Florida's day of fiscal reckoning is here! This is the unmistakable message of Gov. Reubin Askew's \$2.9 billion 1971-72 budget proposal.

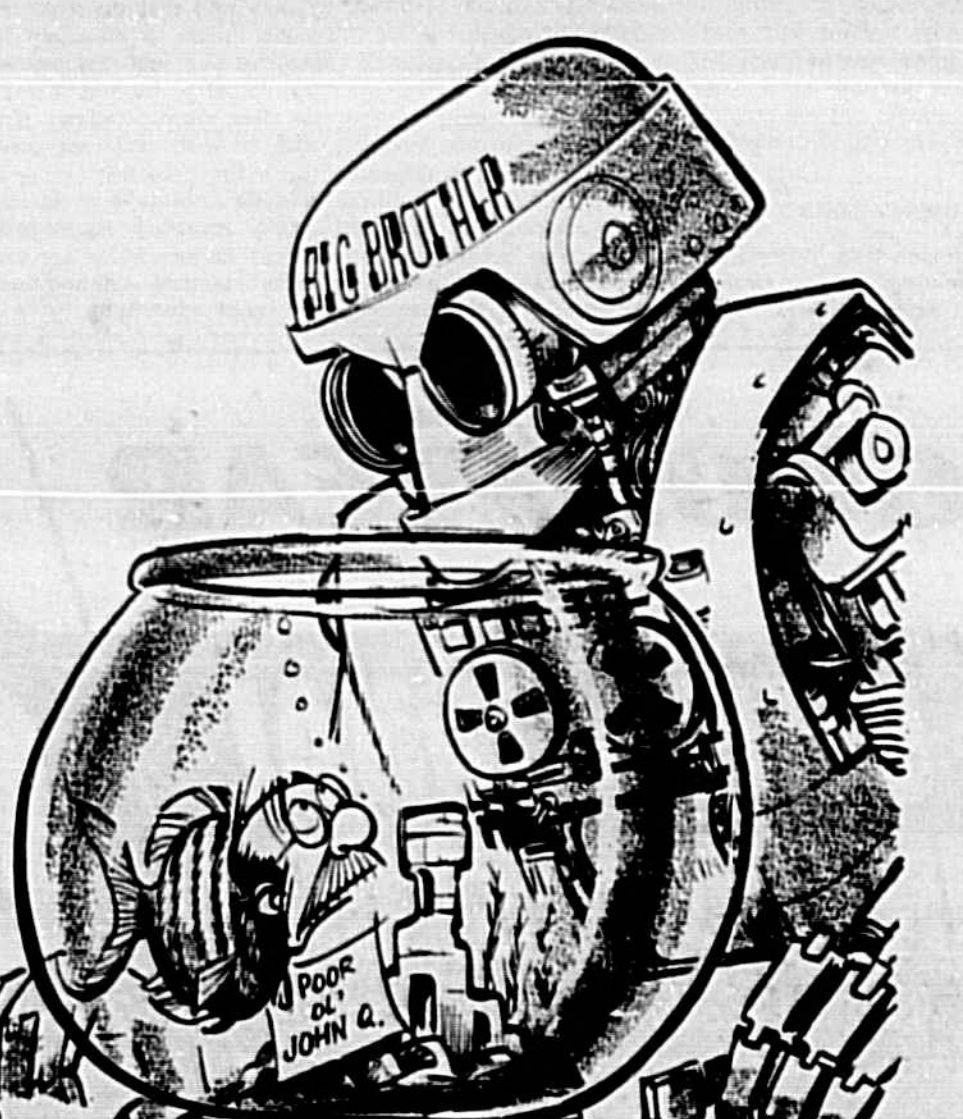
It is not that the governor is a Democrat. It is not that his character and personality is such that the easy way out is automatically barred if expediency is the motive.

Marquette Streak Is Growing

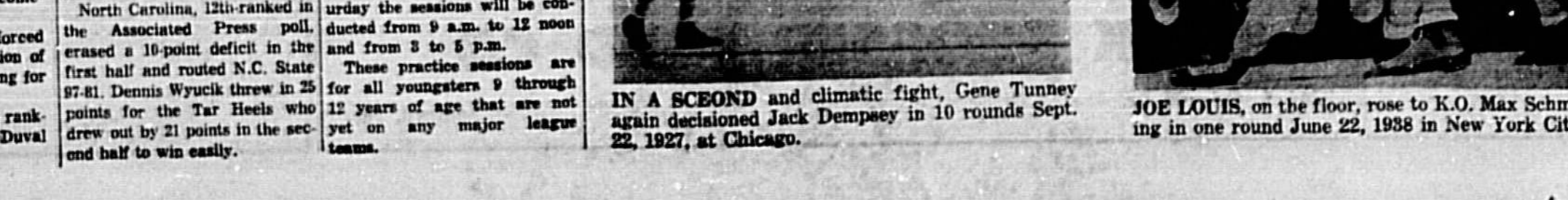

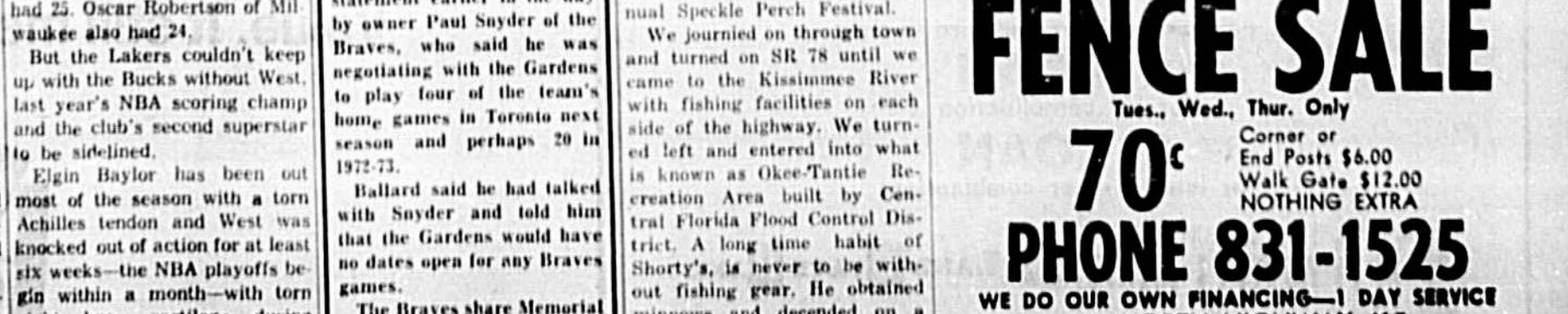

The Fine Art Of Complaining

Complaining is an art as well as a responsibility. If someone belittles you by the way he talks, it's your responsibility to tell him, thus giving him the opportunity to show good faith.

It's often easier to say "speak up" than it is to speak up; and it's even easier to speak up than it is to make a fair, formal and accurate objection.

Dr. George Weinberg, New York psychologist and psychiatrist, offers a set of suggestions — do's and don'ts in making and receiving a complaint — which are designed to further communication in any of your relationships.

COMPLAIN ONLY to the person harming you — not to anyone else — and make your complaint in private. The person to whom you are complaining deserves the right to make his own impression on people without the influence your evaluations of him might have.

NEVER COMPARE the person's behavior with that of other people. Comparisons of this kind are irrelevant, and trying to whip someone into submission in this way completely misses the point.

MAKE YOUR complaint as soon as you can. Don't repeat yourself once you've made it, and try to convey your complaint vocally instead of using facial expressions as substitutes for words.

OBJECT ONLY to actions people can change, otherwise you'd be asking too much.

MAKE ONLY one complaint at a time — you'll demoralize the other person and lose the point if you make more.

NEVER PREFACE a complaint and don't apologize after making one — both are detracting factors from the complaint itself.

Avoid sarcasm — it's undignified and cowardly.

Avoid words like "always" and "never." They contain implicit references to the past and will rob you of the psychological advantages that go along with making a complaint.

DON'T EXPECT the other person to remain open to your criticisms if you never pay him any compliments.

If you're on the receiving end of a criticism, there are some points to remember in order to accept it more easily.

LISTEN QUIETLY and carefully, always making directly at the person doing the criticizing in order to convey your receptiveness.

UNDER NO condition find fault with the person who has just criticized you, and never criticize that person's reaction to your behavior by accusing him of being oversensitive.

DON'T BE FLIP — don't caricature the complaint, and never try to change the subject.

USE YOUR intelligence to help articulate the objection, not to obscure it.

BY THE use of paraphrasing, convey to the other person that you understand his objection.

Earthquake Damage At \$50 Million

NEW YORK (AP) — Despite wide acceptance of the notion that earthquake insurance is either unavailable or prohibitively costly, claims from the recent California tremor are now estimated at \$50 million.

Industry officials refer to a 1969 report that shows 184 companies write such insurance in that state. And a survey of homeowner rates show they range from about \$1.50 a thousand to \$2.50 a thousand.

In 1968, industry reports show \$5 million in earthquake premiums were written throughout the country, 86 million of them in California.

The California insurance commissioner, Richard D. Berger, states flatly that homeowner insurance is available and at a reasonable rate, and that no new legislation is needed.

Some of those who have proposed changes in the law, he says, acted without first checking the facts and are now "scratching for something to talk about," he insists. The present laws are adequate to protect homeowners.

Sen. John Tunney, D-Calif., disagrees. He argues that the universal report to his office is passive for homeowners and small businessmen, and he seeks a way to provide government aid.

The answers to the mysteries involved—how, for example, the notion became so widespread that quake insurance was unavailable—may forever lie in limbo, but there are hints as to what happened.

First, there may be close to 200 companies writing such insurance, but that doesn't mean the public knew it. "To a great extent, insurance is bought as well as sold. Some people just didn't know they could buy it."

Then there was the matter of deductibility. Policies generally call for exclusion of damage up to a per cent of the policy's face amount, meaning that the owner of a \$20,000 house would be liable for damages totaling less than \$1,000.

Wolfhounds Returning

After near extinction, the legendary Irish wolfhound, tallest of all breeds of dogs, is returning to the Pacific Coast.

The "great dogs of Ireland" are related to and resemble Scottish deerhounds. Rough-coated, with longer hair over eyes and under jaw, they come in various colors—wheaten, gray, brindle and occasionally all black and all white. Muzzles are long and moderate. Powerful and dignified, they're the largest of the "galloping hounds" which hunt at sight rather than scent.

They've been known since Roman times. In a letter thanking his brother for a gift of seven Irish dogs (the usual number presented by one dog family to another) for their Roman consul wrote: "All Rome viewed them with wonder."

In addition to being the most valued hunting dogs, they were also formidable warriors of past centuries. But, in more recent times, they were being "known" as the name implies, as protectors of flocks and people from wolves.

But during the 19th century they were described by a famous American sportsman as typifying "the greatest in stature, intelligence, courage, loyalty and affection of all the dog family." And many of today's owners reiterate this praise.

Evidence has shown that those individuals most likely to be involved in a crash are the very ones least likely to wear the Safety belt. Deaths have occurred at speeds as slow as 12 mph—deaths which had the victim been wearing his seat belt. Somehow, we must make this clear.

Encourage friends, family, and anyone with whom you drive to take the few seconds necessary to "buckle up for safety."

Tips On Cleaning Drain

By MR. FIX. When water goes down the drain slowly it won't be long before it doesn't go down the drain at all. Over a period of time there will be a build-up of foreign material in a drain. Grease and soap may cause a drain to fill up, and lint, hair and other bits of material will become trapped and eventually interfere with the flow of water.

While chemical drain cleaners can be effective, they are the most hazardous household chemicals you can have around. Most of them are extremely caustic and must be used with extreme care. Milder solvent types also must be handled carefully.

Using them in small amounts at frequent intervals is often recommended to prevent stoppage, but you can do just as well by occasionally pouring some boiling water down the drain and allowing the hot water to run for a minute or two.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Use a rubber spatula to grease baking pans. It is efficient and less wasteful than paper. Put a piece of plastic wrap between the top of paint can and lid. This keeps that tough layer from forming on the paint.

STURDY PLASTIC FOOD BAGS

Sturdy plastic food bags can be reused — sometimes more than once. Wash them with soap, rinse, stuff with crumpled paper, towel and stand upright to drain.

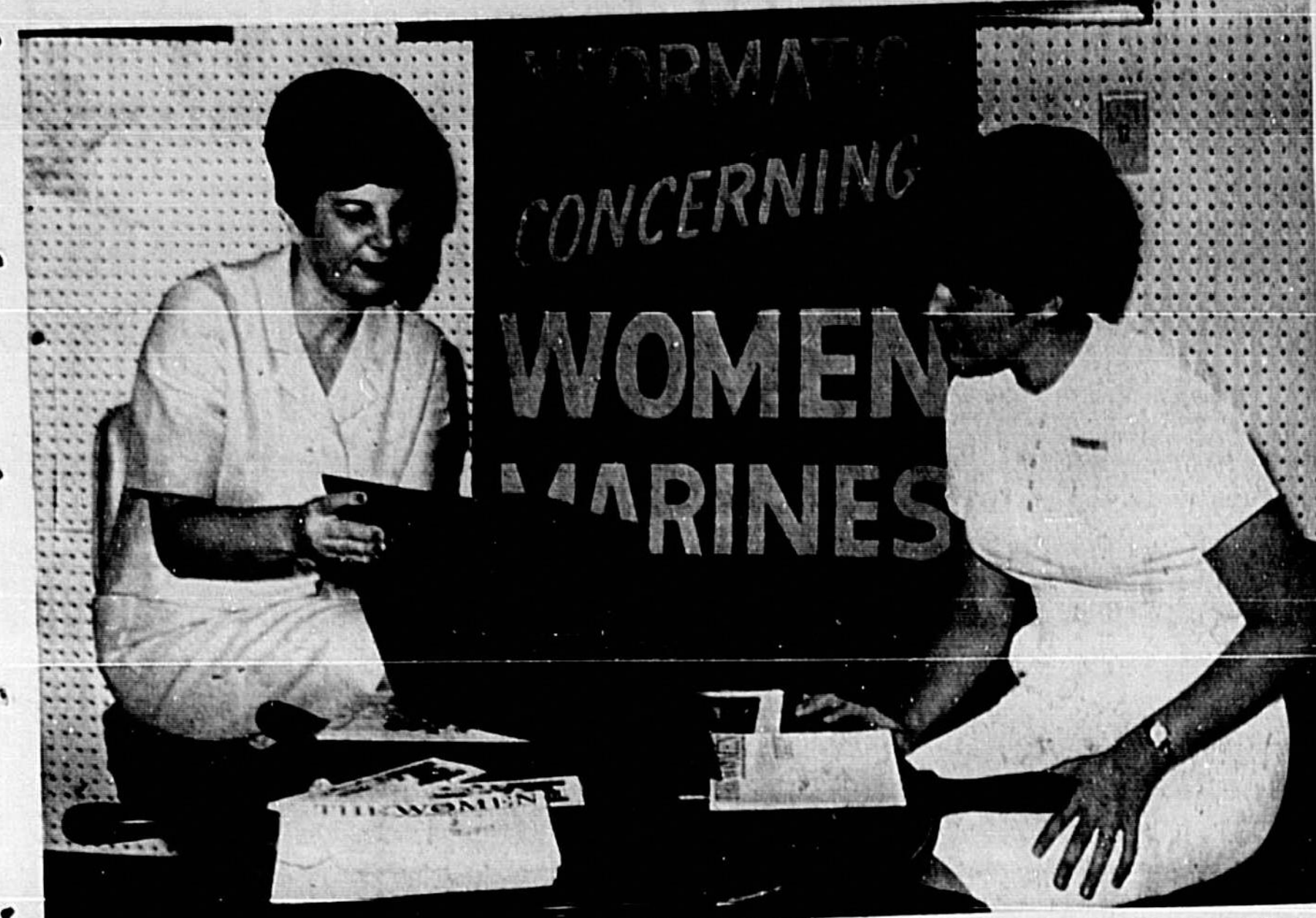

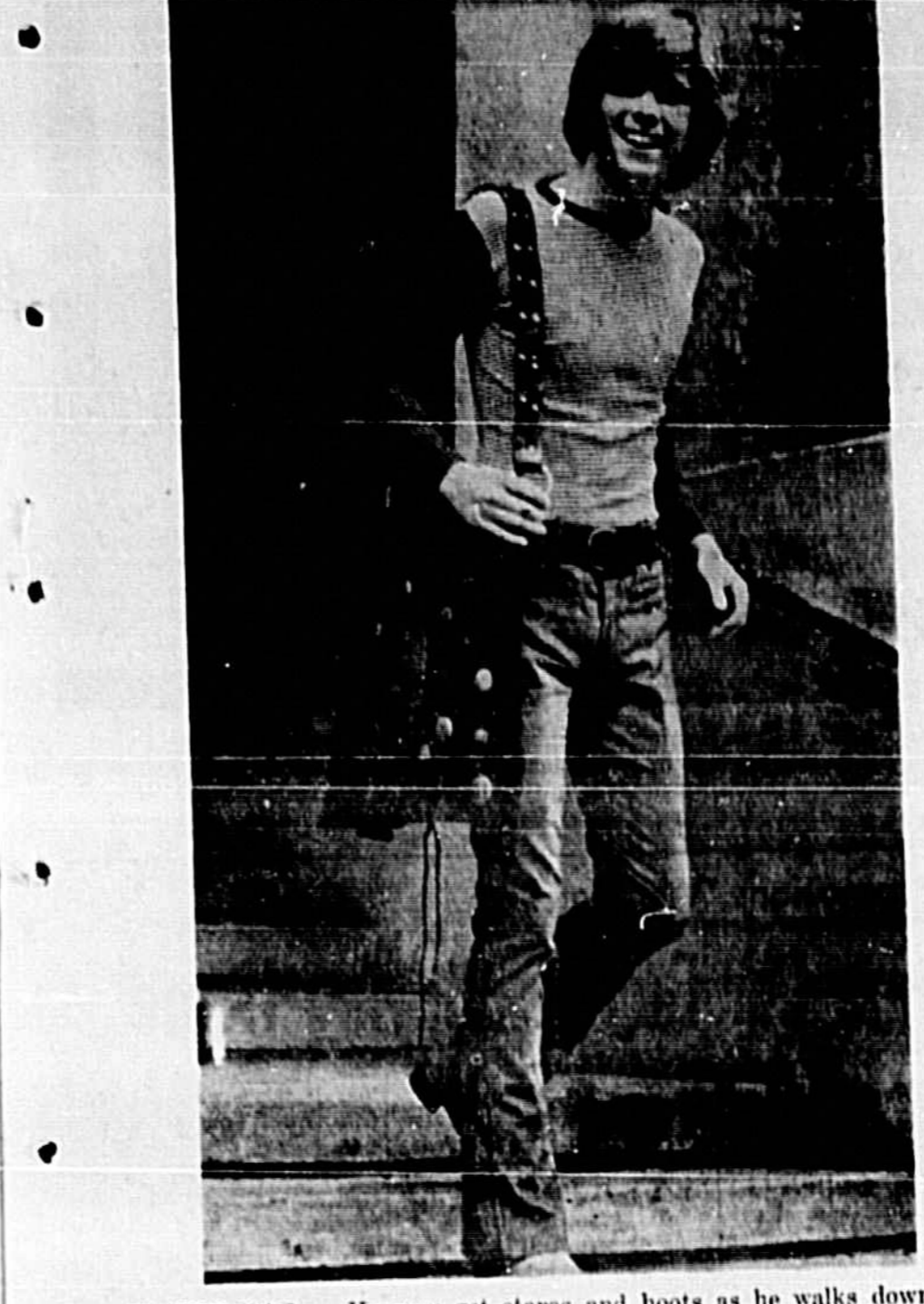

Teachers' Workshop Scheduled At FTU
