## Burden Of Proof With State

# State Atty. Must Glean Fact

> out the system of jurisprudence . fact and fact alone. The task of gleaning fact, since the burden of proof remains with the state in prosecution, rests with State Attorney Abbott Herring.

Herring explained that the circuit involving Seminole and Brevard Counties (18th Judicial Circuit) was originated in 1967 with present Judge Dominick Salfi as the first state attor-

plemented \$3,000. At the time Salfi's salary was \$18,000; a regular salary of \$15,000, with \$3,000 available to use at his discretion. There was one part-time assistant and the budget included a secretary for Brevard County and one for Seminole, at a salary of \$4,030. This left \$10,000 of the budget, out of

which the part-time assistant, Thomas Speer, was paid \$10,000. According to Herring, Salfi was forced to supplement the state attorney budget through his own law office.

In 1969, Herring assumed the job on a full-time basis, and






