## Ford's NYC Plan Passes First Senate Test, Friday Is Next

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford's \$2.3 billion loan plan for New York City passed its first Senate test today as opponents still overwhelmingly in an attempt to send it back to committee.

## Delay In Defense Spending?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House budget office is urging a delay in asking Congress for a new nuclear-powered aircraft carrier to help hold down defense requests next year, administration sources report.

The Pentagon reportedly is preparing to ask President Ford to reject this proposal by the Office of Budget and Management on grounds that a year's delay would only boost the already high cost of a carrier because of inflation.

## House Gets Tax Cut Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The bill to extend this year's tax cut heads for action on the House floor where liberals will attempt to end some tax advantages, including the so-called "Perot amendment."

The House is expected to send the bill to the Senate tonight or Thursday. Both chambers face time pressures to finish the tax-cut extension before adjourning for Christmas either Dec. 12 or Dec. 19 because the tax cut now in effect expires Dec. 31.

## Democrats Seeking Issues

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic governors are trying to show some political muscle now and increase their campaign influence in 1976, but their chairman says they'll do it by seeking to shape issues, not appoint a candidate.

## FBI Discredited Black Leader

WASHINGTON (AP) — The late FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover approved a plan to discredit a Missouri black militant leader with anonymous letters accusing him of adultery and of being a bureau informant, according to FBI documents.

The documents, made available by the Senate intelligence committee, show that the bureau's campaign against Charles E. Koen lasted from 1962 to 1971 and was approved in each step of the way by late FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

## Paty Gets Trauma Treatment

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Patricia Hearst is undergoing psychiatric treatment to help her overcome an emotional trauma, according to her lawyer, who says she has lost weight and looks "pale and gaunt."

## Officials Disagree On Busing

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — The most widespread agreement among the nation's city officials is that they disagree so fundamentally on school busing that they don't try to take a stand on it as a group.

As court-ordered busing to achieve racial integration emerged as a volatile issue in the 1970s, both the National League of Cities and its sister organization, the U.S. Conference of Mayors, avoided in each year, including this one, issuing any policy statement on school busing as a desegregation tool.

## Postmaster Asked To Explain

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some members of Congress, angry that Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bolivar has taken major steps recently without consulting them, have invited Bolivar to explain his postal policies.

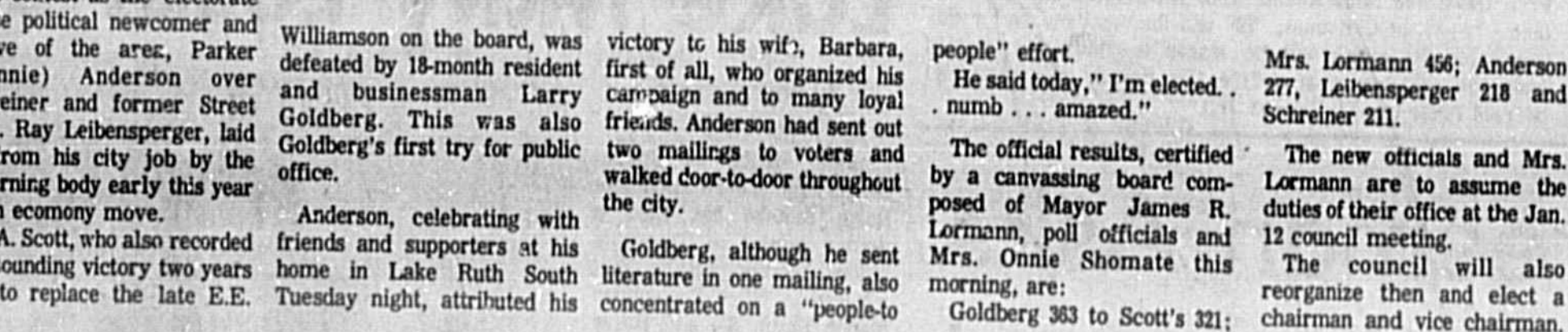

# Schreiner Suffers Defeat Longwood Chooses New Faces

**LONGWOOD** — City voters, following the tradition it has set in recent years, ousted from office two opposed incumbents, opting for two new faces in their first forays into the political arena.

At the same time 64 per cent of those voting gave incumbent Council member James Lormann a thumbs down, while two-to-one in his first election in three tries in 1973.

Schreiner ran third in a three-man contest as the electorate chose political newcomer and native of the area, Parker (Donnie) Anderson over Schreiner and former Street Sgt. Ray Lebesenberger, laid off from his city job by the governing body early this year in an economy move.

H.A. Scott, who also recorded a resounding victory two years ago to replace the late E.E. Williams on the board, was defeated by 18-month resident and businessman Larry Goldberg. This was also Goldberg's first try for public office.

Anderson, celebrating with friends and supporters at his home in Lake Ruth South Tuesday night, attributed his victory to his wife, Barbara, first of all, who organized his campaign and to many loyal friends. Anderson had sent out two mailings to voters and walked door-to-door throughout the city.

Goldberg, although he sent literature in one mailing, also concentrated on a "people-to-people" effort.

He said today, "I'm elected, numb . . . amazed."

The official results, certified by a canvassing board composed of Mayor James R. Lormann, poll officials and Mrs. Onnie Stomata this morning, are:

Anderson 456; Anderson 277; Lebesenberger 218 and Schreiner 211.

The new officials and Mrs. Lormann are to assume the duties of their office at the Jan. 12 council meeting.

The council will also reorganize then and elect a chairman and vice chairman.

# Hit-Run Thief Escapes

A bold hit-and-run thief eluded Sanford Police Tuesday night at Sanford Plaza shopping center after snatching a \$600 diamond ring from the hand of a jewelry store manager.

Police sealed off a wooded area on the east and north sides of the shopping center after a black male asked to see the ring from a display at Zales's Jewelers and then snatched it from the hand of manager W. W. Boatner.

Boatner told police the thief, wearing a blue jacket and white, floppy hat, ran from the store and through a nearby coin-operated laundry.

Lt. Ralph Russell and police patrolmen sealed off the area adjacent to the shopping center and used a Winker Park Police Department K-9 unit in a 70-minute search.

Patrolman Rick Dearing said the police dog tracked the suspect through the wooded area to a spot on U.S. 17-92 between Action Honda and ABC Lounge, north of the shopping center. Police said the jewelry thief is believed to have escaped in a waiting car.

The suspect was described as a young black male, 160-170 pounds, about six-foot-three-inches tall.

Attorney Jailed

Altamonte Springs police arrested an attorney early today on a burglary charge, according to county jail records.

Sergio Spisani, 25, listed his occupation as self-employed attorney when booked on a burglary—entering without breaking—charge at county jail.

Altamonte police said details of the arrest and charge weren't immediately available. Jail booking records indicated Spisani was arrested by three officers in the parking lot of Holiday Inn, Altamonte Springs, at 2:48 a.m. Bond for Spisani was set at \$5,000.

Drug Arrest

Casselberry police jailed a New Smyrna Beach man early today on drug charges. Paul Edward Spencer, 20, was held in county jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond on charges of possession of controlled substance: marijuana and possession of a paraphernalia.

Warrant Served

Sheriff's deputies arrested Michael David Quattary, 25, Orlando, on a circuit court warrant charging delivery of controlled substance. His bond was set at \$5,000.

Juveniles Charged

In other reports, deputies arrested two juvenile girls—ages 19 and 18—Tuesday at Lake Howell High School, Dixie Road, south Semolenia on drug charges.

Deputy Randy Pittman said the arrests were made, and the girls suspended from school, after they went to Dean of Students Raymond Gaines' office to sign—due to skipping school—and officials detected an odor.

Sheriff's reports said school officials were given permission to search the students and discovered what appeared to be marijuana cigarettes in their purses.

Residence 'Hit'

Paul D. Lariviera, of 1164 Otter Lane, Maitland, reported to sheriff's deputies that his residence was burglarized and items valued at \$2,565 taken.

Listed as missing were \$1,200 in tools plus two pairs of water skis, a color television, stereo, tapes and a camera, deputy Randy Pittman said.

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# FLORIDA IN BRIEF

## Official Killed By Trooper Was Legally Intoxicated

ORLANDO (AP) — A Brevard County official killed by a Florida Highway Patrol trooper who mistakenly thought the man was driving a stolen car was highly intoxicated at the time of his death, officials say.

A medical examiner's report shows that Frank D. Booth, 50, had an alcohol blood content of .28 per cent when he was shot while parked on the side of the BeeLine Expressway Saturday, Orange County sheriff's spokesman Richard King said Tuesday.

A motorist with an alcohol level of .10 per cent is considered intoxicated under state law.

Booth, who headed a job program in Brevard County, was shot by trooper Robert Rennie, 25, after Rennie received a radio report that the highway patrol computer listed the license tag on Booth's car as stolen. The report was later found to be in error.

## Unemployment Head Fired

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Commerce Secretary Edward Trombetta has fired the director of the state unemployment program, saying he wants someone with a "more open personality" at a time when unemployment is at its worst in Florida since the Depression.

Trombetta, claiming Tuesday that "the system is being tested to the fullest degree," fired John Wesley White and replaced him with Labor Division Director Andrew J. McCullum III.

White, director of the Employment Security Division since its formation in July 1973, had become controversial and too aggressive, Trombetta said.

## Mother Appealing Conviction

TAMPA (AP) — "My kids will never, I mean never, go back to government schools," says a mother of seven after a jury convicted her of breaking the law by keeping two daughters out of school to protest the state's textbooks.

Her children are in an approved school right in her living room, she said.

Marion Ryan of Daytona Beach was sentenced Tuesday to two years probation and \$1,000 fine.

## Money Squeeze Hits Colleges

BOCA RATON (AP) — Florida's money squeeze has reached the colleges, and the state's nine universities are bracing for an even tighter grip.

The Board of Regents told university presidents Tuesday to begin planning how to cut their 1976-77 student enrollments by 10 per cent in the face of an anticipated university budget freeze by the legislature.

If Florida does place admission ceilings at all its universities, and that decision will not be made until state lawmakers decide next April how much money higher education will receive, it will become the first state to do so.

## Conner: No Law Violations

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner says he has gathered his documentation and is "fully prepared to show there's been no violation of the law" in his land deals or on his financial-disclosure forms.

Conner was to appear before the Ethics Commission today. Executive Director Larry Gonzalez said the panel would hear any evidence Conner wished to present about his finances.

"I would hope that those who said there's been a violation of the law would be there to state the violation, not have it interpreted in the newspaper," Conner said Tuesday in asking for the meeting.

## Inmates' Demands Refused

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Lt. Gov. Jim Williams, who has rebuffed three demands by inmates on a hunger strike at Florida State Prison, will not consider any other demands until the protest ends, an aide says.

Williams refused to heed the inmates' call Tuesday for improved food and canteen and package privileges. The aide said Williams would not consider a demand for increased exercise opportunities until the inmates end the strike.

## State Cuts Budget, Personnel

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — State Agencies have been hit with a double dose of bad economic news. Gov. Jeanne Askew says there will be another mid-year budget cut and a Senate committee is seeking a slash in personnel costs.

Both announcements came Tuesday with the Senate Ways and Means Committee agreeing to demand that all state agencies submit budgets which cut personnel costs by 12.5 percent. The panel also warned that non-productive agencies would find their budgets cut even more.

# St. Johns River Problems Aired Environmentalist Cites Loss Of Flood Plain

Members of the Friends of the St. Johns (FOSJ), meeting in St. Johns last night, heard environmentalist Hugh Nicolay explain problems affecting the St. Johns River and some possible solutions.

The FOSJ is a local group dedicated to preserving the river.

Nicolay is chairman of the St. Johns River Coordinating Council (SJRCC) and president of the Indian River Audubon Society.

A basic understanding of the river requires that the entire basin, or "river system" be considered, he explained.

Nicolay cited the loss of flood plain, caused by Florida's burgeoning population, as the river's prime predicament.

The encroachment of civilization, including the diking and damming of the flood plain, causes a deterioration of the river's natural functioning, he said.

Another problem Nicolay cited was the diversion of surface water via canals to the Indian River, which takes it to the Atlantic Ocean.

The environmentalist said approximately 30 per cent of surface water in the upper river basin eventually is diverted to the ocean, although the full significance of the diversion is still not known.

The increasing of the river's rate of flow, poor game fishing, and increased pollution are noticeable symptoms of those underlying problems, Nicolay added.

He said a first step citizens can take to alleviate the river's deterioration is to vote "yes" on a referendum scheduled for next March.

The referendum, if approved, will allow Florida's five water management districts to levy taxes — up to one dollar on every thousand dollars of appraised property value — to fund their operations.

Nicolay said two-thirds of Florida residents already are paying such taxes and the increased revenue garnered from making the taxes state-wide would allow those districts to hire the biologists, hydrologists and other professionals, needed to effectively manage Florida's rivers.

The SJRCC chairman also urged people to support the efforts of the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation (DER), which is working to control pollutants being channeled into the state's rivers.

Both the FOSJ and SJRCC are urging citizens to write to the DER to request public hearings be held on an application by A. Duda and Sons to drain 2,400 acres of marshlands in Brevard County.

Nicolay said although the support from Sanford crucial role the St. Johns River plays in the city's economy, business, because of the

groups are opposing the Duda's drainage plans, that company has been "open to suggestions" on the environmental issue and it wouldn't be fair to "put black hats on them."

In other business at the meeting, FOSJ president J.T. Turnipseed announced that Bob Ball, of Sanford, had been elected chairman of the group's board of directors.

Citing recent approval of redevelopment plans for the city's Downtown, Turnipseed expressed hope that the FOSJ would continue to receive

support from Sanford business, because of the crucial role the St. Johns River plays in the city's economy.

And moreover, many of these merchants and property owners marked their ballots with cold, hard cash to insure the continuation of the work started by the Downtown Development Council.

The ball is now rolling and the project is gaining momentum as additional merchants and property owners seal the sincerity of their votes by adding their pledges to the fund, that already tops \$40,000.

We are sure that this overwhelming faith in the future of Sanford will be contagious and that the entire city will be working toward a united goal that of restoring the downtown business district into a beautiful and thriving center of commerce for our area. With enthusiasm such as was shown at Monday night's meeting, Sanford must and will prosper.

Blue ribbon honors must be bestowed on Sara Jacobson, the DDC's executive director, and her assistant, Shirley Moak. Despite the odds, these two tireless individuals donated long, hard hours in formulating the program, and sometimes even went to some rare extremes to put across their point.

## Spain Today

The best that can be said of Generalissimo Francisco Franco is that he gave Spain order and stability from 1899 until 1975; the worst, that he prevented any progress toward democratic freedom.

Of all the European countries of the non-Communist West, Spain has been the only one under a dictatorship.

The parliamentary tradition is weak in Spain. Conglomerate has seemed alien to the unbroken Spanish spirit. Extremism marks the history of the Spanish people.

It was the extremism of the left that brought about the Army officers' revolt against the Republic, the revolt Franco led in 1936-1939.

As caudillo, leader of the nation, he has presided over a period of great economic growth for Spain. But parliamentary institutions have remained rudimentary. There has been little freedom for the press and trade unions. It is time for Spain's political progress to catch up with the country's economic progress.

The problem for Juan Carlos, succeeding Franco as head of state, is to bring about the political modernization of Spain while preserving political stability.

The nearby example of Portugal shows the dangers. Since the Portuguese dictatorship was overthrown last year, the country has been averted only because the Portuguese people tend to have a forgiving nature.

The Spanish are more inclined to be intolerant of one another. Juan Carlos must tread a middle path. He must walk cautiously. He will need all the help he can get.

We should give much help to the extent that we can see that it will promote stability and freedom. It is time for Spain to rejoin the community of Europe.

Special care should be taken in renewing our agreement under which about 25,000 U.S. military people and their dependents are stationed at four major American bases on Spanish soil.

The terms of the agreement should be submitted to the Senate for full advice and consent.

Debate should make clear the exact nature of the American commitment of our relationship with post-Franco Spain.

The musical comedy, "The Fantasticks," scheduled for tonight and Friday night at Seminole High School Auditorium, has been cancelled due to the illness of the leading actor. Environmental Protection Secretary Jay Lenders said the church probably should have obtained a permit from his agency before lighting its fire.

He said open bonfires are exempt from permit regulations if they are for ceremonial or recreational purposes. Lenders said the record burn-in presumably has a ceremonial function.

However, he said the exemption does not apply and a permit must be obtained if the fire causes "excessive visible emissions." That's backcountry for a cloud of thick, black smoke.

Boyd said the church was eager to comply with state pollution regulations and would seek a permit if one was required before it burned the next batch of records collected by teen-agers.

"Whether we burn or whether we bash or smash or whatever, we want to get rid of the records," he said.

Besides, Boyd said, records don't make such a hot bonfire anyway.

Have the exploits of House Speaker Donald Tucker, D-Tallahassee, reached all the way to Israel? A release this week announcing Tucker's trip to Israel with 14 other legislative leaders from around the country would make it seem so.

"The Israeli Embassy said Tucker was selected not only for his prominence in Florida politics, but for his reputation in national legislative and government organizations as well," it said. "All 15 tour guests were similarly selected because their influence and reputations extend beyond their individual state borders."

Recently reported charges, made by an FBI informant named Earl Robert Merritt Jr. that he had committed thefts on behalf of the FBI. We were unable to get a comment from the FBI at the time. Now the FBI has responded and we are happy to publish it. "These allegations," declares the FBI, "are fabricated and completely false... Merritt was specifically advised on several occasions that he was not to engage in any illegal activities in his efforts to obtain information... The FBI categorically denies that the activities of the agents in contact with Merritt were at any time improper."

While a new City Hall will never be built as cheaply as one started tomorrow, for instance, it strikes me that a simpler solution would be to construct something unique on the present site.

This is especially so if it is true, as Mr. Meyer said, that less than one per cent of the people have a need to go to City Hall.

Think of the money that could be saved with a plan like this:

First, install three modern trailer-type offices on the south side of the present City Hall. Arrange for three m.c.s. on the north side.

The middle of the three on the south side would extend to the, or a recessed curb, to allow for water payments via a drive-in window.

Move everything out of the present building, tear it down, and in its place erect either a round building, or square, the lower floor to connect directly with each of the six trailers; the upper floor to house a maximum council room seating not over 250. Public rest-rooms would be on the lower level along with storage space.

Behind this entire "spokes-of-a-wheel layout" erect a simple three or four story parking lot without a single office building. The "no frills" suggestion would include no windows in the central building, and above all, NO STEPS, nor should there be steps leading into any of the trailers.

Such a plan would allow all of the city-county activity to be downtown, where it belongs.

There are three African independence movements which have received Communist aid and yet have not subsequently invited the Russians to establish bases on their territory.

But Angola's strategic position, the Atlantic sea coast, and its good harbors near the Cape shipping routes, put it in a special category. The Russians would certainly try hard to establish their influence in a Marxist Angola.

This is the fear which has prompted both China and America to back Dr. Neto's opponents.

### Church's Burn-In Illegal?

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — It would be mighty hard to prove — because the evidence went up in smoke — but the sexy record burn-in sponsored by a Tallahassee church may have violated state pollution control rules.

The Tallahassee Baptist Church sponsored the rock conflagration last week, burning some \$2,300 worth of records and tapes. Church Pastor Charlie Boykin said the church is campaigning against rock music because the sexual beat unleashes lust.

He said he had seen statistics which showed "of 1,000 girls who became pregnant out of wedlock, 994 committed fornication while rock music was being played."

But Environmental Protection Secretary Jay Lenders said the church probably should have obtained a permit from his agency before lighting its fire.

He said open bonfires are exempt from permit regulations if they are for ceremonial or recreational purposes. Lenders said the record burn-in presumably has a ceremonial function.

However, he said the exemption does not apply and a permit must be obtained if the fire causes "excessive visible emissions." That's backcountry for a cloud of thick, black smoke.

Boyd said the church was eager to comply with state pollution regulations and would seek a permit if one was required before it burned the next batch of records collected by teen-agers.

"Whether we burn or whether we bash or smash or whatever, we want to get rid of the records," he said.

Besides, Boyd said, records don't make such a hot bonfire anyway.

"We hardly got a flame started and we had to start breaking them because they just don't burn very well," he said.

Have the exploits of House Speaker Donald Tucker, D-Tallahassee, reached all the way to Israel? A release this week announcing Tucker's trip to Israel with 14 other legislative leaders from around the country would make it seem so.

"The Israeli Embassy said Tucker was selected not only for his prominence in Florida politics, but for his reputation in national legislative and government organizations as well," it said. "All 15 tour guests were similarly selected because their influence and reputations extend beyond their individual state borders."

## Palestine Guerrilla Command Promises Air Raid Reprisals

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The Palestine guerrilla command, two promised "immediate reprisals" for the big Israeli air raid Tuesday, and the Lebanese and Egyptian governments asked the United Nations Security Council for an urgent meeting to take up charges of aggression against Israel.

The Palestinians said it was "the biggest attack in the history of Israel assaults against Palestinians in Lebanon," and a message on behalf of Pope Paul VI called it an "inadmissible gesture of violence."

Lebanese police said seven bodies were recovered Tuesday, bringing the toll to about 100 killed and more than 150 wounded in the attacks on refugee camps and guerrilla bases in northern and southern Lebanon.

## U.S. Raises Israeli Ire

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford said Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger are seeking to soothe Israeli officials after a flap developed between the two governments over a reported U.S. promise to veto Palestinian participation in Middle East talks.

Sources said Kissinger made the promise "in principle" by telephone last Friday night to Israeli Ambassador Simcha Diniz, with a qualification that any veto first would have to be approved by the White House.

But the next day, the United States gave its support in the United Nations to a compromise agreement extending the U.N. observer force mandate in the Golan Heights for six months while paving the way for Palestine Liberation Organization participation in talks on the all-Mideast situation to be held by the Security Council in January.

## Hijackers Fire On Mediator

BEIJING, The Netherlands (AP) — Five Indonesians holding about 50 hostages aboard a hijacked train stranded in northern Holland opened fire on a would-be mediator today and released a Chinese cook with new demands.

More than 150 armed men ringed the train but kept out of range. Two persons were killed aboard the train shortly after the hijacking, and the men in the cordon made no attempt to get aboard.

The Chinese cook brought a message demanding an engineer for the train, food and drink for 50 persons, a balloon and medicine for an epileptic and a diabetic, officials said.

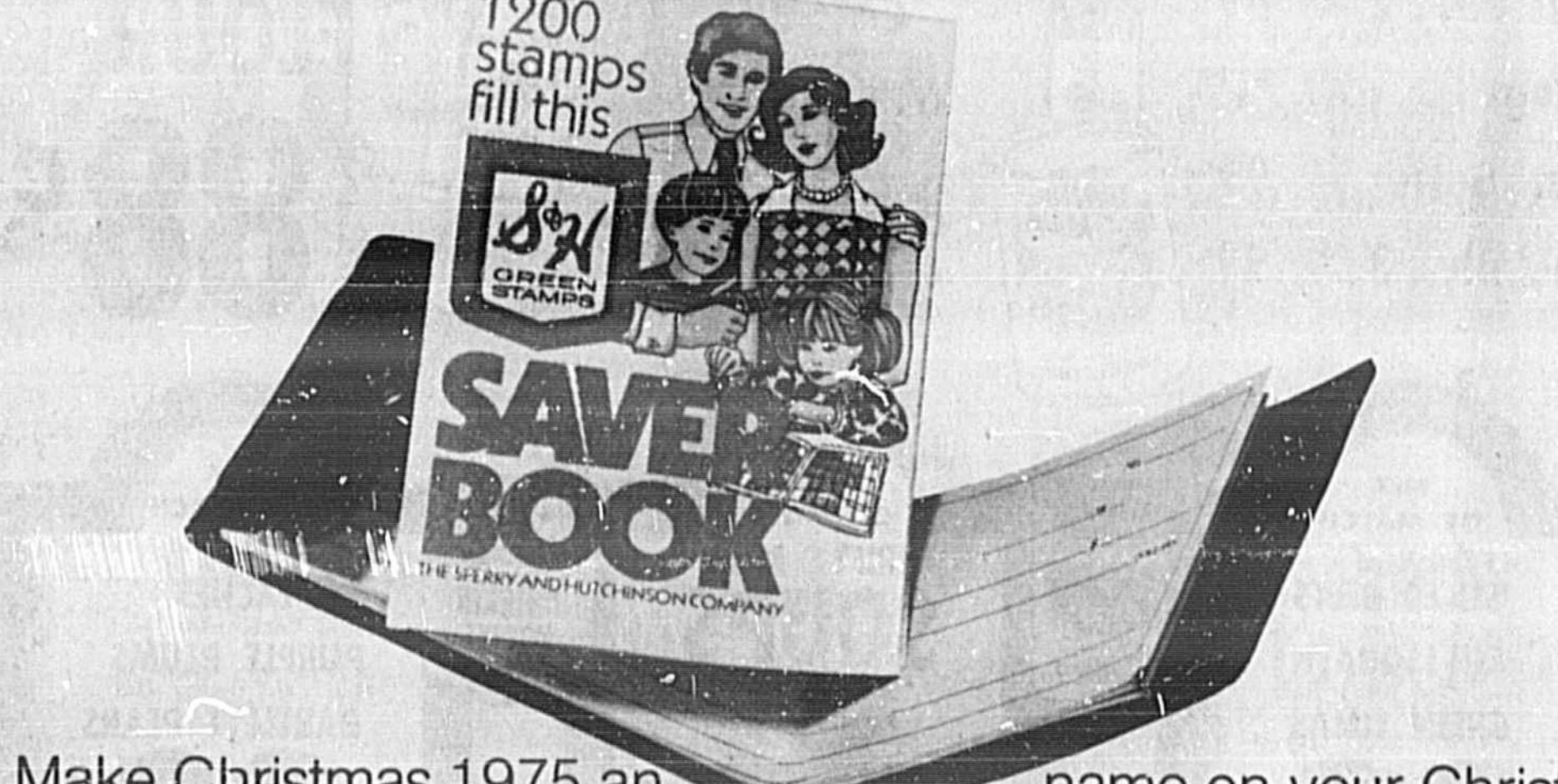

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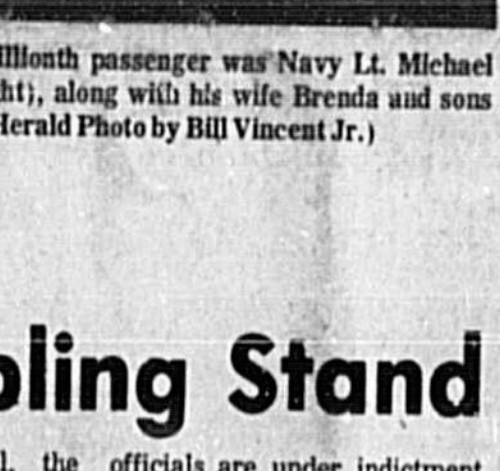
