Hoover Lashes Citizens For Apathy On Crime

WASHINGTON (UPI)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover lashed out today at Americans who stand idle while criminals turn parts of the nation into a "no man's land" of violence.

Hoover, writing in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, described as "shocking" the 5.3 per cent increase in crime last year. He noted it was the highest rate in the recorded history of U. S. crime.

The FBI chief said the report showed that some areas are a veritable "no man's land" where crime is ever lurking. He reprimanded citizens who have a "detached attitude towards crime."

"This country's citizens," Hoover wrote, "must awaken to the fact that the war on crime is not just the battle of the law enforcement officer."

"Every citizen has a stake when hoodlums prowl the streets bra-

only committing atrocities which appall even veteran police officers. No one is immune from the attacks of depraved murderers, robbers, sex offenders and kidnapers."

Hoover said the police officers are a "small patrol" when compared with the "army of law breakers roaming America."

"Often the law enforcement officer's battle is a lonely one," he added, "and too frequently the citizens who should be his allies are indifferent and apathetic."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 3, 1935

ARTICLE VII

WHEREAS the Legislature of 1935, under the Constitution of 1932 of the State of Florida, did pass a bill proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Florida, and the same was approved by a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house; and the vote of each house was entered upon their respective journals, with the yeas and nays thereon, and that the said Joint Resolution be submitted to the electors of the State at the special election on November 3, 1935;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, R. A. GRAY, Secretary of State of the State of Florida, do hereby give notice that a

SPECIAL ELECTION will be held in each County in Florida on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1935, the said Tuesday being the third day of November, for the ratification or rejection of the said Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Florida, viz:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to apportionment; proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Florida, providing for forty-four senatorial districts; providing a plan for apportionment; providing for filling vacancies created hereby; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS the Legislature of the State of Florida has determined that an emergency requiring an early decision by the electors of the state does exist, and, WHEREAS, an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Florida, relating to the subject matter of reapportionment should be submitted to the electors of the State of Florida at the earliest possible time. **NOW, THEREFORE,**

Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the following amendment of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Florida, relating to apportionment in the Senate and House of Representatives be and the same be hereby agreed to, and shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Florida for approval or rejection at a special election as provided by Article XVII, Section 3 of the Florida Constitution.

That three-fourths (3/4) of all members elected to each house of the Legislature does determine that an emergency requiring an early decision by the electors of the state does exist with reference to this amendment to Article VII of the Constitution.

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 of Article VII are hereby repealed and in lieu thereof the following sections are hereby adopted:

ARTICLE VII

Section 1. Representation—Apportionment.—The state shall be apportioned into forty-four (44) senatorial districts designated by number in consecutive order. Each apportionment shall provide fair-

(1) There shall be only one senator for each district.

(2) No district shall be composed of more than three (3) counties.

(3) Counties forming a district shall not be separated by territory of another district and must be contiguous.

(4) No county shall be divided in creating a district.

(5) Vacancies that are created by the reapportionment provided for forty-four (44) senatorial districts of the Senate shall be filled by the electors in the general election in November, 1936. Upon election, new senators shall be elected in the new districts for the following terms:

District 33 for four (4) years.

District 48 for two (2) years.

District 41 for four (4) years.

District 42 for two (2) years.

District 43 for four (4) years.

District 44 for two (2) years.

Thereafter, all Senators shall be elected for a four-year term.

(6) In the House of Representatives the representation shall be apportioned as follows:

(a) Five (5) representatives to and for the most populous county; four (4) representatives to and for each of the two (2) next most populous counties; three (3) representatives to and for each of the four (4) next most populous counties; two (2) representatives to and for each of the fourteen (14) next most populous counties; and one (1) representative to and for each of the remaining counties of the state at the time of such apportionment.

(b) First apportionment—reapportionment.—The first apportionment of each legislative house shall be in accordance with statute designating the senatorial districts and the representation in the house adopted at the 1935 session of the Legislature, and the next apportionment of the Senate shall be at the regular session in 1937, and the next apportionment of the House of Representatives shall be at the regular session in 1936 based upon the 1930 Federal Census; and decennially thereafter, the Legislature shall reapportion its representation in accordance herewith. Should it fail to do so, its duty shall continue in every session of whatever type until reapportionment has been effected.

(c) Failure to reapportion at regular session, and providing for extraordinary session to perform reapportionment.—Should the Legislature fail to reapportion the representation in the Legislature at any regular session as required by the Governor, the Legislature itself shall call the Legislature into extraordinary session to perform its duty within thirty days after adjournment. No other business shall be transacted during such session and the session shall not recess for more than seventy-two hours, except that after a period of sixty days from the date the extraordinary session is convened, the Governor may, by proclamation or the Legislature may by concurrent resolution, recess the Legislature to a future

Suggestions For School Clothing

School clothes cost plenty of money, especially when a family has several children to dress. With careful planning and good quality fabrics, children can look neat and clean without too much expense.

Buy shoes that are comfortable and not too hard to care for. Some styles can be worn any season. These are most practical. Sweaters and wraps can be worn longer if purchased a little large for the school boy and school girl.

Finishes on fabrics today are not always permanent. Many of them wash out gradually. After about fifteen times in the laundry, you may notice that a garment has shrunk quite a lot. This is due to the fact that the threads have relaxed because most of the finish is off. Manufacturers stretch the threads when applying these finishes. As long as the finish is there, it holds the threads in place. This same thing makes it much harder to get a piece of fabric on grain line if it is off more than 1/2 inch. Glazed cottons which are off grain cannot be straightened. Check for this before buying piece goods. When sewing, try making 3 skirts and 3 blouses whose fabrics and color are such that the 3 blouses will look nice when worn with any of the 3 skirts. Allow for growth changes in all clothes. Tucks in blouses can be let out front and back for waist expansion. Buttons on blouses of younger girls allow for lengthening and enables mixing and matching. When set-in sleeves become too tight, try making 3 sleeveless blouses by removing sleeves.

If a family has a member who has time to make school clothes and has the ability to sew, it saves money. You get better quality for the amount of money spent. There is also a satisfaction of individuality and better fit. Have trim washable and easy to iron.

Shrink interfacing. Some of the fabric from which the garment is made can be used if desired. Reinforce corners of pockets with a second row of stitching and machine baste a strip of fabric to the waistline on the wrong side. This will be the same color as the garment when a piece is needed to mend a tear. Then you can cut off what you need from this strip for mending.

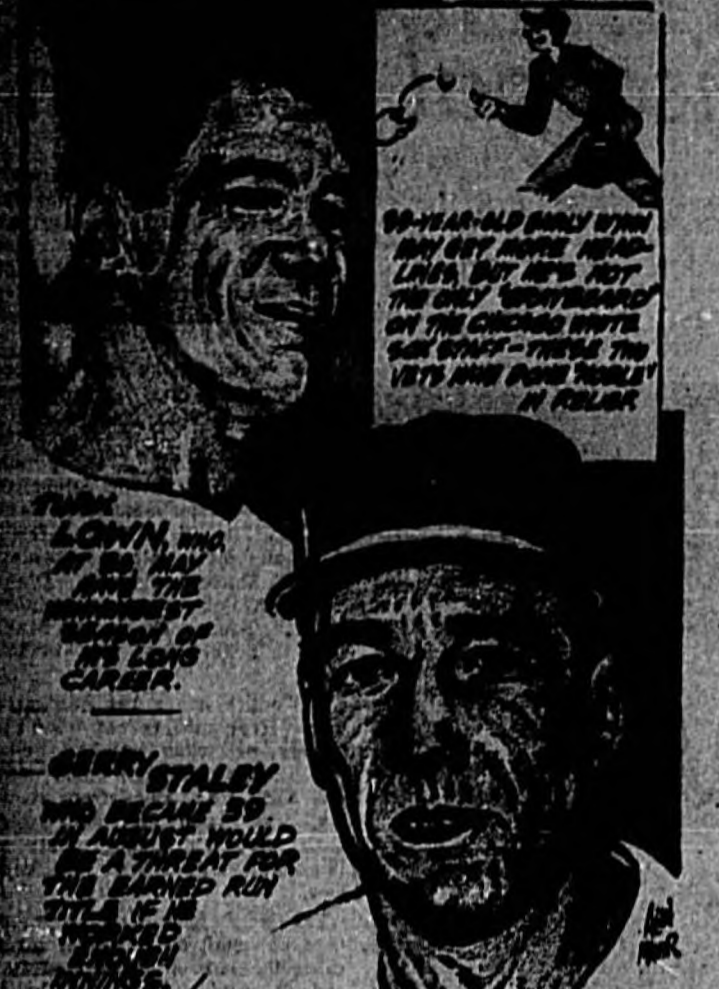

Leg Muscle Holds Key For FSU's No. 1 Eleven

BATON ROUGE, La. (UPI)—The speed with which one pulled leg muscle improves may well be the determining factor this fall in Louisiana State's efforts to repeat as the No. 1 college football team in the nation.

That injured muscle belongs to All-American halfback Billy Cannon, a 200 pounder who runs the 100 in a dazzling 9.4 and generally conceded to have been the best back of all in '58.

Cannon, who led the Southeastern Conference in rushing last fall, pulled the muscle at a spring track meet and LSU coach Paul Dietzel has been sweating it out since. The Tigers' big gun operated at half speed in early pre-season drills but expressed confidence that he'll be back in top form when the defending SEC and national champions open their season against Rice on Sept. 19 before a national television audience.

But even with Cannon not at top form, there's little reason to feel sorry for Dietzel and his Bengals. A total of 31 of the top 34 players on last year's unbeaten, untied club return—include nine starters, 10 second teamers, and the entire gang of "Chinese bandits."

If Cannon's ready, the LSU backfield, including halfback Johnny Robinson and quarterback Warren Rabb—fifth in the SEC last year in rushing and passing respectively, will have few peers. The lone lean spot is fullback and Ted Broadnax graduated with Tommy Davis turned pro.

Coaches at LSU think they may have already found Cannon's replacement for 1960. He's sophomore Wendell Harris who also runs the 100-yard dash in near record time and who combined speed and an effective change of pace for a great freshman season.

Up front, the Tigers are three deep at every position with pro-

U.S. Death Toll 407; 12 In State

United Press International
The nation's traffic toll mounted steadily today and the National Safety Council predicted it might reach an all-time high before the end of the Labor Day weekend tonight.

A United Press International count at 11 a. m. showed 311 persons killed in traffic accidents. Four died in plane crashes, 43 drowned and 43 were killed in miscellaneous accidents for an overall total of 407.

California, which had hoped for a repeat of its relatively safe July 4 holiday, when only 10 died, led the nation with 59 highway deaths, followed by Ohio with 26, Texas with 20, and New York and Pennsylvania with 18 each. Virginia and Michigan each recorded 13.

At least 12 persons had died in Florida since the weekend started. The survey showed four traffic deaths, five drownings and three deaths in the crash of a private airplane.

Big Powers To Reopen Talks On Disarmament

Arms Race Like's Top Interest

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States, Russia, Britain and France have agreed to resume their long-dormant disarmament talks aimed at ending the tense and costly cold war weapons race.

The big powers decided that a 10-nation disarmament commission — composed of five Western and five Communist countries — should start negotiations soon.

U. S. officials viewed Russia's decision to take part in the new talks as particularly significant because it came on the eve of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's visit to the United States.

They said President Eisenhower considered disarmament to be the most important single matter he planned to discuss with Khrushchev.

Government sources disclosed the agreement on new disarmament talks Sunday night. They said the commission was expected to begin work soon.

East and West have been unable to get together on disarmament since London negotiations by a United Nations subcommittee blew up in disagreement in September, 1957.

The aim of the new commission will be to make some headway toward solving such touchy problems as ending production of fissionable weapons materials, trimming current atomic stockpiles and expanding military forces and setting up a system to prevent surprise attack.

Since the London talks broke down two years ago, the United States, Britain and Russia have made headway at Geneva toward devising a system to police an atomic test ban. They failed, however, to come up with methods of lessening the danger of surprise attack.

President Flies Back To Capital

PRESTWICK, Scotland (UPI) — President Eisenhower ended an historic trip to Europe today and headed home to prepare for his meetings with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

Bad weather over Iceland forced the president to cancel at the last minute plans to stop at Keflavik on the way home for a talk with Iceland President Asgeir Asgeirsson.

The president must complete plans for the Sept. 15 arrival of Khrushchev. There will be conferences with Republican legislative leaders on administration bills in the closing phases of Congress. He will consult with the State Department and the delegation to the United Nations on the crisis in Laos.

Kay Kendall Dies; Harrison Keeps Two-Year Secret

LONDON (UPI) — Rex Harrison knew his actress wife Kay Kendall had an incurable illness before he married her, her doctor said, but he kept the knowledge from her.

Miss Kendall, 32, died here Sunday of leukemia, cancer of the blood for which no cure has been found. Harrison played his most difficult role in keeping her from knowing she had it during the two years of their marriage, according to Dr. Carl Goldman.

"Kay never knew what her illness was," Goldman told newsmen after her death in the London Clinic.

"Mr. Harrison knew before he married her. It has been a long and difficult strain for him. Now it is over and he is completely broken up."

Goldman said the disease was diagnosed in 1955 and Harrison was told of it before their marriage in June, 1957. But he said Miss Kendall thought her trouble was a less serious blood disease with similar symptoms.

She awoke briefly from a 13-hour coma at 12:30 p. m. Sunday, murmured a few words to Harrison, who had been at her bedside for three days, and died.

U.S. Asks Facts On Laos

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The United States lined up support today for a move to send United Nations fact finders to investigate Communist attacks on Laos.

U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge was ready to make the proposal to the 11-nation Security Council this afternoon.

Lodge spent Sunday sounding out possible co-sponsors for a necessary resolution.

The Security Council will begin consideration of the Laos situation by hearing a report from Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld on the appeal for help he received from the government of the tiny Southeast Asian nation.

Laotian Foreign Minister Khanmanan Panya was on his way to New York by air to plead his nation's case personally if he is invited to appear before the council.

The council is composed of Argentina, Britain, Canada, Nationalist China, France, Italy, Japan, Pakistan, Russia, Tunisia and the United States.

The Communist bloc has opposed U.N. interference and Russia could veto any move the other members of the Security Council might want to make. Then the case likely would be taken up by the 82-nation General Assembly.

Laos, in its appeal to Hammarskjöld, asked for a U.N. emergency force to halt "aggression" but the United States and its allies decided to press for only a fact finding commission at this point.

The United States would like to see the team on its way to the war zone within two days in hopes this alone might help stem the fighting.

The Communists have been pressing for revival of the three nation International Control Commission comprised of India, Canada and Poland. This was set up to watch over Laos after the Geneva Conference of 1954 which neutralized Laos and ended the Indochina war.

Scores and entrance fees of \$1 per person will be taken from 8 a. m. to 12 noon, and from 1 to 3 p. m. both days. No special applications need be made. The Callaway handicapping system will be used to determine the winners. Handicaps are given proportionate to a golfer's score under the Callaway system.

Men's and Women's division trophies will be given to winners and runners-up in the tournament.

Ronald W. Perry, Sanford Recreation Dept. head, will direct the tournament. Mrs. Clifford Overman, president of the Casselberry women's group, Miss Ellen Bette, president of the Mayfair group, are in charge of arrangements at their clubs.

Some lawmakers already were convinced that Morse's "parliamentary war" with Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson would force Congress to abandon its adjournment goal and meet into next week, when Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev arrives.

Morse, whose parliamentary delaying tactics kept the Senate in session until after midnight Saturday, threatened to block any action at the Labor Day meeting by reading a three-volume history of the American labor movement.

The Senate planned to resume debate on a bill to extend the farm surplus disposal program. Johnson also hoped for action on the House-approved bill to permit President Eisenhower to hike interest rates on series E and H government savings bonds.

The House planned to consider a bill that would deny passports to people who had promoted the Communist cause during the last nine years.

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Chinese Troops Cross Burma Line

RANGOON, Burma (UPI) — Communist Chinese troops led by a second lieutenant crossed the border into Burma searching for Chinese refugees, the English language newspaper "The Nation" reported today.

Mitchell To Ask Strike Cool-Off

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell says he would recommend that President Eisenhower invoke the Taft-Hartley Act to force an 80-day "cooling off" period in the steel strike if it continued into October and created a national emergency.

He made the statement as Democratic Gov. Mike V. DiSalle of Ohio, one of the nation's steel-producing states, called on the government to use "all its facilities" to bring about an early end to the 54-day old strike.

DiSalle, former federal price stabilizer, criticized Mitchell Sunday for failing to intervene in the strike. The governor said a continuing strike could harm the economy. But he conceded it had done no serious damage so far.

Mitchell noted that there were about 650,000 persons idled by the United Steelworkers Union without that has shut down plants producing 90 per cent of the nation's steel.

The secretary said he would recommend that Eisenhower obtain a Taft-Hartley injunction if the strike continued into early October and serious steel shortages and further unemployment in steel industries developed.

The injunction would halt the strike for an 80-day "cooling off" period during which Steelworkers would have to go back to their jobs. They would be free to continue the strike if no agreement was reached by the time the injunction expired.

"Union officials oppose use of the injunction."

Eisenhower has refused to intervene in the strike. He has urged both sides to work for an early settlement that would not be inflationary.

His feeling between U.S. workers and their employers is growing, and the 54-day old steel strike proves it, top labor spokesmen declared today in special Labor Day statements.

The union leaders generally took a somewhat grim view primarily because Congress approved last week a labor reform bill stripping organized labor of some of its power and curtailing some of its privileges and immunities.
