Life Insurance Paid Florida Families

NEW YORK CITY, May 23. (Special)—Florida families received \$4,515,000 in life insurance death benefit payments in 1944, the highest in the state's history, according to the Institute of Life Insurance reported today. These payments reflect the greater war mortality under the intensified activities on all war fronts," the Institute said in announcing the figures. "The payments in this state were 10.5% greater than those of the same period of 1944 entirely due to the war-caused deaths, as the civilian death rate on the home front has shown a material decrease under a year ago. Nationally, this has meant many millions of dollars going to the families of service men killed in action or who died in service. These payments are in addition to those made under National Service Life Insurance."

Victory Gardens Are Urged As Way To Fight Rationing

WASHINGTON.—This year's Victory Garden effort promises to be the biggest since the program started in 1942.
Because of high prices, the shortage of canned vegetables, and the prospect of a meat famine for civilians next summer the Department of Agriculture estimates the number of Victory Gardens will exceed 20 million—the high mark reached in 1943.
The War Food Administration says gardens will be more necessary in 1945 than they were in 1944, when some 18,500,000 were planted. Victory Garden interest slumped in March 1944, when the OPA took many canned products off ration lists. Then when the Allies swept across France that summer, many people assumed the European war would soon be over and there would be no need for a big garden program in 1945.
This year, however, more food will go to more fighting men overseas. Food authorities say that even after war ends in Europe all the garden stuff that can be grown will be needed. Large numbers of service men will not be demobilized until both Japan and Germany are defeated. Furthermore, people in the liberated countries will need large supplies for some time.
The outlook for gardening materials is generally good. Crops of vegetable seeds last year were bumper in most areas. There may be some bottlenecks in deliveries, so gardeners are urged to

order seed, fertilizer and insecticide early. The fertilizer situation is not as good as a year ago but there should be enough for most gardeners.

The Department recommends long-season gardens wherever possible—the planting of early crops and late ones, often for two or three harvests from a single row. Details of succession planting should be settled well in advance of the first planting so the ground can produce continually during the season.
Employers are urged to encourage employee's gardening, perhaps providing the land and plowing. The Department emphasizes the importance of experienced local garden leaders. Much of the success of the program is attributed to these old-timers.
The average garden should be more productive this year. Gardeners have learned by experience what kinds of vegetables fit the needs and tastes of their families. They also have learned what grows best in various soils and how to fight plant insects and diseases.
The tomato is by far the most popular of Victory Garden vegetables. Sampling surveys made last year by the Bureau of Agri-

cultural Economics showed that tomatoes were grown in about 40 out of every 100 war-time gardens. Onions, radishes and lettuce were favorites everywhere. Snap beans, wax beans, beets, carrots and peppers were generally popular.

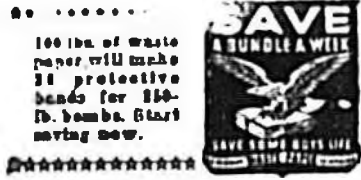

## Himmler Takes Own Life With Poison Dose

### "Butcher Of Paris" Karl Oberg, Taken Alive At Hideout; Ribbentrop Loose

SECOND ARMY HEADQUARTERS, May 25, (AP)—Army officials today remained undecided whether to hold a funeral for Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler in the presence of captured German military and civilian bigwigs. The body still lay on the bare floor of the Lüneburg villa 88 hours after his poison suicide death. It was generally suspected that former Nazi Foreign Minister Ribbentrop—the only high Nazi not yet captured or reported dead—was somewhere in the British sector in northwest Germany.

At Kutzbühl, Germany, General Karl Oberg, former chief of all German SS and police activities in occupied France was captured at mountain hideout by the 101st Airborne and 42nd divisions. He was known as the "Butcher of Paris."

Himmler died wearing only his socks. He had been stripped for examination. The examining doctor, looking for concealed poison, put his finger in Himmler's mouth. Himmler jerked back and bit on a tiny phial of cyanide tablets which he had concealed in his mouth.

## Big Five Hold On To Control Of Peace Plan

### OPA Is Reported Planning Drastic Cut In Sugar Allotments; French Hit France

The big powers were reported today to have lined up enough votes in the United Nations conference to block any change in their absolute control of the world machinery designed to produce peace. The decisive blow was struck as the conference entered its second month at Secretary of State Stettinius' turn in Washington.

In Washington a Congressional food investigator said the OPA is planning a drastic curtailment of industrial sugar which will cut the manufacturers to half their 1944 supply or less. The new reduction will be effective July 1, said a law maker who asked not to be named. He said he did not know if the restriction could be extended to household sugar supplies.

In Paris the French Foreign Affairs Committee recommended the government break relations with Spain and that France propose to other Allies that money be taken to force the resignation of Generalissimo Franco of Spain. The recommendation asserted the Franco regime was no different from the erstwhile Fascist government of Italy before its surrender. It termed the Spanish regime a menace to world democracy.

WASHINGTON, May 25, (AP)—President Truman served notice today that the government will make an efficient, smoothly-run business at least cost and with fewer personnel.

Continuing his vigorous shake-up of the administration, he invited six weeks ago, he asked congress for authority to make permanent changes and consolidations in the unwieldy executive branch.

"A well organized executive branch will be more efficient than a poorly organized one," he said (Continued on Page Three)

American Superfortresses struck Tokyo in large force today, perhaps duplicating the 30 plane attack two days ago. Guam reported they dropped more than 100 tons of bombs on Tokyo's Maritime business district and the imperial government center.

Japanese counter landings on Okinawa and the Central China coast were reported today. Allied infantrymen swept through five more towns and began mopping up in three scattered sectors.

Sixty Mustang fighters and a few Superfortresses attacked the Tokyo area still smoldering from the second B-29 raid yesterday. Japanese broadcast that the attack was repulsed.

At the same time, Japanese reported that they had captured an American B-29 bomber on the ground in the vicinity of the city of Yawata.

On the west coast, the Sixth Division of Marines landed in strength into Naha. The 7th cap (Continued on Page Three)

## Truckers Union Is Denounced By Farm Bureau

### New York Group Demands Drivers Join Union To Join

Protest by the Seminole County Farm Bureau against a new ruling by an AFL union which would compel all drivers of incoming trucks of produce to join the union before they would be allowed to unload their trucks in New York City, will be made in Florida representatives and senators in Washington, and the State Farm Bureau will also be requested to take up the matter, it was announced today by M. L. Callum, president of the county farm bureau.

This decision to protest what is termed an unfair practice on the part of the AFL union, which union, was reached Wednesday evening at a special Farm Bureau meeting held in the office of County Agent C. R. Dawson.

For a number of years the union would not allow drivers of out-of-state trucks of produce to unload in New York, but furnished union men at \$1.35 an hour to do the unloading, said Mr. Callum. Now the union, short of help, announces it will discontinue this "tax" on delivery and have asserted that drivers may themselves unload their produce on condition that they join the AFL union.

Initiation fee for joining the union is reported to be \$50 and two months dues, at \$3 a month are required. The AFL, porter union members will not touch produce to unload it from out-of-town trucks unless the driver can show his union card, according to information received here from shipper's representatives in New York.

Most fishing licenses, which are good for one year, are secured either at the beginning of the bass season or at the start of the hunting season in the Fall, as it is easier for sportsmen securing licenses to remember when they expire by getting them at those times.

## Vegetable Shipments Up Since Last Year

LAKELAND, May 25. (Special) — With 90 percent of the 1944-45 Florida vegetable season now in, shipment tabulations of the Florida Vegetable Committee this week revealed that the industry had sent by May 12, 27,500 more carloads of produce into northern markets this year than were shipped during the corresponding period a year ago, an increase of five and a half percent, according to LaMonte Gray, Manager of the Committee.

The increase of 27,500 carloads represents a net figure on the overall picture, because some commodities showed a decrease in shipments under a year ago. Among these were beans, cabbage, eggplant, lettuce, English peas and peppers which combined to show a total decrease of 4,570 carloads.

However, celery, cucumbers, greenole, white potatoes, tomatoes and mixed carloads built up a combined increase of 6,946 carloads over the same period a year ago.

A outstanding factor for the betterment of the industry and its market was revealed in the boost of 23,360 carloads of mixed vegetables over last year. The total figure of 20,000 mixed cars represents a 35 percent increase over last year's 14,800 percent increase over 1941-42.

The constructive tendency of growers and shippers to send more mixed carloads to the north, said Gray, "should have a most beneficial effect in broadening the market for Florida vegetables."

### Celery Shipped This Year May Pass Last Year

(Continued From Page One) far during the week from Sarasota which indicates the deal there is about over. A total of 2,094 cars from Sarasota this year is heavier than the 1,885 total of 1944.

The lower East Coast shipped only 16 cars this week for a season total of 2,272 as compared

with 2,630 for last season. This light shipment for the week indicates the deal there is about over also.

Other Florida sections which would include Weirsdale and Island Grove new deals shipped 40 cars on Monday and Tuesday. The season total there is 157 cars compared to 80 cars last year.

A recent survey of the central Florida output indicates that there are about 700 cars of celery remaining to be shipped during the rest of the season. Of this amount 244 cars will be Pascal and 456 Golden variety Zellwood mucklands in which Sanford and Oviedo growers have large interests will lead with 155 cars. Oviedo grown celery will come next with 91. Weirsdale with 85 and Island Grove, 75. Rain is reported to have cut the Oviedo output some.

Markets Tuesday were firm, except for a dull New York market with premium larger size bringing \$5.50 to \$6.50 a crate. Small sizes ran from \$2.50 to \$4.00, according to grade. Philadelphia was strong on Pascal and dull on Golden Heart.

New and improved methods of production have been developed in Sanford having a bumper sweet corn crop for shipment this season. Not only from the eastern seaboard but from Cleveland and Chicago have come reports that these very edible varieties of golden corn are the "finest ever," according to shippers.

M. L. Callum, president of the Seminole County Farm Bureau, revealed that acreage devoted to sweet corn this year is probably nearly 500 acres. He estimated that the corn shipped out of the county last year was 1,000 carloads, would total 140 cars and predicted that from 500 to 1,000 carloads would be shipped out of this section next year.

This provides a valuable new industry for the county which shipped only about 10 carloads of corn last year. It may even cover the cost of summer labor on some farms. The Sanford sweet corn yields seem very well adapted for the corn which is planted soon after early celery is cut. After the corn is harvested, the land is usually planted to celery. In other cover crops to enrich the soil during the summer months until the celery is set out again.

Aside from the golden varieties of corn, a large variety of white silver variety grown on the east side is finding much favor at Sanford retail outlets.

Locally grown tomatoes of a considerably fine quality are bringing \$8.50 to \$3.50 a crate at the Sanford State Farmers Market. This is, however, quite a jump from the previous \$3 to \$5 a crate. Prices for the small Florida product that prevailed a while ago. Reduced prices are probably due to the fact that truckers have come to buy at the market since the truck making houses ended their season.

(Continued From Page One) tured two villages near Shuri. The Chinese, sweeping toward the Japanese corridor to Indochina, engulfed Hwajiyanchen and to north east within 10 miles of Suifu. In a belated effort to halt the Chinese counter-offensive in the Poochow area, the Japanese landed reinforcements from warships north of that front East China port.

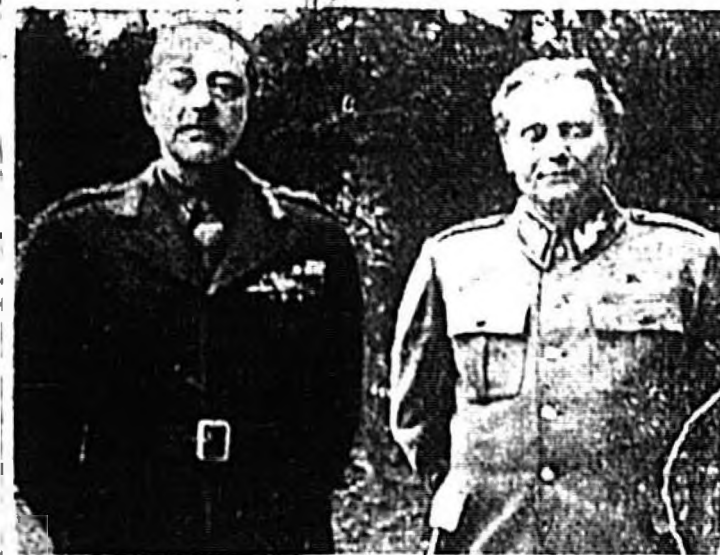
The mopping-up stage was reached on Mindanao Island in the southern Philippines after the Yanks completed two junctions. Mopping-up also was started in the Iloilo Dam area on Luzon. In Burma, the British found the river port of Basaen deserted by the Japanese. Tokyo forced a possible Allied landing on Amami Island in the northern Ryukyus, 200 miles south of Japan, admitting Japanese suicide tactics couldn't halt the American advance.

About 100 carrier-based planes bombed Kyushu, southernmost of the Japanese home islands, yesterday. Tokyo broadcasts said, atacking barely 12 hours after midnight. The planes were reported to have dropped incendiary bombs through the Shingawa industrial district of Tokyo in the war's greatest incendiary assault.

While Tokyo told of this second air attack May 21, Gen. Lauris, 21st bomber command on Guam, said losses in the attacks on Tokyo by carrier-based bombers have been expected light and that recent night were achieving greater results than the greatest attacks mounted on Germany.

Raid Air Bases The Japanese raids said that about 4 P.M. Thursday, Japanese carrier fighters and Martin bombers began raiding Japanese air bases on Kyushu, continuing the attack for about two hours.

Tokyo during the past week Tokyo has received Allied naval task forces on the coast in the Pacific and speculated nervously of strikes against the Japanese homeland. Tokyo Japanese claims said that the attacking planes approached their targets from the sea west of Kyushu, in the South China sea. They came in over both the southern coast and southern-tem portions of Kyushu, the enemy said.

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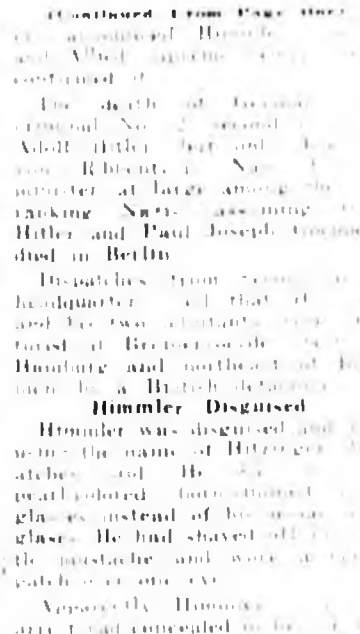

### ATC To Fly 50,000 Men A Month From European Fighting Fronts

MIAMI, May 25. (Special)—Florida's airways this week marked a new milestone with the Air Transport Command's fourth anniversary. They also look for busier times in the coming fifth year as ATC steps into the biggest job in the history of air transportation—the flying movement of 50,000 fighting men each month from European battle fronts to the States and additional thousands across long Pacific supply routes to the Pacific war.

Along its 16,000 air line miles, several thousands of which criss-cross Florida, ATC flies daily an average of 2 million miles, the line equivalent of 28 times round the world at the equator. Regular scheduled flights bring back more than 4,000 sick and wounded in air evacuation planes each month with more than a thousand of these coming home via Florida.

Florida, as an important port of aerial entry, also has figured heavily in the receipt of strategic materials flown from foreign producing areas. More than 90 per cent of the foreign air freight coming to American factories for processing flies through Florida.

No single item can be described as "typical" freight carried by the Air Transport Command's planes foreign and one domestic flight. Pilots at the three major ATC bases in Florida—Hollywood, Miami and Morrison Army Air Fields—have memories of the varied cargoes they have carried in transport cabins. One flyer tells of his favorite passenger, a falcon, which he carried across the Himalayas to China. The falcon was to be used by Chinese ground troops for killing Japanese aircraft. Accompanying the falcon on his ATC flight was a box of mice which served as in-flight lurch for the bird.

Another strange air cargo left Florida last week buckled into transport cabins a locomotive which was carried piecemeal to Moulbatten in Burma. On the eve of European D-Day, fifty five thousand pounds of mine-cutting equipment were flown to Britain's Navy along with hundreds of roll of luminous tape for Allied paratroopers' helmet makers.

### Heavy Late Bloom Is Seen For Citrus

LAKELAND, May 25. (Special)—Many Florida citrus growers studying the results of one of the longest "two rain" periods in many years are freely predicting an exceptionally heavy late bloom, especially if there is substantial rainfall in the next several weeks.

Figures compiled by the Florida Citrus Commission indicate that for the seven-year period, 1937-28 to 1943-44, rainfall for the six months, November to April inclusive, deemed the critical period for moisture, averaged 44.14 inches.

But, in the same six months, 1944-45, the rainfall in the same areas was only 41.92 inches, and these figures are compiled from 25 selected stations which blanket the citrus area.

Growers should note a three-month period, February, March and April, about 25 stations showed an average of 2.55 inches of rain in the same months of the seven year period, but for this year the average is only 2.46 inches, showing a deficiency of almost six inches.

Observers have noted a close parallel between the current season's lack of rainfall and the situation in the 1937-38 season when the trees put out a heavy late bloom.

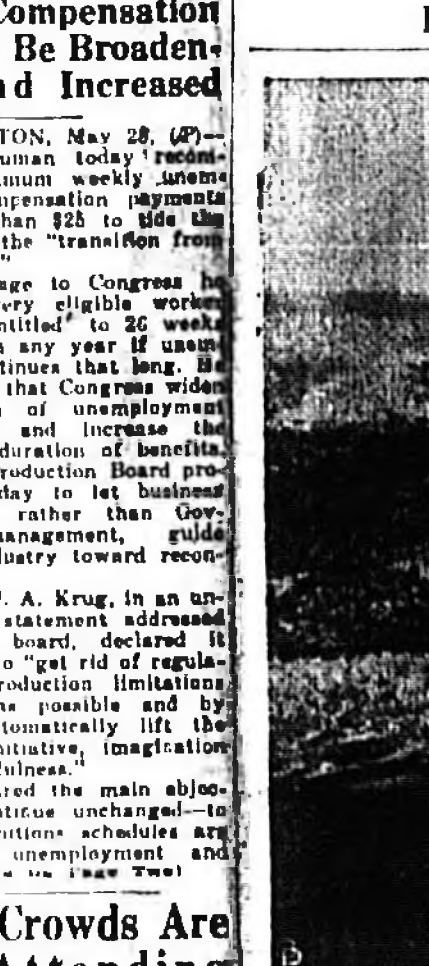

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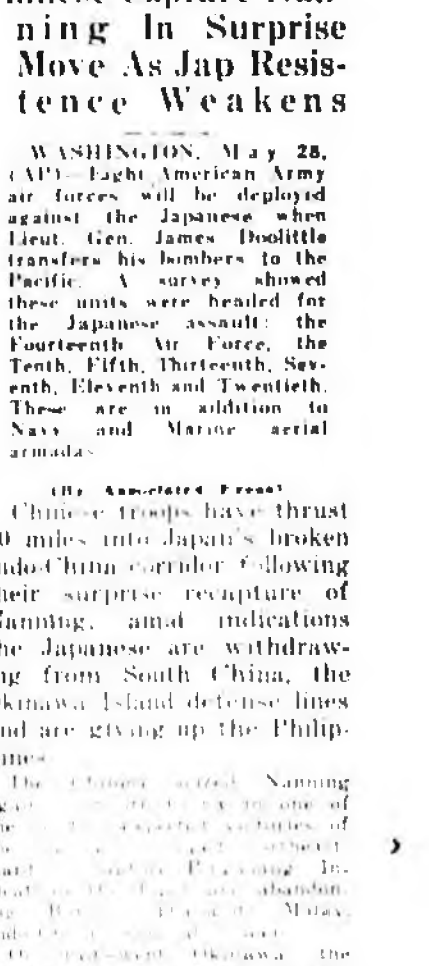
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
