# Cooperation Will Do It

Since last Tuesday's dedication of the sparkling new English Estates school building in South Seminole, The Herald has had time to look into some of the questions raised by parents of children who will attend the school. The primary inquiry concerned the completion of Oxford Road.

This road, at the present time, is a clay stabilized right of way which runs from SR 436 southward to the site of the new English Estates school. From the southern boundary of the school property, Oxford Road does not exist, as such, until it reaches the northern edge of actual development in the English Estates subdivision.

However, the northern boundary of the overall English Estates subdivision adjoins the southern prop-erty line of English Estates school at a point 1,800 feet south of the school itself. In other words, if one were to cross the southern property line of the school he would actually enter English Estates subdivision.

There are two points which should be made clear. Initially, it is not the responsibility of the Seminole Coun-ty Board of Public Instruction to provide access roads to schools. This is - under usual circumstances the responsibility of the county if the school is not situated within a municipality. Secondly, it has not been the policy of the County Commission - and it is as it should be - to pave or clay stabilize roads within privately developed subdivisions. The Commission holds that this responsibility should belong to the developer. And there is little doubt but that the citizens of this county will almost unanimously agree with the Commission.

lieve the developer of his responsibilities. When this action was taken by the Commission it put the Oxford Road job on its schedule. Other major road items were on the schedule ahead of the Oxford job. The Commission, however, did place the job as high on the schedule as possible.

But the tremendous amount of January rainfall had delayed numerous projects. That the Commission is interested in getting access roads to the school

in borne out by the fact that when it was originally determined to attempt to open the English Estates school Jan. 6, the Commission ordered its road department to complete the section of Oxford Road from SR 436 south to the school, In fact, the road department put every piece of equipment it had on the scene for a period of 80 days and it met the deadline.

The Commission, as soon as the schedule and the weather permits, will complete the road south of the school into the English Estates subdivision.

Parents of children attending English Estates school have every right to be concerned. In fact, they ought to be. But they also must realize ---as was pointed out last Tuesday by, members of the Commission att. iding the dedication and open house - that there is just so much money available for the construction of new roads and the maintainance of those already built, and that the funds must be utilized in the most wise and justifiable manner.

Meanwhile, members of the Commission have asked that these parents be as patient and as tolerant as possible. The Herald believes these parents should work with the commission for the completion of

# Liston Now Has 2.7 Million **Tax Problem**

DENVER (UPI) - Silent Sonny Liston remained in seclusion at his northeast Denver home today, recovering from a painful wrenched arm and facial beating received at the hands of new world heavyweight champion Cassius Clay Tuesday.

Liston, his huge arm dangling in a sling, arrived with his wife in Denver Thursday afternoon, pushed stolidly through a cheering crowd of 250 at Stapleton Airfield without a word, and took a cab home.

Liston made no comment regarding tax liens filed egainst him by the Internal Revenue Service amounting to an estimated \$2.7 million. The claim made Thursday blocked payment of nearly \$5 million to Liston, the firm which promoted the fight in Miami Beach, and another organization with movie rights to the

match. Liston was not available for comment late Thursday. whose handlers threw in the towel at the beginning of the seventh round to give Clay the crown, was emotionally upset to be returning to his home town as a loser, said Denver boxing promoter Milt Willner.

Willner, long as associate of Liston, said Liston told him he did not want to talk to anyone on his Denver arrival.

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


