COMMITTEE OF SENATE OKEYS RELIEF BILL

Debate Is Begun Upon Roosevelt Plan For Giving Men Jobs In Country's Forests

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—(AP)—The administration's bill to create a \$500,000,000 unemployment relief fund was reported to the Senate today by the banking committee for consideration immediately following the Roosevelt reforestation measure.

The committee gave unanimous approval to the bill at about the time debate began on Roosevelt's plan to put 250,000 men to work in the nation's forests.

Final vote is expected by the end of the week.

Senator Wagner, Democrat of New York, who is the sponsor of the \$500,000,000 bill, said it will be taken up for consideration shortly and predicted its approval by the end of the week.

Full approval of the administration plan, as passed by the House, was expected before the Senate agriculture committee by U. S. Black, president of the American Cotton Cooperative Association breaking a long parade of opposition to the measure.

The House judiciary committee decided to give further consideration Thursday to the Wilson-Cotton Reliance bill.

Chairman Rogers, said he thought there will be action on the bill today.

Criticism of the Roosevelt plan yesterday before the Senate agriculture committee as the administration measure bumped the tower of the Senate floor.

AKRON, Mar. 28.—(AP)—A crude attempt to blackmail Mrs. Charles Lindbergh for \$25,000 was thwarted today with the arrest of a 15-year-old Hudson high school boy whose name was withheld by authorities.

The boy, they said, readily admitted mailing two letters to the aviator's wife but said "I don't know what I would have done with the money if I got it. My father will kill me, though, when he finds out."

ACTION SOUGHT ON CHARGES OF MELLON DEALS

Accusation Made That Officials Failed To Collect Huge Taxes

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—(AP)—A department of justice investigation of charges that Andrew W. Mellon and other former and present officials of the treasury failed to collect more than \$600,000,000 in taxes and interest from foreign-ownership companies and the Gulf Oil Company, a Mellon concern, was sought in a resolution yesterday by Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana.

The resolution cited that civil suits had been filed in the local courts against Mellon and others by David A. Olson, former counsel for the Senate stock marketing investigating committee, charging the taxes had been "illegally withheld" from the treasury and seeking their recovery for the government.

Assertion Is Made In Emperor's Proclamation Announcing League Withdrawal

TOKIO, Mar. 28.—(AP)—Japan's withdrawal from the League of Nations was announced in a proclamation by Emperor Hirohito in which it was asserted the nation was "sadly separated" from League efforts to assure peace.

The decision was communicated to the League in a telegram which asserted that the League assembly's report on Manchuria, which condemned Japan's course, was "unfair" and "unjust."

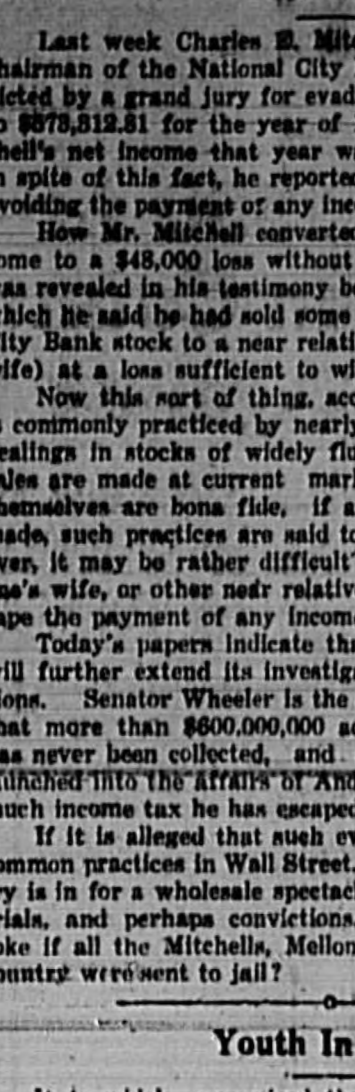

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LABOR LEADERS ARE INVITED TO COMING PARLEY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—To discuss means of providing further employment and of assuring a rise in industrial standards when revival begins to take place, Miss Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor, has invited more than a score of labor leaders to confer here on Mar. 31, "at the request of President Roosevelt."

A program of public works, relief measures, short hours as a means of further employment, increase of purchasing power of the wage earners and its effect on stimulation of employment, unemployment insurance, home mortgage problems of wage earners and unemployed workers, and a study of the possibilities of reabsorbing labor into its normal employment are the "emergency items" to be discussed.

The labor leaders will attempt to determine whether shorter hours should take the form of a short day or week or both. They will discuss whether federal legislation, state legislation or voluntary joint agreements between employers and employees constitute the best method of introducing short hours. They will go into the question whether increased purchasing power can best be brought about by minimum wage legislation, joint action between employers and employees, through the regulation of wages
