'Help Unfortunate Help Themselves'

Perhaps there is a little too much concern for projects such as the "White Way" lighting around the lakefront and too little concern for the vast waste in human resources in the City of Sanford, Rev. Amos Jones, executive director of Seminole Community Action, told the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees at their luncheon meeting today.

"It appears to me there ought to be more enthusiasm and support shown for the job training program that has been proposed to be placed into operation on part of the Sanford Airport property for the unskilled, the unemployed and the underemployed citizens of Sanford and Seminole County," Jones declared.

Talking about the dilapidated housing "that is being dealt with in some ways by the City Commission's Advisory Committee" Jones insisted, "This could be done much more effectively with much more self pride and dignity if people were earning a decent living so that they could provide housing for themselves.

"A much more meaningful program with much more longevity can be put into operation if the people, themselves, were given the resources to do the job," he said.

Bureau Requests 'Tied To Balloon' Record Budget Getting Axe

Up, up and away are the budget requests being gone over in daily sessions by the Seminole County Board of Commissioners.

Commissioners opened their session Tuesday afternoon. Department heads are appearing before the Board all this week in the morning and afternoon, budgets in hand, explaining requests and attempting to justify them.

The requests are at an all-time high of \$3 million over the nearly \$1 million over the current fiscal year.

Largest budget comes from the county road department at \$671,239.16 with the second highest request from Sheriff John Polk at \$119,091.11.

J. C. Lavender, road superintendent in his presentation to the Commission, noted his department paves or resurfaces some 29,22 miles of road in Seminole annually in addition to maintaining untold miles of road.

Sheriff Polk with an eye toward the growth expected with the advent of Disney World wants to keep his department in preparation and

wants his men paid a living wage. "We must bring up our standards to match those of surrounding counties," he declared yesterday. "Due to the increased cost of living, and the passing of minimum requirements for law enforcement officers, the pay must be increased."

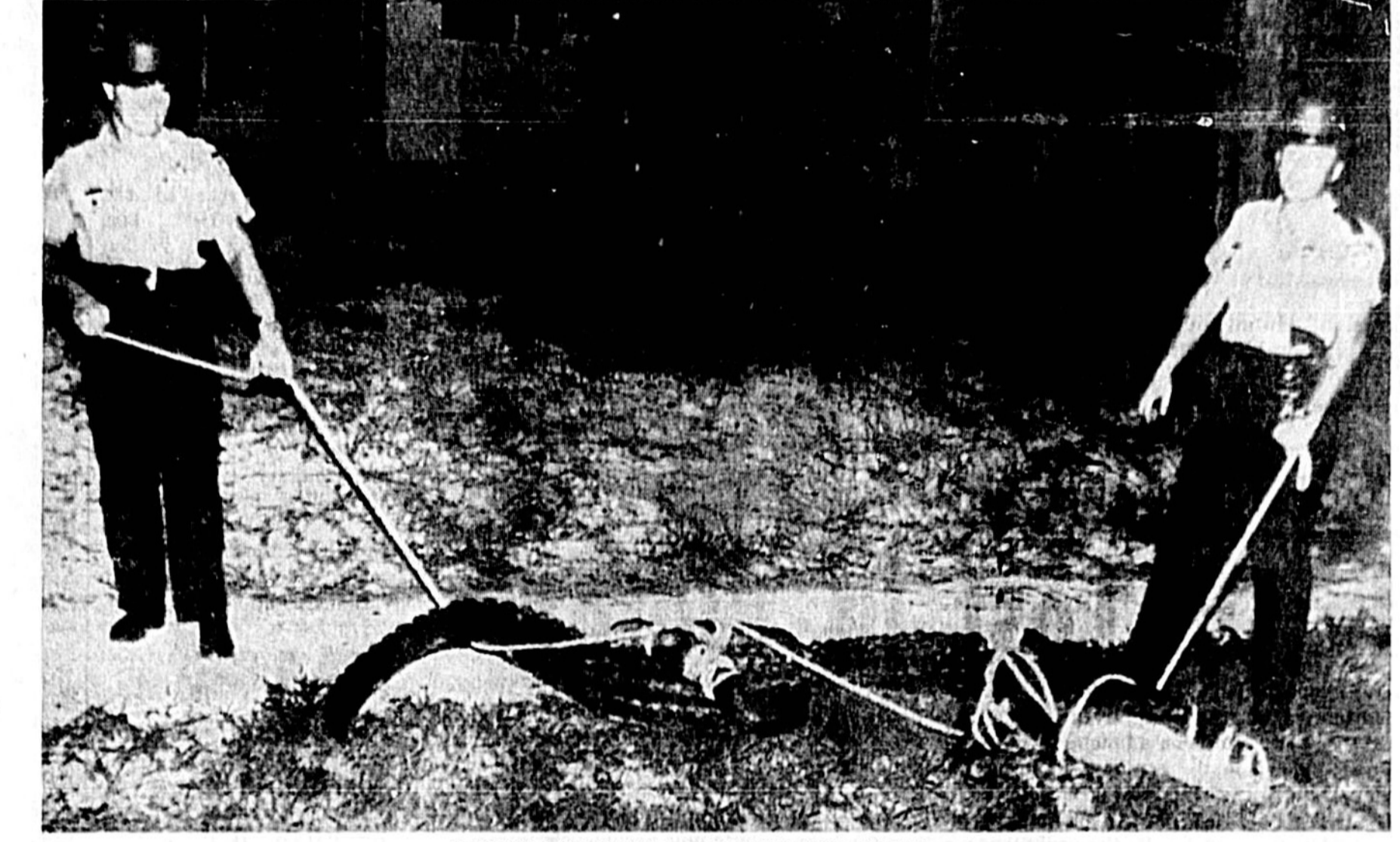
"The day has gone when anyone could be hired and a badge put on them. Now they must be high school graduates, have training and they must be paid accordingly," Polk said.

Mr. Camilla Brown, county supervisor of elections, wants to send out two notices next year in the voting registration roll purge to make sure all who should be registered are notified.

County Engineer William Bush doesn't want the wages of his employees to continue at a "laughable" rate.

Commissioners are to begin paring sessions next week.

Will Spend \$50,000 On Barracks City Eyes Move To Airport

The City of Sanford will move its municipal operations and jail complex to Building 310 at the Sanford Airport as soon as the structure there can be renovated to house the several departments now being squeezed in the 44-year-old present facility on the lake front.

All five city commissioners indicated approval of the proposal yesterday during a luncheon talk session at the House of Steak, but official action will have to wait until next week.

City Manager Knowles estimated \$50,000 cost just to move the city hall.

Mayor Lee P. Moore said he was "excited" about using the structure for a temporary city hall, but mentioned that some inconvenience would be experienced because of the insufficient roads leading to the property from the rest of Sanford.

Salary request alone accounted for \$134,293 of the requested budget to bring employees of the unit in line with the state merit system minimums. State has recommended the director, county sanitarian, and chief of nurses be raised in classification from rank I to rank II.

This would raise Leone's salary from the current \$17,898 to \$19,819 while Robbins' salary would advance from \$4,193 to \$9,346 and the nurse director from \$7,160 to \$9,143.

County Commission Chairman John Alexander decried the fact the state recommends far more in salary increases annually than it increases its allocations. State allocation in the new budget is up some \$3,000 while salaries are recommended increased some \$25,000.

Full in 1965 for an estimated \$45,000 cost just to renovate the building would be required, particularly on the third floor jail area, to accommodate the city-police complex.

Editorial Comment

Fleshing Out Governmental Organization

Reorganization of the Florida state government has now suffered the rigors of legislative debate, sloggled through the morass of official research and is fleshed out with the key persons who will head this monumental task walking around.

As chief of the newly created Department of General Services was made at the insistence of the Democratic members of the Cabinet.

This was met by a stinging rebuke from Governor Kirk who took this as an evidence of "cronyism" among the Democrats and went out of his way (and beyond the bounds of fair play) in downgrading the 49-year-old Navy veteran.

Our good friend and the champion for roads in our city and county, Willard Peebles, former SRB member, has given an appraisal of what this change means to highway construction in such small counties as Seminole which would be most harmful if true.

He told an Orlando Jaycee meeting that this concentration of power over transportation — especially roads — in the hands of one man was too much power and authority.

For Sanford-Seminole it has been hard enough to make effective contacts when roads are concerned. In fact it has been so difficult that the sharp edge of our county commissioner's attack on this grave handicap has been dulled to the point of little return.

It is, nevertheless, one touchstone which voters in our community can use as they go about the task of seeing just what this major re-organization of our state governmental machinery means in terms of performance.

We have not commented on what the path of most portability will be, but it will mean more, not fewer people on the state payroll.

The payroll, need we say again, are the dollars which come out of the taxpayers' pockets. Expansion of the last penny's worth out of the shrinking dollar is, obviously, what is needed. The question is: "Will we get it?"

Our information is that the combined efforts of the Sanford Lions Club and the Sanford-Seminole Jayces will put the major events in air-conditioned Civic Center.

This is, of course, not to say that the outdoors will be neglected. That we always have. That we have enjoyed. That is one of the priceless natural assets of Sanford with the playing fields near the lakeshore.

And it is outdoors where the fireworks will be on display in the late evening and will make their spectacular show as they arch over Lake Monroe and the reflection adds to the splendor.

But it is indoors where such attractions as the final judging of the baby photo contest will be held. And, in continuing this valuable annual service the Lions Club will conduct free eye examinations.

Our news columns have told of the specific events and we trust that our readers have used this information in planning their holiday fun.

Nor do we want to emphasize the Sanford Seminole County where the holiday events will be spreading in every region.

Altamonte Springs, one spot where growth is so obvious that the name is often in our reports, will be the stage on which the Sanford Seminole Jayces will hold their annual celebration.

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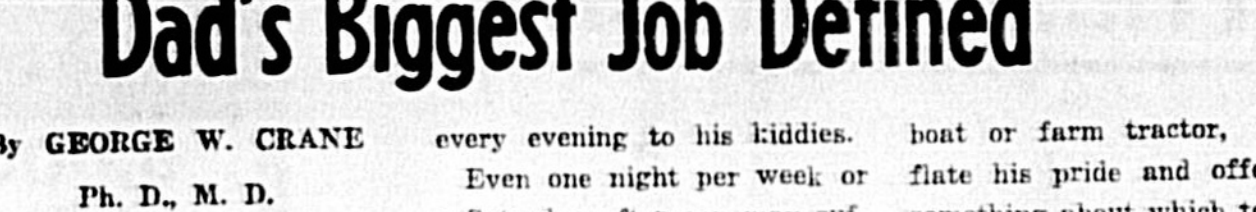

NEW YORK — It all depends, of course, on how you look at it, whether it is going uphill or downhill for sports to share an award with a library, a cafeteria, a convent, a girls' dormitory and, yes, a rehabilitation center for former narcotics addicts.

The San Diego Stadium, home of the Chargers and Padres, was one of 16 buildings to win design awards in the American Institute of Architects' 1969 Honor Awards program announced recently.

The building design awards have been given out since 1949. But this is the first time that a major sports facility has received the honor — and that includes the Astrodome in Houston, Texas, which was named one of the "wonder works of the world," a Houston "other wonder of the world," note New York baseball fans.

To set the record straight, however, two other sports facilities have received awards. The Sea Ranch Swim and Tennis Club of Sea Ranch, Calif., and the Washington and Lee High School gymnasium. Both received the award last year.

When the San Diego architects, Frank L. Hope and Associates, submitted their design, along with some 465 other entrants, they said the stadium "has become the identifiable architectural statement of San Diego."

This is equivalent to the Space Needle in Seattle, the Eiffel Tower in Paris and the Constitutional Elms in Corydon, Ind.

The five-member jury looked over the design, gave several prizes and announced. "This mammoth project has a plan of diagrammatic simplicity and a structural system that is monumental.

All this for a joint in which the center of attraction in summertime is guys wallowing around in dirt, and the center of attraction in wintertime is guys wallowing around in mud.

"The stadium that sets San Diego apart from others of its stripe is that the innovative 'supererle' shape supposedly allows the best seating arrangement for viewing circle," incidentally, a hybrid between a circle and a square.

The stadium, completed in August, 1967, has five tiers, and at field level 5,000 seats are placed in three large sections on wheels and can be scooped around after a football game to accommodate a baseball game.

Another major structural departure for the San Diego Stadium is that the building and the "vertical transportation" — the ramps and escalators — are separated. The vertical transportation curves around the building and is connected by small, concrete bridges. This is to avoid congestion between people coming into the park and those huddled in front of the psychologically colored concession stands and lavatories.

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These guys aren't too familiar with road courses," he said, "but I expect they'll surprise the fans. Just because there aren't any famous names doesn't mean these guys aren't getting it done. They want to win."

"Winning races is the name of the game," Hamilton said, "but when you win five on the GT circuit you've got a right to feel good. I've never seen so much competition. You've got to have a good car and a lot of luck. And I've been lucky."

Hamilton, who'll drive a Jim White Camaro prepared by Gene Ruggles in the \$24,850 250-mile race, is the only driver among the prizemen of the new GT division. He'll be racing against intermediate sized cars, Camaros, Mustangs, Cougars, etc., was opened last year.

"I've never seen anything that would beat it," said Jim Pischal, a stock car veteran who recently moved into GT competition. "You wouldn't believe some of the races we've been having. These guys want to win."

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Pete Hamilton Hopes That Streak Continues

Heat May Slow Firecracker 400

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — With his sights on a third straight victory in the Model of Honor Firecracker 400 race Friday, favored Cale Yarborough is in for a hot ride in his 1969 Mercury. The pole-sitter, who set a world closed course record of 190.700 miles an hour in qualifying, will forego the comfort of a suit cooled by circulating ice water and thus save the added weight of the equipment.

"I don't mind the heat," Yarborough said in his first post-race interview. "The heat will be a factor, but it won't be the factor that will slow me down. I'll be in a hot car, but I'll be in a hot car because I'll be in a hot car."

At the faster speed of the aerodynamically improved body and newly approved 429 cubic inch engine, Yarborough decided they couldn't add 50 pounds of cooling equipment and keep their edge over the factory Fords and Dodges.

Buddy Baker joined Gostkowski, Bobby Isaac, Phil Goldsmith, Bobby Allison and Dave Marcis as Dodge benefactors when he led Wednesday's qualifier with a speed of 184.101 m.p.h. It earned him 11th place. Jim Leonard, the only Firecracker 400 winner in the field this year, was second Wednesday at 181.820 in a Ford called by Willy Smokey Yantis, Dr. Don Terry, who called himself "the world's fastest doctor." As a warmup to the 10 a.m. holiday feature, a field of 11 cars will run the Paul Revere 250 starting at midnight tonight. Jim Paschal of High Point, N.C., will start on the pole. He earned it with a second 105.682 m.p.h. speed around a 1.81-mile road course in a Javelin.

Red' Kelly Is Penguin Mentor

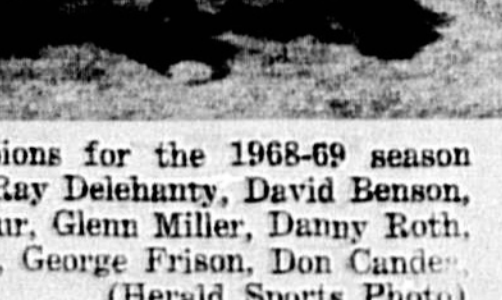
PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Pittsburgh Penguins begin training Sept. 14 for what most observers say will be another long National Hockey League season.

Horton Gives Batting Advice

Every kid has the ambition to hit the long ball but it's a big mistake to swing too hard when you're young.

The thing to do is just get the feeling of putting your bat on the ball. The base hits will follow as you get older, and so will the home runs.

Keep your eye on the ball. This is the biggest thing about hitting. You've got to follow the ball from the moment the pitcher lets go of it.

When I was a kid my dad taught me to follow the ball even when the other team was throwing it around the infield.

I learned to follow it into each player's glove and I learned to follow it when he threw the ball to the next player.

Don't turn your head when you swing at a pitched ball. You've got to keep your head and eyes right in there so you can see the ball all the way until your bat comes in contact with it.

You must use your hands more than your arms in swinging. If you use your arms too much you'll get a sweeping swing. There's no snap in that kind of swing.

Timing the right bat is important. Get one that feels comfortable when you swing it. You must have control of the bat. You swing it; don't let it swing you.

As for stance, there is no set way to stand at the plate.

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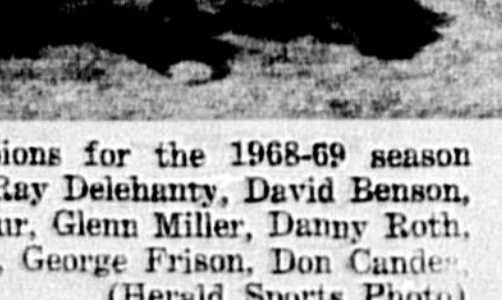

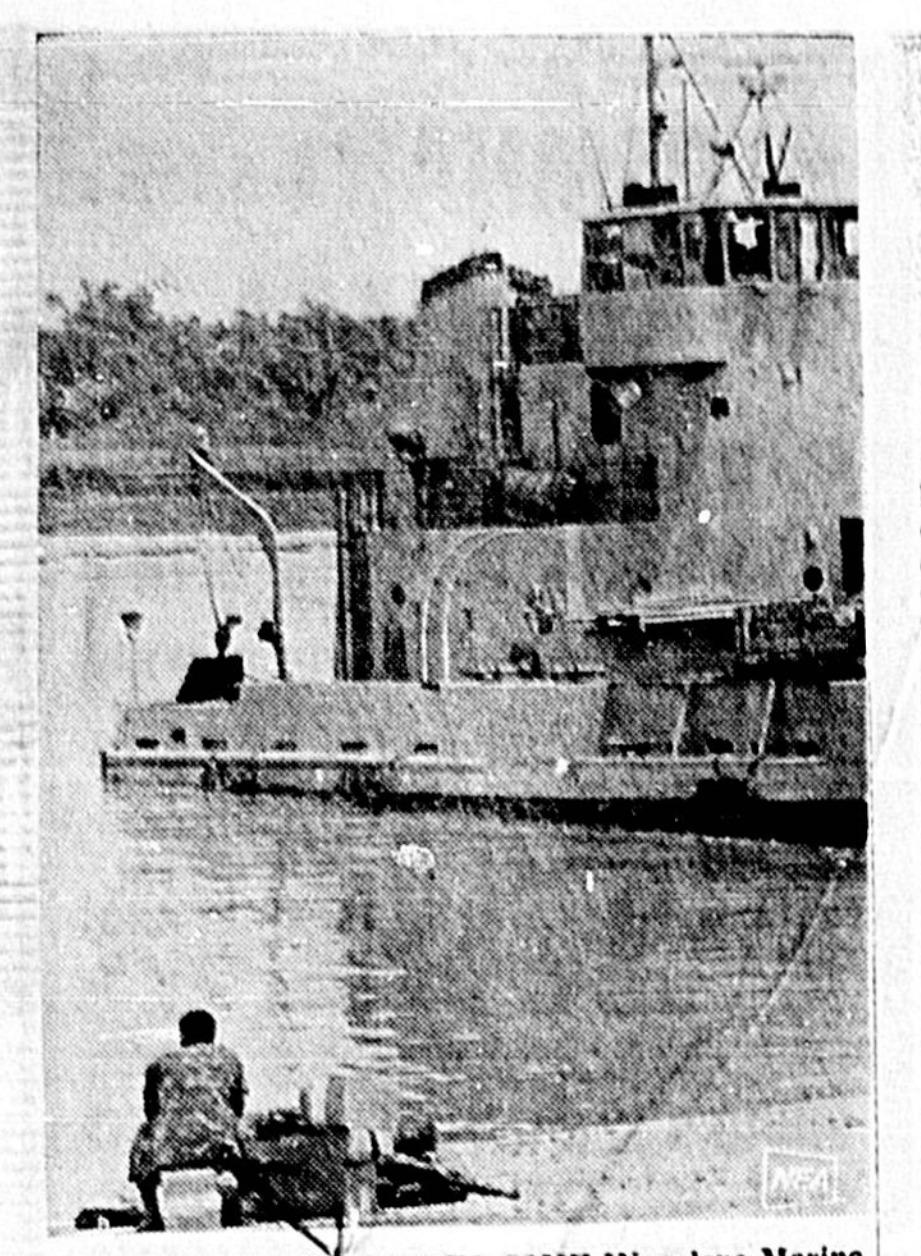

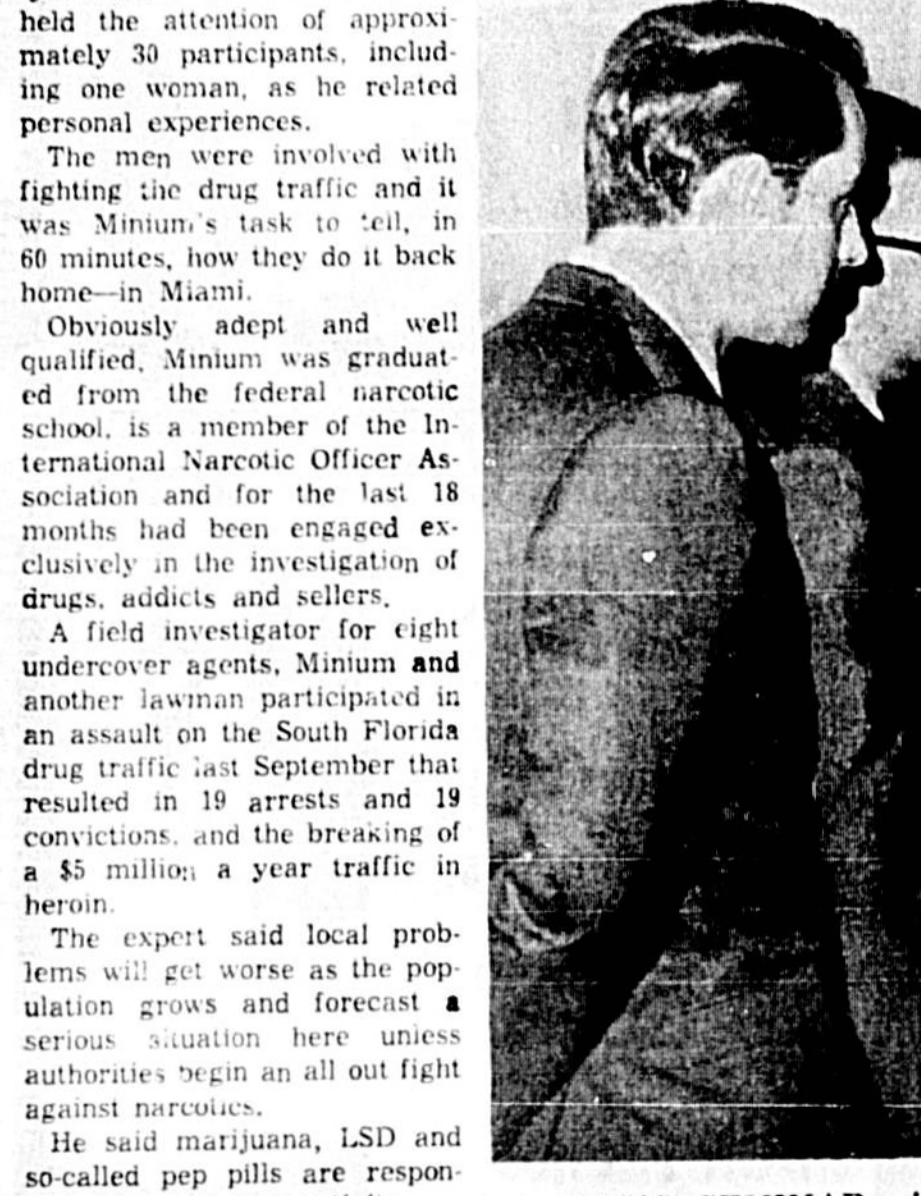
