

More Liberal Benefits For Vets Sought

Politically Powerful Groups Seek Aid For Ex-Service Men And Their Survivors

Pensions For All Dependents Asked

\$11,000,000 Annually Would Be Cost Of Proposed Program

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Politically powerful veterans' groups went up against House economy sentiment today with proposals to liberalize benefits to ex-service men and their dependents.

There was much speculation as to what reception the requests would receive in view of the fact that one of the most popular of all appropriations, for farm purposes, was cut down substantially by the House yesterday.

Beginning hearings on the proposed veterans' legislation, one of the chamber's committees invited spokesmen for the Legion, VFW, and DAV, to submit their 1940 programs.

The Legion, and VFW were asking pensions for all surviving dependents of World War veterans. Pensioners have already been paid to surviving dependents of veterans who had disabilities connected with their military service or whose deaths were caused by the war.

An estimate last year showed a cost of \$11,000,000 the first year if all 375,400 children, 193,400 widows, and 43,000 parents eligible applied. The Senate House recessed until Tuesday.

Formal Entry In House Spares Georgia Primary Administration Made By Garner

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Vice President Garner yesterday formally entered his name in the Georgia Democratic presidential preference primary for delegates to the Democratic national convention.

The 71-year-old Texan who recently announced he would seek the Democratic presidential nomination, regardless whether President Roosevelt runs for a third term, made known his intention in a letter to Senator George of Georgia.

Senator George, whom Roosevelt attempted to displace in his ill-fated 1938 political purge, had inquired of Garner whether he would enter the primary if one were held.

"I understand," Garner said in a letter to George, "that the established custom of the Democratic party in your state is that in presidential years a preference primary is held for the purpose of permitting the people to express their choice for the presidential nominee."

George is the Democratic proponent. As you know, I have heretofore announced that I will accept the nomination for president but I will make no effort to control any delegates. The people should decide and the candidate should be chosen.



Warplanes roaring over the North Sea from Germany struck at British shipping the third time in the 22nd week of the European war today.

The British said their fast-climbing pursuit planes bagged three raiders, downing two and "very seriously" damaging another.

What the Nazi fliers have been able to accomplish was not immediately clear. A trawler attacked off the Yorkshire coast caught fire but otherwise no results of the raid were reported. German bombers made similar forays last Monday and Tuesday.

Another victory for Britain was reported by the crew of the torpedoed Swedish freighter *Palala* which said a depth charge from a British submarine destroyed the freighter's submarine attacker.

Finland also was the target of intense raids in her conflict with Russia. Eleven civilians were reported killed yesterday in air raids. Warnings were sounded in Helsinki today but no bombs fell. Finns claimed the capture of a number of Russian strategical positions of Ladoga, smothering Russian attacks on the Karelian Isthmus. Finns said defense craft downed at least 15 invading bombers. Attack Made On New Deal By AFL Group

Sharp Criticism Of Government's Industrial, Social Policies Voiced

MIAMI, Fla. 5.—(AP)—Sharp criticism of the national government's industrial and social economy policies of the past seven years was contained in a statement released by a group of AFL leaders.

They demanded the "hour has come for Americans to recognize the dangers that confront them, and to join in a united effort to halt the drift toward national insolvency, industrial collapse and the extension of opportunity for the Americans of tomorrow."

They described many of the government's policies as an "experiment" and declared "innovation after innovation" have followed upon each other so fast and furiously that only a trained few could keep abreast of the changes.

"We find labor torn into warring camps. We find industry depressed and capital on a strike. We find ten millions of American workers unemployed. We find youth discouraged and age discouraged."

"Industry and labor alike have been disturbed, the production of useful goods has been hampered by the introduction into the industrial scheme of boards and bureaus which assume ill-considered authority over the relations between labor and management."

President William Green last night called on the government and business to effect "a lasting peace" in an effort to eliminate unemployment which he termed the nation's "No. 1 problem."

Speaking at a Methodist church here, Green outlined the belief "that government, whether justified or unjustified, must cease. There is no sense to it. The American people will not stand for it."

Solution of the unemployment problem, Green said, "will help labor, it will help industry, it will help the farmers and it will help our government. It is the only way to a better life for all of us."
