County To Pick New Seminole Health Clinic Site

By MICHEAL BEHA Herald Staff Writer

Two sites along Airport Boulevard in Sanford will be considered by Seminole County commissioners Tuesday for purchase as the site for a new county health clinic.

The two sites are adjacent to Zayre Plaza and Lakeview Middle School in Sanford.

One site is 13.7 acres and carries a \$267,150 price tag. The second site is 8.7 acres and has a purchase price of \$167,910.

Public Services and Development Director John Percy asked commissioners to decide on which of the sites, or another site, they wish to proceed with for use as a new health

Several other sites have been examined. The old Seminole Memorial Hospital was considered for use by the health department but commissioners decided to move their offices

A site adjacent to the county's Five Points complex also was considered for use as a health center site but that parcel is not

favored because the location is farther away from Sanford. That site is now favored for use as a new county administrative

The two Airport Boulevard sites are now considered the top choices for the center.

The assessed value for the first site is \$280,000. The assessed value of the second site is \$196,000. In all, costs for the first site would total \$324,336. Costs for the second site would total

Commissioners also plan to discuss at a work session Tuesday efforts to keep the Central Florida Zoo in Seminole

The management at the zoo has complained that the site of

the zoo, which is along Lake Monroe just outside of Sanford, is swampy and difficult to expand because the soil is potentially damaging to several types of animals at the zoo.

A study is underway to determine the feasibility of moving the zoo to Turkey Lake Park in Orlando. The study, being funded by Orlando, Orange County and the Dr. Phillips foundation, is expected to be completed in January.

Seminole commissioners currently lease the property used by the zoo for \$1 a year. While opposed to subsidizing the zoo, they have discussed moving the facility to another site in Seminole County.

Oviedo May OK Tax Pact

Oviedo's city council tonight is expected to act on a resolution agreeing to compromise with the Seminole County Commission over the double taxation

The Oviedo council is the only city government of the seven in the county that has yet to act on the resolution. The council will meet today at 7:30 p.m.

 Oviedo City Councilman Gary Gotwalt, as a member of double taxation study committee voted in favor of compromise. Last week, however, he declined to vote for or against resolutions to the county on the issue at the Council of Local Governments meeting.

Lake Mary joined with five other Seminole County cities and the Council of Local Governments in adopting resolutions agreeing to compromise with the County Commission over double

The Lake Mary action was taken after Sanford City Manager W. E. "Pete" Knowles, who chaired the double taxation study committee of city and county representatives, urged the adoption.

"If we go to court, we want to go in with as clean hands as possible," Knowles told the Lake Mary council. "This strengthens the municipal posture - to have taken every administrative remedy possible."

And former City Councilman Vic Olvera, now a candidate for mayor in Tuesday's city election, said he hopes the seven cities are "not taking a bone and lying over and playing dead" by taking a position of compromise.

The study committee unanimously agreed that double taxation does exist in the county particularly in the Sheriff's Department road patrol and investigation branch. The committee and six of the citles - Sanford, Longwood, Winter Springs, Altamonte Springs, Casselberry and now Lake Mary - have asked the county to agree to a philosophy that double taxation exists in those two law enforcement units and to cure the inequity whereby the city residents are not receiving "real and substantial benefit" from the service.

The resolutions call on the county commission to concur with the philosophy by Jan. 15 and back this up with a plan for corrective action by May 1, submitting the plan at that time to the cities through the Council of Local Governments.

The idea of compromise, said Knowles, looks like the "light at the end of the tunnel." He noted the study committee had some difficulty because it was laboring under an emotional reaction to

double taxation. Knowles said the "real and substantial" benefit test required by the law and fair and equal treatment are two body is not required by law to provide fair and equal treatment to city residents or in fact to any of its individual taxpayers, he said.

"Under the patrol and investigation (claim" we've got a toe-hold," Knowles said. He added that no one is the winner in a court action.

He informed the council that case law shows that the cities cannot go back and collect for past double taxation abuses by the county and that there is "no pot of gold at the end of the double taxation

The Sanford city manager said the cities always have the courts as a last resort.

"We feel everyone is much better off if we negotiate and compromise," he said. He urged the cities to be patient and understand the dilemma the county is in trying to solve the problem. "We are not telling them how to solve the difference," he said. "But we will make suggestions if they like. We have put the county in the unenviable position of being handed an olive branch."

City Attorney Robert Petree said the resolution to the county is one of "peace and reason together."

Doctor Stripped Of License

The 8-year-medical practice of a Lake Mary doctor has come to an end with the state Board of Medical Examiners revoking his license to practice medicine in Florida.

Dr. Robert L. Bevier, 45, of 159 N. Country Club Road, who different things. The county governing has practiced family medicine since 1974 and most recently in Lake Mary, was stripped of his license Saturday during a board hearing in Kissimmee.

Bevier had been under an emergency state order since Sept. 11 which suspended his license to practice medicine. The license was suspended by the state Department of Professional Regulation (DPR) based upon administrative complaints that Bevier had been injecting cocaine intravenously since August 1981, drinking heavily, using Ativan and Valium, was guilty of malpractice and could not account for two of six vials of

"Bevier didn't produce any witnesses at the hearing Saturday, although he was there with his lawyer," said Diana ·Hull, DPR spokeswoman. "The board discussed Bevier's case for about 30 to 45 minutes then revoked it (his license)."

"Beyier did dispute the validity of a urine sample which the board felt showed he had used or abused drugs since leaving an impaired physicians program," Mrs. Hull said. "Bevier denied such use and said the sample was not taken from him, but the board didn't agree."

Bevier told the board he had not used alcohol or cocaine since leaving the rehabilitation program in April. But Dr. Richard Conard, board vice-chairman, said sarcastically, "Yeah, and if you believe that, there's a bridge I want to talk to

Shortly thereafter Conard moved to revoke the former Lake Mary doctor's license. The motion passed unanimously. Bevier remains licensed in two other states and those

medical boards will be notified of his license revocation here and, it will be up to them as to what action, if any, to take against Bevier, Mrs. Hull said.

"Bevier could appeal the board's decision to the district court of appeal," Mrs. Hull said. "He has not indicated to us what he plans to do. He could also ask the board to rehear his case, but the board's decision is final as far as the administrative matters are concerned and it's entirely up to them if they'll hear him after a sufficient amount of time has passed since this decision. That could take years."

Bevier has repeatedly denied the charges pertaining to malpractice, drug and alcohol abuse, but said he is guilty of keeping poor records concerning medicine and prescriptions.

At an administrative hearing in Orlando last month, which is a prerequisite to a hearing before the board, Bevier pleaded guilty to all charges of alcohol and cocaine abuse and malpractice in exchange for the state hearing officer's recommendation to the board that Bevier be suspended from See 'DR. Election Tuesday

Absentee Vote Light

Fewer absentee ballots have been requested by city voters than in past elections, a survey of the four cities with elections scheduled Tuesday indicated

Absentee voting often is an indication of how voters will turn out on election

Absentee ballots for Tuesday's elections in Sanford, Lake Mary, Longwood and Casselberry must be returned to the respective cities prior to the polls closing at 7 p.m. Tuesday, city officials and clerks in the Supervisor of Elections

Camilla Bruce's office reminded voters. In three of the cities - Lake Mary, Longwood and Casselberry - absentee ballots may be picked up for ill electors today or Tuesday.

In Sanford where two city commission seats are on the ballot as well as three city charter questions, a clerk in Mrs. Bruce's office said today that applications have been received for 38 absentee ballots. The deadline for picking up absentee ballots is 5 p.m.

Sanford's 8,830 voters are eligible to cast ballots at the civic center polling place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. And City Clerk Henry Tamm predicts that 20 percent, or about 1,766, of the eligible voters will participate in the election.

The election pits former City Commissioner A.A. "Mac" McClanaban against incumbent first term Com-

missioner David Farr.

In a second race, Patricia "Pat" Baxley is vying with incumbent first term Commissioner Milton Smith.

The voters will decide among three alternative charter questions on the ballot. Question No. 1 concerns a new charter without residency districts for city commissioners; question No. 2 concerns a new charter with residency districts and question No. 3 calls for retention of the current charter.

The only difference between the first two questions is whether or not the people prefer city commissioners to live within certain geographic areas while being elected at large.

Other changes called "housekeeping" measures are included within both questions No. 1 and 2. Those include the deletion of sections which are in conflict with state law.

In addition the proposal would place the uniformed services - police and fire departments - under the direction of City Manager W. E. "Pete" Knowles just as all other city departments are. Under the old charter, the two uniformed services are under the direction of the City Commission with Mayor Lee P. Moore serving as liaison between the commission and the departments.

Questions No. 1 and 2 include provisions to change the city election time from December to September to coincide with the first primary election, to change the name of the governing body from a city commission to a city council and to extend Mayor Moore's term an additional year for a total of five years in this term only with his office up for election in 1985.

Electors may vote for only one of the three proposals.

If none of the propositions receives a majority of the vote - 50 percent plus one vote - the two measures receiving the highest vote will be placed on a runoff election ballot Dec. 21.

The Lake Mary polling place - City Hall at 158 North Country Club Road will be closed Tuesday with all city employees, except City Clerk Connie Major, given the day off.

Mrs. Major said she has received 17 applications for absentee ballots, adding this number is not a good turnout of Casselberry.

The Lake Mary ballot includes a race for mayor, contests for the three city council seats and three city charter

Some 1,550 qualified voters are eligible in Lake Mary and Mrs. Major has predicted that 55 percent - about 850 will turn out.

The races on the ballot include: mayor - Councilman Richard Fess, Vic Olvera and eight-year incumbent Walter Sorenson; Council Seat 1 (one-year term) - Barbara Ball, George F. Duryea, Charile Lytle and Susan A. Stern; Seat 2 (two years) - William "Bill" Durrenberger, Colin Keogh, Russ Megonegal

and James D. Stern; Seat 5 (one year) -

Burt Perinchief and Joe Stern. Lake Mary's voters also are asked to support or reject three charter questions. Question No. I would revise the charter in detail; question No. 2 would extend council terans and that of the mayor from two years to four years; and question No. 3 calls for single-member districts for four of the five council members. The four would run within geographic districts and be elected by the residents of those districts only. The fifth councilman and the mayor would be elected at large.

Among the changes in question one are: election by the highest number of votes (plurality) rather than majority, thus eliminating runoffs; changing election times from December to September; changing the governing body's name from council to commission; giving the council by a simple majority the power to fire some office-employees and requiring four positive votes to override a mayoral veto.

In Longwood, City Clerk Don Terry said today that 12 absentee votes have been issued and electors who are sick may apply for an absentee vote until 7 p.m. Tuesday. He has predicted a 20-22 percent turnout - (788 to 866) of the city's 3,938 electors. Absentees must be returned to Terry.

The ballot includes two city commission contests and a charter question. Incumbent City Commissioner J. Russell Grant is being challenged by Robert N. Daves while former Commissioners Larry Goldberg and Bill Mitchell are vying for the commission seat now held by Timothy O'Leary, who is not seeking re-election.

The charter question, if approved, would extend City Commission terms from two to four years. In Casselberry, City Clerk Mary

Hawthorne said 35 absentee ballots have been issued. The polling place is the city hall council chamber. Absentees may be picked up and returned by 7 p.m. Tuesday, After 5 p.m. Tuesday, absentees must be returned to the election

Races on the Casselberry ballot include: Seat 1 - Michael Bratman, Margaret Driggers, Jun Hill, Berthan Rines and Richard Russo; Seat 2 - incumbent Frank Schutte and Frank Stone: Seat 3 - incumbent Bill Grier, Carl Robertson Jr. and Valentino Zeek.

Casselberry voters also will consider whether they want the city to launch a paramedic program calling for an additional tax to pay for the program for at least two years of \$1.25 per \$1,000 assessed valuation of real property.

Fate Of Downed Spy

Plane Still Unknown

WASHINGTON (UPI) - In 1958, a CIA spy plane with at least eight persons aboard went down in Soviet territory. The passengers' fate remains a U.S government secret.

Previously secret congressional transcripts reveal that the incident occurred three years before American Francis Gary Powers was shot down in his U-2 spy plane over the Soviet Union.

Senate historian Don Ritchie said Sunday that if Powers' plane had not been shot down it is unlikely Congress would have ever been told about the first

MX, Gas Tax Hike Debated

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The lame-duck Congress entered its second week today with President Reagan's 5-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax hike sailing toward passage and his MX missile plan streaking toward a showdown.

At the same time, Reagan and congressional Democrats are on a collision course with the Democrats seeking a public works jobs program that Reagan has threatened to veto.

The House today was to begin debate on Reagan's proposed gas tax hike that would raise an estimated \$5.5 billion a year to repair deteriorating roads, bridges and mass transit systems.

Tuesday, the House intends to begin what is expected to be a stormy debate over the \$231 billion fiscal 1983 defense appropriations bill, particularly a provision providing nearly \$1 billion in funding for 100 MX nuclear missiles.

Clark May Be Walking Soon

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) - Barney Clark sat on the edge of his bed and swung his dangling legs for five minutes - his first exercise since his dying heart was replaced four days ago by a plastic pump.

Clark remained in serious but stable condition at the University of Utah Medical Center, recuperating from a second operation in which surgeons stapled shut four or five tiny leaks in his lungs.

The physicians who ordered the exercises said they hope to have Clark standing and possibly taking a few steps in the next day or two as they try to strengthen him to a "general feeling of robustness."

Murder Suspect Freed For 2nd Time

An Oviedo murder suspect has been freed from the Seminole County jail for the second time following his rearrest in connection with the Feb. 8 shooting death of another Oviedo man. On Thursday, Circuit Judge C. Vernon Mize, Jr. ordered Charles William Francis, 24, of 540 First St., to be jailed under \$5,000 bond, reversing County Judge Allan Dickey's decision

last month to free him. Francis, who was released from jail after posting the \$5,000 bond, is charged with second-degree murder in the shooting death of Dennis Roger Golden, 23, of 622 Aulin Ave., outside an Oviedo convenience store.

Francis turned himself in to Delaware police Nov. 14 in connection with Golden's death and was returned to Florida. During an initial court appearance, Dickey ruled that investigators did not provide him with sufficient sworn documents necessary for Francis to be jailed. Dickey delayed his ruling for 24 hours, to give police and prosecutors time to produce such evidence, but at the hearing the following day, disallowed the playing of an alleged taped confession from Francis and declined to listen to statements from a man reported to be an eyewitness to the shooting. Dickey then released Francis from jail without bond.

At Thursday's hearing, Mize reversed Dickey's ruling, saying Dickey had not followed Florida rules of criminal procedure. He also ordered that a \$5,000 bond be set, adding that although Francis had fled out-of-state following the incident, he had surrendered voluntarily to authorities.

Florida law provides that a judge may find probable cause to detain a suspect "based upon a sworn complaint, affidavit, deposition under oath, or, if necessary, upon testimony under oath properly recorded.'

At the time of the hearing before Dickey, Francis' court file

contained sworn statements from two reported eyewitnesses, a request for Francis' arrest and his arrest report.

Mize is scheduled to hear Francis' trial Jan. 21. Dickey could not be reached for comment concerning Mize's

practicing medicine for one year. However, Bevier said later that he only pleaded guilty to one charge of "bad record keeping" and that "I never pleaded guilty to alcohol or cocaine abuse.'

"That's simply not the case," Mrs. Hull said. "He did plead guilty to all the charges, although one charge involving the cocaine vials was amended to read that six vials were involved and not four. That's the only amendment."

Other information presented to the board Saturday included sworn statements from an Orlando man charged and later acquitted in Seminole County with trafficking in morphine, who maintained that Bevier injected him with morphine and gave him a large amount of the controlled drug; sworn statements from a topless dancer who said she dated Bevier and that the two used cocaine on several occassions, adding that Bevier is known to many dancers and bar patrons as "Doctor Bob" who provides drugs to them when they want them; and documents showing Bevier has been unsuccessful in

completing rehabilitation programs for doctors with alcohol or drug abuse problems.

In addition, Bevier could face criminal charges if the federal Drug Enforcement Administration's Orlando office feels such action is warranted.

Lake Mary City Council Puts Coal-Train Issue On Siding

A decision on whether to support an Altamonte Springs effort to stop proposed coal-laden trains from making 212 round trips through Seminole County weekly has been delayed by the Lake

But at least one councilman, Ray Fox, has challenged Orlando Utilities Commission statistics on how long the 90-car coal trains will hold up traffic at major intersections from Sanford through Lake Mary, Longwood and Altamonte

An OUC spokesman told Altamonte Springs City Commissioners last week the trains would hold up traffic at each intersection - Lake Mary Boulevard, and State Roads 436 and 434 — through Seminole County two to three minutes.

"That must be one of the fastest trains that has ever come through the county," Fox said, adding the coal cars are "obviously tiny little cars" to go that fast.

Fox said at the same time he couldn't support the Altamonte Springs' contention that the coal dust from the cars would pollute the area around the railroad tracks.

"I can't support the contamination bit," Fox said. Mayor Walter Sorenson reported to the council that delegates to the Council of Local Governments in Seminole County at the request of Altamonte Springs City Commissioner Lee Constantine adopted resolutions directed to the Jacksonville-based Family Line Railroad, Gov. Bob Graham and the Cabinet and Florida's congressional delegation to force rerouting of the coal trains to an OUC power plant proposed for construction in southeast Orange County.

The resolutions ask the railroad to reroute the coal trains to a route through Callahan, the outskirts of Ocala and the outskirts of Lakeland to Orlando or if the trains are to go through Seminole County, despite opposition, to schedule those runs at low traffic level times of 8 p.m. to 7 a.m.; request the governor and Cabinet at its meeting Tuesday to minimize the environmental impact of coal-dust from the trains if the Seminole County route is not changed and urge Florida congressional delegation to support continuation of a coal



The Rejectionists Must Not Prevail

The Palestinians, speaking through the Palestine Liberation Organization's Central Council, which met in Damascus recently, have denounced President Reagan's Middle East peace plan.

But they did not say the entire plan was unacceptable. The way was intentionally left open for PLO chairman Yasser Arafat to continue his negotiations with Jordan's King Hussein and others on the possibility of further peace moves based on the plan.

That's a response marginally more positive than the total rejection of the plan by the government of Israel.

Predictably, the PLO statement objected to Mr. Reagan's opposition to the formation of an independent Palestinian state in the West Bank and Gaza and to Mr. Reagan's failure to recognize the PLO as the sole representative of the Palestinian people.

There was no mention in the PLO statement of any consideration of a change in the PLO charter, which bars recognition of the state of Israel.

But, until the Palestinians can bring themselves to recognize the sovereignty of Israel within its pre-1967 borders, there can be no hope of peace in the Middle East.

Such recognition can only come when the moderate leaders of the Arab world, both within and outside the PLO, feel themselves strong enough to prevail over the "rejectionists," who refuse to recognize the existence of Israel.

Meanwhile, the rejectionists on the Israeli side, including Prime Minister Menachem Begin and his Cabinet, angrily said "no" to the Reagan peace plan on the next day after it was proposed. They refused to enter into any negotiations with any party on the basis of the Reagan proposal.

A key passage in the proposal declares:

"The United States will not support the use of any additional land (in the West Bank and Gaza) for the purpose of settlements during the transition period.

"Indeed, the immediate adoption of a settlement freeze by Israel, more than any other action, could create the confidence needed for wider participation in the autonomy talks." But the Israeli Cabinet declared:

"Such settlement is a Jewis inalienable right and an integral part of our national security. Therefore, there shall be no settlement freeze. We shall continue to establish them in accordance

with our natural right."



A spokesman for the quasi-governmental World Zionist Organization said in Tel Aviv Nov. 4 that Israel will push ahead with a plan approved last year to settle 400,000 Jews in the West Bank within five years and a total of 1.4 million in 30 years to help guard against creation of a Palestinian state in occupied territory.

The United States can do little about the rejectionist policies of the Palestinians, except to hope that the Arab moderates prevail.

We might be able to do something about the rejectionist policies of the Begin government, since we contribute a great deal of financial aid to that government and since there are many in Israel, outside the Begin government, who oppose Begin.

No U.S. president has used aid to Israel as a bargaining chip in order to persuade Israel to change its settlement policy. Perhaps the time now has come to review the wisdom of giving aid to rejectionists, on either side of the conflict.

He also warned that while the cities can go to court, a suit can also be filed by taxpayers in the

unincorporated area if they feel they are not being treated fairly.

If the Board of County Commissioners adopts a cooperative approach with the cities, it can truly be a hardship for them, he said, pointing to their duty to respond to their constituents in all areas of the county.

Again noting the cities can take the issue to court if the county refuses to cooperate, Knowles said if the cities feel the report done by Kelton and Associates on double taxation is sufficient to be used in court, it actually is not.

"It's not detailed enough, nor factual enough,"
the city manager said. "It will require as much
work again as had been done for it to be sufficient in court."

Knowles said he hopes the elected city bodies will be reasonable in this very sensitive area affecting the tax structure of Seminole County. "It's a delicate question of diplomacy," he said. He noted that the county commission doesn't

have to increase taxes in the unincorporated areas to solve the problem with double taxation. It can instead use sales tax revenues to achieve equality in funding of the two law enforcement services.

An important aspect of the special committee's work, Knowles said, is that the lines of communication between city and county government in Seminole have been opened.

At the conclusion of the Council of Governments' meeting, Longwood Mayor June Lormann, chairman, presented Knowles with a plaque of appreciation for his work with the

committee.

Casselberry Mayor Owen Sheppard, a past chairman of the group was also presented with a plaque.

Sheppard will be leaving his office in Casselberry early in the new year. He resigned and his replacement as mayor for the one year remaining in Sheppard's term is Charles Glascock, who was elected unopposed.

Times Have Changed

Who remembers the book "The Greening of America" published a decade ago by Charles

Reich, professor of law at Yale University?

That book comes to mind now as the country is in the midst of a period of economic struggle. In that foolish book, which was praised to the skies, Dr. Reich argued that the country was so prosperous that young Americans would not have to worry about work.

In one particularly absurd passage, Dr. Reich said that "today a life of surfing is possible, not as an escape from work, a recreation or a phase, but as a life — if one chooses."

Dr. Reich, for all his foolishness, was not alone in thinking that economic struggle was at an end. Time and again, pundits insisted that a depression was impossible. The only problem in America they said, was the need for a massive redistribution of wealth from producers to consumers.

Well, times have changed. Americans have discovered that prosperity isn't forever, that the country doesn't exist on a permanent plateau of plenty.

Foday's hardships are real for millions of people. And while no one wants an individual to suffer, the problems of today are a reminder of the need for a strong work ethic. Much of the difficulty the U.S. is experiencing today is the result of the deterioration of the work ethic. People on production lines became sloppy and turned out poor products. Large companies became inefficient and slow to make needed changes in design and engineering. They yielded to unreasonable union demands. In brief, the country became fat and happy in the Sixties and Seventies.


We are paying a high price for that now, in terms of unemployment and business bankruptcies. Perhaps Americans will learn from their current problems. Wages in many industries must come down if the United States is to compete successfully against aggressive foreign producers. However, wages in these industries, especially those where unions are strong, remain fixed at a high, non-competitive level. In our northern neighbor, Canada, Chrysler Corporation workers went on strike, despite the terrible condition of the Canadian economy.

The current period of economic difficulty provides an opportunity for companies to become lean and competitive again. Problems can be turned into opportunities. Americans must realize, however, that wages and prices have to respond to changed conditions and can't be fixed at the level of yesteryear.

Americans also must understand that government can't effect a quick fix by spending billions to create broom and shovel jobs.

More On The Bishops

In my most recent column, I took serious objection to the substance of the proposed new teaching on nuclear weapons by the American Catholic bishops.

I argued that in its condemnation of both deterrence and counter-force strategy — i.e., attacks upon cities or upon opposing nuclear weapons — the bishops would leave the United States with no nuclear strategy at all.

The bishops' condemnation of any "first use" of nuclear weapons has now been itself condemned by the government of West Germany, which is not grateful to the bishops for their willingness to put West Germany at risk to Soviet tanks.

The current behavior of the American Catholic bishops, to be sure, takes place against a larger backdrop.

The bishops have been consistently wrong, for example, on economics and do not appear to have much understanding of the free market system. Their general tendency has been socialist, stressing the redistribution of goods over production.

On Central America, the bishops have been wrong, and have been rebuked by their fellow bishops on the scene in El Salvador and Guatemala.

The American hierarchy has been wrong on racial busing, which it has supported against the overwhelming opinion of parents of both races and against all of the evidence that, far from doing any good, it is disruptive to education, to the communities involved, and to racial relations.

As I indicated in my previous column, I myself feel a much greater sense of communion with the young men who fought the American Revolution and, with a clear mental lens, designed the American Constitution, than I do with these ecclesiastics whose recommendations would put at extreme risk the republic those men designed, would invite the totalitarianization of the world, and mean for Christianity, at best, an indefinitely prolonged catacombs existence. For an American Catholic, the bishops'

proposed teaching on nuclear weapons poses an obvious dilemma. Is it possible to continue association with a church so led?

Of course, I suppose that it is metaphysically impossible for someone convinced of the truth of Catholic doctrine really to leave the Church. But one could cease to lend one's visible support to the whole enterprise.

From that standpoint, the bishops have raised the old question of whether it is possible, in good conscience, to support their church and at the same time be a patriotic American and a loyal member of Western civilization. That kind of question in the 19th century was put in terms of the supposed dual loyalty American Catholics had between nation and pope. Today the question can be put of whether the position of the bishops is consistent with the very survival of the republic.

The answer, I think, is that the American Church — and the larger Church — is not the possession of these muddled men. They must be fought both intellectually and politically, and there are at least two reasons for hope.

The first is Pope John Paul II himself, one of the great men of the 20th century, a genuine here.

His personal letter to Leonid Brezhnev, threatening in the event of a Soviet invasion of Poland, to "lay down the Crown of St. Peter" and return to Poland to lead the resistance, must be counted one of the great strokes of Western history. It seems to have led to the Soviets issuing a contract on the Pope's life: they knew they had a tremendous antagonist.

The second reason for hope is the quality of many of the new young men who have been entering Catholic seminaries during the past five or six years. A substantial number of my own students at Dartmouth have become converts in recent years, and a half dozen have found vocations. These are not the '60s-style McGovernite wimps who now dominate the staffs of the bishops.

The MX Facts And Other Facts

All Americans have a direct and vital interest in the cost-effectiveness of national defense.

We are the ones who pay for a military machine designed, first, to deter war and, second, should it not, to ensure our survival as a nation. We are the ones who stand to lose much more than money if the investment fails.

Few of us, however, have the expertise to evaluate military policies that today must be based on the highest technology. Most of us can only be bewildered by the barrage of arguments for and against the MX missile system to which we are being subjected.

Presumably not included, however, are military professionals such as Rear Adm. Gene R. La Rocque, Marine Major Gen. William Fairbourn and Rear Adm. Eugene Carroll.

All — now retired — are on the staff of the Center for Defense Information, which has issued an analysis of President Reagan's address explaining his decision to proceed with "dense pack" MX deployment. The focus is not on the decision itself but on the facts the president selected to back it up which, in Admiral Carroll's words, "simply (do) not square with the facts."

For a starter, the officers take aim at the president's assertion that "the Soviet Union has raced, we have not" in nuclear arms development and acquisition.

The truth of the matter, they contend, is that from the first nuclear explosion in 1945 the United States has never lost the nuclear lead, remaining two to five years ahead of the Soviets who hace had to play catch-up. True, the Soviets now have more delivery vehicles. But the United States has more warheads on missiles and bombers, giving it a significant edge in the number of nuclear weapons that can be exploded on the Soviet Union.

The president's economics are also faulted.

To compare current defense expenditures to the 46 percent of the budget during the Kennedy administration, as he did, is misleading because of the rapid growth of Social Security funding and interest payments on the national debt in the intervening decades. In real terms, debt and military expenditures are rising at an approximate 10 percent annual rate. In the 1983 budget, military programs plus veterans' benefits will absorb some 60 percent of total expenditures.

"For 20 years the United States has deployed no new strategic bombers," the president asserted.

The facts, according to the CDI critique, are that in the decade 1966-76 we built 76 FB-111 strategic bombers comparable to the much-publicized Soviet Backfire in bomb load, speed and performance characteristics but with the added advantage of in-flight refueling capability, giving it intercontinental range. The Backfire lacks that.

True, the B-52 fleet is aging, as the president said. But so is the Soviet mainstay, the 100 TU-95 Bears (out of 145 strategic bombers), which is propeller-driven and can carry only hald the B-52's bomb load. All 376 operational U.S. strategic bombers are high-speed jets. In a continuing modernization program, the fleet has been fitted with new engines and electronics, enlarged bomb bays and advanced missiles.

"I can't understand why so many adults, many of them parents, just sit by when hard drugs are introduced at a dinner party or social gathering," she said. "It is just as easy to speak up, stand up and leave when this happens.

"It would set an example for others, expecially our young people. When they see their parents use drugs, they feel it must be acceptable. I have heard many reports from youths that they would sit down to family meals and their parents would be stoned."

Mrs. Reagan said there's no problem — foreign or domestic — more important than the elimination of drugs from American society. "The cooperation of the Justice Department and the FBI is helpful and should

have been employed before now," she said.
"But most important of all is the role parents
must play in fighting the drug problems."
The first lady was equally severe with the

movie and television stars whose use of drugs repeatedly makes headlines. When she was in Hollywood 30 years ago, she said, she was not aware of any widespread availability or use of 'drugs. The situation has changed dramatically, though.

"Those who are role models in motion pictures and television must provide an example for young people," she said. "Too many are shown deep into the drug habit. That's why it's important that those in the entertainment world, and who have rid themselves of drug use, should be applauded and made known to the public."

Mrs. Reagan is particularly upset at proposals to legalize drugs, even those classified as "soft" drugs. "There is no difference between hard and soft drugs, in my opinion," she said. "Both are harmful. When I asked young people how they felt about

legalizing drugs, they came back with a yelling 'No!' to any such idea."

Plastic Hearts Won't Go On The Market Soon

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) - People with dying hearts should not rush to the University of Utah looking for an artificial replacement because doctors have only one more of the plastic hearts and are still studying their first implant.

The head of the hospitals artificial organs department still wants to proceed as soon as possible with more implants. The heart implanted in Barney Clark, 61, a Seattle-area dentist, still is in the experimental stage, Dr. Ross Woolley, a member of the university's Institutional Review Board, told a

news briefing Sunday. He could not predict when the next polyurethane pump will be tested in a human.

Clark became the first human to have his failing heart permanently replaced by a machine in an operation Thursday. He has recovered well enough to sit on the edge of his bed and do some exercises.

Woolley said the university Medical Center cannot handle another implant patient until Clark is well enough to leave the hospital or at least is stable enough to be removed from a specialized recovery room.

"We don't want to shortchange him," he said. "To undertake another heart operation at this time surely might compromise his chances."

The inventor of the artificial heart, Dr. Robert Jarvik, does

not have shelves full of the devices or the machines that drive them, he said.

"Until two hearts and a heart driver are built, no more transplants can take place," Woolley said.

Surgeon William DeVries had three of of the polyurethane hearts available when he began operating on Clark. Just one remains because DeVries had to remove the left ventricle of the first heart sewn into Clark and replace it with a ventricle from one of the backups.

However, artificial organs pioneer Willem Kolff said the university should get moving as fast as possible on the project. "Now we have the momentum, we don't want to lose it," said Kolff, director of the university's artificial organs division. "The next patient should come as soon as DeVries recovers

DeVries is the only surgeon authorized by the Food and Drug Administration to conduct human experiments with artificial hearts. He has permission to do seven of the operations before the project will be reviewed again by the FDA.

Cowboys Crush **Redskin Fantasy**

The fantasy is over for the Washington Redskins but not the dream.

The Redskins, who entered Sunday's game as the only unbeaten club in the National Football League, tasted defeat for the first time, falling 24-10 to the Dallas Cowboys.

But while the loss ended hopes of an unbeaten record in this strike-shortened season, the Redskins proved they could play on the same level as the best in the league and still are in a solid position for a playoff spot.

The top eight teams in each conference will make the playoffs this season and Washington now is in a three-way tie with Dallas and Green Bay for the National Conference lead at 4-1. NFL clubs will play only nine games this season.

Danny White passed for 216 yards and a touchdown, Ron Springs scored twice and the Dallas defense shut down Washington quarterback Joe Theismann. It was the Cowboys' sixth straight victory over the Redskins, who have not beaten Dallas since Nov. 18, 1979.

White, who hit 21-of-29 passes, passed eight yards to Springs for a touchdown. With Dallas leading 17-10 in the fourth period, Springs applied the crusher, running 46 yards for a score. Tim Newsome had an 18-yard TD run and Rafael Septien kicked a 31-yard field goal for Dallas.

Theismann, the Redskins' sparkplug in their first four victories, struggled against the Cowboys' pressure. He threw a 17-yard TD pass to Charlie Brown and set up Mark Moseley's 38-yard field goal, but those were the only bright spots. He hit 19-1-29 passes for 234 yards.

The t'owboys sacked Theismann seven times for 69 yards in losses and intercepted three passes.

Steelers 35, Chiefs 14

Terry Bradshaw, playing despite a sprained shoulder, passed for 231 yards and three TDs in three quarters to spark Pittsburgh (4-1) past Kansas City (1-4). The Steelers sacked the Chiefs' Steve Fuller eight times. Bradshaw's TDs included passes of three and 74 yards to John Stallworth and five yards to Greg Hawthorne,

nuck Muncle and James Brooks scored two TDs each in the first half, powering San Diego (3-2) over Cleveland (2-3). Muncie scored twice in the first quarter and Brooks twice in the second period. Rolf Benirschke added a 24-yard field goal in the final period. Cleveland's only TD was a 4-yard pass from Brian Sipe to Ozzie Newsome, who had 10 catches for 140 yards.

Packers 33, Bills 21 Green Bay (4-1) turned two Buffalo fumbles in the opening minutes into field goals by Jan Stenerud and then recovered one of its own fumbles in the end zone for a touchdown in beating Buffalo (3-2) in the mud and rain at Milwaukee. Stenerud kicked field goals of 33 and 25 yards after only 3:41 of play and added field goals of 31 yards and 42 yards in the final period.

Cardinals 23, Eagles 20 Stump Mitchell, replacing the sidelined Ottis Anderson, ran for 145 yards and a TD and Nell O'Donoghue had three field goals, lifting St. Louis (3-2) over Philadelphia (1-4). Mitchell, a return specialist who had rushed for just nine yards entering the game, scored on a 32yard run to spark a 13-point second

Ken Anderson threw TD passes of one and two yards to M.L. Harris in the second half to boost Cincinnati (4-1) over winless Baltimore (0-5). Anderson, who hit 22-of-29 passes for 206 yards, also threw a 24-yard TD pass to Steve Kreider. Baltimore led until Anderson hit Harris with 3.55 left in the third period. Raiders 21, Seahawks 23

Rookie Marcus Alien ran for 121 yards and two TDs in the first half and Los Angeles (4-1) held off a furious last period surge by Seattle (2-3). Allen helped the Raiders to a 28-0 lead, scoring on runs on two and three yards, before Seattle came back. He set up his second score with a 53-yard run and finished with 156 yards rushing.



Raiders Turn Back Polk; Welcome Falcons Tonight

If Seminole Community College's Raiders need an incentive to play well, they'll get one tonight when Florida College comes to SCC for a 7:30 tipoff. The Falcons are 8-1 and big. "They're

6-10, 6-8 and 6-7," said SCC coach Bill Payne. "We'll really have to get on the boards to beat them."

Get on the boards is what the Raiders did Saturday night when they toyed with Polk College before beating the Vikings,

Although the 4-3 Raiders had just a one rebound edge (39-38) on the backboards, 6-6 Luis Phelps, 6-10 Rudy Kuiper and 6-5 Delvin Everett got some key offensive rebounds and put them back in.

"We rebounded pretty well and we played pretty good man defense," said Payne while assessing the victory. "They're a pretty scrappy team and they played hard."

Kuiper dropped in 10 first-half points as the Raiders jumped out to a 15-10 lead in the first seven minutes. At the midway point, SCC increased its lead to 25-13 as Kuiper tossed in a field goal over his head - with his back to the basket - on a nice feed from Jimmy Payton.

Phelps, who scored 14 points and grabbed 12 rebounds coming off the bench, hit three of the next four buckets as the Raiders went up by 15, 31-16.

In the last two minutes, Everett, who hit all six of his floor shots, hit two free throws and a lay up as SCC went into intermission with a 41-32 lead.

Phil Holder, a 6-4 forward from Cocoa, dropped in 13 points to lead Polk, 1-5. SCC hit 18 of 37 shots for 49 percent while Polk connected on 13-31 for 42

Crooms Turns Back Vanguard For 38th Consecutive Victory

Melvin Brinson took care of the first half and Robert Hill took care of the second half.

"You've got to go through the valleys to get to the peaks," said Lake Mary soccer coach Larry McCorkle Monday morning.

After experiencing the peak with an 8-0 victory over West Orange last Thursday, the second-year Rams found themselves looking up from the short end of a 4-1 setback to Boone on Saturday.


"I'm in a unique group, but I don't consider myself like them yet because there is room for me to improve," Walker said Saturday night after becoming just the seventh junior to win the award honoring the outstanding college football player in the nation.

"I can never say that I'm the best because I haven't faced every team in the country but, because of the award. I'll try to uphold the honor with my performance in life as well as on the field."

For the 20-year-old Walker, on the verge of becoming the NCAA's all-time leading rusher, winning the Heisman has been a long time coming. As a freshman, he finished third to winner George Rogers and runnerun Hugh Green, and as a sophomore, he was second behind Marcus Allen.

"He could have won it as a freshman and he could have won it as a sophomore," said Georgia Coach Vince Dooley, "He finally won it as a junior and I think that shows the consistency of the candidate, and that's what makes him great. Every week people try to stop him and they can't."

Walker captured the award by a wide margin over Stanford quarterback John Elway, with Southern Methodist running back Eric Dickerson third.




