Bacon Stacks Offer Tasty Luncheon Dish

Looking for something unusual as a luncheon entrée? Stacks of Canadian-style bacon, orange and onion slices served with an orange sauce make a delectable luncheon dish.

One pound of Canadian-style bacon is cut into 12 slices, approximately one-fourth of an inch in thickness, explains Roba Stagers, meat authority. Two slices are put together with the orange and onion in sandwich fashion for baking and serving.

Canadian-Style Bacon With Orange Sauce
12 slices Canadian-style bacon, cut 1/4-inch thick (1 pound)
4 thin onion slices
6 orange slices, rind removed
2 teaspoons sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 cup orange juice
1 orange, cut in sections
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
Grease a shallow 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Place 6 slices of Canadian-style bacon in it. Top each slice with an onion slice, an orange slice and another slice of Canadian-style bacon. Bake in a slow oven (275 degrees F.) for 30 minutes. Mix together sugar and cornstarch. Add orange juice and cook, stirring constantly, until thick and clear. Stir in orange sections and orange rind. Serve over Canadian-style bacon. 6 servings.

A half-dozen groups and several private organizations have formed a "coalition" to fight against the dirty air threat to health, hygiene and comfort. The Prefecture of the Seine, which corresponds to City Hall in the United States, supervises chimney and vehicles for illegal black smoke in the winter cities.

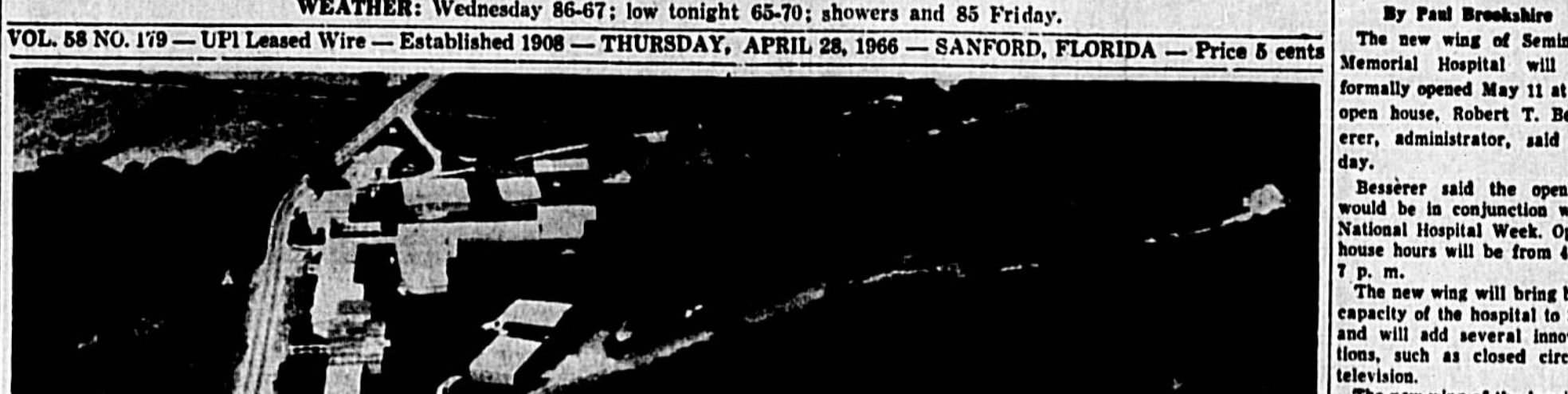

The new wing of Seminole Memorial Hospital will be formally opened May 11 at an open house, Robert T. Bessner, administrator, said today.
Bessner said the opening would be in conjunction with National Hospital Week. Open house hours will be from 8 to 7 p.m.
The new wing will bring bed capacity of the hospital to 200 and will add several innovations, such as closed circuit television which will be used as a training device for doctors and nurses and also for viewing of mothers and new babies.
Bessner said the hospital's new wing will be more spacious and attractive than the old hospital building, which will be demolished.
The new wing of the hospital will be a six-story wing across the rear of the hospital. The cost of the new wing is \$1,000,000 and will be completed in the next few months.
The new wing will be used for general medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, and pediatrics. It will also have a 200-bed ward, a 20-bed intensive care unit, and a 20-bed operating suite.
Other sections of the hospital will be remodeled, including the lobby, which will be more spacious and attractive.
Future plans call for construction of a six-story wing across the rear of the hospital, which will be used for general medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, and pediatrics. It will also have a 200-bed ward, a 20-bed intensive care unit, and a 20-bed operating suite.

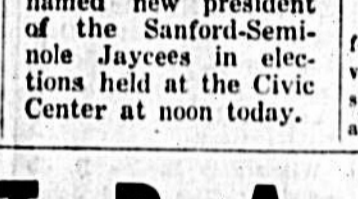
