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Three thousand pulp and paper mill employees remained on strike at International Falls, Minn., and Fort Frances, Ont. They have demanded higher wages and a 26-hour week.

Coughlin Agency's Revealed As Holder Of Supply Of Silver

DETROIT, May 2.—The Radio League of the Little Flower, sponsor of the weekly addresses of the Rev. Father Charles E. Coughlin, an advocate of the monetization of silver, was revealed recently as the holder of twenty contracts for 500,000 ounces of silver. The holdings had been listed in the Treasury report as those of "A. Collins, Royal Oak, Mich."

Miss Amy Collins, secretary-treasurer of the league, in a copyrighted statement recently, said she had invested \$20,000 of the league's money in the silver contracts on "the President's word" that he would "raise the prices of American goods to the 1926 levels." She said she had acted entirely of her own volition and in her capacity as an officer of the league. The investment was in silver futures.

"While I raise my voice against gambling and speculation, the Radio League shall continue to be its own financial agent and invest this surplus league money safely in American commodities and securities," she said.

In another copyrighted statement, Father Coughlin attacked Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, and denounced the silver investigation.

CUBAN YOUTH DEMANDS END OF MASSACRES

Leader Protests Killing Of Havana High School Student By Government Troops

HAVANA, May 4.—(AP)—Cuban youth cried out today against the slaying of one high school student and the wounding of five others by government soldiers.

Their leaders called it "massacre" and asserted "This is worse than under Machado."

Eduardo Chibas, Jr., student leader, called upon "students of the world to protest this massacre. I fought Machado six years but I never saw anything like this. It was massacre without cause."

Soldiers fired upon a group of rioting students yesterday with rifles and machine guns after the students refused to disband. A meeting in front of the high school.

School men and parents joined students in their protests to President Mencheta.

The fighting which continued most of the afternoon, turned into a veritable war zone. Wild excitement was caused through the city.

The outbreak came at a time when an unusually large number of tourists was in the city, many of them at the Plaza hotel; but two blocks away from the scene of the bloody disorder.

Regular tourist ranks were swelled by a convention of steamship tourist agents who arrived Wednesday from New York aboard the Morro Castle.

One hundred university students, apparently unarmed, rushed to reinforce the high school students, cracking their rifles from the latter. Onlookers fled when gas clouds became heavier, their eyes smarting.

The disorder occurred in front of a high school in the center of Havana where students gathered and defied efforts of guards to disperse them. Finally the youths were forced back into the building by tear gas.

Subsequently, outside the officer remained outside, the students engaged in firing benches out into the street to form barricades. They refused to let traffic pass the building and the soldiers opened fire directly at them.

France Tells Japan She Wants China's Door Left Open

PARIS, May 4.—(AP)—In a memorandum supporting Washington's insistence that treaties be observed, France informed Japan yesterday that she wants China's door left open.

"In the opinion of the French government," the note said, "the only equitable and satisfactory solution of Chinese affairs lies in the principles of the Washington document; notably by application of the friendly procedure described in Article 17 of the treaty of Feb. 24, 1922."

Roosevelt Tells U. S. Trade Body To Quit Crying 'Wolf'; Strawn Scores Experiments

Chief Executive Asks Delegates To 1934 Meet To Co-Operate For U. S. Recovery

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told the Chamber of Commerce of the United States last night that it was time "to stop crying 'wolf' and to co-operate in working for recovery."

In a message to the chamber, read at the annual banquet by Henry I. Harriman, president, Roosevelt said: "Your membership largely represents those interests which from motives of self-interest as well as good citizenship have a leading role to play. The people as a whole will be impatient of those who complain and of those who hold out false fears. It is time to stop crying 'wolf' and to co-operate in working for recovery and for the continued elimination of evil conditions of the past."

"I confidently count on the loyalty and the continued support of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States."

The President's message was read after an open forum during the day during which the Administration's recovery program brought scathing protests against "bureaucratic regimentation," experiments and "hysterical legislation."

"Since your last session," the President said, "widespread and significant improvements in our economic life have taken place. In the meantime American business men have co-operated patriotically."

"I hope that increasingly intelligent co-operation between the federal government and the commercial interests of the country will stimulate the progress of our recovery."

"Congress has been and is doing its part, and within the next few weeks there is every probability that the legislative program for this session will be definitely completed. The federal government will continue its unceasing efforts to stimulate employment, increase American values and bring about a more wholesome condition. Private business can and must help take up the slack."

Albert Fall In Tears During First Speech

ALAMAGORDO, N. M., May 4.—(AP)—Albert H. Fall, former secretary of the interior in the Harding cabinet, gave way to tears here recently in his first public speech since his release from the Santa Fe prison.

Fall, who served a sentence in connection with the Teapot Dome scandal, spoke at the opening of the White Sands national monument. Tears streamed down his care-worn face as he faced many of his old friends in the audience. He delivered the latter part of his speech while seated.

Later in the program he heard himself described by former Governor George Curry as the man who "had done more for New Mexico than any other man."

Frank Ferguson Has Clarke Robertson Arrested On Charges Of Profanity

ORLANDO, May 4.—Frank Ferguson, the stormy-petrel of the court house corridors, wrote another chapter into his history of "Ferguson's Utopia for Orlando." Thursday morning when he caused the arrest of Clarke Robertson, former chief of police, whom he accused with conduct unbecoming a gentleman and the use of vile, indecent language.

WOODIN DIES OF INFECTION IN HIS THROAT

Secretary Of Treasury In New Deal Cabinet Had Been Suffering For Several Months

NEW YORK, May 4.—(AP)—William H. Woodin, whose warm friendship for Franklin D. Roosevelt led him to take the helm of the U. S. Treasury in one of the Nation's gravest crises, died last night in a hospital from the ravages of a throat infection. He would have been 66 years old late this month.

For seven months, through the strain of the national bank holiday and the unprecedented monetary experiments of the "New Deal," Mr. Woodin held to his post until last November when he first obtained a leave of absence and finally, on Jan. 1, resigned as Secretary of the Treasury.

The President, whom he called "Governor" and by whom he was in turn addressed as "Will," several times took occasion to acknowledge the value of the counsel and administrative ability of Mr. Woodin.

Mr. Woodin's throat infection troubled him during the summer 1933. He came to New York and for a time virtually ran the Treasury by telephone. He finally returned to the Capital, but by fall his condition was such that doctors felt a change of climate was imperative.

On Nov. 16, the President made public an exchange of letters in which the secretary obtained a leave of absence and the President assented while expressing the hope Mr. Woodin might eventually return to office. But Mr. Woodin never saw Washington again. He went to Arizona and finally on Jan. 1, Mr. Roosevelt announced his resignation and the appointment of Henry Morgenthau, Jr.

SHOLTZ WARNS CITRUS MEN TO GET TOGETHER

Governor Wants State Industry To Set Its House In Order Before 1935 Session

ORLANDO, May 4.—(AP)—Governor Sholtz said yesterday it was "absolutely necessary for the best interests of the citrus industry" that a unanimous program be presented to the 1935 Legislature for enactment into law. Unless such a program is forthcoming, he declared, he would himself take the lead in recommending legislation.

"To bring order out of what threatens to be a chaotic situation," the Governor recommended closer co-operation between federal and state operation agencies, full co-operation in the national citrus plan under the agricultural Adjustment Act and a standardization law to eliminate poor fruit and indiscriminate boxing of fruit.

His remarks were made in an address before the Florida Horticulture society in convention here.

Fred Weaver Is Dead After Short Illness

Fred S. Weaver, 81, died at his home in Ginderville late night after a brief illness.

Crippled Cuban Takes Vow To Kill Himself

JACKSONVILLE, May 4.—(AP)—The United States likely will send 22-year-old Jose Paraza to Havana, and if he is forced to return to his native land of bitter memories, on his oath he will kill himself.

Paraza, his body broken and mutilated arrived here this week, a stowaway aboard the fruit ship Ranger and told a story of torture rivalling the Spanish Inquisition. The soldiers of Gerardo Machado, the president of Cuba, captured the youth last summer and subjected him to heart-breaking atrocities trying to make him tell the whereabouts of his father, a leader in the ABC secret society, which was largely instrumental in Machado's overthrow.

Everett Sanders To Quit Committee Job

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—The Republican National Committee yesterday made public a letter by Everett Sanders saying he had decided to remain as chairman.

Other controversies intervened in a smaller chamber, however. On top was more debate on easing the corporate bankruptcy procedure.

Roosevelt Praises William J. Bryan

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt praised William Jennings Bryan as a man of sincerity in dedicating yesterday a monument to the Democratic leader on the banks of the Potomac.

"He chose his path not to win acclaim but rather because that path appeared clear to him from his inmost belief," said the President. "He did not have to dare to do what to him seemed right; he could not do otherwise."

Methodists Decide Not To Pick New Bishops

JACKSON, Miss., May 4.—(AP)—The quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, today defeated proposals to limit the terms of bishops, decided not to elect any new bishops at this conference, and amended discipline to permit the retirement of bishops for "unacceptability and inefficiency."

CHICAGO, May 4.—Henri Gordon, make-up advisor for Joan Crawford, Jean Harlow and other movie stars, said Wednesday that repeal of prohibition has sent women flocking to beauty parlors "hysterically" seeking removal of "whiskey faces."

RE-OPENING OF ECKERSON PLANT MAY COME SOON

Owner Predicts Early Ironing Out Of Argument With City

C. H. Eckerson, president of the Eckerson Fruit Canneries, Inc., announced today that "It is very possible that our cannery will again swing into production shortly pending an adjustment in certain minor difficulties between the cannery and state and city officials."

If production is again resumed, he stated, "It would be entirely on the packing of tomatoes, which have been the chief product canned during recent weeks."

He added that grapefruit juice also would be canned if some of the remaining fruit can be secured.

Celery Only Slightly Affected By Ruling Which Covers All East Of Mississippi

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—A reduction in freight rates on vegetables from Florida to all parts of the country and on most vegetables from other portions of the southeast was ordered today by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

"Proposed increased rates were cancelled."

The Commission fixed some rates on the basis of cents per 100 pounds, but in the most instances it dealt only in percentages of first class rates.

Rates from all points on the Sanford and Everglades railroad were ordered to be fixed at the same figure as the rates from Sanford.

The rates from Florida are slightly higher than other points from the southeast, but they are a reduction from the old rates.

A rate of 80 percent of first class was ordered for green beans, lima beans and peas in 20,000 pound lots; green peas, corn cobs, and lima beans in 10,000 pound lots; potatoes in 10,000 pound lots; and sweet potatoes in 10,000 pound lots.

The Florida rates named above apply to all points except the continental territory for which following rates are fixed: string beans, lima beans, and peas \$2.00 per hundred pounds; beets, carrots and turnips with tops, tomatoes, peppers, egg plants, green corn cobs, cucumbers, lettuce, sweet peas and romaine, \$2.04; celery, \$1.98; cabbage, \$1.47; potatoes, \$1.35.
