but poorer countries. It's a disgrace, really, but our real second job (or third or fourth) is buying and borrowing to keep the big American wheel turning.

Sitting here on the porch last Friday, trying to throw out the papers that accumulate over a year, I came across a selection of articles from *The Lowell Offering*, a literary magazine published in Lowell, Mass., from 1840 to 1845 under the banner: "This Number Wholly Written by Female Employees in the Mills."

These females, country girls and then Irish immigrants, were soldiers of the Industrial Revolution, the first wage-earning women in the country, working in textile mills and living in nearby boarding houses. The pay was \$4 a week for a 70-hour, six-day week.

There were some, probably relatives or friends of the mill owners, who thought the system was utopian, bringing "ignorant" girls into progressive citizenship and even into their own churches and Sunday schools on their one day off. There were some, too, particularly in Boston, who called the whole thing "white slavery." Much of *The Lowell Offering* was devoted to that heaven-or-hell argument, and, at least in the pieces I've read, the mills were indeed close to heaven on Earth — which may have had something to do with the owners' financing the magazine.

In one 1845 issue, "Miss B" says: "A factory girl's work is neither hard nor complicated. There can be no better place for reflection, when there must be toil, than the factory ... The patronage which newspapers and periodicals find in our city, our well-worn libraries, evening schools, crowded churches and Sabbath schools, prove that factory operatives use leisure as the means of improvement both in mind and heart."

In my favorite piece, "A Week in the Mill," the anonymous author writes: "The Sabbath has made her heart and her step light, and she is early at her accustomed place, awaiting the starting of the machinery. Everything having been cleaned and neatly arranged, she has less to occupy her on Monday than other days; and you may see her leaning from the window to watch the glitter of the sunrise on the water...."

The sunrise! It was a long day, ending at 7 p.m. The observer goes on, talking about how much the girls are able to do for themselves before bedtime at 10 p.m. She, if it is one of the girls who wrote this, concludes: "There is very little variety in an operative's life, and little difference between it and any other life of labor. It lies half in sunlight — half in shade."

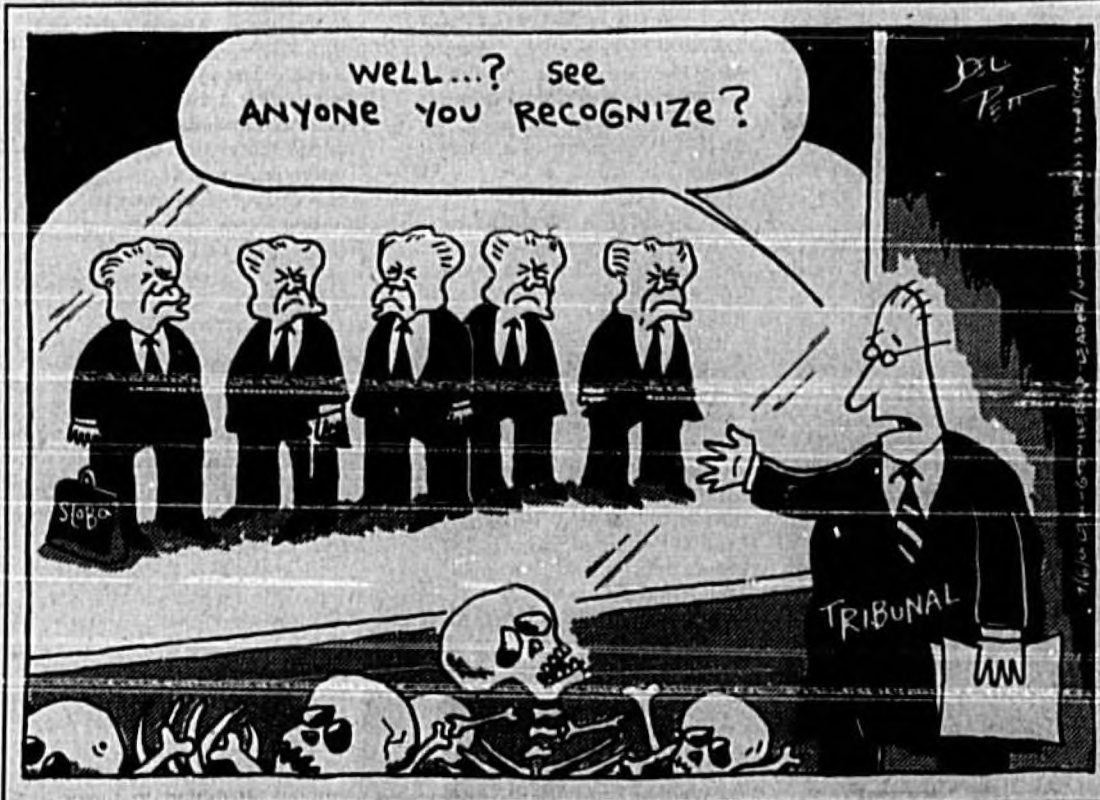
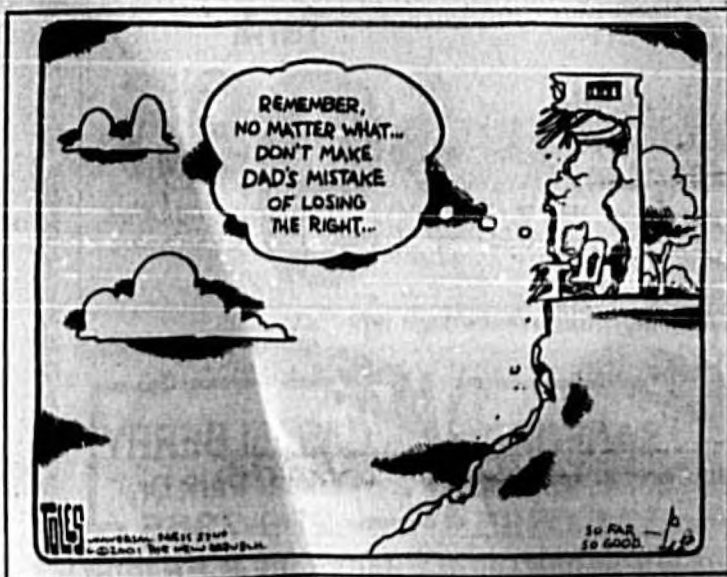
Putting that down, I picked up the day's *Wall Street Journal*. The story on the left-hand side of page one appeared under the headlines:

"In 24-Hour Workplace, Day Care Is Moving to the Night Shift ... Parents Drop Off Their Kids at Dusk-to-Dawn Sites; The Future of Baby-sitting."

The reporter, Barbara Carton, reports on around-the-clock, day-and-night care centers in a half-dozen states where parents are working night shifts in hospitals, nursing homes, auto factories, computer companies and gambling casinos. She focuses first on a 9-year-old girl in Nevada named Najah Finch, doing cartwheels at 3:30 a.m. while her mother works nearby as a dealer.

I guess you could call that the American way. We are all the children of the mill girls of Lowell.

Environmental exposé nothing but propaganda

While watching John Stossel's ABC News special, "Tampering With Nature," I felt like a citizen of those not-so-long-ago "captive nations" who learned the truth of what was going on not from their own leaders and the controlled media, but from the *Voice of America* and *Radio Free Europe*.

In one hour last week, Stossel exposed the propaganda and one-dimensional perspective about the environment and biotechnology that has caused millions of schoolchildren to repeat the information they've been spoon-fed in a way that would delight a teacher in a communist classroom.

The special revealed another point of view that is rarely, if ever, heard. The reason these views aren't heard is that most of the people who bring you the news and who teach our children are of a singular mindset and teach or broadcast only their ideas.

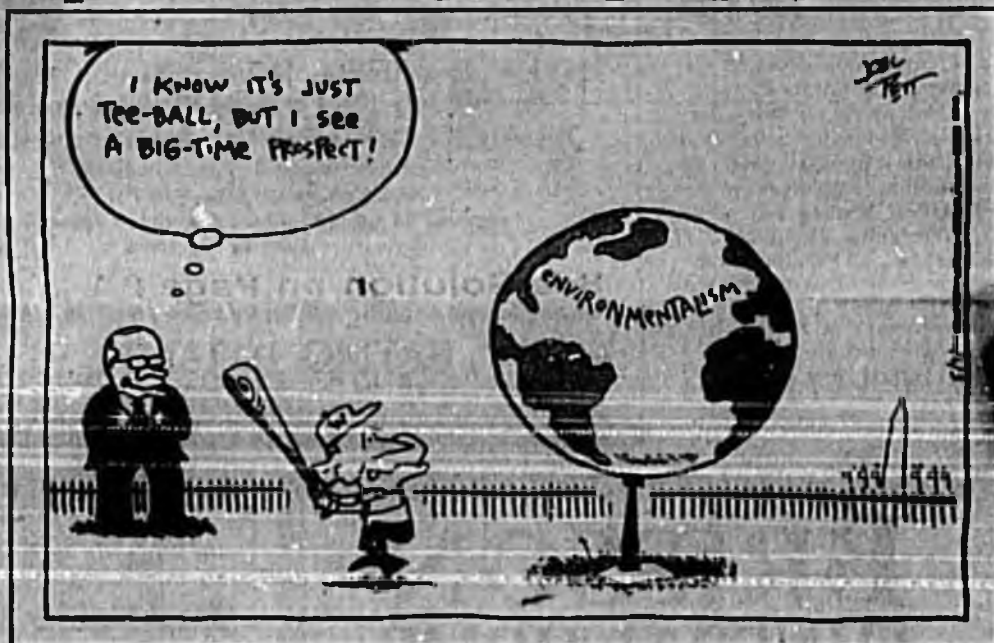
Patrick Moore, a former director of Greenpeace, was interviewed. He said political activists have hijacked the environmentalist movement and that they are "using environmental rhetoric to cloak agendas like class warfare and anti-corporatism that, in fact, have almost nothing to do with ecology."

Interest groups, Stossel said, pressure members of Congress into voting for things that have little or no effect on the environment, but which increase the influence and fund-raising capabilities of such groups.

Even if greenhouse gases were restricted, Stossel says reliable estimates show restrictions would prevent a rise in global temperature by only a fraction of a degree. He wondered if such low expectations are worth the potential high cost to taxpayers of trillions of dollars and a radically altered lifestyle.

Biotechnology, which is helping to make food more plentiful, is another target of environmentalists. Stossel showed that their objections have been answered by the very science they decry.

Bovine growth hormone, for example, increases milk production in cows, though environmentalists regularly condemn it as



harmful to human health. Stossel reported that the World Health Organization, the Food and Drug Administration and the American Medical Association have deemed the hormone completely safe.

The most controversial and disturbing moment came when Stossel interviewed elementary schoolchildren in Santa Monica, Calif. Stossel told Fox News Channel's Bill O'Reilly that some individual interviews had been cut by ABC after an environmentalist group contacted and "brainwashed" parents into believing that Stossel was doing an "editorial" that would be injurious to the environmental cause.

Stossel told O'Reilly he wanted to show how public schoolchildren have been lied to about the environment. He said children believe the one side they have been taught of the global-warming argument: that Republican presidents are responsible for dirty air and water (though, he noted, air and water are much cleaner now) and that corporations are "evil."

Even with the interviews that remained in the program, Stossel managed to prove his

point. He asked the children what they had learned, and then he quoted governmental and scientific sources to prove the children and their teachers wrong.

He also interviewed activists about their knowledge of the earth, food additives, genetic food engineering and other scientific discoveries designed to improve human life.

"The extremists dominate the debate," Stossel told O'Reilly. Indeed they do.

What else have students been taught and what else does the public believe that is factually untrue? It might take years of TV specials and a different education objective to cleanse our systems of the intellectual and moral impurities we have been programmed to accept as truth.

Stossel should be thanked and ABC News praised for allowing another environmental point of view to be heard. The environmental lobby controls almost all of the media, as do so many other liberal perspectives. It is testimony to the power of truth that so many wish to discredit and even silence John Stossel.

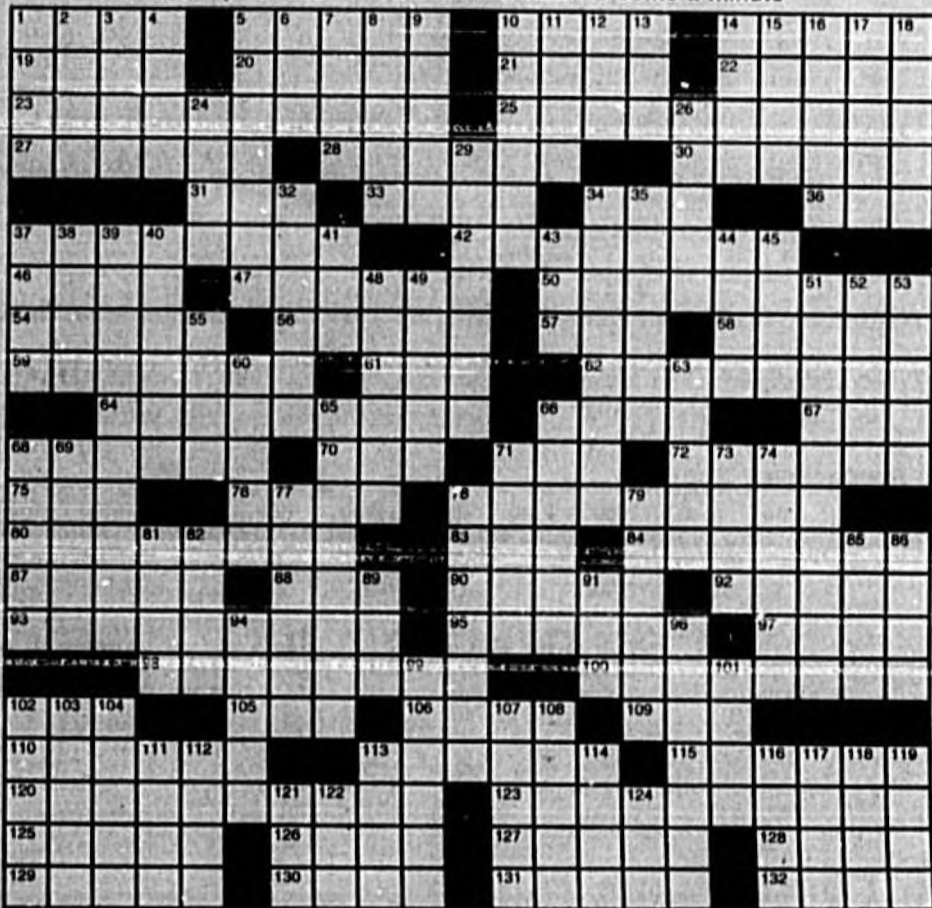

in family type situations, Dixon said. Some of her best mediators have success rates approaching 99 percent.

"I have one mediator who I think the last five or six cases I've sent to her have either settled prior to mediation or they reconciled," Dixon said. "In court, the judge may not do what either one of you want. You may come out of there very unhappy with what the judge has ordered, but you have to live with it because it's an order."

Seminole County Judge Thomas Freeman agrees independent mediators play a part in the program's success.

"Anytime you get people sitting down and talking instead of yelling at each other in the courtroom it's beneficial," Freeman said. "People are scared to death of a judge and the courtroom. The procedure kind of fosters that."

"A mediation situation is much different. The mediation keeps everything simple — it's not an aggressive procedure. The worst place to reach an agreement is in a courtroom."

Much of the program's success can be attributed to Dixon who started working in family situations when she was 19 years old. Prior to coming to Seminole County, Dixon worked with the Guardian Ad Litem program for 18 years in Brevard County and was director of the program for 12 years.

Guardian Ad Litem program is a court appointed advocate program designed to protect the best interests of children involved in the legal system because of their parents' divorce or other domestic issues.

the upcoming court battle, Lovstrand said the commission did not use "due diligence" to arrive at their previous decision.

Lovstrand said the city is losing more than \$2,000 a day in lost franchise fees from Florida Power and has already lost \$46,628 because of not having a new contract signed.

At a scheduled Aug. 1 hearing, a judge will decide if an injunction can be placed on the impasse between Longwood and Florida Power and the lost franchise fees reinstated.

"The clock keeps ticking," Lovstrand said. "Even if we win the lawsuit and get our franchise fees back the cost will go to the consumers. We're fighting a battle we don't need to. Sign the contract and we will get our franchise fees."

Commissioner John Maingot responded to Lovstrand comments "Your words of wisdom give food for thought, but we have to stand steadfast. We really thought this through before we took action."

However, even if Longwood wins the Aug. 1 hearing City Attorney Robert Taylor said the courtroom battle might last well into next year.

According to Commissioner Dan Anderson, Longwood officials were told by Florida Power that the clause that states the city can buy the rights to provide electricity, will not be in the new contract and will not be honored from the old contract.

"For Florida Power to look us in the eye and tell us that's not what it says bothers me," Anderson said. "They have deep pockets and are playing poker with us. They're waiting for us to blink."

"We did not vote to take over the system. We voted to have a judge assert our rights over our property. We have to preserve the people's rights. I don't see how we can say we give up and walk away from this."

Casselberry waiting for court to rule

The City of Casselberry is awaiting a decision any day now from the 5th District Court of Appeals.

According to City Manager Jack Schluckebier, the city has been involved in court battles against Florida Power for about a year now. The city's 30-year franchise agreement with the utility provider ended last April, and Florida Power is not honoring a purchase option in the contract.

"We're pursuing that question of the purchase," Schluckebier said. "We've done quite a bit of background as a part of this. They told us these terms were not applicable and their system was not for sale. That's not usually how contracts work."

A preliminary feasibility study for the municipalization of the electric system was completed in May for Casselberry. According to the report, buying the electric system could cost the city \$14 to \$17 million; however the net profit per year could be about \$1.5 to \$3 million.

"We didn't start off wanting to be in the electric business," Schluckebier said. "We felt compelled to pursue all of our rights. We just think they're not squaring up with their obligations."

According to Schluckebier, Casselberry system "would not be reinventing the wheel" because 32 cities in Florida provide electricity to their residents.

Casselberry is the farthest along in the judicial process against Florida Power as sever-

al other cities including Winter Park, Edgewood and Longwood are all either considering actions or have taken preliminary steps against the electricity provider.

The franchise agreements for more than 35 cities in Central Florida were up for renewal since 1995. Many cities, including Altamonte Springs, have resigned new agreements. All the contracts were very similar with almost identical language, Schluckebier said.

Attorney Tom Cloud and his firm Gray, Harris and Robinson represent several cities in their legal battles with Florida Power. Cloud has had numerous experiences with similar court cases, including successful cases in 1992 involving two Sarasota County cities that fought to purchase the water, sewer and gas systems.

Cloud said Florida Power's recent fight with cities "is just another smoke screen — anything they can do to confuse the cities they don't have a viable option."

While buying an electrical system carries a hefty sticker price that most cities are unable to afford, fighting Florida Power in the courtrooms may even have a steeper price.

"Florida Power is trying to spend these cities into the ground," Cloud said. "They're a classic monopoly."

Cloud said if Florida Power's strategy is to out spend municipalities with lengthy courtroom proceedings, the utility may be guilty of a Sherman Anti-Trust Act. He cited a 1972 case in which the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that Otter Tail Power Company was guilty of "engaging to prevent towns from

establishing their own power systems when Otter Tail's retail franchises expired."

"Has their conduct risen to that level? I don't know," Cloud said. "It's starting to look awfully like the Otter Tail Case."

Gail Simpson with Florida Power said many cities are underestimating the cost it takes to run an electrical system and the cost of five years of litigation.

"We've done the research and know how much it costs," Simpson said. "We don't want to get into litigation anymore than they do. These municipalization cases can take years. Unfortunately for Florida Power and the cities, we all lose in this except for the consultants and lawyers."

According to Simpson, Florida Power has an obligation to serve the public regardless of the franchise agreements. She said several cities in Florida do not have franchise agreements with the utility provider.

"Consultants express municipalization can be profitable (for cities), but they can't determine the costs up-front in litigation," she said.

According to Simpson, cities are not realizing that running an electrical company is "one of the most intensive capital businesses." Besides the poles and wires, cities are neglecting to account for the large staff needed to run an electrical system.

Simpson also said cities are not realizing the experience and depth of resources Florida Power offers to their customers. For example in a storm emergency, Florida Power can bring trucks and personnel from all over the state to remedy the problem.

"Sometimes it's better to walk away than fight for our rights," Lovstrand retorted.

Commissioner Butch Bundy agreed with Anderson. "At any point we can stop

this process," Bundy said. "They don't want to negotiate — they want to dictate."

stolen, or he may have wandered off — which to Sedigh is the most unlikely.

"I know he was probably taken on honest pretense," she said. "I just want him back. I cannot tell you how devastated I have been about his disappearance. I have loved Dino madly for the past three years."

Three years ago, Sedigh adopted Dino as a favor to a friend who could no longer take care of the gentle, but giant, lizard. Although it was the first time Sedigh had owned an iguana, she did her research and the two quickly became inseparable.

At his new home, Dino also became a bit spoiled. His favorite spot to sleep was in bed next to Sedigh and her dog, and he would only eat his vegetables off a plate.

"I even began to understand the way he communicated," she said. "Iguanas do a lot of head bobbing. It's their own language. When he bobbed his head a certain way, it meant he was hungry or he was saying 'hello'."

"I was amazed how intelligent iguanas are and how they have their own unique personalities."

Today, Sedigh said she regrets leaving Dino outside alone. She never imagined her pet would turn up missing. But, she is optimistic the iguana, which eats only leaves, buds, flowers, vegetables and fruits, is still alive. There's even been several Dino sightings.

After reporting his disappearance to the police, animal control and the Central Florida Zoological Park, Sedigh posted signs throughout her neighborhood. A couple weeks ago, some children saw what they believed to be Dino in the woods next to Sedigh's house.

And, on the Fourth of July, two women reported seeing a 5-foot striped tail on Elliott Avenue.

"But, they were too scared to see what was at the end of the tail," Sedigh said. "They went to the supermarket, and on their way, they saw one of my signs. When they returned home, they called me. But, by the time I got to where they saw the tail, whatever was there was gone."

Even though Sedigh is heartbroken about her lost iguana, she believes two good things have occurred as a result of his disappearance — Sabzi and

Marmalack, the two newest iguanas to join her family.

The two reptiles, whose names mean green and reptile in Persian, came to live with Sedigh after people found out she lost Dino. Although both came from loving homes, their owners could no longer take care of them.

"I feel like I was meant to take them in," she said. "But, I still want to get Dino back. And, I'll take him back with no questions asked."

KIKZ brings new kind of soccer to Seminole

LONGWOOD — If you enjoy playing soccer and are looking for the ultimate soccer experience, then stop in at KIKZ at Five Points Soccer Center and take part in a game of Five-A-Side.

The new indoor soccer facility is operated by Billy Buchanan, chief executive officer; Mike Harward, co-owner and Chris Surceoner, manager. Although Five Points has been synonymous with indoor soccer for more than 10 years, KIKZ opened its doors in April. The goal of the new owners, Buchanan said, is to establish Five Points as the premier soccer and leisure destination in Central Florida.

According to Surceoner, 5-a-side originated nearly 14-years ago in Scotland and is now very popular throughout the United Kingdom and Europe. "The United Kingdom now has over 100 of these centers," he said.

The game is a simplified version of soccer using five players instead of the traditional 11-a-side game. The playing area is also downsized — instead of one regular size soccer field, Five points has three playing courts. Each court, Surceoner said, is covered with a unique artificial surface manufactured by Astroplay. In addition to the padding under-

neath, the artificial surface has sand mixed in, which helps reduce knee and ankle injuries by providing a safer, more stable footing surface.

"Although you can still get an occasional 'strawberry'," Surceoner said smiling.

Several advantages to 5-a-side soccer, Surceoner pointed out, is it offers a fast and skillful style of play. Because the ball is never out of play, every player is constantly involved. The average player will have five times the amount of ball possession, compared to a player on an 11-a-side team.

"More ball contact will develop the player's touch and control skills," he said. Games are played indoors, so you never need to worry about the weather. Each game is 50 minutes long — 25 minutes a side. The higher scoring, faster paced game also appeals to the spectator.

Five Points offers a host of ways to join the fun:

- **Competitive leagues** — For beginners to advanced players. All age groups include men's and women's teams, co-ed teams, over 40 league, junior and youth league, and even children. 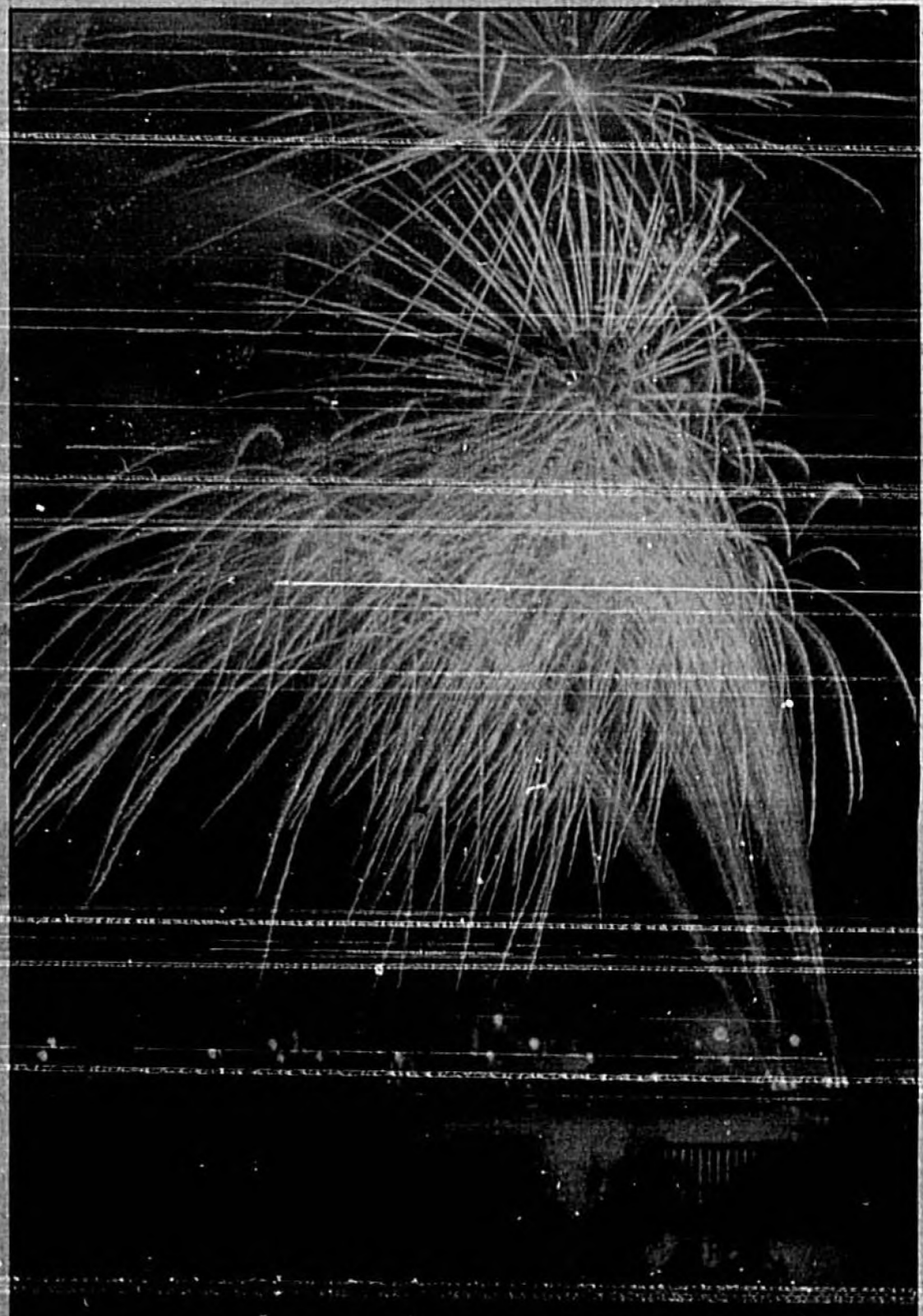

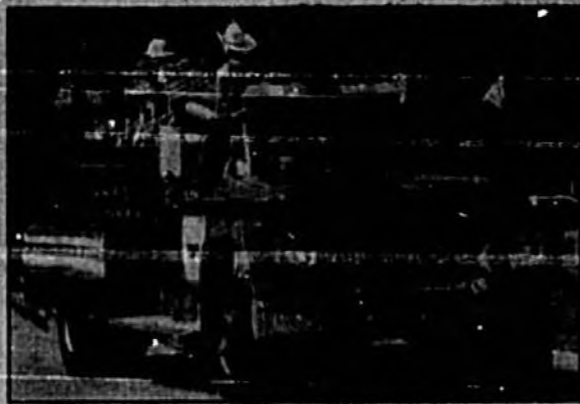

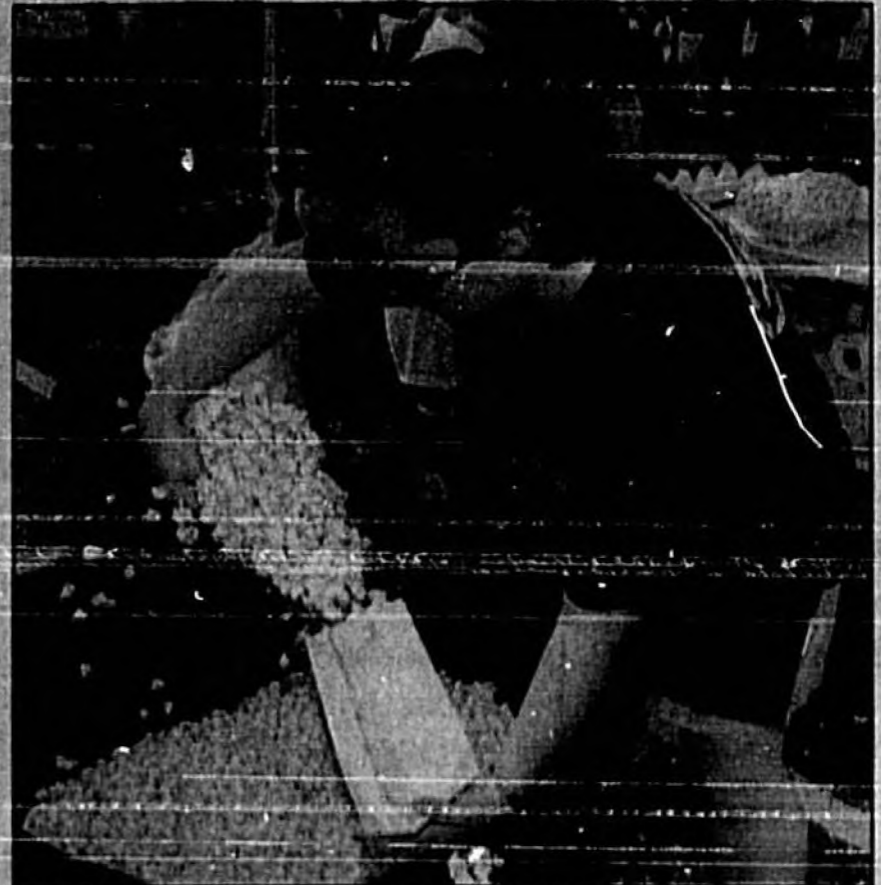

Boat ramp closed

GAINESVILLE — The Johns Lake Boat Ramp in east Lake County will be closed beginning July 12 until further notice. The ramp is located just south of State Road 50 west of Winter Garden. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) and the Lake County Board of County Commissioners are closing the lake because of damage occurring to the lake bottom as a result of people driving vehicles on the lakebed. The lakebed has been exposed because of the extended drought conditions, and it is a violation of state law to destroy state lands, which includes exposed lake bottoms.

SINCLAIR WINS DOLPHIN DERBY
KEY WEST — Findlay Sinclair of Key West scored the heaviest aggregate weight of dolphin during the 11th annual Key West Gator Club Dolphin Derby, that concluded Sunday, June 24. Fishing from his own boat, the "Offshore I," Sinclair and his son Hunter, of Austin, Tex., reeled in two dolphin totalling 81.7 pounds to clinch first place and a \$4,000 prize. Ending the first day of fishing in a close second place with a 37-pound fish, the duo didn't make their first second-day catch until noon. Subsequently, after catching a 30-pounder and a 42-pounder, they sighted the fish that would put them in the winners' circle. "We threw the spinner on him and it was a decent fight," said the elder Sinclair. "After about 40 minutes we got him on the boat, and that was it." Will Sims of Orlando caught the tournament's single largest dolphin, a 51.6-pounder that earned him a 40-hp Yamaha four-stroke engine. Sims, who fished aboard Captain Chip Veach's "Super Grouper" with his father, Bill Sims of Orlando, earned the second-place award and \$2,000 for a total aggregate weight of 74.7 pounds. The younger Sims also took home the award for top male angler, while Veach was named top charter boat captain. The tournament's most unusual catch didn't qualify for any prizes — but it gave Rene May of Key West what she calls "the best fishing day of my life." Fishing aboard the "Sailfish" with Captain Ralph Lennon, May caught and released a rare white marlin, measuring 7.5 feet and weighing an estimated 65 pounds, on Sunday. "It felt like a long fight, but it was about 28 minutes," said May. "It's the first white marlin Ralph and his mate have ever had on their boat, so they were tickled to death." The tournament provided a weekend of angling "firsts" for May. As well as her first marlin on Sunday, she captured her first sailfish on Saturday. The Dolphin Derby's top female angler was Kim McKendry of Key West, for her 42-pound dolphin. Her son, eleven-year-old Jesse Hammers, took the top junior angler award with his 33.2-pound catch. 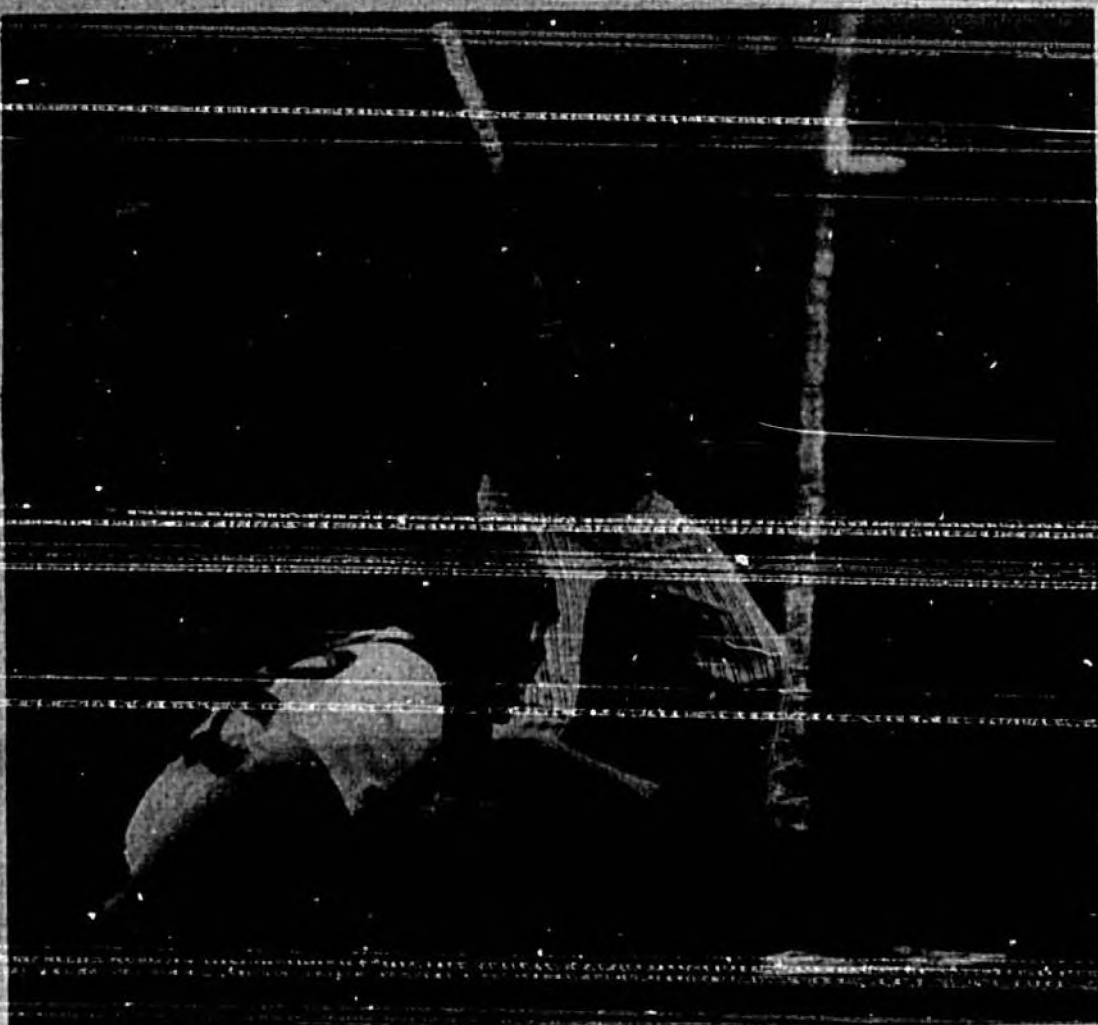

Colemans learn what it takes to patrol Sanford on bike

At 1000 hours, Kyle and Jayson Coleman make final preparations for the day's assignment. Helmet straps are tightened, a final safety check is conducted, and sunscreen is liberally applied. Their mission: To shadow Officer Ed Morales as he patrols the streets of Sanford on bike.

The three-hour tour of duty provided Kyle, 9, and Jayson, 14, a first-hand look at what it takes to be a bike cop, a valuable lesson for Kyle who is considering a career in public safety.

"I probably want to grow up to be a police officer," Kyle said. "Either that or a fireman."

Morales showed Kyle and Jayson the in's and out's of his beat, which includes the lakefront, the Historic District and portions of Georgetown. He also provided a tour of the police station and Fire Station No. 31.

"It was a lot of fun," Kyle said. "He's my favorite cop."

The boys got to know Morales because of his frequent stops at their parents' bakery (Tammy's Custom Bakery) on 2nd Street and Sanford Avenue.

"He's a good guy," Kyle said. "He stops in every day."

Police Chief Brian Tooley said the relationship Morales has built with the Colemans is what he envisioned when the department first began bike patrols.

"We get a lot of positive comments from the downtown business community about the job Ed and the other officers are doing," Tooley said. "He makes frequent stops by many of the businesses and is very visible downtown. That's what we expect."

Tooley said he was pleased Morales took initiative in offering Kyle and Jayson an opportunity to ride with the officer.

"We like the officers to take a little ownership of some of these different programs," Tooley said. While a regular youth ride-along program has not been established, Tooley said it is something the department is considering.

"It was a unique opportunity for Kyle and Jayson," Morales said. "It's not everyday that a young kid gets to ride with a law enforcement officer. It's a good way to interact with the public."

Morales said he would like to see the department create a standard operating procedure for youth ride-alongs. "Especially if we

get the same enthusiasm as we did with Kyle and Jayson.

Morales said during the safety checks, he instructed the boys on what to do if they came upon a situation or he had to respond to a call for service.

"Obviously, we didn't want to put them in harm's way," Morales explained. "We talked about how they should stay back away from the scene of any emergency that might occur."

Fortunately for Kyle and Jayson, no major incidents occurred, but that doesn't mean the duo didn't learn some important lessons.

"Officer Morales taught us the rules for safe biking, which are basically the same as driving a car," Kyle said. "He also showed us how to ride down stairs and how to do the power slide. What you do is go really fast, and then you slide the back end of the bike around. It helps you catch the bad guys."

"That was his favorite trick," Morales chuckled when told of Kyle's fascination with the power slide. "I showed them some of the different skills an officer must know in order to be a member of the bike patrol. You just can't jump on a bicycle

and be a bike cop. You have to have special training and be certified."

Jayson said he was impressed with Morales' knowledge of the beat.

"Everywhere we went he knew so many people," Jayson said. "When we rode along the lake he was waving and talking to all the people fishing. He knew them all."

"He knows a lot about alligators, too," said Kyle, who explained they took a short break to watch one of the Lake Monroe reptiles glide through the water.

Morales said one of the advantages of being a bike cop is the opportunity to learn the community.

"Being on the bike you get to hear and see things you don't in a patrol car," Morales said. "You get to know the people who live and work in the area. Most people are very happy to know the bike patrols are out there. It's been a great way to connect with the community."

Kyle and Jayson said they won't soon forget their ride with Morales or his willingness to help.

"It was really nice of him to let us go out with him," Kyle said.

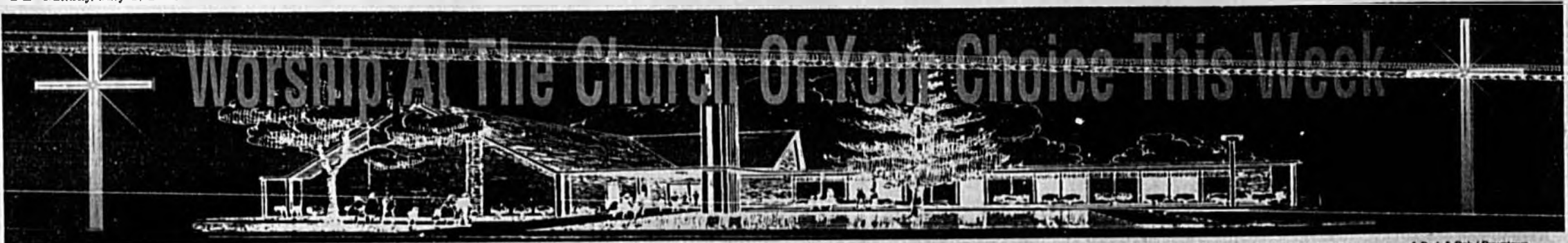

Dinner table not place for battle of wills

QUESTION: Should a parent try to force a child to eat?

DR. DOBSON: No. In fact, the dinner table is one potential battlefield where a parent can easily get ambushed. You can't win there!

A strong-willed child is like a good military general who constantly seeks an advantageous place to take on the enemy. He need look no farther. Of all the common points of conflict between generations — bedtime, hair, clothes, schoolwork, etc. — the advantages at the table are all in the child's favor. Three times a day, a very tiny child can simply refuse to open his mouth. No amount of coaxing can make him eat what he doesn't want to eat.

I remember one 3-year-old who was determined not to eat his green peas, despite the insistence of his father that the squishy little vegetables were going down. It was a classic confrontation between an irresistible force and an immovable object. Neither would yield. After an hour of haranguing, threatening, cajoling and sweating, the father had not achieved his goal. The tearful toddler sat with a forkload of peas pointed ominously at his sealed lips.

Finally, through sheer intimidation, the dad managed to get one bite of peas in place. But the lad wouldn't swallow them. I don't know everything that went on afterward, but the mother told me they had no choice but to put the child to bed with the peas still in his mouth. They were amazed at the strength of his will.

The next morning, the mother found a little pile of mushy peas where they had been expelled at the foot of the bed. Score one for Junior, none for Dad! Tell me in what other arena a 30-pound child could whip a 200-pound man?

Not every toddler is this tough, of course. But many of them will gladly do battle over food. It is their ideal power game. Talk to

any experienced parent or grandparent and they will tell you this is true. The sad thing is that these conflicts are unnecessary. Children will eat as much as they need if you keep them from indulging in the wrong stuff. They will not starve. I promise!

The way to deal with a poor eater is to set good food before him. If he claims not to be hungry, wrap the plate, put it in the refrigerator and send him cheerfully on his way. He'll be back in a few hours.

There is a little mechanism in his tummy that says "Gimme food!" several times a day. When this occurs, do not put sweets or snacks in front of him. Simply retrieve the earlier meal, warm it up and serve it again. If he protests, send him out to play.

Even if 12 hours or more go by, continue this procedure until food — all food — begins to look and smell wonderful. From that time forward, the battle over the dinner table should be history.

QUESTION: What's the appeal of all the human suffering and violence on television and in movies? Why do people want more of it?

DR. DOBSON: I'm sure it has something to do with our desire for excitement and our need to escape from the boring existence many people experience. But I have to admit I don't fully understand it. It is difficult to comprehend why people enjoy watching such bloody events.

A number of years ago, the No. 1 television program in the entire year, watched by more people than all the sporting events or any other single program in the course of the 12-month period, was "Helter-Skelter," the story of the Charles Manson "family." One incident in that TV special was the murder of a woman, eight months pregnant, who was brutally stabbed in the abdomen. Why would anyone want to see

such brutality? The popularity of that program and others like it speaks dramatically about the depravity of the American people and our lust for violence.

faced a generation of babies making babies. Lost are the values for strong families and responsible adults. All over this nation, the Central Florida Community included, there is a crisis with teen pregnancy. The government, private, non-profits and faith communities are addressing this concern with the utmost urgency. Three years ago, the Grove Counseling Center of Seminole County developed a team of community partners to address this concern in Seminole County. The Grove was a recipient of a Department of Health and Human Services Grant. Emory University of Atlanta served as the fiscal agent for the three-year grand period. The Seminole Teen Options Program, known as STOP, was implemented in two Seminole County Middle Schools, Millennium and Sanford Middle, formerly Lakeview.

The Seminole Teen Options Program is a teen pregnancy prevention program. It serves seventh and eighth grade students from Sanford and Millennium Middle Schools. The program format consists of four, six-week cycles. Students meet after school two times a week and on Saturdays for six-weeks. The program addresses the role-play issues that leads to teen pregnancy. Staff facilitates groups that include but not limited to: self-awareness, decision-making, alcohol, tobacco and drug awareness, anger management, conflict resolution, peer pressure and assertiveness. The Grove's Adventure Based Counseling (ROPES) course helps to build confidence, social skills and teamwork. Planned Parenthood of Greater Orlando provides a prevention curriculum that deals with sexual transmitted diseases, the human anatomy and assertiveness skills. Tajiri School of Performing Arts and

Academics introduces students to entrepreneurship, creative African Dance, dramas and other cultural enrichment entities. Seminole County Healthy Start Coalition works with students through their Monday's Child video, which depict local teens that had become pregnant and share their experience as a means to teen pregnancy prevention. STOP, ROPES, Planned Parenthood, Tajiri, Healthy Start and the Grove create a partnership with the same vision — reducing teen pregnancies in Seminole County.

The program is in its final year under the Department of Health and Human Service grant. We can proudly say of the 200 students served in three years there were no reports of teen pregnancies or teen fathers. Further testament of the program's success lies in the fact that the Seminole Teen Options Program was chosen at a 2000 Disney Award recipient in the area of community service. Based on STOP's success Planned Parenthood of Greater Orlando chose to replicate this model in five middle schools in Orange County.

Programs of this caliber are very much needed to prevent teen pregnancies in our communities. If you are interested or would like more information, contact Larry Dorsey, project coordinator at 407-839-0133 or 407-327-1765, ext. 203.

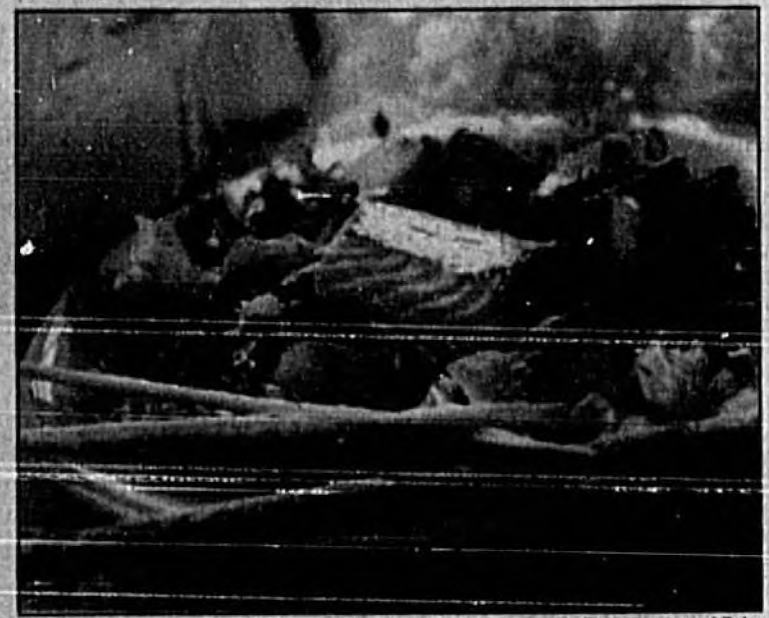

Grilled Salmon, Asparagus and Potato Salad

When summer heat calls for meals that are cool and quick, grilling is the answer. Since 75 percent of U.S. households own a barbecue, grilling ingredients for a light summer salad is possible for practically any family. And, while Mom and Dad are doing the grilling, the kids can be in charge of tossing together the salad ingredients.

You won't have any trouble convincing seafood lovers to try Grilled Salmon, Asparagus and Potato Salad. Craving a heartier salad? Dish up Grilled Pork and Wild Mushroom.

Grilled Salmon, Asparagus and Potato Salad

Preparation: 20 minutes, Grill: 12 minutes

Servings: 3

- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1/4 cup olive or vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1 shallot, minced
- 8 ounces new potatoes, cut in 1/2-inch pieces
- 1/2 Dole Asparagus Spears, cut into 1-inch lengths (1 1/2 cups)
- 1 red or yellow bell pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 12 ounces salmon filet
- 1 bag (8 to 12 ounces) lettuce spring mix or romaine salad blend

Combine lemon juice, oil, mustard and shallot in shaker jar. Cover, shake until blended. Pour 1/4 cup dressing in small bowl, set aside remaining for salad.



Place potatoes in shallow microwave-safe dish with 1/4 cup water. Cover, microwave

on HIGH for five to six minutes or until nearly tender. Drain well. Place fish, potatoes, asparagus and bell pepper pieces in shallow dish. Pour 1/4 cup dressing over fish and vegetables; turn to coat.

Remove salmon. Grill or broil salmon for five minutes. Place potato, asparagus and bell pepper pieces on grilling rack or broiler pan. Continue grilling salmon and vegetables for six minutes or until salmon flakes easily and vegetable are tender.

Toss together salad blend and vegetables with reserved dressing in bowl. Line three individual plates with salad. Arrange salmon over each salad.

Grilled Pork and Wild Mushroom Salad

Preparation: 15 minutes, Grill: 25 minutes

Servings: 3

- 1/3 cup olive or vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons balsamic or red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh basil leaves or 2 teaspoons dried basil leaves, crushed
- 3 boneless pork chops (about 3/4-inch thick)
- 6 ounces fresh portabella mushrooms or large button mushrooms
- 1 package (8 to 12 ounce) Italian or hearts of Romaine mix salad blend

Combine oil, vinegar, mustard and basil in small bowl, stirring until blended. Remove 1/4 cup for pork; cover and refrigerate remaining dressing for salad.

Grill or broil pork 10 to 15 minutes on each side or until pork is no longer pink in center, brushing occasionally with 1/4 cup dressing and adding mushrooms the last five to 10 minutes of grilling. Discard any remaining dressing. Cut pork and mushrooms into slices.

Toss together salad blend with reserved dressing in bowl. Line three individual plates with salad. Arrange pork and mushrooms over salad.

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
