# Herlong Ready To Call It Quits

U. S. Rep. A. S. Herlong Jr. will open the door to the 1968 political season in Florida Saturday morning when he is expected to announce his retirement from the political arena. Earlier this week he issued a call for a press conference at his home in Leesburg for tomorrow morning.

Herlong, himself, was between Washington and Leesburg this morning, and unavailable for comment, while his Capitol aides at Washington refused comment by telephone, saying, "The Congressman desires to make his own announcement at 9:30 Saturday morning at his home."

Herlong will announce his retirement at the end of his term next year and it may be that Herlong will join former Congressman George Cox in the Senate.

## Legislators Say 'No' To Urban Renewal

Delegation Irked At City  
TALLAHASSEE (Sp) - Proposed legislation supporting urban renewal in the City of Sanford was "killed" for at least two years by the Seminole-Orange delegation here last night.

Sen. Robert Elrod, delegation chairman, said the group turned "thumbs down" on the measure because of a "strong feeling against urban renewal."  
The delegation also was irked at the City of Sanford for submitting the legislation after the normal deadline for dropping bills in the hopper.

This bill could have been submitted as an "emergency" measure but would have required a two-thirds vote in the House for permission to file after the deadline.

FTU Access Roads In Bond Issue  
TALLAHASSEE (Sp) - Seminole-Orange legislative delegation has been successful in including in a statewide road construction bill in new construction totaling \$5,005,000 for Seminole County, subject to statewide referendum in Gov. Claude Kirk's \$375 million road bond issue, Sen. Robert Elrod reported today.

Three access roads primarily to serve Florida Technological University located on SR 520, three miles south of Oviedo, are included in the bill which will come to a vote of the Senate road committee next Tuesday.

The roads are 6.5 miles from SR 520 at Iron Bridge Road to SR 419; one mile of SR 620 at county line to Iron Bridge Road and 6.5 miles of Redbury Road from SR 426 to SR 428. Included in the issue will be construction costs and one-half of right-of-way costs.

Other roads to be in the bond issue are 6.85 miles from SR 426 from Oviedo to Goldenrod; 4.42 miles of SR 426 from Orange County to 1-4; two miles of SR 415 between French River and 1-4 (four lanes of road along Lake Monroe); 7.23 miles of SR 426 between Oviedo and Geneva, according to Senator Elrod. Estimated costs of all the Seminole roads in the bond issue is \$5,005,000.

## Work Due On Paulucci Complex

Construction of the tallest building in the county to be located at Seminole Blvd. and Melonville will start within the next few months, Architect Douglas Kelley reported today.

Kelley made the statement after the Board of Adjustment yesterday approved a variance for the proposed new eight-story Paulucci Building that will have 15,000 square feet of office space.

Paulucci is planning a 131 foot structure. Present city law requires no building in a neighborhood commercial area to be more than 35 feet. Indications are that Paulucci plans to bring the bulk of his Duluth, Minn. operation here - involving some 100 families.

Radio Station WTRR manager Bill Reek said he was concerned that the height of the building could affect his transmitting tower. However, Ovid Ganno, a radio engineer associated with the University of Florida, emphasized that in his opinion there would be no material change in the transmitting pattern.

Reek also stressed the Paulucci Building would be a great asset to Sanford and "we don't plan to stand in their way."  
The entire project will be done in two phases, Paulucci told the Herald this afternoon. The first phase will be completed within two years, he added.

Reek indicated there was a change in his organization relating to the tower and that he was "working with the Paulucci interests to resolve this problem."  
Kelley, in making his presentation to the adjustment board, pointed out that out of 45,000 square feet, at least 50 percent would be utilized for a parking area.

He said the area contemplated for the first phase of construction will be 15,000 square feet with office space on levels 2, 3 and 4.

The first level would have a reception area, lobby "along with provisions for vehicular and pedestrian egress beneath the surface."  
Kelley said that great emphasis will be placed on verticality, both in esthetic and functional design consideration.

The board, in unanimously approving the variance said it would pave the way for beautifying the lakefront with modern-day skyscraper complex.

Do Not Disturb

One may walk down the corridor of any modern day motel and he will see signs on the doors almost any morning (Sunday included) "Please do not disturb." Of course, some people are getting some much needed rest and they need to be left alone. Others may be hiding from or running from responsibility. The sign on the motel door suggests two meanings to me.

First of all we do need to enter some closet door of privacy and pray to God. This is what Jesus encouraged. "But when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to the Father which is in secret, and the Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly." (Matt. 6:6). Our praying is not to be heard of men but it is to gain a hearing from God. We need those "do not disturb," periods when we practice the wonderful privilege of prayer.

Are you left your room this morning. Did you think to pray? In the name of Christ, our Saviour, Did you see for loving favor, As a shield today?

The "do not disturb" sign also reminds us of the response of many people to the apostle invitation and gracious promise of the Son of God. "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If any man hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to him and will sup with him, and he with me." (Rev. 3:20). Man in his natural state tends to prefer to be left alone. "All we like sheep have gone astray. We have turned every one on his own way." (Isaiah 53:6). In the privacy of our own personal pursuits and pleasures we want to be left alone. We post the "do not disturb," placard and wander on astray. The Lord of life, Jesus Christ, wants to lead us to salvation from our sin and to satisfying service. He wants to come into our lives and be our savior and guide.

In response to many of the deep needs of the world we also prefer not to be disturbed. So many cases of persons refusing to get involved are reported almost daily. Persons in distress are passed by because of the fear of added responsibility. We just hang out the "do not disturb," sign so often and do nothing.

The most happy people in the world today are those who have been "disturbed" by the Bible's message of sin and judgment, who have been awakened from their spiritual sleep, and who live in daily awareness of the love of Christ Jesus, our Lord. On the doors of their hearts is inscribed the loving invitation: Redeemer, come! I open wide My heart to thee here, Lord, abide! Let me Thine inner presence feel, Thy grace and love in me reveal!

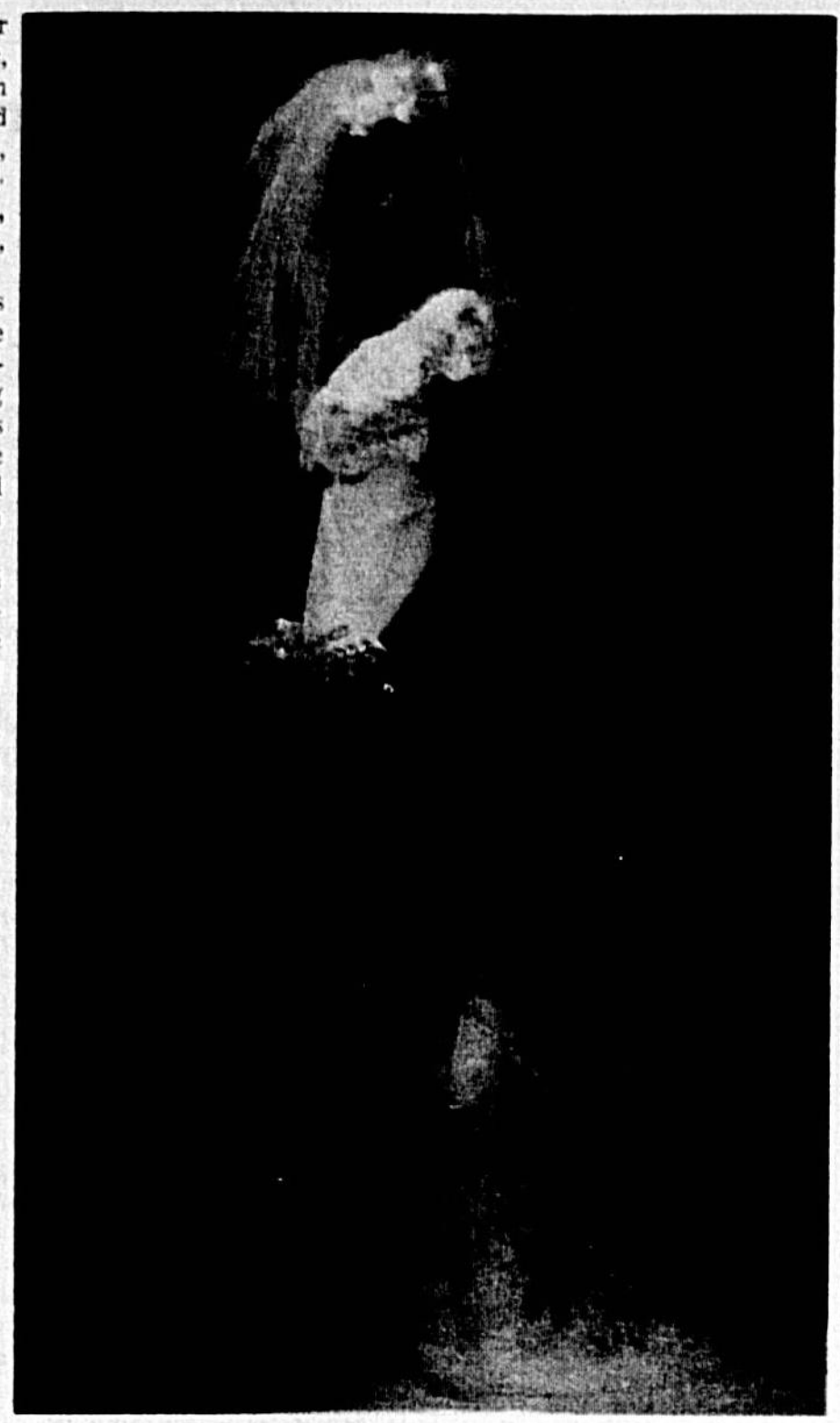

## Liberalized Abortion Law Hits Roadblock

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The Florida Medical Association's plan to liberalize the state's 99-year-old abortion law ran into a roadblock in the House Anti-Crime Committee Thursday.

After a two-hour discussion and a number of amendments, the committee defeated the House version of the bill by a 6-4 vote, 11 to 6.

Fisher, a sponsor of the Senate version, said the lawmakers should allow doctors to make the decision whether abortions were necessary.

Fisher said he had hoped to get the House bill, already approved by the House Health and Welfare Committee, to the floor as soon as the first of several lengthy amendments were accepted. He said the drastic change killed the bill.

The present law allows abortion only to save the life of the mother. Upon approval of three physicians, the proposed bill would have allowed abortions in cases of rape or incest, where there was probability of serious physical or mental injury to the mother.

Rep. Ed Whitson, R-Clearwater, was one of several committee members who proposed amendments to the proposal and then voted against it.

Whitson said he offered the changes to point out deficiencies in the bill. He said he voted against the bill because there was not a chance at this late stage of the Legislature that the amendments would stay on through House debate and the necessary Senate approval.

Rep. Maurice Ferré, D-Miami, delivered an emotional plea for public television to be funded on philosophical grounds. He said the question touched the heart of philosophy of government because the strength of the country was based on the dignity of the human being.

Ferré said the liberalized basis for abortions would be in effect condemning an unborn child and "taking the life of a child because of inconvenience."

Rep. Walter Sackett, D-Miami, a doctor, admitted his Catholic religion made it morally wrong for him to perform an abortion but said it did not bind others.

"I do not feel I can do the hands of a doctor doing something that he feels is absolutely the best treatment for his patient," he said.

Jack Peoples, attorney for the medical association told the committee that the bill substantially strengthens Florida's abortion law.

He said it would make it easier to prosecute an unjustified abortion and would require that the doctor be accredited.
