## Khrushchev Emerges Soviet Boss Today

### Further Upheavals Seen

LONDON (AP) — Nikita Khrushchev emerged today as the undisputed boss of Russia, but the turmoil of the past few days may be only the prelude to further upheavals in Moscow.

### County Sales Tax Collections Over \$29,000 For Year

Florida sales tax collections for the fiscal year 1956-57, which closed out with collections during June (based on May sales), totaled \$100,893,217, according to Ray E. Green, State Comptroller in his latest report.

This is the first time the sales tax has passed the \$100 million mark, he said, and added, "the total collection of \$100,893,217 is within nine-tenths of one percent of our estimate made at the start of the fiscal year."

The sales tax collections in Seminole County exceeded the previous year's record by nearly \$1,000. In a resume of collections by counties June 1957 collections came to \$29,470.24 in comparison to \$28,630.66 collected in June 1956. June collections lacked approximately \$2,000 in being equal to the previous month's collections.

### 2 Local Children Hurt In Accident In Daytona Beach

A two-car collision in Daytona Beach yesterday, shortly before 4 p. m., resulted in the injury of two children of a Sanford Naval Air Station officer and property damage to the two automobiles estimated at nearly \$1,500.

Steve G. Knight, 8, and Robert Knight Jr. were injured when the two cars crashed at the intersection of Ridgewood and Loomis Avenues.

The boys, sons of Cdr. Robert Knight, Commanding Officer of VAH-7 were hospitalized at Halifax Hospital. Steven received conclusions about the local and abrasions of the lip while Robert received abrasions of the right ear and right leg.

Damage to Cdr. Knight's car was estimated at \$700 and \$450 damage to the automobile hired as property of John Ellis of Ormond Beach.

## Explosion Sends Raging Fire Through Boat Works

Fire, caused by an exploding boat, raced through a piling and metal roofed boat shed at the Sanford Boat Works yesterday.

As many as 12 boats were destroyed by the flames and the shed was a total loss. The flames were brought under complete control at 4:30 p.m. and prevented from spreading into other nearby sheds.

Injured in the blast which destroyed an 18 foot boat owned by Holloway Concrete Company of Winter Park were Thomas Ross, 41-year-old employee of the firm and Francis H. Emerson, 51, a Winter Park architect.

The two men had arrived only a short time before the explosion and were attempting to work on the boat. Mrs. Emerson said, late yesterday afternoon at Seminole Memorial Hospital, that her husband had left home between 2 and 2:30 with Ross to come to Sanford and the Boat Works.

"We were out in the boat the night before and discovered water in the bilge," said Mrs. Emerson, and added, "they came over to pump the water out and try to repair the boat."

The explosion shook the area shortly after 3 o'clock. John Brunley, owner of the Sanford Boat Works and Ray Slaton, whose boat is docked there, pulled the two men from the area. They were brought to the Seminole Memorial Hospital by an unidentified motorist. Hospital attaches said the two boaters walked into the hospital unassisted. They were treated about the face, neck, arms and body. A motorist, who came on the scene immediately after the explosion, said that one of the men's hair was singed off and they both were badly burned around the face.

Various estimates of the number of boats circulate around the scene yesterday afternoon and damaged was set at several figures. However, it is believed, from the actual count of burning hulls, that there were nine boats destroyed along with the shed.

Approximately 200 boats, valued at \$50,000 with the boat shed worth \$20,000, were stored at the Boat Works.

There were 10 boats destroyed in the boat shed fire, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's office. The boats were owned by George Fauer, Gus Varish, Belts Beatty, Holloway Concrete Co., G. F. Graham, Collier Biggers, Samuel Farron, Dr. Ross Beitel, Morris Bob, and Harry Farron.

Four boats usually housed in the shed which was destroyed by fire were out, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's Department records. They were owned by Ray Flint, Maxwell Wells, Fred Smith, and John Talton.

The shed had stalls for 14 boats. One experienced boat owner, locking over the charred ruins of the boats and shed, said that the damage would run from \$75,000 to \$85,000.

The Sanford Fire Department and the Sanford Naval Air Station Fire Department answered the alarm sending pumps to the scene to protect other nearby sheds and boats.

Hundreds of spectators gathered at the Sanford Boat Works, located at the Otteen Bridge across the St. Johns River on State Road 415. Bumper-to-bumper traffic from New Smyrna Beach provided the audience of curiosity seekers watching the fire.

Also at the scene to control traffic and standby for emergencies were Deputies from the Seminole County Sheriff's Department and the Constable.

Similar signs for other commercial business houses are governed by an ordinance recently adopted by the Board of Sanford City Commissioners.

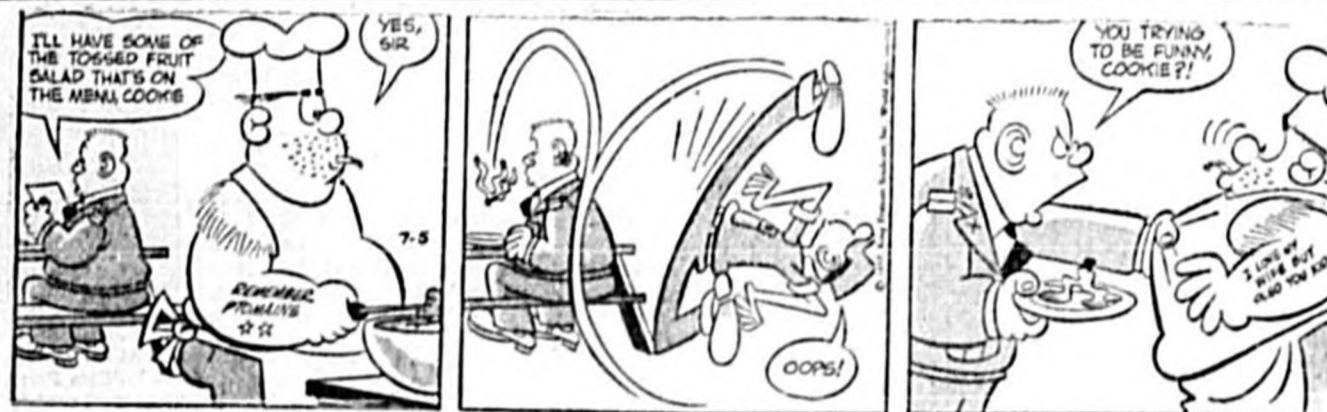

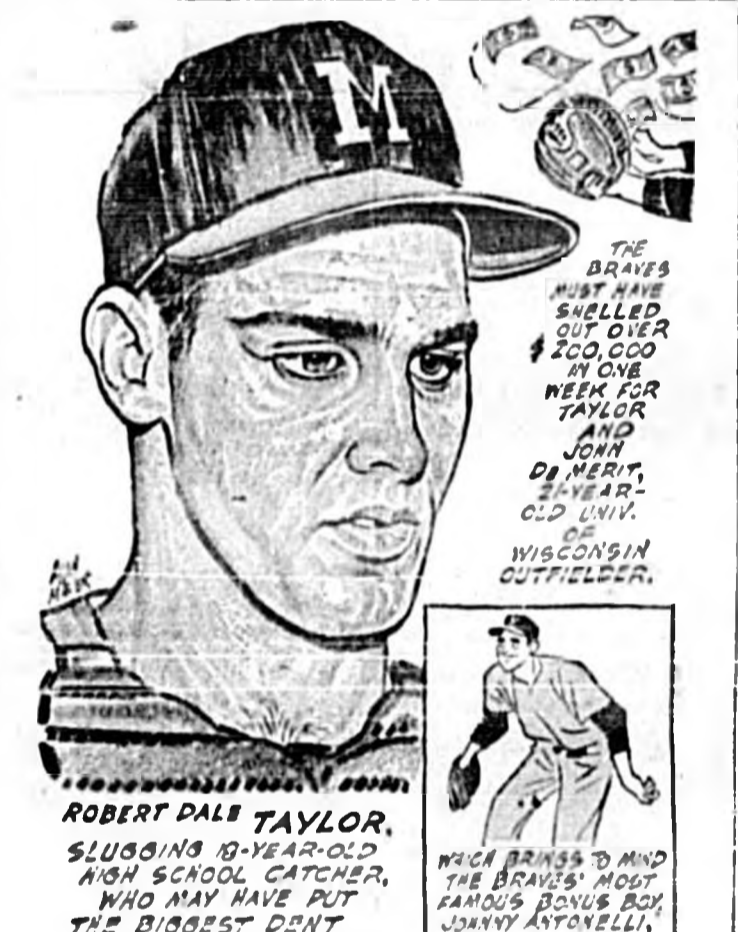

## Silver Lake Scene Of Tragedy

The entire crew of an ASD Douglas Sky Warrior twin jet bomber was killed when the plane crashed about two miles south of Sanford Naval Air Station on a wooded area on Silver Lake between the Boy Scout Camp and a dwelling.

Time of the crash was set by the Navy at 8:37 p. m. Saturday night.

The plane was participating in night training exercises and at the time of the crash was practicing mirror landings when the Navy explains consists of field carrier approach work.

Crash trucks and ambulances from the Sanford Naval Air Station were on the scene in apparently a matter of seconds but were unable to save anyone from the plane which apparently, according to local naval officials, exploded when it struck.

Commander James M. Miller, commanding officer of Heavy Attack Squadron Nine, to which the plane was attached, denied last night in a radio broadcast over Radio Station WTRR that the plane exploded in air as an observer had reported at the scene.

The plane was one of three participating in the night training flight. However, the two planes in the air at the time of the crash were landed at Pinecastle Airforce Base and returned to the local base yesterday afternoon.

There was no property damage or injuries other than that of the plane.

A wide swath was cut through the heavily wooded area as the plane came in at low level to crash. Debris was scattered over the entire immediate area.

A Naval Investigation Board has already started digging into the debris and scattered parts as well as interviewing those who witnessed the crash in order to determine the cause of the tragedy Saturday night.

Civilian automobiles parked in the area along roads leading to the crash scene Saturday night hampered the free flow of Navy crash trucks and ambulances to and from the point of the crash.

Civilian officers at the scene cleared the area as quickly as possible in order to prevent further accidents because of heavy traffic. Two Deputy Sheriffs from (Continued on Page 8)

## New FP&L Rate Offers Saving To Customers

Florida Power & Light Company has filed with the Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission revised residential and general service rate schedules effective approximately 600,000 customers, which will result in an annual saving to such customers in the neighborhood of \$3,205,000, which together with the reduction of \$1,200,000 for its large commercial and industrial customers made effective last May, makes a total annual reduction of \$4,405,000.

It has been estimated that these proposed revised rates will effect an annual reduction of approximately \$90,000 in the Sanford area.

The principal reduction goes to customers living outside the city limits who have been paying more for electricity than those inside the cities, because the city R-

mits have been used for rate zoning purposes. The Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission apparently considers such zoning preferential. In its order to FP&L on June 13 to file revised rates by July 15 or show cause on August 19 why it should not reduce rates, the Commission indicated that the company's schedule of rates "have not been revised to give full and proper recognition to the tremendous growth of certain portions of the territory served by said utility, and as a result certain rates and charges appear to give undue and unreasonable preference and advantage to some persons and localities and subject other persons and localities to undue and unreasonable prejudice and disadvantage."

The following trend is reflected on taxable property in Seminole County: On taxable Non Exempt Real Estate 1937 figures show an increase of \$3,726,481 or 20% over 1936 valuations.

On taxable personal property an increase of \$376,630 or approximately 5% over 1936 valuations.

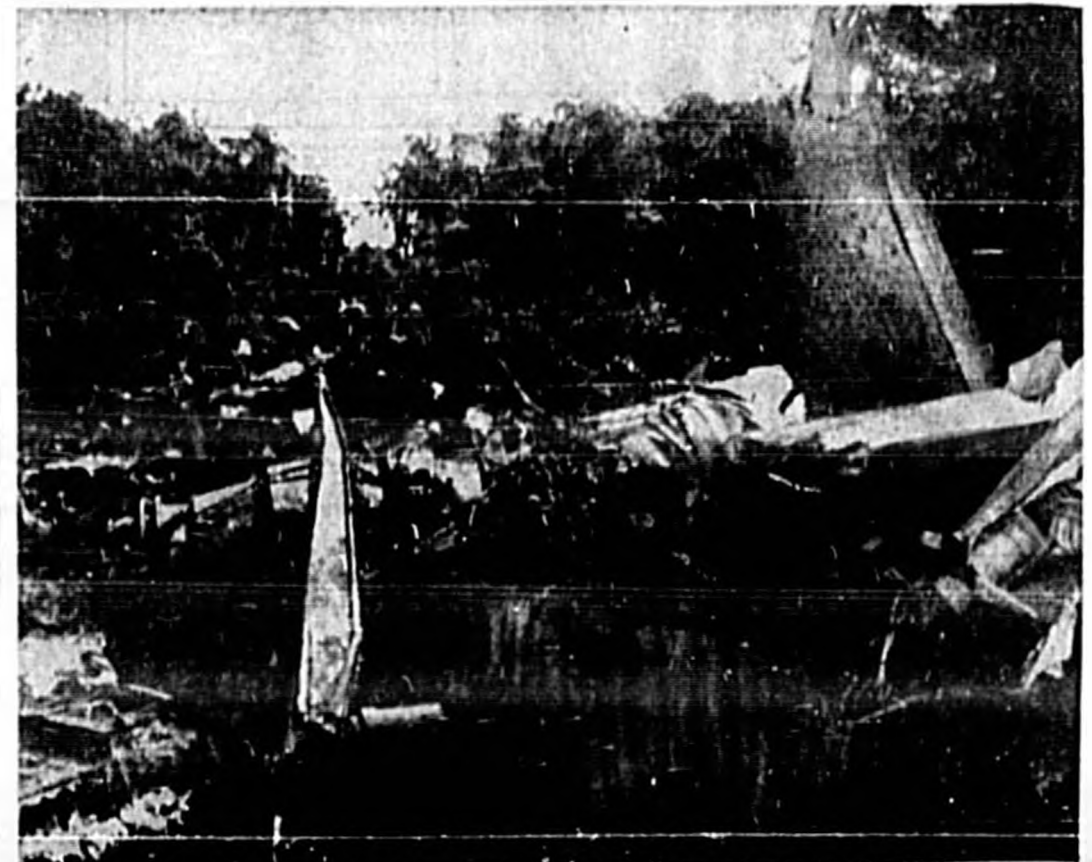

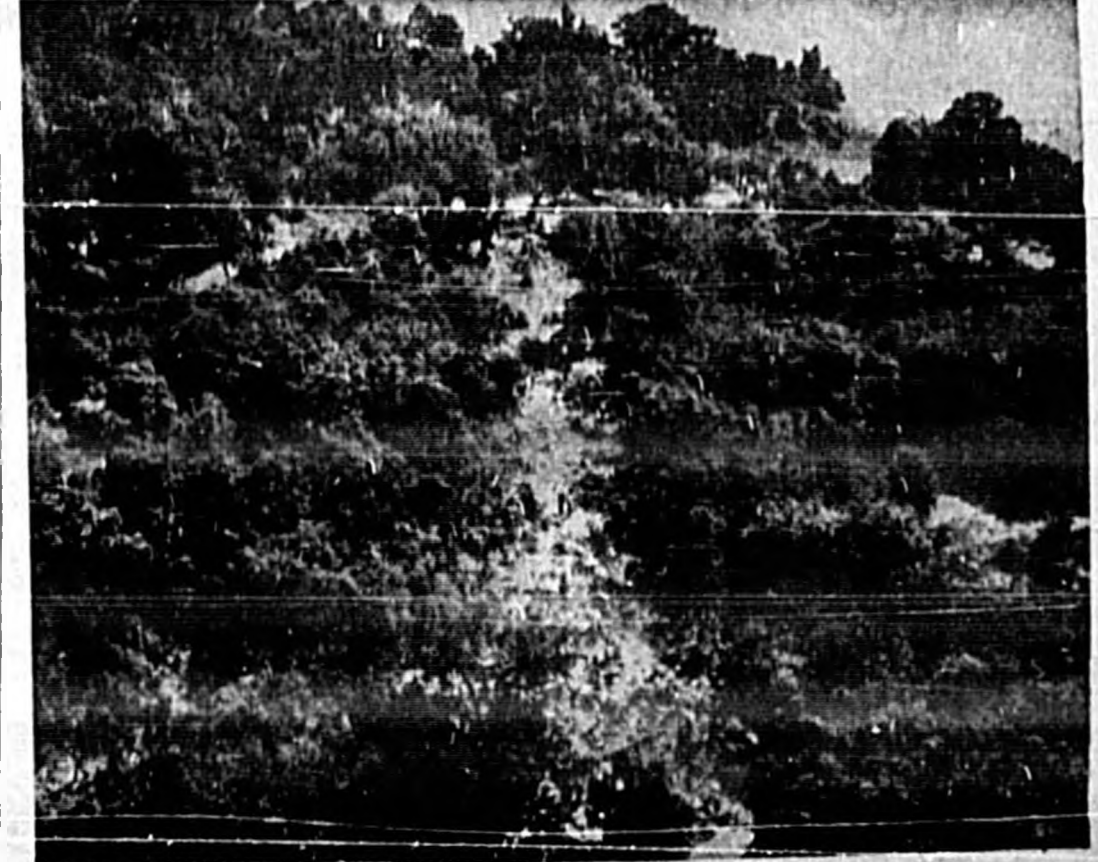
