

Polk Target: \$80,000 To Speed Design Work For New Jail Complex

Sheriff John Polk has requested \$80,000 to speed up plans for the county's proposed \$5-million-dollar jail facility in anticipation of federal dollars to fund the project.

Polk's request to continue design work for the proposed jail-sheriff's complex at Five Points was prompted by a \$4-billion public works bill that officials say is about to become law.

Last January, federal officers turned down Seminole's request for the \$5 million for construction of the jailhouse facility. The cut resulted from bureaucratic snafu, officials said then. But Polk and Commission Chairman Dick Williams flew to Washington and received assurances, they said, that Seminole will get part of

the new \$4-billion public works bill proposed by the Carter administration.

The bill has passed both the House and the Senate and differences are being ironed out by a joint conference committee. Officials predict the bill will become law by mid-April.

Polk says the design work needs to be moved along regardless of the bill's progress. The sheriff said he's keeping a close watch on the bill and expects the jail to be funded with federal dollars.

The sheriff is asking that the \$80,000 be taken from federal revenue-sharing funds. Seminole has about \$75,000 in federal money that wasn't budgeted for this fiscal year.

Commissioners Tuesday are scheduled to discuss Polk's jail request and a second one for \$39,000 to outfit a SWAT team in Seminole.

"We feel fairly certain we'll get the (jail) grant—if the bill comes through," Office of Management Analysis and Evaluation (OMAR) Director Pat Glisson said this morning.

Glisson said Polk's two requests are the only ones from agencies outside county government. Public works is asking for \$397,000. The fire department has requested \$182,000. County development wants \$65,000, and administrative services has a bid in for \$69,000.

Williams said Washington-based Economic Development Administration (EDA) Chief George Karras assured him Seminole will be "in" when the Carter administration wins the additional \$4-billion for public works projects.

County officials have recognized a need for a modern jail-sheriff's complex in the Five Points area. Hopes are high that federal funds will be forthcoming to construct the facility. If not, a referendum could be held and voters asked to devote tax dollars for a new jail.

The 37-inmate county jail in Sanford is filled on weekends to capacity, according to the sheriff. And, one way or the other, Polk says the county needs to build a new and larger jail.



MELODEE SKATING RINK J.S. BEST AT GATE-CRASHING SCENE

Gunshots, Gatecrashing A Noisy Tune At Melodee: Owners Nab Two Suspects

After four burglaries in three months, Melodee Skating Rink owner J.S. Best said he'd had enough and began living at his business on Sanford's W. 25th Street night and day.

Early today in a flurry of gunshots and gate-crashing with a van, Best and his 24-year-old son, Charles, rounded up two burglary suspects at the rink and held them at gunpoint for sheriff's deputies.

"I'm sick of it. I've had enough," Best said today as he recounted how burglars had repeatedly broken into his popular recreation business since early January, taking money and expensive sound equipment and vandalizing coin-operated machines.

Best said besides damage to the building he's lost over \$2,500 in cash and merchandise.

Just after midnight, Best, who has slept at the rink with his pistol at hand for the last month, said he was going to a restroom for drinking water

when he heard the sound of a protective mesh screen being pried off a window.

"Sure, I was scared. I didn't have my pistol with me but I looked out and there were two men trying to get in," he conceded.

Best moved silently through the 80-by-200-foot rink building to a telephone and alerted Charles.

As pre-arranged, Charles jumped in his van and headed for the rink. Best meanwhile was arming himself and easing out a side door where he confronted a man and fired a warning shot in the air.

"That guy tried to convince me that he was alone but I knew different," Best said.

Just as Charles approached the front gate of the fenced property he says he spotted a man climbing over a smaller fence at the building. His dad fired two more shots, missing the fleeing suspect.

But Charles didn't wait to open the gate, he crashed the van through the gate and raced across the parking lot with the running suspect in the light of the headlights.

Charles said when the suspect realized he was running into a small pond instead of a wooded area he halted and yelled, "O.K., you've got me."

Charles took the man in tow at gunpoint and back into the rink building where his father had herded the second suspect at gunpoint and the men were ordered to lay face down on the rink floor until the sheriff's department was notified and a deputy arrived.

Jailed in lieu of \$5,000 bond each on charges of attempted burglary and possession of burglary tools were Van Heflin Holloway, 22, of Barwick, Ga., and Douglas Hall, 31, of 2402 Chase Ave., Sanford.

Sheriff's deputy Elton Grantham reported cutter pliers and a screwdriver were found near the window mesh that had been pried on a bathroom window.

This morning Best and his son told reporters that they had no regrets about the incident despite the damages they'll have to pay for. There's \$500 to fix the gate and fence, \$1,000 damage to the van and at least \$50 damage to the window, Best said.

"You can't imagine how it is to open for business to find somebody's ripped out expensive sound equipment and broken open all the machines," Best said. He said he still has hopes that police may be able to recover some of the items stolen in previous burglaries.

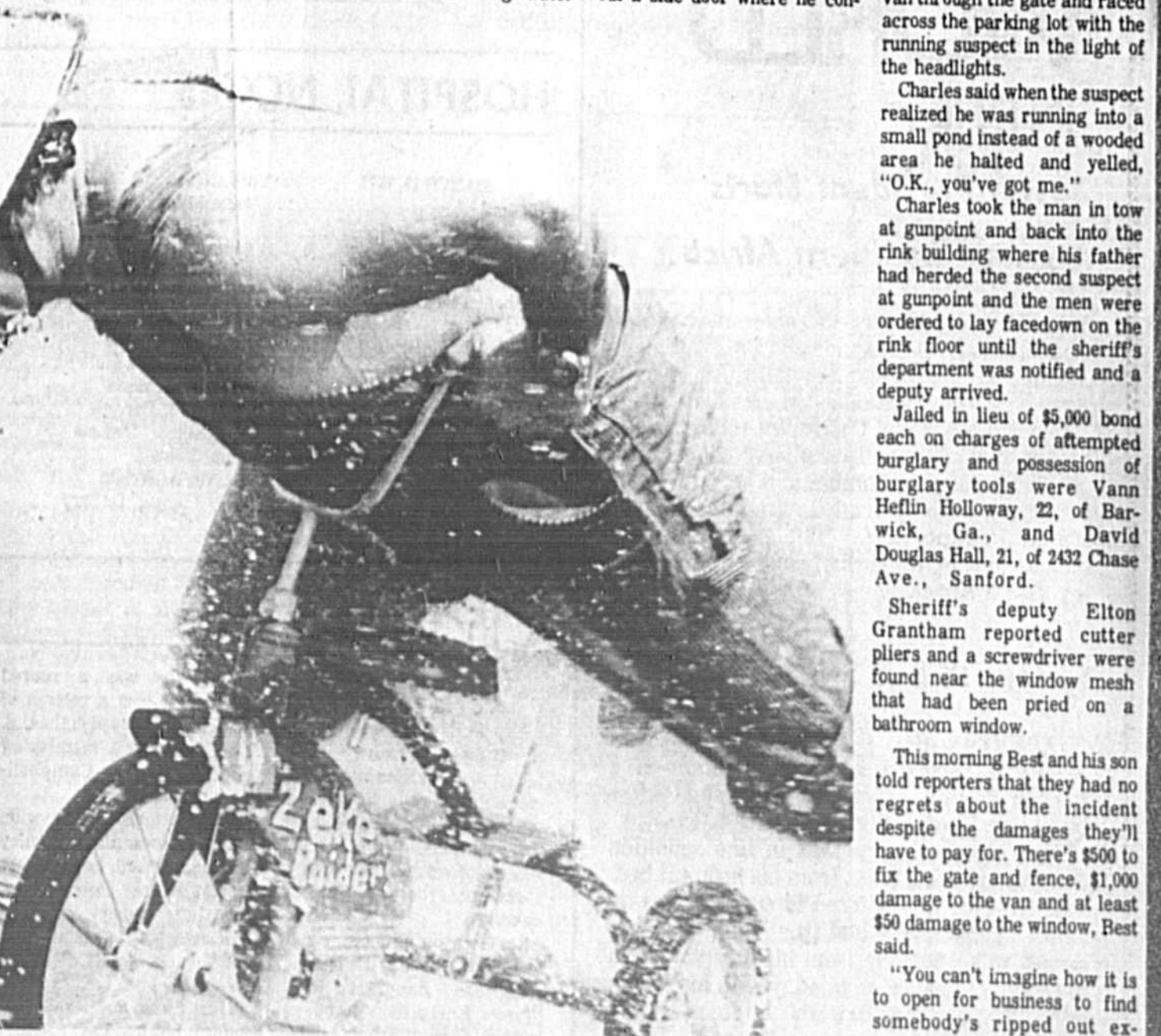
The word from Best is plain. Tell would-be burglars who decide his skating rink that's just outside the city limits is a prime target they can expect a hot reception.

JUST SPRAYING 'ROUND THE MALL

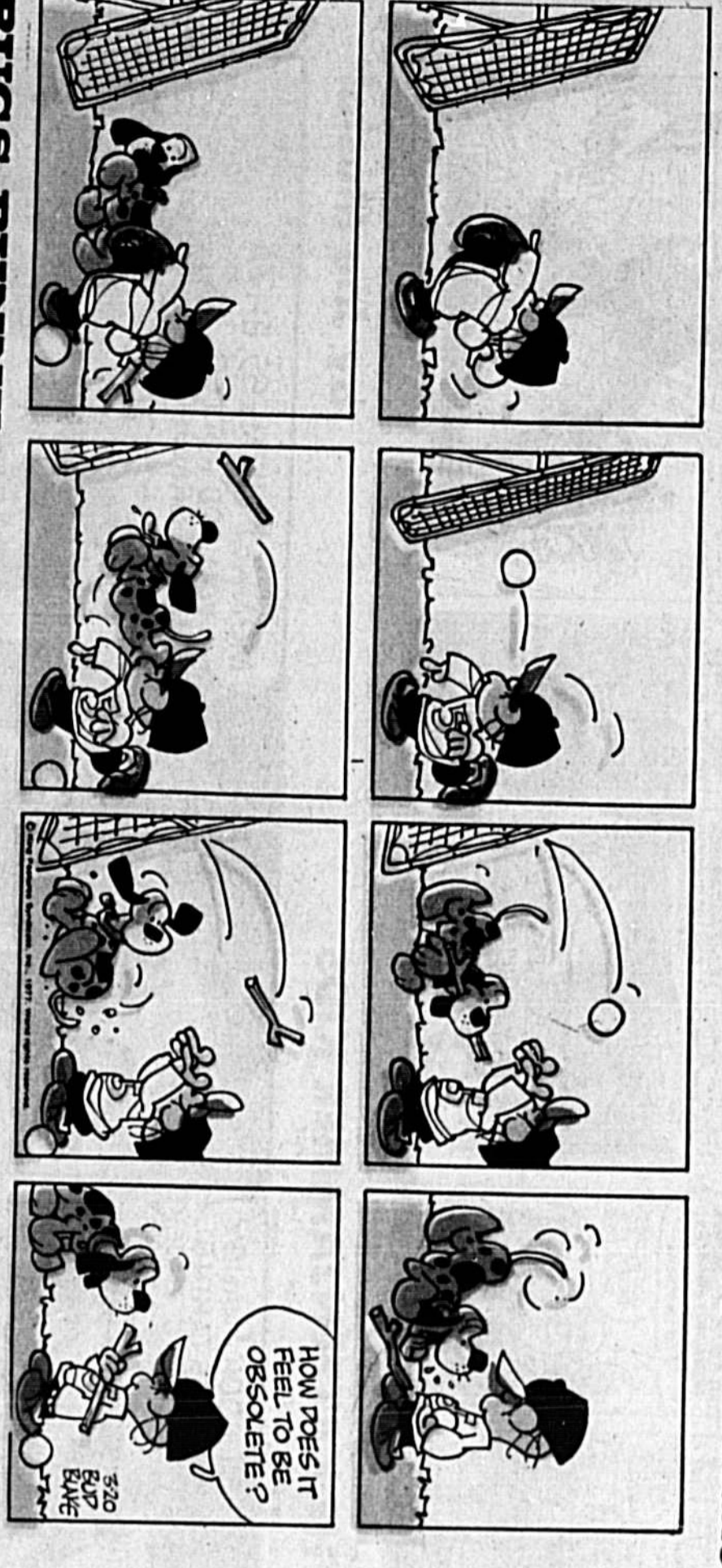

NCAA Down To Final Four Men From UNCC No Spy Story

By The Associated Press Top-rated Michigan and third-ranked Kentucky were bit the dust Saturday, No. 2 UCLA bowed out two days earlier and San Francisco, which held the top spot for much of the season, has been long gone from the National Collegiate basketball championships.

North Carolina was comfortable most of the way against Kentucky's physical Wildcats despite the loss of foul-plugged, sore-elbowed All-American Phil Ford for the last 19 minutes. While he was there, Ford scored only two points.

X-Ray Tests Indicate Marijuana Doesn't Damage Brain Or Nerves

CHICAGO (AP) — There is no evidence that heavy marijuana smoking changes the structure of the brain or central nervous system, two research groups conclude, despite earlier evidence that part of the brain wasted away under prolonged smoking. The new studies, carried out independently, are reported in the March 21 issue of The Journal of the American Medical Association. The earlier study was reported in 1971 in Lancet, a British medical journal, in which researchers testing 18 young men who were heavy users of marijuana found evidence of atrophy in the brain. The British study, conducted by Dr. A.M.G. Campbell of Bristol Royal United Hospital and his colleagues, was done with an X-ray technique in which injection of air or gas to outline portions of the brain. The new studies involved 12 young men who had smoked five or more marijuana cigarettes a day for at least five years. The Harvard team studied 19 males from middle-to upper-class socioeconomic backgrounds who were heavy marijuana smokers. They were kept in a hospital research ward so their behavior could be closely watched. They smoked five or more marijuana cigarettes, obtained from federal sources, daily for 21 days. Co and Goodwin said "the only prudent conclusion to draw" from their study is that "young men with extensive exposure to cannabis (marijuana) over a number of years do not necessarily show evidence of cerebral atrophy."

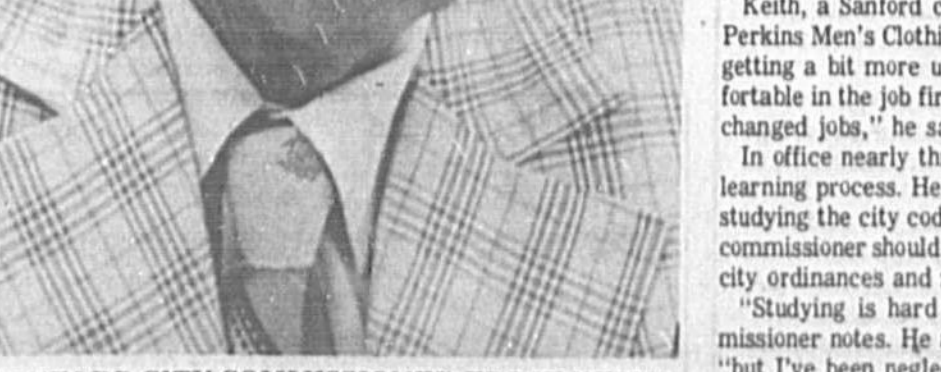
