



Post-War Plans

As long as some of our national leaders in government and education are giving serious thought to post-war problems-and it is a good thing that some plans are being made for the development of a prosperous, peaceful and orderly world when final victory is achieved-a little careful planning along the same line here in Sanford might.

Come the peace and those things which are now sup porting our economic life may vanish overnight into thin air. The Naval Air Station, unless it is made permanent, will be closed, and the 1,500 or more men stationed there and their families will go away. Employment on the railroads, non taxed to capacity by military transportation, will drop until private enterprise is fully restored.

It will not relieve our financial burdens or neip our unemployment problems to complain that these things might have been avoided if we had only thought about it in time.


