Blocking Roosevelt

The success of Al Smith in the Massachusetts and Pennsylvania primaries is a little more complete than even Smith supporters had expected and in addition to placing Smith in a position of tremendous importance in the Democratic convention, has had the effect of putting a check under the bandwagon.

Just why such an effort should be made to stop Roosevelt is not readily apparent to those of us who live far from the center of this activity.

Roosevelt's supporters say that certain party leaders are against him because they can't control him. If elected he would name his own cabinet members and would not submit to the dictates of the party leaders in the disposition of patronage.

This feeling has only been intensified by the fact that chief among Roosevelt's opponents is Al Smith. Had any other outstanding Democrat been selected to lead the forces of the "Stop Roosevelt" movement, it would probably have been met with a sympathetic feeling.

Roosevelt will still be by far the strongest candidate when the balloting begins in the Chicago convention but whether he can reach the two-thirds vote necessary for nomination is becoming increasingly doubtful.

But if Al Smith can block Roosevelt, it is equally true that Roosevelt can block Smith. Thus, both the leading Democratic contenders will be eliminated.

A Highway Menace

We have heard recently numerous complaints by motorists who have had narrow escapes from running down pedestrians walking along the highways.

These narrow escapes from death or serious injury are a daily occurrence on our public thoroughfares, and it appears that only a kind providence keeps down a heavy toll.

The rule of keeping to the right has been so thoroughly engrained in most people that when they leave their cars they still pursue the policy.

Realizing that there is no law designating on which side of the road a person should walk, and granting that one is not likely to be enacted, it occurs to us that a most valuable public service could be rendered if a nation-wide movement were inaugurated to stop pedestrians from walking on the right hand side of the highways.

Mrs. Owen was given a fine vote of confidence, polling 2922 votes against 876 for Joe W. Sears, her opponent. The final state vote for Mrs. Owen was 49,823 while Mr. Sears polled 37,633 votes.

In the race for the State Senate from the 37th District, Senator J. Parrish, Titusville, now seeking re-election won handsomely, by an almost three to one vote.

First choice votes for Mr. Hagan amounted to 1255; for Mr. Lyles, 950, and for H. W. Parrish, Jr., 818. Second choice votes taken from Mr. Parrish's ballots gave Mr. Hagan a total of 1388, and Mr. Lyles a total of 1100.

The race for the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction was also a one-sided affair, with T. W. Lawton polling 2211 votes against 923 cast for Mrs. Maybelle Maxwell. Mrs. Lawton is seeking re-election against the so far perennial opposition of W. B. Ensminger, of Longwood, a former county commissioner.

Under the second choice vote counting system, Vance E. Douglas, who seeks re-election as the office of Clerk of the Circuit Court by polling 1463 first choice votes against 1144 votes polled by R. E. Deas. Mr. Douglas was opposed by Mr. Deas, and D. L.

VETERAN EDITOR REVERES

MARION, Ohio, Apr. 27.—(A.P.)—George H. Van Fleet of the Marion Star retired Monday after an editorial career of nearly four decades.

L. P. Hagan was re-elected to the legislature from Group No. 2, by polling 669 votes against 512 by D. J. Garrett. Mr. Hagan is now running for Tax Collector.

S. F. Long was re-elected as county commissioner from District by polling 667 votes while E. H. Kilbee polled but 549. Mr. S. Entminger polled 525 votes against 387 by C. B. Seary, and 260 by H. E. Fuller in the race for county commissioner from District No. 3, but in the count of second choice votes, Mr. Seary won by a narrow margin.

L. P. Mills was given 610 votes against 500 votes given E. F. Wheeler to win the election to the office of County Commissioner of District No. 4. Mr. Wheeler is now a candidate for the legislature.
