Gas leak causes traffic tie-up

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Traffic was blocked on State Road 436 near Jasmine Road for nearly 45 minutes by police this morning as county fire crews turned off a natural gas leak at the Dunkin' Donuts restaurant.

A Seminole County public safety dispatcher said the leak was reported at 9:37 this morning at the restaurant at 653 S.R. 436. He said the employees and patrons of the restaurant were evacuated until the leak was stopped by 10:15

Man killed in ink plant blast

MARLBORO, Mass. - One man died from injuries suffered in an explosion and fire at an ink manufacturing plant that hurt 21 others, officials said Tuesday.

Authorities were investigating the cause of the blast at the Gotham Ink company in Mariboro, about 20 miles west of Boston. The explosion occurred about 9:50 a.m. Monday, a Fire Department spokesman said.

Romildo Hoffman, who was airlifted from Mariboro Hospital to Worcester City Hospital, died Monday night, a hospital spokeswoman said. Hoffman's age and address were not immediately available.

Candidate wins by one vote

BERKELEY, Calif. — After four months of counting and controversy, Berkeley officials declared Monday that Ricardo Noguera had been elected to the city's Rent Board by a one-vote margin out of more than 40,000 cast.

Noguera received 20,241 votes to 20,240 for his opponent, Richard Holt.

It was originally appounced that Holt had

It was originally announced that Holt had beaten Noguera by 13 votes last Nov. 8, but a lawsuit led a Superior Court judge to order a recount of 369 provisional ballots.

Tower gets Democratic boost

WASHINGTON - President Bush now has ne of the Senate Democrats he needs for John Tower's confirmation as defense secretary, but the odds still weigh against success.

Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., a former chief justice of the Alabama Supreme Court, became the first Democrat to support Tower, declaring Monday he would vote for confirmation.

Heflin noted the chief concern voiced by Tower's detractors was whether the nominee has a drinking problem. The Democrat said he had never seen Tower drunk during the years they served together in the Senate and, besides, there are adequate safeguards if Tower breaks his pledge not to drink if confirmed.

Road project sparks debate

Lake Mary road widening subject of disagreement among Sanford officials

SANFORD — Disagreement among city commissioners surfaced Monday night over the proposed city contribution to the Lake Mary Boulevard widening project.

At a city workshop, Commissioner Lon Howell told the commission that a decision needed to be made concerning the city's part in an agreement to widen the boulevard. "For the city of Sanford

to put \$1 million into it is ridiculous....If we're going to spend \$1 million, let's put it into (State Road) 46," he said.

However, commissioner Whitey Eckstein, the commission's representative on the Lake Mary Boulevard study committee, argued that Lake Mary Boulevard will be an entrance to Sanford Regional Airport when passenger and cargo services go on line. The project would not get underway until 1994, and any contribution by the city could be financed over time, he said.

"We have this downtown mentality," Eckstein said. "This could be an entranceway for many,

many citizens." "For what it would do for us and for what it's going to cost us," Commissioner A. A. Mc-Clanahan said, "it scares me."

The study committee has prepared an interlocal agreement providing for a \$925,000 contribution from the city of Sanford, \$1.09 million from Lake Mary and \$1.74 million from Seminole County. Sanford would be responsible for irrigating, maintaining and paving the extension from Sanford Avenue to U.S. 17-92 and jointly with Lake Mary from U.S. 17-92 to Country Club Road.

The debate took place during a four-hour workshop with one agenda item: the future of

The commissioners identified a four-page list of goals to address two pages of the city's strengths and one of its weaknesses.

Terry will keep title for 60 days

LONGWOOD - City Clerk Don Terry will continue his duties as Acting City Administrator for another 60 days.

A special election to fill the vacancy of ousted Commissioner Carol Odom for District 3 will be on May 9, 1989.

Commissioners last night approved a new emergency ordinance to allow Terry to continue his services as acting city administrator until a new administrator is appointed. The first emergency ordinance adopted by the commissioners expired on March 5, 1989. The city has already received close to 60 applications for the city administrator position left vacant when former administrator Gene DeMarie was fired by the commissioners on Jan. 3. Application deadline is March 15.

The qualification period for candidates for the special election for the District 3 commission seat will be from 8 a.m. Friday, March 24 to 5 p.m. Friday, March 31. All candidates must qualify with the city clerk at city hall, 175 W Warren Ave. Voter registration will close Friday, April 7. Residents may register at Longwood City Hall or with any Seminole County voter

registration office.

The special election will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Tuesday, May 9 at the Longwood City Hall.

Perry Faulkner previously an-nounced he will run for the seat. Last November, Faulkner was defeated by Odom in a three-way race to unseat incumbent Lynette Dennis. Faulkner served a term as commissioner in 1985-86. He is general manager of Orlando Radial Tire Co.

Commissioners voted 3 to 1 on February 27 to remove Odom because she had violated the city charter. The charter requires that commissioners forfeit their office if they violate an express prohibition of the charter. Commissioners found that she interfered in administrative matters by interview-

Schools need \$40 million boost

Unexpected influx of new students leaves education budget in a pinch

TALLAHASSEE - An unexpected influx of new students means the Department of Education will need \$40 million more than had been expected in the upcoming fiscal year. Education Commissioner Betty Castor said Monday.

Castor said the money should come from a \$500 million trust fund Gov. Bob Martinez is relying on to ease a prison space shortage that has forced the early release of thousands of criminals.


Castor had based her budget request on a December projection that there would be 67,000 new students in public schools this year. Last week, an updated pro-

jection showed there will actually be 76,645 new students, many of them Nicaraguan refugees who will need English-language and other special courses.

"It will cost \$224 million to educate the 76,000 students and that is unfortunately \$40 million more than we expected in December, \$40 million more than is in our budget, \$40 million more than is in the governor's budget.' Castor said.

Finding the money to provide teachers, classrooms and equipment for those new students will not be easy, Castor said, especially because Martinez and top legislators have repeatedly said they will not raise taxes this year.

County may buy new phone system from Disney supplier

SANFORD - By the end of the year, Seminole County's telephone system may have ears -Mickey Mouse ears, that is.

Officials from Vista-United Telecommunications, Inc. unveiled a proposed \$1.2 million telephone system to Seminole County officials Monday afternoon. The company, jointly-owned by Walt Disney World and United Telephone Co., provides equipment for Walt Disney World.

County commissioners approved negotiating with Vista-United in December. County purchasing director Betsy Leonard said a contract will be available for commissioner's approval on March 14. Commissioners sought to replace the current system, which they say has become costly to maintain and has not been able to keep up with the growing demand by the public for county services.

The proposed Vista-United system uses Northern Telecom equipment and has the capability of up to 5,000 telephones in the County Services Building on First Street. The Seminole County Courthouse and the Five Points complex would each have the capability of 1,500 telephones if needed.

The State Attorney's office, Environmental Services and Health Department will each have up to 400 telephones available to them.

A total of 200 different direct lines will also be

availabe throughout the system, Mueller said.

The five county buildings will be connected by a combination of microwave towers and lines. Should a connection between buildings be disrupted, the system will automatically switch to another connection route, said Gary Windjack. county telephone consultant.

Up to 96 people will be able to call into the County Services Building at the same time. ending the busy signal often heard by callers on busy days and times, said Terry Mueller. Vista-United's account executive for the county. Each building outside the services building will have about 30 lines available to them for incoming calls, freeing lines into the County Services Building.

The system's automatic switching will allow callers to select from a menu of departments and services and each department will also have a menu to allow callers to reach their county sources without asking an operator to route

Should the county employee or officials be unavailable, the caller's message can be recorded on the "voice mail" system.

If commissioners approve the system March 14, it can be installed in the Environmental Services and Health Departments by mid-April, said Roger Schrank. Vista-United project manag-

Electrical problems delay shuttle launch

CAPE CANAVERAL - The shuttle Discovery's rocky road to blastoff took a detour Monday with launch delayed from Saturday to at least March 13, because of time needed to replace a faulty electrical component.
"We're no earlier than the 13th, and that's

soft." NASA spokeswoman Lisa Malone said. The latest problem for the year's first shuttle flight, already more than two weeks behind schedule, involved a "master events controller," or MEC, that failed a routine test Sunday night.

The component is one of two such devices that control when the shuttle's boosters and external tank separate during launch.

Malore said a firm launch date would not be known until a replacement unit, taken from the shuttle Columbia, is installed and tested and that work will not be complete until Wednesday.

If the work goes smoothly, Discovery could be ready to blast off on the 28th shuttle mission at 8:07 a.m. EST Monday, March 13. But Malone said launch could be delayed an additional day or so if the workers run into problems or if expected bad weather delays work at the launch pad.

Discovery's launch on the third post-Challenger shuttle flight, the first of seven planned for 1989, had been planned for

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Fishing license proposal approved

TALLAHASSEE - Florida fishermen would have to purchase a \$10 annual saltwater license to fish off the state's coast under a bill passed Monday by the Senate Natural Resources Committee.

The bill would require non-resident fishermen to have a \$25 annual license. The only fishermen exempt would be lower income people who receive Medicaid or Aid to Families with

Sponsors said the bill would raise millions of dollars that would be used to protect and improve Florida's badly overfished marine resources.

"It's going to provide a funding source of close to \$20 million or more for research and the Marine Patrol," said Sen. Tom McPherson, D-Fort Lauderdale. "Initially we would get 50 new Marine Patrol Officers, and eventually a lot more than that, eventually 150.

Licenses would be required after Jan. 1, 1990, and would raise about \$8.8 million in the final six months of the 1989-90 fiscal year.

The license would also provide the Department of Natural Resources vital statistical information about how many people fish in Florida's waters and what they catch.

Slow jury process begins in Cruse trial

BARTOW - William Cruse hunkered down in a chair and clenched his eyes shut Monday while a judge read to potential jurors 36 felony charges against the retired librarian accused of mass murder.

Nearly two years after the bloody rampage through Cruse's Palm Bay neighborhood and two nearby shopping plazas, Cruse, 61, started trial far from the Brevard County community he allegedly terrorized.

The trial was moved to rural Polk County because extensive publicity would have prevented an impartial jury from being seated. But the story of one of Florida's most sensational crimes reached across the state, with every potential juror questioned Monday admitting they knew something about the

It took Circuit Judge John Antoon nearly 30 minutes to read the charges of six first-degree murders, 28 attempted killings and two kidnappings to dozens of potential jurors.

Cruse, his pale face partially covered by long gray hair and beard, appeared disinterested in the proceedings in which one potential juror after another was called to the witness box and asked about his or her familiarity with the case.

The defense is expected to seek an acquittal on grounds of insanity, which would require proving that Cruse is mentally ill and that he does not understand that what he did was illegal.

Right whale sightings up dramatically

BRUNSWICK, Ga. - The number of right whale sightings more than tripled during the fifth annual survey of the migrating mammals conducted off the Georgia and North Florida coasts, officials said Monday.

"What this means is that the coasts of Georgia and northern Florida are again a comfortable place for them," said Hans Neuhauser, chairman of the U.S. Right Whale Recovery Team. "It's obviously a great improvement over last year.

In February 1988, the survey team reported that only seven of the giant mammals, which were declared an endangered species in 1937, were spotted.

The low numbers, especially the report of only two calves, raised fears among researchers that the whales were falling to come back from extinction.

Neuhauser said it is possible dredging at the Kings Bay Naval Submarine Base, the new home for the nation's Atlantic Trident Submarine fleet, prompted the whales to veer from their normal migration path in 1988.

"We'll certainly never be able to prove this," he said. "But you've got to remember that with whales everything is done by sound. If there is a major disturbance in sound, that might cause them to go somewhere else."

Hospital wants to close

MIAMI - AMI Southeastern Medical Center, beset by too many competitors and too few patients, should be the first major south Florida hospital allowed to close, its owners said

"Somebody believed at some time that there should be that many players down here, and that somebody was us," said Sharon Gordon-Girvin, the head of the state office that decides which health programs can open and close.

She said the 224-bed hospital in North Miami Beach, which had eight patients one day last week, has a 50-50 chance of closing. State officials must be convinced that the hospital is unneeded - not only that it is closing to reduce competition with its sister hospital, AMI Parkway, 2 miles away.

There are seven hospitals within a 2-mile area in north Dade County.

Florida consumers are confident

GAINESVILLE - While consumer confidence among Floridians continued to climb in February, plans to buy big-ticket items fell sharply, economists at the Univer-

sity of Florida said Monday.

The Florida Consumer Confidence Index. at 98.0 in January, rose to 99.9 percent last month, according to UF's Bureau of Economic and Business Research, which compiles the index from a monthly survey of 600 randomly selected households. The index has been climbing since last October, when it stood at 96.2.

Also rising was the percentage of Floridians optimistic about their current financial situation - up from 40.3 percent in January to 49.2 percent last month. In February, 49.5 percent expected good

financial times personally in the next year. up from 42.9 percent two months ago.

"Despite this apparent optimism, Floridians believe strongly that now is a time to reduce spending," said Jerry Milliman, director of the research bureau.

"The proportion of consumers feeling that now is a good time to make major household purchases decreased from 64.9 percent in January to 58.1 in February while those declaring it a bad time to buy appliances. furniture, carpeting and other big-ticket items increased from 14.1 to 18.9 percent,"

Milliman says there are several possible explanations for the mixed signals Florida's

consumers are giving. "Consumer optimism is high because personal income jumped quite a bit in January: 1.8 percent nationally," he said. "However, higher interest rates appear to be limiting plans for making major purchases. which consumers buy on credit.

"As a result, the savings rate has soared recently. People may have more income, but they are saving more and spending less. That does not bode well for retail sales in Florida in the coming months.'

Milliman said the consumers' cautious attitude is "consistent with the view of Florida economists who have forecast a slowing in state growth in 1989." He said the slowdown of population growth and the rise in interest rates are beginning to affect the Florida housing market and may reduce stimulus to trade, services and new construction.

Developers want a higher gas tax

TALLAHASSEE - Florida developers said Monday that unless motor fuel taxes and other transportation-related fees are Increased by more than \$200 million annually, growth in the state may grind to a halt because

of a lack of money.
"We firmly believe that the time has come to stop debating whether or not there is a need for funding the infrastructure," said Jim Rester, president of the Association of Florida Community Developers Inc..

The association called for a 10-cent per gallon "user fee" on motor fuels, a \$100 one-time charge on new auto purchases, a \$1 surcharge on car rentals and a flat \$35 rate on all vehicle tags.

Rester said the charges would Increase the Department of Transportation budget to \$852.5 million annually, compared with the \$645 million budget request Gov. Bob Martinez has made for the department for the upcom-

ing flacal year.

Martinez has said he opposes a gas tax increase or other fee increases to boost the DOT budget, which is facing an estimated \$900 million shortfall over the next six years.

Transportation Secretary Kaye Henderson said bad planning and management already have canceled consideration of some DOT proposals for the upcoming fiscal year and has called in outside help to solve the department's financial problems.

Rester said developers have been caught in a squeeze created by the state's Growth Management Act, which went into effect this year and mandates that local governments have infrastructure funding for roads and utilities in place before allowing new developments to begin.

The combination of the DOT shortfall and the law have forced some cities and counties to halt developments and Rester said the situation only will get worse until a "realistic" approach is taken to provide transportation

Under the developers' proposal, local governments would get half of the motor fuel tax increase and the rest would go to DOT. Rester said that would give cities and counties a revenue base for new roads and streets and allow the state to complete needed construction near or in new developments.

Group calls for insurance revolt

TALLAHASSEE - Officials from a consumer group said Monday private automobile insurance rates in Florida should be cut 25 percent, but in-dustry experts said the reduction is unnecessary and justified by bad information.

"The time has come for Floridians to join Californians in the auto insurance revolt," said Frank Jackalone, executive director of the Florida Consumers Federation Inc., the group calling for the

Jackalone said a petition drive will begin Saturday in an effort to get the Legislature to approve the cut this year, along with a series of other proposals made by the federa-

He said the group also wants rate relief for safe drivers, stronger enforcement of mandatory insurance laws, the elimination of unfair industry practices and the abolition of the antitrust exemption granted insurance companies.

Jackalone said an lilinois

study showed Florida had the 10th highest auto insurance

rates in the country, with the average policy for minimum coverage costing a person with a good driving record \$595 annually in 1987.

He said that was an increase from \$533 in 1986 and that auto insurance premiums jumped 63 percent from 1982 to 1987.

But Sam Miller, executive

director of the Fiorida Insurance News Service, said the federation's study was flawed. Miller said an A.M. Best Co. survey ranked Florida 29th in the country in the cost of auto premiums.

Miller said in 1987, autoinsurance companies in Florida had a total profit of \$48 million, or 1.5 percent.

Miller said Florida already has some of the toughest insurance regulation statutes in the nation and pointed to the fact that the state's insurance operation has been praised by the likes of con-sumer advocate Ralph Nader.

Jackalone said no sponsor has been found for the bill containing the package of re-forms advocated by the group.

Lotto prize is claimed

TALLAHASSEE - A nursing home worker who had not played the lottery in several months Monday turned in a Lotto ticket worth \$37.4 million prize, the second largest jackpot since the weekly game began last May.

"I'm getting a Rolls Royce," said Gloria Mitchem, 25, from the north Florida town of Bronson, at a news conference. Mitchem said her winning six-number ticket was one of four she bought last week after she stopped playing the Lotto game for several months.

Mitchem said she was in her trailer home by herself when she heard the winning numbers broadcast shortly after they were drawn Saturday

Eastern operations slashed

MIAMI - Eastern Airlines Monday suspended all but its two most lucrative operations, the Northeast shuttle and a route to South America, after failing to persuade pilots to cross ground workers' pickets lines. As many as 6,000 employees were immediately laid off.

Eastern also asked a federal judge to order the airline's 3,600 pilots to stop honoring the strikers' picket lines, which went up Saturday, and to award it damages for what it termed an illegal pilots' strike.

Robin Matell, an Eastern vice president and the carrier's chief spokesman, said the cutback in service meant between 5,000 and 6,000 employees were put on "no-work" status Monday and paid for the hours they worked in March. Normally the workers would be paid March 15.

The airline is maintaining its prestigious shuttle operation linking New York, Washington and Boston, and thrice-weekly service from Miami to Buenos Aires, Argentina, and Santiago. Chile, because they are the most profitable, Matell said. He also said the shuttle is the easiest operation to maintain because it requires no advance bookings or ticketing.

"We deeply regret having to take this action, but not enough pilots are coming to work," Matell said. "We cannot afford the steady financial drain which this type of sub-par operation creates."

Eastern employees present at the announcement greeted the news of the cutbacks and layoffs with tears. "It is sad," said Karen Ceremsak, a spokeswoman at Eastern.

Reacting to the layoffs, Charles Bryan, president of International Association of Machinists District 100, which represents the Eastern's 8,500 striking mechanics and baggage handlers. said, "Our membership has done what it had to

"(The people being laid off) were in there trying to go against us, do our work, break our ranks and so forth, so I don't have any great sense of feeling for them. But I don't like to see anyone Bryan said. "I think we have had a very effective strike. To that extent, if you want to call it victory, it is that."

Eastern said only 200 of its 3,600 pilots have come to work since the strike began. Eastern has described that boycott as an illegal strike.

'We have filed in federal district court of Miami a request for a permanent injunction and damages against the pilots union.

Former Contra fund-raiser takes stand against North

WASHINGTON - A former fund-raiser convicted in 1987 of tax fraud - who named Oliver North a co-conspirator - has begun telling North's jury how millions of dollars were gathered from private citizens for the Nicaraguan rebels.

Carl Channell began Monday what could be critical testimony against the ex-White House aide, who is charged with lying to Congress about his activities for the Contra rebels at a time when official U.S. ald was banned.

Channell, whose National Endowment for the Preservation of Liberty raised the money for the Contras, was expected to detail Tuesday how he and North solicited wealthy private citizens with appeals for the

rebel force. The third week of North's felony trial opened with a tense exchange between U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell and de-

fense lawyer Brendan Sullivan. ... Sullivan complained Gesell unfairly limited evidence that said he just wants to "end this trial while I'm still alive."

again, I've ruled on your behalf," Gesell, 78, told Sullivan. "I think you're being oversensitive."

Much of the money that Channell raised for the Contras. while ostensibly going to pay for "humanitarian" assistance such as food, uniforms and medicine - actually purchased weaponry in 1985 and 1986 for the rebels, who were trying to overthrow Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

Those arms purchases violated the tax laws and Channell was convicted in April 1987 of tax fraud. He named North, a former aide on the National Security Council, a co-conspirator.

North, a retired Marine lieutenant colonel, is charged with lying to Congress about his covert activities for the rebels, destroying official documents about those acts, tax fraud and accepting an illegal gift. If convicted of all 12 counts, he could face 60 years in prison and \$3

million in fines. The confrontation between the judge and lawyer came when Sullivan objected to Gesell's

ruling to limit the evidence on the 1985 and 1986 arms sales to Iran - made in a secret effort to buy freedom for Americans held hostage in Lebanon by pro-Iran extremists.

Gesell narrowed the focus of such information because the two key counts against North that dealt with those sales conspiracy to defraud the government and theft of government property - were dropped Jan. 13.

He said detailed testimony about the arms sales is no longer relevant and cautioned against raising the subject to stretch out the trial unnecessarily.

Sullivan, his voice rising slightly, said, "The indictment (against North) makes specific reference to the Iran initiative. ... The government's opening statement discusses the Iran Initiative."

Of North's participation in the tangled policies. Sullivan said. "lan't it relevant to show that there was a dual role?"

in civil tones, was the most pointed between Gesell and Sullivan since North's trial started Feb. 21 but not the first time Sullivan has accused Gesell of being unfair.

At a late January hearing. Gesell replied to Sullivan's complaint, "I understand you're trying to build a record on that" for an appeal.

Sullivan has built a reputation for confrontation in defending North. During his client's 1987 testimony to the congressional Iran-Contra committees, he once took umbrage at a perceived slight by saying. "I'm the lawyer here! I'm not a potted plant!"

River festival gem should be polished

The St. Johns River Festival is a wonderful idea. It's good for Sanford and it's good for downtown.

What a pleasant outing it is to pass an afternoon along the waterfront at Lake Monroe and inspect, perhaps admire, interesting art and crafts, and maybe even buy something.

The Sanford Seminole Art Association and the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, the sponsors of the two-day event that concluded Sunday, are to be commended.

But we suggest that, in planning for next year, consideration be given to ways to attract more people to the festival, hold them in the downtown area for longer than one stroll through the rows of wares, and, when they do depart, have them leave with a feeling of what a fine place downtown Sanford is. Downtown: the lake front, the marina, Ft. Mellon Park, and the business district.

The festival was an enjoyable event. Nevertheless, being familiar with many similar events elsewhere, we couldn't escape from concluding that the attendance was light.

What constitutes successful attendance and a successful event are, no doubt, subjective matters. The chamber estimated 25,000 people would attend each day. "We've got a great turnout," Dave Farr, chamber executive director, sald Saturday. But the plain fact is that at the very same time the vendors themselves were asking where the crowd was.

Of course, promotion is the chamber's business, so hyperbole, perhaps, is understandable. But exaggeration is no sub-stitute for creative thinking and the wherewithall to make improvements.

Cleanse the air

During his recent meeting with Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, President Bush promised to negotiate an accord between the United States and Canada to reduce the acid rain that is killing forests, lakes, wildlife, and endangering human health across North America. Mr. Bush's assurances represent a welcome break from the Reagan administration's failure to deal decisively with the worsening environmental

Canada has already adopted a stringent program to cut back on the use of fossil fuels and require public utilities and smelters to install smokestack scrubbers. The United States should follow suite by requiring that scrubbers be installed in sulfur-spewing power plants in the Midwest, which were built before the passage of the 1970 Clean Air Act and are exempt from its requirements.

A more farsighted, albeit controversial, policy is for the United States to reduce its reliance on fossil-fuel power plants and make greater use of nuclear energy. Environmentalists in this country fall to see the irony in their opposition to nuclear plants even though these power sources avoid the atmpspheric pollution that produces acid rain. The standard argument against nuclear plants is that they pose a constant radiation danger to the public. Yet, a coal-fired plant emits more radiation annually than was released during the 1979 nuclear accident at Three Mile Island. Nuclear energy is clean. safe, and readily available in many parts of Canada. It should be utilized more fully in the United States as well.

The cost of cleansing the air of acid rain will be high. But the cost of allowing these pollutants to poison our lakes, our forests, our wildlife, and ourselves would be much higher.

How revolution shaped our world

It is well to step back, occasionally, from the has afflicted modern times. flux of daily events and contemplate for a lt is only fair to reco moment the larger developments that have shaped our lives. This year we are celebrating, or at any rate observing, the 200th anniversary of the French Revolution, and it certainly falls in that latter category. In terms of modern history. it almost bears comparison with the Big Bang: The globe is still reverberating from the explosion.

Unquestionably, much of the inspiration for the French Revolution was drawn from its American predecessor, which had broken out 13 years earlier and was only finally concluded by treaty in 1783. But the American Revolution, though equally vast in its consequences, was politically speaking a much more limited affair

than the one that began in France in 1789.

The American colonies sought their independence from Britain to realize their own conception of ordered freedom. The French overthrew their feudal monarchy and aristocracy, then fell into a long quarrel over what was to replace them. Out from under the rock of the French Revolution there has crawled, in the succeeding two centuries, along with much that is admirable, just about every pernicious tendency that

It is only fair to recognize that both the American and French revolutions were heavily stimulated by a still broader phenomenon, the

Industrial Revolution, and also by that general growth and apread of knowledge in the 18th century that came to be known as the Enlightenment. But the Americans managed to absorb these stimuli without being bowled over by them. The postrevolution intellectuals of 19th century France and of continental Europe gener-ally, on the other hand, conceived of themselves as living in almost a brand-new world.


The basic difference was that man would henceforth assume responsibility for his own

destiny. Neither God nor king would prescribe for him: He would be answerable only to the neutral, implacable laws of science. In political terms, this collapse of religious and monarchical authority resulted in the idealization of the

With the end of World War I in 1918 these processes were largely complete; and the curtain rose on the characteristic tableau of the 20th century: Newly "conscious" masses, uprocted from the traditions that had modulated their behavior, being hurled across the landscape by ambitious charismatics and dying by the millions. The softer brands of 19th century socialism were succeeded by the harsh prescriptions of Marxism-Leninism.

Meanwhile, the nation that had developed out of the American Revolution was making its way. as one of the 20th century's major powers, to the forefront of world attention. With all its defects, the United States was by 1980 indisputably the most successful model yet devised for the encouragement of human happiness.

In a sense, therefore, the final years of the 20th century are witnessing the triumph of the basic principles of the American Revolution over those that emerged in time from the French.

The privatization of school

BOSTON — Let me begin by saying that I do not think Chris Whittle is a capitalist pig. Honest, Chris. Some of my best friends are entrepreneurs.

If I were to characterize the genial and creative head of Whittle Communications (and after our several conversations, I think I am entitled to), I would describe him as one of those people who wants to do well by doing good. Like the pop business manuals say, he thinks of a crisis as an opportunity.

The crisis at hand is the miserable state of education. To talk to Whittle is to hear the world "cultural illiteracy" spinkled like crumbs along a path of reasoning he wants you to follow. He talks carnestly about teen-agers who think the Holocaust is a Jewish holiday and Geraldine Ferraro is a talk-show

The opportunity, as he sees it, is to produce and beam a national news program right into the schools. He would provide color TV monitors, VCRs, satellite dishes and ten minutes of fairly zippy daily news. In return, the schools would provide a guaranteed teen-age audience for two mintues of commer-

The test run of this trade-off is a program called Channel One that will begin on Monday in schools in Kansas City, Detroit, Knoxville, Cerritos, Calif., Billerica, Mass., and Cincinnati. If all goes well, Whittle hopes that Channel One will be broadcast in 8,000 high schools, which means that more teen-agers would see this than any other program except the Super Bowl. Commercial heaven.

Whittle likes to talk about this - indeed likes to think about this - as "an enlightened partnership between the business community and the educational community." it's a entrepreneur trying to take some of those juicy advertising dollars and transfer them into schools while making a profit along the way.

All of which makes it harder for him to understand the opposition. Peggy Charren. hed of Action for Children's Television (ACT). calls this a "Great Big Gorgeous Trojan Horse." If the schools go for this trade-off, she says, "they might as well auction off the school day to the highest bidder."

Arnold Fege of the National PTA also calls this a "pernicious trade-off." Imagine, he says. students being required by the schools to watch Pizza Hut commercials. "The prime intent is to use the public schools to sell a

This classic standoff makes Channel One look more like a wrestling match than a news show. The entrepreneur describes his work as an example of the "private sector getting involved in the public sector." It's private

enterprise creating (profitable) solutions for public problems.
Public-interest

advocates point to this as a blatant example of the "privatization of the public world." The school day, like a national park, is being leased, minute by minute, acre by acre. to private industry.

If the schools allow advertising on televi-sion, says Charren in high dudgeon. what's to stop them from having advertising in a tex-tbook? If those ads mean that the schools could affort twice as many books, says Whittle, let's

hear it for the ads. This argument about values is likely to be replayed throughout the 1990s as strapped communities try to get more bang for their diminished tax bucks. The schools want business involved in a partnership. The business community has a vested interest in an educated work force and citizenry.

But it is one thing when business is interested in young people as students. Quite another when they are interested in students as consumers. It is one thing when the marketplace supports the schools. Quite another when the schools become a marketplace.

Channel One - at least in its prototype - is a slick if rather lightweight daily news hit. It will sorely tempt any school principal to trade a captive student audience for some video equipment.

But schools are expected to teach students values rather than deals. How does a principal explain this commercial exchange? That he sold his students, literally? Must the teachers enforce required viewing of messages from Nike or McDonald's?

At the very minimum, the schools become the sponsors of commercials. This is a deal they can refuse. The schools are not commercial turf. They are the marketplace for ideas.

Black group opposes South African ban

WASHINGTON - A group of prominent black Americans has become an unlikely advocate for U.S. companies doing business in South Africa. The organization publicly argues that companies shouldn't be forced out of South Africa by economic sanctions.

Here's something they don't publicize. The group was formed with money and moral support from corporate giants that have big investments in South

found that the group had received about \$1.2 million from companies doing

terests in the racially segregated country business in South Africa, including Mobil Oil, Johnson & Johnson and Caltex Petroleum Corp. For years, such companies have

opposed congressional efforts to impose economic sanctions on South Africa. They have also resisted public pressure to divest their interests in the racially segregated COSA was formed in 1987 thanks in large part to public relations wizard Raphael Pagan

and his firm, Pagan International. Pagan had previously been a consultant to Shell Oil, a major investor in South Africa. When Shell was faced with a boycott by anti-apartheid groups. Pagan came to the rescue. In a document known as the "Neptune Strategy." he spelled out the solution: Get religious leaders on the side of business. (Shell was not involved in the formation of COSA.) Once COSA got rolling, Pagan International

got out of the coalition because of disagreements with some members of the group. Phillip Cato, a Pagan official, told us COSA "was never intended to be some kind of a front for business." And the corporations told us they were not trying to buy influence when they helped COSA get started.


Another COSA founder was Robert Brown. the black North Carolina businessman who angered South African blacks last year by claiming he had power of attorney to represent the name of imprisoned black nationalist leader Nelson Mandela. Brown said he was trying to protect the Mandela name from exploitation. But Mandela's supporters feared that Mandela's wife, Winnie, wanted to profit from the name. Brown runs a public relations firm and among his clients are American companies with South African

Brown is resigning from COSA because of complaints from other members. Sources told us the group wants him out because of his ties to Winnie Mandela.

A spokesman for Brown, Armstrong Williams, confirmed to us that Brown and COSA gave Winnie Mandela money to build a palatial home amid the squalor of the Soweto township. Black activists in South Africa were so outraged by the lavish house that Winnie Mandela wisely decided not to move

COSA also gave money to help rebuild Winnie Mandela's medical clinic when it was firebombed in 1985.

We talked current COSA members who think that American businesses can play a positive role in overcoming apartheid, if they are allowed to stay there. They also think economic sanctions will hurt the impoverished blacks of South Africa. The group has lobbled Congress on the sanctions issue, has sent aid to South African blacks and sponsored South African students to study in the United States.

Prices opened higher and continued to build on their gains after the U.S. purchasing managers survey showed that employment in February dropped for the first time in nine months amid continued slowing in economic growth.

Analysts said the survey, whose employment index slipped to 49.7 percent from 50.5 percent in January.

Dollar higher; gold down

The dollar was higher Tuesday in light trading against most major foreign currencies. Gold moved lower.

In Tokyo, the dollar closed higher against the Japanese yen at 129.03, up 1.40 from 127.63 yen on Monday.

It was the first time since Feb. 9 that the dollar had reached the 129-ven plateau.

immigration chief reportedly out

LOS ANGELES - Alan C. Nelson, who has directed the massive alien amnesty and legalization program, will lose his battle to remain as commissioner of the immigration and Naturalization Service, it was reported Tuesday.

The Los Angeles Times cited Bush administration sources as saying Nelson would be replaced, but that no decision has been made on his successor.

Disclosure of Nelson's expected departure comes in the wake of a recent Justice Department audit that was highly critical of INS management practices.

Sources told the Times that Attorney General Dick Thornburgh, head of the Justice Department that includes the INS, wants to bring "new blood" to the agency.

A Justice Department spokesman said President Bush "has indicated he would like to see a major turnover of people in the administration to reflect his views and priorities.

\$5.5 million contractor fine largest ever

LOS ANGELES - A federal prosecutor says the \$5.5 million fine levied against Rockwell International is the largest ever assessed against a defense contractor for procurement fraud, and he hopes it will send a message.

The government had asked that Rockwell be fined \$5 million and ordered to pay back \$448,248 it overcharged the Air Force on a \$1.2-billion contract to build a satellite navigational

But U.S. District Judge Consuelo Marshall, without explanation, imposed an additional \$500,000 fine at Monday's sentencing. She also placed Rockwell on five years probation and ordered the aerospace giant to pay the restitution.

Report criticizes Navy safety procedures

WASHINGTON - Inadequate safety procedures played a major role in the death of nearly one-third of the Navy recruits who have died in training since 1986, a congressional report charges.

The General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress, also found the Navy's procedure for investigating training deaths often fails to address the underlying safety issues.

In some cases, the GAO said, the Navy neglected to conduct an investigation at all, despite its own regulations that up to three different reports be prepared on every training fatality.

The 68-page report, obtained Monday, examines the March 2, 1988, drowning of recruit Lee Mirecki and 16 other less publicized deaths that have occurred since 1986.

Man sentenced for starting forest fire

YUBA CITY, Calif. - Gary Wayne Parris, who accidentally started the 34,000-acre "Forty-Niner" brush and forest fire last fall, was sentenced Monday to a 3-year term at the state mental

facility at Atascadero. Parris last month was convicted on two felony counts and

two misdemeanor counts, but was then found legally insane. Parris, 39, a sometime window washer, was burning paper bags outside the abandoned shack he called home near Nevada City last Sept. 11 when brisk winds carried the burning paper to nearby brush, starting the fire that blackened large chunks of Nevada and Yuba counties. It was nicknamed the Forty-Niner fire because it roared through California's famed Gold Rush country, destroying some 200 homes.

Car explodes, two killed in Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon - A booby-trapped car blew up during the morning rush hour near the American University hospital in Moslem west Beirut Tuesday, killing two people and wounding 20 others, police and witnesses said.

The car, an Italian-made Fiat laden with explosives and flammable liquid, was parked on the roadside when it exploded at 9:20 a.m. near the rambling Hamra shopping center.

Police said two people were killed and 20 others were wounded in the blast. Sources at the nearby American University hospital said 11 of the wounded were treated and

immediately after the explosion, Syrian troops cordoned off the area and fired submachine guns in the air to disperse the

Venezuelan curfew lifted

CARACAS. Venezuela - Authorities listed a nationwide curfew but constitutional rights remained suspended one week after rioting sparked by government austerity measures left at least 246 people dead.

Defense Minister Gen. Italo del Valle Alliegro said Monday that President Carlos Andres Peres decided to lift the curiew, which was announced Feb. 28 along with the suspension of constitutional rights, because "normality in everyday life has resumed."

Del Valle Alliegro said the suspension of rights would remain in effect, however.

Government spokesman Reinaldo Figueredo said Monday that 246 people died and 1,831 were hurt in the rioting. Newspapers have estimated the number of deaths at more than

About 1,000 people were arrested, 327 of whom have been released, del Valle Alliegro said.

Arab held by Israeli security service dies

JERUSALEM - Israeli soldiers shot and killed two Palestinians, and an Arab held by the Shin Bet internal security service died of undetermined causes in a Gaza Strip jail, Israel Radio reported.

Throughout the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, Palestinians observed a general strike Monday to protest the closing of schools. In Nablus, the West Bank's largest city, the army listed a 10-day military cursew imposed after an israeli

As a good-will gesture, the army released 124 detained Gaza residents to mark the Moslem holiday celebrating the flight of the prophet Mohammed to heaven, an army spokesman said. The Gazans had been in the Ketziot detention center in Israel's

Queen Elizabeth II braves wind, storm

WELLINGTON, New Zealand - Wind-whipped waves in the South Pacific battered the Queen Elizabeth 2 luxury liner Monday, injuring 20 people aboard and tossing about a grand piano, cruise line officials said.

The 45-knot winds battered the 67,140-ton QE2 as it was nearly 700 miles northeast of Auckland, its destination, a spokesman for Cunard Line Ltd. said.

Twenty passengers and crew aboard the 963-foot vessel were injured in the storm, the spokesman said.

Tower recruits one Democrat

WASHINGTON - President Bush now has one of the Senate Democrats he needs for John Tower's confirmation as defense secretary, but the odds still weigh against success.

Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., a former chief justice of the Alabama Supreme Court, became the first Democrat to support Tower, declaring Monday he would vote for confirmation.

Heflin noted the chief concern voiced by Tower's detractors was whether the nominee has a drunk during the years they safeguards if Tower breaks his and Chuck Robb of Virginia.

The sweetness of winning over Heflin's vote, savored publicly by Republicans, was soured a bit when the No. 3 man in the Democratic leadership, Sen. David Pryor of Arkansas, announced he would vote against Tower.

Republicans are outnumbered In the Senate 45 to 55.

Monday, a survey of senators showed 39 declared in favor of Tower and 43 against him.

Of eight senators still undecided or staying silent, two were Republicans considered likely to back Tower. The Demodrinking problem. The Democrat crats were Sens. Lloyd Bentsen said he had never seen Tower of Texas, Christopher Dodd and Joe Lieberman of Connecticut, served together in the Senate Bennett Johnston of Louisiana, and, besides, there are adequate Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island

Tower were John Breaux of Louisiana, Dale Bumpers of Arkansas, Quentin Burdick of North Dakota, Wendell Ford of Kentucky and Bob Graham of Florida. The only Republican to list himself as leaning against is Larry Presaler of South Dakota. Four Republicans were leaning in favor of Tower but not declared.



Quick tax refunds a new option

That dreaded time of the year is quickly approaching-the deadline for filing tax

This year, those tax-filling procrastinators have a little extra time because April 15 falls on a Saturday, so the due date has been extended to Monday, April 17.

But that shouldn't be an excuse to slack off and leave things until the last minute. In North and Central Florida, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) reports having received 575,000 tax returns including 167,000 1040 forms, 207,000 1040As, and 201,000 1040EZs as of Feb. 10, compared to 7.5 million tax returns nationally. At the same time last year, the IRS received 595,000 returns in that same Florida area.

"The reccipts are slightly down. We're not getting as many in early as last year," said Amanda Michanczyk, assistant public affairs officer. However, the week after that has been a "record-breaking week" and when the IRS takes that into account, Michanczyk said the IRS could have done better across the board.

Michanczyk also reports the average refund is higher this year at \$805 as compared to \$782 last year.

Joan Mock, supervisor at H&R Block in the Seminole Center, Sanford, said her company sees a surge of customers in the last week of January and the first weeks in February.

"The majority of people at that time are people that are going to get a refund. That's why they come in. They're anxious to get a refund," Mock said.

A new option this year in the state of Florida is quick tax returns. Tax filers now can receive their refunds in as little as six days through electronic filing.

Each firm calls it something different, and some of them consider the refund as a loan on an anticipated refund. The bank issues the "loan" and a fee is paid by the customer.

According to to Michanczyk, in Northern and Central Florida, about 300 businesses have electronic filing.

"We felt it was a good turnout for the first year it was offered," she said. More information on electronic filing can be obtained from the IRS by calling 1-800-424-1040.

With electronic filing, individuals can expect their refunds within three weeks.

Most businesses are charging a fee. In the future, the IRS hopes to become so fast it wouldn't even be thinkable to get a refund anticipation loan," Michanczyk eald must sow trees ton

At H&R Block the system is called "Rapid Refund" and the service is available whether the firm prepares the return or not.

The returns are filed electronically through a computer center and go directly to the IRS. After the refund is approved by IRS, a bank cuts a check (if the individual opts for the anticipated refund loan) and IRS closes the account. There are transmission and bank fees for this process, but an individual can expect to receive a refund within six days. The refund will be minus



the fees. The money is considered a loan against the anticipated refund by this method.

Mock said her firm uses two types of rapid refund: One is the six-day loan and the other is to guarantee a refund within a maximum of 28 days. There is no bank fee for the 28-day refund although a transmission fee is still charged.

"The majority of people are going with the six-day loan," Mock said.

Mock said that 40 percent of clients at the Sanford office already have taken advantage of "Rapid Refund" returns. Another tax firm, Wilder Accounting and Income Tax Service in Sanford, reported not much response for electronically-filed returns.

We had exactly two requests for it. We haven't put it on line. There's not a big enough request," Mary Wilder said.

Mock said there are steps an individual can take to simplify tax filing. She suggests keeping good records before tax time and if they itemize, keeping medical receipts. interest statements and charitable donations together. Mortgage interest is fully deductible, Mock said.

This year, taking the higher standard deduction rather than itemizing may simplify the tax process. A tax filer may not

use both options. The standard deduction for a single person under 65 is \$3,000 as compared to \$2,540 last year. For 1989, the standard deduction increases to \$3,100 for a single person, according to Mock.

To itemize, an individual needs to claim more than \$3,000 in tax deductible expenses, and there are limitations on these

"Unless someone has an extremely high mortgage, interest or medical expenses, by the time they take those limitations, people are finding it easier (to take the standard

deduction)," Mock said.

This year more people are unable to itemize because of a 2 percent limitation on their adjusted gross income that the IRS will not allow a tax filer to use toward itemizing. For example, if a person's adjusted gross income is \$15,000, \$300 of that cannot be applied to itemizing.

The IRS said the standard deduction is a problem this year with tax filers.

"So far, people are not giving themselves the correct standard deductions. We would like them to follow the instruction table," Michanczyk said. She said incorrect standard deductions are particularly prevalent for taxpayers 65 years of age and older because there is a special table for them.

Other things to be aware of for this year and next are:

Children 5 years or older who being claimed as a dependent must have social security numbers. Next year, children aged 2 and older must have social security numbers.

Child-care credit is based on a sliding scale depending on the parents adjusted gross income. Parents with an adjusted gross income below \$10,000 are able to take a credit for 30 percent of child-care costs, up to a maximum of \$720 for one child and \$1,440 for two or more children. The credit decreases as income increases. The total expenses used to figure the credit cannot be more than the income of the spouse who earned the lesser amount. Next year, people Who claim child-care credit will need to record the social security number of the child-care provider.

• For next year, medicare recipients should prepare to pay the catastrophic tax. Individuals with low incomes won't be affected. Someone with a tax premium of \$150 or more will pay a catastrophic tax.
