





## **County Sales Tax** Collections Over \$29,000 For Year

Plorida sales tax collections for turmell of the part few days may the fiscal year 1956 37, which closed out with collections during June (based on May sales), totalled \$100.893,247, according to Ray E. Green, State Comptroller in his

> This is the first time the sales tax has passed the \$100 million mark, he said, and he added, "the total collection of \$100,803,347 is within nine tenths of one percent of the fiscal year."

> The sales tax collections in Seninole County exceeded the previous year's record by nearly \$4,000. In a resume of collections by counties June 1937 collections came to \$29,470.24 in comparison to \$25,630.66 collected in June 1936. June collections lacked approvedmately \$2,000 in being equal to

the previous months enliections. Gasoline tax collections continue to rise in Seminole County, according to the State Comptroller's report. A total of \$70,689.50 was collected in June of 1957 in comparison to \$64,525 52 collected durng the same month a year ago. collections for May 1957 came to \$69,521.55.

Comptroller Green pointed out that sales tax law changes which went into effect this week will not be reflected in state sales tax collection reports until the end



Wood decay is caused by the action of fungi-small plant-like organisms present everywhere in the soil. Numerous insects—including termites-also attack wood. Both need warmth, moisture and air in which to work. Rain-soaked wood and wood in contact with soil are ideal for their destructive ac-

The preservatives suggested by Jensen are poisonous to both in sects and fungi. Mixed with oil, they are not soluble in water and wood soaked with them becomes water repellent. But to be effective the preservatives must pene trate the wood. Surface treatment such as painting on with a brush, is not sufficient where wood is in contact with the soil or where noisture stands. Whenever pos sible, these vulnerable spots shound be immersed in the penta or copper napthenate solution and allowed to stand until thoroughly soaked. For furniture like picnic tables, benches and chairs, stand each leg overnighe in a tin can or other container filled with preservative oil solution. A flexible plastic mixing bowl makes a convenient container for treating odd-shaped legs or supports that will not fit

easily into a rigid holder. You can breat other vulnerable spots—such as joints, bolt holes, cracks, and lumber ends where rain is likely to soak into the wood-by repeatedly flooding the






