**Naval Station Commissioned**

When Ed Higgins and the Chamber of Commerce first began working for a new airport at Sanford some two years ago, there were plenty of people here who said nothing would ever come of it and a few who objected to the comparatively small percentage of the total cost to be borne by the City. Last July when work actually began on the Naval Air Station, there were some who insisted it would never be completed until after the war was over.

But today as the station nears completion and the commissioning ceremonies "take place," we believe everyone admits a wonderful job has been done, and a few who will see it perhaps for the first time will regard it as a miracle of transformation. Never before in the history of this town has so much been accomplished in so small a period of time.

With hundreds of sailors already here and hundreds of cadets soon to be brought here for special flight training, this new air station may well prove the salvation of Sanford's economic life. Hundreds of our best young men have gone away to join the Army or the Navy. Hundreds more have left to work in defense factories. There are still other hundreds yet to go before this war is over.

And so Sanford needs the new air station no less than the air station needs Sanford. With complete co-operation we can go a long way together. We can help them and they can help us.

And local Doubting Thomases must admit: "They tackled the thing that could be done, and they did it!"

**The Child's Outlook**

Wendell Willkie after his recent trip around the world is more convinced than ever that men and ships and planes will win the war, but that American homes must help secure the peace by giving children a world outlook. Writing in the November issue of "Parents Magazine," Mr. Willkie says: "We can best justify the sacrifices of the men who are struck down in this war by the creation of a world in which those who survive them, and their sons and daughters, can live in freedom and in peace."

"We cannot wait until the war is over to begin work on that aim," he declares. "We must build a world in which men of all races and creeds and religions and nations can live in peace and harmony, in which the just fruits of enterprize will find their just fulfillment, in which children may look forward to a constantly better world, free of hatred and bitterness and narrow isolationism and of economic degradation."

Mr. Willkie adds: "To build such a world the nations of the earth need each other's help. It will be a new idea to many Americans that the United States may in the future need help from other nations. But we do need help if our idea of personal liberty, of justice, of equality, of hope, growth and expansion are to survive. We can keep America to ourselves though I doubt if the America we keep to ourselves would be free. . . . If we are to have freedom we must share freedom."

"Already we owe much to other people who are fighting for freedom. After Dunkirk the British stopped the German tide while we were slowly rousing ourselves from the delusions of peace. We had an opportunity to get our industries on a war footing, thanks to the brave Russian people. And how greatly in debt we are to China for the five long years of fighting by which she checked the Japanese."

"American liberty is a religion. It is a thing of the spirit. It is an aspiration on the part of people for not alone a free life but a better life. . . . Now it is our duty to look, and to help our children to look, beyond the bloody horizons of the present, toward the shadows of the future which rise up like majestic promises of what may be our reward. Never has there existed such hope for mankind as exists today. Never have there existed on the surface of this planet so many human beings who know what freedom is and who are determined that, though it cost their lives, it shall endure."

**The French Ships**

At the Fall of France, some of its fleet lay in French harbors. Some of it lay at Dakar and other colonial points. Some of it lay at Laval. Hitler had wanted to get his hands on those ships, but Marshal Petain was able to hold him off. Laval has no moral or patriotic inhibitions. Darlan appears to play the Hitler game. If the United Nations could take them over that would be a great gain but such possibility seems out of the question in the near future.

The B. B. C. recently broadcast that Hitler had sent an ultimatum to Laval, demanding the surrender of all merchant ships, French or foreign, now in French harbors. If he gets these, he will be after the naval shipping next.

The French do not like these demands. Unarmed, they have been helpless. Now assistance is drifting in, so far as a mere trickle. Their day is coming, however. Hitler knows it. That's why he is in haste about French ships.

### Rats Controlled By Poisoned Potatoes

GAINESVILLE, Nov. 3. (Special)—Sweet potato baits dusted with zinc phosphite controls water rats, rice rats and cotton rats in truck and cane fields of the Florida Everglades and Dade County, says L. C. Whitehead, district agent with the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Field tests conducted recently by H. J. Spencer, Fish and Wildlife Service representative in Gainesville, showed that sweet potatoes dusted with the zinc phosphite and distributed down the rows were very effective in killing the rats. The zinc phosphite is cheaper and more easily obtained than poisons which have been used for the purpose.

Community-wide control is necessary for the poisoning to be effective.

This youngster with the tongue-twister name footed three field goals, two in the second quarter. Unless my memory is bad you'll have to go back many a year to recall a college player kicking three goals in a single contest. The last comparable feat I remember was the Army-Navy game of 1924 when the cadet center, Ed Garloch, banged four between the uprights to beat the sailors 1-0.

Professional mentors get the most out of an accurate placement of drop kicker but few college coaches stress the foot in football or take full advantage of the kickers they have. 

## British Army Wins Flaming Six-Hour Battle In Egypt

### Allied Planes Pound Retreating Enemy Forces As Fight Picks Up Speed

CAROLINE, Nov. 4. (AP)—Directly behind British heavy bombers destroyed two medium sized merchant vessels and approximately half of the supplies in the harbor of Tobruk, a United States Army Middle East communication announced today.

Britain's desert armies were reported today to have won the first major test in the new campaign for Egypt by routing the Axis in a flaming six-hour battle and jeopardizing Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's entire position on the El Alamein front, 80 miles west of Alexandria.

A Cairo bulletin said the British Eighth Army again thrust itself forward in two sectors along the 38-mile front Monday, and again yesterday after defeating Rommel's tank forces Monday.

The British offensive is now in full swing with Allied planes pounding the withdrawing Axis forces.

Outlasting a 10-day drive, painstaking at first through the Axis depth defenses, the Imperials yesterday burst into the open desert where it was tank against tank and gun against gun.

A number of enemy tanks were knocked out and many prisoners were taken in a new advance, a British communiqué said, "and heavy fighting continues."

The battle line was swinging westward, a British communiqué said, "and heavy fighting continues."

Abd El Rahman area near the coast where Australian infantry have pinned some 3500 Axis troops against the Mediterranean and hurled back their desperate efforts to break out both to the east and west.

The British have lost one-third of their tank strength but nevertheless today it admitted a breakthrough on the northern sector of the front.

The Germans said the British had drawn all their mobile formations from the southern and central sectors into the northern sector battle behind a vanguard of 500 tanks, including American-made "General Grants" and "General Shermans."

## Reds Oust Nazis From Heights On Black Sea Coast

### Germans Throw New Divisions Into Stalingrad Drive

In the 72-day-old siege of Stalingrad and the western Caucasus the Reds yesterday credited today with ousting the Germans from several fortified heights northeast of the city, the Black Sea naval station, and with beating off Nazi counterattacks.

The Germans threw two divisions into the attack at Stalingrad and could not even hold the initiative, yesterday midnight communiqué announced.

The communists said Soviet troops were locked in tense defensive fighting southeast of Stalingrad to reclaim lost positions. It mentioned no changes in the battle line, implying that the powerful German drive had been checked after seven Russian retreats in a week.

The German siles army was reported struggling desperately to move up to the wrecked city and attack behind a curtain of aerial bombing, the high command reported.

The defenders of Stalingrad repulsed all German attacks, the latest communiqué said. "In the course of one factory Soviet soldiers, having repulsed an attack by enemy infantry and tanks, went over to counter-attack and occupied several strong points."

Marshall Timoshenko's relief army beating toward Stalingrad from the northwest added to the pressure on the German flank which was a number of fortified positions occupied by German troops.
