

Hearst Hoax Works

LOS ANGELES (AP) - By telephone, a woman tricked police into believing she was fugitive newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst. The hoax touched off some frantic activity. Miss Hearst's parents and sister flew to Los Angeles from San Francisco. Her father was "very lisappointed." More than 100 police surrounded an apartment building, blocked off streets and negotiated by telephone with the trickster, who said she wanted to surrender to "Uncle George." Rumors later buzzed that Miss Hearst had been in the apartment building but had escaped. A police spokesman said officers raided an epartment but found only a cat, a .22-caliber rifle and an automatic shotgun. But a husband and wife who lived in the apartment-she having a superficial resemblance to

Miss Hearst- said they were grabbed by detectives and questioned. The guns had a legitimate owner with no connection to the Symbionse Liberation Army, police said. The prankster wasn't found, and a police spokesman said later "we had no evidence that Miss Hearst or any SLA member was ever there."

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - The Joint legislative Auditing Committee has narrowed the number of applicants for the job of public advocate to 15. Sen. George Firestone, DMiami, said today, The public advocate will represent consumers in utility

rate cases pending before the Public Service Commission. The job pays between \$22,000 and \$30,000. The committee selected the 15 from a field of 34 applicants at a meeting Wednesday in Tampa, Firestone, committee chairman, said in a telephone interview.

Court Cuts Alimony

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - House Speaker Pro Tem A.H. "Gus" Craig, D-St. Augustine, can stop paying alimony to his former wife on Nov. 2, 1975, the 1st District Court of Appeal ruled today. The court also upheld a Volusia County Circuit Court

decision that the alimony be reduced from \$120 a week to \$95 immediately and to \$50 next November. The appeal court said it based its decision on a "ben chmark" Florida Supreme Court opinion that women now

have abundant opportunities for self-support. The income of Craig's former wife, Catherine, who is a teacher, has increased nearly 40 per cent to more than \$10,000 a year since their divorce in 1969, while his income has remained nearly constant, the court said. Craig is an

The court also said their two children no longer live with Mrs. Craig and that Craig spent \$13,000 between July 1972 and July 1973 on clothing, medical, auto and college ex-

Greeks Returning Home

ATHENS, Greece (AP) - Leftist composer Mikis Theodorakis returned home Wednesday night after four years in exile, said he believed the replacement of the military dictatorship by Premier Constantine Caramanlis was a "positive step," but noted that "for the moment, the political left is excluded." He said the leftists would "use the new liberty to organize the people. If we are wise, we will be able to organize the great strength of the people in a way that is new for Greece." Among other well known exiles, newspaper publisher Helen Vlachos was reported preparing to leave London, actress Melina Mercouri was expected to visit Athens soon and ex-King Constantine was waiting in London for a call.

Colombian Hijacker Killed

CALI, Colombia (AP) - Police disguised as mechanics approached an Avfanca jetliner at the Cali airport Wednesday and killed 24-year-old Eduardo Martinez who had hijacked the plane on a domestic flight. The police shot it out with Martinez just after the plane was refueled. The 123 passengers had been allowed to escape through an emergency door, but the seven crew members stayed as hostages. Neither the crew nor the police were hurt, Martinez demanded release of political prisoners and \$2 million. Police said he hijacked another plane to Cuba in 1969, stayed several months and went to Spain.

Cambodian Posts Fall

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) - Khmer Rouge insurgents captured two government outposts north of Phnom Penh, and 170 of the government defenders are missing, military sources said today.

Tuk Hot, in Kompong Chhnang province about 50 miles north of the capital, was lost Wednesday after six assaults during the day, the sources said. The post was defended by a 300-man battalion, and 100 of them were reported

Longvek, on the east bank of the Tonle Sap river 25 miles north of Phnom Penh, after two days of attacks, according to the sources. They said 70 of the government

troops were not accounted for. The post was established at Peam Longvek to try to keep insurgents from attacking food convoys coming

down the river to Phnom Penh. In Saigon, the South Vietnamese command said its air force on Wednesday had its busiest day since the ceasefire 18 months ago. It said more than 210 strikes were flown and claimed 350 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong

A spokesman said more than 50 of the strikes were around the besieged town of Duc Duc, southwest of Da-

The story wasn't all that interesting. Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, for instance, announced profits deliberately slowed the mails in 1972 to avoid a noved the White House. had soared 131 per cent over the same period in rate increase that might have hurt President 1973. Shell's profits increased 39 per cent, Cities Nixon's re-election prospects. Service Co., 76 per cent and Gulf Oil Corporation, 28

These are really quite piddling profits compared to the first quarter and, after all, why get excited when we all know the oil companies have been ripping off the whole country for decades.

The really interesting part of the story was Shell's explanation for the huge profits pronounced by President Harry Bridges. Said Mr. Bridges: "These earnings results come during a unique

period in which extraordinary conditions prevailed generally, conditions so different as to preclude any meaningful comparison with earnings in Now if anyone has the time we'd like to suggest

you go over the back issues of your newspaper, back the end of the first quarter and see if there's any substantial difference between what Mr. Bridges is saying today and what the oil companies were saying of their record profits then.

On second thought, don't bother. We'll tell you. There's no difference. It's like an echo chamber or, as we said earlier, "It Seems To Me I've Heard That Song Before...'



Those who are more equal, moreover, are not many but expensive. The VA budget of \$13.6 billion is already the third largest in the bureaucracy and can do nothing but skyrocket.

WASHINGTON - (NEA) - The most difficult ask in politics is persuading a good man to run

Public Life

He doesn't like the financial sacrifice, the nterference with his normal career or the effects on his family life. But most of all he doesn't like the personal attacks, the suspicion, the general disrepute which surrounds all politicians and the bitter, bloody infighting which prevails within political parties.

This is the area in which Watergate could be most damaging. The most serious effect will not be what these scandals do to incumbents, but that voters will turn even more cynical. If politics turns so unpopular that heavierthan-usual numbers of voters sit on their hands election day, that popular distrust will become clear to responsible citizens who might otherwise be persuaded to try for office.

This reporter has seen the results of local Watergates in counties, cities and states. The first temporary effect sometimes was a surge of eager house cleaners interested in putting honest men in to replace the "crooks." But over the years, the net effect was a decline in the caliber of the men willing to file. As time went on, only hacks would run. Fewer volunteers were willing to work. One party or another gradually found it more and more difficult to win elections. The winning party built a steady voter group out of the inner circle of relatives, hangers- on and favor-seekers. Voting dropped so low that these groups were able to win repeated elections without effort.

Eventually, the low caliber of men in office and the lethargy and overconfidence of the "Machine" itself would lead to its collapse. But one-party government by hack lasted for years after it had become a corpse because voters would not vote and able men would not run. I have seen incumbents on platforms who

barely knew the duties of their office, who had never attended the meetings of committees of which they were nominally chairmen, who dozed through the meetings of the legislative bodies to which they were elected and some so feeble and decrepit their minds wandered. But no one would






Torture At School Denied WASHINGTON (AP) - A Florida minister says overzealous committee investigators have bilked senators into believing the school he ran for emotionally disturbed

children was conducted like a Nazi concentration camp. The Rev. George E. von Hilsheimer III on Wednesday denied repeatedly that he or his staff engaged in systematic beatings or torture of the children, a charge he said had gained credibility by being repeated over and over.

The Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee is holding hearings on allegations of child abuse at the Rev. Mr. von Hilsheimer's Green Valley School in Orange City, Fla., and at the University Center in Ann Arbor,

The subcommittee was to take up today the allegations about the institute in Michigan, where committee investigators reportedly found widespread use of drugs. The investigators said punishments at the University Center included placing boys in a basement solitary confinement room called "the

Dungeon" for extended periods.

At least half of the patients at both the Michigan and the Florida institutions were covered by the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS), run by the Defense

Department. The Rev. Mr. von Hilsheimer, superintendent of Green Valley, testified that because of what he called an unwarranted controversy he has advised staff members still





Some 400 youthful swimmers representing 17 clubs from throughout the state are expected to invade Sanford Friday morning for the two-day 10th Annual Invitational Swim Meet sponsored by the Sanford Swim Association.

In all, there will be 82 individual events for the boys and girls, ages eight-years-old and under to 17-years-old. Starting time Friday is set for 8:30 a.m. with the 100 yard backstroke for Seniors, 15-17-years old, with the 44th and last race coming much later in the day of continuous swimming. Saturday's starting time is the same, with the 200 yard individual medley for Seniors the opener.

The firm designed a wood and fabric biplane 36 feet long, with a 50-foot wingspan and a gross weight of about 8,000 pounds. 

Panel Demos Zero-In Against Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP) - House Judiciary Committee Democrats rewrote their proposed articles of impeachment today to make more explicit the set of charges the panel is expected to level against President Nixon.

In a closed caucus before convening of the nationally broadcast session, the Democrats (Related stories, Pages 1B, 5B)

revised the proposed resolution to tighten and strengthen its language


