

Lake Mary skate park gets green light

LAKE MARY — It has funding from the state and approval from the city's Parks and Recreation Board, and now the city's proposed skate/bicycle park has City Commission's go-ahead.

Commissioners gave conceptual approval Thursday to the park that has been discussed by city officials for more than two years. Following hours of research, site visits and public hearings, Parks and Recreation Department staff members recommended the city construct a 10,000 square-foot concrete skateboard

park with a design similar to the park located in Lakeland.

"We've done a lot of research on this," Parks and Recreation Department Director Bill Carrico said. "Now we have to decide on where we would like to go on this."

In 1999, the state legislature passed a law encouraging governments to make land available for skateboarding, in-line

skating and bicycles. The legislation stated no government or employee would be liable to a person who is injured during an activity in the park.

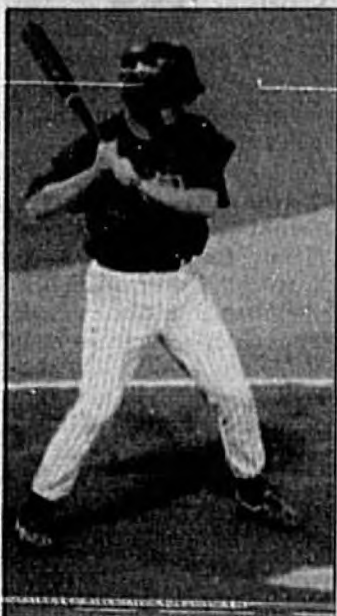
In July 2000, City Commission voted to accept a \$112,000 grant from the state Department of Environmental Protection to use toward the construction of the facility. By accepting the grant, the city also agreed to match it by \$37,500.

"Now that the law has been passed, more are being built," Carrico said. "We won't be the only game in town — or at least in Central Florida."

In May, City Commission asked the Parks and Recreation Board to gather more input from the public concerning the proposed park after several residents living near the city's Sports Complex spoke out against it. The concerns focus on possible increases in traffic, litter and noise in the area.

In June following a public hearing where numerous children spoke out in

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New police headquarters

Lake Mary dedicates \$5 million police station

LAKE MARY — It's been six years since voters approved the construction of a new police department. And, with their first gumpse Thursday of the new facility, community members and city officials say the wait was well worth it.

More than 200 people gathered in front of the \$5 million facility during the city's dedication ceremony for the new police headquarters located at 165 E. Crystal Lake Ave. The complex is more than three times larger than the current space occupied by the police department on Rinehart Road.

"This is the vision of many, many people," City Manager John Litton said. "Ten years ago, Lake Mary was only a blimp on the radar and a great place to live. We are state-of-the-art now. We have grown up."

The 26,000-square-foot building includes an ultra-modern communications system and a property evidence area, a briefing room, an investigations area, a conference room and detention, training and observation areas. A section of the building, about 5,000 square feet, will remain empty in order to have space for future expansion.

Following the referendum

six years ago, city officials and members of the police department began planning for the new complex. Construction began in December 1999 on property previously occupied by three houses and a church.

Although there were no major problems during construction, the completion date was moved back several times as a result of more than 50 change orders. According to Deputy Chief Sam Belfiore, several items still need to be finished before the police department relocates to the new facility at the end of

August or the beginning of September.

"After our first walk through, we made a punch list of things that needed to be done," Belfiore said. "After the things on the punch list are finished, we will do another walk through. If we agree that the punch list is finished, the city will agree to accept the building."

Belfiore said he doesn't foresee any major problems during the police department's transition between its current location to its new headquarters.

"There may be a few glitch-

es," he said. "But, as far as the officers are concerned, there shouldn't be any problems. Their office is in their cars and on the road."

"I'm just extremely happy the building is basically finished," he said. "It's been a long time coming. We've needed this facility for the last six or seven years or more. Our current facility was getting very cramped."

During Thursday's ceremony, Police Chief Richard Beary awarded Belfiore with the

County approves plan to develop I-4 tract

SANFORD — Bill Heard Chevrolet on Interstate 4 will soon have a new neighbor as county commissioners unanimously rezoned a 55-acre tract north of the car dealer Tuesday night.

Development of the site would consist of 503,050 square feet of retail, office and showroom uses in ten "high-end finish" buildings.

"I'm happy to see this site developed this way other than a large commercial building," said Commissioner Daryl McLain after the board approved the rezoning from C-2 to planned commercial development.

With the land designated planned commercial development, developers will have to adhere to strict design standards in their final development plan which will also have to pass the board's vote.

Previously, residents of the nearby Lake Forest neighborhood balked at any developments in the area, most recently a proposed Wal-Mart on State Road 46. However, the new development will be different as "most of it will be geared toward small users."

"It's planned as a sort of business park," said attorney Jim

Pine pests destroy acres of softwood

LONGWOOD — One of Florida's longtime residents is causing millions of dollars of destruction this year, but the mayhem brought on by its tree destroying rampage is nothing new to North America.

The southern pine beetle is one of the most destructive pests in the southern United States, Mexico and Central America. In one of the worst outbreaks in record from 1973 through 1977, the native insect killed approximately 4.5 million board feet of pine timber, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service.

The forest service predicted high southern pine beetle activity in Central Florida this year because of the mild winter and extended drought. However, the largest outbreaks are still occurring in the states of Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, North and South Carolina. During 1999 and 2000, Tennessee alone approximately lost 100,000 acres of pine timber valued at \$75 million.

Approximately 6,000 acres of pine forests in Florida have

already been destroyed this year, and thousands of more acres are expected to fall to the beetles' pine tree eradication.

Typically the beetle outbreaks last two to three years and repeat about every seven years, said Wekiva State Park ranger John Fillyaw. The beetle attacks and can kill all species of pine timber, but generally prefers the loblolly, shortleaf, Virginia, pond and pitch pines.

At the Central Florida's Wekiva State Park half the preserve is shut down as logging crews thin acres of forest trying to stop the bug's progression. Trails are ruined and service roads are widened by the heavy

machinery, and the ground is scattered with dead pine tree bark and piles of underbrush.

According to Fillyaw, 400 acres of the 7,200-acre park have already been infested. The beetle devastation doesn't stop at the Wekiva State Park as infestations have been reported in 26 Florida counties, according to the forest service.

Taking a closer look at the inside of the dead bark shows the tell tale sign that the beetle has done its damage. Adult beetles bore through the outer bark and stay in the cambium layer, or the first layer of wood where

Auto theft sting nets four teen-agers

SANFORD — A 13-hour shift by the City-County Auto Theft Bureau Wednesday night resulted in the arrest of four Sanford teenagers.

According to bureau coordinator Anthony Berrios, a routine auto theft sting at State Road 46 and Persimmon Avenue turned into a 10-hour pursuit and search into Volusia County and then back into the Sanford area.

At approximately 6 p.m.

Wednesday, Berrios said his squad was briefed on the auto sting. About three hours later at the operation site, four suspects arrived in two separate vehicles and took the bait investigators had set out — custom wheels and rims. According to Berrios, the suspects were going to steal the wheels first, then come back for the car.

Terrence Green, 18, and Delvin Ingram, 16, were arrested at the scene by undercover deputies, but the two suspects

Two arrested for ID fraud

SANFORD — A local son and father-in-law are in jail after state agents uncovered an operation by the duo that netted \$500,000 in stolen property, including eight luxury cars and two 27-foot boats.

Sanford resident Rohan Grant, 26, and Altamonte Springs resident Cosmore Ebanks, 57, are being held in the Seminole County Jail on bonds of \$250,000 and \$150,000 respectively. Their arrests were part of a two-month investigation by

Florida Department of Law Enforcement Agent Larry Carr that uncovered an identify theft ring.

The 16th Statewide Grand Jury returned indictments Thursday charging the two individuals with numerous counts of grand theft, identity theft and organized fraud.

"It started when I was called by Gary Collins, who is the vice president of Bank of America security," Carr said. "He was looking for a boat leased in Clearwater, and he thought it

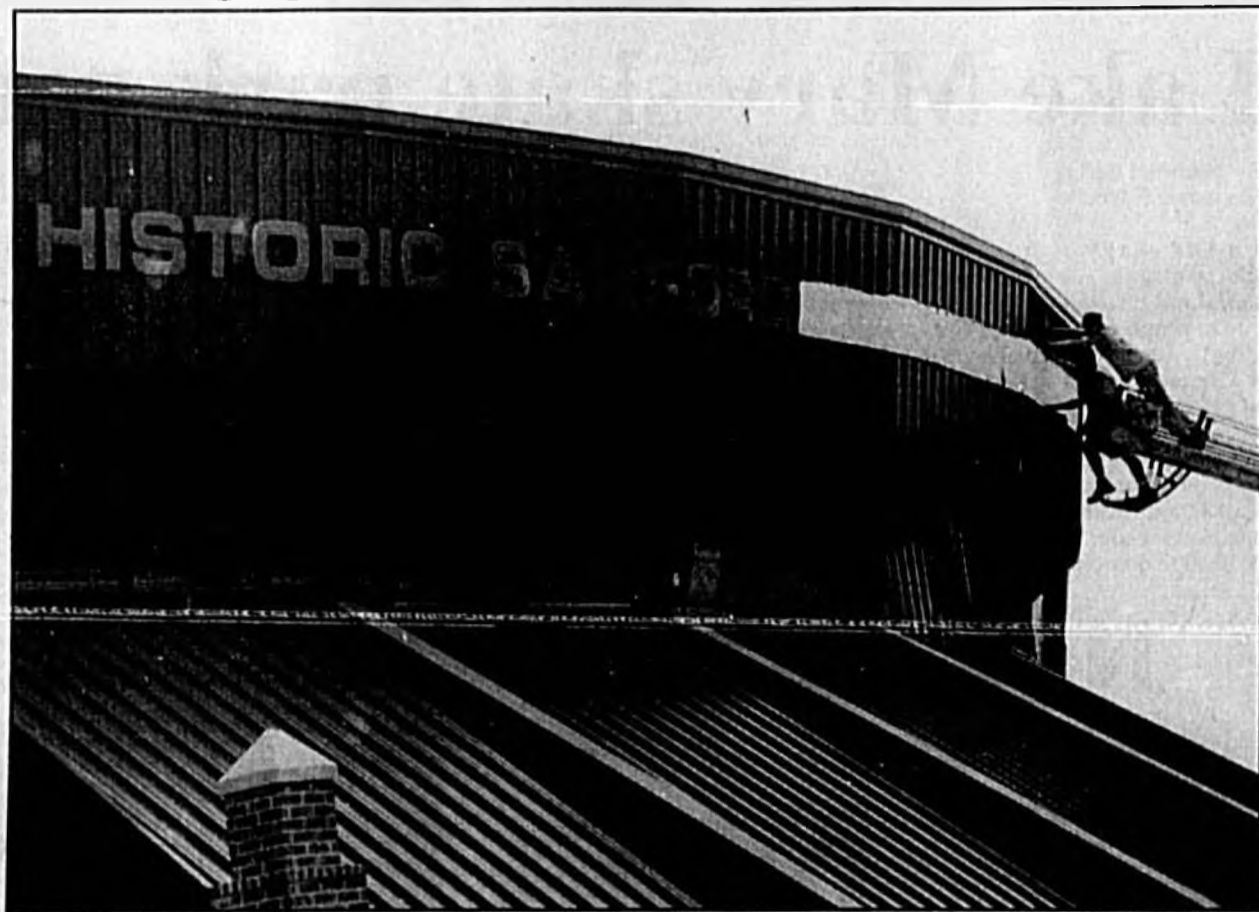

Talk show plan brings more bad news to NAACP

Not again. For the second time in a decade, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the nation's premier civil rights organization, stands to be humiliated by the actions of a self-serving leader. Seven years ago, the NAACP was scandalized by revelations that its executive director, Ben Chavis, had secretly used the organization's funds as hush money to fend off a subordinate's complaints of sexual harassment.

Now, the NAACP is about to be battered by another wave of bad press, with revelations that make its 2-year-old campaign against alleged racial discrimination by TV networks appear nothing more than a shakedown for a job by Chavis' successor, Kweisi Mfume.

It had always struck me as curious that Mfume spent so much of his energy on a campaign aimed at television, which, he said, refuses to place enough minorities in prominent positions either in front of the camera or behind it. After all, even if "Friends" suddenly integrated and the evening network newscasts began to feature Latino-Asian anchor teams, the wall separating poor minority communities from mainstream America would not even be dented.

Now, Mfume's motives become clearer. On Friday, just days after Mfume held another press conference blasting the four major networks, published reports revealed his nascent deal with a division of one of those networks, NBC. In July, Mfume taped a prototype in which he hosts an Oprah-style talk show, which he hopes to syndicate in a deal involving NBC Enterprises, the network's syndication arm.

When he lashed the networks last week, Mfume didn't mention the deal involving the talk show. Asked about it later, he used convoluted logic (and equally convoluted syntax) to claim the deal did not compromise his campaign challenging the networks over diversity. "... I would never admit or allow any conflict of interest even to be perceived if in fact any economic action is taken against any individual network which theoretically could be construed as a competitor (to NBC)," Mfume told the Los Angeles Times.

In that failed exercise in rationalizations, Mfume seemed to suggest that his deal with NBC Enterprises matters only if he actually called for a network boycott (which he stopped just short of) and an NBC competitor suffered economic harm as a result.

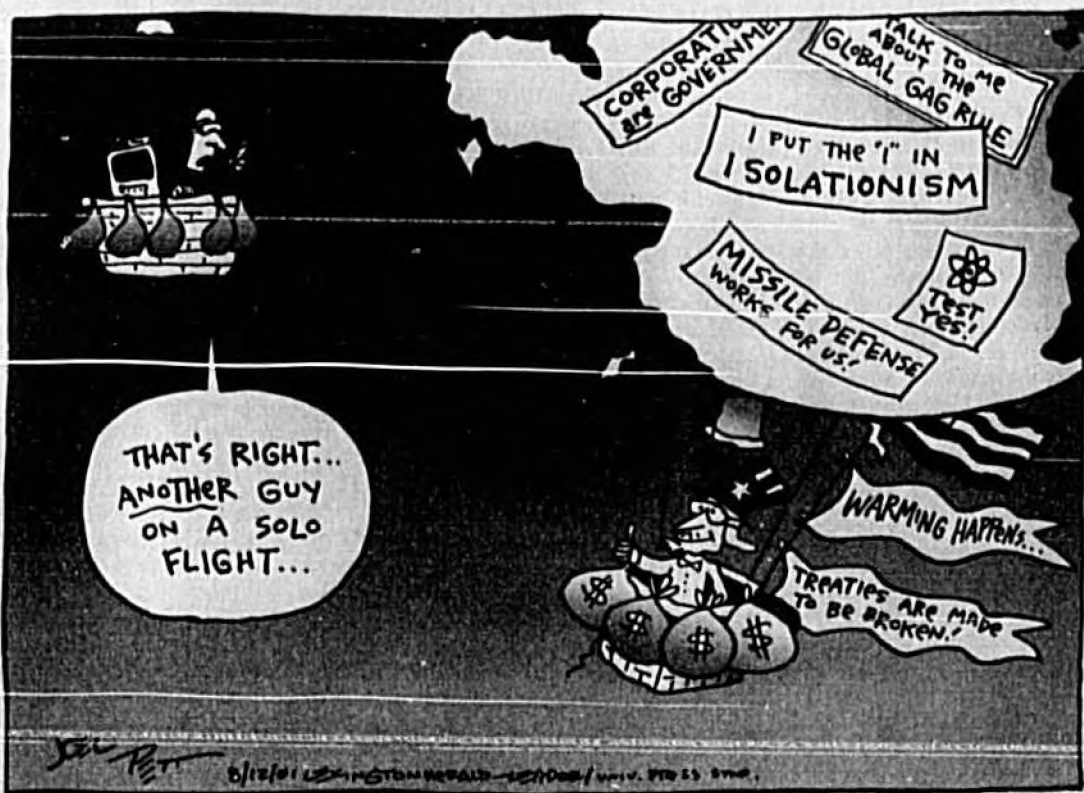
But the part of that response that was most truthful was, "I would never admit." Mfume would never admit that his ego and extraordinarily poor judgment have left the NAACP vulnerable to charges of a shakedown. Doesn't it seem clear that the quickest way for NBC to get the NAACP off its back is to help Mfume get his syndicated talk show?

The timing could not be worse. This revelation comes as journalists are investigating the financial activities of organizations associated with the Rev. Jesse Jackson, who has been accused of funneling donations to Karin Stanford, the mother of his illegitimate 2-year-old. Jackson's critics have also accused him of turning his anti-discrimination crusades against major corporations and financial institutions into nothing more than shakedowns; as soon as those corporations hand money over to Jackson's groups, his critics claim, he ceases his public crusades against them.

The NAACP cannot afford this sort of controversy. At the very least, its board of directors ought to demand that Mfume give up his plans for a nationally syndicated TV talk show — with NBC Enterprises or any other group.

Then the board ought to re-assess this crusade over TV diversity. The organization's time would be better spent encouraging minority households to give up TV altogether. Television-viewing rarely enhances achievement.

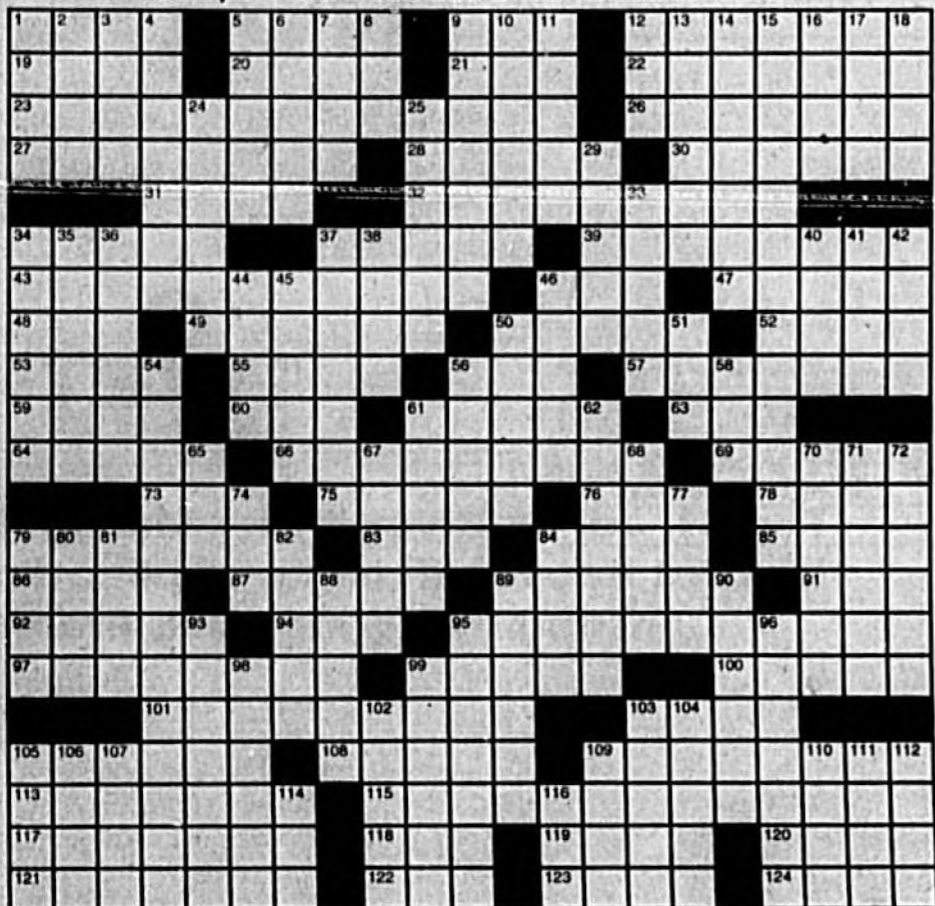

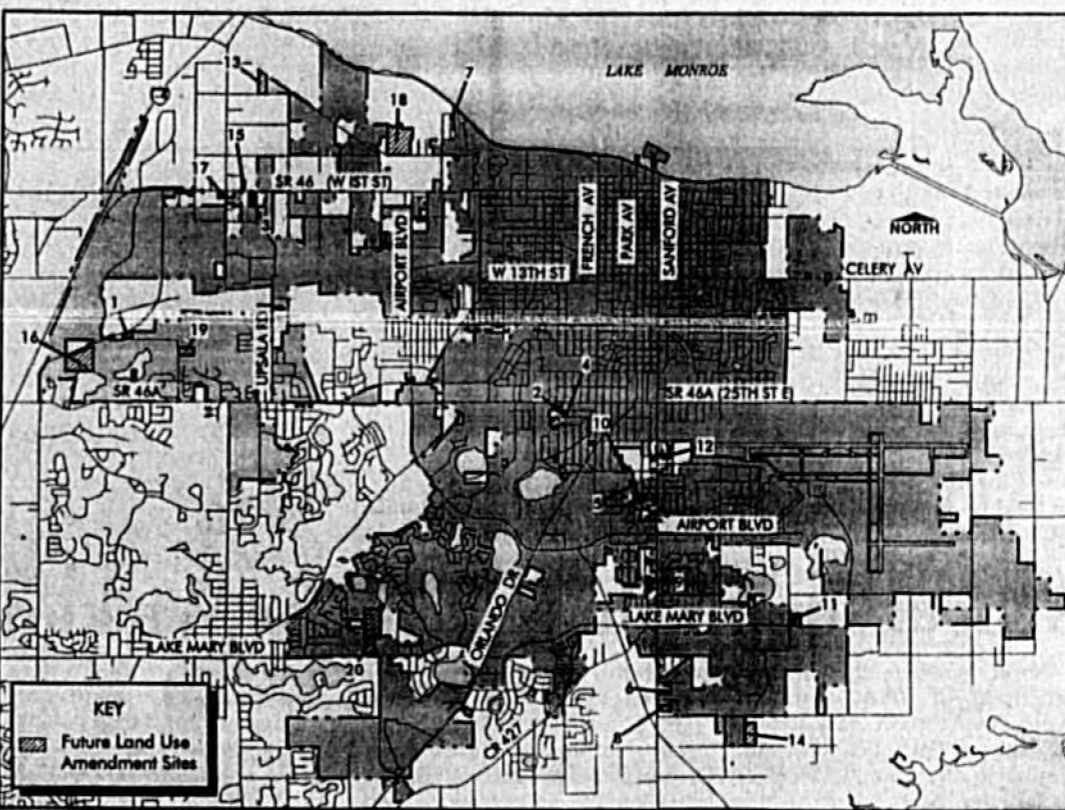

Willard who represents local developer Triad Investors. "It's a well-designed plan that addresses the concerns of the nearby neighborhood. This will have a minimal impact to their neighborhood."

According to Willard, the business park will be "different from the office buildings in the Lake Mary and Heathrow area." Unlike the five and six story office buildings in that area, the new business park will primarily feature one-story buildings with offices at the front and small distribution companies in the back.

Construction will begin in the spring and summer of next year and buildings will be constructed according to the market demand, Willard said. Also featured in the construction, are road improvements to Oregon Avenue, large buffers and plenty of landscap-

ing which will reflect the park's low intensive use, said Willard.

"I think it will be a good location there is a lot happening out there," Willard said.

In other business, commissioners denied rezoning for a planned apartment complex on Tuskawilla Road, 2000 feet south of Red Bug Lake Road and south of Howell Creek.

Residents from across the street of the development in the Cardinal Lake and Sonehurst subdivisions cited numerous reasons why the board should deny the rezoning.

The proposed 226-unit complex would be served by three schools, Lake Howell High, Tuskawilla Middle and Red Bug Elementary, which residents complained are already stressed to capacity.

Other concerns of the neighbors included the increase of traf-

fic and the lack of a median cut which would force apartment residents to make dangerous U-turns across the six-lane Tuskawilla Road.

One resident said he spent the previous night researching how many apartments were in the area and he proceeded to list them one by one. Commissioner Morris cut him off at about the tenth because he said there was 41 apartment complexes in 8-mile radius of proposed apartment complex.

"I believe the impact is going to be significant in the area," Commissioner Carlton Henley said. "Just look at the number of schools in the area."

"Were not going to allow a median cut from what I can envision," Commissioner Randy Morris said. "We allow schools to go into a residential areas for a reason — they help sell the area."

I just don't think we need to compound our problems with schools in the area."

Although commissioners voted unanimously to deny the rezoning for the apartments, Morris did say the plan was one of the more "Tiffany projects" to come through the board in awhile.

Commissioners also approved the rezoning of a five-acre plot located on the northeast corner of Wayside Drive and Henderson Lane from agriculture to single family dwelling district (R-1AAA).

Originally developers asked for R-1AA and proposed a 11-home neighborhood, but commissioners felt that was too much for the small plot.

favor of the park, the Board reaffirmed its recommendation to build a skating and biking facility in the city's Sports Complex.  was a fraudulent deal."
 According to Carr, the suspects created fake drivers licenses using stolen personal information from retirees all over the country.
 "I went up to the address Collins had on Grant, and when I got there all these luxury vehicles were parked at his apartments," Carr said. "So I left and then went back there at one o'clock in the morning and ran all the VINs (vehicle identification numbers). The next day I started calling all the lien holders and that's when I started discovering it was a case of stolen identities."
 The two men reportedly fooled more than a dozen Central Florida dealers in believing they were legitimate luxurious car and boat buyers.
 "They had rehearsed and it was well planned out," Carr said. "Every dealer told me when the dealer would have a question or a red flag would pop up that Rohan would have an

answer. They would check it out and it would check out — he had covered his tracks."
 According to Carr, Grant was receiving the personal information from a "friend that works for a company here in town" that had access to that information. Several more arrests are forthcoming in the case, including the "friend," said Carr.
 The reason Grant went after the high-end merchandise, according to Carr, he liked to think of himself as part of the flashy and wealthy hip-hop musician circle.
 "Mr. Grant and all the individuals in this little group are all

into the rap, hip-hop scene," Carr said. "Rohan portrayed himself as a successful rap artist in the industry and he's not."
 As for the victims who had their identities stolen, Carr said they were all retirees with stellar credit from all over the country.
 "Everybody knew when I contacted them except for one individual," Carr said about the victims. "A retired gentleman in East Lansing, Mich., had a warrant out for his arrest. A very nice guy, had been a model citizen all his life and here he's got a warrant out for his arrest for grand theft auto."
 "If he would of got stopped for speeding or whatever by a

police officer he would of been arrested and extradited to Florida," Carr explained. "And of course he would of been screaming the whole time. He told me the last time he was in Florida was in the 1960s."
 According to the Federal Trade Commission, Florida ranks third in the nation behind California and New York in total numbers of victims and identification thefts. Recently, Gov. Jeb Bush impaneled the grand jury to specifically look at identity thefts, said Carr.

the tree sends its nutrients up to the leaves, said Fillyaw.

"They're like tiny drill bits," Fillyaw said as he pointed to the beetles S-shaped galleries which crisscross the inner bark. "They do it so fast the tree's bark will be falling off before even the tree knows it — it will still be green."

Some forestry experts, including Fillyaw claim the bug's destruction is just a part of nature's cycle.

"My feeling on a lot of this is we've excluded fire so much in the southeast that the forests are not like they used to be," Fillyaw said.

Long before fire fighting helicopters and park rangers in fire towers, fires used to rip through the southeast only stopping for natural fire breaks like the coast and rivers. The fires used to destroy thousands of acres, but the destruction helped keep the forests young and vibrant, said Fillyaw.

"The drought was the straw that broke the camel's back, but this is just nature correcting itself," Fillyaw said. "It's going to be the for the best. If we don't do it by logging it (nature) will

do itself."

Routine controlled burns are already a part of Wekiva State Park to help keep the forest from degenerating to the "climatic community" of all hardwoods — oak, sweetgum, hickory and poplar, said Fillyaw.

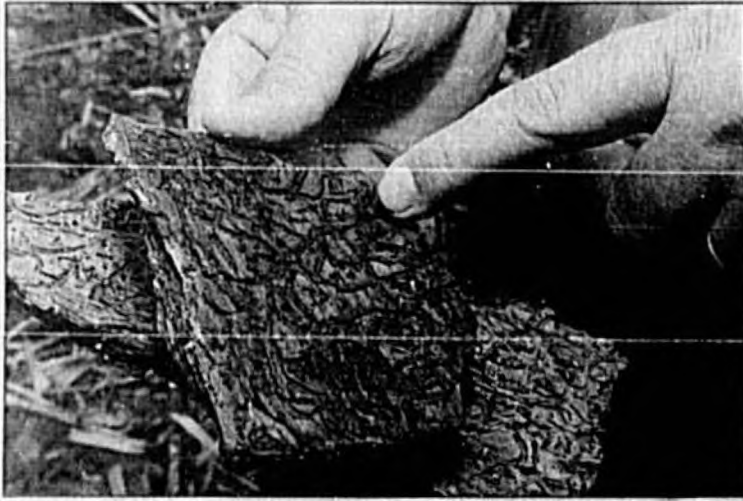
"Give it five or six years, it (the forest) will be back up," Fillyaw said about the open spaces.

Logging is one of the few alternatives to fighting the beetle, according to Fillyaw, because beetles tend to move very fast through the thick forest.

"If it was one or two trees in your yard you could spray them to get rid of them, but here what we have to do is cut-off their food supply," Fillyaw said.

Rangers identify infested areas as they notice the tree turning yellow, and then eventually red as the beetle sucks the life out of it. Loggers then down the infested trees and the immediate trees around the infested area. After the tree is cut down, Fillyaw said, the heat bakes them inside the tree.

Although the beetle causes millions of damage, the dead standing trees can cause serious

hazards to homeowners. Falling trees can cause damage, but forest fires are even more threatening.

"It's not a big concern, but it is definitely there," said Fillyaw about how the beetle will effect the typical forest fire season this winter. "Dead standing trees obviously present more of a hazard."

Fillyaw said for residents to

identify southern pine beetle infestation look for "the classic pitch tubes." The tubes are a signature trademark of the beetle that are created when the beetle bores into the bark. Sap pushes out of the beetle-created holes and "it looks like popcorn."

He said anyone who spends the \$56.50 to buy a five-year hunting license, or buys one of the other long-term hunting licenses during the promotional period, will receive a package of product samples and coupons valued at more than the cost of the license.

"Although they'll save up to \$6 in fees and avoid possible future price increases, the real value is in the bonus package," Whittington said. "We have succeeded in securing quality product samples that hunters can use."

The free bonus package includes a Simmons monocular, Birchwood Casey Shoot-n-C targets and gun cloth, CamoFace camouflage face paint, Backwater Bayou beef jerky, BuckStop cover scent and unscented sportsman soap, a Woods 'N Water six-month trial subscription, Everglades Seasoning and other samples and coupons.

Five-year and lifetime licenses are waterproof, credit-card-type cards, designed to hold up to rugged outdoor use. The offer also extends to lifetime sportsman's licenses.

"One trip to the tax collector's office and they'll be all set to go hunting for five years," Whittington said. "They'll even receive a renewal notice from the FWC when their license is about to expire."

Long-term license revenues are especially important to fish and wildlife conservation efforts in Florida, because they ensure a stable funding base for research and management of the state's living resources.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

The five year and lifetime hunting licenses are a good deal and warrant some serious consideration.

FISHING FORECAST

Bass fishing is really tough in the river. Between the heat and the high water bass are hard to locate and to catch. Bream and catfish seem to be dependable, however, and will readily bite worms or mussels. Anglers are catching bream, catfish, mullet, and a few specks and bass from the Sanford seawall.

Sebastian Inlet features fair action with catch and release snook, redfish, trout, and a few flounder. Large live shrimp or small baitfish are top baits. The outgoing tide is best. Trout are hitting on the grass flats just inside the inlet.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that king mackerel and cobia are the most dependable species. Kings and cobia can be caught off wrecks and reefs such as H A and Pelican Flats. A few kings and tripletail can be seen. See Outdoor, Page 3B

Post 12 (46-13) pounded out 19 hits against Post 52 (31-11) with Clint Wade going 6-for-6, scoring five runs, and driving in two.

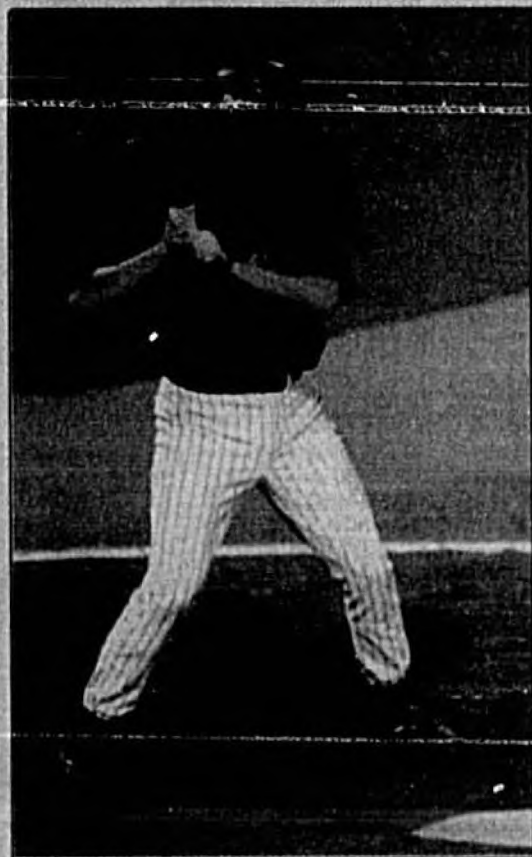
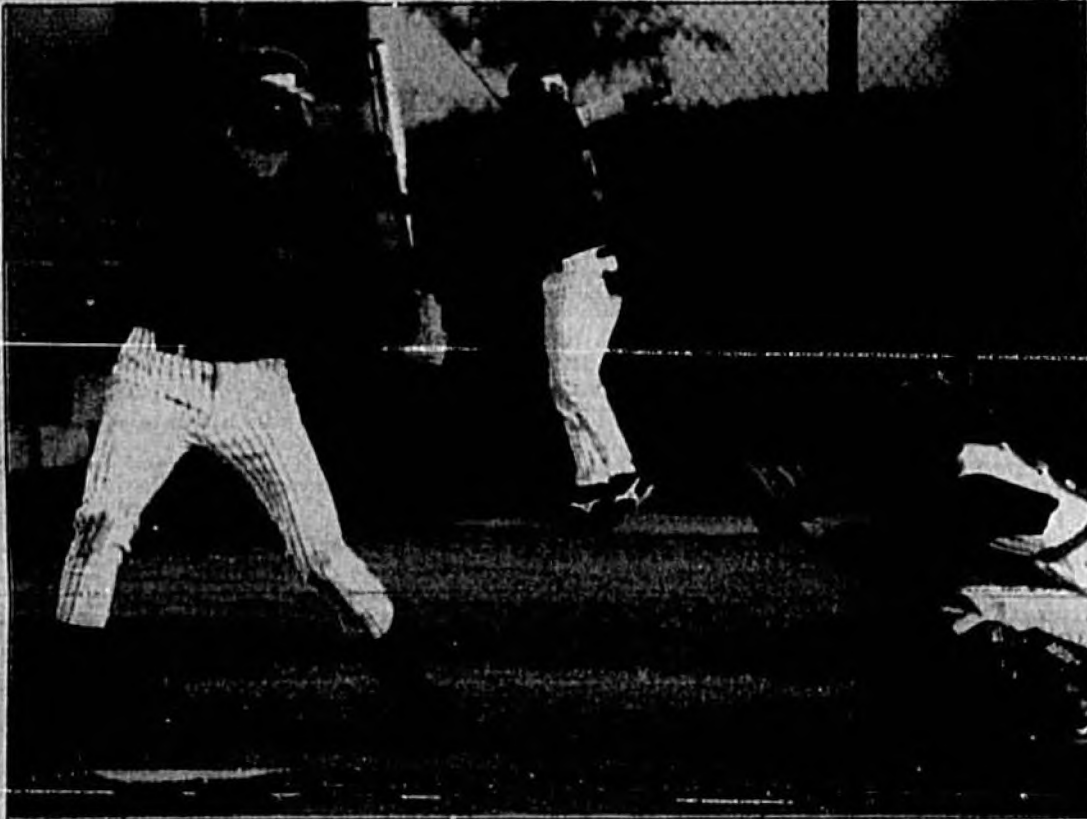

ORLANDO — What was expected to be a day of bad news at UCF turned out to be a birthday present for starting middle linebacker Tito Rodriguez (Lehigh Acres/Lehigh HS) and an encouraging report for starting center Mike Mabry (Dayton, Texas HS).

Rodriguez, who turned 23 Thursday, injured his right knee in practice Wednesday but did not feel the full effects of it until he awoke Thursday morning. He sat out the morning practice with a suspected tear in his meniscus, but the injury turned out to be just a strain. He is expected back early next week.

Rodriguez missed the first two games last season while recovering from arthroscopic surgery to clean up a torn meniscus in his left knee a year ago today (Aug. 16).

An MRI revealed a sprained medial collateral ligament in the right knee of Mabry, who was feared to have been lost for more than a month. Mabry, a junior college transfer who is expected to fill the void left by the graduation of four-year starter Chris Lorenti, was injured on the second set of downs during the first scrimmage of the year on Wednesday.

As it stands he is expected back inside of two weeks, but is questionable for the opening game at Clemson on September 1.

"It'll probably be two weeks before he can go full speed," coach Mike Krueck said. "But that's better than we thought."

In the meantime, starting guard Willie Comerford (St. Petersburg/Gibbs HS) has been moved to center and has been replaced in the starting lineup by Garrett McCray (Mayo/Lafayette County HS).

Chris Pilinko (St. Augustine/Nease HS),

Rodriguez' backup, sprained his left shoulder in practice Tuesday and will be out of the lineup for up to two weeks.

Redshirt freshman Savaris Brown (Ft. Myers HS), who recently moved from outside to middle linebacker, has assumed the starting role and is being backed up by incoming freshman Stanford Rhule (Ft. Lauderdale/Dillard HS).

Redshirt freshman Tavaris Capers (Miami/Jackson HS) practiced for the first time Thursday. He has been out since the death of his father, who passed away as a result of cancer last Wednesday.

"What a great kid," Krueck said. "He came in and gave me a hug this morning with a big smile on his face and indicated he was ready to go. He's missed a lot of reps, but he'll catch up quick."

Tailback Terrance Williams (Clearwater HS) returned to practice Thursday for some light, non-contact work. He has been out while nursing a sore right hip and tendonitis in his

Inspiring Voices

They've been a hit in local churches for several years. Now the Sanford-based gospel group Voices of Inspiration hopes to broaden their message with their own record label and a popular CD.

SANFORD — At the corner of 6th Street and Hickory Avenue, directly behind the Victory Temple of God, is arguably the heart of Georgetown. It was there that Ms. Marie, a local midwife, delivered most of the children who grew up in the community.

Ms. Marie died several years ago, but that block on 6th Street may soon be considered the birthplace of a gospel music empire — Peace In Love Music Inc.

The seed for the company was planted more than five years ago when a group of young men volunteered to lead the Victory Temple of God youth choir.

"We were planning a concert and decided we needed an intermission," said Robert Bradley Sr.

Bradley said he and the other members of the group, Travis Costen Sr., Joe Hillery and Calvin Smith, decided to perform a couple of songs during the break. For Costen and Hillery, it was nothing new, they have been playing music together since they were in school. With Costen laying down a funky bass line and Hillery hitting hot licks on the drums, Bradley provided the words for two original songs, "Whatever You Ask" and "You're Worthy."

"We were going to be like the 'half-time' show for the youth choir, so the kids could catch their breath and get something to drink," Bradley said. "We did the two songs, and everybody pretty much flipped. We got a miraculous response."

They formed a group and named themselves Voices of Inspiration, or VOI. The group has performed at churches and events across the region and sang the national anthem during a ceremony in May when Gov. Jeb Bush visited Sanford.

"We have a major concert this Sunday in Jacksonville at the Joint Heirs Ministry, and we've been asked to sing the national anthem for the dedication of the new stadium in Sanford," Hillery said.

In addition, the group is expected to open for several major gospel artists in 2002.

"I don't really want to say who right now," Hillery said. "All the deals have been worked out, but sometimes things happen. It should be a good year."

Hillery and his band members appreciate the success they've had, but they don't intend to rest on their laurels. A couple of years ago, they joined with Hillery's brother, R.T. Hillery, to form their own record label, Peace In Love Music Inc., to help promote their songs and the songs of other local performers.

"There are a lot of other groups and soloists in the Sanford area that are doing good work," Hillery said. "We want to be in a position to help them get their message out."

Peace In Love Music is currently working with a handful of soloists who should have CDs hitting the market in 2002, Hillery said.

The company's first full-length CD is an original collection of VOI songs titled, "Whatever You Ask." Like their name implies, the CD is loaded with songs that inspire the spirit. For Voices of Inspiration, it's all about the lyrics.

"We want people to hear the message, that's the reason we do this," Hillery said. "We want to inspire people to come

to God and see the difference He can make in their lives."

Bradley shoulders most of the song writing duties. The process can take five minutes or five days depending on how the Holy Spirit moves him, and Bradley said he finds inspiration calls at odd times.

"I always keep some paper handy because a song might come to me in the middle of the night or during the day," he said. "As a matter of fact,

some of the worst times for me personally — when I'm going through tribulations — have also been the times when I've been inspired to write songs that have become some of our best."

Hillery said VOI is planning to release a compilation of Christmas songs next year, as well as a CD of wedding

songs. "We've got a bunch of songs we've written and performed, so we can release several CDs," Hillery said. "We also want to form a community choir."

No matter what their plans, though, Costen said they never want to get away from the true reason they perform

"We're just giving back to God what He gave us," Costen said. "We sing because that's how He blessed us."

DEAR ABBY: I am a professional whistler and bird caller. Whenever people ask what I do for a living, my reply is often met with the question, "What is that?" About the best I can respond with is, "Someone who whistles."

Abby, it's hard to deal with the fact that the art of whistling has become so far removed from the public. Could you kindly print my letter as a reminder to your readers that whistling is a beautiful art form with a rich heritage in America and elsewhere? (No name, please. This one's for the art.)

DEAR WHISTLER: I'm pleased to do so. It's the truth. And I'm not whistling "Dixie."

DEAR ABBY: I read the letter from "Lifeguarding Mom" who had a "close call" with a near-drowning accident she will never forget.

My child had a close call I will never forget, either. He also survived, but he is NOT fine. Media coverage is extensive with drowning accidents, but you do not always hear the follow-up stories of the results of the accident. Many people

hear that a child survived and went home from the hospital. What they do not realize is that many children go home with severe disabilities.

My child survived a near-drowning accident 13 years ago. He cannot walk or talk. He is fed using a tube in his stomach, needs oxygen, has seizures daily and requires 24-hour care. In less than five minutes not only did his life change, but

so did many other lives as well. These past years have been an unending emotional roller-coaster ride. I would not wish this on anyone.

DO NOT THINK THIS CANNOT HAPPEN TO YOU. I have spoken to many parents of children who have survived a near-drowning experience. Their stories are not all the same. The common link is small children and a water source. It takes only 2 inches of water for a child to drown. It happens in buckets, fountains, toilets, pools, canals, streams, lakes, etc. And it often happens when the adults are distracted for any of a thousand reasons.

Most parents have temporarily lost track of a child at one time or another, especially if there is more than one child. Most of the time the child is safe. Of course, drowning is not the only danger from which we need to shield our children. Accidents WILL happen, but if you are careful this may not happen to you.

Rough times for teens can help build maturity

QUESTION: Our 15-year-old daughter is getting some rough treatment at the hands of her peers these days. She wasn't invited to a party given by a girl who had been her best friend, and she cried herself to sleep that night. It's just tearing me up to see her hurt like this. Will this experience leave lifelong scars on her mind?

DR. DOBSON: It's all a matter of degree. Most teen-agers experience a measure of rejection like your daughter is experiencing. They typically roll with the punches and eventually get beyond the discomfort. Others, however, are wounded for life by the rejection of those adolescent experiences. I suggest you give your daughter plenty of emotional support, keep her talking, and do what you can to help her cope. I think she'll get her legs under her when the pressure of these years have passed.

Let me address the larger issue here. When we see our children struggling with the teen experience or other frustrations, it's natural to wish we could sweep aside the prob-

lems and obstacles. Sometimes we have to be reminded that the human personality grows through adversity. "No pain, no gain," as they say. Those who have conquered their problems are more secure than those who have never faced them.

I learned the value of hard times from my own experience. During my seventh and eighth grades, I lived through the most painful years of my life. I found myself in

a social crossfire that gave rise to intense feelings of inferiority and doubt. And yet those two years have contributed more positive qualities to my adult personality than any other span of my life. What I learned through that experience is still useful to me today.

Though it may be hard to accept now, your child needs the minor setbacks and disappointments that come her way. How can she learn to cope with problems and frustrations if her early experiences are totally without trial?

Nature tells us this is true. A tree that is planted in a rain forest is never forced to extend its roots downward in search

of water. Consequently, it remains poorly anchored and can be toppled by even a moderate wind. By contrast, a mesquite tree that's planted in a dry desert is threatened by its hostile environment. It can survive only by sending its roots down 30 feet or more into the earth, seeking cool water. But through this adaptation to an arid land, the well-rooted tree becomes strong and steady against all assailants.

Our children are like the two trees in some ways. Those who have learned to conquer their problems are better anchored than those who have never faced them.

Our task as parents, then, is not to eliminate every challenge for our children, but to serve as a confident ally on their behalf, encouraging them when they are distressed, intervening when the threats are overwhelming, and above all, giving them the tools they need to overcome the obstacles.

QUESTION: What is your opinion of Nintendo and other kinds of video games? They've been claiming a big portion of our son's time over the past

few months, and I'm getting uneasy about it.

DR. DOBSON: Depending on the particular games in question, you may have a valid cause for concern. Dr. Vince Hammond, head of the National Coalition on Television Violence, has described the potentially harmful nature of video games, especially those with violent themes. Some observers have come to the conclusion that these games can become obsessive and encourage aggressive behavior. There's even evidence to suggest that children between the ages of 8 and 10 are 80 percent more likely to fight with one another after playing with them.

I'd advise you to put clear limits on the amount of time your son will be allowed to spend with video games or the Internet so that he won't become obsessed with them. Insist that he avoid the violent ones altogether. With realistic guidelines I think it's possible to keep this kind of activity under control rather than letting it control your son and your family.

Cost is \$3 per student per lesson.

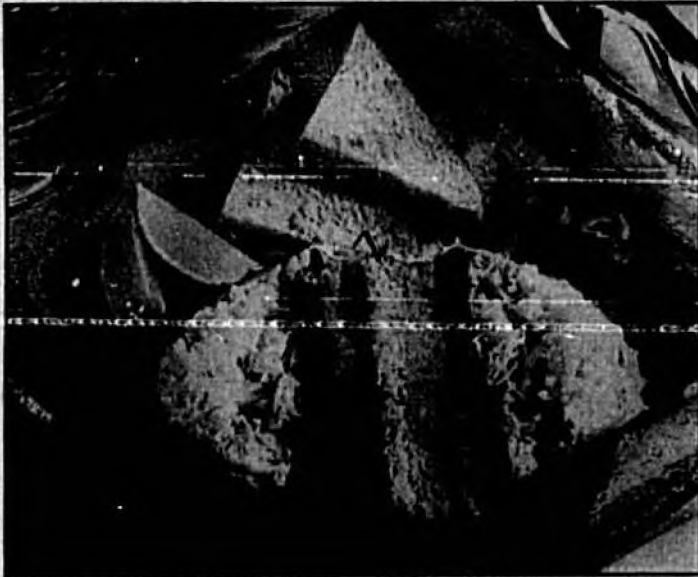
The regular club dance is 8 to 10 p.m. at VFW Hall,

'Dress' for dining success this summer



Celebrate the summer's freshest catch with crab "dressed" in traditional British fashion.

Summer is in full swing, and faced with long days of beautiful sunshine and warm weather, it's more important than ever to have plenty of "no-sweat" ideas at the ready for summer entertaining.

For example, turn a simple get-together in the backyard or at the park into a trip to the famed English seaside. Take a break from the good old American burger and gather a few friends to enjoy dressed crab sandwiches, a seafood classic from the isle of St. George. The recipe takes less than an hour to prepare and multiplies easily for a greater number of guests. Add fun, friends and a healthy dash of your favorite English music for a

smashing time. Recipe of "Le Cordon Bleu Home Collection: Summer" (Periplus Editions).

Dressed Crab
• Serves 1 to 2

In Britain, the most traditional way to enjoy fresh crab is to "dress" it. This enduring favorite is well worth the effort and evokes the feeling of an old-fashioned, English seaside holiday.

2 eggs, at room temperature
1 cooked crab, about 1 1/2 to 2 pounds
1 to 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, to taste
1 cup fresh bread crumbs
Worcestershire or Tabasco sauce, to taste
1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
3 canned anchovy fillets, to garnish
3 teaspoons drained capers, to garnish
2 tablespoons sliced stuffed green olives, to garnish
4 slices whole wheat bread
1 tablespoon unsalted butter, at room temperature
1 lime or lemon, cut into wedges

1. To hard-cook the eggs, place them in a small saucepan and cover with cold water. Bring to a gentle boil and cook for ten min-

utes. Drain and cool in cold water. Peel the eggs and push the whites and the yolks separately through a fine metal strainer.

2. Cook the crab. Scrape all the creamy brown meat from the shell and flake it into a bowl. Stir in the mayonnaise and bread crumbs to bind, adding more of each if the flavor of the dark meat is too strong. Season with salt, freshly ground pepper and Worcestershire or Tabasco sauce.

3. Crack open the claws and remove all the white meat, checking that there are no shell splinters left. Season to taste.

4. Place the white meat from the claws and body of the crab towards the two outer sides of the cleaned and dried shell. Spoon the brown meat into the center, then arrange the chopped parsley on the seams in between. Cover half of the white meat with the egg whites; spoon the egg yolks on the dark meat. Garnish with anchovies, capers and sliced olives.

Butter the bread thinly and serve the dressed crab with the bread and lime or lemon wedges to the side.

Tip: The best way to check there are no shell splinters in the meat is to throw pinches of the meat onto a baking sheet. Listen for the sound of shell pieces: if you do hear any, discard the meat.



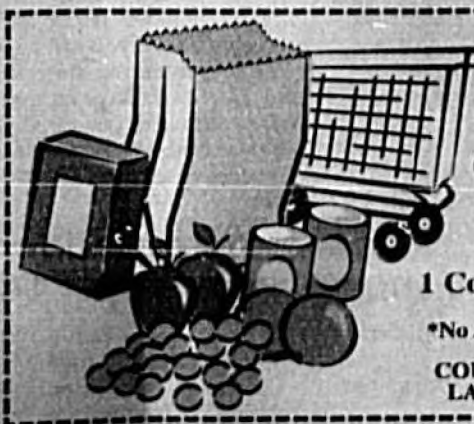
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
