Cave-in victims identified

The names of the men involved in the trench cave-in on West Airport Boulevard Tuesday morning have been released.

Andrew Home, 25, of Lake Hamilton died within a short time after EMS personnel and fellow workers removed him from the dirt and debris that covered him.

Keith Creason, 22, of Auburndale is still in critical condition at Central Florida Regional Hospital.

The third worker, Pablo Quintana, 32, of Mascotte was treated for minor injuries and released.

All three were employed by Scarborough Civil Corp. of Winter Haven a subcontractor for the project GreeneWay extension project.

E.C. Scarborough, president of the company, issued a statement: "All of us at Scarborough Civil Corp. are shocked at the loss of our co-worker, Andrew Home, and at the serious injuries to Keith Creason. In a small company like ours, our co-workers are also our friends. We grieve for these men and their families. We will cooperate with officials to determine the cause of this tragedy."

The investigation of the cause of the collapse is under the jurisdiction of OSHA. According to local officials, the main question appears to be why there was no bracing or safety measures taken at the excavation to prevent it from caving in.

Sierra Club objects to St. Johns proposed changes

SANFORD — The St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) is discussing major changes to how it protects Central Florida's water and wetlands.

In a moratorium on hiring additional staff personnel, the District Governing Board is reportedly proposing "streamlining the workload of staff and simplifying the permitting process." The information came in a memorandum to SJRWMD Executive Director Henry Dean.

Environmentalists disagree with water district on how to protect wetlands

In consideration of the moratorium and possible changes, the Central Florida Sierra Club, headquartered in Maitland, issued a statement on Monday voicing its objections, claiming any changes in the permitting process will weaken the enforcement of Water Management

District rules or encourage piecemeal permitting without careful consideration of all impacts.

Jeff Cole, with the SJRWMD Office of Communications says the club's memo was distributed to board members, but no action was deemed needed at the present time.

The Sierra Club said it was concerned the Governing Board would consider an overall reduction in required permits, the exclusion of non-mitigated wetlands from permit thresholds, the raising of stormwater thresholds requiring permit, new permit exemptions, and allowing for more general staff-issued permits without Board approval.

Among these changes is a proposal to "exclude wetlands that do not require mitigation from counting towards the

Proceeds from the event, sponsored by Bill's Restaurant and local production/promotion company Waggin' Tail Productions, will benefit the National Parkinson Foundation.

Solo guitarist Jimmy Fields will kick off the event at noon. He will be performing outside from noon to 4 p.m. followed by Bird Dog Bobby and the Honey Hounds, with featured artist Rock Bottom, who will be playing indoors until 8 p.m.

From 2 to 6 p.m. there will be a pig roast. Throughout the day people can choose their favorite drafts from a beer garden outside.

Leigh Ann McNair, head of Waggin' Tail Productions, a local production/promotion company, said that she wanted to do the fundraiser because her mother has Parkinson's disease.

"If you're going to spend your money, it might as well go to a good cause," McNair said.

McNair, who also works part time at Bill's Elbow South Restaurant shared her idea with owner Bill Foulkes and the two decided to turn it into an all-day food and music event.

"I've always been partial to Blues music," McNair said. "There's definitely a need for it in this area."

Bud Rupert gives broken clocks a second chance

LONGWOOD — Bud Rupert considers the resonant chimes of several hundred fine clocks at Christensen's Clockworks shop to be among the sweetest sounds of life.

Rupert is a clock maker — a horologist, "a student of the theory of time," he says.

He began repairing floor clocks and collector clocks after a 30-year military career. At 74, he is very much a gentleman if no longer a Naval officer. A kindly man with wavy gray

hair, he gains great satisfaction when he can give a 100-year-old clock another 100 years of ticks.

He works on although his eye-sight is failing — he's had laser surgery, lens implants. Rupert wears trifocals and a clock maker's loupe that is attached to the right side of his regular glasses. Masterfully, he works on his customers' most treasured possessions.

"A clock is like a person, each one has a heart. Some of these hearts have been ticking for a couple hundred years."

Assessment test for college admission is set for Sept. 23

The next ACT (American College Testing) assessment will be administered on Sept. 23.

College-bound high school students must register for the college admissions and placement exam by Aug. 18, the deadline for having a registration postmarked. There is a late registration fee charged after Sept. 1.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all U.S. colleges and universities including all Ivy League schools, and are used along with other student

information such as high school grade point average, for admissions decisions and to help place students in appropriate courses for their academic achievement. The test fee in Florida is \$26.

Students can register for the ACT by getting information from their high school counselors or online at ACT's Web site www.act.org.

The Web site also has helpful information, sample tests and the opportunity to order test prep materials, including an interactive CD-ROM, ACTive Prep, which contains actual, timed tests and helps

students build a study plan.

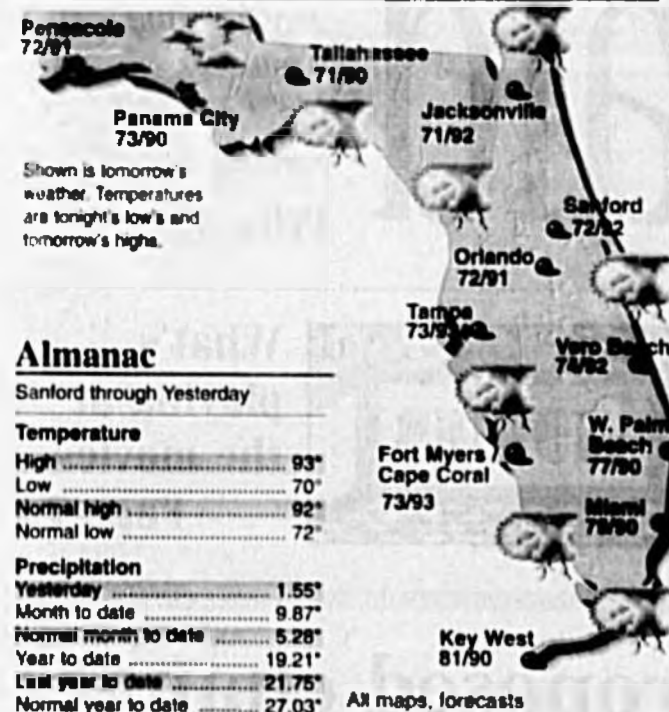
The ACT assessment is given in all 50 states and is the most popular college entrance exam taken by high school students in 25 states including Florida. It is a curriculum-based test, designed to measure a student's academic achievement and the appropriate course level for college placement.

There are four sections to the exam, English, reading, math and science reasoning. Approximately 1.8 million students took the test last year.

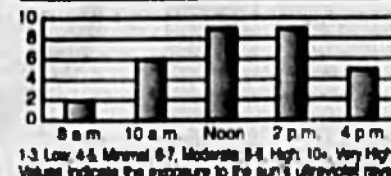

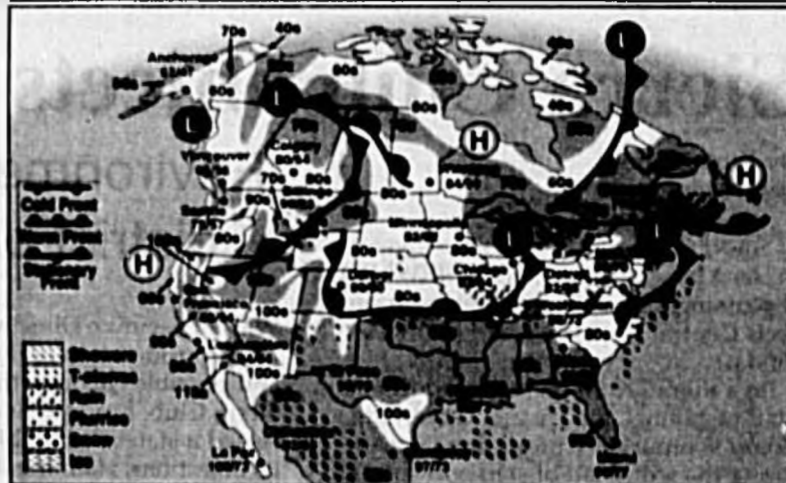

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Lombardi knew all about camp life

Vince Lombardi and I became splendidly acquainted at a "happy hour" social 31 years ago at the Washington Redskins training camp in Carlisle, Pa.

"So, you're Russ White," he said, rendering a cold, first look. "You ripped me up pretty good Monday."

"Tuesday, coach... it was Tuesday."

Lombardi nodded and held out his right hand, saying, "Grrrr, I like that."

America's most popular football coach had left the frozen tundra at Lambeau Field in Green Bay in 1969 to reconstruct the Washington Redskins, who had not been winners for 15 dreary seasons.

At the late summer camp in Carlisle, Vince Lombardi introduced his players to his kind of football. The workouts were conducted at Dickinson College. The two-a-days at the start of camp gave the coach a good idea about each player. The happy hours each evening gave him an opportunity to talk about those ideas.

There would be a half dozen or more of us at happy hour, inside one of the college dorms. Lombardi would be accompanied by some of his assistant coaches. No players, of course. The cast would also include the three writers cover-

ing the team.

Dave Brady, a wonderful gentleman who wrote football for

the Washington Post, used to enjoy a prank or two at happy hour. I sensed this one night when I thought he was pretending to be Redskins owner Ed Bennett Williams on a happy hour phone call.

"You want to talk to Lombardi, huh?" I answered the call, believing it was Brady.

"Get me Lombardi," Williams said, harshly.

"Get 'em yourself, Mr. Big Time lawyer," I said, waiting for Brady to own up.

Lombardi was taking in the whole thing, amusedly. It was Ed Bennett Williams on the line. Happy hour would not be same again — for any of us.

If Garbo was a woman of a thousand faces, Lombardi was a coach of two thousand faces. His players never knew which face to expect. He'd chew you out face to face, making grown men squirm. Ten minutes later, he'd be slapping you on your back. "Sonny, I could kiss you," he told Sonny Jurgensen when the quarterback completed a string of passes one afternoon.

The players were in awe of their coach. He was a legend, they were lonely losers. Now, they would win and his legend

would grow. The man was capable of anything. Some thought he could walk on the Potomac.

For a man who had so much to do and so much on the line his first year in Washington, Lombardi proved to be gracious and gruff. He'd charm you to pieces but he'd gripe about the pieces you wrote that did not please him. He told me one day he liked the writers but considered us, "a necessary nuisance."

Lombardi brought a priest with him to training camp at Carlisle. The Redskins were the first professional football team with a camp padre. The players were up a 6 a.m. each morning and some attended a 6:30 a.m. Mass.

"I didn't know we had this many Catholics," Lombardi said the first morning when three-quarters of the team showed up for Mass.

The Redskins went 7-5-2 for Lombardi in 1969. He died a year later while the team was in training camp. The team won a pre-season game the day after he died. The players asked Mrs. Lombardi if she would allow them to bury the game ball with their coach. She lovingly approved.

He was an American treasure — this Vince Lombardi. And, this was his favorite time of the year — the opening of football training camps.

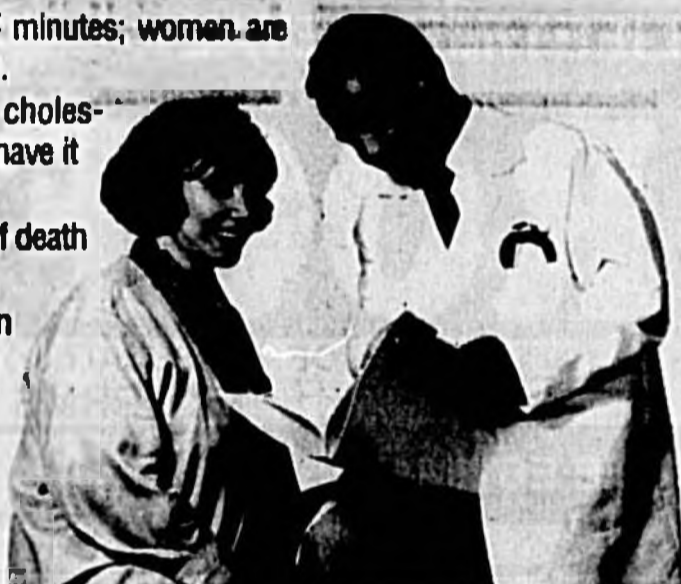

Owner Eric Christensen hired Rupert 16 years ago. The two clock makers work as if they were one — in perfect harmony. There is a fascinating variety of clocks for sale in the front of the shop. Those that are being repaired or restored — "heart surgery" — fill a workshop and a storage area.

"We're three years behind on some," Rupert said. "You don't



rush this kind of work. These are precious instruments. You have to do everything right. Getting to them is the secret. Finishing one clock and getting to the next."

Rupert said he began repairing furniture after leaving the Navy. When people brought in prize clocks, he began to read manuals how to fix them. He took a course and became good enough to ask Eric Christensen if he could work at the shop.

"This is not a lucrative profession," Rupert said. "If we were paid by the hour we wouldn't eat. It is very rewarding in the terms of satisfaction, however. It is a wonderful feeling to restore beautiful clocks, to hear them chime, to know they're alive again."

His most prized clocks, Rupert said, are two-century-old French wonders. "They are very fine precision clocks." On Tuesday, he was working on a French Vincente brass clock. He was able to read the small print: "Received a medal in 1855."

Rupert, smiling, said it was as difficult for him to name a



favorite clock as it would be for a father to name his favorite child. "You love each equally," he said.

As one would expect, Rupert's "Symphony of Chimes," continues at his home. He has six striking — or chiming — clocks in his house. "I keep them one minute apart to hear them individually," he said.

Such a sweet symphony for a nice man.

individual permitting threshold ... or counting toward Environmental Resource Permits."

The Central Florida Sierra Club questioned why advanced notice was not provided for the changes and whether public hearings would be held.

In response, Cole explained that there have already been three public discussions on the issues presented by the Sierra Club.

"I guarantee there will be no dilution of any of our projects," Cole said. "The matters they (Sierra) discussed will be brought back to the board early in the fall. There will be public notices issued to all parties regarding the matter, and we not only invite but urge people to attend hearings on potential rule changes."

In another move, SJRWMD voted to lower a tax rate which has been in place since 1994. The board approved a tentative

\$202.2 million budget with a 0.472 millage rate for the 2000-2001 fiscal year that begins Oct. 1. Public hearings will be held prior to adoption in September.

"One of our greatest challenges is rooted in protecting and restoring water resources while minimizing the impact to the taxpayers," said Governing Board Treasurer Duane L. Ottenstrofer. "Our preliminary budget proves we can accomplish both goals."

Vet seeks bigger audience for little-known part of war

DEAR ABBY: I read with interest the letter regarding Ralph George and his veterans' speaking program. I hope vets all over the country are doing this. I have — on my own — spoken to classes at both elementary and college levels. I have also spoken to service clubs.

I served in an area referred to as "the forgotten theater." The

China-Burma-India theater is not even mentioned in many history books. When there is a program on World War II, it is usually devoted to Europe or the Pacific.

The CBI (as we call it) was a hostile, unforgiving area, with high mountains, dense jungle, rampant disease (more men fell to disease than to enemy action), foul weather, and rain for half the year (200 to 300 inches). Furthermore, many of the mountain tribes were head-hunters.

Many Americans are not aware that we were fighting in China and Burma almost a year before Pearl Harbor and for six months after Japan surrendered. The U.S. government is not even sure how many Americans

served in the CBI — figures range from 200,000 to 750,000. However, most settle for 250,000 personnel. A friend who served in Europe told me that the CBI was used as a threat: "You foul up one time and you'll find yourself in the CBI!"

It's important for Americans to know we were there. Find a CBI veteran in your area and have him speak to your group. A friend of mine doesn't discuss it because he fears no one would believe him.

DEAR BOB: Since I printed that letter, I have heard from readers from both the United States and Canada, describing similar programs involving veterans groups. While I think that veterans sharing their personal experiences in the classroom is a terrific way to bring a chapter in our history to life, not all readers viewed it in the same way.

DEAR ABBY: The letter from Ralph George about talking to children in classrooms was lacking in a very important point. He gave the impression that war is not so bad. Abby, the job of our armed forces in war is to kill people and destroy property. It's a terrible purpose. The talks should not ignore these realities.

Permit me to quote from a speech Franklin D. Roosevelt

gave on Aug. 24, 1936: "I have seen war on land and sea. I have seen blood running from the wounded. I have seen the dead in the mud. I have seen cities destroyed. I have seen children starving. I have seen the agony of mothers and wives. I HATE WAR!"

DEAR STANTON: I agree that war is a tragedy and its realities should not be glossed over, but neither should they be belabored. **Read on:**

DEAR ABBY: The veterans in the classroom program will not work. Most vets cannot tell you about their experiences because that would make them relive them. My brother was a four-time Vietnam vet, and he could not tell anyone what he did. Thank God he is dead and doesn't have to relive that part of his life over and over.

You should never ask vets to

talk about major battles they have been in. What they say was too horrible. I will never reveal some things he told me. They were unspeakable.

A VETERAN'S SISTER

DEAR SISTER: I respectfully disagree. When a trauma is locked inside, it cannot heal; it grows and festers until sometimes it takes over the person's life. Talking with professionals and others who have experienced the same horror is often therapeutic. Such programs are ongoing at VA medical centers — as well they should be. Until a person starts talking, he cannot start healing.

After finishing 39th, 32nd and 43rd the past three years in the Winston Cup standings, Robert Pressley realized his season of reckoning had arrived in NASCAR's premier series. "This was going to be the year of whatever," Pressley said. "This is the year we showed if I could do what I needed to in Winston Cup or if I couldn't."

The crossroads proved to be a springboard for the 41-year-old's previously nondescript career. This season, Pressley is 24th in points and has become a top-20 contender on Sundays. His single-car No. 77 team is ahead of such multiteam veterans as Jerry Nadeau, Jimmy Spencer, Kevin Lepage and Kenny Wallace in the standings.

Pressley's emergence was validated in the Knart 400 at Michigan Speedway on June 11. He jockeyed for spots in the lead pack throughout the race and nearly captured his first victory when his Ford left the pits in first place during a rain delay.

The rain stopped, and Pressley settled for fifth. But a message had been sent. "That was the first weekend we went home and the fans and media felt like we were for real," he said. "[Crew chief] Ryan [Pemberton] made a good call that day. That was the first day that everything fell into place."

It rarely had before. After notching one top-10

showing in 1998, a third at Texas, his best finish last year was 14th. Placing outside the top 25 became routine.

"The worst years of my racing career," said Pressley, who began competing on North Carolina short tracks more than 20 years ago. "But we knew the team was capable. We had everything but a leader."

Guidance arrived during the off-season in the form of Pemberton, the younger brother of Robin Pemberton, Rusty Wallace's crew chief. As crew chief of the No. 36 Pontiac, Pemberton had notched several pole positions and top-10 finishes with Ernie Irvan.

"What Ryan has done is make the cars consistent every week," Pressley said. "There's 12 cars in the shop, and when I get in the car, I can't tell if it's the car for Bristol, Martinsville or Indy. Every car is exactly alike, and it makes my job easier. Last year, I'd get in the cars, and the gauges and switches were different."

The 31-year-old Pemberton is part of a wave of crew chiefs willing to experiment with radical setups to produce results. He said that Pressley has quickly adapted to the new style.

"Robert's got the experience, but he's not set in old ways," Pemberton said. "He doesn't mind going to the outer limits of a chassis setup, where you have to be these days. You're doing things crazy

to make to make the car fast, things you wouldn't have thought of four or five years ago. Odd things that mechanically aren't right. He doesn't mind doing that stuff."

Pressley also isn't afraid to tussle with NASCAR's big names. With 25 laps left in the recent Pennsylvania 500, he was battling hard with three-time Winston Cup champion Jeff Gordon for fifth place. He eventually faded to 14th at a track where he finished 11th last month.

"Last year, we were 35th and 39th [at Pocono], so we're making headway," he said. "Over the winter, I said if we can do everything that Ryan says, we can go over the top 30 and reach the top 20."

The key to remaining a contender is staying in the top 25, which allows teams to use provisionals without being charged and virtually guarantees qualifying for every race.

"Once upon time, I missed a race, and it still keeps me up late every night," Pemberton said. "We have breathing room now and a little more confidence, and that's helped us."

"There's still been a bunch of little problems. When we clean up that part, it will put us to the next level. But there's still another level after that."

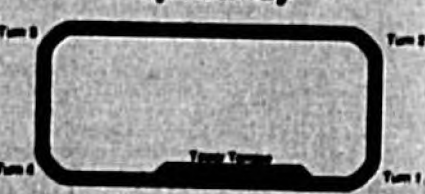

NASCAR ponders a Daytona 500 without restrictor plates

A Daytona 500 without restrictor plates certainly would be a thriller of a kickoff to the 2001 Winston Cup season, just the thing that Fox's David Hill would like to have for his television network's NASCAR debut.

So NASCAR officials will try once again to find the magic to make it happen.

However, there are some serious doubters that NASCAR can, in just a few days in August, turn around the aerodynamic evolution that over the past 10 years has gotten them into this jam.

Richard Childress and Jack Roush are not among the doubters.

A no-plate Daytona 500 "would be great," car owner Bill Davis said, "and there is a way to do it; there is certainly a way to do it. I don't know that I have the answer, but I know there's one out there somewhere to do it."

"I mean, this last race at Daytona was horrible. So there's a way to do it ... with more spoiler, more fender, more drag. Maybe 'lips' across the fenders. Anything to dirt it up and create drag."

"I'd love to say I'm optimistic, because I'd love to get rid of the plates. If they invite us to the test, we'd go."

David Smith, who runs the Mike Skinner-Larry McReynolds operation for Childress, is also optimistic.

"I think everybody is in agreement that it would make better racing if they could put more drag in the cars," Smith said. "They would punch a bigger hole in the air, and that would put a lot more drafting back into it. Now it would take more horsepower to do it, but all the drivers are in favor of more throttle response. It's just a matter of working out what the bodies need on each of these cars."

But Robin Pemberton, who has what might be the best Daytona-Talladega package this season, in both aerodynamics and horsepower, said he isn't very enthusiastic. Pemberton, Rusty Wallace's crew chief, has been taking it on the chin lately, with NASCAR spreading his engines out for the rest of the world to see, so he's not in a good mood at the moment. Now NASCAR is considering some major changes that would take away the edge he and Wallace have worked to build.

"I have not heard one word about that test, what they're going to do or what they're going to look at," Pemberton said. "Not one thing."

"I don't know if there is pressure from fans or press people or television people, saying the races are boring. At Daytona, the best passes for the lead were made on restarts, but there was a lot of racing going on back in the pack.

"If you look at it over the years, every two years or so, NASCAR does this mid-season sweep of 'What can we do to get rid of restrictor plates?' So it's just one more test. I'm not saying it's a good idea or a bad idea, I'm just saying it's their ongoing search for an answer to the question that people keep hitting them over the head with."

"But you can't get rid of the restrictor plates. The technology is too great. The engines make too much horsepower [over 800 unrestricted], and the cars are too slick. They'd run 250 mph at Talladega if you took the plates off of them."

Part of NASCAR's thinking, in agreeing to this test, is the Chevrolet-Ford debate in the wake of Ford's sweep at Daytona three weeks ago. Chevy teams have been politicking for some Daytona-Talladega rules breaks, and NASCAR officials might be able to check that option out, too, in the forthcoming testing.

"The Chevrolets simply couldn't lead any laps at Daytona; we just couldn't do it," Smith said, pointing to Dale Earnhardt's valiant but vain struggle to stay up front. "I think that brought this whole thing up from the back burner. ..."

"Remember, the drafting at Daytona wasn't good. You had to be really lined up and get the right kind of run at just the right time to get by somebody."

"So if they can make these cars less aerodynamic, they'll punch bigger holes in the air, and you can suck up and pass. That's what the fans want to see, that's what these racers want to see."

Altamonte Springs "nine" goes 1-2 in American Legion B State Tournament

DeLAND - Altamonte Springs Post 19 got off to a super start in the Department of Florida American Legion Baseball 2000 Class "B" State Tournament on Melching Field at Conrad Park this past weekend.

But then the rains came.

Jonathan Venters hurled a seven-hitter, striking out eight and walking only three as Post 19 opened the tournament with a 7-4 victory over Ormond Beach-Seabreeze Post 267 last Friday morning.

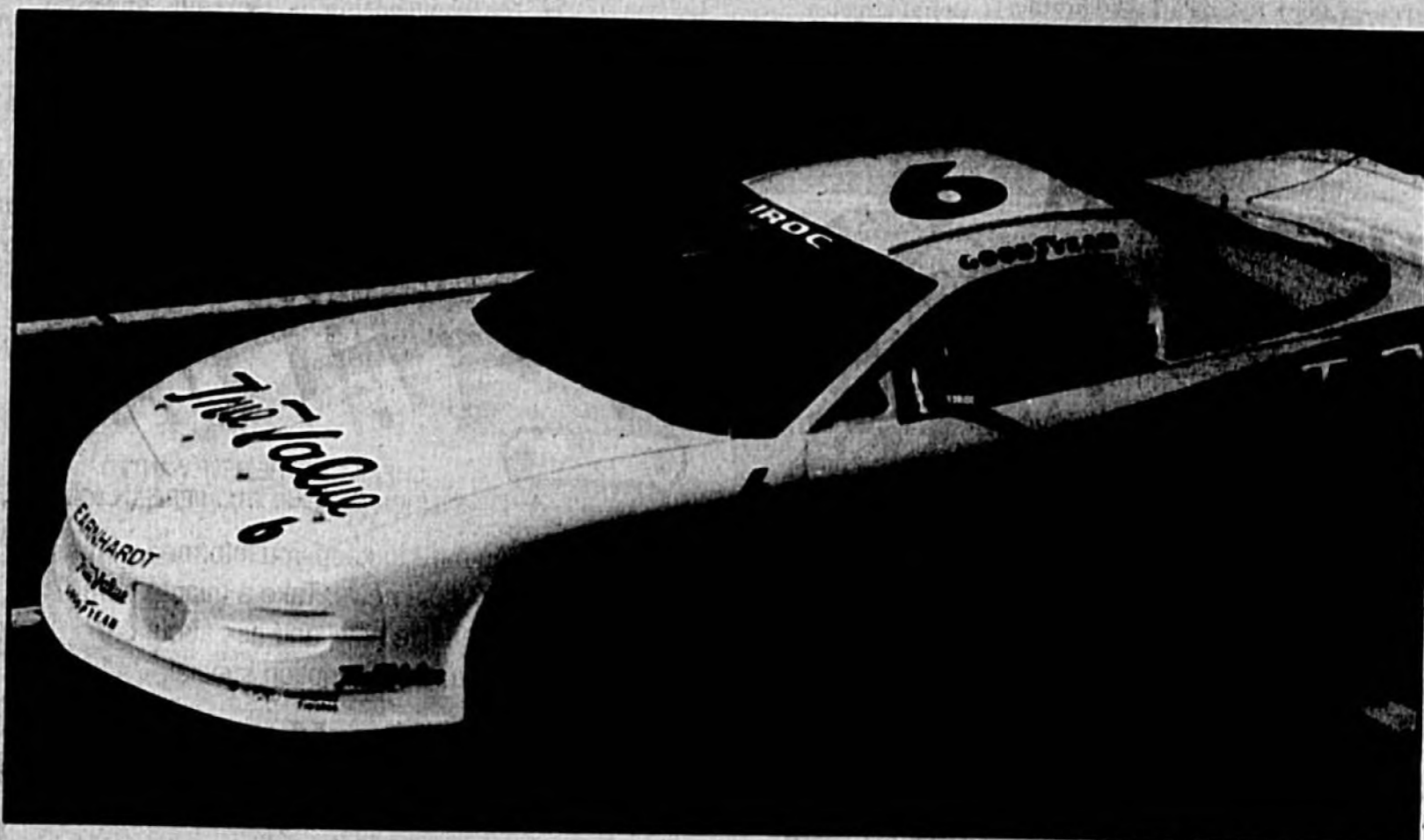

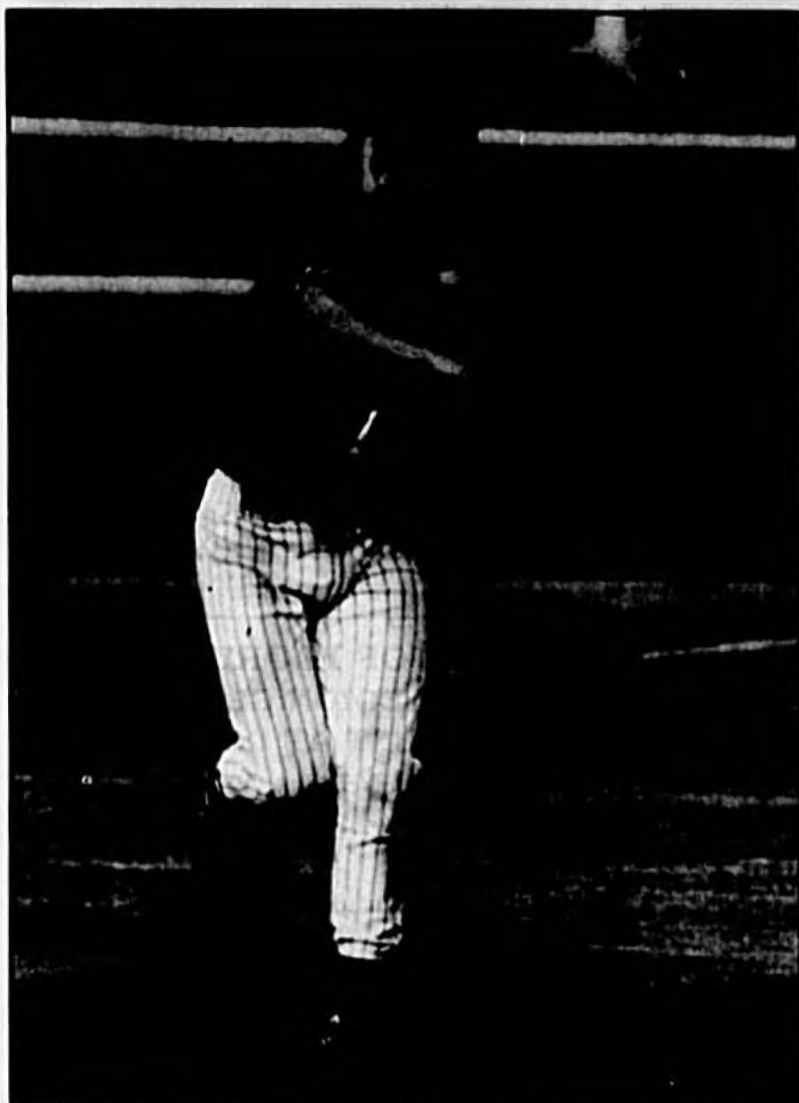

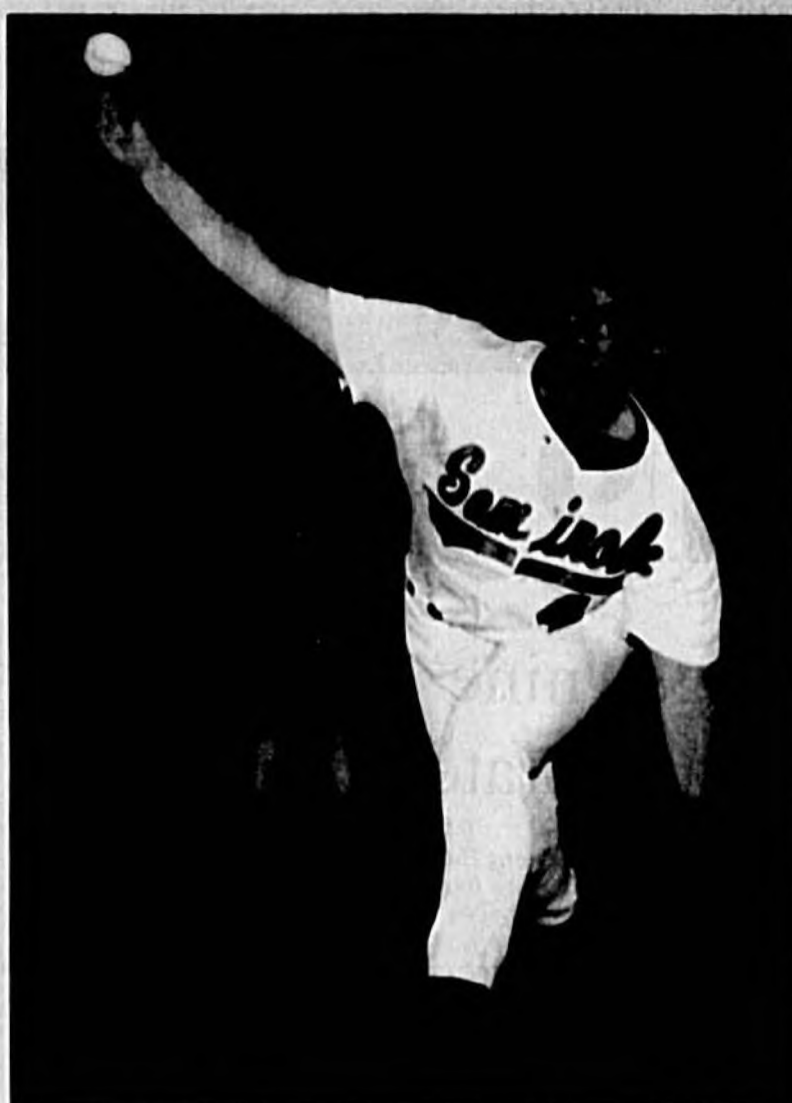
