Bright Economic Report May Help Carter

WASHINGTON (UPI)—In a major turnaround for the economy, the government reported today the Gross National Product grew at an annual rate of 1 percent in the third quarter on heavy consumer spending.

The jump in economic output in a July-September period followed a record 9.6 percent decline in the second quarter, the Commerce Department said.

The report, one of the last major economic barometers before the Nov. 4 election, could be a major boost in President Carter's battle for the White House with Republican Ronald Reagan.

The preliminary report of a 1 percent annual rise in the GNP—which measures the value of American goods and services in a calendar quarter adjusted for inflation—will be revised next month.

The government attributed the GNP rise to a sharp boost in consumer spending, including purchases of new 1981 model automobiles. Such spending has fallen sharply in the April-June quarter.

The report said economic output increased at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 0.2 percent in the third quarter of the year.

The Commerce Department said business stock inventories were drawn down sharply in the third quarter, falling by \$17.9 billion compared to an \$11.4 billion increase in the second.

Smaller inventories means manufacturers are drawing on stocks to meet production needs.

Layer, Hughes Debate Issues

Bob Hughes is concerned with communication and morale in the schools, but William "Bud" Layer says these aren't even issues.

A small but concerned group attended a debate Thursday between candidates Layer and Hughes, who are running for Seminole County Superintendent of Schools. The debate was held at the Welaka Building, 107 1/2 N. Oak Ave., Sanford.

Although both candidates were supposed to give short presentations of their issues, Layer mostly rebutted what Hughes said in his opening remarks.

Hughes, who spoke first at the meeting sponsored by Seminole County Resources for Human Needs Committee, said open communication with employees, agencies that work with the school district and board members is needed.

"We need communication to get information out to the public," said Hughes, who is the principal at Sabal Point Elementary, Longwood.

"A good public relations program should be set up," he said. Layer, who is running for his third consecutive four-year term, said the "best public relations program should be the kids' daily contact with their teacher and then going home and telling their parents they had a pleasant experience at school."

Hughes said "we need to provide a positive learning environment for the kids and those who work at the schools."

Some of the successes over the past eight years have included good programs and competent staff to carry out the programs, and the district was ranked by the U.S. Department of Education as number one in cost effectiveness, Layer said.

Layer said he supports the Equal Rights Amendment and the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT), abortion, prayer in the public schools, the Equal Rights Amendment and Congressional ball out of New York, Chrysler and Lockheed.

Both gave their unqualified support to assisting and aiding Israel.

McCollum said while SALT is an admirable goal, the U.S. should not consider the treaty at the time because of Russian aggression.

Best said SALT is not based on the nation trusting the Soviet Union. "It's in the best interests of the United States to enter into negotiations for arms limitation. Our agencies are superior. We don't have to trust the Russians. We know what they are doing."

McCollum said he is opposed to abortion except in cases where a mother's life is threatened or rape or incest is involved. Best said he is personally against abortion and against federal funding for abortion, but he added, abortion is a personal decision made by a woman and her family.

McCollum favored allowing prayer in the public schools. Best said anyone could pray anytime they wish.

McCollum said he opposes the Equal Rights Amendment in its present form. Best said some women need the Equal Rights Amendment. He added that he has doubts concerning the constitutionality of the time extension given for ERA ratification by the states.

McCollum said he is opposed to the federal funding of day care centers while Best said he favors the funding if it will enable able-bodied women to work and get off the welfare rolls.

About the Abacem investigation which led to the political downfall of current Congressman Richard Kelly, Best said: "I think it is wrong when government agents prepare the stage for a crime to be committed."

Best, McCollum Avert Clash

A personal confrontation between Democrat David Best and Republican Bill McCollum, candidates for Florida's 5th District seat in Congress, was stopped Thursday night.

During a debate at the Jewish Community Center in Maitland, the two were invited to question each other.

Indigent Care Funding, Utilities Top Seminole County's Priority List

Seminole County commissioners agreed this week on their top four priorities for the coming year. They are:

- Accomplishment of an agreement with Hospital Corporation of America on how care for indigent patients will be financed at Seminole Memorial Hospital now that it has been sold to the Nashville firm. The county remains legally responsible for providing hospital care for those unable to pay.
- The assimilation of the Tanglewood Sewer System into the county utility system and proceeding with the county's plans to hook-up with the new Iron Bridge sewage treatment plant south of Oviedo.
- Continuation of negotiations to obtain the Greenwood Lakes water and sewer treatment plant owned by the Florida Land Co. and negotiations with Central Utilities Corp. concerning their water and sewer service to county residents.

Implementation of the new "System 38" computer expected to be delivered in July. The sooner the computer is activated, the more money the county will save, said County Administrator Roger Neisewander.

In a work session this week the commissioners reviewed 33 projects brought forth by Neisewander.

At the suggestion of Commissioner Richard Williams the commissioners agreed to individually vote for each project by rating it "A," "B" or "C."

They agreed "A" votes denoted projects that must be accomplished if nothing else is.

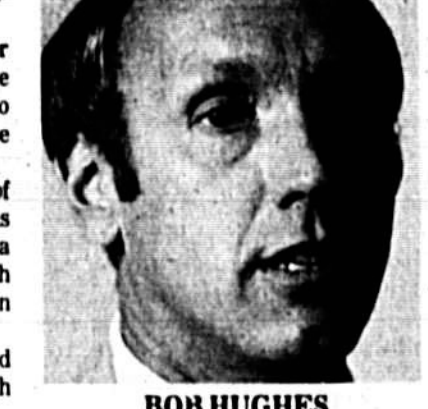
"B" votes were for projects that must be accomplished even if projects given a "C" rating aren't.

And "C" votes were for projects that must be accomplished even if individual departmental priorities aren't.

The county's four top priorities are those which received "A" votes from all five commissioners. The commissioners agreed that the county's



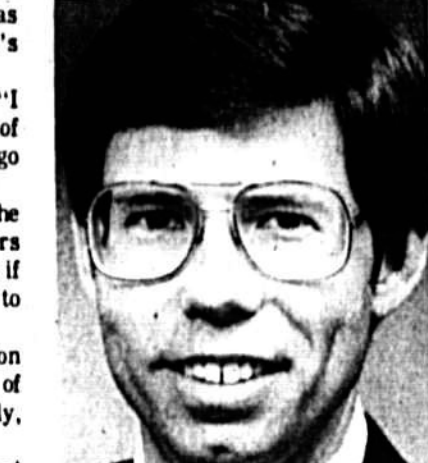

Cops 'Sting' 35 In Royal Flush Scam

Some 35 persons are expected to face a variety of charges resulting from a three-month-long "sting" operation called "Royal Flush" and operated by Seminole and Volusia counties' sheriffs' departments, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and Deland and Orange cities police departments.

Law officers operated a phony store in Deland and took in more than \$150,000 in stolen goods ostensibly to force the arrests.

In Abacem-like fashion, the undercover agents were armed with video taping equipment, hidden microphones and recorded some 300 separate transactions.

A local FBIEL officer overseeing the operation said operating the Deland second hand shop which took in the stolen goods cost about \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Night now none of the stolen items have been traced to Seminole County, the local FBIEL officer said.

"But we have lots of unidentified property" he said law officers will be reopening their shop next week to allow burglary victims to come by and try to identify some of the stolen goods. Details on the investigation have not yet been announced.

The formal announcement of the arrests was to be made at a 2 p.m. press conference today at the Volusia County Sheriff's office in Deland.
