Bombing Derby One Of Top Social Events

The Navy's Annual Bombing Derby, besides being a major fleet exercise, has always meant to the local community one of the major social events of the year.

A reception held on the eve of the final day — this year March 20 — is the traditional meeting ground for Navy and civilians amid a festive atmosphere of food, drink, music, entertainment and colorful decorations.

This is the occasion when the manufacturer's representative from Columbus Ohio, can have the long promised social toast with the maintenance lieutenant who works with his products; when a Sanford lawyer meets a California engineer who, lo and behold, lives next to the lawyer's sister in Santa Monica, and Naval officers renew old friendships among the visiting military from other ships and stations.

Perhaps the favorable returns are in part a product of circumstances. TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant said today he talked with U. S. Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz about new efforts to settle the strike against the Florida East Coast Railroad. Bryant's office said President Johnson suggested in Miami Thursday that the governor talk with Wirtz about the strike. In a brief statement, Bryant said, "The Secretary of Labor called me this morning about 9 o'clock and we engaged in a discussion as to the mechanics of carrying out the President's suggestion. We expect to be back in touch with each other during the day and will be contacting interested parties to see if we can develop some progress toward settling the strike."

ST. AUGUSTINE (UPI) —

Steps Of Faith

One of the finest examples of steps of faith is seen in the case of the nobleman whose son was so sick that death was eminent. The father was so distressed that he went to Jesus for help. The incident is described in John 4: 46-54 so you may wish to turn to this portion of Scripture for the story first hand, however, I will review what happened.

This nobleman, or official as some translations describe him, was employed in the government of Herod Antipas who was the tetrarch of Galilee. Evidently all means of healing had been exhausted and the official had become rather frantic so was willing to try anything to have his son made well.

He heard that Jesus had returned to Galilee. The miraculous power of the Lord had gained much publicity and people from all the land were flocking to Him. The official found Jesus and begged Him to go to Capernaum and heal his son. Our Lord seemed to discourage him at first but then told him that his son was cured even as he willed it. The man believed and returned home to find his son well. His faith became great enough to spread to his entire household.

Let us observe what happened here step by step. First we see that the official had a need. He knew that his son was so sick and though he had great authority there was nothing he could do.

Today the first step that we take on our way to faith is to understand that we have a need. We have not been able to save ourselves but that One far greater than any man is necessary in our lives if we are to enter eternal life. We must recognize that there is not enough wisdom, strength, power, or any other attribute of our own selves to go through life aright. When we feel a deep need do we start on the road to faith in God?

During war many people seem to seek God who turn their faces away with the signing of the armistice. Some turn to prayer when they face any great crisis of life be it financial, health, or anything else, only to forget God's goodness when the crisis has passed.

Second, we see in the miracle that the official found the answer to the need was Christ. He did not find the answer in man, or any of the powers of man, but in Christ. What a world we would have today if the people in it would recognize that the answer to its problems is in the One who revealed God to us, even Jesus Christ.

If the world is to see, individuals will have to be illumined first. This compels all of us to do all we can to turn each member of our families, our friends, our schoolmates, business associates, and others to see Jesus.

Third, the appeal is to be made. The official made his petition to Christ to cure his son and he repeated the prayer even though he seemed to be rebuffed at first. When we know we have a need and that the answer to the need is Christ the next step is to make our appeal to Him. How necessary it is to pray. Do we find time for it? If we do not have time we had better be sure that some activities are discontinued in order to remedy the situation.

Prayer is our means of having conscious and direct fellowship with God. Through prayer we keep the channels of communication open with God. If someone offered us a direct telephone line to the president of the United States we would feel that we had become important indeed. When we realize that God loves us so much that he gives us a direct line to His throne of grace we should be grateful and make much use of it.

Fourth, faith is rewarded. In the case of the official we find his son cured. This was the fulfillment of the heart's desire of this man. It is not true that God always cures everyone we pray for. King David prayed that his son would live and he did not. David arose from the bedside of his dead son, wiped his eyes, and expressed faith in God's divine wisdom. Even if God does not answer our

He and Mrs. Kellersberger have traveled in 40 countries and on five continents.

After graduation from the Biblical Seminary in New York, Mrs. Kellersberger married the doctor and they shared a rewarding life as Presbyterian missionaries and as representatives of the American Leprosy Missions. She is listed in "Who's Who of American Women" and is the author of seven books.

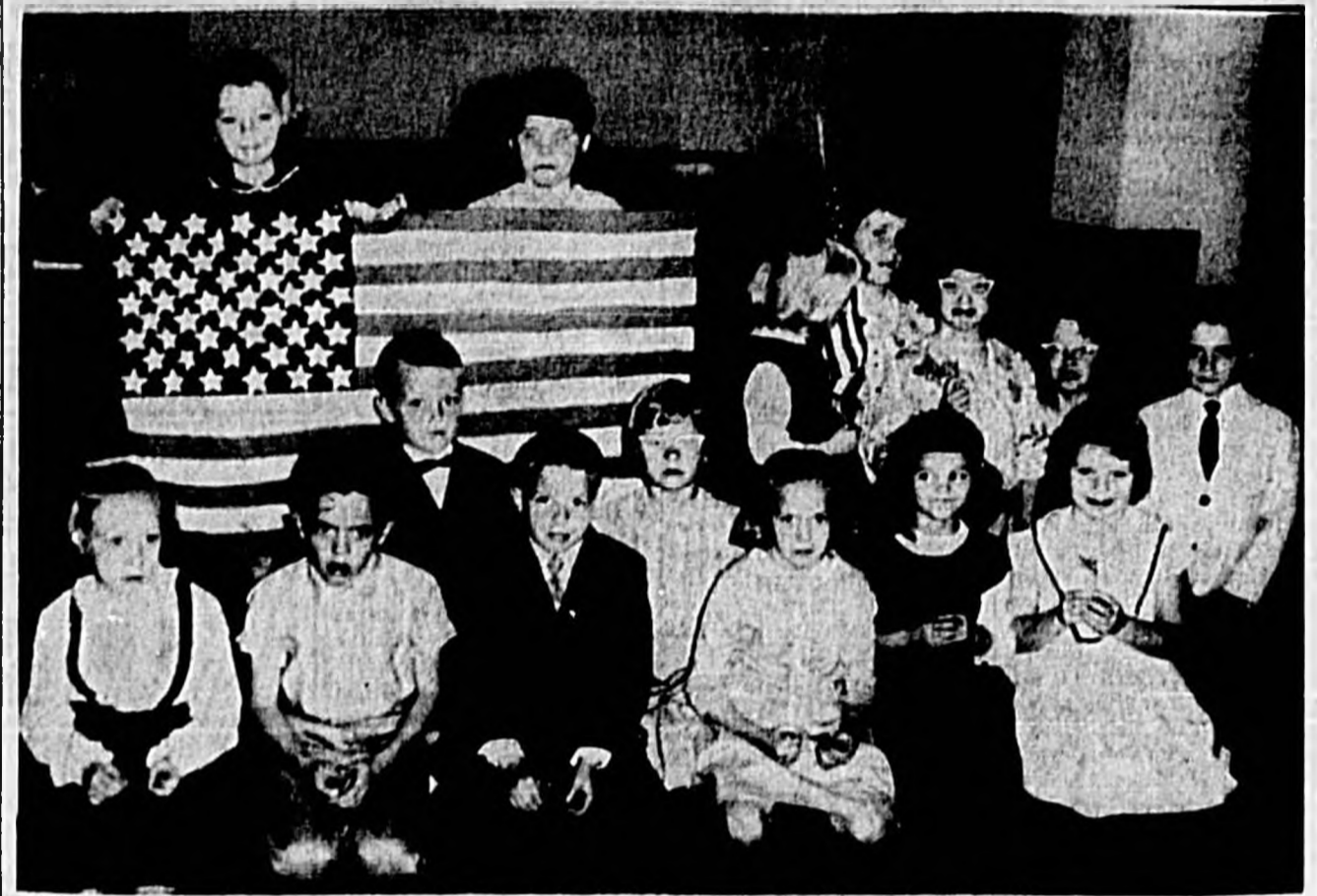
Patriotic Program Presented Here

DENVER (UPI) — Silent Sonny Liston remained in seclusion at his northeast Denver home today, recovering from a painful wrenched arm and facial bruising received at the hands of new world heavyweight champion Cassius Clay Tuesday.

Liston, his huge arm dangling in a sling, arrived with day afternoon, pushed stolidly through a cheering crowd of 250 at Stapleton Airfield without a word, and took a cab home.

Liston made no comment regarding tax liens filed against him by the Internal Revenue Service amounting to an estimated \$2.7 million. The claim made Thursday blocked payment of nearly \$5 million to Liston, the firm which promoted the fight in Miami Beach, and another organization with movie rights to the match.

Liston was not available for comment late Thursday, whose handlers threw in the towel at the beginning of the seventh round to give Clay the crown, was emotionally upset to be returning to his home town as a loser, said Denver boxing promoter Milt Willner.

Willner, long an associate of Liston, said Liston told him he did not want to talk to anyone on his Denver arrival.

An IRS spokesman revealed Thursday night that more than \$2.7 million in estimated tax liens have been filed against the dethroned heavyweight champion, the firm which promoted Tuesday night's title fight and another organization with movie rights to the bout.

The IRS spokesman added that the action was aimed at getting Liston and his associates to discuss payment of taxes before being allowed to collect proceeds from his fight against Cassius Clay, which was halted because of the sixth and seventh rounds because of an injured left shoulder suffered by Liston.

"We only take such steps when we think collection of taxes might be difficult," said the spokesman.

A \$1,105,500 lien was placed against Intercontinental Promotions, Inc., of which Liston is president. Another \$887,808 lien was placed against Liston and his wife, Geraldine. The IRS also claimed \$783,000 in taxes from Delaware Advertising and Management Agency, Inc., which had secondary rights to the fight.

Another government group also expressed an interest Thursday in the Liston-Clay fight.

Sen. Philip A. Hart, chairman of the Senate antitrust subcommittee, said his group plans to look into the arrangement which gave Liston promotion rights to Clay's first title defense.

There were indications that both Liston and Clay will be called to testify at a hearing of the subcommittee in the near future.

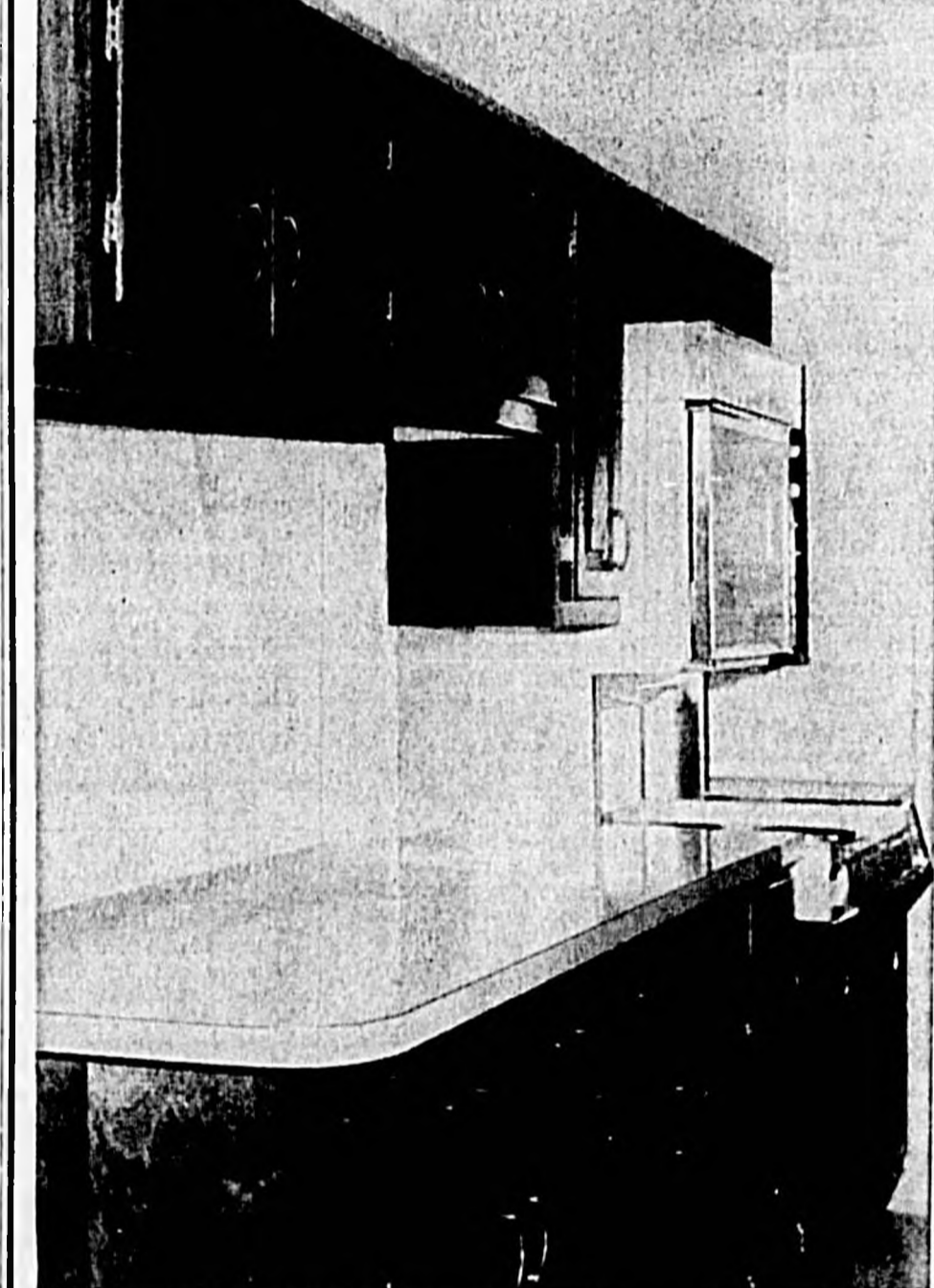

Railways Join Effort To End FEC Bombings

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Association of American Railroads offered a \$100,000 reward today for information leading to the arrest and conviction of saboteurs who dynamited a Florida East Coast Railway freight train Feb. 26.

Association President Daniel P. Loomis disclosed the action in telegrams to President Johnson and Florida Gov. Farris Bryant. Loomis also praised Johnson for ordering the Federal Bureau of Investigation into the case.

The blast, about 10 miles south of St. Augustine, was the fifth such explosion on the strike-troubled railway in three weeks. Another explosion occurred during President Johnson's trip to Florida, Feb. 27.

Loomis' wire to the President said the nation's railroads "earnestly hope for success of the present investigations before this savagery adds loss to human life to its mounting destruction of property and disruption of vital public transportation services."

There presently is no passenger traffic on the Jacksonville-to-Miami rail line. State, FBI Teams Intensify Hunt

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A governor-appointed team of police and FBI men under Presidential order intensified their search today for persons behind violence associated with a year-long Florida East Coast Railway strike.

Railroad officials, who said they increased their security guard to at least 100, said they welcomed the state and federal investigators.

Gov. Farris Bryant Saturday ordered 15 highway patrolmen, six Sheriff's Bureau investigators and Assistant State Atty. Joseph Jacobs to investigate the bombings but to concentrate on smaller incidents connected with the strike.

State planes were ordered to patrol the state-long FEC tracks the governor said. Last week President Johnson ordered FBI men to concentrate on the investigation after two trains were dynamited during the day he visited Florida while the state team will aid the FBI in the dynamiting, Bryant ordered it to put special emphasis on the smaller deaths—shootings in the homes of rail workers and similar incidents.

Recovery In Building Indicated In Florida

TALLHASSEE (UPI)—Sales and use tax collections for the July-January period indicate the building industry may be recovering from an over-development period.

Revenue Director J. Ed Straughn said today. Straughn said building contractors reported gross sales of \$120.6 million for the first seven months of the current fiscal year, an increase of 10.31 per cent over the same period the previous year. The increase amounted to \$11.2 million.

Gross sales of lumber and building materials have been down for the past two years, he said, but the decline appeared to be checked in the last seven months. Gross sales totaled \$472.1 million off only .33 per cent for the corresponding period a year ago. Sales tax collections were up \$489,792 or 5.5 per cent.

Roofing and sheet metal industry reported gross sales of \$54.5 million, up \$189,589. Decorating, painting and papering industry had gross sales of \$30.8 million or 30.20 per cent increase.

While, electrical, plumbing, heating and air conditioning showed slight declines, gross sales for household appliances jumped by 23 per cent or \$23.3 million.

The F. W. Dodge Corp. reported that future construction based on December contracts totaled \$147.8 million, an increase of 19 per cent over last year. The corporation's breakdown showed non-residential contracts totaled

\$38.7 million, up six per cent; residential construction at \$76.4 million up 38 per cent and non-building construction at \$32.6 million, up one per cent. The corporation reported cumulative total of contracts for 1963 amounted to \$1.8 billion, a 12 per cent gain over 1962.

Other places entered by the youth, according to police, include the John Faedi home in Longwood and the Longwood Elementary School.

The four boys were released in custody of their parents pending possible action in Children's Court.

Investigating were Deputy Charles Fagan Jr. and Longwood Police Chief Claude Lajo.

Later he moved to the tool department and at the age of 15 was assistant stockkeeper. He became a trainman 44 years ago, a post he has held since.

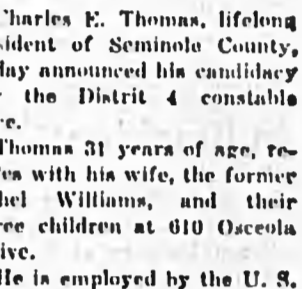

Allen was born in Enterprise and came to Sanford with his parents when he was six months old.

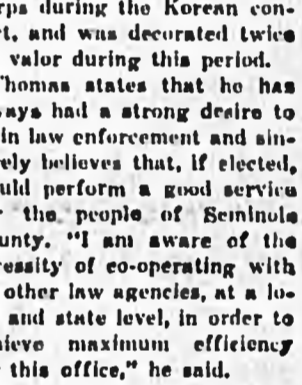

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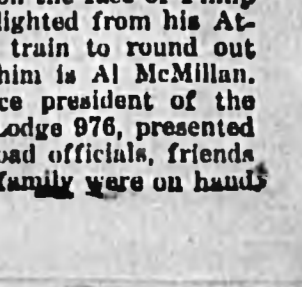
