## RUCK YIELDS ANCY PRICES IN LOCAL AREA

or Of Beans Sent  
By Express Brings  
\$2,300; Half Crop  
Is Already Moved

Lettuce, Romaine  
To Be Ready Soon

Sanford is in the midst of what promises to be the best trucking season in its history. With beans bringing record-breaking prices and prospects bright for excellent markets for lettuce, romaine, escarole, peppers, cabbage and eggplant, and others, plus a few early crops of unsurpassed monetary yield.

These were the observations of W. A. Leffler, a manager of Chase & Company, furniture, the Borden warehouses and dry goods to substantiate the statement.

While the grain crop of Mr. Leffler was good, the earlier crops that are to be harvested soon, Mr. Leffler said, the crop, which has been only moved, is endangered. Heats, the tenderness of the fall truck will easily kill by frost.

There are approximately 1,000 houses in the heart of town planted now. This acreage is expected to yield 100 cars beans being harvested now. Mr. Leffler revealed he has brought anything from \$3 to \$40 a hamper in Sanford. Onions (recently hitting a dollar a dozen), the beans have brought as high as \$17 a hamper. ## SCIENTIFIC BOOK EXPLAINS ORIGIN OF METEORITES

Growth Of Comets, Satellites And Planets Also Revealed

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—(INS)—A new scientific book of Genesis, offering explanation of the origin and growth of comets, meteorites, satellites and planets, and solving the old problem of the retrograde motion of the outer satellites, the "creep" of the axes of planets, and the rotation of the earth presents itself this year. It is entitled "The Earth and the Planets," and was written by the University of Chicago Press. Dr. T. C. Chamberlain, eighty-five-year-old Professor of Geology and Paleontology at the University, and author of the genealogy, called "The Sibley Families—The Sibley Children."

Advancing a "cometary theory" of the origin of the planetary family, Professor Chamberlin completes the story of the sun's offspring. Planetary motion, the origin of meteors, secretions shot out of the sun under the attraction of a passing star, the planetary theory, the advance of the planets in their orbits, and more are explained in the nebular hypothesis of Chamberlin.

Explained by him: The possibilities which form the comets and meteorites are like the planetesimals in size and structure; and that they are not given the same initial velocity as the sun, the inner planets, but are constantly being urged by the sun, which has a propulsive power almost equal to the power of attraction.

The satellites, he says, are held in orbit by the sun from the southern heavens in a hyperbolic curve at tremendous momentum, within the range of the outer planets. They draw four great bolts from the opposite sides of the sun, the earth being the twin of the sun, and threw them in a link. In revolution, they are held in balance, so as to remain in equilibrium by centrifugal force.

It limited great mass to the inner planets, he says, because of the fact that the particles were all moving in the same direction, enabled them to grow around their natural center of gravity and become the heads of comets.
