Competency Pay Plan Killed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Reacting to strong teachers opposition to a so-called competency pay plan, the legislature Monday sent to the governor a measure repealing the \$100 awards to exceptional public school instructors.

Repeal of the controversial award was approved by a 702 to 15 vote. Rep. Robert Mann of Hillsborough said two years ago, when the merit pay plan was placed on the lawbooks, "I told you this plan would not be popular and would disrupt teacher morale." He opposed Crews' amendment, noting that if it was passed, the lawmakers would be back in two years to repeal it.

The teachers and their state organization, the Florida Education Assn., have opposed the plan ever since it was placed on the law books. They opposed a requirement that the teachers be evaluated by principals and superintendents and that they must make 600 on the national teacher examination to qualify.

Teachers should be graded, said Crews, "everyone has to be graded in life. Everyone has to be graded except the people (schoolteachers) who want to be known as professionals."

repeal the old law. There are 20,000 to 22,000 teachers who could qualify for it." An amendment conforming the measure to the appropriations bill was tacked on the measure and the bill must make a stop in the upper chamber before heading to the governor's desk. The amendment would authorize those teachers who have qualified for the award to get their money.

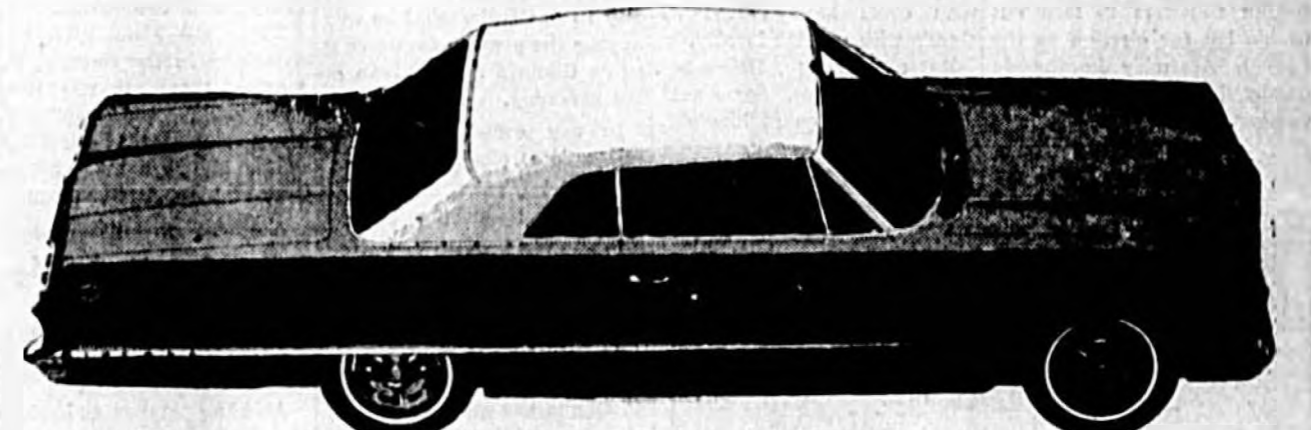

NEW YORK (UPI) — Dick Ellsworth of the Chicago Cubs and Milt Pappas of the Baltimore Orioles boast the lowest run averages in the major leagues.

Statistics compiled by The Associated Press showed today that Ellsworth tops the National League ERA listings with a 1.00 mark. Pappas is the American League leader with a 1.59 average.

Ellsworth has allowed eight earned runs in 66 innings while winning five games and losing three. The 23-year-old southpaw posted a 3.08 earned run average last season.

Pappas has allowed nine earned runs in 51 innings. The 21-year-old right-hander has posted a 4.0 win-loss record and two of his four complete games have been shut-outs. His ERA in 1962 was 4.04.

Juan Pizarro of the Chicago White Sox is runner-up to Pappas with 2.25. Working 90 innings, he has been charged with 15 earned runs.

Baltimore's Steve Barber is right on Pizarro's heels at 2.27, followed by Jim Bouton of the New York Yankees in fourth place with 2.29.

Hank Aguirre of Detroit, the American League leader last season with 2.21, is far down the listings this year at 3.77.
