

Polk Target: \$80,000 To Speed Design Work For New Jail Complex

Sheriff John Polk has requested \$80,000 to speed up plans for the county's proposed \$5-million-dollar jail facility in anticipation of federal dollars to fund the project.

Polk's request to continue design work for the proposed jail-sheriff's complex at Five Points was prompted by a \$4-billion public works bill that of ficials say is about to become law.

Last January, federal officers turned down Seminole's request for the \$5 million for construction of the jailhouse facility. The cut resulted rom bureaucratic snafu, officials said then. But Polk and Commission Chairman Dick Williams flew to Washington and received

Tanker Splits, 17 Missing

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP) - The Coast Guard said today a 676-foot Panamanian tanker with a crew of 39 broke in two after an apparent explosion in the Atlantic 140 miles off the North Carolina coast. Twenty-two survivors were spotted on the 20-year-old, Japanese-built tanker Claude Conway, and "some, it is

not clear how many" were removed to safety by mid-morning, the Coast Guard said. The Coast Guard said the tanker reportedly was empty. The explosion apparently occurred Sunday. Most of the survivors who had not been removed from

the Conway were congregated on the stern section of the ship, a Coast Guard spokesman said, as rescue efforts continued in calm, clear weather. The Coast Guard said it had received no reports that any of the Conway's crewmen had been found in the water

but said it was told "there were some injuries. We don't know how many or how bad." The injured were to be flown to the Marine Corps base at Camp Lejeune, N.C., for treatment, the Coast Guard spokesman said.

Four merchant ships, a helicopter and two airplanes were at the scene 125 miles southeast of Wilmington, N.C. Life boats were being lowered from the merchant ships to remove the Conway's surviving crewmen from the

shattered tanker. The helicopter also was equipped to lift men to safety. The stern section of the Conway was first spotted about 5 a.m. today and the bow section at daybreak, not far

away, by the merchant vessel Moss Point.

the new \$4-billion public works bill proposed by the Carter administration. The bill has passed both the House and the Senate and differences are being ironed out by a joint conference committee. Officials predict the bill will become law by mid-April.

Polk says the design work needs to be moved along regardless of the bill's progress. The sheriff said he's keeping a close watch on the bill and expects the jail to be funded with federal dollars.

The sheriff is asking that the \$80,000 be taken from federal revenue-sharing funds. Seminole has about \$575,000 in federal money that wasn't budgeted for this fiscal year.



2 New York Buildings

Damaged By Bombings

NEW YORK (AP) - Bombs went off early today in two buildings housing New York of fices of the FBI and the American Bank Note Co. The Puerto Rican terrorist group FALN

claimed it planted the explosives. A man walking by the Manhattan building in which the FBI has offices was hospitalized with a minor shoulder cut suffered when the bomb went off. The device exploded in a ground floor drug store and damage was confined to merchandise and windows.

The bomb which exploded at the American Bank Note building in the Bronx was described by police as "not powerful."

More Tax Reforms Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) - Six months after changing the nation's tax laws in a way that resulted in a record number of taxpayer errors, Congress is talking "simplification" again. The House has passed and the Senate Finance Committee is considering a new method of tax-computation that the Treasury Department says will make the annual taxpaying process easier for 96 per cent of the population. It will result in a longer but far simpler tax form, the experts say. The changes are part of a big taxcut bill, including \$50-per-person rebates, that the finance committee expects to approve this week.

Carter, Fukuda Start Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter and Japan's Prime Minister Takeo Fukuda, two newcomers to the international scene, are opening two days of talks on global economic and security issues. A White House ceremony featuring military honors was scheduled today for Fukuda, here on an official visit. The Carter-Fukuda talks are expected to focus on bilateral economic issues and on preparations for the May economic summit in London involving the United States, Japan and other industrial democracies.

MOSCOW (AP) - President Nikolai Podgorny left Moscow today on a major Soviet diplomatic mission to Southern Africa. He flew first to Tanzania, which his Latin-American ally Fidel Castro left today before his arrival. From Tanzania, Podgorny is scheduled to go to Zambia and Mozambique, two more of the so-called "frontline" black states supporting black nationalist movements in Rhodesia, South-West Africa and South Africa.

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GANDHI: Resigning

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Prime Minister Indira Gandhi probably will resign today following the loss of her seat in Parliament and reverses suffered by her Congress party in the Indian general election, official sources reported. Mrs. Gandhi's foes already had begun talks to try to put

together a government. With returns in for 283 of the 542 seats in the lower house of Parliament, the new Janata (People's) party had 135 and could count on the support of nine more. Mrs. Gandhi's Congress party, which won two-thirds of the seats in the 1971 election, had only 103. Independents, regional groups and a handful of minor parties accounted for the rest.

Hours after the announcement that she had lost her own seat the 59-year-old prime minister ordered the end of the state of emergency, under which she imprisoned thousands of her opponents, and the restoration of all civil liberties. Proclaimed in June 1975 to keep her in office after her con-

viction on a charge of campaign irregularities, the emergency sparked a voter revolt that contributed to her downfall, the defeat of her son Sanjay in his first bid for office, and the eclipse of the ruling dynasty her father, the late Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, established 30 years ago. The chief contenders to succeed her are two former leaders of

the Congress party who broke with her, Morarii Desai and Jagjivan Ram. Desai, now 81, was Mrs. Gandhi's deputy prime minister in 1969 when she split the party in a struggle for power with conservative leaders. He and other conservatives formed the Opposition

Congress, and in January it merged with three other opposition parties to form the Janata. Ram, the 68-year-old leader of India's Untouchable caste, was the agriculture minister in Mrs. Gandhi's last cabinet. He broke

with her last month and formed the Congress for Democracy, which won seven seats in the early returns. There was speculation that Mrs. Gandhi's defeat would produce more defectors from her Congress who would rally behind Desai

> French Stocks Take Tumble

PARIS (AP) - The French stock market fell sharply today after the Socialist-Communist alliance won a popular vote majority and control of more than 70 per cent of the big cities in Sunday's local election runoff. One broker blamed the slide, which averaged about four per

cent, on "jittery Black Monday trading" and added, "you can't say where it will go." Sunday's results spelled the biggest defeat ever for the con-

servative-centrist coalition the late President Charles de Gaulle forged after he established the Fifth republic 19 years ago. It opened a year of hard political fighting in preparation for National Assembly elections, scheduled for March 1978. Observers said the stock market seemed to react in particular

to leftist plans to nationalize French industries if it takes power. The French franc held firm in currency trading at just under five to the U.S. dollar, but a trader said the government was intervening heavily to protect the currency.

Leftist leaders said Sunday's voting showed the French people no longer feared the prospect of leftists in power.

GISCARD: A Blow PARIS (AP) - The Socialist-Communist drive to win control of

the French National Assembly next year picked up steam from runoff local elections in which the leftist alliance won a majority of the popular vote and control of 70 per cent of France's larger

Sunday's defeat was the biggest ever suffered by the con-servative-centrist coalition, forged by the late President Charles de Gaulle after he established the Fifth Republic 19 years ago. It opened a year of hard political fighting in preparation for the National Assembly elections scheduled for March 1978. "There's a strong wind blowing, and the country has sensed it,"

said Socialist leader Francois Mitterrand. "I don't say victory in the future is a sure thing, but it's certainly a good sign for the future," said Communist party leader Georges Marchais.

"Premier Raymond Barre and the government ran a demented campaign saying voting for the left equals collectivism. It doesn't work any more.'

The left came out of the local voting on the past two Sundays controlling 156 of the 221 French cities with more than 30,000 population and 51 per cent of the total vote. The moderates and conservatives who make up the National Assembly majority of President Valery Giscard d'Estaing got 47 per cent of the vote and kept 66 cities, including Toulouse, Strasbourg, Nancy, Metz and Bordeaux. Eighteen other cities

went to parties and candidates who usually vote with the govern-The Socialists won control of 82 cities, the Communists 71 and other leftist groups not affiliated with them got three. The most

impressive leftist wins were in Nantes and Rennes, conservative areas where the Socialists took control, and in LeMans and St. Etienne, where the Communists won. The leftists also increased their vote in Paris, but the tra-

ditionally moderate capital voted in Jacques Chirac, the former Gaullist premier, as its first mayor after 105 years of rule by the central government. His success was another blow to Giscard d'Estaing since Chirac is challenging the president for leadership of the moderates and conservatives.

Talk Now, Build Soon

Construction of Sanford's new city hall, which will be located just north of the current city hall, will be the subject of an afternoon "pre-construction conference" today between the contractor and city officials. Williams Development Co., whose low bid of \$1,406,000 was accepted last week by the City Commission, will build the new structure. Construction is scheduled to begin April 4.

According to regulations of the U.S. Commerce Department's Economic Development Administration, which granted the money for a new city hall, construction must begin by April 12, which is 90 days after the grant was awarded.

Some preparation of the construction site has begun, City Manager W.E. Knowles said this morning. Two trailers, which house city public works, civil service and the city engineer's office, were recently moved into the city employes' parking area just west of city hall. The trailers were located just north of city hall, the site of the new building. The entire city employes' parking lot north of city hall will be closed because of construction, Knowles said.

Florida Will Sue U.S. To Keep \$29 Million Aid

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Florida will go to U.S. district court to keep federal officials from cutting off \$29 million for a rehabilitation program that reaches 85,000 to 100,000 handicapped Floridians, state officials say.

"The suit will be filed in U.S. district court in Tallahassee, and it will probably be filed later this week," Gov. Reubin Askew aide Bonnie Armstrong said Sunday.

Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) Secretary Joseph Califano rejected a plea from Askew to grant Florida a waiver from federal rules or postpone the March 31 cutoff date. He notified state officials of his decision Saturday

But William Page, secretary of the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, said the state would file suit quickly to save the vocational rehabilitation program.

'Dead' Reports Revived

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Education Commissioner Ralph Turlington says he's learning that some of the 92 reports he abolished three years ago when he took office are really needed.

"What happens is the ones that you need flow back to the top," said Deputy Education Commissioner Roger Nichols.

He recently reinstated a report on the number of graduates of state university teacher training programs who were finding jobs as public school teachers.

The Senate Education Committee called for the report in January, saying no one could be sure whether Florida had too many or too few teachers or what the future might bring.

Barron Leads Tax Fight Again

Bar To Sue Over Poll Funds

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Election officials fear that political offices could go to the highest bidders if a threatened suit against Florida's law limiting political campaign contributions is successful.

"If the courts strike down these limits on contributions they might as well strike the entire 'who-gave-it-who-got-it' law," says Election Director Mary L. Singleton. "There wouldn't be much of a law left."

Gunter Unveils Policy Plan

TALLAHASSEE, (AP) - Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter today unveiled an ambitious plan he said would reduce auto insurance rates 30 to 80 per cent.

He called for abolition of compulsory liability insurance, replacing it with the requirement that motorists carry at least \$5,000 worth of personal injury protection, and elimination of lawsuits to recover "pain and suffering" resulting from auto accidents.

Own Shot Killed Gunman

Algie Simmons who held five persons hostage in the Catalina Motel, Saturday, actually died of gunshot wounds, apparently self-inflicted.

It had at first been assumed that the gunman died in flames from tear-gas cannisters thrown into the motel apartment to end the 12hour siege.

An autopsy report attributed death to a gunshot wound in his head. Two persons injured in the siege, Louis Smith and Patricia Truss, were reported in satisfactory condition today at Orlando Regional Medical Center.

Costly In Casselberry

The problems of graffiti and wanton destruction usually associated with New York and other big cities are also plaguing at least one Seminole municipality: Casselberry. The cost of these acts - whether perpetrated by adults with motives of revenge or theft or juveniles looking for excitement - has been high for the City of Casselberry's Utilities Department, running into many thousands of dollars.

Eventually these losses hit the consumer where it hurts - his pocketbook - being passed on in the form of higher rates. Favorite targets for vandalism and theft have been the newer installations such as the North Water Plant and South Water Plant.

according to operations supervisor Bill Schrader. When the North plant located in the Kathryn Woods area was added to the system, the cost for such destructive acts totalled \$6,000 in the first nine months. On one occasion alone it cost \$5,000 to replace stolen

damage done. The city's \$800,000 South plant, South of Howell Branch Road on SR 436, which began operation in October of last year, has been under attack by vandals and sabateurs armed with paint cans and fire bombs.





Wall Still Stands, A Double Failure

When Vice President Walter Mondale visited West Berlin, he looked over the infamous Berlin Wall and made an observation that inevitably comes to mind. The wall, he said, is a symbol of failure - the failure of East German communism to produce a society that doesn't require a wall to frustrate the desire of people to get out.

That's certainly true, but the wall now standing in its 16th year is beginning to symbolize another kind of failure. Hopes are fading, that the Helsinki Conference and other trappings of East-West detente would usher in a new era of freedom for travel and communication through the Iron Curtain and more liberty for the people of Eastern Europe.

If anything, the expectations raised by Helsinki may be producing a countermove by the Soviet Union to make it clear that very little has changed.

Late last year, East German authorities began an obvious campaign of harassment against dissidents who have been testing the atmosphere with expressions of unorthodox political opinion. Applicants for exit visas in East Berlin are being intimidated by police. New requirements have been invoked for Westerners wanting to visit East Berlin, prompting the United States, Britain and France to protest that the 1971 Four Power agreement on Berlin is being violated.

The U.S. State Department has fired off a protest to Prague, where the Communist government has been moving against signers of a manifesto demanding more recognition of human rights. The next day, we sent another protest to Moscow about the treatment of Andrei Sakharov, the Nobel scientist who dared to suggest that the police engineered an explosion in a Moscow subway to blame dissidents for an act of "terrorism."

Events behind the Iron Curtain speak poorly of the "spirit of Helsinki," if indeed that spirit existed at all outside the minds of Western statesmen. Protests from the West can assure dissenters under communism that they aren't forgotten, but Communist governments tend to greet them with

an attitude of "mind your own business." There is irony in the fact that West Berliners were especially pleased to see the new U.S. Vice President visit their isolated city. They are fearful that Berlin could become the focal point of a Soviet move to reassert its hold over the fate of Eastern Europe and to test the stamina of President Carter. It was Willy Brandt, the former chancellor of West Germany and former mayor of West Berlin, who gave detente its initial push in 1970.

The momentum of his Ostpolitik - his treaty with Moscow recognizing postwar borders of East Germany, and his meetings with East German leaders giving tacit recognition to their government - carried Europe all the way to Helsinki in 1970.

Gerrymandering

There is some question as to the scope of the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in support of a legislative reapportionment plan in New York which was frankly designed to create districts with black majorities.

The decision of the justices was based on their conviction that the goal of the remapping was to conform with the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965. But, disregarding the debatable desirability of establishing

racial quotas as guidelines in shaping political, educational or employment patterns, consideration of "community of interest" in drawing political boundaries is justified. It can be assumed that members of a racial minority share

common objectives and deserve the political clout of concentrated voting power. The same case can be made for structing political districts to strengthen the voice of farmers, perhaps, or residents of dense


urban areas - or fishermen. The court has given its stamp of approval to a little gerrymandering if it promises political unity to those who hold similar views - stopping short, presumably, of embracing

DON OAKLEY Tax Breaks Spreading Opposition

The exemption of a wide range of properties from real estate taxes is an old, established American tradition that has withstood numerous court challenges.

The question today is whether it can withstand a brewing taxpayer revolt. Most people recognize that tax-exempt real estate (property held by churches, schools, charities, hospitals and similar non-profit institutions, as well as by federal state and local

governments serves the general welfare. It is the growing ratio of this tax-exempt property to taxable property, combined with ever-higher property taxes for homeowners, that is giving more and more people cause for concern, writes Leonard Sloane in a recent Parade

In financially precarious New York City, for example, the percentage of tax-exempt property use from 20 per cent in 1950 to almost 40 per cent in 1976. More than \$25 billion worth of property in that city is now free from real estate taxes. According to Democratic Rep. Edward I. Koch, the city of New York is subsidizing the federal government alone to the tune of \$50 (A) million a year in lost property tax revenues, and foreign governments by another \$8 million. He has proposed a bill that would allow cities to apply for government payments in lieu of real estate taxes on exempt federal and foreign-held

Casselberry Kills Plan To Fluoridate City Water printed on the monthly water bills, voting 657 for

The Casselberry City Council in a close 3-2 vote Monday night killed the planned fluoridation of the city's water supply

Along with halting fluoridation, the council instructed the administration of the city to dispose of \$20,000 worth of equipment purchased to inject the chemical into the city water, selling the equipment for as much as possible.

Councilmen Frank Schutte and John Leighty fought the action even though both said they were opposed to fluoridation personally.

Leighty pushed for a decision on the issue and after a lengthy discussion during workshop and with input from a few persons in the sparse audience, the council called itself back into official session to vote on the matter.

Leighty, pointing out that the people of Casselberry in a straw ballot in 1973 voted for association presidents and local fluoridation and again in a poll of water customers school advisory chairman over the past few weeks voted for fluoridation, revealed that 95 per cent insisted the council should do what the people "want

"I have to do what the people of the city want me to do while I sit in this seat," Leighty said. "The voters have spoken," Schutte said. Council Chairman Nathan Van Meter said only 16

New County Policy: See Us Before Trying To Build In Hammock

By ED PRICKETT Herald Staff Writer

The Seminole County Commission, in a surprise 4 1 vote today, set a new county policy which requires that county government review all applications for building permits in the Spring Hammock area before any new construction can begin.

Conservationists had requested a building moratorium on hammock property until the county's comprehensive plan is adopted in October.

Although today's action isn't an official moratorium, Director of County Development John Percy said it will spotlight any petitions for building

County Opts Against Sanford Annex Plan, Page 2A permits in the hammock, which environmentalists say should be left as is because of its value to Seminole County.

The Spring Hammock area, as defined today by county planners, encompasses a 21/2 square-mile area from SR-427 to SR-419 on both sides of General Hutchison Parkway.

Commission Chairman Dick Williams proposed last week that the commission review applications spurned.

Count Commissioner John Kimbrough made the motion to adopt the new policy. It was seconded by Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff. Williams and Commissioner Bob French also voiced approval; Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski cast the lone opposition vote.

County planners asked that the commissioners also set standards which would determine whether future building permits would be issued for the environmentally sensitive area.

Kimbrough and French, however, didn't approve the proposed standards. French said his understanding was that requests for permits will be "brought before the board."

"We'll look at them (permits) to see if there's a problem," Kimbrough commented.

Williams, who favored setting standards, commented. "Half a loaf is better than none."

The standards proposed by the planners were taken from the comprehensive plan. In essence, the standards designated Spring Hammock as an environmentally sensitive area and recommended low-density zoning.
