# 'Failure To Insure Defenses' Five To Face Army Discipline

DORKIN AP Military Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — A two-star general and four other high-ranking officers have been told they will be demoted or reprimanded as a result of the most devastating attack on a U.S. firebase during the Vietnam war. It has been learned. The five, including Maj. Gen. James L. Baldwin, former commander of the 11th Airborne Division, received letters three weeks ago notifying them of the proposed administrative action approved by Army Secretary Robert F. Froehike. Each was given 60 days to present evidence that could change the secretary's mind regarding the punishment, which does not require trial by court-martial. The Army refused comment until final action on the case is completed.

## Florida's Power Says \$ Ouch \$

ORLANDO (AP) — Florida's power industry charged Tuesday that proposed state restrictions on hot water discharged by electrical generating plants will cost producers as much as \$6 billion in 30 years. "You're trying to legislate or rule us into submission," Florida Power Corporation vice president Joel T. Rodgers told members of the pollution control board at a hearing in Orlando. "The proposed standards lead me to believe that the waters of this state would be more protected than man himself," said Rodgers. Rodgers described himself as the spokesman for "one hundred per cent of Florida's electrical suppliers." He said establishing a rigid temperature standard for the entire state would add "untold millions" to the cost of the public without sufficient benefits to the environment. It would impose "severe and improper operating limits on our plants and our ability to produce electricity," Rodgers added. State Department of Pollution Control staff members have suggested permitting power plant discharges to be limited to four degrees above normal averages, and only 1.5 degrees above normal during summer months. Marine biologists have warned that temperatures only a few degrees above normal levels can kill or harm a wide variety of marine organisms.

## 'Just For Meanness' Prisoners Destroy Electric Fans

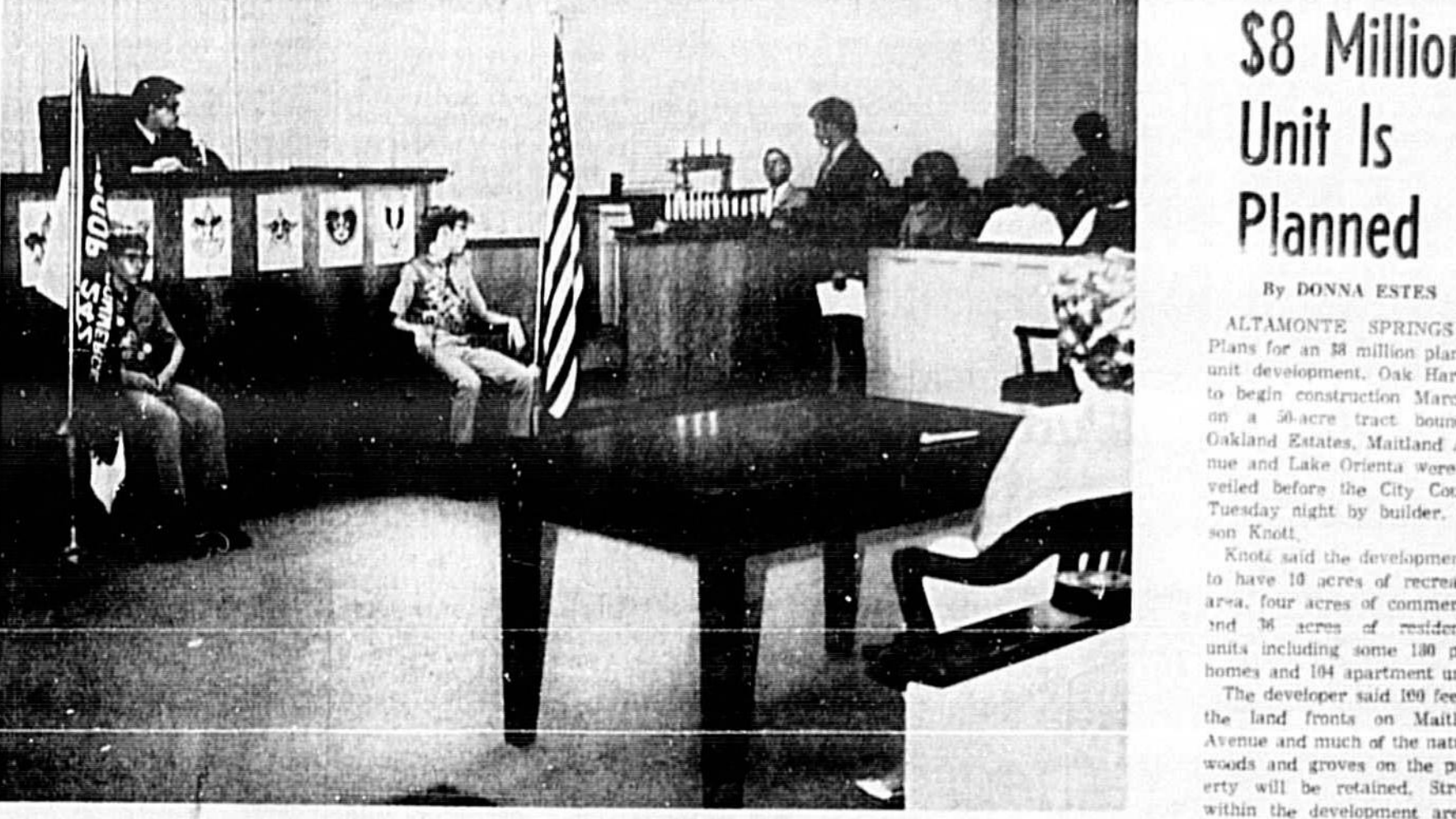

There are no disciplinary problems which Sheriff John Polk has encountered similar to those experienced in other penal institutions. However, Polk did note the fans for which he had worked so hard to procure for the prisoners had been destroyed by the inmates just for "meanness." There is no television available, and visiting hours for prisoners are on Wednesday and Sunday from 1:30 p.m. to 3 p.m. Visitors include only the immediate family of the inmate unless he has no family in the area, in which case he submits one or two names. Mail is censored except from the court and attorneys. The jail is equipped to handle 82 inmates, with allocation being one, three or four to a cell. Two are not placed in cells due to the possibility of homosexual activity, which Polk feels is less likely if there are more in a cell. Two such incidents have occurred during Polk's tenure. The individuals involved in the case have received prison sentences or are awaiting trial. There have been no suicides since Polk took office.

## Bad Debts Collection Pushed Hospital Boosts Room Rates

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees voted Tuesday night to increase room rates by an average of \$2.25 per room and will turn bad debts over to the Small Claims Court to recoup some of a \$250,000 deficit. The action, which will become effective in 60 days, will boost the present room charges for wards from \$28 to \$30 a day; semi-private facilities will increase from \$37 a day to \$40; private rooms will jump in price from \$39 to \$42 and de luxe private room rates will be changed from \$43 a day to \$46. Robert Bessner, hospital administrator, said the change in rates will place the Sanford hospital in the middle and lower middle range as compared with nearby hospitals. In checking with hospitals located in Orange County, which are utilized by Seminole residents, particularly those living in the South Seminole area, The Herald learned the changes will put Seminole Memorial Hospital's rates 12 less than the \$42 a day for semi-private rooms charged at Orange Memorial and Florida Hospital, but the local hospital's semi-private rate will be \$1 higher than Winter Park Memorial Hospital's \$39 a day charge. Seminole Memorial Hospital is charging \$1 more per day for de luxe private rooms than the \$45 charged by Winter Park Memorial Hospital. Trustees voted to change the procedures to collect debts owed the medical facility over 60 days by turning accounts less than \$500 over to the Small Claims Court, unless the debtor makes some form of arrangement with the hospital to pay. Those delinquent accounts above \$500 will be turned over for collection to a lawyer, possibly legal action. Trustees also voted to increase from \$30 to \$50 charges for operating room use for the first hour, \$20 for each additional one-half hour until three hours, then \$15 for each 30 minutes thereafter. Increases for cytotoxicology will increase from \$20 for first hour to \$25 with \$15 for each additional half hour. Recovery room charges were boosted from \$15 to \$18 for the first hour and \$1 for each additional hour. Sigmoidoscopy rates were upped from \$7.50 to \$10.

## SR 436 Congestion Protested Traffic Relief Is Pushed

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Resolution directed to Gov. Reubin Askew, State Department of Transportation, the Board of County Commissioners and the various Seminole County municipalities affected was adopted by the City Council Tuesday. The resolution concludes "that the responsible governmental authorities, agencies and units of government should consider storage lanes, turn lanes, and other facilities which may assist in relieving the problems and to seek the advice and knowledge of officials of municipalities who are confronted on a day-to-day basis with the traffic conditions existing on the highway." In other action, Council held in abeyance the occupational license revision until its next meeting due to length of the document. Plans for the area due by former director of the Orange Seminole Osceola Planning Council, Harlan Hanson, leaves untouched all trees except those at construction sites, Knott said. The apartment buildings were designed to appear to be large houses with eight units in each, four on the first floor and four on the second story. The developer said four one-story professional buildings will be constructed and there will be no retail outlets. Plans for the area will be sold and the apartments will be rented. The houses are to be built on the perimeter of the property. Most of the 30 acres is already within the city limits and zoned high-type residential. Knott applied for change in zoning in that area to planned development (PD) and public hearing was set for Dec. 14. For the portion outside the city, Council adopted on first reading an ordinance of annexation.

Several Seminole Junior College (SJC) students are planning a 12-hour fast beginning at midnight Wednesday to protest the Vietnam War. Dean Robert A. Schreiber said the group, calling itself "Vietnam for Peace," obtained permission to sit in the lobby between the breezeway and college science building. Dean Schreiber said, "There are only about two or three involved in this and I don't believe they will have too many supporters joining them." He explained the fast was tried previously but, because of poor turnout, failed.

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# Jacoby On Bridge

Jacoby and Son

The expert and the beginner both use a standard no-trump with a 4-3-2, 4-4-3-2 or 5-3-2-2 distribution and a 3-6-3 range in high cards. Some experts prefer a 15-17 point range and they all cheat a little so that any one of them will lead 40 points plus three or four 10 spots as a 3-6-3 hand. They do use the no-trump as a picture play bid and they also use very powerful methods of slam bidding in response to a no-trump opening.

One expert weapon is well within the reach of any player. It is the Gerber convention. The simplest way to use this convention is to provide that after a no-trump opening a jump to four no-trump is a strong raise in no-trump while a

or all four aces; four hearts to show one ace; four spades to show two aces and four no-trump to show three.

If a Gerber bidder wants to ask for hearts he follows up with five clubs; a four no-trump follow-up asks to stop right there.

Today's hand shows Gerber in operation. North wants to play in seven if his partner has the other three aces; in six if he has two of them and at least one in case South has just one ace. If South has no aces, North will quit at four no-trump.

South shows three aces and North bids seven no-trump. He knows that his partner will cheer at least two diamonds so that if the king is held against him it will be a sacrifice.

# Speech Therapist Addresses Sorority

Mrs. Barbara Frazier, a speech therapist and member of Epsilon Sigma Alpha International Delta Gamma Chapter, today addressed the members of the sorority in an effort to educate the members as to the why and wherefores of a speech therapy.

"There are many types of speech problems," Mrs. Frazier explained. "Often a hearing loss or auditory perception difficulty will be responsible. Lack of speech could be due to a child who is aphasic, mentally retarded, or to express themselves. Older people having suffered a stroke may have trouble of sound but are unable to express themselves. Sometimes children socially retarded are not so at all. Our labeling procedures are very poor."

Cluttered speech, additions, substitutions, and omissions may be due to cerebral palsied, motor development, cleft palate, dental abnormalities, or any number of other causes.

"Children develop in sequence. We try to discover if he has missed a segment of his pattern and if it is necessary to back up to that stage of development. When they are babies they develop a noise perception, then they localize sound, and direction of sound, rhythm active inflection of voices will follow."

"Many stutters fall into this group. Here the best bet is prevention, ignore stuttering when the child is in the age group 2. The worst thing you can do is to react," she warned.

"The next step in this pattern is auditory decoding of sound. For instance, continued

### Sewer Problem Studied

By ANN SIECKOWSKI

William A. Ploch, utility control administrator, presented a request for approval of a resolution which requires reducing the 80 connections authorized for Englishwoods Estates to 36 and authorizing 23 sewer connections into the City of Maitland sewage treatment plant for Greenacre Estates, and one for Indian Hills.

Leon Pyle, vice president of Conder Corporation, requested that 23 of the 80 Englishwoods Estates sewer connections allocated to Maitland Utilities be authorized for use by Greenacre Estates, located within the Indian Hills Utility Corporation "certified area." However, all Indian Hills Utility Corporation and Englishwoods Estates sewerage flows into the same City of Maitland sewerage treatment plant.

Commissioner Al Davis pointed out this means that Maitland Utilities has only one permit allowance left for Englishwoods.

Langley Adair, pollution control officer, reported there was a minor oil spill at the Seminole Petroleum Company on Fulton Avenue. Approximately five to 15 gallons of fuel spilled on loading the truck. It was washed into the storm drain when the truck was hoisted down and through the drain into Lake Monroe.

side sealed solid. Periodically Polk said, inspection is made of the jail cell block . . . prisoners are removed and stripped and the cells searched.  
Polk feels the answer to the drug problem is that the state should build an institution where youthful drug offenders may be placed. Raiford is no answer, he said, since drugs may be obtained.  
"In any jail there is a certain amount smuggled in . . . it is impossible to catch all," Polk contended.  
Asked if a rehabilitative program of one sentenced for drug offenses as proposed by Zane Clark would be advantageous, Polk said that it might be possible if it were someone who was not an inmate but one who had been "down that road."  
Jail cell furnishings consist of a mattress, sheets, blankets, pillow, and table. Meals are served on a metal tray; for obvious reasons, plastic utensils are used.  
Questioned about the handling of teenage "run-aways," the sheriff said that most return or call within 72 hours. If this is not the case, a state-wide message is dispatched immediately, specifically to an area in which the parents feel the youth may have gone. If the run-away has not returned within 48 hours a nationwide message is sent.

# Nixon Proposes Swamp Purchase

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has proposed Congress buy more than a half million acres of the Big Cypress Swamp in South Florida to prevent "the loss of a treasure trove" of natural resources.  
Nixon said the vast grasslands were "teeming with flowering plants, rare birds and other forms of uncommon and endangered species."  
Anticipating the President's announcement, the Florida Cattlemen's Association Tuesday endorsed a state policy of acquiring the 547,000 acres before private developers fouled it with dredging and reclamation.  
"Animals and birds move between the park and the swamp without knowledge of the artificial borders drawn by man," he said. Nixon said the purchase would "ensure the survival of future generations."  
Nixon said some 21,000 private owners would have to be dealt with and the final bill would probably be well "in excess of \$100 million."

# Police Lone Witness Saw Victim Set Fire

WINTER PARK, Fla. (AP) — Police Chief Melvin Colman said Tuesday he has a witness who saw Michael Moore borrow a truck of matches from another prisoner and ignite a pile of mattresses in his cell in a blaze that claimed his life.  
The 23-year-old Moore perished in a 10-year-old cellmate was badly burned in the jail house fire Monday while rescuers worked to vein to pry open a cell lock that was apparently jammed.  
Colman testified before the city commission in a hearing called to investigate the blaze.  
He told commissioners he had the witness account on tape. However, he would not identify the prisoner.  
The fire, he said, probably had been a deed of mischief. Flames raced through a cell-block where seven prisoners were detained. Five were held in safety. Moore and his companion Dewayne Paige, were in eight man cell.  
Fire Chief R. S. Bair testified that the three mattresses in Moore's cell burned as well as two others in lower bunks to either side of them.  
"The mattresses apparently were taken off the bunks and set afire," he said.  
Both Colman and Bair discredited earlier theories that in tense, heat welded the lock mechanism making it malfunction.  
They said further "hoarding" would only be speculation and they'd let an investigating team determine the difficulty.  
Paige's life was saved when rescuers handed him a protective oxygen mask through the narrow cell bars. Bair said Moore apparently didn't heed calls when masks were available, he said.

# Crime Lab

The new crime laboratory is a particular source of pride for Polk, who explained that Tallahassee in three to four months behind in work and the county was losing its cases because of this. Illustrating the point, Polk said that at a preliminary hearing, an attorney might request a chemist's report, formerly unavailable in some cases.  
The lab is set up for seven counties. Polk applied for a federal grant to implement it as a five-year program. He was allocated \$25,000 for the first year, amended to \$62,000 for the second year, \$103,000 for the third year to begin in July, 1972. \$130,000 has been approved.  
The lab includes one secretary and three chemists and "some equipment" via Tallahassee doesn't have. "Among the list of equipment is a perfluorimetric atomic fluorescence and infrared spectrophotometer. Also included is a stereo-microscope which projects in 3-D. The lab performs, among many duties, case analysis, toxicology, narcotics analysis.  
Polk was queried as to why recent raids on bolita operations were initiated by the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement as opposed to his department, and why there has been a decline in bolita arrests . . . has the operation gone "underground?"  
Polk said his office is working with the Florida bureau and most of the information gathered by wiretap covered a three county area. Raids encompassed a problem since the local department was short-handed, with two more men having recently been placed on the vice squad. To catch the operators, Polk said, "We must have the manpower to operate a wire tap." He continued, "I'd be a fool to say it isn't operating in the county but it's not what used to be."  
B-Girls  
Interrogated concerning any local problems with organized prostitution, Polk said there was none as such. Only a few cases of prostitution exist in the county, he said, noting there is always a certain amount. Most closely watched, he said, are the "B-Girls."  
The problem of narcotics has been removed to apprehending offenders at their "pads" where most of the action is.  
Polk says he has received excellent cooperation from the office of the state attorney, and better preparation is given to preparation of cases by investigators in the state attorney's office.

# Skyjacker Leaps With \$200,000

RENO, Nev. (AP) — A hijacker apparently parachuted to freedom from a commandeered passenger jet after forcing \$200,000 from Northwest Airlines with a bomb threat, authorities say.  
Two of four parachutes obtained by the middle-aged hijacker from airline officials in a Seattle were missing when the plane landed here with four crewmen aboard, the FBI reported today.  
"There's no way he could have gotten off in Reno," said Harold E. Campbell Jr., special agent in charge of FBI operations in Nevada. "We had the airport covered."  
Officials at McCord Air Force Base near Tacoma refused to say whether the pilots of three planes that trailed the hijacked Boeing 727 airliner saw any parachutes during the flight.  
Authorities said the hijacker probably boarded the plane some time after it left Seattle Wednesday night, but apparently there were no witnesses to his escape.  
Thirty-six passengers and two stewardesses had been let off the plane in Seattle. But airline officials said the hijacker locked the remaining four crew members in the cockpit after the plane took off again.  
"He's in the back of the airplane and everyone else is in front," Federal Aviation Administration supervisor Art Williams said.  
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# Communists Accuse Each Other In UN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Communist China and the Soviet Union accused each other in their first clash here of lining up with the United States.  
Chinese Deputy Foreign Minister Chiao Kuan-hua told the General Assembly Wednesday night that the Soviet Union and the United States had "concocted" the nuclear test ban and nonproliferation treaties to "camouflage . . . their own nuclear arms expansion in the name of disarmament."  
Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Jacob A. Malik retorted that Chiao had joined Secretary of State William Rogers in a "curious Sino-American diatribe of negativism in regard to the Soviet proposal for the convening of a world disarmament conference."  
Chiao, chairman of China's assembly delegation, touched off the confrontation by proposing that a pending Soviet resolution for such a conference "should not be put to vote at this session" of the assembly on grounds that it had no "clear aim."  
Malik, head of the Soviet permanent U.N. mission, observed that only Rogers had previously opposed the Soviet proposal. He said the idea of the Chinese had pu forward was "the best possible gift they could make to the imperialists, who for 26 years have been fighting against disarmament."  
Chiao lumped the Soviet Union with "two superpowers" together "to hoodwink world opinion."
