Decisions affect you

County benefits from recent legislative session

LONGWOOD — Seminole County netted a big boost in school spending, money for road improvements and Lake Jesup cleanup funds, local lawmakers told their constituents last night.

About two dozen people attended a town hall meeting with state representatives Lee Constantine and Bob Starks at Longwood City Hall. Both

panned the legislative session which ended last week as unproductive and criticized legislative leaders for stalling bills until time ran out to review them.

"It was probably the worst-run session we've ever seen," said Constantine, nearing the second year of his first term in the House of Representatives.

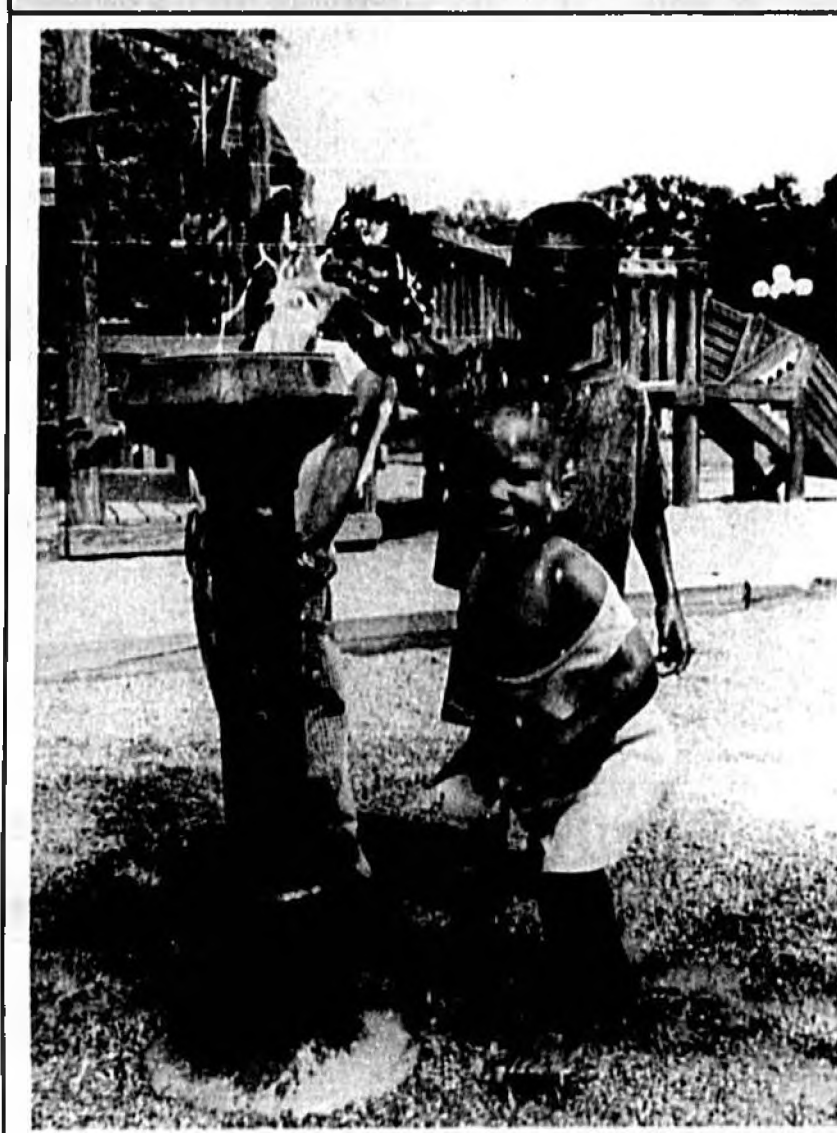
Constantine said the first weeks of the session were slower than usual and the last week quicker

than usual. As a result, legislative proposals accumulated to the point where about 90 percent of the 3,000 bills went unpassed.

Among the legislative victims were Constantine's ex parte communications bill which would return the right of individuals to talk to local officials about zoning matters affecting their property and the Geneva Bubble bill.

Several residents asked about crime-fighting **See Decisions, Page 5A**

County revises system used to pay employees

SANFORD — The majority of Seminole County commissioners voted Monday to retain a merit pay plan for county employees, but modifying it to assure every worker eligible for a raise gets one.

Doing away with the idea of cash bonuses sought by commissioner Larry Furlong and a panel of employees, three commissioners united to endorse the county's current pay hike reward program. The program was opposed by Commissioner Carlton Henley because pay hikes for exceptional service one year becomes the base pay for subsequent years, even if performance slips slightly.

Commissioners agreed with county officials a "lump sum" cash bonus would be detrimental to new employees, who, in two to three years, could be earning less than new recruits. County Manager Ron Rabuff said he feared an increased attrition rate would result.

The pay program will be included in the 1994-1995 budget, which begins Oct. 1. Commissioners didn't set an amount for the program. Employee Relations Director German Romero said each percentage point over current pay levels will cost \$186,000 for the nearly 1,000 employees.

Since the early 1970s, county employees receive annual pay adjustments based on their ability to

meet satisfactory work standards. Employees don't receive an automatic "cost of living adjustment" pegged to the federal Consumer Price Index used by many other government agencies and private businesses.

Instead, employees receive pay increases based on their ability to meet certain performance standards. Average performance is rewarded at an increase which is typically close to the federal Consumer Price Index.

Commissioners found the merit program cost taxpayers less than across-the-board pay increases.

But during the past three years, commissioners cut back on the merit program so many employees meeting satisfactory standards received less than the CPI and some outstanding employees received standard pay increases due to departmental quotas. Romero said the quotas often penalized top-performers in small departments. Employees complained their pay hikes were based on more on their department's quota rather than their performance.

The current "average" pay hike was set at 3 percent, less than half the 7 percent level of 1990-1991. As a result, satisfactory employees received pay raises of about 2 percent, less than the current inflation rate, Romero said.

Commissioners agreed in February to do away with the quota system for the remainder of the year to test its impact.

Officials match money to needs

SANFORD — Seminole County commissioners agreed Monday to tentatively set community service grants next year at the same \$747,300 amount as this year, an amount which does not include \$200,000 for Orlando Science Center or non-social service agencies.

Commissioners balked at a request by Larry Furlong to set the annual program at \$1 million, saying they could increase the

\$747,300 later this year if the money is available. But commissioners agreed the demand from public assistance agencies is great.

"I don't think that any of us are thinking this fund has adequate money to meet all the needs of the community," said commission chairman Dick Van Der Weide.

The same 18 groups that received a total of \$747,300 this year are now seeking \$990,548 for next year, said Dr. Jorge DeJua, director of the county Health and Human **See Grants, Page 5A**

ALTA MONTE SPRINGS — Balance. That's what Joshua Etzkin says is the key to his success in school and in life.

The winner of the Commissioner's Choice Award from Lake Brantley High School said he is the hardest working senior at that school because he has mastered the delicate balancing act that combines a college curriculum, a job, extracurricular school activities and volunteer work.

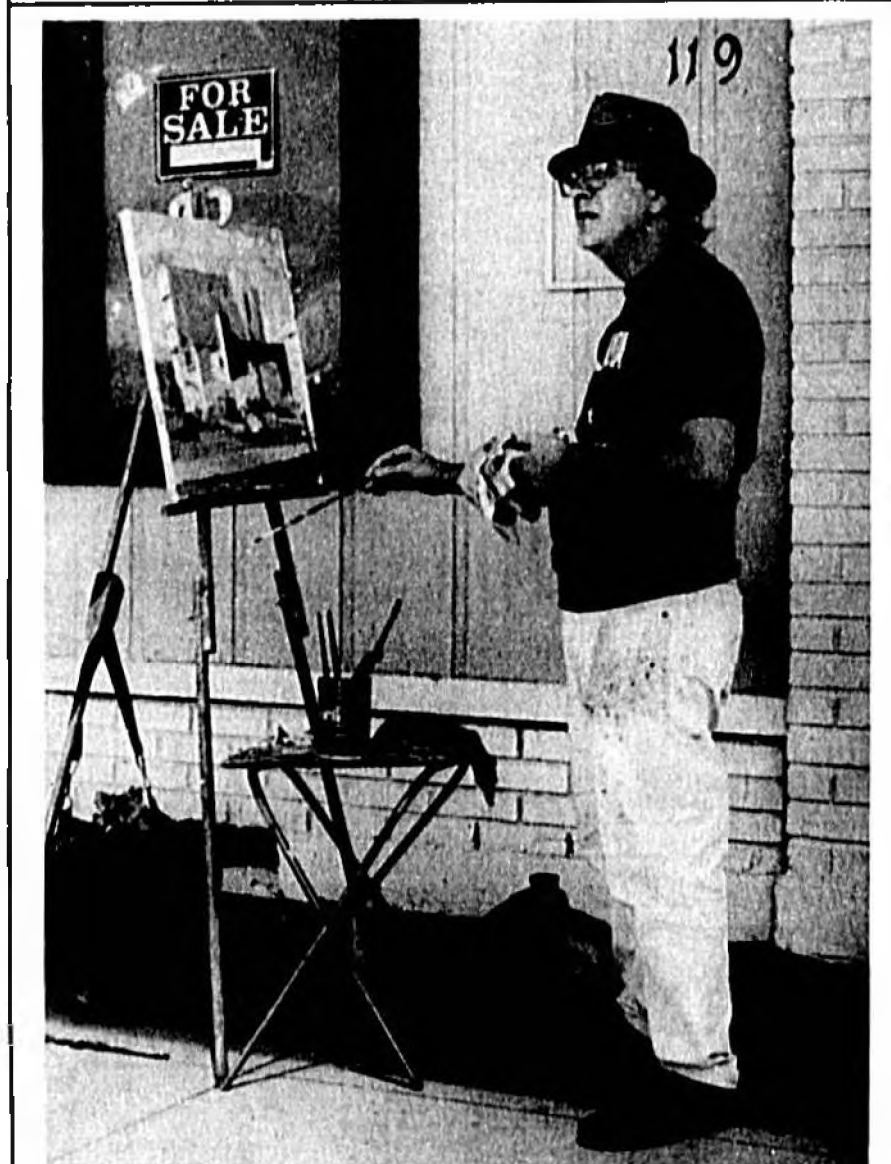

Brown sentenced to 40 years

KESSIMMEE — An Indiana woman who smothered her two young daughters because of an irrational fear they would be sexually abused was sentenced to 40 years in prison.

Donna Brown, 37, of Huntertown, Ind., said she thought her daughters — 5-year-old Carrie and 3-year-old Casey — would be better off dead.

"I just thought if they were in heaven they would be safe," said Brown, 37, during a hearing Monday before Circuit Judge Jose Rodriguez. "I thought it was best because I wasn't thinking rationally."

Prosecutor Dorothy Sedgwick conceded Brown's mental illness but, "nevertheless, knowing right from wrong ... she is completely criminally responsible."

Brown killed her girls in a hotel room on April 26, 1993, after driving from Fort Wayne, Ind., to give them a final day at Walt Disney World.

Midnight curfew approved

ORLANDO — As expected, the Orlando City Council adopted a midnight curfew for anyone under 18 in a 12-square-block area of downtown. The ordinance becomes effective June 1.

Along with an anti-cruising measure for motorists, the curfew approved Monday is designed to thin out groups of rowing teen-agers blamed by police for violating traffic laws, drinking and vandalizing the central commercial district.

The American Civil Liberties Union calls such measures unconstitutional and plans to ask for a court injunction, as it did in Miami last month.

Curfews in other cities have been successfully implemented. The Orlando law will control teens only in the downtown core, which police and fire-rescue officials say is congested and unsafe for both teens and adults.

Station apologizes for pronography

TAMPA — A television station apologized to viewers and an employee was out of a job in the wake of a weekend rerun of "Gunsmoke" that was interrupted by nine seconds of hard-core pornography.

The scene, aired Sunday afternoon during a segment of the program on WTTA-TV, showed a naked woman surrounded by men. Everyone in the scene was performing a sex act.

"We have to humbly apologize to all the viewers who saw it," said Tom Watson, the station's general manager. "It's just not our thing to do. We're very conscious of our wholesome family programming."

An employee, who managers refused to identify, resigned Monday over the incident. What station managers believe happened was that the employee was watching the sex film at the station's operations center and accidentally or intentionally flipped a switch, briefly sending it over the air.

Cutting the education bureaucracy

TALLAHASSEE — A month into a new job as commissioner, Doug Jamerson's plans for the Department of Education became an issue in the governor's race.

Gov. Lawton Chiles spotlighted Jamerson in his state-of-the-state speech opening the 1994 Legislature, telling lawmakers he wanted him to cut administration at the agency by 50 percent.

The department's white 17-story building in sight of the Capitol is an easy target for speeches attacking bureaucratic bloat, and Chiles was true to form.

"That amounts to emptying five floors of the Florida Education Center," he said.

Republican gubernatorial candidate Jeb Bush went the Democratic governor one better and said he would do away with the department entirely.

Jamerson is also campaigning for a new term as commissioner in the fall, after being named by Chiles to fill Betty Castor's

unexpired term.

Even before Chiles' speech, the former state representative from St. Petersburg said he wanted to focus the department on its main mission, supporting local school districts.

And more than 900 employees are being shifted from the 2,100-employee department, though there won't be any empty floors in the Education Center.

Jamerson argued that some parts of the agency — the largest being the Division of Blind Services and the Florida School for the Deaf and Blind — could function separately.

"I wanted to give them their independence," he said.

That fit with Florida's goal of decentralizing the Department of Education's authority, Jamerson argued. Lawmakers went along — but only part way.

Jamerson's proposals to spin off parts of the department would have cut employment by more than 1,200, or 58 percent.

Cuts that survived the legislative session will amount to 43 percent, said Joy Frank of

the department's legislative affairs office.

Though more than 50 jobs will be terminated, most of those affected are being transferred. The largest number, 576, are staff members for the Florida School for the Deaf and Blind.

The school in St. Augustine, already run by a separate board, will be given its own budgeting and hiring flexibility, though employees aren't being cut off from their state pensions and benefits, Frank said.

Jamerson also proposed spinning off the 326-employee Division of Blind Services, which provides rehabilitation services, runs a rehabilitation center and a library for the blind in Daytona Beach, and operates shops and cafeterias managed by the blind in state buildings.

Lawmakers turned that proposal down, voting instead for a one-year study of whether some or all of the services could just as well be provided by the Department of Labor, or by private contractors.

Violence increases as authorities destroy pot harvests

TALLAHASSEE — Law enforcement officials are facing greater dangers when they search for Florida marijuana growing sites, as the value and potency of Florida-grown cannabis climbs, a new report says.

Authorities destroyed 145,384 marijuana plants in 1993 worth \$145 million, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement said in its annual report released Monday on efforts to eradicate domestic cannabis production.

A grower in Highlands County was killed by police, an FDLE agent was injured in Brevard County, and authorities in 38 counties reported weapons seizures, booby traps, warning devices and watch dogs at marijuana farms.

"The violence we're seeing to protect this illicit growing activity offers an increased danger not

only to law enforcement but to the general public," FDLE Commissioner Tim Moore said in releasing the report. "Citizens who come upon a growing site should not investigate on their own."

Since the eradication program began in 1981, more than 1.4 million plants have been burned and more than 5,000 people have been arrested by state and local law enforcement officials.

The amount of marijuana destroyed last year was lower than 1992 when authorities found 243,452 plants worth \$243 million. The 1992 figures were skewed by the discovery of one major pot farm in Lafayette County with 110,000 plants, said FDLE spokesman John Joyce.

Last year, authorities found 2,033 growing sites, the largest number since the program began, the report showed. Police

State Supreme Court lifts stay of Stewart's execution

TALLAHASSEE — The state Supreme Court lifted a stay of Roy Allen Stewart's scheduled execution Wednesday in the rape and strangulation of an elderly South Florida woman.

"The governor's death warrant may proceed," the court ruled Monday.

Stewart's attorneys, Michael Minerva and Stephen Kissinger of the office of Capital Collateral Representative, didn't return calls to their office for comment on how they would respond.

Stewart, 38, is scheduled to be executed at 7 a.m. EST Wednesday in the electric chair at Florida State Prison in Starke in the 1979 murder of 77-year-old Margaret Haizlip of Perrine.

Dade Circuit Court Judge Michael Salmon had granted a stay last week and scheduled a hearing Thursday on claims Stewart's attorney failed to object to what Stewart said were inadequate jury instructions in his 1979 trial.

"Although he has not prevailed, he has had multiple opportunities to persuade us of the wrongness of his conviction or the correctness of the death appeal," the Supreme Court ruled. "The trial judge erred in granting a stay of execution and conducting further proceedings."

Stewart's attorneys argued that his trial counsel failed to object to the form of instructions to the jury on how to determine if the crime was "heinous, atrocious and cruel," justifying a death

Miami police fire officer acquitted in 1988 shooting

MIAMI — Miami police officer William Lozano, acquitted last year of manslaughter charges in the deaths of two black men, has been fired five years after that fatal shooting sparked three days of race riots here.

Police Chief Calvin Ross notified the suspended police officer that he was being dismissed for violating departmental orders in the shooting of motorcyclist Clement Lloyd and the death of Lloyd's passenger in the resulting crash.

Ross said the 34-year-old Colombian-born police officer violated a prohibition against shooting at a moving vehicle and a directive that allows deadly force only as a last resort.

In his letter, Ross informed Lozano that he has until April 29 to appeal his firing to the Civil

Service Board. Lozano had been suspended without pay.

There was no response late Monday to a message seeking comment left at the office of Lozano's trial lawyer, Roy Black. Lozano's own telephone in Miami is unlisted.

Lozano's letter of dismissal came less than two weeks after the Police Department's Disciplinary Review Board turned down the officer's most recent request for reinstatement.

Last fall, the department's Firearms Review Board ruled that Lozano should be dismissed for unnecessarily causing Lloyd's and Blanchard's deaths.

Lozano stepped out into a street in Miami's predominantly black Overtown neighborhood as Lloyd's motorcycle raced his way, fleeing a pursuing patrol car. The officer then fired, killing Lloyd instantly and causing his

Fight gets out of hand

NEW YORK — Former President Richard Nixon, who left the White House in disgrace during the Watergate scandal only to emerge in retirement as an elder statesman, suffered a stroke that aides said left him unable to talk.

The 81-year-old Nixon was stricken at his home in Park Ridge, N.J., while getting ready for dinner Monday night and was taken by ambulance to New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center, said his spokeswoman Kathy O'Connor.

His daughters, Triela Cox and Julie Eisenhower, and the Rev. Billy Graham, a longtime friend, rushed to his bedside. His wife, Pat, died in 1993.

Nixon was in intensive care, conscious and stable, O'Connor said, adding, "He's fine."

Kim Taylor, another Nixon spokeswoman, said just before midnight that the former president had not spoken since the stroke.

"The doctors would like to give 24 hours before they give us any diagnosis or prognosis," she said.

The Daily News quoted an unidentified emergency-room worker as saying Nixon, wearing an oxygen mask, waved to companions as they visited him in the emergency room.

Americans responded quickly to word that the former president — a man whose foreign policy successes during the Cold War were overshadowed by Watergate — had been stricken.

Taylor said Nixon's office had been flooded with calls from "Mr. and Mrs. America, from Iowa and Oklahoma, from other people who have had strokes."

At the same hospital is Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, whose husband defeated Nixon in the 1960 presidential election. The former first lady, who has cancer of the lymph system, is recovering from surgery for a bleeding ulcer.

Nixon was the nation's 37th president. He served from Jan. 20, 1969, to Aug. 9, 1974, resigning amid the Watergate scandal and becoming the only president to leave office to avoid impeachment.

He came to the presidency after nearly a quarter-century as a Republican officeholder — congressman, senator, and vice president under Dwight Eisenhower.

He was a devout anti-communist at the start of his

political career. But as president, he ended two decades of distance between the United States and China, exchanging toasts with Chairman Mao Tse-tung in Beijing. He established a live-and-let-live policy of detente toward the Soviet Union and negotiated arms control agreements with the Kremlin. And he negotiated an end to U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War.

Watergate became shorthand for the 1972 break-in at the Democratic National Committee offices at the Watergate Hotel and the botched attempt to cover it up by Nixon and his top lieutenants.

A month after Nixon resigned, the country was outraged when his successor, Gerald R. Ford, issued a pardon for all crimes that Nixon "committed or may have committed or taken part in" during his presidency.

"While I was not involved in the decision to conduct the break-in, I should have set a higher standard for the conduct of the people who participated in my campaign and administration. I should have established a moral tone that would have made such actions unthinkable. I did not," Nixon wrote in 1990 in his ninth book, "In the Arena."

Despite Watergate, world leaders have received Nixon in retirement as an elder statesman. He has traveled extensively and made his thoughts on foreign policy known through books, articles and speeches. Last month, he visited Russia and caused a stir by meeting with right-wing leader Vladimir Zhirinovskiy.

But he conceded he would forever be known at home as the "disgraced former president."

"It was a price that was inevitable," he said. "I accepted the fact that it had to be paid."

His philosophy was never to look back. "I came to accept Watergate and the resignation simply as one major defeat in a career that involved both victories and losses, both peaks and valleys," he said.

Nixon made his first run for president against John F. Kennedy in 1960 and lost. He was elected by a squeaker in 1968, and by a landslide in 1972.

For more than five years after his resignation, the Nixons lived in virtual exile in San Clemente, Calif. They moved east in 1980 to be near their grandchildren, Jennie, Melanie and Alex Eisenhower and Christopher Cox.

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Hillary didn't impress president's mom

WASHINGTON — Virginia Kelley was used to her son, Bill Clinton, bringing home pretty girlfriends from college. This time, however, the young woman on her Hot Springs, Ark., doorstep gave her a start.

"I didn't know what to think" of Hillary Rodham, Kelley would later recall. "No makeup, Coke-bottle glasses, brown hair with no apparent style."

The future president told his mother he wanted someone he could talk to, not a beauty queen. But tension remained between the two women. They seemed so different.

Kelley loved makeup and hairdos, fur coats and bright colors. The future first lady liked politics and the law and hippie clothes, avoiding beauty aids on principle.

Kelley's then-husband, Jeff Dwire, saw past all that: He recognized that they were "so much alike it was funny," Kelley wrote in her autobiography.

Both were "strong women." Kelley's strength reverberates throughout her newly published book, "Leading With My Heart," written with James Morgan. They worked on it as she was dying of breast cancer.

The book was almost done when Kelley died on Jan. 6, at age 70. The president helped review the final chapters.

Kelley's memoirs — beginning with a description of her 45-minute daily makeup regimen — make it clear she always put the best face on a lifetime of troubles. That may be why she was sometimes misunderstood.

"To most of the country I'm known — besides for being Bill and Roger's mother — for my weird hair, my heavy makeup, my loud colors and my penchant for playing the horses," she wrote. "I'm a character, a cutup, a kook."

"That's me all right, but it's not all of me." She grew up poor in Hope,

Ark., with a jealous, domineering mother who whipped Kelley and screamed at her quiet father late into the night.

Kelley was widowed by three husbands: Bill Blythe died in a car wreck when she was 22 years old and six months pregnant with the future president; Roger Clinton, the alcoholic father of her second son, died of cancer; and Dwire, the soft spoken hairdresser, died from complications of diabetes.

Kelley tore herself away from baby Bill to get nurse-anesthetist training in New Orleans. For years, she battled local doctors over her anesthesiology practice in Hot Springs.

She watched her elder son rise to governor (and learned to love his wife, Hillary Rodham Clinton), then saw her younger

son Roger, a rock musician, imprisoned for dealing cocaine.

In June 1991, Bill Clinton was about to launch his presidential campaign. Young Roger Clinton was getting his life together. Kelley was happily married to her fourth husband, Dick Kelley.

That's when her doctor sat her down and told her she was going to die of cancer.

"He didn't actually say the word 'die,' as I recall, but even if he'd said it, I just couldn't have allowed myself to hear it," Kelley wrote later.

"I looked the doctor straight in the eye. 'If they ask,' I said, 'you tell my boys I'm fine.'"

She kept the extent of her illness hidden, enduring chemotherapy and radiation treatments while throwing herself into her son's presidential campaign.

License plates tell the story

Often, to keep children occupied during a long motoring trip, parents challenge the youngsters to see how many out of state license tags can be found. During tourist time, it's a fun project.

Counting how many different Florida license plates however, may be even a better game. With several dozen different plates already, the Florida legislature recently approved even more specialty tags, some with fish, others with a red apple.

There is a good point here. People often will purchase these special license plates because they have a pet project to support, or think a plate looks good on their vehicle.

While doing this, they are donating extra money to support campaigns or schools identified by these plates. It's an excellent source of income, and often reaches people who might not otherwise make a donation.

Several years ago, there was another license plate design suggested. After the initial proposal was made before the legislature, not another word was spoken.

The plates would have identified persons convicted of driving under the influence of alcohol, rapists, or other criminal types.

Why those concepts went awry have never been revealed. Possibly identifying someone as a convicted DUI motorist or a rapist would be considered too embarrassing for them. Someone intervened and the suggestion has never again been brought up.

You must admit, seeing someone pass you on the highway with a DUI tag on the vehicle would certainly give you reason to drive with more caution. Having a rapist tag on a vehicle seen parked in your neighborhood may suggest extra care needs to be taken.

During this past year, there was a move urging the media to give more names of persons convicted of such crimes as solicitation of prostitution, causing an accident with injuries or deaths, and other reasons.

The *Sanford Herald* joined in the move. Whether it had a direct reduction in the number of persons involved in these illegal activities remains to be determined.

We are not suggesting persons convicted of DUI must have a special license tag, if indeed they are still allowed to drive. This would be unfair to others in the family who may drive that vehicle.

It would go a long way however, in helping determine how safe people are on our streets and highways.

These comments may not offer a direct solution to the increasing crime problem. They are, however, matters of concern and food for thought.

More of these problems need to be addressed. Ignoring them won't make them go away. History is proving that time and time again.

Prisoner rights—an oxymoron

Kenneth Earl Gay, a death row inmate at San Quentin, felt that prison officials were unjustly preventing him from becoming a father. So he sued for the right to conjugal visits or to procreate through artificial insemination.

Jacqueline Farrell, a transsexual inmate (who has had breast implants but retains a male organ), claimed "her" constitutional rights were violated by the Los Angeles County jail system because "she" was moved from a woman's jail to a men's lock-up.

Ralph Kenneth Howard, an inmate at Northern California's Pelican Bay, filed a civil rights suit, claiming that prison officials implanted an electronic device in his head, allowing them to read his mind and broadcast his thoughts over the prison loudspeaker.

These are but three examples of the kind of frivolous prisoner rights lawsuits that make their way onto federal court dockets every year. "These things are absurdities," says California Attorney General Dan Lungren, but they cost the taxpayers money.

The rash of inmate litigation is a nationwide problem. From New York to Florida to Texas to California, prisoners are bringing civil suits like they're going out of style. Last year, for instance, 33,000 inmate lawsuits were filed in federal

courts. That's one of every six federal civil cases.

Of course, not all inmate lawsuits are without merit. In a host of states, prisoners enjoy improved medical care and better treatment by prison guards as a result of such filings.

But the meritorious prisoner rights cases are far outnumbered by the frivolous. Indeed, 97 percent are dismissed before coming to trial. Of the cases that wind up before a judge or jury, only one in eight is decided in favor of the prisoner. That represents the worst success rate of any category of civil litigation that comes before the federal courts.

Prisoners don't care about the odds of courtroom success. They've got everything to

gain by filing even the most ridiculous suits and nothing to lose. This explains why inmate lawsuits have multiplied by more than 1,000 percent over the past three decades.

In some states, like California, prisoners are all but invited to litigate. They are guaranteed access to law libraries. They are provided fill-in-the-blank forms for lawsuits. They are given free postage to mail off their federal suits. And they almost always have the usual \$120 federal filing fee waived.

Besides the ease of bringing a civil case, the other factor contributing to the explosion of inmate lawsuits is that, like so many other groups in American society, prisoners have come to view themselves as a protected minority. They somehow think that the Constitution affords them all sorts of rights. And they are only too eager to sue if they feel their rights are violated.

But the only authentic right that specifically pertains to inmates is the Eighth Amendment ban on "cruel and unusual punishment." Other so-called prisoner rights simply have been invented over the past 30-some years by civil liberties lawyers.

Crime in America numbs compassion

We journalists have had a ringside seat for a fascinating social phenomenon, chronicling the many Americans yelling "more power to 'em" while Singapore prepares to brutally beat an American teenager.

Readers bombard newspapers with letters saying they have no sympathy for Michael Fay, an 18-year-old living with his parents in Singapore who went on a 10-day vandalism spree — stealing "No Smoking" signs and ruining the paint jobs on 18 cars. They say the same thing in TV man-on-the-street interviews.

Columnists of such disparate social views as Mike Royko and Cal Thomas echo their readers' sentiments that maybe a few licks from a martial arts expert with a cane wouldn't be the worst thing.

But Katie Couric is aghast, and other journalists wonder at our lack of compassion for a boy about to be tortured. Neither of those scenarios paints the true picture of how Americans feel about Michael Fay. Could most of us stand by and watch an 18-year-old boy be beaten mercilessly on his buttocks, bloodied and scared, leaving him sleepless for days because of the pain? Of course, we couldn't. Yet we aren't rising up at the injustice of it either, nor pleading with the government of Singapore for mercy.

Some Op-Ed pieces speculate we're so frustrated and fed up that we've lost all sense of compassion. Vandals like Michael Fay have run roughshod over our lives and property for so long, and with so little consequence, that we've become angry and hopeless. We see the Michael Fays in our communities given impotent little swats — at home in Dayton, Ohio, he'd have been handed an automatically suspended sentence and fined \$750 dollars — and then coming back to do something worse.

Rarely do victims of crime in the United States receive any kind of compensation from those who trespass against them, and recidivism rates give us little faith in the deterrent value of American punishment. We pick up our newspapers and read that the government has spent millions of our tax dollars crowding our courts; and defending against civil suits filed by prisoners.

Such suits by prisoners include: a charge of "cruel and unusual punishment" because a guard refused to let an inmate cut an ice cream bar, or refrigerate it for later; one from an inmate who wanted the prison to serve him lamb, veal and oysters for his ulcer; and another from an inmate who wanted chunky peanut butter instead of smooth.

Americans aren't lacking in compassion, they're just numb. They've got The Club on the steering wheel, a big dog in the yard and motion sensors on the doors. Not just in the cities. Rural people have had their mailboxes knocked down or stolen so many times that they can hardly keep a tin can up on a pole to get their federally protected mail. Those who haven't been robbed while they were away from home often have neighbors who were.

One of the most poignant editorials I've read about Fay was by San Jose Mercury News columnist Angelo Figueroa, who was caught stealing Twinkies as a child. His father took him back to the store, slapped him in front of the store owner, and took the boy home and whipped him soundly. The effect was a triumph of behavioral psychology: Figueroa didn't steal again, and he is convinced that his father did the right thing.

What's happened with America isn't that we all suddenly lack compassion. We are desperate for some punishment that will really deter.

Getting that seat in the limo

WASHINGTON — The story, as it was told to me, goes something like this:

David N. Dinkins, then the mayor of New York was riding through the city in his limousine with his wife, Joyce. Looking out the window, they recognized a man doing manual labor on the roadside as "John," a former suitor of Mrs. Dinkins'. Seeing him, the mayor smiled a bit smugly at his wife.

"You must be so glad," she said, to be married to the powerful mayor in the limo rather than to poor John shoveling alongside the road.

His wife smiled. "If I'd married John," she said. "He'd be with me in the mayor's limo."
True or not, it's a funny and insightful story — even if some may see it based on the unfashionable notion that behind every great man there exists a bright, supportive and comparatively invisible woman.

Today, most women want to be recognized, powerful and accomplished in their own right. They realize that in a growing number of U.S. cities, including the nation's capital, the "little woman" seated by the mayor in the limo is a man.

But many wonder if the brave new world of pseudo-equality they're inhabiting truly serves them. It provides them with their own paychecks, higher self-esteem and lives outside the home. But millions of women — despite more help from men with chores — are worn out from balancing their duties as the primary household manager and child rearer with the care and feeding of a job.

Week after week, they find themselves gasping for air. Yearning for an hour in which to just sit still.

And they wonder about the children.

I remember how years ago, a friend's eyes glowed like candles the first time he described his stay-at-home mom, who had time and energy to creatively delight her kids — inventing clever games, lining up chairs into an imaginary locomotive to whisk them away. I thought of how much of my spark was sapped by my work, by cooking, cleaning, homework. And how I never gave my kids a locomotive.

Right now, I know two women desperately trying to stay home longer with their infants before resuming the paycheck shuffle. I know another whose eyes get that candle-lit look only when she describes her housekeeper. Under this woman's magical hands, she says, glasses gleam, sinks sparkle, the house becomes a glittering haven until the kids wreck it. The housekeeper is "the most important person in my life," she jokes. If more pre-women's-lib husbands had so appreciated their wives' talents for keeping house and raising kids, would quite as many women have sought fulfillment outside?

I know that my kids want to talk to me more, share more, without me glancing at clocks, sending them away so I can write. Yet I can't imagine just stopping.

Every woman I know yearns for the obvious solution: an old-fashioned wife, some drudgery-handler who'd give her more time to just breathe with her man and kids, alone with themselves. Of course, that "wife" would probably be some other woman guilty about neglecting her kids.

When everybody is on the front line, there's no little women — or man — left to stand behind, propping us up, plotting our happiness. In that absence, the "little" starts to look awfully big.

Recently on TV, I saw the 1962 film "My Geisha," with Shirley MacLaine as a brash, redheaded actress married to a director famed only for making the comedies in which she stars. But he's about to fulfill his dream: directing an arthouse version of "Madame Butterfly" — independent of his wife, with an unknown Asian actress in the lead.

Of course MacLaine, who craves her own career stretch, dons geisha makeup, brown contacts and a black wig. Faking obsequiousness, she wins the lead in hubby's "Butterfly" without his realizing the masquerade. Her plan is to amaze the world by revealing her identity at the premiere. Near the film's completion, her husband discovers her lie and is devastated.

In the meantime, there's a lot of on-screen talk about a wife letting her man "be a man." A pal slips MacLaine a fan inscribed with something like: "Everything for you, my husband." Seeing the light, the star informs the ecstatic premiere audience that the brilliant Japanese actress they've just seen has retired to a convent. She and her now-delighted husband bow together, hands clasped.

Her selflessness would sit better if her husband then behaved selflessly — finding a terrific drama in which she could star taking time to help her stretch as an artist. In early '60s cinema, that was unnecessary.

I don't know many women eager to rush back to that mentality. Most want to go forward, into barely charted territory.

Roseanne Arnold files for divorce, claims abuse

LOS ANGELES — They flashed their tattooed rear ends in public, posed for gross-out photos and squabbled with TV networks. It wasn't pretty while it lasted, and now the union of Roseanne and Tom Arnold is coming to an ugly end.

Mrs. Arnold filed for divorce Monday and got a restraining order against her husband and business partner, accusing him of slapping her around.

The 41-year-old star of one of TV's most popular shows filed her husband as executive producer of "Roseanne," cut up his credit cards and dashed off to Europe for a three-month trip without him, a source close to

the couple said.

She also fired Kim Silva, the couple's assistant who had joined them in a mock, three-way marriage, said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Mrs. Arnold said in court papers that couple, who married Jan. 20, 1990, officially separated Friday.

"I now realize that I have been a classic battered and abused wife," Mrs. Arnold said in court papers. "Throughout our marriage the respondent hit me, struck me, has thrown objects at me, pinched me and verbally abused me. He also has pushed me against walls, while he screams and shouts at me, drowning out any possible plea

that I might take for him to stop."

PMK, the public relations firm representing the Arnolds, said there was no comment from Mrs. Arnold or her 35-year-old husband, a comic who is filming his own CBS series, the low-rated "Tom."

The caustic, corpulent couple began with a stormy courtship that overlapped with Mrs. Arnold's breakup from her first husband. The actress postponed their 1990 wedding until her husband-to-be sought help for substance abuse.

In her book "My Lives," she says she was sexually abused as a child, leading her to abuse drugs and alcohol.

improvements and both Longwood-area lawmakers said the construction of 14,000 prison beds during the next three years will reduce overcrowding. As a result, criminals will soon serve 75 percent of their sentences, instead of the current 45 percent average incarceration.

Starks, still dressed in his Delta pilot's uniform, told the group Seminole County did score a big appropriations win in school funding, receiving the largest increase in money ever for the county and the fourth largest increase in the state this year.

"So that's real good news," Starks added.

Ken Bovio, governmental relations director for Seminole County schools, said this morning the county will receive a 4.4 percent increase in funding, about \$13.6 million, if the local school property tax is increased 25 cents per \$1,000 of taxable property. Without the local tax increase, the county will receive

\$10.9 million, a 3.06 percent increase.

With the new money, Seminole County's per-student appropriations will move from sixty-second to fifty-third out of the 67 counties.

But Bovio said the state also imposed several new requirements on school spending totaling \$2.6 million. After the mandates, Bovio said the county will see a 2.14 percent increase in money for schools.

The state provided \$2.8 million for an eastern campus of Seminole Community College in the Oviedo area. \$1 million to continue the northern entrance project and about \$700,000 to renovate engineering and computing classrooms.

Starks said the Legislature approved \$4.6 million to widen State Road 434 from County Road 419 to Tuskuawilla Road; \$5 million to buy the land needed to widen Interstate 4 from State Road 434 to Lake Mary Boulevard; \$2 million to add guard rails along I-4 from Lee Road to

State Road 434 and \$1.4 million to resurface State Road 426 from Dean Road to SR 434.

Constantine said \$375,000 was appropriated for the Friends of Lake Jesup to continue the lake floundering restoration effort.

Constantine also took the meeting's opportunity to announce his own legislative accomplishments.

The freshman said he was successful in passing a statewide APRICOT Act, named after the reclaimed wastewater program in Altamonte Springs, where he served as a commissioner from 1978 to 1992. The program will offer incentives to encourage cities and utility companies to offer reclaimed wastewater for irrigation. Altamonte Springs will be eligible for \$1 million in savings from the new laws, he said.

Constantine said he was also successful in having his Florida Condominium Right of Way Act passed which could save land-condemning authorities large sums of money. Currently, if the county needs to condemn property owned by a condominium association for a public project, a survey of every unit — which can be hundreds in south Florida or the southwest coast — must be completed.

Constantine cited a recent county example where Seminole County paid \$1,500 for a strip of land for a road project but paid \$15,000 for the survey work. The Condo Act will require every affected apartment owner be notified of a condemnation action, but allow the condo association to represent them if they desire. Costly individual surveys won't be needed unless an individual chooses it, Constantine said.

Also, Constantine said his amendment to the base closure Defense Transition and Commission Act was successful this year. The addition requires the state to provide retraining for handicapped former base workers.

Endeavour 'A-plus' earth-monitoring

SPACE CENTER, Houston — Space shuttle Endeavour headed for home today with about 150 tape reels of digital data representing some of the finest, most detailed images ever made of Earth.

The shuttle and its crew of six were set to land just before noon EDT at Cape Canaveral, Fla. Acceptable weather was forecast, with a slight chance of low clouds and showers.

Endeavour was launched from Cape Canaveral on April 9 with \$366 million worth of U.S., German and Italian radar instruments for monitoring the environment.

The radar system is the most advanced ever sent into space by NASA. It can scan areas of Earth simultaneously in three microwave frequencies, yielding 3-D images in the detail.

After difficulties blamed on a bad circuit, the system worked perfectly.

NASA says the radar captured all of more than 400 planned views of Earth. They included studies of the Andes Mountains, California's Death Valley, Michigan's Hiawatha National Forest and the Sahara Desert.

To verify the radar's accuracy, about 2,000 scientists, teachers and students around the world surveyed some of the sites on the ground.

All of information will be used to study the condition of forests, the geology of mountains, rivers and deserts and the movement of ocean currents. The mission could also result in new topographical maps of some remote and rugged areas.

About 150 data-collecting tapes, representing more than 60 hours of radar images, were collected in all. Some of the views were beamed to scientists in Houston, who said the quality surpassed expectations.

The astronauts worked in two teams around the clock, putting in fresh tapes, moving the shuttle to help point the radar and photographing the sites being surveyed by radar so researchers can compare results.

"The Endeavour has been a perfect platform for doing science," mission operations director Randy Stone said Monday. "You can't give it any grade other than A-plus."

The radar work will be duplicated on Endeavour's next flight, scheduled for August.

sentence.

The state Supreme Court said it held in a previous Stewart appeal "that a more adequately defined instruction would have made no difference because the acts perpetrated by Stewart on his victim were especially heinous, atrocious and cruel under any definition."

Even if a trial attorney's performance is deficient, the justices said, it isn't grounds to set aside a sentence if it isn't judged likely to have affected the outcome.

Stewart was convicted of Hatzlip's slaying in February 1979.

Witnesses testified that the Sunday school teacher and day care worker invited him into her home for a sandwich, but became angry and confronted him when she saw him take a gold watch.

Hatzlip was beaten, bitten, raped, and strangled with an electric cord.

After he was arrested, Stewart gave police two written confessions and one taped confession. A dental expert said his teeth marks matched bites in the bologna sandwich.

At the trial, Stewart testified that he beat and raped Hatzlip but said he left her alive.

Services Department. Five other agencies are seeking a total of \$366,100, Deju said. Last year, commissioners pledged \$1 million during the following five-year to the expansion of Orlando Science Center.

Also, Sanford Main Street is seeking \$20,000 next year and United Arts wants \$15,000, said Deju.

Van Der Weide said if commissioners find the money to increase the current level of grants, they can "It's easier to raise the money later than lower it," he said.

"Traditionally, it's much harder to raise it than lower it," responded Furlong.

Commissioners have already agreed to do away with the day-long presentations by each group. They stepped back from

an earlier desire to establish funding limits by category, such as childhood services or food commodities. Deputy County Manager Kevin Grace noted the commission has issued grants at consistent levels for each category in past years.

For the past three years, grants to child support groups ranged from 22.9 percent of the total to 22.3 percent, according to a county report. Elderly support ranged from 21.3 percent to 18.3 percent. Food distribution increased from 1.6 percent in 1991 to 3.3 percent this year. Housing support program grants increased from 1.1 percent two years ago to 6.3 percent this year.

arrested 698 people in 1993. Statewide, 65 of 67 counties reported marijuana growing sites.

The seizures have taught officers that they face a greater potential for violence.

Last year, Highlands County sheriff's deputies shot and killed a marijuana grower with a high-powered rifle — the first death associated with the eradication program.

During a training mission in Brevard last year, an FDLE agent suffered minor injuries when he fell into a "punji pit" equipped with sharp stakes.

Authorities said the potency of Florida-grown pot has increased significantly since 1980. The level of THC, marijuana's active ingredient, averaged 1.8 percent 13 years ago, but today averages

3.2 percent.

"With this dramatic increase in the narcotic content of today's marijuana, it is easy to see that we are dealing with a new drug," the report said.

Outdoor growing was favored in rural, sparsely populated areas of the Panhandle, while indoor operations were distributed evenly, the report said.

Holmes County on the Alabama border led all counties with 20,347 plants, followed by Santa Rosa County with 9,015, Levy County with 7,607, Okaloosa County with 7,262 and Lake County with 5,883.

Authorities said they plan to repeat a multi-state eradication effort that netted more than 18,000 plants last year. Florida, Georgia and Alabama conducted the four-day Operation Deep Strike along their borders.

Homes, cars, credit cards: Interest rates rise

WASHINGTON — Americans planning to buy a new home or car, borrow to fix up their current home or reach for the credit card to charge a new spring wardrobe can expect to be shelling out more in interest charges.

Thanks to the Federal Reserve, economists say, the cost of borrowing money is on the way up and — if history is a guide — it may be many months and perhaps years before consumers can again enjoy the kind of rock-bottom rates that were available until just recently.

"The bottom line: It's bad news for all kinds of borrowers," said Robert Heady, publisher of the Bank Rate Monitor in Palm Beach, Fla.

The Federal Reserve boosted short-term rates Monday for the third time this year — from 3.5 percent to 3.75 percent — reversing a five-year trend of lower rates aimed at stimulating the economy.

The shock waves were immediate. Long-term interest rates surged to the highest levels of the

Clinton presidency. Big banks raised the prime lending rate by a half percentage point to 6.75 percent, the second increase in less than a month and the highest level in nearly 2½ years.

Stocks tumbled again as well, which could mean less money to spend for many investors.

The Fed is tightening credit out of fear inflation may be around the corner, even if it's not in sight. The pre-emptive strikes by the central bank are intended to restrain borrowing for businesses and consumers. But for millions of people buying on credit, that could mean paying banks and other lenders a lot more.

The biggest impact will be for home buyers. Mortgage rates already have soared and are likely to climb higher. Someone taking out a \$100,000 mortgage will pay an extra \$988 a year for each additional percentage point.

The rate for a conventional 30-year mortgage hit a 25-year low in October of 6.74 percent and as of last week was about 1½ percentage points higher.

"I had housing starts growing in the double digits this year," said David Lereah, chief

economist for the Mortgage Bankers Association. "And now I have brought it back to 8 percent."

The rate increases are bringing mortgage refinancing on existing homes to a screeching halt. No longer can home owners shave hundreds of dollars off monthly expenses by taking out a lower-cost mortgage.

The picture is not altogether gloomy.

Car loan rates have edged up only fractionally since the Fed began its series of rate increases in February — rising a mere tenth of a percentage point to a typical 8 percent as of last week.

Part of the reason is that bank vaults are swollen with depositors' funds, and banks are in a hot competition to lend.

Many banks continue to offer low "teaser" rates on home equity loans and adjustable rate mortgages. For several months, the rates are enticingly low but they will rise dramatically after that.

As a result, loan demand has been picking up despite the Federal Reserve moves, said economist Paul Getman of Regional Financial Associates in West Chester, Pa.

Also, he said, other factors help spur loan demand, particularly the improved employment and income picture.

"If you think you're going to be out of a job in six months, it doesn't matter what the interest rate is," Getman said.

For savers, there will be small gains, but nothing like the higher cost to borrowers. The rates banks offer on certificates of deposits have inched up since February, but for most people hardly enough to offset the added dollars for consumer loans.

The Bank Rate Monitor said a one-year certificate was paying 3.29 percent last week to savers, up from 3.08 percent two days before the Federal Reserve's first interest rate boost. A five-year certificate has risen from 4.65 percent to 4.85 percent.

But yields on bank money market funds had dropped a fraction from 2.33 percent to 2.32 percent last week. These funds are considered temporary parking spots for investors' money, and banks are not in big competition to raise rates to attract more depositors.

Witchcraft debate

Library aide cites First Amendment

KALISPELL, Mont. — The two seventh-graders wanted to do a report on witchcraft, and they asked library aide Debbie Denzer for her help. She steered them to the encyclopedias, and lent them two books of her own.

That was her mistake, say her bosses. No, she says — that was her job.

Denzer was fired in January for providing the girls with material that Frank de Kort, superintendent of the rural district in north-west Montana, described as "grossly inappropriate."

One book contained graphic descriptions, drawings and photographs about witchcraft and Satanic rituals involving sex acts, mutilations and sacrificial killings. The other discussed sexual matters, and included nude drawings.

Denzer contends there is no written policy on such loans and, without one, she would be professionally obligated to do the same thing again.

She is appealing her firing to the county school superintendent, who is expected to rule in mid-May; nonetheless, she does not expect to get her job back, or find a job anywhere nearby.

She has accumulated some powerful allies: "We basically believe that if a child can understand the material given to them, they're ready for it," said Judith Krug, head of the American Library Association's Office for

Intellectual Freedom.

Other supporters include the American Civil Liberties Union, the National Council of Teachers of English, the National Coalition Against Censorship, and PEN American Center, a writers' organization.

"Instead of burning Debbie Denzer at the stake, the school authorities fired her for 'unsatisfactory performance' and 'misconduct,'" wrote a supporter, author Allee Hoffman, in an Op-Ed piece in The New York Times.

But there are critics, as well. Almost everyone but Denzer — even her solitary defender at school, librarian Joan Gates — agrees the books were "inappropriate" for 12- and 13-year-old girls. A letter supporting Denzer's dismissal was signed by 20 out of 21 teachers at the school.

"This is a troubling case in a lot of ways, obviously," said Mike Dahlem, attorney for the Montana School Boards Association. "If this right of the employees is upheld, what limitation can be placed on importation of graphic materials? There doesn't seem to be any limitation."

"This is not a case of an honest mistake made by a well-intentioned employee," Dahlem argued at Denzer's appeal hearing. "It is a case of open defiance to the adopted policies of the board of trustees."

But Denzer's lawyer, Dan Johns, responded that the board fired her for violating a policy that does not exist.

She "crossed a line in the sand that caused her to be fired," he said.

Toxic chemical waste up slightly, but less released in atmosphere

WASHINGTON — The amount of toxic chemicals generated by industry increased slightly in 1992, but fewer of the pollutants were released into the environment.

The Environmental Protection Agency reports today that industry generated 37.3 billion pounds of toxic chemicals in 1992, an increase of 0.5 percent from the year before.

But chemicals released into the environment were down 6.6 percent, to 3.2 billion pounds.

The figures show that "while industry may be improving its management of toxic chemical waste, clearly there are still many opportunities for preventing pollution by reducing the use of toxic chemicals," Environmental Protection Agency head Carol M. Browner said in a statement accompanying the agency's annual Toxic Release Inventory.

The report was based on 81,016 reports submitted by 23,630 facilities during the year.

Releases of toxic chemicals in 1992 included 197 million pounds of known or suspected cancer-causing chemicals, the report said, along with 166

million pounds of chemicals that damage the earth's protective ozone layer.

Critics complain that some major industries are exempt from the reporting requirements. EPA officials say they are not sure how many factories ignore the requirements, but they believe the situation has improved since a 1987 survey showed 66 percent compliance.

The survey is incomplete because such industries as utilities, airports and recyclers are not included, charged the environmental organization Working Group on Community Right to Know.

But the Chemical Manufacturers Association hailed the decline in toxic releases.

"I think that's a tribute to the real and substantial progress that companies are making to prevent pollution," said Joe R. Mayhew, an association vice president.

Browner said the inventory added 34 chemicals to its reporting this list and plans to begin including more than 300 more. In addition, the agency wants to add non-manufacturing businesses to the list of those reporting chemical production and release.

Of the 3.2 billion pounds of

chemicals released into the environment in 1992, 58 percent went into the air, the report said. Underground injection accounted for 22.8 percent, followed by releases to land, 10.8 percent, and surface water discharge, 8.6 percent.

Air release of toxics was down 9.4 percent from 1991, largely because of declines in the release of solvents, ammonia and chlorine, the report said.

But surface water discharges were up due to increased runoff of phosphoric acid from four fertilizer manufacturing facilities in Louisiana and Texas. Excluding those cases, surface water release of toxics was down.

Underground injection was up somewhat, although it has declined considerably in the last five years.

In addition to releasing chemicals or sending them for off-site disposal, some toxic chemicals were burned for energy recovery, recycled on-site or treated and disposed of.

The toxic chemicals most commonly released were ammonia, hydrochloric acid, methanol, phosphoric acid and toluene.

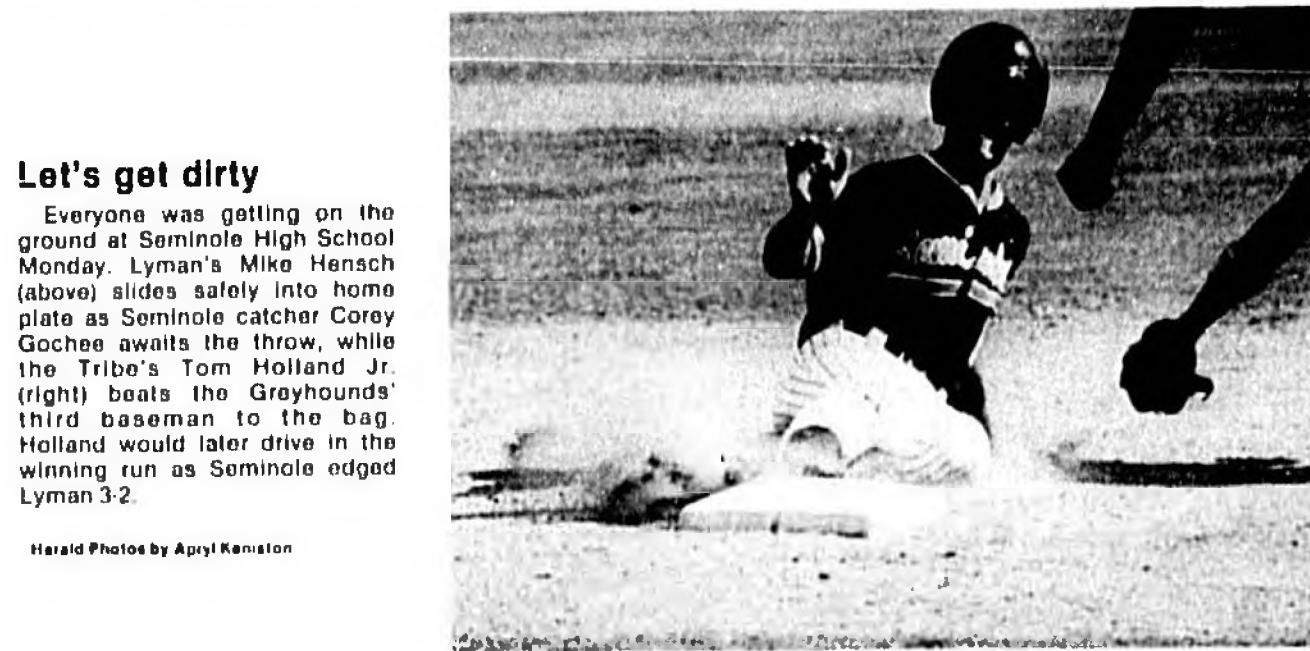

Tim Rain(e)s on Boston's Patriots Day celebration

BOSTON — Wilson Alvarez had just flirted with a no-hitter and won his 11th consecutive decision. Still, he wasted little time in pointing people to the star of the game.

"Tim Raines is the big man today. He's the man today, not me," Alvarez said after Raines' three homers led the Chicago White Sox to a 12-1 win Monday over the Boston Red Sox.

Raines, from Sanford, hit solo homers leading off the first and third innings and a two-run drive in the eighth. He scored five runs and drove in four. He also walked, singled and reached on an error.

It was the first three-homer game of Raines' career and the first home runs he had hit at Fenway Park. All

three were hit to right field, helped by a 12 mph wind.

"I don't consider myself a home run hitter. But on a day like today, you just try to get one up in the air in the direction the wind is blowing," Raines said. "Out of the three I hit, I thought maybe one would have cleared the fence."

The previous three-homer game for the White Sox was by Harold Baines against Minnesota on Sept. 17, 1984.

"He's strong and has kind of a compact swing. I think he's gone to maybe more of a pull hitter since I saw him in the National League," said White Sox manager Gene Lamont, who coached at Pittsburgh in the late 1980s while Raines was with the Montreal Expos.

Frank Thomas also homered off Chicago and Joey Cora added a

three-run triple.

The White Sox hit eight homers in the three-game series at Fenway Park and have 14 in six games against the Red Sox this season. Thomas, who has six home runs this year, homered in all three games of the series. Thomas has homered in four straight overall, and has scored a run in all 12 of Chicago's games.

The power display by the White Sox overshadowed Alvarez's performance. Andre Dawson's single high off the left-field wall in the sixth was the first hit. Alvarez lost his shutout the following inning when John Valentin doubled and Rich Rowland singled.

Raines has 10 of his 11 hits this season against Boston, including all five of his homers. He hit a pair of home runs against the Red Sox on

April 8 at Chicago.

Raines, who raised his average from .200 to .275, said he was more excited about getting four hits than the three homers.

"I hadn't really been swinging the bat well," said Raines, who began the season hitless in 13 at-bats. "I think he (Darwin) just left a couple of balls over the plate."

But just in case Raines was starting to get cocky about his power, Thomas kept him in line. As Raines trotted to the dugout following his third homer, Thomas vowed he'd hit a home run.

"I told him I've got to hit a homer the last time up or else he would talk all day," said Thomas, who backed up his promise two batters later.

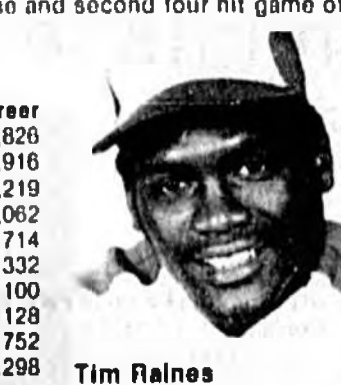

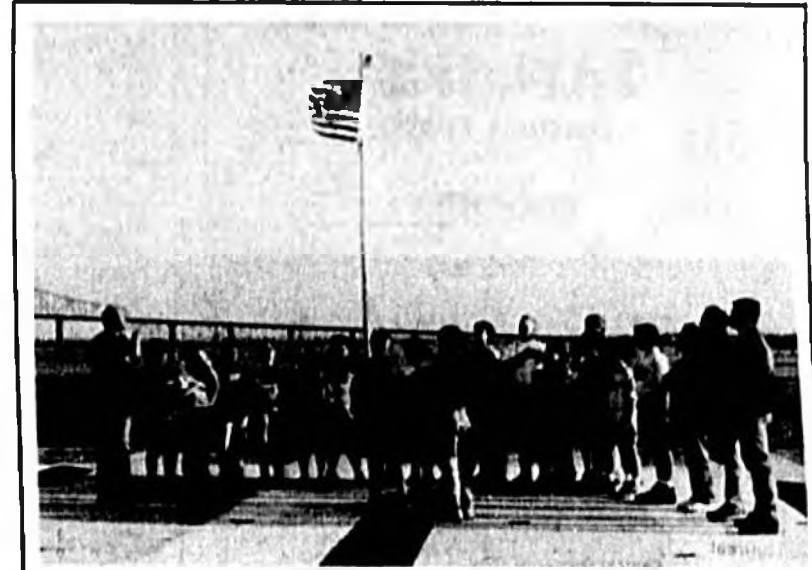

'Four Weddings' first at the box office

LOS ANGELES — A low-budget British comedy starring model and actress Andie MacDowell is proving that old-fashioned humor and romance can still thrill an audience as much as car chases and shootouts.

"Four Weddings and a Funeral" was the nation's No. 1 film over the weekend, burying some standard Hollywood concoctions in its wake.

Starring Hugh Grant and MacDowell, "Four Weddings" stunned even its makers by grossing \$4.2 million in its sixth week of limited release. It was sixth a week ago.

"This is definitely becoming a big date movie," Russell Schwartz, president of "Four Weddings" distributor Gramercy Pictures, said Monday.

Eric Fellner, co-executive producer, said "Four Weddings" was playing exceptionally well thanks to its creative handling of love and relationships.

"It's very human. There are no other films with these themes or settings in the Top 10," Fellner said from London. "When you hit contemporary themes, there's a large potential audience."

Made on a dime store budget of just \$6 million, "Four Weddings" will move to an additional 200 theater locations this weekend, up from about 700.

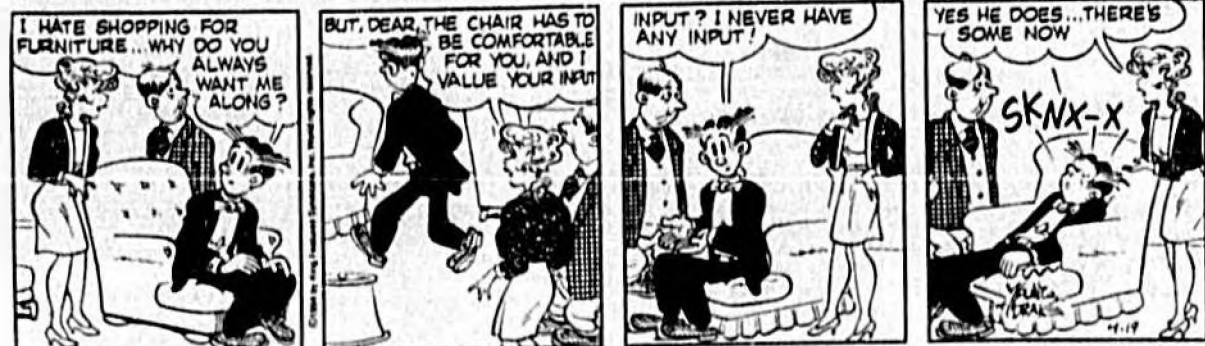

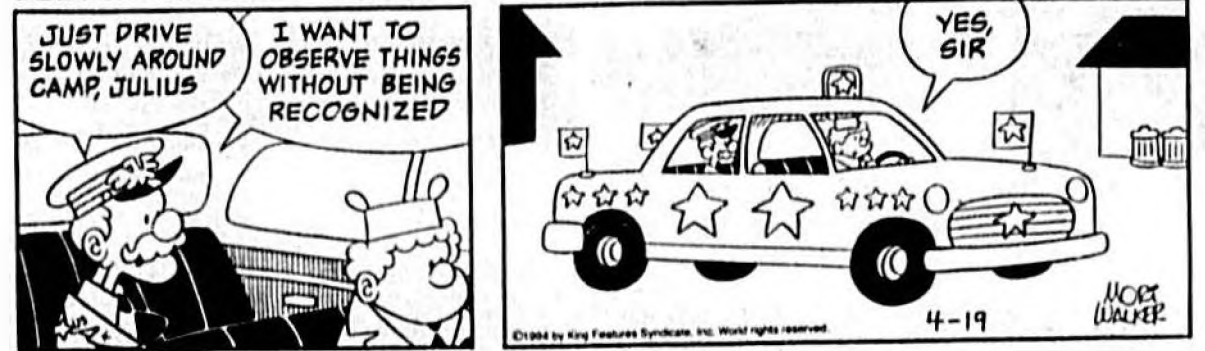

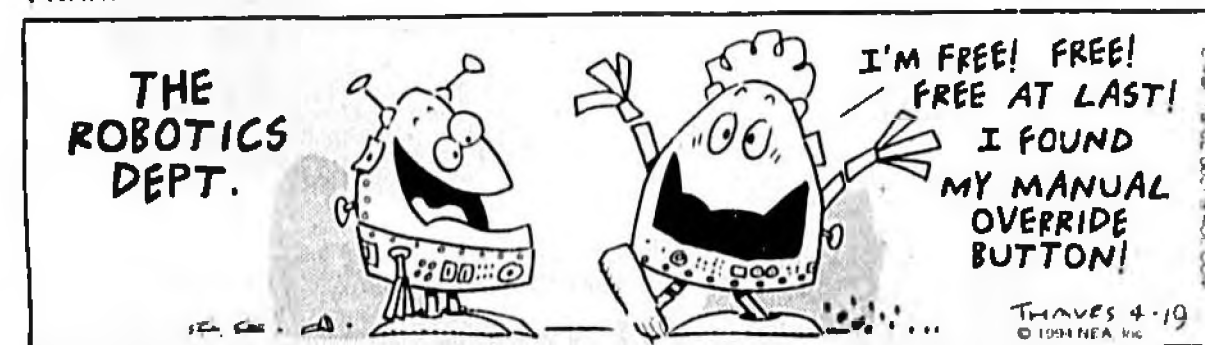

Damaged disc may pinch spinal nerves

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed with a severely damaged cervical disc by a highly competent surgeon, which will require interbody fusion surgery to correct. An article I read recently says this is a controversial type of surgery and that many patients can expect reduced mobility after recovery. The article's writer recommended waiting until a synthetic disc has been developed for use to eliminate the need for fusion. Do you agree?

DEAR READER: No, I don't. A herniated cervical disc can pinch and damage vital spinal nerves that supply the arms and upper body. In my experience, when performed by a qualified neuro-orthopedic surgeon, the operation to repair the disc is usually very successful and permits patients to return to normal lives. Decreased mobility is not a common consequence of this surgery. If your surgeon recommends an operation now, I think that it would be advisable to heed his opinion, rather than waiting for an experimental device that may take years to perfect. In my view, the presently available surgery is far less controversial than the use of an artificial device. Go for it. Or, if you prefer, seek a second opinion from another neurosurgeon.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What does it mean when an ANA shows a speckled pattern?

DEAR READER: Some autoimmune diseases, such as lupus, are associated with protein antibodies against normal cells. Such a reaction is measured by the anti-nuclear antibody test, which shows a "speckled" (in contrast to a "smooth") pattern when antibodies are present.

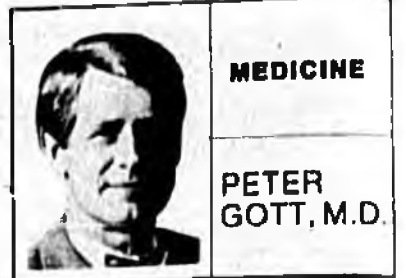
Without further information about your symptoms and other tests, I conclude that your positive ANA test shows the possibility of lupus. However, the ANA test may also show speckling in

the presence of certain medications (such as quinidine), a so-called "false-positive" result. Therefore, you should ask your physician to interpret the result of your ANA test.

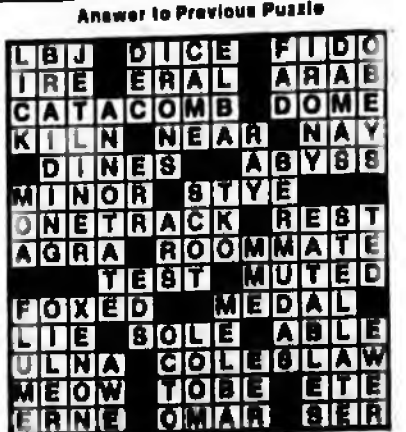

WIN AT BRIDGE

"Nothing has yet been said that's not been said before." What's a bid that? Today's critical suit combination has appeared in print before, but only rarely. Most players would get it wrong. Without peeking at the East-West hands, decide how you would play the club suit for at most one loser in no-trump.

Traditionally, to make a weak sign-off in clubs, you start with two clubs, Stayman, and rebid three clubs. An immediate jump to three clubs is game-forcing. It is better to reverse these interpretations. Stayman gives extra information. This will help only the defenders when the responder has a weak hand. But it may assist the bidding side when the responder is strong.

You can afford one club loser but not two. All plays work if the missing clubs are divided 3-2. So

you must maximize your chances against a 4-1 break. It looks normal to play the king and another club, winning when East has the singleton nine, jack or queen. Yet there is a better play. You should win the diamond lead with dummy's ace and immediately call for the club 10. If East plays the two or three, you play low. If East plays the nine or an honor, you win with the king and return a club, planning to cover West's card.

This line works whenever East has the singleton nine, jack or queen, and also when West has the singleton nine.
